
GLENN SANDERS HIRED AS SUPT. AT ROARING SPRINGS

DRIVING WITH CHILDREN My wife tells me some writers for women say it's safer to have the children ride in the back seat of the car.





Two of the most embarrassing things that can happen to a boater are forgetting to replace the drain plug before launching and forgetting to attach a bow line to the boat before it's pushed off the trailer. The first goof permits water to rush into the boat through the open drain, the second one makes it necessary for you to wade or swim for your drifting boat. Both can be avoided by getting into the habit of following these five launching steps recommended by the Mercury outboards people: first, back the trailer down the ramp, stop a few feet from the water's edge and set the car brakes; second, release all the tie downs. second, release all the tie downs, tilt the motor up and connect fuel and electrical lines; third, put in the drain plug; fourth, back the trailer into position for launching; fifth, attach a line to the boat's bow and hold it to prevent the boat from drifting away once it is afloat. 




PROPELLERS

Selection of the correct propeller for your outboard motor is the most important single step in attaining maximum engine performance. Mercury outboard experts point out that pitch, diameter and number of blades govern a motor's ability to operate within the recommended rpm range. Pitch refers to the theoretical forward movement for each revolution of the propeller (see arrows in illustration). Given two motors with identical horsepower, one propelling a light runabout, the other a houseboat, it's evident that each should be "geared" with a different propeller. In some cases it's advisable to purchase two propellers. For example, if your boat is a swift runabout, you could select one prop for maximum speed under light load, and another for extra pulling power in towing water skiers.

Elderly people, if they live n rural areas, need not give up the idea of building, buying or repairing their homes on credit.

This word comes from Donald B. Cruce, Farmers Home Administration county super visor, serving Briscoe and Swisher Counties.

Mr. Cruse said citizens who are 62 years and over, living in a rural community of 2,500 or less, may be eligible for a 33 year loan bearing 4 percent interest to buy an older home or
