Some Early Cotton Is Ready For Harvest

Harvest prospects are so bright at the present that everyone is holding their breath. The rains have been timely and the crops, both cotton and row crops are beautiful.

Orb Payne's cotton which was planted the latter part of April, and has been just across the fence from three devastating halls, is ready to gather and pickers will be in next week. Orb estimated that this early cotton would make from a bale to a bale and a half to the acre.

We tried to find out just how early this cotton was for Briscoe county but could not get any definite information. Cap Wise, who was manager of gins in the section for thirty years or so, stated that he had ginned late August cotton several times here, but he did not have any exact dates. Mr. Kimmell, who farms the Pierce Hawkins place just south of town, also has some early cotton just about ready to gather.

Plane Here This Week To Dust - Spray Cotton

A plane will be in Quitaque this week, in fact two plane, equipped for spraying and dusting cotton, and the material needed for the work is available here now. Farmers are urged to take precautions now against boll worms.

Right now, before the worms develop, is the time to act, it was stated. Dusting, spraying, nor anything else is successful after the worm develops in the boll, but the flies or insects which make the worm can be eliminated if action is taken early enough.

Full information about the material needed, and services of the plane may be secured from Earl Wise at the Paymaster Gin, or read his adv. in this issue.

Prospects for a bumper cotton crop are too good now, to take chances.

John S. Rucker Buried Monday At Clovis, NM.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2:30 at Clovis, NM, for John S. Rucker who died in a Clovis hospital Saturday morning. The services were held in a Clovis funeral home, conducted by the pastor of the Methodist church at Bellview, NM., about 30 miles from Clovis, where Mr. Rucker had made his home for the past few years. Interment was in the Clovis cemetery.

Mr. Rucker was 69 years of age. Death came unexpectedly, though he had been in failing health for a number of years, the last illness was very brief.

He was born November 8, 1878 in Denton county, Texas. In May, 1904 he married Miss Coline Gibbs of Denton county, and she and their five children survive.

They moved to Briscoe county in 1916 or '17 and lived here, where he engaged in farming, until 1934 when they moved to Lockney. He continued to farm there until his health failed and they moved to Bellview to be near a son and family.

Besides the wife, survivors are three sons, Allman of Tioga, Texas, Gibbs of Bellview, and Raymond of Lockney; two daughters, Mrs. Iola Nelson of Bellview and Mrs. Pauline Whatley of Clovis; nine grandchildren; one brother, C. Rain And Hail

According to the book at the city hall, 1.64 inches of moisture was recorded for Quitaque this week—.76 inch Saturday, .63 inch on Sunday and .25 inch Monday. This is not as heavy as reports from over this area, especially south of town.

However the folks south of town were visited by their third bad hail of the season Sunday evening. This time, the casualty list (as far as we learned) included Cecil Reagan, Cecil Payne, Orb Payne (who estimated about 40 percent loss on fifty acres), Webb Taylor, Hayden Boggs and Warren Merrell.

The feed was not hurt, it was stated, but the cotton was pretty much damaged. This has been the most promising section of cotton, in this area, some of the farmers estimating that they would make a bale or more to the acre (early estimates, before the hail.)

As usual, the showers have been accompanied by electrical storms. Friday afternoon the big transformer at Turkey was struck and Turkey town was without lights for a short period. The telephone service there also was interrupted. Many radios here were burned out, and this week lots of them have been leaving town for repairs. Out at Flomot, lightning also caused trouble with the electric service and they were without lights for a time.

Peach Pie

1 cup flour 1/4
1 cup sugar (or more)
1/2 cup sweet milk
1 tablespoon baking
3/4 cup butter or shortening
Cream sugar and milk and salt, then add and flour. Pour in peaches on top. Dough when cooked.

Upside Down Cobbler

1/2 cup sugar 1/2
1/2 cup milk 1/2 tsp
1/2 tsp. salt 1 1/2 tsp

Mix and pour into flat pan. 1 cup fruit, 1 cup juice, 1 cup sugar and pour on first mixture and with butter. Any kind of fruit may be substituted for the peaches and for a larger cobbler, the recipe may be doubled.

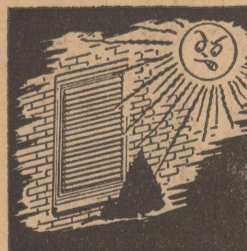

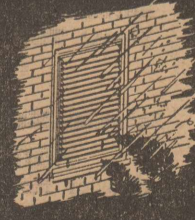

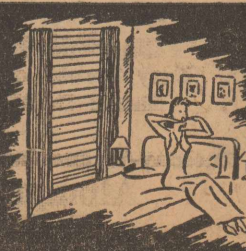

TURKEY

"I Give You Texas"

The first time I was ever paged was in the lobby of the Jefferson Hotel in Dallas in the spring of 1928. I was sitting there reading a paper when a bellboy sauntered by, chanting "Paging Mr. House; Mr. Boyce House." I was so astonished that he had nearly gotten out of

earshot before I hailed him.

There are some questions that are better left unanswered—as for example if your wife asks, "If I were to die, would you marry again?" If you answered, "Yes", she may think you've already got a successor in mind; of you say "No", she may think that you con-

sider marriage such a state as once out of, you'd never return there- unto.

So, brother, sidestep that question.

Someone said, a good many years ago, "The history of Europe can be summed up in one sentence, 'England is an island.'"

Cotton Spraying and Dusting

Material is available at Quitaque for spraying and dusting cotton, at 8½ cents per pound. This material is 10 per cent DDT and sulphur and is not injurious to livestock or the cotton plant.

There will be a plane, or two planes, available this week, and for as long as there is enough work to justify their services. The dusting from the plane will be done for 4 cents per pound. The recommended amount is from 10 to 15 pounds per acre, depending upon the size of your cotton.

No leaf worms or boll worms have appeared as yet, but now is the time to kill the fly which makes the worm. Dusting will start in this area Friday morning.

Plant identification is one of the fundamental principals in proper management of range and pasture land. A large number of forage plants grow in Texas, but only a few of them are of any real importance for livestock grazing.

A. H. Walker, extension specialist in range management of Texas A. & M. College, says that an understanding of conditions and the proper use of range land are simple once the desirable and undesirable range plants are known. He believes that it would pay farmers and ranchmen in the state to know the plants on their land and to be able to classify them according to four main divisions: The most desirable grasses, better browse plants, good weeds or forbes and noxious or poisonous plants. 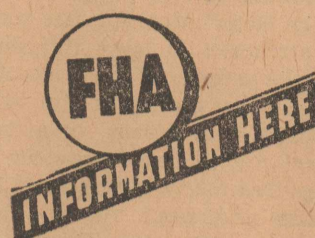

A plant collection or herbarium, is an interesting as well as helpful hobby and is comparatively simple to maintain, he says. A plant press is easily made, while dryers between each sheet of specimens can be made of building felt, blotter paper or corrugated cardboard. After drying, the plants may be kept in species sheets or mounted on herbarium sheets. An occasional treatment with paradichlorbenzene crystals or naphthaline flakes will usually kill or repel insects.

Instructions on the collection and preservation of specimens for range plant study have been prepared by Walker and O. E. Sperry, associate professor of range and forestry, and persons interested in starting a plant collection may obtain information from county agents.
