THE TFX

I predict that when the TFX controversy cools, our very able Secretary of Defense, Robert S. McNamara, will have the support of most Americans in his decision to award the fighter plane contract to General Dynamics Corporation. McNamara's job, under the National Security Act of 1947 establishing the Defense Department, is to provide unified direction and control of our Armed Services. He had full legal authority to make the decision. Few men in the U. S. are as qualified as Secretary McNamara to make a sound decision in a matter so involved in the complexities of industrial production, economics and military needs. In my judgment, no Secretary of Defense during my tenure as Congressman has discharged his duties as capably as has Secretary McNamara.

The losing bidder in the TFX case, Boeing Aircraft Corporation, has an outstanding record in designing and manufacturing nuclear age aircraft and weapons systems. Boeing's major error came in its failure to meet the TFX requirements that General Dynamics met well—the requirements set by Secretary McNamara for a tactical fighter aircraft that would serve both the Air Force and the Navy. As could be expected, many uniformed officers in the two services favored the Boeing designs because Boeing, in effect, designed two planes—one for the Air Force and one for the Navy. Secretary McNamara sought a single-design aircraft, one that he estimates will save the taxpayers \$1 billion, one that will meet the nation's defense needs for years to come. It is the Defense Secretary's job to see that our defenses are maintained in proper balance. Too often, military leaders become locked blindly in positions that would be of advantage only to their single service, not to the general needs of the defense establishment. Too often, they do not give sufficient weight to costs involved.

Too much is being made of the fact that the TFX contract went to a firm that will build the plane in Texas, in Fort Worth. Employment at the Convair plant in Fort Worth will about double to approximately 15,000 workers. But building

modern aircraft is a highly complex manufacturing job and thousands of component parts are needed from suppliers far from the assembly point. When the Convair people at Fort Worth built the B-36 bomber, items for the plane were manufactured in some 40 of the then 48 states. Convair's TFX subcontracts will be similarly diversified. Had Boeing won the job for its plant at Wichita, it too would have spread subcontracts across the nation.

We in the Panhandle have a special interest in the TFX, which the Air Force will designate the F-111 if and when it is approved for full production. I have every reason to believe that the Tactical Training School at Amarillo Air Force Base will be assigned the mission of training mechanics and technicians needed to service the new aircraft.

This would be in line with the present mission at the Amarillo base.

COUNTY SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS GAINS IN ALL DISTRICTS

The Briscoe County School Census for 1963-64 is complete and shows a net gain of 38 over last year according to County Judge M. G. Moreland.

The Negro scholastic census for this year showed a loss of one from a year ago but the white total has a gain of 38 above last years count.

There are now 852 white children on the census roll and 66 colored, a total of 918 for Briscoe County. Quitaque count went from 264 last year to 273 this year. San Jacinto school went from 23 to 26 and Silvertown went from 593 to 619. Each school district in the county show an increase.

Judge Moreland wonders if the increase from 880 compared with the 918 for this year would indicate the growth of the county in total population. That is an increase of 4.3 percent and in ten years would amount to 43 percent. Is Briscoe County growing that fast?

As of the closing date, March 22, farmers in Briscoe County had signed up 344 farms to participate in the 1963 feed grain program, John R. Fowler, County Office Manager, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service reports. The "intentions to participate" forms show 14,820.0 acres to be diverted from the production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley. The diversion is from base acreages (1959-60 average plantings) of 53,917.0 acres.

For farms signed up, estimated total payments for diverting acreage amount to \$227,603, not including price-support payments to be made this fall.

These are the latest available figures on the feed grain program sign-up, the County Office Manager said. They may be changed some, but are not expected to be changed very much when tabulations on the sign-up are completed.

INSECT SHORT COURSE TO BE HELD HERE BEGINNING MONDAY

Elmer Berryhill, local Vocational Agriculture Teacher, announced this week that a very important Insect Short Course will be conducted in Quitaque next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 8, 9 and 10.

Phil Hamman, an entomology specialist with the Texas Education Agency will conduct the Insect Short Course for Adults at Quitaque High School, sponsored by the Vocational Ag Dept. of the Quitaque High School.

Insects to be discussed during the 3-day course are one that pertain to this area and will include the Boll Weevil and recommended controls and practices will be included in this study.

There will be a \$2.00 enrollment fee, which will be used to pay for materials in this class.

The classes will begin at 7:30 Monday night, April 8.

signed up amount to \$253,813,300 not including price support payments to be made to cooperators.

In general, provisions for the 1963 program follow those for 1961 and 1962 crops by giving feed grain producers an opportunity to participate in the program by reducing acreages and depositing the land to conserving uses. By participating, they will receive diversion payments and price-support payments (new to the 1963 program) and be eligible to take part in the price support loan program. Price support for 1963 to farmers participating in the program will be made available on corn, grain sorghum, and barley partly through loans and purchase agreements and partly through an in-kind payment based on the normal production of the acreage planted this year to one or more of the three feed grains.

The 1961 and 1962 feed grain programs have brought about a reversal of a 10-year buildup in feed grain surpluses. By Oct. 1 of this year, estimated total feed grain stocks of 61 million tons will be down about 28 percent from the record 84.7 million tons on Oct. 1, 1961. Continued participation around levels of the past 2 years should bring feed grain stocks near desirable reserve levels by Oct. 1, 1964.

Judge M. G. Moreland called the Tribune Tuesday to report that he had received a letter from Austin stating that road repairs had been approved for the road leading from Highway 256 to the Boy Scout Camp.

The road was badly in need of repair work and Judge M. G. Moreland and two more representatives went to Austin recently and met with the Texas Highway Department in the interest of getting the State to do the repair work.

Freeman Says, No Plans For Livestock Supply-Management

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has no plans for supply-management programs in livestock either now or in the future, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has made clear.

In recent meetings with representatives of American Cattlemen's Association, the Secretary noted that allegations were being made that the Department is planning supply-management programs for livestock. Repeating the position he has taken on this question since becoming Secretary, he said:

"This administration will not submit to the Congress any supply-management programs for livestock either now or in the future. We believe, as we have stated repeatedly, that the prosperity of the livestock producer rests on a stable and healthy feed grain market. If feed grain production is in balance with demand, the grower will benefit through fair prices, and this situation, in turn, is the best guarantee of fair prices for livestock producer. We have no plans to develop supply - management programs for livestock."

What's In A Name? Fishermen use a lot of words - most good, a few bad, and some that don't seem to make any sense at all. Local terms that define fish and fishing methods can confuse even pros.

If you don't know the difference between "chunkin'" and "pluggin'" it doesn't really matter. You're safe if you just stick to casting. But, sometimes, say Mercury fishing experts, an understanding of local expressions can be very helpful.

Let's see if you can describe the method of fishing and species of fish usually involved with the following terms:

(a) Skittering; (b) Moothing; (c) Jugging; (d) Cake walking; (e) Squidding; & (f) Notching.

ANSWERS:

(a) Skittering - A method used for catching bass with a long cane pole and bait, usually fish strip or pork chunk. The bait is danced across the surface along the shore.

(b) Moothing - Salmon fishing technique using anchovies or herring as bait in the Pacific Northwest.

(c) Jugging - Catching catfish with set lines supported by glass jugs or other floats. This is used for both sport and commercial fishing in the Mississippi Valley.

(d) Cake walking - Method of skipping a deep-running plug or bait across the bottom. Used in northern waters for lake trout.

(e) Squidding - Surf fishing term popular mainly on the east coast. While particularly used in reference to striped bass, the same baits or artificials will catch a variety of fish.

(f) Notching - Modifying a plug to reduce extreme action and retrieving with the rod tip extended deep into the water. Deadly for bass in the bayou country.

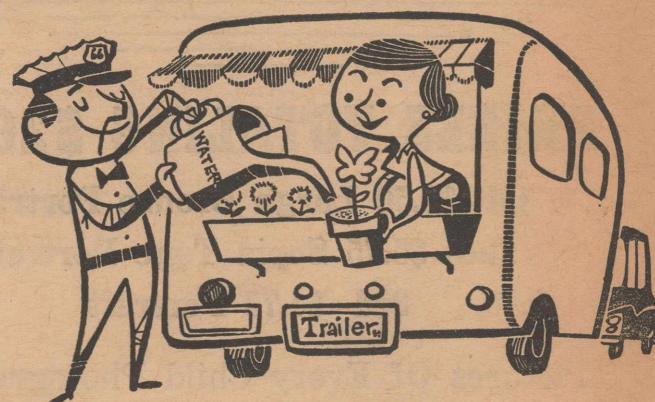
