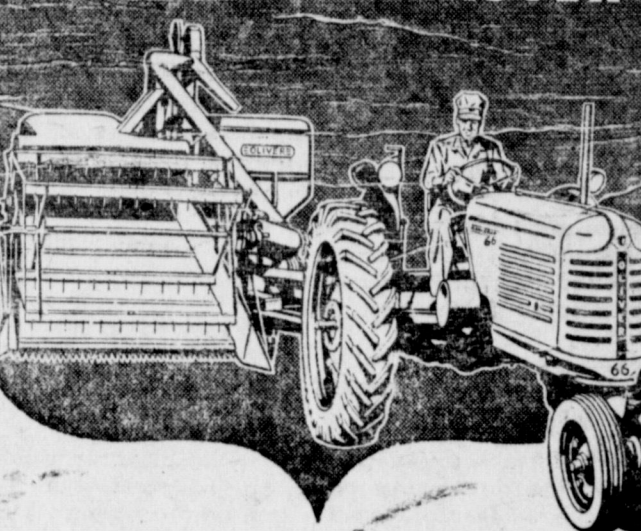

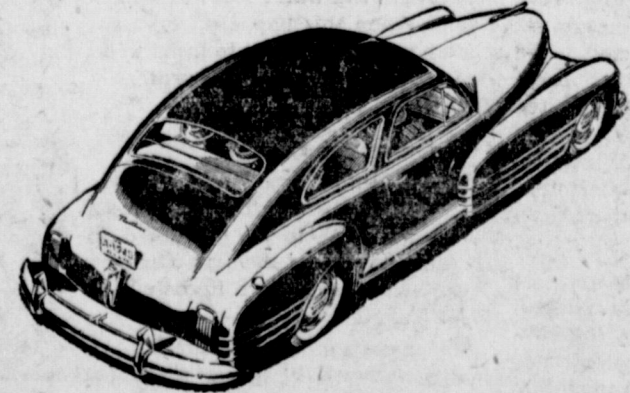

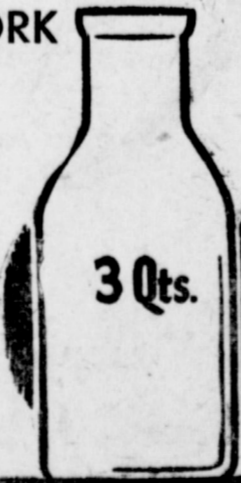

Here Are Ways To Save Time, Energy

Time saved means energy saved, says Mrs. Laurette Williamson, the Bailey County home demonstration agent, and the best way to save time is by "using the right tool for the job to be done." You have all seen a person mash potatoes or beat an egg with a fork. Of course, it is a tool that will do the job, but we think another tool would do the job lots better. Just think how much easier still it would be to use an electric mixer. This brings to mind the question. Do we have the most modern and effective equipment we can afford

to buy in our homes, especially since so many of our country homes now have electricity?

Why don't we list a few of the tools we use around the house that maybe we can all afford if they need to be replaced with more efficient ones. What about the can opener? How much tin does it cut with one turn of the handle? Do the cogs of the egg beater run smoothly and just how many turns do the blades make with each turn of the wheel?

Long handles in such things as dust pans would keep us from having to stoop when we take the dust up after we've finished sweeping, according to the home demonstration agent. Is there a step-ladder so we can reach the high-up shelves easier instead of standing on a chair?

The "tray habit" is a good habit to get. A tray will save time, steps when you're setting or clearing the table after meals.

And we all ought to know that the dishes will drain dry if they're scalded and left in the dish drainer. That will save plenty of wiping, and you know a "tote" basket is a mighty good thing to have for saving extra trips when you're taking things to be stored. Then there's the cleaning kit for taking cleaner brushes, sponges, and dust cloths from one room to another. This might be a box with a handle on it, but it will save steps, I'll bet you.

Then, to have a fix it time each week simply means to have a definite time set aside to put our tools and equipment in order. Try it, it will save lots of time and energy.

and most of all, it'll save your whole disposition for the week.

These are just a few suggestions of the many ways in which we can use the right tool for the job and save time and energy.
