## Turkey Man Dies In Car Crash In Colorado

Lawrence Arnold, 25 years old, of Greeley, Colo., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Arnold of Turkey, was instantly killed Monday night at 8:15 o'clock Mountain Time, at Springfield, Colo., when the five passenger Dodge automobile which he was driving ran into the caboose of a freight train, obscured by a dense fog.

Lawrence was accompanied by his wife and baby and a friend, a young man named Stafford, who attends school at Greeley but whose mother lives in Amarillo, whom he was coming to visit.

Mrs. Arnold was badly cut and bruised and is in a hospital in Springfield; the baby was uninjured. Stafford also suffered cuts and bruises but was not seriously injured. The car was completely demolished, Hollis Arnold, brother of Lawrence who went to the scene of the accident, reported.

Stewart-Hardcastle ambulance went to Springfield after the body immediately after receipt of news of the tragedy.

Funeral services for Lawrence were arranged for 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon at the high school with Rev. C. W. Parmenter officiating. Burial was to be made in Dreamland cemetery with military honors under the auspices of Turkey post of the American Legion. Music for the service was to be furnished by a quartet composed of Bobbie Mullin, Mrs. Oleta Randall, Jake Lacy and Raldo Meacham.

Pallbearers named were Red Williams, Buster Hanna, Roy Russell, Al Duncan, J. T. Mullin and Clinton Lane. Flower bearers were Lyda Castleberry, Mary Daniels of Tulla, Margaret Stevens and Elnora Masterson.

Born at Turkey October 25, 1920, Lawrence attended the Turkey schools and after his graduation here attended the Portales Junior college. He left Portales and entered the college at Greeley where he was attending school when he entered the Navy.

Lawrence was in the Navy for some time but was given a discharge after injuries had been received, caused by a shell explosion that burst his ear drums and impaired his hearing.

Returning to civilian life he went back to Greeley where he bought and was operating a service station and continuing his studies at the college.

Lawrence and his family were enroute to Turkey to visit relatives when the tragic accident occurred.

Surviving besides his wife, baby and parents are four brothers, Hollis Arnold of Amarillo, Joe of Tulla, Roger and Jesse of Turkey; three sisters, Mrs. T. E. Foster of Tulla, Mrs. Joe Richardson and Mrs. Cecil Shannon of Turkey.

## Earl Lyles Is Buried At Turkey Feb. 17

Last rites for Earl (Boy) Lyles were held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Turkey high school with Rev. Alva Johnson officiating. Interment was in Dreamland cemetery under direction of Stewart-Hardcastle Funeral Home with Turkey Masonic lodge conferring the graveside rites.

Mr. Lyles, who was 53 years 6 months and 2 days old, had been in impaired health and almost bedfast for the past five or six months. His condition became serious two weeks ago and he was taken Feb. 8 to the Methodist Memorial hospital in Fort Worth where he remained under treatment until his death at 7:40 o'clock Wednesday evening, February 13.

His wife, his sister Mrs. Valmer Meacham and his son E. J. who lives at Weatherford, were at his bedside when he passed away. His daughters Mrs. Jack Hutchinson of Quitaque and Mrs. Jack Lowe of Morton, accompanied by their husbands, responded to a message that their father was dangerously sick, but he died before their arrival.

George Stewart of Stewart-Hardcastle Funeral Home, accompanied by Bud Meacham, a nephew of deceased, went to Fort Worth and brought the body to Turkey.

Earl Lyles was born August 13, 1892 north of Quitaque in Briscoe county. He moved to a farm near Turkey in 1910, later moving to Turkey where he lived until 1942 when he and Mrs. Lyles moved to Morton. After two years at Morton they moved to Lubbock where they were living at the time of his death.

After moving to Turkey community, Roy was married to Miss Marie Foley of Foley community and to this union four children were born, Earl J., Jeraldine, Dorothy Nell and Lewis.

Surviving besides his wife and four children are two grandchildren and his father, A. L. Lyles of Turkey and a sister, Mrs. Valmer Meacham of Turkey.

During his residence in Turkey, Mr. Lyles was associated with various business institutions. He was manager of the Turkey compress for many years, was president of the old Farmers & Merchants bank for a year and then went back to the compress as manager.

Matthew 25: 16—"He that had received five talents went and traded with them."

Dr. Henry P. Van Dusen recently said in a thought provoking lecture, "We have been speculating with life for a long time, now we must invest life." It was a fine line of division between those two terms that is not easily seen by us many times! Speculation, and investment, we are prone to think of as being about the same things. But actually they are along way apart. Cheap chance taking and questionable use of life, is a long way from an honest effort to invest one's life to get the best returns!

We should invest life, to get more life. Money investment is made to make more money. Just so with life. A positive outlook at once makes impossible an attitude of self pity and destruction—however the end may be accomplished—for all suicides do not slash their throats, some of them work themselves to death over a period of greedy years! It is wise then to live cumulative lives which make for strength and service. One's total impact upon life and work is what counts rather than a few strenuous fitful selfish years which take us away before our time!

Then life should be invested with the view to bearing more of the common load of humanity. One's life should be made strong in order to be able to share more, and care more! This was Jesus' philosophy after all. He said to those who had been faithful over little, "I will make you responsible for much—". This enlargement of life as Jesus saw it then was not to get only, but to get in order to give.

Life, the Christian life, is invested to return more. Here in this parable these servants returned both principal and interest to the Lord! Both principal and interest! Actually no profit was taken! The life was actually invested for the Master's estate! There is no better investment than that, even today. Even in our cold business-like world, that is the very best life that can be lived. That is laying up treasures in Heaven, and the one and only Bishop H. A. Boaz has said "The only way to lay up treasures in Heaven is to invest your money in something that is going to Heaven!"

## PRODUCTION CREDIT ASSN. REPORTS ON PROGRESS

The stockholders of the Memphis Production Credit Association at their twelfth annual stockholders' meeting Monday February 11, at the Memphis High School Auditorium discussed the progress this group of farmers and stockmen has made with their association.

Ralph Howe, Secretary-Treasurer, reporting on the financial progress and growth in membership stated that the association now has 731 stockholders. He also reported \$1,683,000 in loans was made to farmers and stockmen in 1945.

Otis Wilson, Vice President, in his report to the stockholders pointed out that during 1945 the member-owned stock and reserves had increased from \$114,497 to \$134,995 and that the local farmer and stockmen members now own 47 per cent of the \$284,995 capital in the association.

The stockholders all joined with the board of directors and endorsed their plan to acquire full member ownership of the association at an early date.

There were 477 stockholders and guests present. All enjoyed the splendid barbecue dinner served by the association. John Snider of Amarillo prepared the barbecue and the homemaking department of the Memphis High School, under the direction of Mrs. Wynona Moorehead, assisted in serving it.

Stockholders elected Tom B. Berry of Wellington and R. O. Ross of Flomot as directors who will serve on the board with R. B. McMurray of Memphis, S. M. Jolly of Paducah, and Otis Wilson of Quitaque, whose terms carry over to later dates.

The Flomot choral club entertained the group with several numbers.

Virgil P. Lee, President of the Production Credit Corporation and D. B. Sauls, assistant to the President of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, both made short but very interesting talks to the group.

## PRESIDENT URGES SUPPORT OF ENLISTMENT PROGRAM

President Truman has called upon every individual and group in the nation to give earnest and enthusiastic co-operation to the tremendous task of securing the peace by rebuilding the Regular Army.

"It is of the utmost importance," the President said, "that the American people understand the status and significance of our new Regular Army. It will be the duty of this volunteer Army to help protect the freedoms and maintain the peace we have won at so great a cost.

"Such grave responsibilities obviously cannot be met by anything less than the highest caliber of men. For this reason, I asked Congress for legislation to increase the opportunities of the soldier in the Regular Army. This legislation has been passed and signed by me, and is now in effect.

"The Army has embarked upon a world-wide campaign to enlist enough men so that, in demobilizing, we shall not strip our services below the peacetime need. It is imperative that public support be given to this program. We must replace as soon as possible men who have served long and arduously, and who wish to return to civil life.

"We must also build an Army of volunteers adequate to all our requirements—at home and abroad—until the long-range peace terms and military policies are worked out.

"I hope that every individual and group will give earnest and enthusiastic co-operation to this great effort to rebuild our Regular Army. The success of this campaign is vital to the performance of our tremendous task of securing the peace," the President said.

**BURLINGTON RE-INSTATES PRE-WAR PULLMAN SERVICE**

After a wartime absence of seven months, Burlington Lines' overnight sleeping car service between Dallas-Fort Worth and Amarillo will be restored from both ends of the run Friday evening, February 15th, it was announced by Robt. I. Hoyt, general passenger agent, Fort Worth and Denver City Railway, Fort Worth.

The cars formerly in this service were removed from regular daily operation on July 15, 1945, and placed in a pool of Pullman equipment which was established under Office of Defense Transportation General Order ODT 53 to speed up troop movements. Presently, the homeward movement of men from overseas has progressed sufficiently for the return of a portion of this pool of sleeping car equipment to the use of the traveling public.

Northward from Dallas-Fort Worth to Amarillo this sleeping car service will operate out of Dallas at 9:30 p. m. and Fort Worth at 10:45 p. m., with a morning arrival in Amarillo. Southward the cars will be placed for occupancy

in Amarillo at 9:30 p. m. and moved on the Texas Zephyr which leaves at 12:45 a. m., arriving in Fort Worth and Dallas the same morning.

"This is a long step toward normalcy in railroad passenger service," Hoyt pointed out, "One of the most gratifying results of the rapid reconversion to peacetime railroad operation is the present opportunity to offer sleeping and chair car accommodations for the travel convenience of the public." he said.

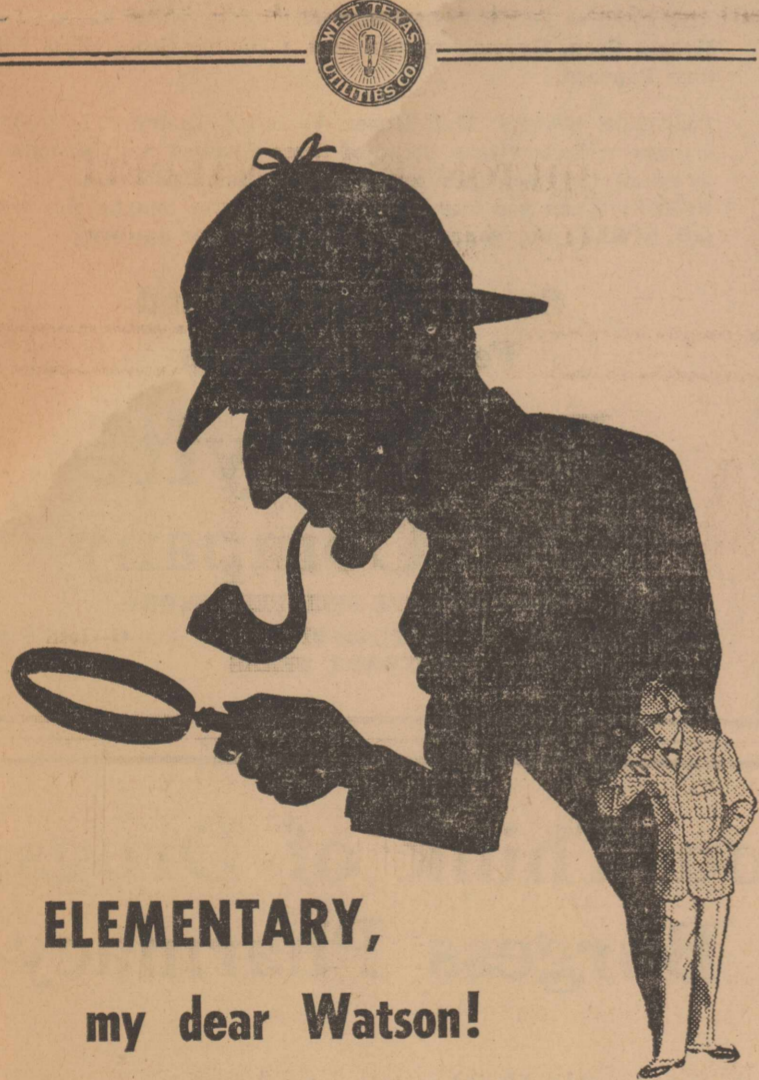
