## Heavy Rains And Hail

### Hit Valley Area Sunday

Heavy rains fell all over the Valley Sunday afternoon and early evening accompanied by hail over part of the area.

The rain came from the southwest and started falling in that area at approximately 3:30 p.m. The storm moved east across the Valley dumping rain that measured up to six inches in spots and hail that caused damage from south of Quitaque all the way to the Bridle Bit and Wolf Flat communities east and south of Turkey. Hail caused considerable damage to rooftops and windows.

Heaviest reports of rain and

hail appeared to fall in an area from the Truman Merrell farm south of Quitaque across the area from Gasoline east to the Wolf Flat and Bridle Bit area. A lot of the fields in those areas held good sized lakes of water.

In Quitaque reports were that about 3 1/2 inches fell in town. Rex Johnson reported that Flomot received about two inches of rain there and no hail. In Turkey, 1 1/2 to two inches fell with heavier amounts south of town and into the Wolf Flat and Bridle Bit area. More showers fell over the area Monday.



## Plans Set In Motion For New Hall County Jail

Hall County Commissioners, at their regular meeting Monday, voted to employ the services of Corgan Associates, Inc. of Dallas as architects to begin work toward construction of a new jail in Memphis, County Judge Lester Campbell said following the meeting. Voters will be asked to vote on a bond issue for the new structure.

The first thing to be decided, it was pointed out, is the location for the new building. Sheriff Elmer Neel has looked at several locations. The site of the old jail, where the 1915-built structure still stands at the corner of Robertson and 5th streets, is not presently being considered, due to the housing authority units already in existence and the possibility of others being added. It is also believed that demolition of the old building would be costly. It currently is being used as a meeting place by Boy and Girl Scout troops.

When a location is decided upon, the architect will then be able to begin his sketches, and estimate the cost of the new building.

Judge Campbell stated that the voters will not be asked to decide the fate of bonds to finance the construction for a number of weeks, since the commissioners simply do not know what the building and its equipment may cost.

Hall County has been without a useable jail for the past eight or ten years. Prisoners of the county have been taken to the Collingsworth County Jail most of the time since the old building was abandoned.

About three years ago, the idea of a four-county jail for Hall, Donley, Wheeler and Col-

linsworth counties was brought forth by the then-judge of Collingsworth County, Zook Thomas. Many meetings were held, and Donley and Wheeler dropped out of the proposed four-county jail.

Hall and Collingsworth counties went ahead with plans for a two-county facility to be located at Wellington. A grant of \$159,500 was obtained, and an additional grant of \$77,000 was requested and was believed to be forthcoming.

However, the Collingsworth commissioners recently voted to dissolve their agreement with Hall County concerning the jail, return the grant money, and remodel the present Collingsworth jail on their own. At the same time, they also hiked the per day prisoner charge for Hall County prisoners from \$2.75 to \$24.75.

Sidedressing nitrogen on sandy soils within 30 days after emergence can boost sorghum yields. The irrigated sorghum

producer can increase yields as much as 2000 pounds per acre. On unfertilized sandy soils, dryland producers with adequate soil moisture this year should be considering sidedress applications.

Past research conducted on Amarillo fine sandy loam soils has shown sidedressing nitrogen to be sound. This research was conducted for two years by Dr.

Arthur Onken, Professor at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. His work was in conjunction with the SEA-USDA Southwest Great Plains Research Center at Bushland.

Research results indicate that nitrogen is leached below the root zone by heavy applications of irrigation water on sandy soils. Large amounts of rainfall could produce the same effect, the researcher says. Leaching of nitrogen on sandy soils also occurs when it is applied prior to preplant irrigation.

While nitrogen application is critical on sandy soils, it is not a problem on clay and clay loam soils. Nitrogen can be applied to these soils with equal effectiveness if applied anytime from fall to early sidedress.

Producers using split applications of nitrogen fertilizer (half preplant and the remaining half sidedressed) are also reminded that the proper time for sidedressing is within 30 days after emergence.

Dr. Onken and his associates have shown there is no economic advantage from the practice of splitting nitrogen applications. Splitting the nitrogen on sandy soils also enhances the possibility of bad weather preventing the sidedress nitrogen application. There is, however, one advantage obtained if high rates of

fertilizer are to be utilized for maximum yields. This being a lower probability of stand problems caused by high nitrogen in the seedbed.

In studies on sandy soils, sidedressed nitrogen produced irrigated sorghum yields ranging from 7,180 to 7,540 pounds per acre. These sorghum yields were dependent upon the amount of nitrogen required. If sorghum producers are interested in how much nitrogen to apply, they should have their soil tested for nitrogen. A soil analysis for nitrogen provides the irrigated and dryland producers the advantage of maximum utilization of residual nitrogen thus reducing production costs. Contact me for information on soil testing.



Now is the time to control the pecan nut casebearer in Briscoe County. Get this costly pest before eggs hatch and the worms get inside pecans.

Be alert to signs of casebearers, mainly eggs on tips of pecans. Early identification and control can help cope with the pest before real damage occurs.

Once you see eggs on tips of tiny nuts, spray pecan trees within four to five days. This is extremely important because the casebearer (in the form of a worm as it emerges from the egg) must be killed before it enters the pecan.

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Backyard trees may be sprayed with either malathion or carbaryl (Sevin) and with guthion Zolone, Sevin, malathion or toxaphene for commercial orchards.

For best control of this pest, wet trees to the point where the spray starts to run off trees. A second application may be necessary seven to ten days later for maximum protection against the first generation casebearer.

Always read instructions on the insecticide label and follow them closely.
