W. E. Morrison of the Gasoline Soil Conservation Group, included as a part of coordinated Soil and Water conservation program on his farm the closing of the ends of existing terraces in order to hold all rainfall. Mr. Morrison stated, in discussing his Farm Plan with technicians of Soil Conservation Service, that the limiting factor in crop production in that area was lack of rainfall and that by holding water that he has been losing with open end terraces, he expects to increase crop yields. Other conservation measures Mr. Morrison is using are: the strip cropping of small grains, sorghum and cotton, contour planting and leaving all possible crop residue on or near the surface of the soil.

W. B. May of the San Jacinto conservation group has recently purchased a disc type terracer which can be used on his present farm tractor. Mr. May says the terracer will be used to increase the body, width and height of his present system of terraces in order to keep them in an effective condition and to construct additional terraces on his farm.

Grady Wimberly of the Gregg conservation group, reports that Hairy Vetch seeded the first of September is making rapid growth and is furnishing excellent grazing for livestock.

Joe Woodruff, a cooperater of the Gasoline conservation group, seeded a small acreage to alfalfa on bottom land on his farm. The seeding was made the first of September and will be used for supplementary hog pasture, according to Mr. Woodruff.

Mr. Walter A. Graham, cooperater with the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District, who operates the W. A. Graham Estate at Quitaque, is constructing a disc type terracer for one of his row crop tractors. Mr. Graham plans to rebuild approximately sixty miles of terraces on the farm with this equipment as soon as the present crop is harvested from the land. Additional height, body and width will be added to the old terraces so that they may be more effective in controlling erosion and more easily worked. Adequate fill will be made in low areas before terraces are rebuilt, according to Mr. Graham.

Blue Grama Grass has made an exceptionally good seed yield this year. Weather and moisture conditions have been ideal for maturing and harvesting a high quality seed. Several thousand acres of this grass is being harvested for seed in the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District this season. Most of the harvesting is being done by Commercial Seed companies. Combine, header and stripper are being used to harvest the seed. Roy McMurtry a cooperater with the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District has had four hundred acres of grass seed harvested in one block on his ranch. Farmers or ranchers interested in securing seed for future grass seed planting are urged to harvest Blue Grama seed now as the seed will shatter as soon as they are ripe and dry. Local technicians of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District will assist cooperating farmers and ranchers in making the needed adjustment on combines to harvest this seed.

John King, a cooperater in the County Line Conservation Group, has seeded four acres to Austrian Winter Peas on his farm. These peas were seeded after the last rains with a six hole corn plate. This crop will be used for grazing and for soil improvement according to Mr. King.

Cap Rock Soil Conservation District met in regular session Friday, Oct. 11. Since this was the first meeting of the Board of Supervisors following the election in Subdivision Three, at which Mr. Earl I. Cantwell was re-elected, the Board was reorganized. The following officers were elected:

Chairman, Earl I. Cantwell; vice chairman, Obra Watson; secretary, Bray Cook; Treasurer, J. P. White. The following applications for assistance were approved at this meeting: Wylie V. Bomar, W. E. Burleson, Lyda Lewis, A. L. McMurtry, W. E. Helms, H. B. Finney, John King, W. M. King, W. E. Morrison, Mattie McCracken, S. H. Kimbell, Tony Burson, C. H. Hamner, J. W. Reed, I. F. Reed, D. L. Mullin, G. B. Moore, D. J. Anderson, J. R. Stroup, W. M. Tracy and E. M. Bass. The following agreements were approved: W. B. Hill, J. K. Bean, True Burson, Bud McMinn, Dr. W. R. Moody, Merle McMurtry, N. R. Honca and A. L. McMurtry.

C. E. Bedwell, a cooperater in the White Conservation Group, has seeded 200 pounds of Austrian Winter Peas on his farm one mile west of Quitaque.

The Board of Supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District has recently purchased a Rotary Fresno Scraper and a Ford Hydro-Scoop which are now available for the use of cooperators of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District. This equipment is located at Supervisor J. P. White's place and is available to cooperators of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District through their respective Group Leaders. Groups who have not already elected Group Leaders are urged to do so. Until all Groups have elected a Group leader, individual cooperators desiring to use this equipment should contact Supervisor J. P. White at Quitaque. The equipment will be operated on a maintenance basis according to the Board of Supervisors. A rental rate of \$1.00 per (workable) day Sundays and holidays excepted, will be charged for the use of the equipment.

Roy McMurtry, a cooperater with the Cap Rock Conservation District, recently constructed a system of diversion terraces on his ranch to increase the existing watershed of two stock water tanks. Mr. McMurtry estimates that he increased the drainage area of the two tanks approximately 100 acres by the construction of 4,000 feet of diversion terraces. The diversion will improve the drainage of two lakes and prevent their killing of grass in these areas. Mr. McMurtry had the assistance of local Soil Conservation Service Engineers in the lay-out of the above system on his ranch. Mr. McMurtry also repaired two stock water tanks by increasing the size and width of the spillway on one and the storage basin of the other, using the dirt to add height and body to the existing dams. Construction work was done with carry-all grader and crawler type tractor.

J. L. Webb, a cooperater, who operates the W. E. Schott Ranch northeast of Silvertown, is seeding approximately 45 acres of Austrian Winter Peas. This crop will be used for grazing and soil improvement according to Mr. Webb. A number of farmers have indicated a desire to plant a small acreage to Austrian Winter Peas. Seed may be secured locally and should be planted by November 15th.

Earl I. Cantwell, a cooperater of the Grass Conservation Group, is seeding 100 pounds of Dixie Wonder Peas, which is an improved early variety of winter peas, on 3 1/2 acres of land. Mr. Cantwell plans to harvest the seed from this acreage.

At the close of the first elimination 26,896 votes had been cast. Sue Barrett, Patsy Stark and Roxie Price remained in the contest on Oct. 29. At the second elimination, Nov. 1, 9,897 more votes were counted, and Sue and Patsy remained to fight it out.

This was settled at noon Nov. 7, when 16,175 more votes were turned in and the contest decided in favor of Sue.

The total number of votes turned in added up to a fine sum of money to be credited to the athletic fund.

All the classes and all the students are to be commended for their loyalty to their chosen candidates. We must express the thanks of the school to the people, patrons and parents for their fine support during the various phases of the contest. We wish to point out the excellent effort made by the classmates and friends of the eighth grade nominee. They kept her in the race to the close of the second elimination. Kuykendall Rites At Flomot Saturday Aft.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Flomot Baptist church for Lloyd Kuykendall, 27 years old, who was killed in a highway accident near Hillsboro Wednesday morning, Oct. 30. Rev. Fullington of Wheeler, former Baptist pastor at Quitaque, conducted the service, assisted by Rev. J. E. Lee of Flomot.

Burial was in the Flomot cemetery under direction of Stewart Funeral Home. Pall bearers were his brothers, Orval, J. B. Hershell, Allen and Porter Kuykendall, Tom Spears, Bron Martin and Harrison George.

He is survived by his wife, his father J. L. Kuykendall of Flomot; six brothers, Allen of Eldorado, J. B. of San Bernardino, Cal., Porter of Los Angeles, Cal., Kinner of Phoenix, Ariz., and Orval of Baileyboro; three sisters, Mrs. Sudie Berry of San Diego, Cal., Mrs. Lois Buford of Big Spring, and Mrs. Ona Lee George of Flomot. All were present for the last rites except one brother Kinner Kuykendall of Phoenix, and one sister Mrs. Buford of Big Spring.

Lloyd Kuykendall was born January 10, 1909 at Loraine, Texas. He moved to Flomot with other members of the family about 1930. In October, 1942, he enlisted in the armed forces and served three years, 20 months of the period overseas in England with the Eighth Air Force.

Returning to the States in July, 1945, he and Miss Irene Ham of Flomot were married at Plainview on July 27.

At the time of his death he was driving a truck for Wiley Hudman Trucking Co., of San Antonio, hauling cattle for Swift & Co. from San Antonio to Fort Worth.

He was enroute from San Antonio with a load of cattle for Ft. Worth on the night of the accident. Trouble developed in his truck which crashed into a bridge, on highway 81, five miles south of Hillsboro. The truck turned over and ignited, throwing Kuykendall clear, but killing him instantly. The loaded trailer went into the creek, killing and drowning most of the cattle.

The deepest sympathy of the community is extended to the bereaved family.

Virgil Purcell arrived home Thursday last week from South Carolina where he has been stationed with the Coast Guard. He will remain here until Dec. 6th, when he is scheduled to receive his discharge. Virgil's wife and small daughter are making their home here with his mother Mrs. U. C. Purcell until he completes his enlistment.
