A Matador native, Meador began his writing career in 1922. He was sole owner and editor of the Matador paper since 1934. He served as Matador mayor from 1948 to 1954, and was twice elected president of the Panhandle Press Association. In 1952 he was named "Texas Newspaperman of the Year" by the Dallas chapter of Sigma Delta Chi.

Survivors include his wife, Lila, and a brother, Joe of Paducah.
