### **Ouality Meat Show** Dates Set for April

Lubbock-Dates for the eighth annual Plains Quality Meat Show, which from this year on will be known as the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show, will be April 4, 5 and 6, according to announcement made this week.

Few charges were made in the organization, mainly the premium list. Heretofore premiums in the calf division were paid on ten places in the individual classifications, and three places for a group of three, but the new lists will show premiums distributed to fifteen places for individual classifications and five places for a group of three.

In the fat pig division it was voted for this year only to classify as follows: Lights, 180 to 225 pounds; heavies 225 to 325 pounds. For the 1939 show classification weights were set at 180 to 240 for lights, and 240 to 300 for heavies

The "breaking point" for calves for this year was set at 850 pounds, those above going into the senior class and those below in the junior class.

As has been the custom in the past, the scene of the show will be at the Panhandle South Plains Fairgrounds. The cured meat division and other activities including demonstrations which have been held in 'the Women's Building at the fair grounds, were discontinued.

A "Fun Nite" program for the first two nights of the show will be the feature entertainment under 'the personal supervision of Assistant Coun'y Agent Homer Thompson. Exhibitors from more than 35 counties are expected to have part in this pro-

DEMAND FOR COTTON BUILT ON ITS DESIRABLE QUALITY

Austin-Demand for raw cotton, commodities which satisfy wants, director of the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas and internationally known cotton economist.

"This suggests that the huge demand for cotton has been built on its desirable qualities as a raw material for manufacture, and because of its cheapness," Dr Cox said.

"Raw cotton itself is used for manufacture and for nothing else. Almost 100 percent of the raw cotton must be spun into yarn before it is usable, and a very large percent of the yarn must be woven into cloth. Since this is the case, it is a universal custom to measure the demand for cotton by the volume of cotton spinning mill consumption. All spinning mills do not use the same amount of cotton per spindle, as that is determined largely by the fineness of yarn made and the hours per day the mill is operated. In the main, however, the locations of the cotton spinning spindles of the world locate the world's demand for raw cotton. "Demand in foreign markets for

By far the largest entertainment structure ever constructed, it will contain enough shows, devices, restaurants, villages, shaded rest spots, secondary streets and plazas to handle more than 250,000

One huge theater-restaurant alone will have seats for 5,000. Another music auditorium will seat 2,500. An amphitheater the state of New York at a cost of \$1,600,-000; erected at the head of one of the lakes it will be the scene of operas, aquatic exhibitions, pageants and other extravaganzas.

The visitor to the Fair will walk about two miles merely to pass through the amusement section which will be laid out in the form of an oval loop with no "dead end" streets.


