And who wants to live in a community where there are no good schools or churches?

It's a little complicated to exsupported by you. Part of the money comes from taxes paid by you to the state, and refunded according to the scholastics of the area in which you live, to the support of your school. Part of the money comes from taxes paid by you into the independent school district in which your property lies.

When it was discovered that better schools with larger curricula could be operated where the enrollment was greater, the idea of "transportation" was instigated. The state offered to pay so much per student for transportation. In areas where the population was thick the idea worked to the advantage of the schools. In areas where distances are great and population is scattered the funds paid by the state have never covered the cost of operation. When a school bus could run ten miles and pick up fifty students, the proposition paid, but when the bus ran fifty miles and picked up ten students, the expense of operation fell upon the school dis-

In order to operate in a businesslike manner, without continued loss, many schools are finding that they must curtail transportation expense, or have additional funds to cover the expense. The most feasable plan is consolidation.
