Aoudad Sheep Permits Total 84 This Season

SAN ANGELO - Palo Duro Canyon landowners have been issued 84 permits for harvesting surplus aoudad sheep during the January 3-10 open season, according to the xas Parks and Wildlife Depart-

The number is one more than was issued last year and 14 more than the 1965 season.

Of the permits, 38 were issued in Armstrong County; Randall County received eight, while 38 were issued in Briscoe County. They are issued to landowners who have surplus aoudads on their property. Hunters who wish to hunt aoudad should contact the landowners issued permits.

Last season, when 83 permits were issued, hunters bagged 19 sheep despite uncomforotably cold winds with temperatures ranging from 7 to 20 degrees.



Pink shrimp and red pimientos make an effective combination when combined with mushrooms and green peppers on a skewer. Served on savory noodles, this is a delectable dish.

Pimiento Shrimp Skewers On Savery Noodles

1 jar or can (7 oz.) whole pi-1 pound cleaned shelled raw

1/2 cup Italian-style salad dress-1 clove garlic, chopped

teaspoon dried oregano l large green pepper, seeded young large mushrooms package (8 oz.) medium or wide noodles

Spread pimientos and shrimp in a shallow glass dish; cover with salad dressing mixed with garlic and oregano. Let stand for about three hours, turning gently several times. Drain, rerving marinade.

On skewers, alternately thread shrimp, pimientos, green pepp squares and mushrooms. Bro turning once or twice, until shrimp turn pink, about six minutes. (Broiling may be done in regular stove broiler, or the skewers laid across a small pan on top of the stove.) Makes 4

Savory Noodles: Cook noodles savory Noodles: Cook noodles as directed on package. Drain. Do not rinse. In a deep skillet mix two tablespoons of butter or margarine, ¼ cup of the marinade drained from pimientos and shrimp, ¼ teaspoon paprika and ¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese. Heat. Add drained noodles and simmer over medium heat, stirring over medium heat, stirring often. After four or five minutes noodles should be well seasoned and golden.

SCS GIVES ON BRUSH CONTROL

"Worthless brush and weeds waste nearly as much water as is used for all other purposes in Texas," according to H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, Temple. 'One of our greatest potentials for saving water is reducing this waste by non-economic plants."

Smith said at least 10 million acre-feet of water could be saved annually by a complete grassland restoration program in Texas. This is about three-fouurths the amount now used by all consumers. This saving would go a long

DOUBLE BUCCANEER STAMPS WEDNESDAY ON ALL PURCHASES

This is part of the information in a new publication just released Jimmy Hawkins and children, all by the SCS, "GRASSLAND RESTO-RATION, PART V, EFFECT OF WATER YIELD AND SUPPLY,' by C. A. Rechenthin and H. N. a series dealing with Texas rangelands. It documents huge water losses that occur each year from brush and weed infestation. It shows how municipal, industrial, and agricultural water supplies are needed on watersheds infested with brush and weeds.

In a 1964 survey, SCS found that 88 million acres, or 82 percent of Texas' 107 million acres of grassland, are infested with brush. Range conservationists say that four out of every five acres are producing less than half their po-

More than one-third of the rain hat falls in the State each year s being used up by non-economic plants, according to estimates made by Dr. J. R. Johnston of the Agricultural Research Service. He says that 13 million acre-feet are being wasted by weeds and brush

Since grass uses less water than most other plants, there are vast opportunities for cutting water osses by improving infested grass-

NOW A NEW WAY TO * HELP YOUR COUNTRY YOU HELP YOURSELF

Using the limited researca. able, Rechenthin and Smith give a detailed study in the new booklet of the effects of grassland improvement on water supplies. For example ,treating salt-cedar infested areas could save as much as three feet of water per year Smith. The booklet is the fifth in for each acre treated. Savings on upland would vary from more than 6 inches in the eastern part of the State to smaller amounts in drier sections.

Annual water savings could total million acre-feet each in the Brazos and Colorado River watersheds; one million each in the Nueces and Red River watersheds (Texas portion); three-quarter million each in the Rio Grande-Pecos and Trinity watersheds; and more than one-half million acre-feet in the Guadalupe-San Antonio water-

Smith said that water has always been one of Texas' most valuable but least abundant resources. He said saving water by improving grasslands will benefit all Texans. The booklets are available at SCS offices.


