### LIVING AT EVEN-KEEL

By E. B. Thompson

In his letter to the church at Philippi, Paul makes a a statement that sounds like so much boasting. He says, "I can do anything in Him who strengthens me-." If one lifts that sentence out of its setting and tries to read it alone, it is as if Paul were showing us his spiritual muscle and saying "Just look at me, I can do anything!"

However when the verse is allowed to remain in the compny of its context and interpreted from the vantage of an understanding of the spirit of its writer, it takes on a very different color, for the chapter is one of humility and thankfulness. Paul has just said, "I know how to be abased, and I know how to abound; in any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and want." Hence he is saying that he has at long last learned to live at even-keel.

Now, we too, need to cultivate this ability to meet life with a steady carriage of soul. We go off on too many tangents, and give way to extreme attitudes. We need to know how to TAKE IT, so to speak. Two things at least are musts. First and always we must be right-right with God and man, if we are to live steadily. "Be sure you are right, then go ahead,' is more than a nice sounding slogan, it is the main spring of courageous living. People who are right walk steadily forward unafraid-those whose souls are burdened with guilt are fearful and undone! Then, we need to fee that we have done our best with the tasks of life. Even in failure, this inner knowledge will soothe and bless, for one who has done his best has not failed because doing our best is success.

Let us learn Paul's secret of living the even-keel life, and with him we can shout, "I can do anything in Him who strengthens me."


