Quitaque Lost A Good Ball Game To Whiteflat

Quitaque's big bats were silent Sunday, or practically so, when the locals dropped a good ball game to Whiteflat 4 to 3. With men on bases in every frame but two, the necessary bingle failed to materialize.

Going into the fifth with the score 2-0 in Whitflat's favor, PeJohn, first up, managed somehow to get on first and was advanced to second, when Skipper arrived at first on an error by the shortstop; Ed Morison singled filling the bases and then Bob Patrick bunted which forced PeJohn for the first out. Rush singled, scoring Skipper and Ed, thus tying the score at 2-all.

With two men on and one out, Dick Cooper popped up to the pitcher and Meyers struck out to retire the side. Meyers usually wields a wicked piece of hickory but his bat Sunday seemed to have a hole in it. First time up he flew out to short, second time he went down pitcher to first, third time struck out and fourth time up was hit by the pitcher for a free ticket to first. Two men were down so he died on first when Herrington fanned.

Ed flew out to first and Patrick struck out to retire the side.

PeJohn did the chunking for Quitaque and had that old pill cutting monkey shines all the way to stack up ten strikeouts. But with all the boys weak with the timber, including himself, the necessary power to capture the contest was lacking.

Furthermore, PeJohn didn't have this strikeout business all to himself either, as the visiting pitcher topped him by two, accumulating a total of 12.

To the legally qualified voters of Quitaque Independent School District and Kent Common School District No. 13:

Take Notice that elections will be held within said Quitaque Independent School District and Kent Common School District No. 13 on the 15th day of June, 1946, at the places and on the proposition more fully set forth in the order of the County Judge of Briscoe County, Texas, substantially as follows, to-wit:

"On the 7th day of May, 1946, there was presented to me a petition signed by Leon Middleton and 19 other legally qualified voters of Quitaque Independent School District, and a petition signed by E. J. Hamilton and 21 other legally qualified voters of Kent Common School District No. 13, which petitions prayed for a consolidation of said districts and the issuance of an order for an election for that purpose.

I find that the petition presented by Leon Middleton and others was signed by 20 legally qualified voters of Quitaque Independent School District, and that the petition presented by E. J. Hamilton and others was signed by 22 legally qualified voters of Kent Common School District No. 13.

I further find that the principal portions of said School Districts and their properties are situated in Briscoe County and that Briscoe County has jurisdiction over the principal schools of said Districts.

I further find that said petitions are in compliance with the law and should be granted.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED:

1. That an election shall be held in Quitaque Independent School District, and in Kent Common School District No. 13 on the 15th day of June, 1946, at which there shall be submitted to the legally qualified voters of said Districts the following proposition:

"Shall Quitaque Independent School District and Kent Common School District No. 13 in Briscoe County, Texas, be consolidated for
