Carter arrives in Yugoslavia

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) -President Carter arrived in Belgrade today, reaffirming America's commitment to "a strong, independent and non-aligned Yugoslavia" and its support for detente.

Emphasizing his backing for Yugoslavia's unique role in Eastern Europe, Carter paid tribute to the late Josip Broz Tito, the architect of the communist country's independent po-

"My pleasure in visiting this proud and beautiful land is tempered by the sorrow we all feel at the passing of President Tito. He was a great man, one of the greatest of the 20th century," Carter said after he received a 21-gun salute and a personal welcome by Tito's successor, Ovijetin Mijato-

"President Tito left a precious legacy, a strong, independent and nonaligned Yugoslavia," Carter said at Surcin airport. "I have come to Belgrade to assure you of the friendship and support of the United States as you build on that legacy.'

The foundation of U.S.-Yugoslav relations is "firm and durable," Carter said, after he arrived aboard Air Force One at 8:39 a.m. (3:39 a.m. EDT) on a flight from Venice, Italy.

Proclaiming his administration's support for detente, Carter said that this policy "must be based on reciprocity. It must be based on mutual restraint. It must be based on the principles of sovereignty, territorial integrity, and non-interference in the affairs of other nations.

"These are the principles of international life for which Yugoslavia has always struggled," the president said, recognizing the long fight Tito conducted for his country's independence from both Moscow and the

After the formal welcome, which included honors by Tito's personal guards outfitted in light blue tunics, Carter drove to the late president's white marble tomb to lay a wreath.

The American president has been sensitive to criticism from some quarters that he should have attended Tito's funeral in early May - an event that brought together Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev and many other world leaders.

Asked at a news conference in Venice on Monday if he felt he had made a mistake, Carter said his absence from the Tito rites was not intended to

be disrespectful and he quickly noted that more than 40 national leaders, including the presidents of France and Mexico, did not go to Belgrade at that time

The American president also claimed the results of a trip now "will be much more beneficial" than a visit in the immediate aftermath of Tito's

In an interview with Yugoslav journalists released on the eve of his arrival, Carter said he and Tito had 'exchanged many long letters which were private and confidential in nature but exceptionally open in the discussion of our two countries and relations and also about events in other countries which attracted our

Tito counseled him, Carter said, on the Soviet drive into Afghanistan, a move opposed by both U.S. and Yugostay leaders, and on nuclear arms limitations and the American hostage crisis in Iran.

Carter is known to have been among the recipients of a round of final political messages, the contents of which have not been disclosed, which Tito sent to various world leaders from his hospital bed in his final

Carter also said in the interview that making foreign policy has been

more difficult than ne thought it would be before he became presi-

"I did not foresee restrictions in solving world problems," Carter was quoted as saying in an unofficial translation by Tanjug, the Yugoslav news agency. "We are a superpower, but we have to deal with other free and independent nations which have different viewpoints. And in a world of freedom, in which people can act the way they want, when they decide to take decisions themselves, there simply have to be differences.

But the American president said, "We have made progress. The world - mostly - lives in peace."

After his arrival and a trip by motorcade to place the wreath inside Tito's tomb, Carter's schedule called for meetings with President Cvijetin Mijatovic and other Yugoslav leaders, a trip to a Belgrade park to plant an American sequoia as a "friendship tree" and a tour of the ancient ramparts overlooking the Danube River. A state dinner in Carter's honor was planned for tonight.

The visiting president, who was accompanied on his European tour by his wife, Rosalynn, and their daughter, Amy, will fly to Madrid on Wednesday and stop in Lisbon on Thursday before returning to the

Carters enjoy night on the town

VENICE, Italy (AP) - For their final evening on the town after the close of the economic summit here, President Carter and his family traveled by boat to a family-style restaurant where they dined outdoors with only a canopy protecting them from a sudden local storm.

The president, his wife, Rosalynn, and 12-year-old daughter, Amy, set out with their aides in a 40-foot launch from the Carters' hotel for a 15-minute boat ride through this city's famed canals to the Locanda Ontine, an unpretensious restaurant in a

working-class neighborhood of Ven-

The wind, blowing in gusts up to 20 knots by U.S. Navy estimate, whipped up white caps on the canal as the presidential party made its way to dinner. An accompanying launch was temporarily knocked out of service in the nasty chop, but sailors were able to make emergency repairs.

The Carters, serenaded by local musicians, ate outdoors under a patio canopy that protected them from a heavy downpour which began shortly after they arrived dinner and continued until after they finished dinner.

Church killer in earlier shooting

DAINGERFIELD, Texas (AP) - A 45-year-old man charged in an attack on a church congregation that left five dead was involved in the accidental shooting of his father 12 years ago, officials say.

Alvin Lee King III, a reclusive former schoolteacher, was charged with five counts of murder and 10 counts of assault with intent to murder after he allegedly burst through the doors of the First Baptist Church on Sunday and began firing at worshippers with a rapid-fire rifle.

Fifteen persons were hit before the flak-jacketed gunman shot himself in the

King, 45, was in critical condition with "unstable vital signs" at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston. He was to have gone on trial Monday on incest charges brought on behalf of his 21-year-old daughter.

King's father, Alvin Lee King Jr., died when he was struck in the head by a blast from a .12-gauge shotgun as the family was looking over a gun collection. King was holding a .12-gauge shotgun moments before the fatal blast, said Justice of the Peace Armando Flores, who ruled the death accidental. "At that time I was coroner," Flores said Monday night. "They were looking

In 1966, according to records discovered by the Corpus Christi Caller-Times,

at the gun and it had fallen from the son's grasp and discharged, hitting the old man in the face and neck."

Meanwhile, church members spent Monday preparing for funerals today for two of those slain during Sunday's services. Church secretary Mary Allen said the sanctuary carpet — more than a quarter of it stained with blood — would be ripped out and the floors sanded. Daingerfield authorities said they knew of no motive for the church attack.

Investigators said they also were puzzled by a "bizarre" note and papers found at the King home that indicated the part-time farmer once had applied for

"There was a letter from the Russian Embassy denying him citizenship and explaining that Russia does not grant citizenship to Americans," said Cass County sheriff's deputy Emit Kennedy.

Other documents indicated King had deposited money in a Swiss bank account in April and May. Kennedy said he did not understand a note he found after Sunday's bloodbath

on the kitchen table at King's secluded home. "I don't know what to make of it," he said of the note. "It really didn't make any sense to me. It was just a strange, weird scribbling on a piece of paper

A Daingerfield police officer who saw the note said it was "dealing with a nuclear Armageddon" and a "nuclear first-strike by the Russians."

Kennedy's energy plank may be hollow victory

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy finally has won his own corner of the 1980 Democratic platform, but President Carter quickly made it clear that his rival's plank on nuclear energy may be worth no more than the heat it would throw from a wood-burning stove.

Interrupting its drumroll for Carter on issue after issue, the Democratic Platform Committee, meeting in Washington, threw one Kennedy's way on Monday by unanimously calling for the virtual elimination of nuclear power plants.

Though that represented a clear, if solitary, victory for the Massachusetts senator, the Carter camp got behind the plank after the Kennedy minority agreed to softer language which set no timetable for a nuclear energy phaseout.

But the proposal, for which the panel broke into long applause upon the final vote, did in fact declare that "as alternate fuels become available, we will retire nuclear power plants in an orderly manner.'

Given the lack of a deadline, the president's delegates might just as comfortably have agreed to windmills on the moon - when practicable. For while Kennedy spokesman Jim Flug was insisting that "We got what we wanted," the reality of the matter had the president himself signing off on a call for more, not less, nuclear energy.

A lengthy comminique issued Monday at the seven-nation economic summit in Venice declared that "We underline the vital contribution of nuclear power to a more secure energy supply. The role of nuclear energy has to be increased if world energy needs are to be met. We shall therefore have to expand our nuclear generating capacity."

The president remarked separately at a news conference in Venice that nuclear power development was more crucial in countries such as France than the United States, which has abundant coal reserves. But "we believe nuclear power will have to play a viable part" to meet U.S. energy needs, he added.

Rape Crisis Center 'successful'

The Midland Rape Crisis Center. which is in financial limbo, may be calling on the Midland County Com-missioners' Court for funds if federal grants are not renewed next year, director Nan Gordon told the court

"We've been very successful so far," Ms. Gordon said of the center. But, rather than financial success, she was talking about the number of

rapes reported to the center.

Since the center was opened last

Since the center was opened last October, 23 women have reported rapes. And that number of incidents was three reports above the center's goal, Ms. Gordon said.

"We're hoping that we'll increase the reporting of rape.

"The Midland Rape Crisis Center provides confidential crisis interven-

their families," Ms. Gordon said.

She was expounding on the effec-tiveness of the center in preparing the court for any future request she might have for funding. The center's financial backer, the U.S. Justice Department's Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA), is endangered of being abolished.

The center's budget for its 1979-80 program was \$39,000. Budget for the following year is \$44,000. Ms. Gordon gave a percentage breakdown of the center's first nine

months: -78 percent of the victims indicated a willingness to file charges.

—61 percent of the victims filed

48 percent of the alleged assail-

-17 percent of the assailants were offense to law exferse reported e to law enforcement offi-

In the nine-month period, the center received 125 calls for assistance or information. The center made 36 referrals and received 38 crisis counseling calls.

27 trained volunteer case workers. "The Midland Rape Crisis Center acts in the advocacy capacity to work with law enforcement, legal and medical agencies to provide sensitive and comprehensive care to rape victims and their families," Ms. Gordon

Ms. Gordon indicated that reports of rapes could be on the increase. "A lot of peope don't want to report (rapes) because of what people will think," she said. In other action, the commission-



Old age, disability pensions may be running out

The House of Representatives' subcommittee on social security will meet Thursday to consider transfering money to the old age fund, the

announcement continued "Borrowing among the trust funds and reallocation of the tax rates will, under our best judgment about the economy, allow the social security trust funds to continue paying benefits timely for the next 25 years and then some," Driver said.

One explanation for the depletion of the fund is that it is taking in less money from payroll checks than was projected because unemployed workers could not contribute to the present fund, Fisher said.

About 35 million retired workers. aged 62 and above, receive benefits from the old age and survivors portion of the social security program,

Starting July 3, a man and his wife both aged 62 years or over, would receive a 14.3 percent increase in their monthly checks, he said.

On the average, these checks would be about \$560 a month for an elderly

couple, Fisher said. The occasion for Monday morning's announcement at Midland College was a symposium to study financing and other aspects of the social security system.

Senate rejects aid to private school students

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate today rejected, 71-24, legislation that would have permitted some students at private and parochial schools to receive federal aid for the first time.

The measure, an amendment to a pending education aid bill, was offered by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., who contended it was a modest proposal that would extend to the neediest private elementary and secondary private school students the same type of aid that is given students at private and religously oriented un-

Opponents said the amendment was clearly unconstitutional, would represent a foot-in-the-door precedent to obtain aid for private schools on a larger scale at a later date and would undermine the nation's system of public schools.

Moynihan's measure would have extended existing federal education programs to poorer students at private schools, permitting a maximum

grant of \$750 a year to help pay tuition for a student from a family with income of not more than \$15,000 a

The overall bill authorizes \$36.2 billion in aid to education over the next five years. Opponents said the tuition aid to students in private schools envisioned in the amendment would total approximately \$160 million a year toward the end of the five-year period.

Another amendment to the overall education measure would eliminate interest-free federal loans for college students, replacing them with loans at a 9 percent interest rate and providing for bill collectors to collect the debts if neccessary.

Sponsors said the loan provision would save an estimated \$3.1 billion over the five-year life of the bill because it would produce sizeable interest income and discourage many "convenience" loans taken out by students motivated not by genuine need but by the present zero percent interest rate

Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., said the proposal on aid to private school children is "plainly unconstitutional" because it would violate the section in the Constitution requiring separation of church and state.

Hollings said passage of the

amendment and the precedent it would create for more comprehensive aid to private schools in the future would be "devastating to the public school system.

He said the plaN represents "a little different scheme" from the tutition tax credit approach to aid private

Iran's foreign minister said the U.S. hostage crisis may be resolved in about a month and the State Department granted an exemption to Barbara Timm to see her captive son again. But any optimism about a quick release for the Americans was dampened by a radical Islamic party which urged Parliament to have the

hostages tried as spies. "Imam Khomeini and the Iranian nation believe that the hostages are spies and must be tried," the Struggling Moslems' Movement, which is close to the Americans' captors, said in its party newspaper Ommat. "Those deputies who do not ask for trying the hostages are in fact compromisers who resist the demands of

Imam Khomeini." Meanwhile, the official Pars news agency reported the executions of 15 insurgents in northwest Iran. It said they were found guilty of killing the governor general of Khoy, a town in Iran's northwest Azerbaijan province, and six revolutionary guards including the town's guard command-

MADRAS, India (AP) - Former President V.V. Giri of India died in his sleep today

Giri studied law during the 1920s in Dublin, Ireland.

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Two Thai military aircraft were downed by anti-aircraft fire today as Thai and Vietnamese forces kept up a crossborder artillery duel and tens of thousands of Cambodian refugees tried to find a safe haven inside Thailand, according to eyewitness accounts.

Senior Thai military sources confirmed that a light reconnaissance plane was crippled by Vietnamese anti-aircraft fire and crash-landed. The pilot and co-pilot were seriously injured in the engagement, part of the sharpest clash between Thailand and Vietnam in 18 months, the sources

Thai villagers reported a helicopter also was shot down in the same area - between the frontier village of Non-Mark Moon and the border village of Nong Chan. The two aircraft were shot down in the space of about 10 minutes, the residents said.

Foreign Minister Siddhi Savetsila said he will call for a U.N. Security Council meeting to "condemn Vietnam," and likened Hansi's cross-border assaults to those of a "gangster" and a "demented person."

The Vietnamese attacked across the border at six points, and a Red Cross spokesman said, "We don't have an estimate of casualties but given the extent of the fighting and the density of the Cambodian population it might be in the hundreds.

The incursion apparently was aimed at punishing pro-Western Thailand for allowing anti-communist guerrillas opposed to the Vietnamesebacked government in Cambodia to operate along the Thai-Cambodian border.

Thai military sources said 130 Thai soldiers were killed or wounded in the assault Monday and that 100,000 Cambodians were sent fleeing in panic from refugee camps. The Thai

command put the toll much lower. The Thai government at first tried to tone down the incursion, the most serious military confrontation between Vietnam and Thailand since Hanoi's troops invaded Cambodia in December 1978 and deposed Premier

"Our impression is that the scale of the incursion was much larger than the Thais are admitting. They obviously don't want people to panic,"

one Western diplomat said. The U.S. government accused the Vietnamese of aggression but played down the extent of the fighting and said the Thai government has not requested American help.

The International Red Cross, which operates along the frontier, said the situation was "very, very confusing"

Western relief sources said the Vietnamese appeared to be in control of at least two large border encampments opposite the villages of Non Mark Moon and Nong Chan - which held tens of thousands of Cambodians.



NEW DELHI, India (AP) - The body of Sanjay Gandhi, son and heirapparent of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, was borne past slogan-chanting throngs today to a tumultuous cremation witnessed by his mother and more than 100,000 mourners.

The 33-year-old Gandhi, a licensed pilot, was killed with a flying instructor Monday in the crash of a stant plane.

The body was burned on a pyre on the bank of the Jamuna River, near the cremation sites of India's foremost national heroes — Jawaharial Nehru, the nation's first prime minister and Sanjay's grandfather, and Mohandas K. (Mahatma) Gandhi, the father of the nation.

Mrs. Gandhi, dressed in white, the Hindu! mourning color, sat expressionless before the pyre as the four-foot-high flames consumed her son's remains

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The guest workers

Sen. S.I. Hayakawa apparently believes this nation could benefit from a guest worker program - a program not unlike one supported by Gov. Bill Clements.

Recently, Hayakawa told the President's Select Commission on Immigration and Refugee Policy that Mexican President Jose Lopez Portillo spoke in favor of the guest worker program when the two met last month.

Under the program, individuals from another country - Mexico, for example - could legally enter the United States on six-month visas after placing a \$250 deposit with their own government. The money would merely serve as insurance that the individuals coming into this country would be less inclined to attempt to hide out here and stay

These guest workers could fill a void left in the United States by American workers who feel some jobs are "below" them.

You might note that the number of unemployed workers in the U.S. is increasing at a steady pace and ask why we would support such a program at this time when it could feasibly add further to the fires of unemployment.

It may be true that in some areas of the nation unemployment is becoming a problem - the in-

But Texas and other booming Sunbelt states do not suffer this affliction currently, at least not to the degree of other states. Business and industry in these states need workers.

Prime employers for workers under such a program could include restaurants, hotels, hospitals, bakeries, landscape firms, food processing companies, plastic and metal fabricators, the garment industry, families needing child care, farms and ranches, and others.

This isn't intended to imply that the guest worker plan has escaped criticism. It hasn't. United Farm Workers' leader Cesar Chavez considers such a program an attack on his union. He believes it would create another bracero program of the 1950s and 1960s bringing hardship to American citizens and legally resident aliens who make their living as farm workers.

We don't think so, however. The program could provide a partial solution, at least, to our country's worker shortage in these areas where that situation exists.

With today's economic woes, we don't understand why the logic of such a program is not realized.



The 1980 American presidential election, while it resembles a comic opera, is the most important American presidential election in the 20th Century in terms of worldwide consequences. On its outcome depends the survival or destruction of the West.

To put it in perspective, glance at a world map. There are only two superpowers: the Soviet Union and the U.S. In the absence of the United States' support, neither Western Europe nor Red China could survive a confrontation with the Soviet Union.

Hoover wanted no part of Bond stories

WASHINGTON - The FBI's deep concern with the true-blue Americanism of such celebrities as Helen Keller and Humphrey Bogart has been chronicled in past columns. Now I've obtained internal FBI documents which reveal that the late J. Edgar Hoover was also worried about a fictional celebrity - Ian Fleming's super-British Agent 007, James

Communist subversion may have been threatening the Republic in the 1960s - as Hoover assured Congress it was every year at budget time but the FBI could still find time and agents to check into the possible effects of a James Bond movie on the agency's pristine image.

An internal FBI memo to Cartha (Deke) DeLoach, one of Hoover's top assistants, dated Jan. 1, 1964, noted that Fleming's spy stories "are generally filled with beautiful women presenting themselves to (Bond) in

scanty attire. This startling revelation was no news to the millions who had either read Fleming's novels or seen a James Bond movie. But it was important to the nation's top investigative agency because there were three passing references to the FBI in 'Goldfinger," a Fleming thriller whose climactic scenes involved an

attack on the U.S. gold hoard at Fort 'The type of book written by Fleming is certainly not the type where we would want any mention of the FBI or portrayal of FBI agents, no matter how favorable they might look in the movie," another confidential memo said. It explained that "Fleming's stories generally center around sex and bizarre situations, and certainly are not the type with which we should want to be associated.'

Evidentally fearful that DeLoach and/or Hoover lived in a hopelessly sheltered environment, the writer of one memo felt it necessary to explain the facts of Fleming's life: "Our files reflect that Ian Fleming is a writer of paperback novels concerning spy stories in which his fictional character, James Bond, is the star," the

memo states. The G-men even checked into the man who was adapting "Goldfinger" for the screen, Richard Malibaum, and reported: "Bufiles (bureau files) contain no record regarding" Mali-

One of the "Goldfinger" memos conceded that an FBI source "was unaware of any FBI portrayal in the movie." Nevertheless, the memo writer recommended that "in the event the Bureau is contacted for permission to portray an FBI agent in the movie, it should be flatly de-

Hoover scribbled "I concur" at the bottom of the memo.

As it turned out, the FBI's fear that it would be somehow involved in a movie featuring "sex and bizarre situations" proved groundless. James Bond was able to save the gold at Fort Knox with the help of only the CIA and the United States Army.

Three presidential candidates courting Jewish vote

WASHINGTON - At a private meeting June 10 in Manhattan's plush Harmonie Club, 18 prominent Jewish leaders whose common bond is Ronald Reagan speeded up the mad chase for the Jewish vote by all parties in 1980, a pursuit menacing U.S. policy in the Mideast that could lead to drastic breakaway action by Israel.

The meeting, presided over by Los Angeles businessman and longtime Reaganite Albert A. Spiegel, poured over data and intelligence for eight hours. Their conclusion: Reagan could win over 40 percent of the Jewish vote, enough to elect him presi-dent. Jewish trust in President Carter has been destroyed, said Spiegel.

Those blue sky prospects mean there is slight chance that either Reagan or independent candidate John Anderson would seriously protest any adventurous excesses by Menachem Begin's Israeli government between now and Nov. 4. Furthermore, it is Begin's alienation from President Carter that makes the rush for the strategically-placed Jewish vote so frenetic by all three candidates.

The early stage of this rush has damaged U.S. efforts to solve the Arab-Israeli struggle. Some officials believe it may stimulate dangerous Israeli action — perhaps another military invasion of Lebanon — before the election

That might seem to collide with Carter's much-advertised opposition to Jewish settlements on the West Bank, which he calls illegal and an obstacle to peace. Mondale avoided the word "settlements," but to the foreign ministries of Saudi Arabia, Egypt and other moderate Arab states, the distinction is a blur that raises questions about Carter's credi-

Saying that Jews could live anywhere on the West Bank they wanted brought sustained applause for Mon-dale, but the anti-Carter animus of the American Jewish community is not about to dissipate because of such political ploys. The upbeat mood at Spiegel's pro-Reagan planning session stems from the belief that Carter is perceived by many Jewish voters as a threat to Israel's future.

Cashing in on this distrust, Reagan has gone to ludicrous lengths to defend his own integrity with American Jews. He denied he had told Egyptian Ambassador Ashraf Ghorbal that if elected he would seek "a comprehensive peace settlement" - which to many American Jews connotes giving up the West Bank.

Public opinion polls show Anderson's standing with Jews to be extremely high, and he aims to keep it that way. He has directed his agents to tell Jewish leaders that ex-Under Secretary of State George Ball, Anderson's earliest foreign policy adviser, will not be allowed to advise him on the Mideast. Within the American Jewish community, Ball is despised for alleged bias against Isra-

U.S. officials think this political climate spurs Israel into making new demands and contemplating new military ventures. Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon, one of Begin's closest confidants and chief strategist for Israel's settlements policy, last month publicly recruited Orthodox Jewish youth in New York to come to Israel and help settle the West Bank.
Speaking to the Union of Orthodox
Jewish Congregations of America,
Gen. Sharon called on his audience to

Burrus, however, followed a trail from Mexico to Spain, France, England and then the United States where the Indian dialect account was found among a collection of documents donated to the New York City Public Library.

Doctors say skin grafts went better than expected

SHERMAN OAKS, Calif. (AP) - Critically burned comedian Richard Pryor was to resume limited treatment today and a full schedule of therapy Wednesday after a skin graft operation went better than expected, doctors said.

'They covered the majority of the burned areas," said Gary Swaye, assistant executive director of Sherman Oaks Community Hospital.

He said doctors were cautious about upgrading the actor's condition from critical to serious, although such a change is standard among burn patients once most of their wounds are covered with new skin.

Despite constant pain, thre 39-year-old comedian "seems to be very positive and helpful," Swaye said. Pryor suffered near-fatal burns over half of his body two weeks ago in a freak fire at his home in nearby

Swaye said a team of six doctors operated on Pryor for an hour and a half Monday morning, taking skin grafts from his thighs and calves and placing them on his shoulders, neck, arms, back and chest A pulmonary specialist also removed mucus from the patient's

lungs to help ease the pneum ionia he is suffering. Pryor's face, less severely burned in the accident at his home two weeks ago, will not be operated on until doctors determine if it will heal unaided, doctors said.



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



Revenue sharing checks to be cut?

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal revenue sharing checks going to the states next month may be cut in half under a \$15.9 billion emergency spending bill before the Senate.

The legislation, approved by the Senate Appropriations Committee Monday, would cut \$572 million from the revenue sharing program for the fourth quarter of the fiscal year -July through September.

That would wipe out the states' portion of federal revenue sharing for the remainder of this fiscal year. To ease the impact, however, the bill would spread the cut over two quarters - July through September and

As approved by the committee, the \$15.9 billion emergency spending bill provides supplemental funds for virtually all federal agencies to carry them through to the end of the fiscal vear Sept. 30.

The decision cutting revenue sharing was one of the final votes taken before the bill was approved.

After several days of work on the bill, committee members added up their appropriations Monday and found the total was too high to comply with congressional budget restrictions. The state portion of revenue sharing then got the ax.


Eagles present \$10,000 check

May's consumer prices rise to match rate set in April

WASHINGTON (AP) - Consumer prices rose 0.9 percent in May, the same as in April and far less than the rampant pace set during the first three months of 1980, the government said today.

If May's price rise continues for an

entire year, the annual inflation rate would be a compound 10.9 percent, the Labor Department said. From January through March, that rate exceeded 18 percent.

Some economists predict that the annual inflation rate could fall to 8 percent or less by the end of the year, as interest rates continue to fall and the recession continues.

In a companion report, the Labor Department reported that Americans' take-home pay in May fell 0.9 percent. In the past year, earnings adjusted for inflation have dropped 7.7 percent. The moderating inflation trend in

May was led by gasoline, which declined in price by 0.6 percent, and food, which increased a slight 0.3 percent, two-tenths of a percentage point less than the month before. These figures are seasonally adjust-

The drop in gasoline prices was the first since August 1977, the department said.

Only housing costs jumped sharply

- 1.5 percent - as recent drops in mortgage rates have yet to show up in the Consumer Price Index, the department reported. Housing expenses accounted for three-quarters of May's increase in the Consumer Price

Index, it said. The report also showed: - Substantial declines in the price of beef, pork, and eggs, which offset increases for fruits, vegetables, dairy products, cereal, bakery products and sugar. Restaurant meals and alcoholic beverages rose 0.5 percent and 0.7 percent, respectively, in

Home financing costs shot up 3 percent, while the price of homes rose 1.3 percent. Although governmentbacked FHA and VA mortgage rates dropped substantially, conventional rates continued to rise.

- Natural gas and electricity charges increased 4.8 percent and 2.5 percent, respectively, while oil prices

 Rents rose 1 percent. - Despite rebate programs to stimulate an ailing auto industry, new car prices were up 1 percent. Automobile financing charges also continued to increase substantially, up 4.3 per-

- Taking public transportation cost 1.5 percent more last month.

porch, looking sort of lost." Told of Fisher's plan to adopt one of his new wards, Mrs. Thomas smiled and nodded with satisfaction.

"That's just like him," she said. "Harry and Gina are exceptionally good with the animals. They seem to have the ability to see with their hearts instead of their eyes."

Mrs. Thomas worked with the West Virginia Department of Vocational Rehabilitation to have Fisher and Miss Howell placed at the animal control center. They spend their days cleaning cages, running errands and grooming dogs and cats so the animals will appear their best when someone comes looking for a pet.

But how many of you have been involved in the spend-money-by-association chain?

It works like this. Your best friend (?) invites you to a plastic party. Everyone likes you and wants to be your friend - especially the plastic person with the order book who approaches you to host a party. She promises you a plastic cantaloupe keeper that will lock in flavor and lock out offensive odors.

You invite 12 of your friends to your party. The next day you have invitations from six of the 12 who attended your party to attend their plastic party. The other six invite you to attend a plant party, sports clothes party, pots-and-pans party, perfume party, encyclopedia party and silver-

At the plastic parties, you meet 72 new faces who also invite you to their plastic parties. Out of the other six parties, three of them are into fabric parties, toy parties and home interior

At the home interior party, you meet another who is into copper parties, one into smoke alarm parties and another who is giving a bra

Hospital stabbing leaves child dead

Lombardi tried desperately to rescue her 6year-old son when she saw a man swing a thinbladed boning knife at him. But when it was over, little Anthony Lombardi was dead and Mrs. Lombardi and four other people were wounded in bloody hospital stabhing spree.

"It was panic," said hospital guard George "There was Bishop. blood all over the place...people screaming ... running in every di-

William B. Robinson, a former ice cream factory employee, was charged with murder and eight counts of assault with a dangerous weapon and was hospitalized under police guard after the Monday incident.

His sister said the rampage came one day after Robinson, 42, visited the same hospital, seeking admission and warning he might kill.

"If they had put him in the hospital, this never would have happened," said Edna Hooks, "These people wouldn't have been hurt. He was threatening to kill everybody that got in his way."

The hospital issued a denial that Robinson had sought admission.

According to security guards at the Springfield Hospital Unit of Bay State Medical Center. the man walked into the emergency room about 10 a.m., grabbed a woman and began stab-bing her. Guard Harold Ferrier, 62, radioed for help before he was stabbed in the back.

More than 100 treated after tower blaze

NEW YORK (AP) — It was the kind of blaze big-city firefighters have learned to dread — flames spurting from a 42-story Park Avenue skyscraper, more than 100 firefighters felled by toxic smoke and heat and an unknown number of people trapped inside the concrete and glass tower.

The fire in the Westvaco Building, opposite the fashionable Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in midtown Manhattan, raged out of control for three hours Monday night as shards of glass fell

Streams of water gushed from the 20th floor executive offices of the Bank of America, where the blaze apparently began. Firefighters were able to contain the fire to that floor, but acrid smoke mixed with noxious fumes from plastic furniture rose as high as the 40th floor

The smoke was so thick that two firemen lost their way in the glass tower for 45 minutes and 15 people trapped on the 32nd floor stuffed absorbent items beneath a door to keep from inhaling the toxic fumes.

Fire marshals said the cause was undetermined and the fire did not appear suspicious. The building did not have a sprinkler system, and one was not required

No fatalities were reported but officials said four firefighters suffered heart attacks and up to 75 people were taken to area hospitals. A total of 125 people, mostly firefighters, were treated for smoke inhalation and cuts from

Firefighters were forced to break windows to keep the fire from consuming oxygen on the floors above. On the street

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below, thousands crowded police barricades to watch. "The smoke is just indescribable and the heat is like an

oven," firefighter John Pistelli said before the blaze was doused as he stood at the makeshift emergency ward set up in the building's lushly appointed lobby. "The smoke is so thick you can lean on it.

For workers in the building, the problem was finding out about the fire and then finding a way to get out. Fire officials could not say how many people were caught in the building when the blaze erupted at about 7: 30 p.m. but all were either evacuated by firemen or left safely by way of stairs or

We never heard any alarms," said a law firm employee who was working on the 35th floor.

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



Sutcliffe handcuffs Houston

HOUSTON (AP) - When Los Angeles pitcher Rick Sutcliffe fizzled early this season after earning National League Rookie of the Year honors in 1979, two people didn't give up--Sutcliffe and LA Manager Tommy Lasorda

The confidence of both player and manager showed Monday night when Lasorda kept Sutcliffe on the mound in the ninth inning to complete his first game since Sept. 30, 1979, a three-hit 3-0 shutout of the Houston

NEW YORK (AP) - After 11 years as a major league player, Charley Lau had a batting average of .255, but as the adage goes: "Them that can't do, teach.

As a teacher, Lau is batting closer to 1.000. The 47-year-old hitting istructor is baseball's premier student

Lau spent a year each with the

Baltimore Orioles and Oakland A's before beginning an eight-year stint in 1971, as hitting instructor at Kansas My, where he molded hitters like George Brett and Hal McRae. In 1979. he went to New York, where he has worked with many of the Yankees'

young hitters. "I don't know a happy .200 hitter," says Lau. "They are always searching, always trying." When they come to him, he stresses four things.

"When I analyze a hitter, there are four things I look for — position of the head, balance in the stance, weight shift and rhythm in the stance and extension with the bat," Lau said.

"If you discussed the basics with a tennis teacher or a golf pro, the same terms would come up," Lau said. "I use a golf swing to illustrate the basic principles, especially in terms of transfering the weight.'

Two years after Lau took up with the Royals, a pair of hitters named Brett and McRae came along.

"When I started with Charley, I was hitting .188," McRae said. "I had just come over from the National League (Cincinnati) and was trying to hit the ball out of the park.

"He changed my style of hitting and also my philosophy.

Lau's philosophy is consistency. He allows hitters to reach their potential by teaching them to make an unnatural motion look and feel natural. He believes in spraying the ball to all fields and letting the home runs come when they may.

"He helped me a great deal, and I'm sorry he left," said McRae, who would have won the AL batting title with a .332 average in 1976 had it not been for Brett, who batted .333.

"He studied hitting as much as anybody and has a better understanding than most coaches of what it takes to hit consistently," McRae said. "He tried to keep you from getting streaky, he taught from that stand-

Joe Lefebvre is one of the Yankees' most moldable rookies with six home runs this season, two in Monday night's game against Boston.

"I haven't listened to everything he's said, but that's my fault," Lefebvre said. "If I got my big head where it ought to be, it'll be even better. I have a tendency to pull my head off the ball, and that's what I ask him (Lau) to watch."

The highest Lau ever hit in the majors was .295 with Baltimore in 1966, but the previous year was more representative of his hitting skills he batted .264. He was better known in his playing days with the Milwaukee Braves when he caught Warren Spahn's second no-hitter in 1961.

New sanctioning group could take over at Indianapolis 500

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - The U.S. Auto Club has ruled over the Indianapolis 500 with an iron fist for the past quarter-century, but the same wind that carried John Cooper into the presidency of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway may also sweep an entirely new sanctioning organization into power.

Cooper took over this year from Joe Cloutier, who was a holdover from the regime of the late Tony Hulman and was just as firmly entrenched in USAC as Hulman had been during his long tenure

Faced with the internal bickering between USAC and the dissident Championship Auto Racing Teams (CART), Cooper was instrumental in forging a workable truce under the banner of the new Championship Racing League.

But the two groups went beyond Cooper's initial proposal and, in effect, left the Speedway virtually out in the cold.

On Monday, Cooper hinted that the situation as it stands may not be good enough, and he said that all five sanctioning groups affiliated with the Automobile Competition Committee of the United States (ACCUS) have been approached about possible interest they might have in sanctioning the 500 beginning next

Besides USAC, other groups affiliated with ACCUS, the umbrella organization for racing in the United States, include the Sports Car Club of America (SCCA), the National Association for Stock Car Racing (NASCAR), the National Hot Rod Association (NHRA) and the International Motor Sports Association

NASCAR may have the inside track, since Cooper has had a longstanding association with former NASCAR President Bill France and his son, Bill France Jr., who is the current NAS-CAR president. Also, the elder France just last week was named to replace Indy 500 chief steward Tom Binford as the ACCUS representative with the Federation d'Automobile Internationale, the worldwide race sanctioning body.

Cooper, a former NASCAR official, and the younger France have also reportedly been negotiating to bring a NASCAR race to Indianapolis next summer.

In Monday's announcement, Cooper also said an invitation was extended to an unnamed individual who has expressed interest in creating a new sanctioning organization.

Bill France Sr., contacted Monday night, said, "When NA-SCAR was formed, the car owners all sat down in a room to make up the rules. After several hours they came out with no agreement, and right then I learned that it was gonna have to be one man who told the people what the rules were gonna be. And if they didn't like it, they could go home

"I think John is smart by doing this now, before it gets carried away, and I'm behind him 100 percent.' Does this mean NASCAR would be interested in sanctioning

"We just might be," France said.

As it stands now, champ car racing is run by a six-man board of governors, including five car owners - three of which belonged to CART. Cooper originally proposed a seven-man board, composed of just three car owners and with five votes necessary to take any action.

The CART-USAC alliance also ignored Cooper's suggestion for a memorial Hulman Cup, along with a \$1 million prize fund for

NEW YORK (AP) - The Cincinnati Reds, who dominated the National League with six Western Division titles, four league championships and two World Series triumphs in the 1970s, dominate the NL All-Star team of the decade, too.

Led by catcher Johnny Bench, the Reds have six players on the NL team of the '70s. Bench received more than 21 million votes from the fans in the decade, second only to the 22,858,453 votes cast for the American League's Rod Carew.

During the 1970s, more than 71 million ballots the largest number in any nonpollitical election were cast in the voting underwritten by Gillette.

The voting ends Wednesday for this year's game, July 8 in Los Angeles. The pitchers, as before, will be selected by the All-Star managers, Chuck Tanner of the Pittsburgh Pirates and Earl Weaver of the Baltimore Orioles.

The other Reds on the team of the decade (some of them no longer play in Cincinnati) are second baseman Joe Morgan (now with Houston), shortstop Dave Concepcion (he shares the position with Philadelphia's Larry Bowa) and outfielders Pete Rose

Carew, a four-time winner of the Gillette Trophy (1975, 1977, 1978, 1979) as the top all-star vote getter of the year, has been on every all-star team since Commissioner Bowie Kuhn returned the selection process to the fans in 1970. Kremlin withdraws about 10 percent of troops

MOSCOW (AP) - The Kremlin announced the withdrawal of about 10 percent of its 85,000 troops in Afghanistan but indicated there were no immediate plans to pull the rest out. President Carter downplayed the announcement and said it would be meaningful only if it leads to "total, permanent withdrawal."

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Radio Moscow said Monday that a Soviet division, which numbers between 7,000 and 14,000 troops, was being withdrawn from Afghanistan along with 108 tanks, in accordance' with the partial pullout formula announced by the official Tass news agency over the weekend.

President Leonid I. Brezhnev said the reason for the limited withdrawal was that the anti-communist Moslem guerrillas and their "interventionist" supporters who have been fighting the pro-Moscow regime in Afghanistan for more than two years have suffered a "serious defeat."

Since December, when Moscow began pouring men and arms into neighboring Afghanistan, the Kremlin has insisted it was sending a "limited contingent" to suppress Afghan counter-revolutionaies it claims are being supplied by the United States, China and other "imperialist

"Naturally we will continue to help Afghanistan create a new life and to secure the gains of the April (1978) revolution," Brezhnev told a plenary

session of the Communist Party's Central Committee. He gave no indication the Kremlin plans to remove the rest of its troops in Afghanistan

Carter told reporters at the close of the Venice economic summit that the partial Soviet withdrawal appears to involve "less than 10 percent" of the 85,000 troops in Afghanistan and they apparently are soldiers who haven't seen action in several months.

'We know some (forces) are bein withdrawn just across the border, and could be returned quickly if needed, Carter said. "They probably have ordered the withdrawal of less than 10 percent of those forces. My own information is that the forces they have withdrawn are those that have not seen action in the last several

Carter said the move could only be significant "if it is a step leading towards the total, permanent withdrawal of Soviet forces.

West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt told Carter and other western leaders at the Venice summit that he intends to tell Brezhnev at a meeting at the end of the month in Moscow that the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan was "unacceptable." the New York Times reported.

Schmidt said he would also tell Brezhnev that Moscow could not use the West Germans in any way during the coming parley to divide the Western Alliance, The Times reported.

Chrysler loan board ready to approve first \$500 million

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government's Chrysler Loan Guarantee Board, after a series of agonizing false starts, is primed to approve the first \$500 million in federally guaranteed loans to the ailing automaker.

Today's climactic meeting - expected to last only 30 minutes or so was postponed repeatedly last week as Treasury Department and company officials worked feverishly to persuade a handful of reluctant banks to participate in the intricate bailout package.

The last holdout, Deutsch Genossenschaftsbank of Frankfort, West Germany, agreed "in principle" Friday, and, according to a Chrysler spokesman who asked not to be identified, signed up Monday.

The bailout package restructures Chrysler's \$4.4 billion debt and involves about 400 banks and insurance

Auto import action could raise prices

WASHINGTON (AP) - A presidential task force says restricting Japanese auto imports to spur the struggling U.S. auto industry could up prices of domestic cars.

Tough restraints on foreign auto imports is one of the major options to be considered Thursday when President Carter's Economic Policy Group meets to discuss possible government actions to rescue the American auto

Senators from auto industry states said last week that Carter has promised to present his recommenda-tions soon after returning from his current European tour.

loan guarantee negotiations dragged on, to suspend payments to many suppliers to preserve its dwindling cash supply. The automaker had said it would be forced to file for court protection from creditors under the bankruptcy laws if it did not get the loan guarantee money this week.

The company always rejected the strategy of a bankruptcy petition filed as a matter of choice on the grounds that its already-depressed sales would dry up immediately because buyers would fear being stuck with an

That ensures up to four more years of running the government the LDP has controlled for almost three decades. The party also won a comfortable margin in the less important Upper House, with 135 of 252

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) - Twentyseven people were killed and four wounded on the eve of a 48-hour general strike called by leftist organizations with the aim of toppling El Salvador's ruling civilian-military junta.

Fifteen guerrillas were killed and two soldiers wounded in a shootout between an insurgent band and a military patrol Monday in Sonsonate, 49 miles west of San Salvador, officials said.

Eight other persons, including three doctors and two nurses, were killed in Santa Ana, on the outskirst of San Salvador, when a military patrol shot it out with insurgents guarding a clandestine guerrilla

Four more persons were killed and two soldiers wounded when leftist gunmen opened fire on a military patrol near the national university in

Some party members had been pushing for the 82-year-old Nishimura to remain party president until regular party elections in December, with' the prime ministership split off and given to a provisional leader until then. With his defeat, the likelihood of that compromise decreased.

Japanese newspaper analyses of the election agreed that a quick compromise on a new prime minister was unlikely, and the battle might continue until a scheduled party caucus July 13 or 14. The prime minister will be formally named in a special Diet, or parliamentary, session July 16.

At present, there are three major candidates: Kiichi Miyazawa, 60, a former foreign minister who is expected to succeed to the head of the group led by Ohira; Toshio Komoto, 69, former international trade and industry minister; and former LDP Secretary General Yasuhiro Nakasone, 62, who also headed the Japan self-defense agency



Earlier, three Israelis were wounded, one seriously, in the explosion of a terrorist bomb hidden in a plastic bag placed in a Tel Aviv grocery store. A second bomb exploded in a Jewish neighborhood in Jerusalem but no injuries were reported.

Police have warned of a sharp increase in attacks by Palestinian guerrillas who have vowed to avenge the attacks against the Arab mayors.

Meanwhile, two members of the Democratic Party headed by Deputy Premier Yigael Yadin - Shlomo Eliahu and Shafik Assad - announced late Monday they were leaving the ruling coalition, trimming Prime Minister Menachem Begin's majority in the 120-member Knesset to 63. They said they were quitting because of haggling over proposed budget cuts and also condemned Begin's settlement policy in occupied Arab territories.




