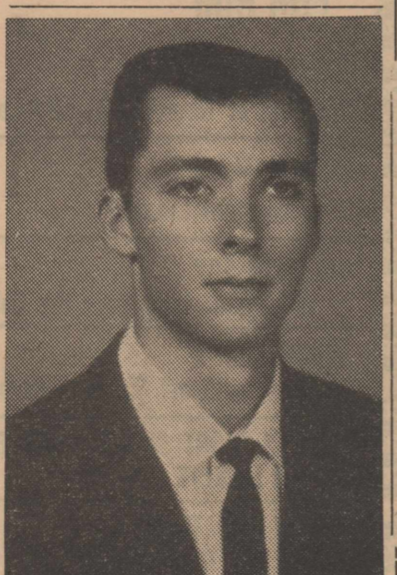

# HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL TEAMS PLUCK THE OWLS TUESDAY NIGHT

The Fighting Pantherettes and Panthers hosted the Owlettes and Owls of Hedley Tuesday night and both teams won handily, the Pantherettes by a 52-25 count and the Panthers by an 83-60 score.

The games were delayed for an hour due to a breakdown of the Hedley bus as they were enroute here. A bus was sent from here to pick up the teams stranded between Turkey and Lakeview.

Both teams were very unimpressive at times.

The Pantherettes started off hitting on all six and were a smooth working crew, running up 24 points on the scoreboard before the visitors notched their first 2 points. At the end of the first quarter the Pantherettes owned a 30-2 lead and Coach Travis Gilliland started to ease off. The Pantherettes sort of overdone the easing off, however. In the second quarter the Pantherettes scored a total of 6 points while the Owlettes netted 9 points to make the count 36-11 at the halfway point. The locals eased even more in the third quarter, putting up only 2 points on the score board while the visitors made 7 to make the score 38-18.

Business picked up some in the fourth quarter when the Pantherettes tossed in 24 points to the Owlettes' 7 to make the final tally of 52-25.

Sherry Stark totaled 16 points to lead all pointmakers in that game, 12 of them coming in the torrid first quarter. Jackie Cheatham and Barbara Chandler each scored 8 points, Glenna Ramsey was runner-up with 11 points, Carol Myers scored 5 and Beverly Rogers tossed in 4 points. Billy Cheatham, Jo Beth Merrell and Lynette Taylor started at guard, and they shared

time with Kay Cochran, Debbie Farley, Neva Morrison and Pam Loudermilk.

The Panthers, unlike the Pantherettes, had a bit of trouble finding the basket at the start and about midway of the first quarter trailed the Owls 5-13. The locals finally found the range, tied the score at 15-15 and 17-17, then went ahead 20-17 at the end of the period. The Quitaque lads were never headed again, leading 41-20 at half-time, and 60-44 at the end of three quarters. The Owls Leon Ward led the scoring parade for the evening with a 29-point effort.

Roland Hamilton had a 22-point night; Jimmy Pointer tallied 19 points; Johnny Pointer was next with 14; David Brunson scored 11 points; Lyn Payne, who had foul trouble again made 10 points and Pablo Leal, 9. Stanley Price saw action but did not score.

The Pantherettes drive over to Plainview Friday evening to take on the Wayland College Queen Bees in the Plainview High School gym, starting at 6:30. The Pantherettes will probably get their sternest test of the current season for the Bees downed the Pantherettes in a scrimmage earlier in the season.

On Monday night of next week the local teams play Wellington here and then on Tuesday night Quitaque will go to Silverton for a doubleheader to wind up the schedule until after Christmas.

On Friday, December 29 the local teams will host Avoca in a return match. The Pantherettes won over Avoca, but the Panthers lost there to one of the three teams that have defeated them this season and the Panthers would very much like to avenge that defeat.

**PLACING YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE**  
Sugar may be good for coffee, but it doesn't help keep a Christ-

mas tree fresh and green. It is a myth that sugar or aspirin added to the water container in a Christmas tree stand will help keep the tree fresh.

There are some things that can be done to safely keep the tree fresh for a longer time.

If the tree isn't to be put up right away, it should be kept in a cool and shaded location and sprinkled frequently with water. When the tree is moved into the house, the lower tip of the trunk should be cut off at an angle, exposing new wood. The base of the tree should be placed in water. A new tree may absorb as much as a quart of water in a day, so the water container should be checked daily.

The moisture helps keep the needles full of water and reduces the fire hazard.

Here are some other tips. Place the tree away from heating units, fireplaces and television sets. Heat dries out the tree and creates a fire hazard.

Lights should be carefully hung on the tree. Each light puts out heat. If needles from the tree touch a bulb, it will dry them out and they will burn.

Most important, place the tree so that if it accidentally topples it won't touch something that could be ignited or block a passageway.

Election Precinct No. Three shall consist of all of Commissioners' Precinct No. Three and the bound-

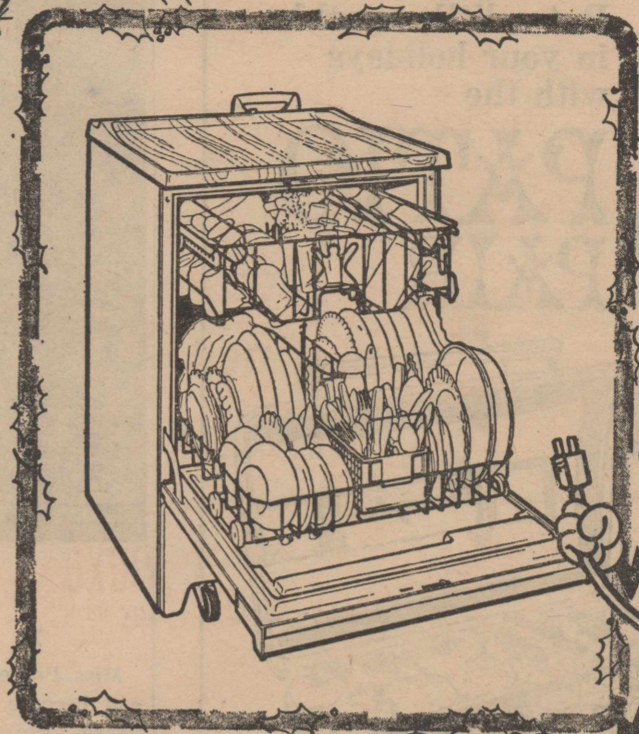
