



## **Cisco Woman Pleads Guilty During Trial**

Lisa Marie Rose, 22, of Cisco entered a guilty plea Monday to the murder of Richard "Country" William-

son of Ranger April 25. A jury was seated on the case, but dismissed upon announcement that Rose would enter a guilty plea. Judge Jim Wright of the 91st

which found him guilty of murder in the Williams case. During testimony in Robinette's trial his brother, Martin, said Rose and Robinette came to where he worked and told him, they had killed Williamson. They

returned to the murder scene

south of Cisco and were arrested.

A pathologist testified in Robinette's trial that Williamson had been shot six times, twice in the head and four times in the back. His head was wrapped in tape.

The murder weapon was found in Rose's purse, according to testimony by Eastland County Deputy Sheriff David Franklin.

Before Rose pleaded guilty Monday an Eastland Doctor examined her and advised her Attorney, Leslie Vance, that she understood the proceedings. During Robinette's trial Rose had been described as having the mentality of a "twelve year old."

Assistant District Attorney Bill Dowell represented the state in Monday's proceedings.

HOMESTEAD TAX INSTALLMENT PAYMENTS ARE PERMISSIBLE FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

An Eastland County citizen has requested that we print the following excerpt from State Law, in advising persons that installment payments for taxes on permissible are if certain guidelines homesteads, are followed.

#### (Text of Section 31.031 effective September 1, 1990.)

Sec. 31.031. Installment Payments of Certain Homestead Taxes. (a) If before the delinquency date an individual who is at least 65 years of age pavs at least one-fourth of a taxing unit's taxes mposed on property that the person owns and occupies as a residence homestead, the person may pay the remaining taxes without penalty or interest in three equal installments. The first installment must be paid before April 1, the second installment before June 1, and the third installment before August 1.

(b) If the individual fails to make a payment before the applicable date provided by Subsection (a), the unpaid amount is delinquent and incurs a penalty of 12 percent and interest as provided by Section 33.01(c).

(c) An individual may pay more than the amount due for each for First, Second, Third and installment and the amount in excess of the amount due shall be credited to the next installment. An individual may not pay less than the total amount due for each installment unless the collector provides for the acceptance of partial payments under this section. Cash awards will be given If the collector accepts a partial payment, penalties and interest are incurred only by the amount of each installment that remains unpaid on the applicable date provided by Subsection (a).

dangerous time is when new sprouts begin to form on stressed or wilted plants. Plants which have the potential for producing toxic levels of prussic acid include Johnson grass, sorghum, sorghum hybrids and sudan grass. Wild cherry species also

Producers need to be takacid develops when the plant is stressed in drought condiing precautions now because tions or wilting following a frost is when the potential for frost. Another particularly purssic acid poisoning is most dangerous. Do not graze susceptible plants for two weeks after a non-killing frost. Do not graze susceptible plants after a killing frost until the plant material is dry, usually in 10 to 14 days. Do not graze at night when frost is likely. Do not graze susceptible plants which are wilted or with young tillers.

> After a frost susceptible plants cut for hay should be well cured. Wait at least two months before feeding.

> There usually are no visible symptoms of prussic acid poisoning. Most of the time only dead animals are found. There is an antidote but it must be administered quickly to be effective.

Winter brings the threat of prussic acid poisoning for livestock but it can be managed for when precautions are taken.

## **Time Is Ripe To Promote Propane**

"In the search for a cleaner, inexpensive, effective and readily available alternative to gasoline, government and consumers alike should pay attention to what thousands of Texas pickup owners have known for a long time, and that is that propane can do the job," Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said.

Hightower made the comments at the Texas LP-Gas Association's annual convention at the Hyatt Regency in Austin.

"Today, pushing alternative fuels is more crucial than ever. On the one hand, Iraq's invasion and occupation of Kuwait has shown everyone that we can no longer take for granted the unlimited availability of cheap gasoline. On the other hand, science is letting us know that we must stop contaminating our world with high levels of ozone, carbon monoxide and other pollutants that come from automobile emissions.

Propane might not be the answer to our nation's alter-

native fuel dreams, but it clearly appears to be one of the answers: It's much cleaner than gasoline, it's already widely used, and we have plentiful natural gas reserves in North America. Texas alone produces more than onethird of the propane in the U.S.," Hightower said.

"Increasing the use of propane as a transportation fuel would also benefit the rural economy. Propane is produced by gas wells in rural areas. Most of it is processed in rural plants, sold by rural dealers and used by rural consumers.

"The time is ripe to promote propane and other alternative fuels such as ethanol and compressed natural gas. Public interest in clean, domestically produced alternative fuels has never been higher. "Even government is get-

ting involved. Texas recently passed legislation calling for all government agencies to begin converting their vehicle fleets to alternative, less-pol-

luting fuels. The Texas Department of Agriculture has already started the switch to alternative fuels. As I speak, mechanics are converting TDA vehicles to propane gas. By next week, the agency will have 14 such vehicles, one for each district," Hightower said

Propane is in an excellent position to compete for that market. The infrastructure is already there - we have 2,000 refueling locations on our state alone, and over 30,000 Texas vehicles are presently running propane."

Hightower urged the industry to do more to promote alternative fuels by making it easier to convert gasolinepowered vehicles to propane, by offering financial incentives to car and fleet owners who might be willing to make the switch, by encouraging the state legislature to give tax breaks to anyone who uses alternative fuels, by stabilizing the price of propane, and by marketing propane more aggressively.



retinoic acid -- seems to block the growth of new tumors in patients who have had smoking-related cancers of the mouth and throat. Research was initiated at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Boston. \*\*\*

Medicine used against high blood pressure -- amiloride can slow the lung damage that threatens cystic fibrosis patients, according to a study reported in the New England Journal of Medicine. New form of the diuretic drug, a spray inhalant, was used to treat adults in the test. \*\*\*

And another high blood pressure drug -- spironolactone -has turned out to be effective against acne. Tests at Boston University School of Medicine show that the drug inhibits the hormone activity that triggers the output of the sebaceous oil glands.







Depending on the situation or even the time of day, Robert Sloan is a New Testament scholar, father of seven children, Little League baseball coach, school board member and or interim pastor.

In all things, however, Sloan claims "I am Baptist with my head and my heart

Sloan, 41, is professor of New Testament in Baylor University's department of religion, where he holds the George W. Truett Chair in Evangelism.

He also is a consulting editor for The New American Commentary, a project of the Sunday School Board, and will be the author of the volume on Romans.

The New American Commentary will be a 40-volume set released between 1991 and 1997. A primary goal of the project is to present a scholarly, conservative view of scripture which affirms the divine inspiration, total truthfulness and complete authority of the Bible.

ACADEMIC respect for Baptist scholarship and a dedication to share the message of the gospel are driving forces for Sloan in writing and teaching.

"Baptist scholarship has been thought of as something of an oxymoron," Sloan charged. "I don't think that is true."

"Our Baptist theological traditions are credible in terms of historical scholarship, and I want our traditions of Bible and theology to be subjected to honest scrutiny," he said.

"The challenge is to produce a commentary that is faithful both to the insights of biblical scholarship and to the Bible as the word of God," he added.


SLOAN is a graduate of Baylor University and received the master of divinity degree, magna cum laude, from Princeton Seminary. He did post-baccalaureate research in church history at the University of Bristol in England and received a doctor of theology degree from the University of Basel.

'Theological exegesis is not philosophical hair-splitting," Sloan said. "I hope we can avoid extremist word and tense study because this is not a theological abstract. We want to produce a holistic commentary that looks for larger points and purpose

"OF COURSE, we will do grammar and word study, but not as an end in itself," he said. "The goal is to get to the message so that after reading the commentary you won't remember a word study but a sense of the whole.
