### Letters From The Boys

Letters from Junior Hulsey who is in Japan, to his grandmother Mrs. W. I. Hulsey and relatives here:

Yokosuka, Japan, Jan. 2.—Dear Grannie and All: Just a few lines tonight as I haven't much time. How's everything at home by now? Hope everyone is well and had a swell time during the holidays. I'm still ok myself.

Did the kids have a good time Christmas? Sure hope so. I suppose Homer and family came over didn't they? Sure wish I could have been there too. I probably won't be able to recognize anyone when I do get back.

Everything was pretty quiet over here over the holidays. That is, compared to last year. As usual, almost everyone was drunk but there wasn't too much trouble, I'm happy to say. They took up all the guns a couple of days before Christmas so there wasn't too much fireworks. Just a few stray shots now and then.

Here lately it's been too darn cold to get out and see what changes have been taking place in Japan. And there have been quite a few changes made in the past four months.

I'm taking to the Japanese language like a duck to water. I can carry on a sensible conversation in Jap now and can ask for practically anything. The only thing that gets me mixed up is the similarity of Jap and Spanish. I took a course in Spanish while I was on Guam. I've almost forgotten it now though.

So you couldn't find any .25 ammo, eh? Well Grannie, don't worry about it. I have another gun now with about 70 rounds of ammo. A Jap gave me the gun. It's really ok. It's a Browning automatic cal. .32. I may sell my .25 now. I can get \$100 for it easy. A small gun out here is almost priceless. They cost, but heavy.

Speaking of guns, I mailed a Jap rifle and a shotgun home the other day, also a Jap bayonet. Grannie, don't let anyone try to shoot either of them. They aren't too safe with American ammo.

I took five rolls of film into Hamakuo a couple of days ago to get them developed. Sure hope they turn out good. I have a darn good camera now. I should get some good pictures with it.

So the kids like school this year, eh? Swell! Just keep on liking it and make some swell grades. I have been thinking very seriously about going back to school when I get back. I know I need the education. There are a few things that kind of make things discouraging though.

Well, Grannie, I have to go to work now so bye. Take care of yourself please and stay in out of the weather. Write when you can.

Jan. 29.—Dearest Granny and All: Will try to write a few lines tonight as the barracks is pretty quiet for a change.

Sorry I haven't written lately but I've been pretty busy. I'm a Honsho in the NCO mess. A Jap pusher, in other words. I keep pretty busy, I'm sorry to say.

Gee, I'm glad Faye and Jo are making good grades in school. Just keep up the good work. I don't know how I'm going to make out but I wouldn't be surprised too much if I don't make such good grades when I first start back to school. I'm a little rusty on school subjects just now.

So Ollie and Wanda are home for good. Swell, I'm glad for them. I hope to be home before long myself. Tell Loyd not to be too onery until I get home. I can teach him a little meanness I think.

Tell dad that one's conduct isn't going to shorten a cruise over here, but my conduct is fair now (brag, brag). I'm sticking pretty close to the barracks. If nothing happens I'll be on my way to the States by the 4th of March. I'm keeping my fingers crossed until then, though.

It was badly smashed up and Bud escaped from the wreckage by crawling through the top, most of which had been torn off.

Bud is in the Matador hospital and has been very sick with pneumonia caused by exposure to the cold following the accident, and the extent of his injuries had not been determined Wednesday on account of his serious illness. However he was reported somewhat improved Thursday and the doctors thought maybe they had the pneumonia licked.

W. F. Geisler had started to Amarillo early Sunday morning and when he saw Bud's auto stacked up against the telephone pole, returned to town for assistance. He didn't at that time see the injured man, who had gotten out of his wrecked car and dragged himself to the pavement where he collapsed. Just how long he lay on the ground in the cold is not known but presumably a couple of hours.

Doctors at the hospital feared he might have suffered an injury to his spine as well as internal injuries, but this is yet to be determined. Bud's many friends are hoping for the best and wish him a speedy recovery.

That you may know what our status is in regard to the lumber situation, we are publishing here our latest information from our Gainesville headquarters:

**To The Managers:**

For your information: The Government has just passed new regulations restricting lumber, doors, windows, frames, finish, trim, brick, tile, wall boards and a number of items used in building houses for the construction of homes for GI's. These regulations require dealers to sell only to veterans, at ceiling prices, any of the items mentioned in the regulations, purchased after January 15, 1946, on permits issued by the Federal Housing Administration (FHA).

Any item of merchandise mentioned above that was purchased and received by a dealer on and after January 15, 1946, must be held in his place of business for 60 days and at the expiration of 60 days, if the dealer has not been presented any permits issued by the FHA then the dealer is permitted to sell that merchandise to any one to be used for any purpose.

We have not found anywhere in these instructions where steel products, builder's hardware, cement and such items come under these restrictions and you are permitted to sell anything in this line as you have heretofore. These items may be put under restrictions at any time but we will notify you as soon as possible.

These restrictions do not affect any merchandise that you had on hand on January 15, 1946, and you are to sell them the same as you have heretofore.

**AGRICULTURE MEETINGS AT AMARILLO AND PLAINVIEW**

Pending legislation and government rulings, and their relation to the future welfare of agriculture, will be discussed by producers of this area in a meeting to be held at Amarillo on Friday, February 22. All speech making will be dispensed with and all time will be devoted to round table and group discussions, analyzing agricultural problems and possible solutions.

The meeting is sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation and discussions will be led by J. Walter Hammond, president, who has just returned from Washington and has firsthand information on the attitude of government officials and members of Congress regarding agricultural issues. Hammond will be assisted by Marvin

Carter, organization director, Texas Farm Bureau.

"These matters should be brought to the attention of farmers," Hammond declared. "The welfare of agriculture is necessary to the prosperity of the nation, and farmers are best qualified to determine what is fair and just for agriculture," he said. "Farmers must take part in these meetings and accept their full responsibility if a prosperous agriculture is to be had. Without a prosperous agriculture, we cannot hope for a prosperous national economy. It is most important that in this reconversion period, agriculture—with 25 per cent of the people of the nation—is given the same consideration and opportunities that are extended to other groups in the nation."

All farmers are invited to attend and participate in the discussions at this meeting. Agency officials are also extended an invitation to attend and give farmers the benefits of their knowledge and experience in administering the different programs.

Joe Hatton of Spearman, member of the board of directors from this district will serve as chairman. The meeting will start at 10:00 A. M. in the Herring Hotel at Amarillo.

Another meeting of the same nature will be held at the Hilton Hotel, Plainview, Monday, February 25 starting at 10:00 A. M.

**INCOME TAX ADVISERS IN MATADOR FEBRUARY 19**

"In spite of all the changes in the income tax laws, March 15 is still the deadline for filing final income tax returns.

"Everyone who had a gross income of \$500 or more in 1945 must file a return. This even includes minor children with \$500 or more gross income. In addition, many wage earners whose salaries were subject to withholding will not owe a tax for the year, but must, nevertheless, file a return in order

to obtain a refund of amounts withheld by their employers from their salaries or wages.

"In order to give taxpayers of this locality first hand assistance in the preparation of their returns the Collector of Internal Revenue at Dallas, is sending Deputy Collectors Fred I. Merrick and W. Dorn to upstairs, First State Bank, Matador on Tuesday February 19, 1946

"The Collector urges every taxpayer to make an effort to bring his tax problems before the Deputy Collectors named above, on the dates shown. The point is stressed that you must bring with you all of your Withholding Receipts, together with complete information as to all 1945 income, expenses and deductions. The Deputy Collectors will need this information before they can give you advice as to how to file your return."

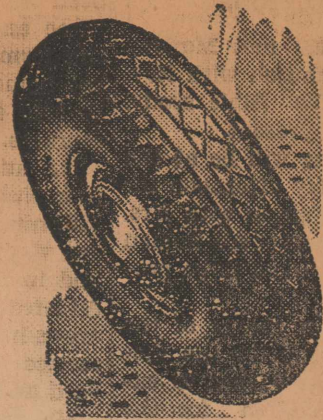

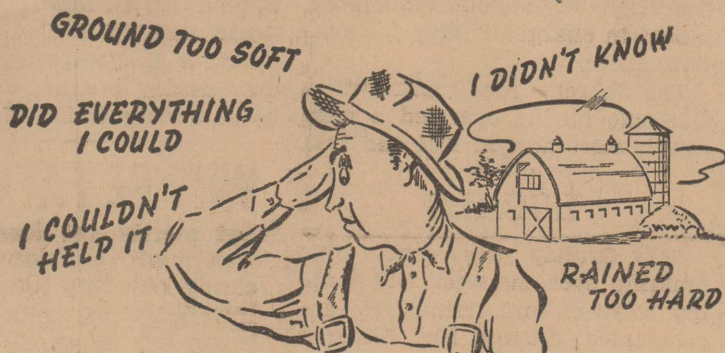

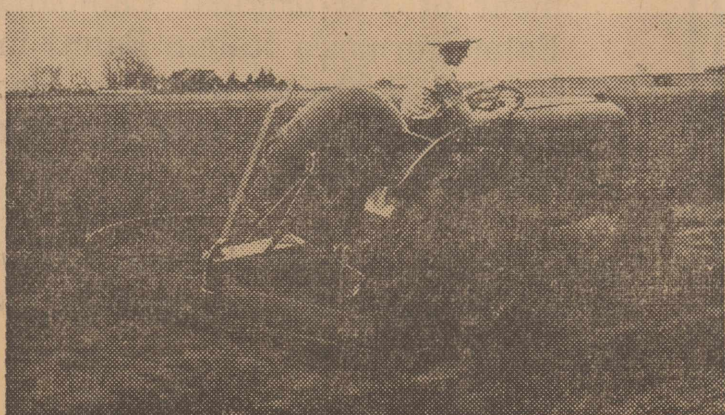
