If at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve the quotas, the quotas become effective.

Approval of the quotas by cotton growers means that quotas with penalties on excess cotton will be in effect for the 1966 crop, and price support and diversion payments — in addition to loans — will be available to growers who sign up and then carry out provisions of the cotton program. Details of the program will be announced before and during the sign-up, which will be held early in 1966. Growers who elect not to participate in the reduction program may plant within their regular allotment.

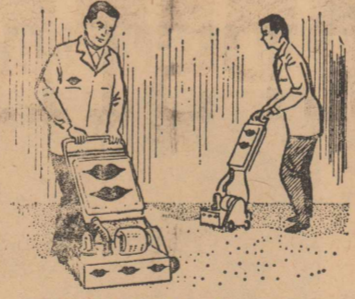

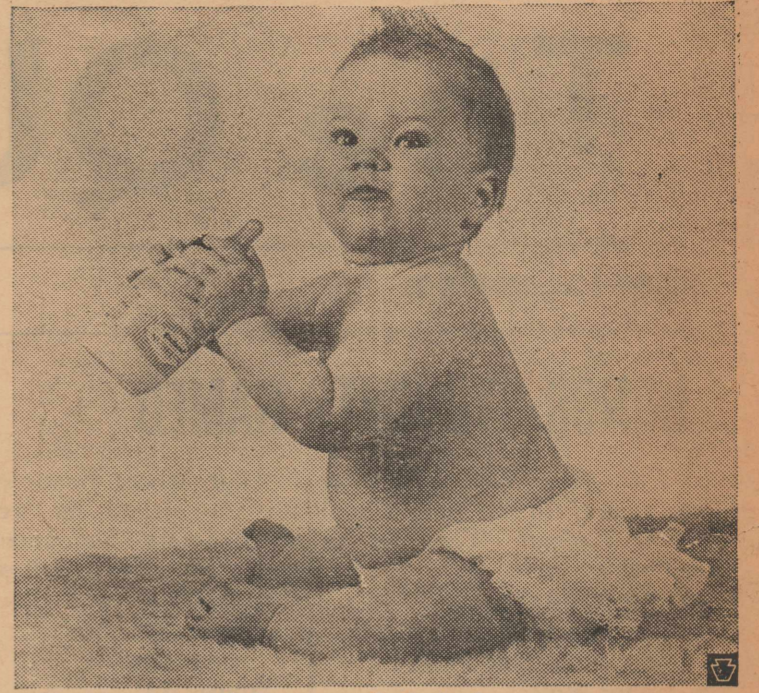

No need to carry the diaper pail, either. Disposable diapers are much improved this year and the cost has come down too.

Several manufacturers are also offering attractive — and warm — all-purpose suits which are ideal for traveling, awake or asleep, at this time of year.

A new baby is too much the joy of Christmas to let unnecessary chores interfere. Traveling with a baby hardly ranks as a problem any more.

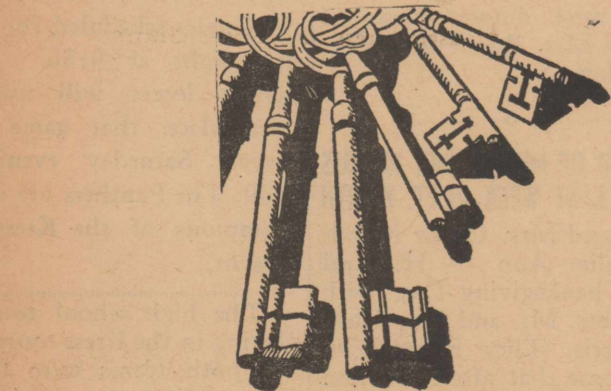

COOPERATIVES SERVING LOW-INCOME FAMILIES RECEIVE CREDIT ASSISTANCE

Farmers Home Administration Economic Opportunity Loans totaling over \$2 million have been made this year through September 30 to 176 rural cooperatives serving some 10,000 low-income people in 25 states, including \$3,800 to two Texas groups, L. J. Cappelman, State Director, reported today.

"Most of this credit is extended in the form of small loans to finance a variety of cooperative enterprises — all designed to increase the net income of farm people and other rural people throughout the United States," Cappelman explained.

Cooperative enterprises financed throughout the nation during the past nine months include dairy products processing, handicraft marketing, feeder pigs sales yard, vegetable marketing, peanut marketing and the sharing of several types of farm equipment.

Economic Opportunity loans to cooperatives serving rural families carry 4-1/8 percent interest and are scheduled for repayment over a period not exceeding 30 years.

Farmers Home Administration loans to cooperatives serving families in Texas are for group owned farm machinery.

The majority of such loans made throughout the United States have been to finance small machinery cooperatives that provide needed agricultural equipment member farmers could not otherwise obtain.

The Texas Farmers Home Administration director emphasized that he foresees great potential in the Economic Opportunity loan programs since they are capable of putting new economic muscle into the rural economy.

The agency's other Economic Opportunity loan program has provided individual loans totaling \$1,659,790 to 1,002 Texas families for developing small farm and non farm enterprises.

67 PERMITS TO BE ISSUED FOR Aoudad SHEEP HUNTERS

San Angelo — Palo Duro Canyon landowners with surplus wild aoudad sheep on their property will receive 67 hunting permits for the December 10, 11 and 12 aoudad sheep hunt, according to Jack Parsons, regional supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Forty-two permits were issued for the first aoudad sheep hunt in 1963 when 6 males and 3 females were bagged. In 1964, 50 permits were distributed among Palo Duro Canyon landowners and 7 males and 6 females were harvested. One ram weighed 270 pounds.

Wildlife biologists said permits have to be severely limited to protect the brood stock.

This year sportsmen will assist in the gathering of biological information by bringing all barbary sheep killed by a conveniently located Department check station before leaving the hunting area.

SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

All farm and ranch operators who are 65 or over, and all

farm and ranch workers who are also that old, are reminded by Hal Geldon, Amarillo social security district manager, that the 1965 changes in the law make it imperative for them to file their social security claims immediately. This applies even though they are still active on the farm and ranch.

The hospitalization insurance, which is automatic, and the medical insurance, which is optional at a \$3 per month premium beginning next July, require that social security claims be filed before those provisions can apply. Persons already 65 need to take such action now. Those who do not file in the current enrollment period will have only one other chance to

enroll, and that will be at a higher cost in the October-December 1967 enrollment period.

Geldon urges all persons affected by the above information to talk with a representative of the Amarillo social security office when he visits in Silverton on Thursday, December 9. The representative will be in the Courthouse from 8:00 to 10:00.

Even though a person's earnings may be too high to permit immediate payment of monthly retirement benefits, Geldon wants to feel sure that no eligible persons have lost out on the health insurance program because of lack of information.
