

Fold in remaining sugar, a small amount at a time. Fold into custard mixture together with flavorings. Pour into shallow 8 x 8-inch pan rinsed with cold water. Crush Cocca Krispies slightly; mix with nutmeats and butter. Sprinkle over pudding. Chill until firm. Cut into squares to serve. Yield: 9 21/2-inch squares.




