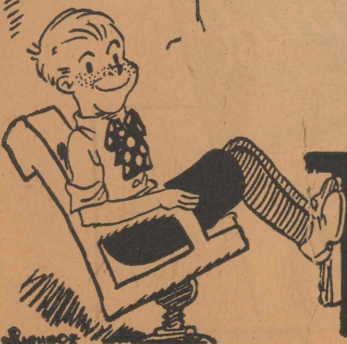
Texas' Non-Metallic Minerals

Owls Defeat the Panthers 7 to 0 In Thrilling Game

Playing before a large Armistice Day crowd, the Quitaque Panthers lost their first home game of the season 7 to 0 to the hard-fighting Silverton Owls. The lone score came in the third quarter, when Allard when over his left tackle for a two yard gain and pay dirt.

The Panthers played a good game on the defense, but failed to get their offense working. Silverton gained very little through the line, made a few good gains on long end runs and seemingly, made most of their yardage through the penalty route, Quitaque being off side in most every series of downs.

Every man on the Panther team played good ball, with Hutcheson, Persons, and Starkey a bit outstanding. The entire Silverton team played heads-up ball.

The first half ended nothing to nothing, with neither team having the edge. The Owls completed several passes for good gains, while Hutcheson made some good gains off tackle and around the end for the Panthers.

In the third period, Bogan dropped a punt near the goal line when tackled hard, with Silverton covering. In five plays, and aided by an off-side penalty, the Owls made their lone score, Allard carrying the pigskin over. Martin made the extra point on a sweeping end run.

In the final period, Silverton out-gained the Panthers, but failed to add to their score. At the final whistle, the ball was resting on the Panther 12 yard line.

The entire game was hard fought throughout, both teams playing hard, clean football. Not a penalty was called on either team except for off-side.

A large crowd from Silverton accompanied the game.

World Supply Cotton Largest In Three Years

COLLEGE STATION—"The world supply of cotton is the largest in three years, according to the Outlook report released from Washington. Texas farmers as the principal cotton raising group in the world are vitally affected by the fact since the price of cotton is governed to a large extent by world conditions," W. E. Morgan, Extension Economist, stated in a recent interview.

"The increase in world is due to marked increase of cotton in Russia, Brazil, and China. In the face of a large world carry-over it is obvious if farmers in America greatly increase production in 1937 they may expect to encounter lower prices. This tendency toward lower prices, however, would be offset to some extent if the general price level continues to rise, or if there is further improvement in demand for the staple.

"Improvement quality of Texas cotton would tend to strengthen the competitive position of American cotton abroad and to make it more salable at home. This is a thought worthy of consideration.

"Government figures indicate that the cotton and supply situation is favorable to maintaining prices of cotton seed and cotton seed products at higher levels this season than last. As a part of the general outlook on cotton this fact is encouraging," Morgan said.

Baptist Pastor At State Convention In Mineral Wells

The General Baptist Convention of Texas is now holding its Centennial meeting at Mineral Wells. Eight thousand delegates and visitors are present for the meeting. Prominent speakers from Nashville, Tenn., Richmond, Va., New Orleans La. and other points throughout the South are on the program.

The State of Texas has the largest gathering of any State in the Southern Baptist Convention.

Representing the Quitaque Church at Mineral Wells are Rev. R. Neal Greer and Rev. J. G. Gowin. Rev. J. G. Eldridge of Flomot and Rev. H. L. Burman of the Calvary Baptist Church of Silverton accompanied the two from Quitaque, leaving early Tuesday morning.

Rev. Greer states that the local church has a record for the past year of which they may be proud. They have given more to the co-operative program than in any previous year in the church history. The Quitaque church led all churches in the Floyd County Baptist Association in baptisms for the past year.

The party will arrive back in Quitaque Friday evening, and Rev. Greer will occupy the pulpit as usual Sunday morning.

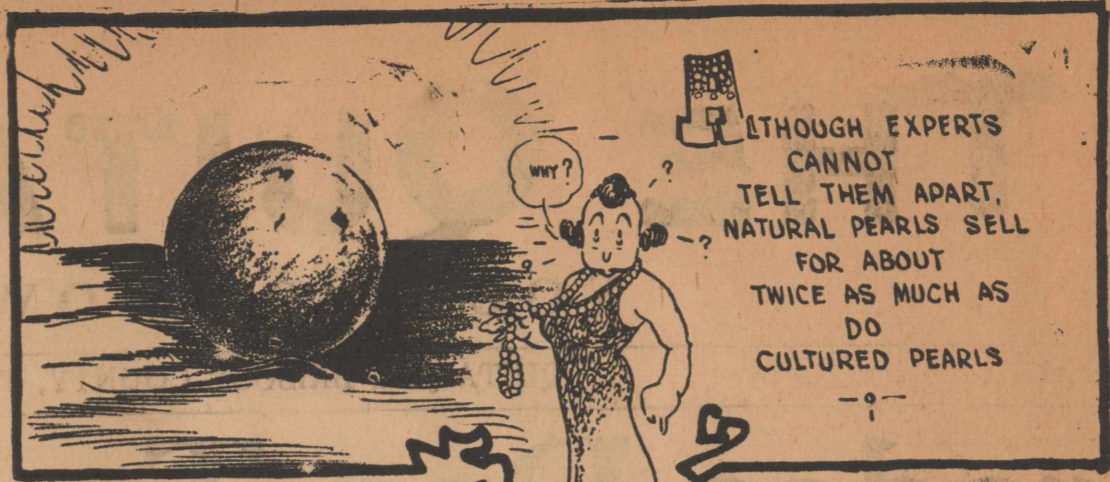

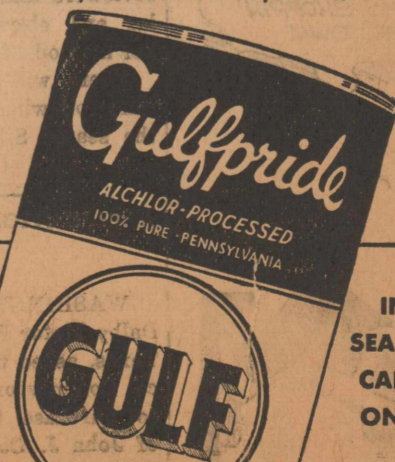

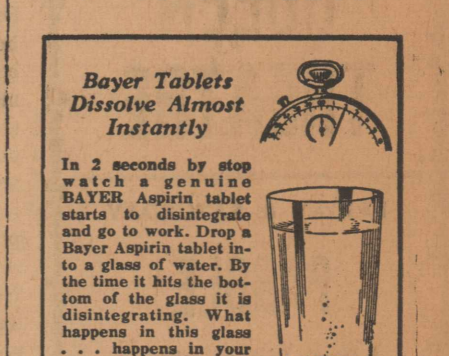

Home Demonstration News

"Walk into my bed room and view a restful sight," is the goal of the Home Demonstrators of Briscoe County, and they are making their plans accordingly. In furnishing, they think a good plan is to take stock of the furniture on hand, discard the useless articles and put in the best possible condition those which can be used. Often there are

pieces of furniture of good design and material stored away that can be brought out, renovated and put into use again.

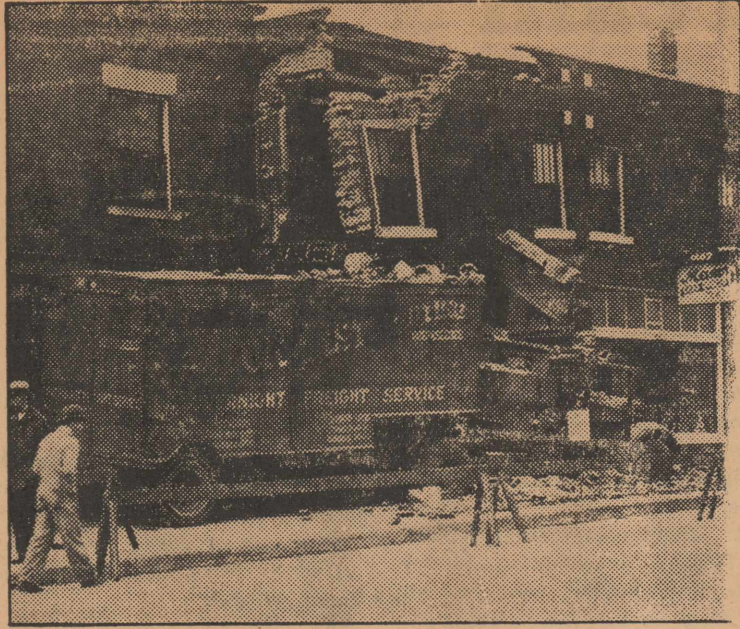
Naturally the bed is the most important piece of furniture in a bed room. The bedstead should be firm and substantial but light enough in weight to be moved easily. The comfort of the bed will be determined by the springs and mattress.

It is important that the springs should support the weight of the body without sagging, the vertical or open coil type is usually recommended on this account. The mattress should be firm enough to support the body, yet soft enough to prevent the bones of the hips and shoulders from becoming sore from pressure. The essential points to remember in the selection of a mattress are that it should be sanitary, light and elastic, and that it should not mat or become lumpy.

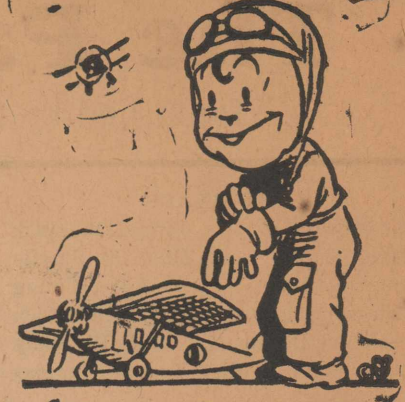
Paducah 81, Quitaque 0

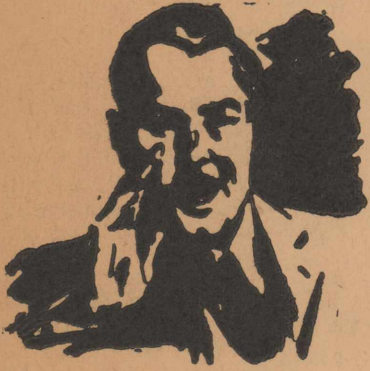

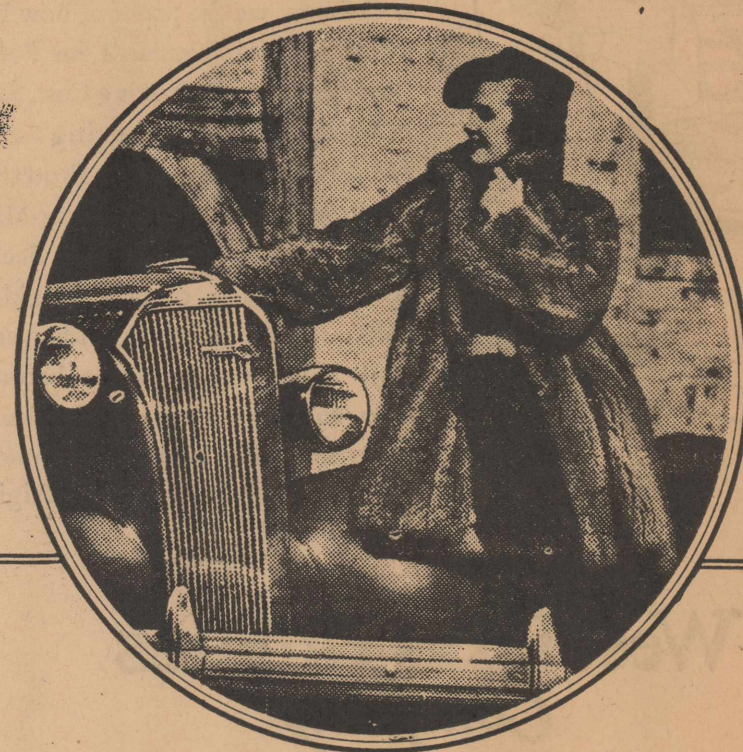
