A cordial invitation is extended to all to attend any or all services.

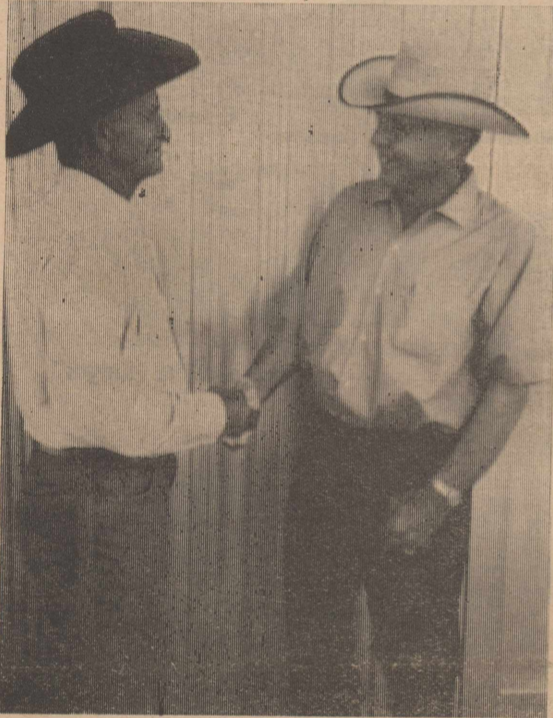
MRS. BEDWELL RECOVERING FROM RECENT FALL

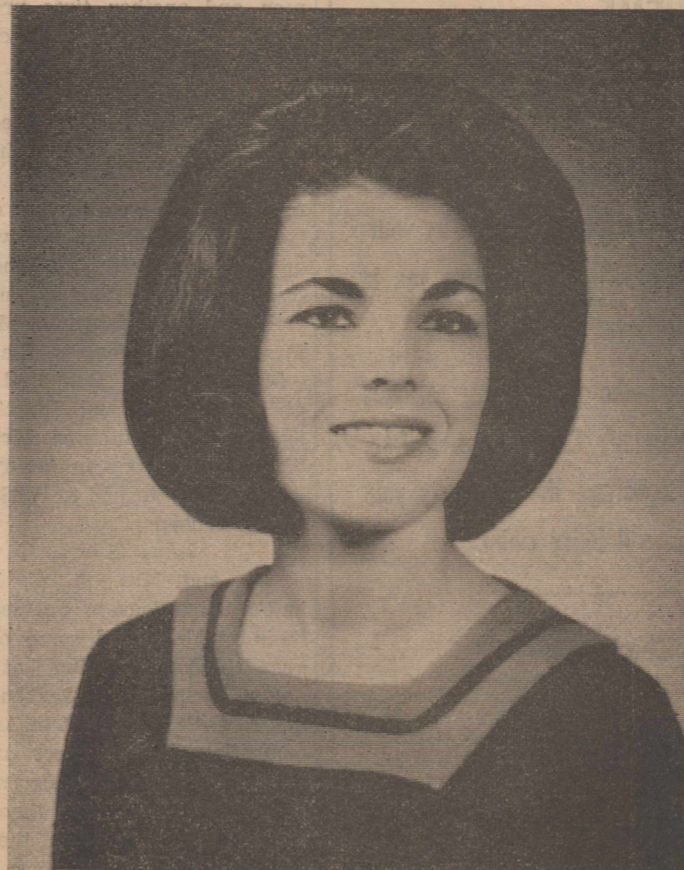

SAN DIEGO (FHTNC) Sept. 5—Marine Pvt. Ronald D. Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Hall of Quitaque was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot here.

He will now undergo about three weeks of individual combat training and then, after leave at home, will report to his first Marine Corps assignment.

The intensified Marine recruit training emphasizes rigid physical conditioning and survival techniques, both at sea and ashore, to develop self-confidence and endurance. Marksmanship with the M-14 rifle and 45-calibre pistol are equally stressed, and close order drill instills the traditions of Marine Corps teamwork.

A thorough study of basic military subjects; hygiene; first aid and sanitation; and the customs, courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare him to join Marine combat forces.

The largest single rain in several years fell in the early morning hours Monday and was accompanied by brilliant lightning and thunder.

More than 4½ inches fell in spots north of town and here in town gauges caught around 3½ inches. The gauge in the Owens' back yard measured 3.4.

Cecil Price, out north of town received 4.6 inches and lightning also knocked 15-inch long slab off their kitchen cabinet and burned out a number of fuses. West of town Jim Stroup reported only 2 inches but the downpour washed out several watergaps. South of town about ten miles, little if any rain fell and Flomot was reported to have received no rain. Bill Helms reported 1.1, and Joe Edd Helms received .9. Turkey reported to have received about two inches.

Some terraces were broken and fields washed considerably because the rain fell so fast.

The power was off for around an hour and a half following the storm. Some hail was reported to have fallen southwest of Silverton but no hail reports were received at The Tribune.

Buster Chadwick reported that Lake Theo received about two and one half to three feet of water from the runoff.

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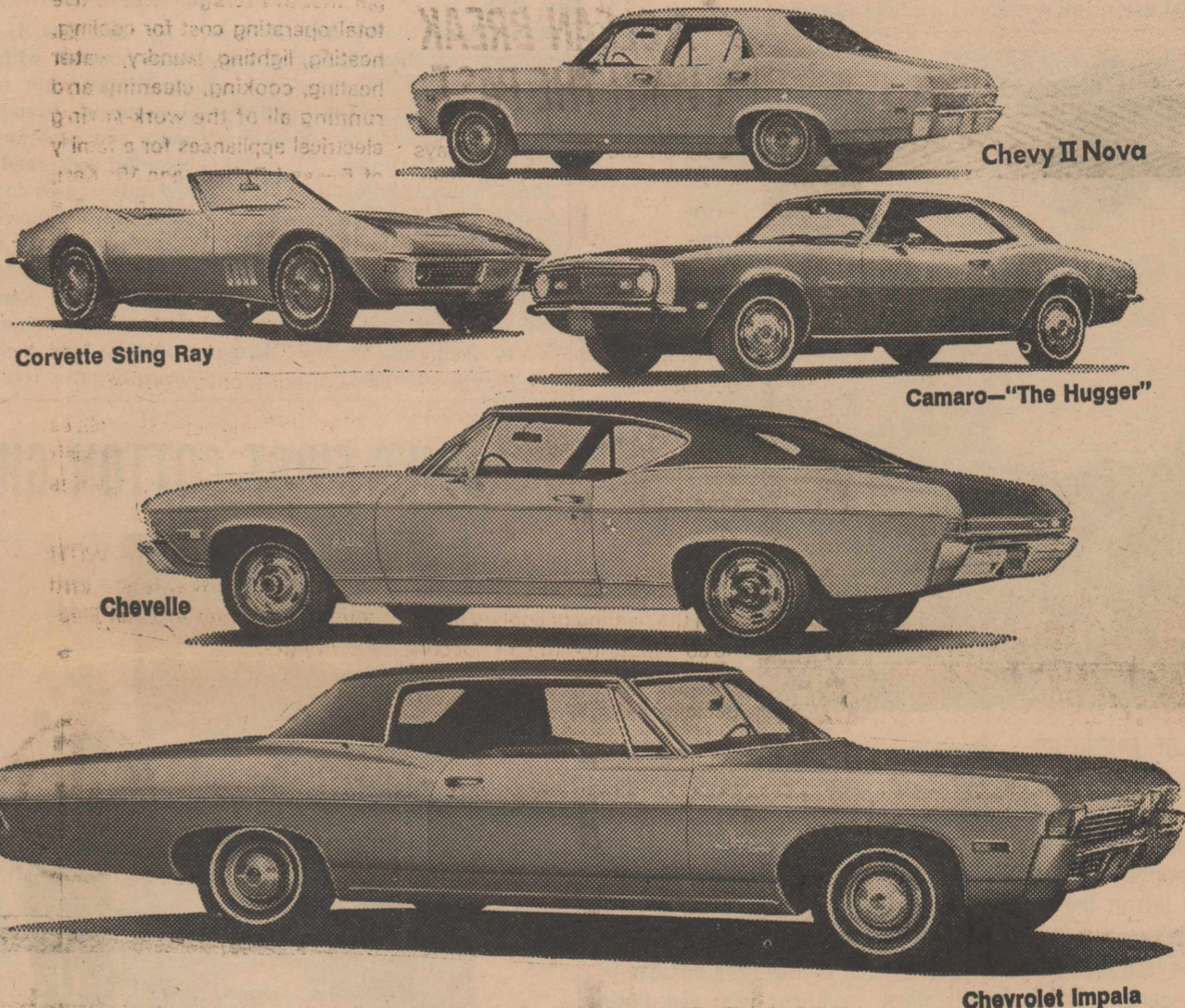

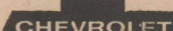

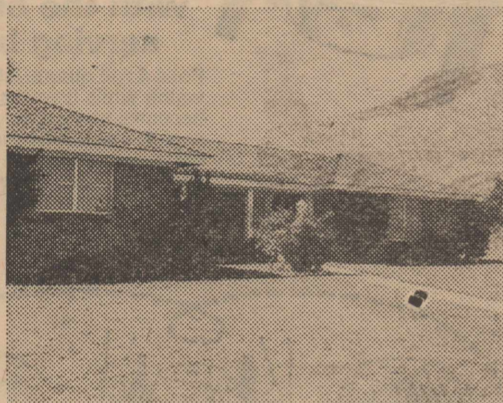

BOOK REVIEW

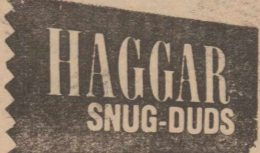

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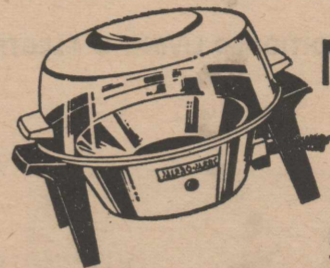
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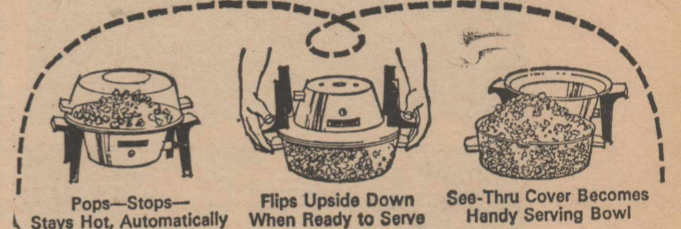
