"The 75th anniversary celebration will be a three-day occasion, with special services Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Former pastors will be special guests and will speak during the evening. Friday and Saturday evening services will be at 8:00 with Sunday morning service and a special service at 3 p. m."

Mrs. Rev. Clyde R. Cain, pastor. Dinner will be served at the school cafeteria, with meat and a drink to be provided and attendants to bring the dessert and the salads.

"Former music directors have been invited to lead the music program, and nursery facilities will be provided," the Rev. Cain said.

The church has a present membership of 992, with many of the present members descendants of those early settlers who established the church. Several four generation families now appear on the membership rolls including Mrs. H. L. O. Riddell, her daughter and husband the R. C. Hutsells; and their son and his family, the Edsell Hutsells.

Mrs. A. D. Arnold is the mother of Mrs. Ruby Gilkeyson, who is the mother of two daughters, both of whom hold membership in the church. They are Mrs. L. B. Garvin, Jr., and Mrs. H. B. Simpson.

The Gabe Garrisons are the senior family in four generation memberships: the Carol Garrisons and their daughter and family, the Buck Hardins, are members, also the Don Garrisons and their daughter, Mrs. Dale Smith and some members of her family, are members.

Mrs. Cora Donnell has been a member of the church since 1901, and has the longest tenure of service of present members.

A number of persons whose home church was the Silvertown church, have entered the religious field. Ronald Ledbetter is with the Arnett Baptist Church in Hollis, Okla. in the ministry; and Dub Jackson, whose father was a pastor at one time, is a missionary in Japan. **BRISCOE RESIDENTS ASKED TO HELP SOLVE MYSTERY OF NAMES**  
Residents of Briscoe County were asked this week to help solve the mystery of the origins of several geographical names found on county maps.

The information is needed for a dictionary of Texas place names, including Briscoe and 253 counties, to be published soon by the East Texas State University press. Before Dr. Fred Tarpley, professor of English at the university, submits his final manuscript, he is appealing to county residents for assistance in contributing information about several names with unexplained origins.

With the following exceptions, the reasons for the choice of approximately 200 names found on detailed maps of the county have already been determined: Barrell Creek, Big Sandy Creek, Bluff Creek, Bull Run Creek, Burson Lake, Cherokee Creek, Coon Creek, Hackberry Creek, Hardscrabble Creek, Horse Creek, Indian Creek, Marshall Creek, Mexican Creek, Pilgrim Creek, Pole Canyon, Troublesome Creek, Tule Creek and Turkey Creek.

Dr. Tarpley who started his research on Texas geographical names five years ago, has exhausted material available to him in history books, newspaper files, students research, and interviews with county leaders. He is hoping that the story behind the naming of communities, creeks, and other geographical sites listed above can be explained before his book goes to press.

Information will be wel-

comed by Dr. Fred Tarpley, Department of English, East Texas State University, Commerce, Texas 75428.

**REPRESENTATIVE RALPH WAYNE REPORTS FROM STATE CAPITOL**

State Representative Ralph Wayne, in a letter to the editors, reports on the windup of the 60th Legislative Session. Mr. Wayne says:

As you know, the 60th Legislative Session adjourned Monday, May 29 after a busy 140 days. I thought I might take this opportunity to give you a short review of the session.

The passage of the Traffic Safety Act will be of great benefit to all Texans. The main purpose of the bill is to save lives and minimize the great financial loss that is suffered by thousands each year. The act included bills which provided that a person with driver's education may get his license at the age of 16, otherwise, he must be 18. Also, a driver who has had his driver's license suspended on a third conviction, will get an automatic 72 hour jail sentence. The act also provides for a personalized driver's license with the individual's picture. This is to keep minors from buying alcoholic beverages. There are three ways in which a person can acquire a driver's license at the age of 15: (1) a hardship exception; (2) an instructor's license, which requires a 21 year old licensed driver in the front seat; and (3) a motor scooter for scooters under five B.H.P. There is absolutely no reexamination requirement except when a license has been suspended or revoked.

The liquor-by-the-drink bill was killed in the Rules Com-

mittee. Pari-mutuel betting was never brought up for a vote, however, there will be a referendum in the 1968 General Election on parimutuel gambling. It will be a vote to determine how the people of Texas feel about parimutuel gambling. This has no legal effect other than an expression to the Legislature.

Last week the Compulsory Foreign Language Bill was passed by the House of Representatives, but failed in the Senate. It would have required a foreign language to be taught in the public schools in grades 5, 6, 7, and 8.

We revised the Code of Criminal Procedure in order to correct some of the errors we made last session. By strengthening the parole laws, we have now made it more difficult for the criminal.

The Western Information Network Bill, which I introduced, has also been made law. It allows 18 colleges and universities to form a television network for education and indus-

trial purposes. Wayland College will be one of those participating, as well as Texas Tech and West Texas State.

Also, I acquired funds for research of quality castor bean development in our area. This could be very beneficial to the farmers of the South Plains.

We were able to increase teacher salaries by 48 million dollars plus an increase to the teacher retirement plan of 3 million dollars making a total increase of 51 million dollars. This increase was made without any new taxes being levied on the taxpayers. Under the minimum foundation plan, the total increase to teachers is some 60 million dollars.

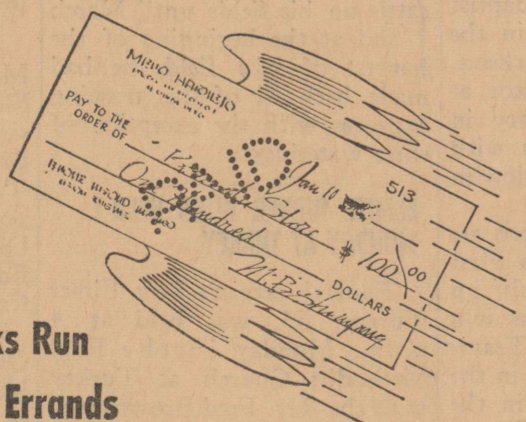

**HOME NOTES**

Planning your June Menus? Be sure to add plentiful foods to your shopping list. May plentiful foods according to the USDA List are: Eggs, orange juice, beef and potatoes.

Vacation time is fast approaching and in traveling about the question many times arises: Is it safe to use bar soap in a public washroom. A reassuring YES is the answer based on repeated tests reported in medical and health journals. Scientific research shows that bar soap does not support the growth of bacteria under usage conditions. Moreover, bar soaps are inherently anti-bacterial because of their physical-chemical nature. While it is good manners to rinse soap after use, even a dirty bar does not constitute a health hazard.

**Durable Press Curbs Sheet Shrinkage When Washed**

Treating bed linens and covers with a durable press finish has resulted in several benefits besides its basic no-iron properties. Because it reduces shrinkage when laundering cotton and blended-fiber bed sheets, standard sizes are being reduced from 108 to 104 inches, and from 120 to 115 inches in queen size.

Another change in marking sheets in terms of mattress size instead of torn size. These new markings are expected to aid homemakers to buy durable press flat and fit-

ted sheets more nearly scaled to the beds they cover.

Careful pressing is a must if a garment is to have a professional look when finished.

Every dart should be pressed before a seam crosses it, and every seam should be pressed open before being crossed by another seam.

Some fabrics are more difficult to press than others, and some extra equipment is helpful when pressing particular fabrics. For example, a needle board is helpful when pressing nap and pile fabrics. If a needle board is not available, you can press such fabrics as velvet, velveteen, corduroy, wool, broadcloth etc., by placing a heavy terry towel or leftover piece of fabric on the ironing board. Place the garment gently over the ironing board, wrong side up. Press with a steam iron.

Short seams in napped or pile fabrics can be pressed over a stiff brush. Turn the bristles up. The nap interlocks with the bristles and the fabric can be pressed without marking.

Matelasse is another fabric in which the technique is different from regular pressing. To press this fabric, let the iron stand on its heel, and move the wrong side of the seam across the base of the iron horizontally as you hold the seam open. Darts can be slashed open and pressed the same way.

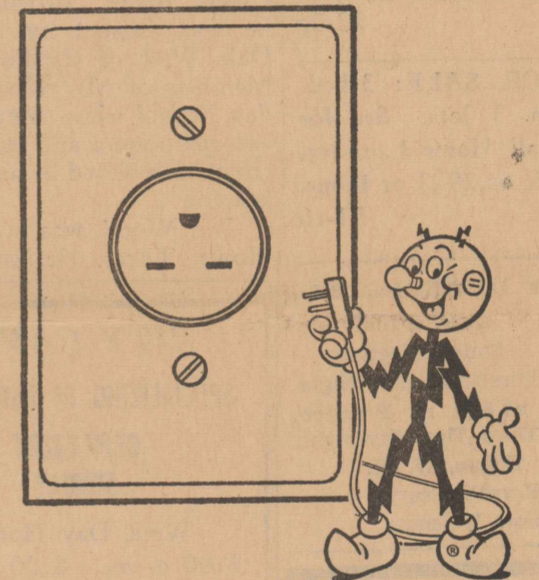

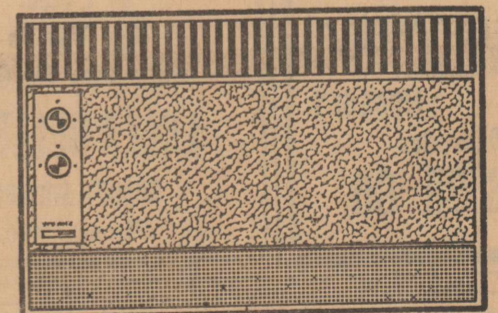

**QUICK TIPS for Smooth Trips**



A tote bag is ideal on automobile trips. It can pass for a handbag, yet it's roomy enough to hold extra shoes, overnight gear—even a change of clothes. Carried in tote bags, en route essentials are far easier to get to than if they were packed away in the luggage. The bags come plain—in solid-color vinyl, plastic, or simulated leather, for example—or you can choose fancy needlepoint and tapestry styles. Tote bags are lightweight, sturdy, and easy to keep clean. Most of them are plastic-lined, accommodating anything from wet washcloths to just-used bathing suits.

On a trip, a large brush-type hair curler is a good emergency clothes brush and lint remover. The best device for combatting lint, though, is a new roller gadget tailor-made for the job and tailor-made for travelers. Available at most large drug and department stores, it is conveniently mounted in a small plastic case with a collapsible handle. The adhesive on the roller lasts indefinitely. When the roller is full of lint you simply wash it in soap and water and it's ready to go again.

Out on the road early in the morning or late in the afternoon, you might frequently spot the lumbering form of a school bus. As you drive in and around cities—particularly in areas where there are a number of hills and turns—it's certainly wise to watch for school buses. It's wise, too, to know exactly what is expected when you meet one.

When approaching a school bus from the front or from behind on the same roadway, reduce your speed, to determine if conditions are right to pass. If the bus is stopping, loading children, or letting them off, come to a complete stop at least 10 feet away. Move ahead only after the bus does or after the driver has signaled an "all clear."

Inattention is one of the biggest causes of highway mishaps. Little things like lighting a cigarette, fussing with the radio, or glancing at the road map can divert a driver's eye just long enough to place him in a hazardous situation. When chores like this need to be done, it's a good safety precaution to let the navigator handle them. If you're driving alone, wait till you come to a stop—if necessary, pull off the road. Take the wheel again only when you can give your driving undivided attention.

Mrs. Jim Clemmer directs the five-day kindergarten and Manley Wood is custodian. The church also assists the mission in Elko, Nevada, which is directed by Don Ledbetter, former member of the local church.

The first Sunday School for First Baptist Church, Silvertown, was organized in October, 1891, first in the school building and later in the county courthouse. All denominations met

together, and when the Presbyterian church building was constructed, the community Sunday School met there until each denomination erected its own building.

The actual organization of the First Baptist Church was in 1892 with 16 charter members. In 1901, the first building was constructed where the Chevrolet building now stands. Additional improvements were made in 1903. From 1911 until 1921, the church had nine pastors. Various departments of the organization were added after that time, and in 1931, a second church came into being—the Calvary Baptist Church. Organized under the pastoral

leadership of Rev. W. M. Lawrence, the church continued until 1946, when the two were combined. The present building was constructed in 1946. Fiftieth anniversary was observed for First Baptist in 1943, and the local Negro Mission project was launched in 1943.

The church has continued to grow, with a library dedicated on May 20, 1952 to provide books, films and additional helps.

The New Jerusalem Baptist Mission for the Latin American people was begun in 1957. Buildings for both mission

churches were constructed and are still in use. Educational building for the present church was erected in 1957 and a new parsonage in 1960. The church is in a building program at this time to construct added facilities and to remodel the present building.

Thirty pastors have served the Silvertown church since Rev. W. S. Riddell first accepted the responsibility those 75 years ago... 75 eventful years which will be remembered as old-time members and pastors meet with the present membership for this, the diamond jubilee celebration.
