By means of these numbered bands important investigations relative to the migrations and other facts in the life histories of North American birds are being advanced. The bands are attached to the birds by volunteer cooperators, both in the United States and Canada, who serve without pay. Success in the bird-banding work is therefore dependent upon the reports of persons in both countries on such banded birds as come to their attention.

Migratory waterfowl have been banded in large numbers at more than 150 stations scattered over the continent and have been recovered as far south as the northern part of South America. Small song birds have been banded in still greater numbers, and many interesting facts concerning their movements are being discovered. These data are not only of scientific importance but also are of much service in the administration of this valuable wild-life resource. INNER-SPRING SOULS

By E. B. Thompson

In John's narrative about the incident at Jacob's well, Jesus is represented as saying to the misguided woman "-the water I will give-will become a spring of water bubbling up for eternal life-." This figure, I think, is one of inner resource, rather than merely that of storage. The spring suggests continual replenishing-and that is what Jesus was trying to do for this person, and all persons. It is also what Paul suggests in his testimony, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me-." And again what John expressed when he wrote, "To as many as believed Him-to them gave He power to become the sons of God-."

Many souls all about us are utterly lacking in this inner source of power and strength so vitally necessary to steady, logical, and consistent living. Because they have neglected the cultivation of soul powers and strength, they find themselves unable to meet the stresses and strains that life imposes. Starved sculs are just as weak and powerless under a load as are starved bodies.

Others simply have no central point of soul-integration. No focal ideals hold them together. Therefore their lives are divided and spasmodic, going from one value and loyalty to another. They are the fanatics, and their theories as well as their general conduct, change often and much.

Then there are integrated souls, who have loyal and strong central ambitions to which they give all attentionbut, these in the last analysis are not sufficient. They fail as did the house Jesus talked about which was built on a sand foundation-not because the builder failed to work hard in the construction, nor because he did not love the house nor trust in it, but because the material of it was not of the right stuff to stand the test of the ultimate. Mis-integration is then just as dangerous as dis-integration, for it means that one has fastened his soul to some value which will in the end go down, and because he is so bound to it, he goes down with it.

Let us be careful to integrate our lives around Godand holy values. Let us trust in the highest and best, for it alone is sufficient for our deepest needs. May our souls be inner-spring souls, which live on the bubbling water of eternal life and eternal values.






