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Heat eases — a little

The sizzling Southwest heat wave, the worst in 25 years, lost a little steam as temperatures in Texas dropped below 110 degrees.

But the death toll climbed to 63, roads buckled and fields dried out across the blistered region, and forecasters said it may be extra hot all summer.

And as the three-day July 4 holiday approached, some officials worried that tinder-dry fields and woods might be set ablaze by vacationers.

Texas shrugged off the heat and ventured out into the noonday sun Monday as temperatures fell for the start of a new work week. In Dallas-Fort Worth, 107 degrees seemed almost like spring after two days of 113.

"It's really not so bad," said Sandra Bryant as she ate lunch in Dallas' Thanks-Giving Square park. "I was a little warm last week."

More than 20 cities registered 100 degrees or higher and forecasters said it would be just as hot today. But Wichita Falls' high of 110 was 7 degrees lower than the reading Saturday.

"Yes, it's going to stay hot. And it is reasonable to be hot," said a National Weather Service forecaster who asked to remain anonymous. "We'll have, well, should I say hotter-than-seasonable temperatures."

"It's bad right now and it looks bad for the summer," said a spokesman for the weather service in Oklahoma City. He said the searing heat, which

sent the mercury to 100 Monday, was the worst since 1936.

Meanwhile, Army officials at Oklahoma's Fort Sill rescheduled strenuous activities for cooler hours after the death of a lieutenant who collapsed during an exercise aborted because of heat. In Lawton, autopsy results indicated a 1-year-old boy found dead in his grandmother's home had succumbed to heat before being mauled by rats, officials said.

Authorities in Temple, Walters, Madill, Tulsa and Broken Arrow asked residents to cut back on water use or face rationing, and other officials worried about a threat of accidental fires during the long holiday weekend.

In Colorado, firefighters contained the largest forest fire on record as rains fell on the five-day blaze, and two smaller fires were controlled. More than 1,000 firefighters were flown into Colorado to help fight the 10,050-acre blaze-conflagration near Emerald Lake.

In Arkansas, as temperatures reached 102 in Little Rock, the Poultry Federation said 2 million broiler chickens and 300,000 breeder hens had been killed by heat. Road crews worked through the weekend to repair 14 sections of highway that popped open under the scorching sun.

The weather service said temperatures of up to 103 could be expected through the end of the week, compared to normal July highs of 90. Arkansas Power & Light Co. had a record demand for power on Monday.

And while the heat is making tomato and peach crops ripen more rapidly, officials say 10 to 15 percent of the 4.8 million acres of Arkansas land normally cultivated in soybeans had not been planted because of the weather.

Texas farmers fretted over their grain sorghum and vegetable crops, and ranchers worried that a continued hot spell would force them to reduce rangeland cattle. But wheat farmers in the Panhandle were delighted by the heat, which helped dry up land left soggy by an usually wet spring.

The heat wave has been blamed as a contributor or cause in the deaths of 45 people in Texas, 10 in Oklahoma and eight in Arkansas.

The height of the heat wave had Dallas air conditioning repairmen working 14-hour days as cooling units conked out across the city. Beer, ice and electric fan sales skyrocketed, as did electricity usage. Overheated cars coughed and died on every major roadway.

"Just about all you can do to keep cool is dream, just think about getting home to a cold shower," said James Bramblett as he worked at a downtown Dallas construction site.

Heat threatens some Texas crops but is ideal for wheat, Brown says

AUSTIN (AP) — Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown said Monday the Texas heat wave is threatening growth in newly planted crops and livestock forage but it is too early to make damage predictions.

"The newly planted fields of cotton, sorghum, corn, peanuts and soybeans are being severely moisture-stressed on dryland acreage," Brown said.

He said hot, dry weather has one benefit, "It makes for almost ideal conditions for the harvest of wheat."

Brown said if it does not rain soon, soil moisture will be inadequate for good forage growth.

"We are concerned about conditions, but it's too early to make any predictions about the extent of damage caused by heat and dryness. I've seen the years in Texas when one good rain could completely turn around a crop that looked like a loss," he said.

Wheat growers in the Panhandle area are happy with the hot spell — both with its intensity and its timing. Coming right before the wheat harvest, the heat quickly ripened this year's crop, which appears to be the best in years.

Carter will attend Ohira's memorial service

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter will interrupt his summer vacation and travel to Japan next week for a memorial service for the late Prime Minister Masayoshi Ohira, officials here and in Tokyo say.

A White House official, who asked not to be identified, said Carter decided Monday to attend the July 9 service for Ohira, a close ally of the United States who died of a heart attack June 12.

The president plans no other stops on the trip and will return after an overnight stay in Tokyo, the official said.

Japanese Foreign Minister Saburo Okita said U.S. Ambassador Mike Mansfield informed acting Prime Minister Masayoshi Ito of Carter's plans.

Carter is scheduled to go to his hometown of Plains, Ga., July 4 and leave directly from there for Japan on July 8. He will return to Sapelo Island off the coast of Georgia, the administration official said.

Begin reported in 'fair' condition

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Menachem Begin is reported in fair condition after suffering a slight heart attack during a parliamentary debate in which his coalition government defeated a bid to force early elections.

The U.N. Security Council, meanwhile, condemned plans to designate the Arab sector of Jerusalem part of Israel's capital.

On the occupied West Bank of the Jordan River, Israeli troops demolished the homes of three suspected Arab guerrillas and walled up rooms in two other buildings. A military spokesman said one of the homes belonged to a Palestinian accused of killing an Israeli secret service agent. The Palestinian, Bassam Mohammed Habash, was killed Saturday in a shootout with security forces, the spokesman said.

Begin, 66, was taken by ambulance from the Knesset, Israel's Parliament, to the Hadassah Hospital in Jerusalem Monday after suffering increasingly intense chest pains during the debate on the future of his shaky government.

After spending a comfortable night, Begin was undergoing tests today to

determine how much damage was done to the heart, said his personal physician, Dr. Mervyn Gottesman.

"I believe he will recover from this and be much better," Gottesman said.

Begin suffered a severe heart attack in 1977 and has been hospitalized several times since for minor heart ailments. He also suffered a minor stroke last year.

There was no word on how long he would be hospitalized.

Begin was in the hospital's cardiac intensive care unit when the Knesset gave him what amounted to a personal vote of confidence by defeating an opposition motion that would have dissolved the Parliament and advanced the November 1981 elections more than a year. The vote was 60-54.

The motion was proposed by the tiny, dovish Shai Party and was supported by the Labor Party, the chief opposition faction.

Begin had lobbied hard against the measure, which came to a vote a week after two members of his coalition defected, trimming his parliamentary strength to 63 of the 120 Knesset seats.

Parents may plead for clemency

Their son accused of sexual misconduct with Iranian girl

Marine Sgt. Michael Moeller's parents say they are considering a trip to Tehran to plead for clemency for their 23-year-old son, threatened with a trial and a possible 10-year sentence on charges of having sexual relations with an Iranian woman who became pregnant and was handed by her brother for disgracing the family.

Meanwhile, Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr warned today that Iran's Islamic revolution was "threatened from inside." In a speech delivered at a religious school in Tehran, he said "In the previous regime life, property and business of people were violated in the name of monarchy and today, they do the same in the name of fighting with anti-revolutionaries."

He accused U.S. officials of trying to undermine his government, "sink me in trivial issues so that I fail to manage our vital economic battle against the U.S. pressure." Bani-Sadr said some Iranians he did not identify by name were working with America, trying to "create obstacles to stop me from expanding our vital economic crusade against the United States."

An Iranian Justice Ministry investigator, Ali Akbar Parvaneh, told a reporter Monday that the 28-year-old Moeller, of Loup City, Neb., might escape a trial if the dead woman's parents agree to "forgive" him. Parvaneh suggested Moeller's parents fly to Iran to try to persuade her parents to drop the charges.

Parvaneh said earlier that Moeller definitely would be put on trial even if Iran's Parliament decides to free the

other 52 hostages, now in their 241st day of captivity.

In Nebraska, Doris Moeller, the Marine's mother, said she and her husband were considering the trip to Tehran.

"I'm not going to say yes or no. I have to think about this and I'd definitely have to have confirmation from the State Department," she said.

State Department spokesman Hodding Carter said the United States has received no confirmation that Moeller faces trial. However, the department said it would consider an exemption from President Carter's ban on travel to Iran if the Moellers decide to make the trip.

Moeller, a Marine guard at the occupied U.S. Embassy, is accused of having seduced a 23-year-old Iranian student, identified only as Amaz A., prior to the seizure of the embassy by young militants last Nov. 4. Parvaneh said Moeller denied the charges.

Having sexual relations with an unmarried woman is a crime punishable by up to 10 years imprisonment under Iran's Islamic law. Iranian authorities learned of the alleged affair when the woman's brother surrendered to police last March and said he had hanged her after learning she was five months pregnant.

The woman's diaries claimed she was seduced by Moeller, the investigator said. He told a reporter this was one entry about the affair:

"It happened at this room. I lost it last night. Does my fate depend on some drop of blood? No, no, he is obliged to protect me. He is obliged to live with me."

In Cairo, meanwhile, an Egyptian

doctor gave the deposed Shah of Iran a better than 75 percent chance of pulling through after surgery Monday by a two-week bout with pneumonia. Another Egyptian physician familiar with the Shah's case said the long-term prognosis may not be so promising.

Dr. Abdel Kader Osman, chief of the Maadi military hospital's heart and chest department, told The Associated Press 60-year-old Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi was in satisfactory condition following the operation. He predicted the Shah would be

released from the hospital in about a week.

"His chances are more than 75 percent; he is a tough guy and will pull through," said Dr. Osman, one of the three physicians who operated on the ex-monarch.

A second Egyptian doctor said although the immediate prognosis "looked good," in the long run the same situation may arise again. The doctor, who declined to be identified, said the chemotherapy treatment the Shah has been receiving to control lymphatic cancer has decreased his level of white cells.

Carter may go along with tax cut this year

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter refused today to rule out a 1981 tax cut that could be enacted this year, the chairman of Congress' Joint Economic Committee said after meeting with the president.

But, said the chairman, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, Carter will wait until the administration finishes its mid-year budget and economic review later this month before deciding whether to support tax cut legislation before the November election.

Bentsen and other congressional leaders conferred with the president at the White House this morning after Senate Democratic leaders held off Republican demands Monday for a \$36 billion tax cut by offering renewed promises of their own plan.

Carter "certainly did not rule it out," Bentsen said of a 1981 tax cut. "It's obvious he wants to look at the July figures."

Bentsen told reporters that no figures for an administration-supported tax cut were discussed, although it has been reported that it would be

worth between \$20 billion and \$30 billion.

The Washington Star reported today that the economic review that the administration is preparing assumes a tax cut of \$25 billion.

Bentsen said the major achievement of the meeting was an agreement to coordinate efforts by the administration and the Democratic majorities in the Senate and House to "explore the possibilities of a tax cut."

He said that Carter told the group that if there is to be a tax cut, it should be "carefully targeted."

"It was a good exchange, quite helpful," Bentsen said.

"I certainly think you're going to have a tax cut this year," he said.

For the second time in five days, the Senate on Monday rejected the GOP tax cut plan that the likely Republican presidential nominee, Ronald Reagan, has proposed as a challenge to Carter's economic policies.

Woman killed, another hurt in shooting here

An Odessa woman is dead and a Midland woman was listed in stable condition this morning at Medical Center Hospital in Odessa after a shooting Monday evening.

A Midland man was taken into custody in connection with the incident.

Police became aware of the shooting when notified that a shooting victim was at the hospital emergency room. Mildred Cornett, 27, of Midland told police that about 5 p.m. her husband kicked in the front door at 1715 E. Oak St., Midland, and shot her and Norma Jean Loring, 31, of Odessa.

Apparently, the Cornetts are in the

process of getting a divorce, according to police reports. The house had been awarded to Mrs. Cornett during a recent hearing, and family members told police it had upset Cornett.

Mrs. Cornett was shot in the left side, just under the arm pit. She was transferred to Medical Center Hospital Monday afternoon. Ms. Loring was shot just below her right breast. She was taken to Midland Memorial Hospital emergency room, where she died shortly thereafter.

Peace Justice John Biggs pronounced her dead.

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Pope opens Brazil visit with appeal for human rights

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP) — Pope John Paul II opened his visit to Brazil with an appeal for respect for the fundamental rights of all persons and a warning to Brazilian priests not to let "socio-political" concerns get in the way of their spiritual mission.

The pontiff arrived in Brazil's inland capital Monday for a 12-day tour of 13 cities in the world's largest Roman Catholic nation. After a meet-

ing early this morning with prisoners at a Brasilia penitentiary, he was flying 450 miles to the southeast for a brief stop in the industrial city of Belo Horizonte, then on to scenic Rio de Janeiro, on the Atlantic coast.

The pope's visit put him in the center of a conflict between politically active Brazilian bishops and priests and the military-backed government and its conservative sup-

porters. The pontiff gave strong support to the Brazilian clergy's concern for human rights and improvement in the economic condition of the impoverished masses. And his insistence on the primacy of the clergy's spiritual mission stopped short of the condemnation of clerical political action that the government and its supporters hoped for.

"I pray to God that every Brazilian

will respect and may always see respected the fundamental rights of all humanity," the pope declared at an open-air Mass for a throng of 500,000 persons led by President Joao Figueiredo, the fifth army general to head the government since a right-wing military coup in 1964.

He called on the Brazilians to build a "just society, overcoming imbalances and inequalities." And he paid

tribute to Brazil's bishops, who sponsor programs to encourage political and social activism by the masses and have issued a series of statements critical of government policies. But he warned that the church's mission cannot be reduced "just to socio-political matters."

Scores of people in the vast crowd fainted after standing for hours wait-

ing for the pope's arrival.

In a speech Monday night to Brasilia's diplomatic corps, the pope reiterated his opposition to violence as a vehicle for social and political change, coupling it with a censure of strong-arm governments that use violence against their domestic opponents in the name of national security.

Four agree to repay profits stemming from hotel deal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Four persons have agreed to repay profits that the Securities and Exchange Commission charged were earned illegally on the basis of inside information about entertainer Johnny Carson's bid to buy a Las Vegas hotel.

The settlement came Monday after the SEC filed a civil suit in U.S. District Court in New York.

The SEC said the four, including Carson's brother-in-law, Peter Ulrich, purchased stock in National Kinney Corp. on the basis of non-public information, to the detriment of the sellers, that the company planned to join Carson in developing hotel-casinos, including the troubled Aladdin Hotel.

The four agreed to return the profits to the sellers. They neither admitted nor denied the SEC allegations.

Carson, host of NBC's "Tonight Show," and his wife, Joanna, were not implicated in the case.

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Investigators prowl discos for violations

DALLAS (AP) — A half-dozen consumer affairs investigators are doing the town in Dallas discos, dancing and drinking on the city's tab. They aren't looking for hookers or drugs. They're looking for discrimination.

"It's not a 'disco squad' as such," said Walter Higgins, investigative supervisor at the consumer affair's office. "There are six men and women on my staff who go anonymously to several different discos ... to see if they're following the ordinance."

The ordinance in question was passed by the city council in December and requires clubs to post dress codes outside to prevent discrimination against minorities through arbitrary dress codes.

Members of the squad are between ages 27 and 35 and have worked "all kinds of consumer cases," Higgins said.

"We have blacks, Mexican-Americans and plain vanilla," and go to "at least two" discos during their monthly outings, Higgins said.

"They wear their own clothing. We don't pay for that," he said. "I don't know what they wear. I suppose it's something outlandish."

"They do buy drinks. The only reason we advise them to drink is to blend in. They couldn't very well do that if they bought a glass of milk or a milkshake."

Higgins said the investigators were chosen for the once-a-month treks from the regular staff soon after the ordinance was passed.

"We decided that, when you get a new ordinance, you've got to decide you're going to enforce it: shopping around to see if the places are following it."

The investigators go out about once a month, but in the six months since the ordinance was passed, they have filed no cases.

"We've seen some borderline cases, but nothing we could actually file a case on," Higgins said. "But it's a pretty hard thing to prove. It's hard to say they discriminate against blacks when they see blacks there (in the club)."

Officials from Papagayo, a northside club, are scheduled to appear at a Thursday pre-trial hearing to respond to charges they keep minorities out by using a dress code. The charge was the result of a consumer complaint and is the first filed under the ordinance.

Rain helps firefighters contain Colorado fire

Aided by the first rain in the Colorado Rockies in more than six weeks, hundreds of firefighters contained the largest forest fire in state history after a five-day battle.

Two smaller blazes were brought under control Monday as 1,000 firefighters stayed by firelines today and crew leaders mapped out strategies for extinguishing hot spots.

Firefighters said they hoped to control today the largest blaze, a 10,050-acre fire near Emerald Lake in the White River National Forest that repeatedly jumped fire breaks under strong and erratic winds.

Meanwhile, in Arizona, a summer storm sprinkled blazing forests. Firefighters had looked to the rain for relief from blistering 110 degree heat as they fought 30,000 acres of central Arizona brush fires, most of them caused by lightning strikes across dry rangeland.

And in California, officials said at least 50 fires were started by lightning as a storm moved over dry areas. The rain did help firefighters mop up some weekend blazes.

More light showers were forecast for Colorado today after six weeks of hot, dry weather that turned mountain forests tinder-dry.

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New surgery set for Pryor

SHERMAN OAKS, Calif. (AP) — Comedian Richard Pryor is to undergo a second skin graft operation Wednesday, a Sherman Oaks Community Hospital spokesman says.

Pryor's doctors scheduled the operation Monday after determining that 75 percent of the skin grafts performed June 23 were successful, said spokesman Gary Swaye.

He said Pryor will need "at least a few more" skin graft operations with the third round coming seven to 10 days after Wednesday's surgery. He said Pryor may spend two or three more months in the hospital.

"Most burn patients are in and out of the hospital for a number of years," Swaye said. "We can't say for sure how long he will have to stay here because it will be determined by the amount of scarring that occurs."

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Politicians and taxes

It's almost comical to watch the Republicans and Democrats in Congress vying for the credit for an election-year tax cut. All the subtlety has been abandoned.

That was the scenario, at least, last week when Republican presidential candidate Ronald Reagan outlined his proposal for a 10 percent reduction in individual income taxes, ostensibly to be followed later by still more reductions if he wins election.

Republicans in the Senate immediately lined up behind the Reagan proposal and pushed it to a vote while Senate Democrats indicated they would present their own economic plan by early September.

Everybody, it seems, wants to be able to claim credit for a tax cut now that it's election-year. Certainly we will not argue with the decision to slice taxes in this nation. Our runaway rate of taxation at almost every level of government is becoming increasingly discouraging and difficult to tolerate.

We, too, believe a tax reduction is in line. It's our opinion that in any given situation the taxpayers know better how to spend their own money than does government. Furthermore, if the government requires less money in the

form of taxes, that's more capital remaining in the private sector for expanded business development, personal prosperity and economic stability.

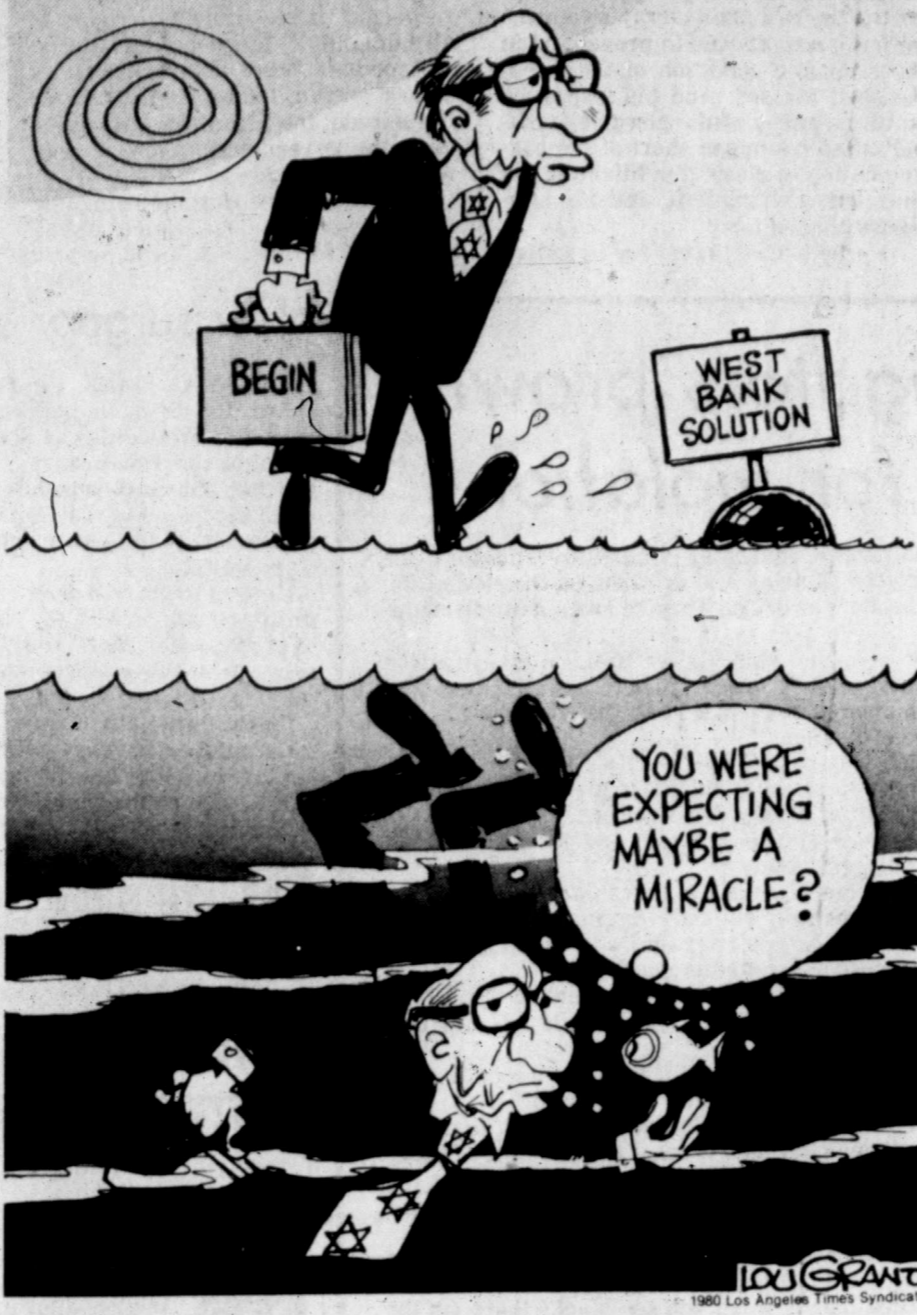
But that kind of thinking requires an adjustment in our political system. Our elected representatives have to realize they cannot give everyone everything he or she wants or they'll end up spending dollars they don't have. Rather, they are charged with the responsibility of filling the greatest needs for the majority of the people in this nation.

That means setting some priorities on what we all deem "essential", services and determining to what degree we will provide those services.

It also translates into living within our means and recognizing the destructive force that exists in governmental extravagance and overtaxation.

It also entails electing representatives who are cognizant of our concerns, compassionate of human needs and, yet, realistic about our ability to provide services.

What we need are members of Congress who are a little less interested in taking credit for a tax cut and a little more interested in earning credit for a cut.

Intelligence agency foul-ups hurt crusade

WASHINGTON — Intelligence officials are prowling the halls of Congress, trying to convince the lawmakers that the laws governing intelligence activities should be tightened. Congressional access to this information, the spooks argue, must be strictly limited.

But the pathetic truth is that it's not loose-lipped members of Congress who are the worst violators of security. It's the intelligence agencies themselves. I've documented this in the past, now I have two examples that would be funny if they didn't involve serious security foul-ups.

The first case concerns the super-secret National Security Agency at Fort Meade, Md. Of all the nation's intelligence agencies, this is — or should be — the most sensitive. Its specialty is satellite spying and intercepting coded foreign communications.

To protect its secrets, the NSA had Marine guards posted throughout its headquarters building to keep employees from going into areas they didn't have clearance for. Then, in October 1978, the NSA brass adopted a nifty new system. It replaced the Marines with civilian guards and gave each security-cleared employee a battery-operated, electronically coded badge. This touched off an alarm if the employee wandered into an area not authorized by his or her clearance.

There was one awkward flaw in the super-duper badge system, though: If someone walked past a checkpoint with no badge at all, the alarm didn't go off. The security geniuses at NSA discovered this after a couple of months when a woman — fortunately not a Russian spy — got lost looking for a bank office and wandered into the agency's most sensitive area.

The second example involves the Central Intelligence Agency. About 15 years ago, sources told my associate

Dale Van Atta, a technician with a mechanical knack discovered a weakness in the combination locks the agency used on its file cabinets here and abroad. Without any tools, he could open any file cabinet in five or 10 minutes.

The technician — again, fortunately, a patriotic American and not a potential traitor — devised a simple way of solving the problem. His suggestion was ignored.

Exasperated after several years of official shrugging, the employee finally made the CIA an offer it couldn't refuse: Stripped of his underwear and locked in a roomful of file cabinets, he would open them all. Taken up on his challenge, he proceeded to do precisely that.

Instead of congratulations or an award, the technician got nothing but grief from his bosses, who condemned him for meddling in affairs that were none of his business.

Later, the CIA adopted the employee's suggestion, but then let it fall into disuse. As a result, "anyone with equal mechanical ability can discover how to open filing cabinets here and abroad, and any disaffected former employee can use this method against the agency," a CIA source said.

Only voters can cure nation's sick economy

The American economy is sick and only we, the people, can cure it by exercising our political power.

First, however, we must diagnose the illness. We must know what are the conditions of health and what are the conditions of sickness. We can find the answers in history.

The United States represents only 6 percent of the world's land area and less than 7 percent of the world's population. Contrary to the propaganda of the envious little Marxists, the great explosion of material prosperity did not occur because our land was simply richer in resources than others. It is not and never was.

Yet at one time we plain Americans owned 85 percent of the world's automobiles, 60 percent of the life insurance policies, 54 percent of the telephones, 48 percent of the radio sets, 46 percent of the electric power capacity, 35 percent of the world's railway mileage and 30 percent of the improved highways. Before World War II we consumed 75 percent of the world's silk, 60 percent of the world's rubber and 50 percent of the world's coffee.

This blossoming of material prosperity, the most successful war on poverty ever waged in the history of mankind, occurred under two conditions. They were the cause of the prosperity. One was a weak central government which allowed individu-

als to do the best they could at anything they wanted to try. The other was a weak central government which allowed the people to keep nearly all of what they earned which meant they could save and buy tools which is the only way to increase productivity.

History is as plain as Jimmy Durante's nose. A free society succeeded; every planned economy in the world, past and present, failed. It is absolutely insane, therefore, for us to reject proven success and to adopt proven failure. Yet that is exactly what we are doing.

To cure our economy's sickness then we must cut taxes to allow people to keep nearly all of what they earn and we must reform radically the regulatory process in order to free people to do the best they can at anything they want to try.

Today, taxes consume about 42 percent of our income. All of these taxes are levied by people we elect from the city council to the Congress. That's why high taxes is a problem we have the power to cure. The Kemp-Roth bill, which would cut income taxes 30 percent, would be a good beginning. A simple reform of estate taxes would be granting every person a \$25 million exemption. We could eliminate the tax on interest earned by savings. It is in effect taxing the same income twice. So is the tax on dividends. We should reduce or eliminate the capital gains tax. Reduce the corporate income tax. The present heavy tax system not only drains wealth from the private sector, but distorts the economy by forcing people to make decisions on the basis of tax laws rather than on the basis of productivity.

The point to remember about taxes is that they are levied on wealth already produced. In other words, taxes do not decrease the cost of anything; they add to it and every penny is paid by the people. Look at your own situation. Look at the money you earned which goes to the government instead of to your family. The proper question to ask is, who can spend that money more productively? The people who earned it or the politicians.

The only way we can correct this abuse is by ruthlessly defeating every politician who refuses to vote for genuine tax reductions.

We must also elect people who will abolish the present regulatory system and start over. Those who favor a state-controlled economy found that they could not sell this ideology to the American people. Therefore, they came in the back door and gained control of our economic lives in the name of consumer and environmental protection.

The choice is clear: either we free our income from the cancer of excessive taxation and our economy from the octopus of government regulation or we join the rest of the world in poverty. The issue is not scarce resources, but scarce liberty.

Carter's political advisers afraid of 'tax cut fever'

WASHINGTON — President Carter's political advisers, though publicly nonchalant, are worried privately that Democratic members of Congress will catch tax cut fever during the forthcoming congressional recess and return to Capitol Hill susceptible to Ronald Reagan's tax schemes.

These advisers confide that Reagan's call for immediate tax action is a political masterstroke. Democratic ranks are sure to hold firm for now. But Carterites fear what a few weeks back home while tax cut rhetoric blares out of the Republican convention in Detroit does to that resolve.

Consequently, drafting a tax-cutting alternative ready for action when Congress comes back is a first order of priority at the White House. The impediments are less Carter's caution than anti-tax cut stubbornness by economic adviser Charles Schultze and slower-than-slow staff work by the Economic Policy Group. The EPG staffers have had tax cut policy under consideration for some six weeks with no discernible progress.

HOSTAGE PROBING Behind the public posture of the Carter administration that the hostage issue should be quieted down for a while, intense negotiations are going on behind the scenes to free the 53 Americans by early October.

Highly secret negotiations conducted several weeks ago by then White House chief of staff Hamilton Jordan are continuing in Paris, Tehran and

other world capitals. U.S. negotiators are mainly private citizens — in effect, unpaid, undercover workers for President Carter. They include lawyers from the U.S., France and other countries.

Carter's fondest hope is to bring the hostages home before he faces American voters on Nov. 4, the first anniversary of captivity for the hostages. Skeptics in the administration believe the odds are heavily against success.

PRO-LIFE ZEALOTRY

Ronald Reagan's operatives finally gave up in disgust when New York state's Right-To-Life Party kept raising the ante for giving its presidential nomination this year to Reagan instead of pro-life activist Ellen McCormack.

The New York Lifers first demanded only that Reagan, who is anti-abortion, name a like-minded vice president. But the asking price kept going up. Reagan would have to endorse conservative Alphonse D'Amato against liberal Sen. Jacob Javits in the New York Republican

primary. Finally, they insisted that Reagan endorse for election throughout the country only Republicans who support an anti-abortion constitutional amendment.

Those last impossible conditions convinced Reagan's agents that Mrs. McCormack wanted to run so badly that she never would give way for Reagan. As a result, he will have to win New York without the 130,000 or more voters likely to vote for Mrs. McCormack.

NUKE COMPROMISE

At the height of controversy over the nuclear power issue in the Platform Committee, Democratic National Chairman John White quietly telephoned Robert Strauss, President Carter's campaign chairman, with this word: We can compromise the nuke plank and avoid a bloody, perhaps losing fight on the floor at Madison Square Garden.

Strauss at once saw the value of this. Even though aides from Carter's White House believed they had 79 sure votes (out of 117) to carry Carter's preferred language on the hot issue, it was decided to compromise.

The ambiguous language of the compromise failed to satisfy far-out anti-nuclear hotheads. But it did bring in enough new supporters to protect Carter's position from further erosion at the August convention.

ARROGANCE IN DEFEAT

Repeated defeats in primaries have not taught humility to Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's presidential campaign, as shown by the treatment of insurance magnate Bernard Rapoport of

Waco, Texas, a longtime liberal activist and early Kennedy backer.

Rapoport had endorsed Kennedy for president as soon as he announced last year. He raised some \$60,000 for him in Texas, no easy task in a state where the state's Democratic money is solidly for President Carter. Hence, Rapoport was stunned to learn the Kennedy campaign had rejected him as a delegate to the national convention in New York. The lame excuse: The delegation's quota of white males was exhausted.

That exhibition of arrogance in defeat lost Kennedy an eloquent and respected voice in Texas. "I think that the fight for the nomination is now over, and I think we should all work to elect President Carter," he told us. Does he know why Kennedy is still running? "No," Rapoport replied. He will be in New York for the convention anyway helping his good friend, Democratic National Chairman John White.

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Barbara Buckley to attend Miss Universe pageant

Barbara Buckley, Miss Texas USA 1980, will end her reign Aug. 18 when she crowns her successor, but there is much excitement to come before she hands over the title.

Ms. Buckley and the other Miss USA delegates are leaving today for Seoul, Korea, for the Miss Universe Pageant along with Miss USA title winner Shawn Weatherly of Sumter, S.C.

While being enthusiastic about going to Seoul, Ms. Buckley also reminisced about her reign and talked about her future.

"I had never been in a pageant before the Miss Texas USA pageant," said Ms. Buckley. "I had no idea how involved they were. It's a lot harder to do than it looks. You get nervous."

"But I liked it," she added with a smile. "I'm an actress and I like performing and that's what the pageant is — selling yourself. You've got to show your personality just standing."

Ms. Buckley said she did not think she had a chance at winning the title she now holds, but said her attitude was "might as well try it. My main purpose in being in the pageant was to meet the judges." Ms. Buckley said two of the judges were from Los Angeles and several of the judges were "important people in the Texas film industry."

What was the hardest thing about being Miss Texas USA? "Everyone expects you to know everything and

you don't want to disappoint them," said Ms. Buckley.

What are the future goals of the graduate of Angelo State University where she majored in drama? "After the pageant in August, I will be moving to Dallas and will probably be starring," she said. "This title has let me get my foot in the door of my career, but next year will be the hardest because it will be the first year I will really be on my own."

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Schmidt honors Soviet war dead

MOSCOW (AP) — In a solemn ceremony outside the Kremlin wall, West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt today honored Soviet troops killed fighting Nazi Germany in World War II. The German leader later was to hold a second round of talks with Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev.

A Red Army band played the West German and Soviet anthems and an honor guard marched in goose step during today's 15-minute ceremony at the red-granite Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Schmidt earlier honored about 100 German prisoners of war who died in Soviet captivity and were buried with a group of Japanese POWs in a cemetery in suburban Moscow.

West German sources said Schmidt's departure, originally set for 7:30 p.m. local time tonight, was being set back 1 1/2 hours. Observers said the delay suggested negotiations on Afghanistan and on missile deployment were moving slowly.

But West German officials said later Schmidt and West German Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher would be meeting with Soviet Defense Minister Dmitri Ustinov before holding a separate session with Brezhnev and Premier Alexei Kosygin.

The officials also said a German-Soviet, 25-year economic agreement would be signed by the Soviet and German ambassadors, Vladimir S. Semyonov and Hans Georg Wieck. The agreement is expected to provide for German technological help in the development of Soviet natural resources, including new Siberian gas fields. The Soviets already provide 14 percent of West Germany's natural gas.

On Monday, Schmidt publicly called on Brezhnev to withdraw all Soviet troops from Afghanistan and agree without conditions to negotiations to reduce medium-range missiles in Europe.

Brezhnev urged the West to stop "ever-new attempts to spur on the arms race" and said the subject of missile deployment in Europe would be taken up in his talks with Schmidt today. He made no mention of Afghanistan in his speech at the state dinner at which Schmidt called for the troop withdrawal, but at their first meeting earlier Monday, Brezhnev called for international pledges not to support the Afghan foes of the pro-Soviet communist regime in Kabul.

Schmidt said before his arrival Monday that helping to start a new round of Soviet-American talks on missile reduction was his most important objective in his talks with the 73-year-old Soviet president and Communist Party chief during his two-day visit to Moscow.

Union organizers restricted

HEREFORD, Texas (AP) — A state district judge has set strict limitations on union organizers trying to enlist farmworkers in High Plains onion fields.

Judge David Wesley Gulley issued a temporary restraining order Monday that restricts pickets and union organizers in Panhandle vegetable fields, bans secondary boycotts and prohibits Texas Rural Legal Aid lawyers from encouraging farmworkers to strike.

The order, sought by 17 Deaf Smith and Castro County growers, came after union officials said they would press Panhandle farmers to organize despite the failure of last week's walkout on onion growers. "I can't say we've been defeated, because people are still talking to people. We're still organizing," said Antonio Orendain, director of the Texas Farm Workers Union.

Three arraigned on robbery charges

LAMESA — A Midland woman and two Lubbock men were arraigned Monday on aggravated robbery charges following a reported robbery at a Lamesa grocery store Friday evening.

Dana Prince, 18, of Midland, and Tommie Brown, 28, and David Brewer, 26, both of Lubbock, were arrested by highway patrolmen Friday night following a holdup in which almost \$600 was taken from the cash register of Matthews' Food Store.

According to Dawson County Sheriff's deputies, two men armed with a snub-nosed pistol approached store owners Virgil and Faye Matthews and told

them to place the contents of the cash register in a paper sack. While Mrs. Matthews filled the sack held by one of the men with the entire day's receipts, the other man began tying Matthews' hands with a length of cord.

When Matthews resisted, he was reportedly pistol-whipped by the robber, who struck him and knocked him to the floor after he resisted a second time, deputies said.

Another scuffle erupted and Matthews suffered a cut on his face when he shoved the armed bandit from behind as he was leaving the store. Mr. and Mrs. Matthews both had their hands tied.

A description and license number of the getaway vehicle was noted and reported to the police by the Matthews, who had also noticed a woman waiting in the car while the two men were in the store.

A car matching the description was stopped by

DPS troopers after a short pursuit north of Stanton, and three people were arrested.

A .22 caliber revolver and \$599 in cash were found in the 1977 Monte Carlo.

Bond was set at \$100,000 each for the two men and \$50,000 for the woman by a Martin County peace justice, and the three were brought back to Lamesa Friday evening.

The trio was arraigned on aggravated robbery charges Monday morning by Dawson County Peace Justice Fred Vera. All three are being held in Dawson County Jail.

Brewer is reportedly less than a month away from finishing a five-year parole on a previous conviction for robbery and forgery, according to deputies. He had served two years of the five-year prison term, and was to be released from parole on July 20.

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Sioux to get payment from U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress acted illegally when it took the Black Hills from the Sioux Indian Nation more than 100 years ago, partly in retaliation for the Custer massacre, and the bill \$117 million with interest — "must now at last be paid," the Supreme Court says.

Monday's 8-1 decision upheld the largest award

ever granted by the U.S. Court of Claims, including \$17 million for the land itself and about \$100 million in interest, dating from the 1877 takeover. The claim was first filed in 1924.

But attorneys in the case said the decision is not expected to have a large impact on other Indian claims cases.

No unexpected radiation measured in TMI venting

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Continued venting of radioactive gas from Three Mile Island has produced no unexpected rise in radiation levels away from the nuclear power plant, officials say.

"The levels we've measured so far are what we had predicted. They are insignificant in terms of producing any negative health effects," Erich Bretthauer, TMI project manager for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, said Monday.

Plant spokesman Blaine Fabian said more than 2,900 curies of krypton-85 had been vented from the radiation-filled reactor containment building by late Monday.

About 57,000 curies of krypton and hundreds of gallons of radioactive water were released into the containment building 15 months ago during the nation's worst commercial nuclear accident.

Officials expect to complete the krypton removal, which began Saturday, in two to four weeks. The purge will enable workers to clean up the containment building and do further repairs.

After faulty readings on particulate monitors set off two alarms Saturday, the NRC ordered Metropolitan Edison Co. to sample for radioactive particles every 15 minutes during venting.

John Collins, chief on-site official for the NRC, said Monday the tests have not detected any particles of cesium, strontium, cobalt or other radioactive isotopes.

"It confirms what we've been saying all along. The concentration of particulates in the containment building is very low," he said.

Off-site monitoring is being conducted by Met Ed, the EPA, the state Department of Environmental Resources and a group of trained local citizens.

One of the citizen volunteers, Brian McKay of Newberry Township, said routine checks since the venting began have shown basic normal background radiation with some periods of slightly higher readings.

McKay said 20 to 25 people have called him each day for information on radiation levels and, if they have left town, for advice on whether to return.

Siles leading race in Bolivia

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — Leftist ex-President Hernan Siles Zuazo held a lead of more than 100,000 votes in the 13-man race for Bolivia's presi-

dency today and said he was confident the new Congress would uphold his popular-vote victory in a runoff election.

Unofficial returns trickling from Sunday's election showed that Siles, despite his big plurality, was not going to get the majority required for election now.

Congress is to meet Aug. 4 to choose the president from among the top three candidates. But the seats will be divided among the various political coalitions in accordance with the votes won by their presidential candidates Sunday, insuring that no faction will have a majority.

With about 40 percent of the estimated 2 million votes counted, Siles, 8, had 272,271 votes; former right-wing dictator Hugo Banzer Suarez, 54, was in second place with 155,954, and centrist ex-President Victor Paz Estenssoro, 72, had 115,396.

The other 10 candidates trailed far behind.

"We believe the people's choice will be reflected in Congress' decision," said Siles. "It is inconceivable that a party that has such a lead over the next challenger would not be able to take power."

NEW YORK (AP) — "Dodger Blue" was the primary color in the National League All-Star starting lineup announced by Commissioner Bowie Kuhn Tuesday as four Los Angeles Dodgers were selected to the mid-season classic.

Second baseman Davey Lopes, the leading vote-getter in the majors, headed the Dodger contingent which includes first baseman Steve Garvey, shortstop Bill Russell and outfielder Reggie Smith.

Joining the four Dodgers on the NL squad for the July 8 game at Los Angeles are catcher Johnny Bench of the Cincinnati Reds; third baseman Mike Schmidt of the Philadelphia Phillies and outfielders Dave Parker of the Pittsburgh Pirates and Dave Kingman of the Chicago Cubs.

"Obviously, we have some outstanding players on this team and the fans have shown it by the way they have backed their club," said Dodgers Manager Tom Lasorda.

And did they ever back their club. Twelve players in the senior circuit received over two million votes and seven were Dodgers.

The American League team was announced Monday. It was headed by California first baseman Rod Carew and included Milwaukee second baseman Paul Molitor; Kansas City third baseman George Brett and New York shortstop Bucky Dent and outfielder Reggie Jackson. Boston Red Sox outfielders Fred Lynn and Jim Rice and catcher Carlton Fisk complete the team.

Lopes, the Dodgers captain, drew 3,862,403 votes to end the three-year reign of Carew as the leading vote-getter for the All-Star Game. Lopes had over two million more votes than Pittsburgh's Phil Garner, his nearest rival at second base.

"I'll be there," said Lopes, who earlier this season felt he wasn't performing up to All-Star caliber. "I'm gratified that many people put the time into voting. It's nice to know you're that popular."

Jaeger dumps Wade to advance at Wimbledon

Austin, King also find win column

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Youth and experience locked horns at Wimbledon Monday. Honors ended up about even.

Andrea Jaeger, just 26 days beyond her 15th birthday, carried the flag for youth, trouncing Virginia Wade, the experienced 1977 champion, 6-2, 7-6.

Tracy Austin, something of a veteran at 17-years-old, joined Jaeger in the last eight of the women's singles by defeating 24-year-old Terry Holladay 6-2, 6-3.

But you can't keep a good oldie down — as Billie Jean King and Evonne Goolagong proved just before Jaeger started to frustrate Wade and the partisan center court crowd.

KING, 36, winner of a record 30 Wimbledon titles, clawed her way back from the brink of defeat to oust 17-year-old Pam Shriver 5-7, 7-6, 10-8 in a 2 hours 40 minutes thriller on the bumpy court number two.

Goolagong, the 1971 champion, lost the first set to the impressive 18-year-old Hana Mandlikova but recovered to win 6-7, 6-3, 6-1.

Jaeger, the youngest Wimbledon seed ever, displayed a maturity far beyond her years in matching Wade, then overpowering her.

"She was probably more nervous than me," the chirpy schoolgirl said afterward.

Wade, however, felt that it is too early to talk of Jaeger as a possible Wimbledon champion.

"Not this year, I don't think she is ready yet," said the British player.

"Andrea is fast, hits the ball early, has good timing and changes pace well. But she plays quite a few 'nothing balls' and if I had played well I would have beaten her," Wade added.

"I don't think Andrea could possibly beat Chris Evert Lloyd."

Jaeger meets the two-time Wimbledon champion in the quarterfinals.

AUSTIN, seeded to meet defending champion Martina Navratilova in the women's singles final, grows with confidence with every match she plays.

No longer a shy schoolgirl in pig-tails, she fears no one.

"The first time you play against well-known opponents it is tough and you doubt whether you can beat them. But after a few times it's fine," she said.

Mandlikova, the promising young Czech, started off well against Goolagong, but faded against the former champion's greater experience.

"Hana is a good player, but she was a bit erratic today," said the Australian.

Seaver's problems continue to mount

Tom Seaver's problems continue to mount.

The seven-time all-star was rocked for seven hits and five runs in four innings Monday night and tagged with the loss as the San Francisco Giants beat the Cincinnati Reds 8-4. Seaver's record is now 3-5, his earned run average a dismal 4.76.

"I can't keep pitching this way," Seaver said. "I have a sore shoulder and it's not getting any better and it's not going to if I keep pitching."

"It's frustrating. It's depressing. I love what I do."

In other National League games, the Atlanta Braves beat the Houston Astros 5-4 in 11 innings, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Montreal Expos 7-5, the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the St. Louis Cardinals 5-4 and the San Diego Padres trimmed the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-3.

Milt May hit a three-run homer off Seaver in the first inning and Jack Clark tagged him for a two-run shot in the third as the Giants staked rookie Bill Bordley to an early 5-0 lead. Bordley was making his first appearance since being called up from Phoenix.

Bordley, like Seaver a former college pitching star at Southern Cal, went on to post his first major league victory with relief help from Gary Lavelle, who worked the last three innings to post his third save.

"I didn't know what we'd get out of Bill," Giants Manager Dave Bristol said of Bordley. "He hadn't pitched since June 17. I have to be very pleased with getting six innings out of him tonight."

Braves 5, Astros 4
Jose Cruz tied the game for Houston with a ninth-inning home run and put the Astros ahead with another homer in the 11th, but Glenn Hubbard's two-run homer in the bottom of the 11th gave the victory to Atlanta.

Hubbard credited his homer to a tip from a teammate about the way Astros reliever Joe Sambito was pitching.

And there it went, landing well up in the blue seats behind the left field fence.

Houston Manager Bill Virdon took the loss in stride, as befits the manager of a first-place team. Despite the loss, the Astros still lead second-place Los Angeles by 2½ games in the National League West.

"There's always the chance you'll lose one that way in this stadium," Virdon said of Hubbard's home run. "But there's always the chance you can win one here that way, too."

Phillies 7, Expos 5

Philadelphia scored all its runs in the fourth inning, which was highlighted by a grand slam by Keith Moreland and a two-run homer by Pete Rose. Both came against Montreal starter Bill Gullickson, 0-2, who had difficulty keeping the ball low.

"He was coming up high with everything," said Expos Manager Dick Williams. "The first pitch he threw to Moreland was right in his wheelhouse."

Moreland deposited it in the left-field bleachers, and then got a surprise.

"I didn't even know it was a grand slam until I rounded third base and saw everybody standing at home plate," said Moreland of his first career grand slam. "I guess this would be about the biggest thrill of my career."

Pirates 5, Cardinals 4

Tim Lincecum singled home the winning run in the ninth inning for Pittsburgh, playing its first home game following a 3-9 road trip.

"It sure is good to be home," said Pirates Manager Chuck Tanner. "It seems like we've been away for three months."

Despite the losing road trip, Monday's victory put the Pirates just 2½ games behind first-place Montreal in the N.L. East.

Padres 4, Dodgers 3

Juan Eichelberger and Bob Shirley combined to scatter seven Los Angeles hits and Aurelio Rodriguez singled home Dave Winfield with the winning run for San Diego in the seventh inning. For the Dodgers, Dusty Baker hit his 18th home run and Steve Garvey his 17th.

The Brewers added another run in the second on singles by Mark Brouhard, Jim Gantner and Charlie Moore and scored three times in the third on doubles by Don Money and Cecil Cooper, singles by Gorman Thomas and Oglivie and a sacrifice fly by Sixto Lezcano.

Yankees 6, Red Sox 3
Tommy John struggled to his 11th victory of the season with seventh-inning help from Rich Gossage. The Yankees scored in the first inning on a triple by Willie Randolph and a sacrifice fly by Bobby Murcer. Tennis officials aren't worried

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Top tennis officials of Wimbledon and the United States Open shrugged off on Monday a reported threat of a boycott unless the men touring professionals can dictate how the tournaments are run.

Such a threat was raised at the French Championships in Paris earlier this month when the ruling council proposed that conduct of Grand Prix events be extended to the traditional classics.

The idea would call for the Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP) to have all tournaments put under the control of five supervisors.

Wimbledon, now in its final week, has permitted no intrusion by supervisors. The U.S. Tennis Association allows supervisors at the U.S. Open but only in a supervisory capacity. The USTA maintains control.

A number of players, the most prominent being Roscoe Tanner and Marty Riessen, have hinted at a boycott of the U.S. Open and possibly Wimbledon next year if the demands are not met.

Twins 12, Royals 3

John Castino drove in five runs with three singles and his fifth homer to back the strong pitching of Darrell Jackson. Jackson struck out all the Kansas City runs on four hits while striking out seven and walking six before he was relieved by Mike Baskis to start the eighth. The Rangers teed off on Seattle starter Mike Parrott in the third, handing him his ninth consecutive setback after an opening-game victory.

Tiger bleachers 'cool'
DETROIT (AP) — "We're Cool," a banner in the center field bleachers of Tiger Stadium proclaimed.

The atmosphere indeed was cool in the bleachers, re-opened Monday night for the first time since a rowdy display June 16 forced Tiger General Manager Jim Campbell to shut them two weeks ago.

Campbell said he would permanently shut the bleachers — which hold more than 10,000 fans at \$2 a head — if the fans did not shape up.

"Boy the atmosphere is really different around here tonight," one beer patron exclaimed while waiting in line.

"Yeah, Big Brother is watching you," his friend said.

Thousands of workers striking across nation

Nine thousand city employees — from sanitation workers to bus mechanics — went on strike today in Detroit, and New York's police, firefighters and other key workers vowed to walk out on Thursday if their wage demands are not met before then.

In another major labor dispute, 39,000 copper workers began a nationwide strike this morning against seven companies in nine states. With no formal negotiations scheduled, picket lines were manned in New Jersey, Maryland, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Montana, Utah, Nevada and Washington.

The impact on consumers of the copper strike — by smelters, miners and other workers — was not clear as the strike began. Two of copper's biggest uses are as wiring in house construction and automobiles, two industries already slumping.

Union officials, who noted that the copper workers have struck for every contract since the mid-1960s, said the key issue is the size of a cost-of-living adjustment. The copper workers now average \$10.23 per hour.

Detroit's sanitation workers, bus mechanics, office employees and hospital workers struck at midnight as

union leaders called the city's latest offer "totally unacceptable." The union wants a three-year pact averaging 7 percent a year, while municipal leaders say Detroit is in a deep deficit position and can't afford that.

A walkout by police and firefighters in the nation's sixth-largest city — was averted Sunday when they filed for arbitration, which automatically extends their current agreement.

Mayor Coleman Young has warned city workers that if they are on strike for the Republican Convention, which begins July 14, they "would live to regret it."

New York's police, firefighters, sanitation workers and five other uniformed services gave a roaring authorization Monday night to strike on Thursday if there is no agreement.

The original deadline for the strike by 42,000 workers was midnight Monday, but it was pushed back when both sides moved closer to a contract, union leaders said.

The unions representing all of the city's major protective forces say they are committed to winning raises greater than the 8 percent increases received by New York's 215,000 civilian workers last week.

Gun control measure tough, but 'lifesaver'

BOSTON (AP) — Five years ago, blunt warnings went up at the borders of Massachusetts: Anyone convicted of carrying a gun without a state permit goes to jail for one year. No exception. No suspension. No furlough.

Today, firearms advocates still bristle over the law billed as the country's toughest gun control measure, but its supporters say it is a lifesaver.

"It's the single best law in the country," said retired Judge J. John Fox, who helped sponsor the penalty and remains its most passionate advocate.

"It has the main ingredient: the certainty of punishment for lawbreakers," he said. "Police officers say they see the effect now, with fewer guns in evidence."

A similar measure was signed into law in New York by Gov. Hugh Carey on June 13. It mandates a one-year prison term for anyone convicted of having a loaded, illegal handgun in public. But there, a judge may waive the penalty if he feels it is too harsh for the circumstances.

Current New York law provides for up to 15 years for illegal gun possession but such sentences are rare. Of 3,894 felony gun arrests in New York City in 1978, only 7 percent resulted in

prison sentences.

After the Massachusetts statute took effect in April 1975, the death rate from gun-related incidents dropped, said David Bartley, who was Massachusetts House speaker when he helped sponsor the law. He is now president of Holyoke Community College.

"Five years later, there are at least 50 to 75 more people alive each year," he said. "That's good. It won't solve the ills of society, but there is no reason for anyone to carry a gun on the streets unless he is a police officer."

Public Safety Secretary George Luciano said he is proposing a similar required jail term for drug trafficking.

"It was not intended to be a gun control law," he said. "It was intended, as the legislative mandate said, to decrease the incidence of violent crime involving firearms away from home or business."

But the law contains a feature that's particularly nettlesome to its opponents: Simply carrying a gun outside a home or business is a violation, even if no other crime is involved.

"When this law was proposed," said Michael Yacino, executive director of the Gun Owners' Action League, "it was as a penalty for 'illegal use' of a gun. Now that was a great idea. That

was aimed at the criminal.

"Unfortunately, when the Legislature amended and changed it, it became 'illegal carrying' of a gun. When it came to that point, we opposed," he said. "Mere possession made a criminal out of an honest man."

The mandatory jail term got mixed marks in a two-year study by a group of Boston and Northeastern University scholars.

"Although there was a reduction in certain types of gun crimes after Bartley-Fox went into effect, (all) persons who illegally carried a firearm by no means went to jail for one year," said Professor David Rossman of the Boston University School of Law.

Concert accident leaves many injured

WINDSOR, Ontario (AP) — An explosive charge that was to climax a performance by the Windsor Symphony Orchestra misfired, sending shrapnel into a crowd of concert-goers, and 46 people were reported injured, officials said.

Windsor Police Staff Sgt. Jim Adkin said the accident occurred Monday night during a performance of Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture.

The symphony was performing at the Freedom Festival, an annual celebration by this Canadian city and by neighboring Detroit of Canada's Dominion Day and the U.S. Fourth of July.

Adkin said those injured suffered minor cuts and bruises. Officials said 28 people were treated at two Windsor hospitals and released while police received reports of an additional 18 injuries.

The orchestra was on a barge tied to the Canadian side of the Detroit River and had begun its program as the prelude to a 45-minute fireworks display for which an estimated 750,000 people lined both banks of the river.

One of the injured, Jeff Knoll of Windsor, said police told the crowd to move about two yards back from the fence around the charges. He said the police warned the crowd to listen for the signal for the charges to be set off — but fireworks from a barge in the middle of the river went off and drowned out the orchestra.

Adkin said the charges were in canisters that were supposed to explode straight into the air, but one of the devices exploded sideways, sending shrapnel into the crowd. Two policemen were among the injured.

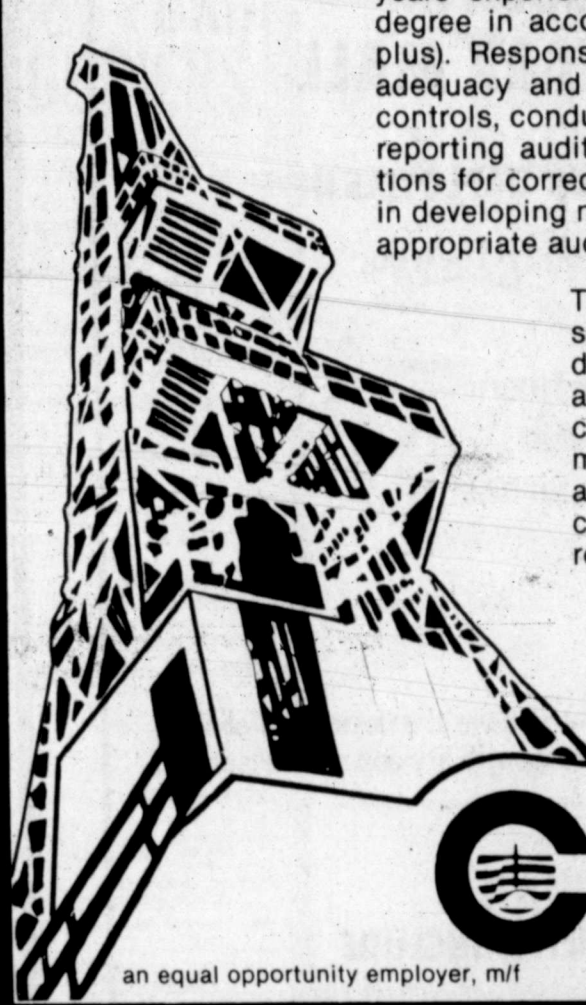
