According to report, the officers said had the boys gotten across into Mexico, there would have been nothing they could do to recover the car.







Acros the state, agriculture added \$7.1 billion to the economy last year, Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service surveys showed, with receipts from all crops almost balancing those from livestock and livestock products. Livestock receipts totaled \$3.5 billion, followed by \$3.3 billion for crop receipts. Government payments made up \$206 million of the total, including over \$120 million through drought and flood assistance programs.

DANNY FUSTON Conservation emphasis from land to water is turning heads at least in the southwest and mid-central plains. The conservation research for water is going a lot deeper than just fun-off. The programs on conservation of water run from the efficient use of irrigation water to the conservation of the rainfall that takes place directly on the soil. An example of this was first used a couple years back by a group in the Oklahoma Panhandle. Plastic sheets were placed over plots and holes cut inthe plastic for the plants. The results were astounding, it took only half the amount of water to grow the plant. Although the cost was too high for immediate use, ideas in other areas have been helped. The development of new breeds of feed grain for dryland farming is one of the better developments in the
