

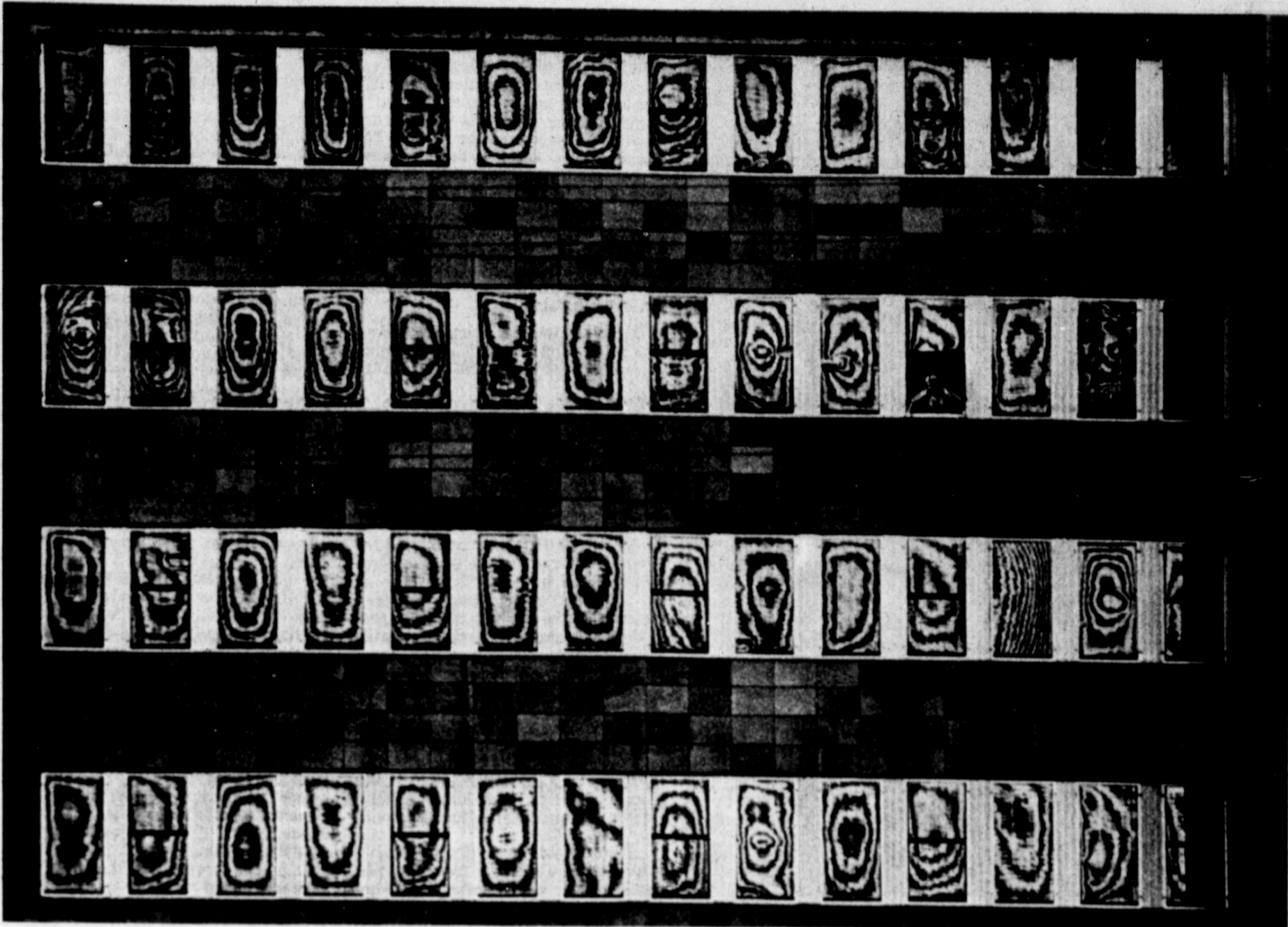

Hijacker will switch planes

SEATTLE (AP) — A man claiming he had a bomb in his briefcase seized a Northwest Airlines 727 jet on the ground Friday afternoon at Seattle-Tacoma International Airport and demanded up to \$600,000 and two parachutes, authorities said.

Four hours later, at 5:30 p.m. PDT, the hijacker released all 50 passengers, the FBI said, and 30 minutes after that he agreed to switch to another plane, said FBI negotiator Ron Beiner.

Beiner said the man agreed to switch to a four-seat, single-engine plane after FBI agents convinced him he would risk his life and the lives of the crew if he jumped from the jet. The smaller plane was to be flown by one of the Northwest pilots, said Beiner, trained in handling hijack situations.

More than seven hours after the 727 was seized, a single-engine Cessna arrived and the hijacker was reported preparing to transfer to it.

The man also agreed to release a stewardess as a gesture of a good faith, Beiner said.

The hijacker, who was not identified by authorities, was described by passengers as about 20, of medium build, wearing blue jeans, an Army fatigue jacket and aviator-type mirror sunglasses.

He "seemed very serious at the beginning but as time wore on he relaxed," said passenger Jim Crall, 35, of Los Altos, Calif.

The man earlier told negotiators he intended to parachute from the plane with his money, similar to the action of the man identified only as Dan Cooper, who disappeared over southwestern Washington in 1971.

At various times, the hijacker demanded different sums of money,

ranging up to \$600,000. "I'm not crazy," the hijacker said by radio after the passengers were released. "I don't want to talk no more."

"If I get that small plane and parachute, these people (remaining on the plane) will be set free and can go home to their children," he said.

Remaining on the 727 were a three-person flight crew, a flight attendant and an off-duty pilot, Northwest said. The airport remained open to other flights during the negotiations.

At about 4:30 p.m., the hijacker had set a three-hour deadline for action on his demands, but did not say what would happen if the deadline was ignored, Beiner said. The deadline passed without incident.

The man was in the cabin of the 727, which was parked on a ramp leading to a runway, said Dennis Feldman, a Federal Aviation Administration spokesman.

"I work for a man and the thing I do, I kill people for a living," the man said by radio as he talked with Beiner.

The man said he was not going to surrender until his boss was killed, but the boss was not identified and he did not explain why he wanted him killed.

The man also said he owed people money.

Before the agreement to switch to a smaller plane, the parachute request appeared to indicate the man planned an airborne escape in the style of Cooper, who parachuted into southwestern Washington from the rear stairway of a Northwest 727 in 1971.

Bond rejected in ax murder case

McKINNEY, Texas (AP) — Candace Montgomery, accused of murder in the ax slaying of family friend and church member, was jailed Friday after the presiding judge refused to accept her bond.

A spokesman for the Collin County sheriff's department said Mrs. Montgomery, 30, was jailed about 3 p.m., after District Judge Tom Ryan refused to accept the \$100,000 bond posted on June 27.

Mrs. Montgomery surrendered to authorities on June 26, hours after a warrant was issued for her arrest in connection with the brutal June 13 slaying of 30-year-old Betty Gore, who was struck at least 15 times with a 3-foot pole ax.

Mrs. Montgomery was freed after posting the bond. Neighbors found Mrs. Gore's mutilated body in the blood-spattered utility room of her home. Her sobbing 1-year-old daughter was discovered unharmed in a bedroom.

Mrs. Montgomery was babysitting for the Gore's 5-year-old daughter on the day of the murder.

Eruption feared at Mount Hood

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Increased seismic activity under Oregon's Mount Hood sent scientists scurrying Friday to determine whether a second Cascade Range volcano was signaling an eruption.

Mount Hood, 50 miles east of Portland, Ore., and 60 miles south of Mount St. Helens, has been quiet except for wafting steam since 1865.

But in the last four days, 50 earthquakes have been detected under the mountain, prompting the U.S. Geological Survey to plant additional instruments on the volcano.

"Hood has not done anything in a long time, we're not sure what to expect," USGS geologist Tim Hait said Friday.

The quakes were centered four miles below the volcano, Hait said. Scientists will be watching to see if the quakes rise closer to the surface — a possible indication that molten rock is rising in the volcano.

The quakes at Mount Hood had some similarity to those that rocked Mount St. Helens a week before its initial March 27 eruption, Hait said, but he said there were also differences.

There was a dramatic increase in the number of quakes on Mount St. Helens before it erupted, which has not been noted on Mount Hood, Hait said.

Detroit strike settlement near

DETROIT (AP) — A ratification vote was expected Saturday on a tentative settlement that would end an 11-day-old strike by 9,000 Detroit municipal workers, the union's chief negotiator said Friday evening.

"We hope to have a ratification vote tomorrow in Cobo Hall," said Lloyd Simpson, chief negotiator for Council 25 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees. "We've already arranged for the hall at 8 a.m. It looks like we're going to wrap it up."

Simpson stopped short of saying a tentative agreement was reached that would halt the strike before Monday's opening of the Republican National Convention here.

But he said there was "pretty much agreement on everything," adding that it remained for negotiators to resolve "a few cleanup issues." He would not disclose details.

New trial date set for Clayton

HOUSTON (AP) — The first four persons to be indicted in the FBI undercover operation Brilab, including Texas House Speaker Billy Clayton, are to go on trial in a Houston federal court Aug. 18.

U.S. District Judge Robert O'Connor set the new trial date after a hearing Friday.

The trial was to begin July 21, but defense attorneys said they needed more to listen to the hundreds of hours of tapes the prosecution used in its presentation before the federal grand jury.

Also scheduled for trial in August are L.G. Moore, a Houston labor leader, and two Austin attorneys — Randall B. Wood and Donald W. Ray.

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Queen reunited with parents

Freed hostage's doctors 'optimistic'

ZURICH, Switzerland (AP) — Freed hostage Richard Queen, appearing "euphoric," flew from Tehran to the care of Swiss and American doctors in Zurich and had an emotional reunion with his parents early Saturday.

"We are overwhelmed," his father, Harold Queen, said after the 50-minute reunion at the Zurich University Clinic. "Richard is not as we have known him when we last saw him a year ago. He needs treatment, but we are confident."

Both he and his wife Jeanne looked tired and strained following the meeting.

Preliminary tests at the Zurich clinic indicated the 28-year-old vice consul was suffering from a neurological problem involving some lack of coordination and a stiffness in his left arm, U.S. officials said.

"The doctors are optimistic, they are quite optimistic, and that's the most important thing," the elder Queen said. "But it was a highly emotional experience."

Queen's father and U.S. Ambassador to Switzerland Richard Vine said they had no word from doctors to confirm Swiss television reports that Queen would undergo an operation Saturday for an aneurysm in the brain. An aneurysm is defined in medical texts as a sac of blood formed by the enlargement of a weakened artery.

The U.S. officials said a more definitive report on the freed man's condition could be made later Saturday.

Earlier, a U.S. Embassy spokesman said the freed

hostage was not in pain, and in fact seemed "euphoric" after his flight to freedom.

Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini ordered the young man freed Thursday because of his illness — in the spirit of "Islamic humaneness," the Iranians said.

In Georgia early Friday, President Carter said, "We hope Queen will be OK and hope they will release all the hostages." U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim said in Tunisia he welcomed Queen's release, and echoed Carter's hope that the others would be freed.

But the Tehran authorities gave no sign of any softening in their stand on the 52 Americans who still remain captive in Iran. Khomeini, in fact, unleashed a new denunciation of the United States, accusing it of seeking to "trample Islam underfoot" through conspiracies aimed at his regime.

Iran's prosecutor general, Ayatollah Seyed Karim Mousavi Ardabili, told reporters in Tehran that Queen's release "in no way" signified any change in the plan to debate the fate of the hostages in the new Iranian Parliament. That debate apparently is weeks away, possibly months.

Soon after Queen landed here — the first of the Iran hostages released in more than seven months — his parents left New York, bound for Zurich via London. Richard grew up in Scarsdale, N.Y., but his parents recently moved from New York to Lincolnville, Maine.

GOP openly courting labor vote

DETROIT (AP) — Republican platform writers delivered a wilting criticism of President Carter and the Democrats who control Congress, saying "America is adrift" under their leadership. It was part of the preamble of the GOP's 1980 campaign document, approved unanimously in committee on Friday.

At the same time, Republican strategists looked beyond rhetoric to the fall campaign and openly courted the labor vote that traditionally goes lopsidedly Democratic.

The GOP platform committee was preparing an entirely new plank, to be added early next week, calling for tax breaks for Americans who buy U.S.-built, fuel-economical cars and for foreign automakers who construct assembly lines in the United States.

That proposal, designed to battle the high level of unemployment in the U.S. automobile industry, came after top GOP leaders met Friday for breakfast with United Auto Workers president Douglas Fraser.

Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas said he would offer the new plank Monday when the panel meets to formally deliver the document to the GOP convention.

The platform committee completed work on the 1980 platform by adopting a preamble harshly critical of foreign and defense policy under the Carter administration and the Democratic congressional leadership.

"Never before in modern history has the United States endured as

many humiliations, insults and defeats as it has during the past four years — our ambassadors murdered, our embassy burned, our warnings ignored, our diplomacy scorned, our diplomats kidnapped," said the introductory section.

The platform preamble cited "unparalleled unity within our ranks" and said the Republican party, under Ronald Reagan, could "make America great again."

"America is adrift" and headed toward "one of the most dangerous and disorderly periods in history," it said, adding: "In ultimate humiliation, militant terrorists in Iran continue to toy with the lives of American diplomats."

The proposed platform, closely reflecting Reagan's views on both foreign-policy and domestic issues, calls for sharply higher defense spending, a broad tax cut and efforts to strengthen the family. It also stresses the need for new tax breaks and government deregulation to stimulate domestic energy production.

Sen. John Tower of Texas, the committee chairman, said the platform clearly reflects "a rightward move in this country."

"I think there is a conservative swing in this country and I think that's reflected in our platform," he said. "It's even reflected in the travail within the Democratic party now."

Tower said he could think of no instance in which the finished plat-

form differed from positions advocated by Reagan, the prospective GOP nominee.

Following Friday's breakfast meeting, Fraser — a Democratic supporter of Carter's challenger, Sen. Edward Kennedy — said Republicans have "got the issues" in 1980 and predicted that a large number of his union's members will vote for Reagan.

Two hours after the GOP meeting with UAW leaders, Dole showed up at the platform session waving the new proposal urging relief for the auto industry.

Reagan won't pick Laxalt, Washington newspaper says

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ronald Reagan has decided against choosing his national campaign chairman, Sen. Paul Laxalt, as his running mate, according to published reports here.

The Washington Post, in Saturday's editions, said Reagan ruled out Laxalt for the Republican vice presidential nomination on grounds of regionalism and party unity.

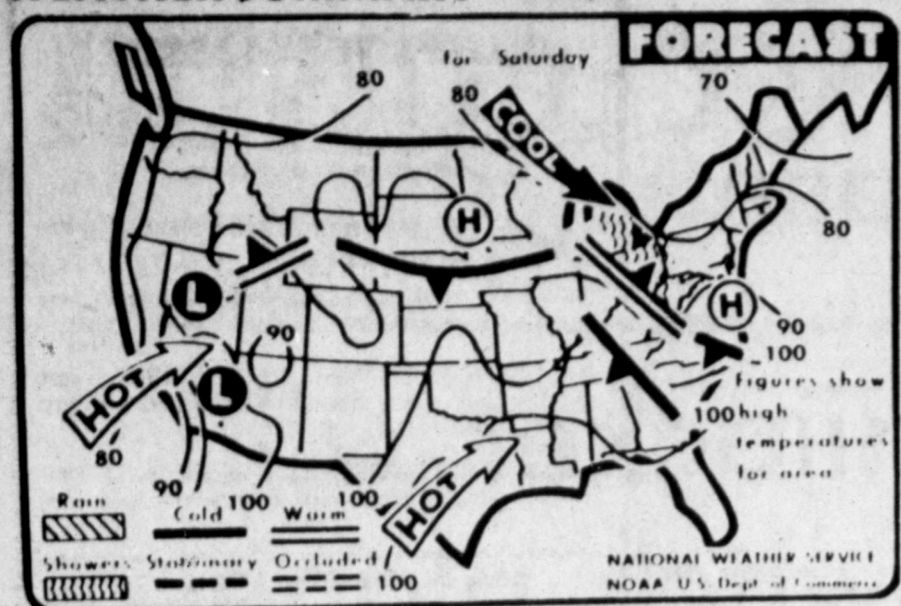
Laxalt, the junior senator from Nevada, was often mentioned as a leading possibility for the vice presidential nomination. He will deliver the speech next Wednesday night placing Reagan's name in nomination for the presidency at the Republican National Convention in Detroit.

Reagan and Laxalt have been friends since they were governors of neighboring states in the 1960s. Their conservative political views are very close.

The newspaper said Laxalt was Reagan's first choice for his running mate. But it said he was ruled out on pragmatic grounds.

An unidentified source reportedly said of Laxalt: "In many ways, Laxalt is like a younger Reagan and from the same region. He brings nothing to the ticket that isn't already there."

Parking in loading zones may bring tow truck

Downtown workers and visitors who have been slipping their vehicles into posted loading zones instead of finding regularly-marked parking spaces will have to start going straight home Monday — or the Midland Police Department will give the driver a nudge in the right direction while the vehicle gets towed off in another. Midland City Council last month amended an ordinance to control freight loading zones in downtown, according to Lt. Herman Wicker of the police department. This regulation requires any vehicle less than one ton to have a freight loading permit for parking in loading zones. These areas have been designated tow away zones if vehicles, such as automobiles, don't display the permit, said Wicker. Doug Vanover with the city traffic department explained that in the "past year or so we've had trouble providing enough loading zones for downtown buildings. People are parking in these loading zones when they're not really loading freight." On Friday, city street crews installed tow-away signs in the loading zones to warn drivers. On Monday, police will put the ordinance into force by writing tickets for vehicles that are not loading freight and by placing a flyer explaining the new policy on the windshield, Wicker said. This policy will continue through Aug. 1. On Aug. 4 — allowing drivers enough time to apply for and receive a permit — the traffic officers will begin having cars without the permit towed away. To obtain a permit, the lieutenant said the application forms may be picked up at the Police Department in the Traffic Division. A completed application will be reviewed by the police and city traffic department to see if it fits into the exceptions category. If so, the permit will be issued at no charge. This permit "must be displayed where it can be seen," he said, adding that it can go on the left side of the windshield or on the sun visor, which is then pulled down for officers to see while the driver is absent. "Salesmen can't get permits for soliciting orders," he admonished. "These are only for delivery purposes." Nor will the permits be given to someone who wants a good parking slot.

Vermont nuclear power plant closed

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP) — Fearing that a small leak could worsen, officials of the Vermont Yankee nuclear power plant decided to shut the reactor down Saturday to repair the leak and conduct tests ordered by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission. "Right now, it is only a whisp of steam," plant spokesman Steve Stoll said Friday. "But it is the type of thing that could get worse." The leak was first noticed Thursday when radiation monitors showed a slight increase in levels within a dry well which surrounds the reactor. The reactor was lowered to 70 percent power, allowing technicians to enter the well to investigate the leak's source. Stoll said officials found the leak to be caused by poor packing in a re-circulation valve, and returned the plant to full power until they decided when to make repairs. Officials initially decided to wait until the plant conducted a test shutdown ordered by the NRC on Monday to determine why a similar plant in Alabama would not shut down on command two weeks ago. Twenty-three other plants were also ordered to undergo the test shutdown during the next two weeks. But Stoll said officials decided to make the repairs and conduct the NRC-mandated tests this weekend. "If we waited and the leak got worse, we might have to make two shutdowns," he said. "We thought it best to get it all over with." He said the plant would conduct the first test shutdown at 8 a.m. Saturday, make the repairs and then conduct a second test shutdown. He said the plant should be back to full power on Monday. The weekend shutdown will mark the third outage for Vermont Yankee in the past month. The reactor closed June 13 to replace a valve that was leaking thousands of gallons of radioactive water into the containment area. On June 17 a drain valve failed, tripping an automatic shutdown.

TMI venting complete, company official says

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — The remaining radioactive krypton gas was vented from the Three Mile Island nuclear plant Friday, completing the first major step in cleaning up the facility since it was contaminated by the nation's worst commercial nuclear power accident 15 months ago. Meanwhile, an anti-nuclear coalition said it would continue its legal action against the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for allowing the venting to take place. "At 9:30 a.m. we terminated the venting process," said Robert Arnold, senior vice president of the Metropolitan Edison Co. About 43,000 curies of the radioactive gas were released from the crippled nuclear plant during the 14-day purge. Arnold said about 40 curies were released during the final hours of the purge. The total release was about 14,000 curies less than the 57,000 anticipated. He said the higher estimate was made initially because safety judgments were at stake. "The 43,000 figure was more consistent with what we expected from what we think happened," he said, referring to the March 28, 1979 accident that crippled the plant. A brief manned entry into the dank, radiation-drenched containment building is scheduled within a month, Arnold said. But he said the lower than expected krypton gas content should not be considered an indication that the accident caused less damage to the reactor than had been believed. "It (the lower krypton content) doesn't confirm that we'll find what we think, but it certainly doesn't conflict with it," he said. Arnold, who lived with his family in a trailer near TMI during the venting, said he is relieved the process went off as planned and off-site radiation monitoring was accomplished "without any real glitches." "The monitoring was reliable and it confirmed the forecast that any expo-

Citibank cuts prime rate to 11.25 percent

Tax cut expected to be eaten by social security increase

Don't expect a cut in federal income taxes to help you put more food on the table or more money in the bank next year. Higher Social Security taxes would wipe out most of the extra dollars and inflation would eat up the rest. A family with a \$15,000 income could lose over \$1,100 in purchasing power; a family with \$25,000, could lose almost \$1,700 worth.

some figures to understand why you are likely to end up with less purchasing power next year — even if income taxes are cut as both Democrats and Republicans are promising.

First: Social Security taxes are rising. The rate is going up and so is the maximum on which you have to pay tax. In 1980, the first \$25,900 of earnings are subject to a tax of 6.13 percent. In 1980, you face a tax of 6.65 percent on everything you earn up to \$29,700.

Next: Take inflation into account. The rise in prices has slowed recently, but is still at an annual rate of almost 11 percent. The inflation rate for all of 1980, according to Tax Foundation economists, is expected to be about 14.5 percent.

Consider a hypothetical family of four — man, woman and two children — with one wage earner and an adjusted gross income of \$15,000.

Figures compiled by the Tax Foundation, Inc., a non-profit research group based in Washington, D.C., show that the family faces a 1980 federal tax bill of \$2,065 — \$1,145 in income taxes and \$920 in Social Security levies. After-tax

income: \$12,935. (State and local taxes are not included in these figures.)

Suppose the same family has the same adjusted gross income — \$15,000 — next year. As things now stand, its federal tax bill for 1981 would be \$2,143 — the same \$1,145 in income taxes, and \$998 in Social Security taxes. After-tax income: \$12,857, for a loss of \$78.

Suppose income taxes are cut by 10 percent, as the Republicans, led by Ronald Reagan, are proposing. (The Democrats haven't given out the details of their plan yet.)

The hypothetical family's total federal tax bill for 1981 would drop to \$2,028.50. After-tax income: \$12,971.50. About two-thirds of the \$114.50 decrease in income taxes would be wiped out by the \$78 increase in Social Security levies, but there would still be a gain from 1980 to 1981 of \$36.50.

That gain, however, is before inflation. Many experts, in and out of government, believe the underlying rate of inflation in our economy is about 10 percent a year. Assume the rate of inflation in 1981, therefore, will drop to 10 percent.

The 1981 dollars will be worth 10 percent less

than the 1980 ones. The \$12,971.50 after-tax income will buy only as much as \$11,792 did in 1980, when the family's after-tax income was \$12,935. Loss of purchasing power: \$1,143.

The dollars and cents vary at different income levels, but the basic pattern is the same. A family with an adjusted gross income of \$25,000, for example, would gain \$306 from a 10 percent cut in income taxes. Higher Social Security taxes would cut the gain to \$176. And a 10 percent rate of inflation would leave the family with an overall loss of \$1,696 in purchasing power.

The family whose income increases to keep pace with inflation is not much better off. That's because of something known as "tax bracket creep" or "taxflation." When your income increases, you are pushed into a higher tax bracket.

The Tax Foundation looked at what would happen to a family whose income increased from 1979 to 1980 by 14.5 percent to match this year's expected inflation rate.

A family with an adjusted gross income of \$15,000 last year would have an adjusted gross income of \$17,175 this

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Power demands skyrocket

The unrelenting heat wave in the South, Southwest and Midwest is bringing record-breaking electricity demands to utilities, and may bring record-breaking bills to consumers who have to pay for the power.

"Each day we go on, the air conditioners stay on longer," said Neil Nelson, construction manager for the Northern States Power Co. in Sioux Falls, S.D. "Everybody wants to keep cool."

Utility officials contacted in an Associated Press survey Friday said they were managing to meet the demand for electricity without problems so far.

Charles Kelly, director of corporate communications for the Arkansas Power and Light Co., said a new nuclear power plant has helped produce the record amounts of electricity needed. "You begin to be a little more nervous the longer it goes on," said Kelly, "but we don't anticipate any problems."

An unofficial tally by the AP, compiled from local reports, indicates more than 330 people in 14 states have died of heat-related causes during the heat wave, now in its 20th day in some areas.

Controversy over registration

Battle of the network stars

WASHINGTON (AP) — The controversy over draft registration could begin to look more like "Battle of the Network Stars" in the next few weeks, with both sides urging broadcasters to use their prepared announcements featuring famous personalities.

The Committee Against Registration and the Draft (CARD) joined the battle Friday, with radio tapes by actors LeVar Burton, Martin Sheen, Lilly Tomlin, Henry Gibson and others.

Already on the way to

radio and television stations are public service announcements from the Selective Service System featuring singer Lou Rawls, Olympic hockey coach Herb Brooks and Ken Michelman of "The White Shadow," a television program.

Both sides are seeking to reach about 4 million young men, born in 1960 and 1961, who are required to register for the draft between July 21 and Aug. 1.

Rev. Barry Lynn, chairman of CARD, calls the government's public service announcements inaccurate and misleading, and charges that they contain "offensive

racial stereotypes." Assistant Selective Service Director Brayton Harris responded: "We feel our spots are straightforward, prepared in a variety of formats with a variety of messages. Stations are free to use one, several, or all of them."

Some of Lynn's announcements also may be considered misleading. One by LeVar Burton begins: "You may have an alternative to draft registration." The rest of the announcement and other CARD materials offer no real alternative, however, although they urge efforts to end the program.

Lynn said he sees the CARD materials as a "counter" to the Selective Service announcements.

While providing alternative announcements, Lynn also wrote to the major networks and large broadcasting stations, urging them to either refuse to use the government-provided materials or to air the CARD spots for balance.

The Selective Service materials urge registration as a means of helping the nation be prepared in the event of a national emergency, as an exercise of adult responsibility, and because the law requires it.

CARD's announcements stress the potential fine and five-year prison sentence for violating the law, penalties Lynn contends the Selective Service attempts to minimize.

"Sure, it's the law," said Harris. "But we don't want to hit people over the head with a sledge hammer. Our goal is to get people to register because it's important to the security of the United States, in our opinion and in the opinion of the president and the Congress."

UT says it will expand its vineyard

PORT ARANSAS, Texas (AP) — The University of Texas Regents approved Friday a major expansion of its experimental vineyard near Bakersfield, Texas.

The board approved \$685,000 to expand the project from the current 14 acres to 160 acres of Chenin Blanc and French Columbard grape plants.

When the 72,000 plants reach maturity in five years, they will be capable of producing over 1,000 tons of grapes — the equivalent of 200,000 gallons of wine.

UT will not produce wine, but hopes to show the university lands in West Texas are suitable for vineyards.

Lynn also contends registration will do little to insure national security.

"Rev. Lynn thinks there may be facts in dispute, we do not," Harris said.

Lynn also contends the government spots are political because they promote registration, a Carter administration policy opposed by both GOP presidential hopeful Ronald Reagan and independent candidate Rep. John Anderson of Illinois.

Lynn concedes that CARD's materials likely will increase the turnout for registration. But he notes that the organization — a coalition of more than 50 groups — also is continuing to try to get Congress to end the program.

Catholics, Lutherans congregate to celebrate Augsburg Confession

NEW YORK (AP) — About 3,000 Roman Catholics and Lutherans packed the cathedral, singing the great hymn of Protestantism's 16th century reformer Martin Luther, "A Mighty Fortress." A Catholic-Lutheran clergy procession of about 100 was led by six bishops of both traditions.

"Doesn't it feel great?" observed Lutheran theologian William Lazareth. The Lutheran-Catholic congregation applauded long and loud.

"IT'S ALMOST TOO GOOD TO BE true," said Msgr. James F. Rigney, the Catholic pastor.

This was the scene at Manhattan's St. Patrick's Cathedral on Sunday, June 22, one of scores of ecumenical affairs going on in many communities and nations this year, marking the 450th anniversary of a document intended to heal the impending rupture in Christianity, the Augsburg Confession of 1530.

But instead of healing — in the political tensions of those times — the irenic document formalized the rift between Protestantism and Catholicism.

THE CONFESSION, SOMETIMES CALLED the "Protestant Magna Carta," became the foundational credo of the Reformation and still remains the central statement of faith of the world's 70 million Lutherans.

However, in the contemporary atmosphere of inter-church dialogue and fusing of insights, an official international Roman Catholic-Lutheran commission says:

"The contents of... the Augsburg Confession in large measure... can be regarded as an expression of common faith."

SEVERAL CATHOLIC THEOLOGIANS have suggested that it could be accepted by Catholicism in basic content.

Reconsidering the confession, Catholics and Lutherans "have discovered that they have a common mind on basic doctrinal truths," says the joint international team of scholars.

The scholars say it "reflects as no other confession does the ecumenical purpose and catholic intention of the Reformation" and "points the way to a confession of our faith here and now, with Catholics and Lutherans no longer divided...."

The 20,000-word confession, made up of 28 articles of basic

Christian beliefs, was drawn up at the request of the Holy Roman Emperor Charles V for emerging Protestantism amicably to state its case.

IT WAS PREPARED BY LUTHER'S scholarly colleague, Philip Melancthon, moderate in tone, aimed at showing Protestants were not heretical, but pointing to abuses in the church needing to be reformed.

It was a last attempt at reconciliation, and feelings ran high as Protestant and Catholic princes and theologians met in Augsburg for the imperial diet and the two-hour reading of the confession.

Its purpose "is to bear witness to the faith of the one, holy catholic and apostolic church," says the joint Catholic-Lutheran analysis.

"Its concern is not with peculiar doctrines nor indeed with the establishment of a new church, but with the preservation and renewal of the faith in its purity — in harmony with the Ancient Church and the Church of Rome — and in agreement with the witness of Holy Scripture."

BUT IN THE RIVALRY OF THAT era, the confession did not accomplish its objective, the ensuing negotiations breaking up over secondary matters, such as administering both wine and bread in Holy Communion.

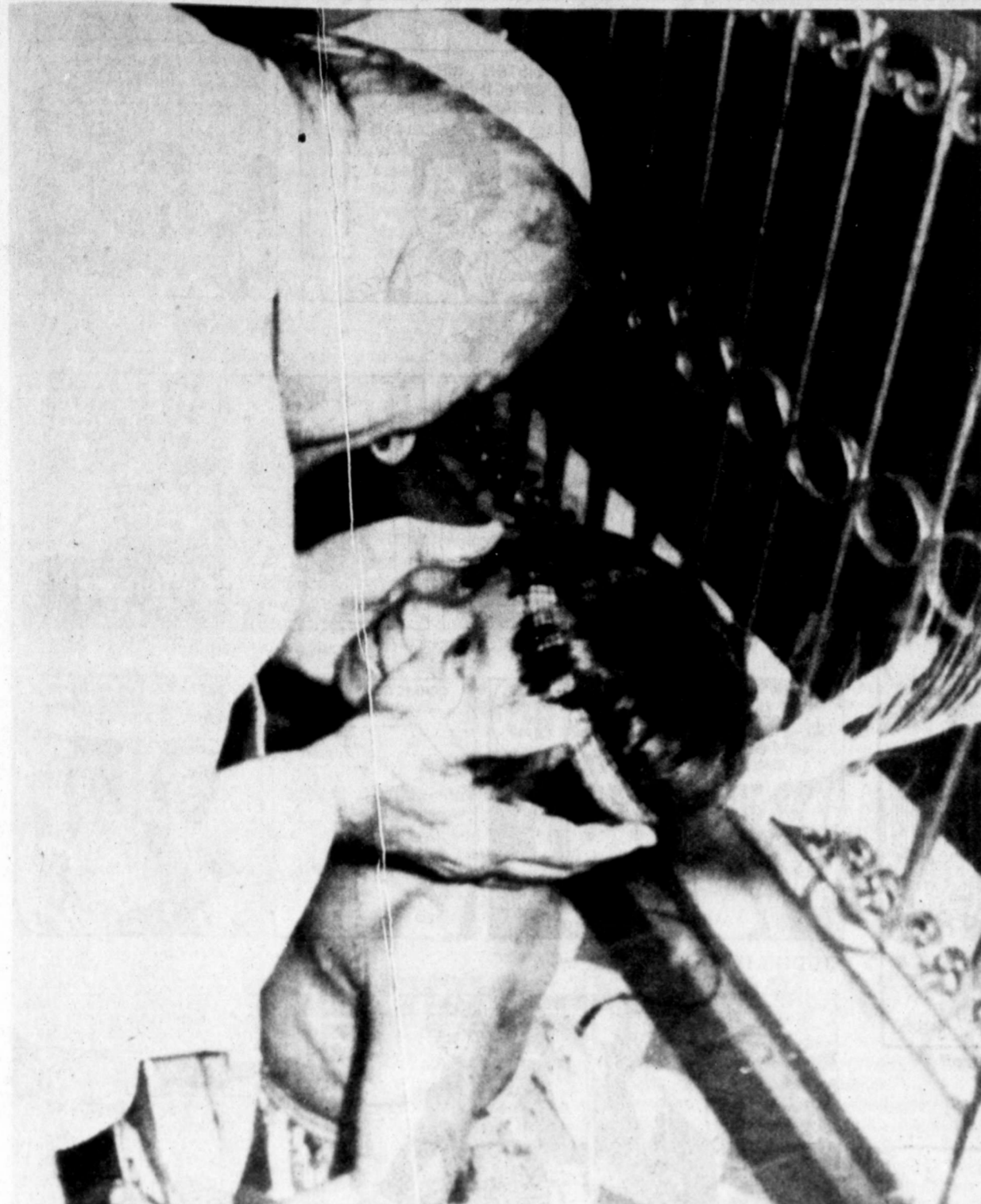
Luther himself, who was not present, being forced to remain in Wittenberg for safety after being declared an outlaw at the previous Diet of Worms in 1521, later wrote:

"Even if we cannot attain peace, we have this advantage before God and the world that we openly confessed our teaching and sought peace... What God and our descendants have to say about that, only time will tell."

CONCERNING LATER PORTIONS of the confession opposing "abuses in the church" of that time, the joint Catholic-Lutheran team says changes have occurred that "essentially remove the grounds" for the criticism.

In the confession's deepest intention, it could be accepted by Catholicism, says Germany's Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger. But since the "moment of hope" was not realized in 1530, he adds, "Can we not now take up again that offer of hope and give a new opportunity to the chance that history offered then?"

"Be patient," advises New York's Archbishop Cardinal Terence Cooke concerning potential unity, "but not too patient."

Pope real inspiration to Brazilians; Visit leaves doubt of fast changes

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Pope John Paul II inspired tens of millions of people of all classes during his 12-day pilgrimage through Brazil. But a close look at the more than 50 proclamations he made during his journey leaves doubts that his visit will produce any fast changes in this underdeveloped part of the world.

During the exhaustive Brazilian 7,500-mile journey — his longest and most extensive since assuming the papacy two years ago — the pope left behind many encouraging words but few prospects for immediate action.

THE POPE EXPERIENCED failures on earlier travels: Last September his visit to Ireland was greeted with great enthusiasm, but his appeals for an end to sectarian violence fell on deaf ears.

He sent his envoy to Iran to seek the release of the American hostages, but Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini only asked why the Vatican was silent during the former shah's reign.

He holds to the church's traditional stand against artificial birth control, but church officials admit the

poverty that are the most negative and humanly depressing aspects of this superficially well-off Third World cosmos.

THE DELIRIOUS SHOUTING, chanting and singing of the pope's praises erupted in practically all 13 cities he visited, but as the last of the cheers died out some skepticism began to surface about what the pontiff had accomplished here.

"John Paul is an able politician," said Luis Inacio da Silva, Brazil's most important labor union figure. Silva — known to his admirers as "Lula" — was the leader of assemblyline workers in grimy auto plants on the periphery of Sao Paulo, the nation's biggest city, until the military-run regime summarily removed him because of a strike.

"Yes, the pope spoke to the most diverse sectors of Brazilian society," the ex-union chief added, "but he still hasn't taken a definite position in favor of workers."

CARDINAL AVELAR BRANDAO Vilela of the church-filled city of Salvador, generally is regarded as a political moderate. He described the pope's Brazil pilgrimage this way: "The pope spoke freely. But he did not take sides with the government or the opposition, nor with the conservatives or progressives. And it's stupid to think otherwise."

Cardinal Eugenio Sales of Rio, has quietly defended political prisoners and other enemies of Brazil's 16-year-old military regime, in a spiritual style that meets with John Paul's standards. He said, "People who think the pope's visit here will lead to a confrontation between the church and the government are mistaken."

President Joao Figueiredo, the ex-general who leads Brazil's government and who says he will return the nation to democratic rule, declared that the pope's words in his country "affected me deeply." But the president did not promise any new political, social or economic changes as a result of John Paul's visit.

IN FORTALEZA, BRAZILIAN clergymen opened their religious congress with a document that criticized the government for allegedly not doing anything to eliminate social, economic and even racial discrimination. But the farthest the pope would go on the issue was to hold an unusual off-the-record meeting with the dissatisfied prelates.

Later he restated: "You are ministers of the Gospel. As bishops, you are forbidden from everything that might look like political partisanship."

ban is widely flouted by Catholics.

In Brazil, John Paul stood by his conservative or middle-of-the-road positions on church participation in temporal affairs — a stance he already had outlined in earlier trips abroad. But he also pleaded for greater social justice in this South American nation where extreme poverty lives beside the rewards of 20th-century progress.

THIS ACKNOWLEDGEMENT of social problems, combined with the pontiff's magnetic personality, made him a hero to all kinds of Brazilians — from Heider Camara, the internationally known liberal bishop of Recife, whose enemies label him the "red bishop," to an ultraconservative lay Catholic organization known as "Tradition Family and Property," which holds big street demonstrations against alleged Communist infiltration in the church.

Even white-robed followers of African-inspired voodoo cults, who nominally are Catholics but who tend to believe more strongly in spirit religions, let themselves go — temporarily — and hailed John Paul as "our king."

Rubens 'Samson-Delilah' brings \$5.4 million

LONDON (AP) — After only three minutes bidding the colorful Rubens masterpiece "Samson and Delilah" on Friday fetched the world's third highest auction price for a painting.

Britain's National Gallery, dueling against an anonymous rival who bid via telephone, paid \$5.4 million for the richly colored canvas showing Samson asleep on the lap of bare-bosomed Delilah while a man cuts off his hair, the source of his strength.

Delighted trustees of the state-funded gallery immediately put the work on public display.

It was the highest ever paid for anything by 17th century Flemish Old Master Peter Paul Rubens.

Art experts overflowed from the Christie's room, but the contest quickly narrowed to 72-year-old London art dealer Sir Geoffrey Agnew, acting for the gallery, and the anonymous competitor.

"This magnificent painting, probably executed around 1610 shortly after Rubens' return to Antwerp from Italy, represents an aspect of the painter's style not previously included in the gallery's collection," the gallery said in a statement.

The painting measures 72 3/4 inches by 81 inches and was created when Rubens was 13.

The price of the work, sold by an unidentified European "family," fell short of the world auction record for a painting.

That honor goes to "Juliet and her Nurse" by the English artist J.M.W. Turner, which was bought for \$6.4 million by an anonymous collector, at Sotheby Parke Bernet and Co. in New York on May 29. It was the most paid at an auction for any work of art.

Friday's gavel price for the Rubens was also just short of the \$5.5 million paid at Christie's

here in 1970 for "Portrait of Juan de Pareja" by the 17th century Spanish artist Velazquez. It was bought by New York's Wildenstein Gallery for the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

The order between the Rubens and Velazquez would be reversed if a controversial buyer's 10-percent premium, and British sales tax are included. They bring the price paid by the gallery to \$6.1 million. There were no extras when the Velazquez was sold.

"The trade doesn't include the premium or tax when ranking paintings, but only the hammer price," a Christie's spokesman said.

The 10-percent buyer's fee at London's big auction rooms, introduced in 1978, has drawn bitter criticism from art traders.

Agnew told a reporter: "It is most unfair. Art dealers have long been against this set-up." But he was proud of his purchase.

"It is a magnificent example of the work of one of Europe's greatest artists. I feel very honored to have been chosen to buy it."

The previous auction record for a Rubens was \$770,000 for "The Adoration of the Magi" at Sotheby's in London in 1959.

Explaining the millions separating the two Rubens, a Christie's spokesman said: "They just don't come up for sale."

New Patriarch elected for Syrian Orthodox Church

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Archbishop Elias Zakka of Baghdad, Iraq, was elected Syrian Orthodox Patriarch of Antioch and All Orient on Friday.

The church's holy synod chose Zakka at a meeting in the Syrian capital which is the seat of the Syrian Orthodox Church. Zakka replaces Patriarch Ignatius Yacoub III, who died of a

heart attack June 26. The Syrian Orthodox Church is an Eastern Orthodox Rite church with followers in Iraq, Syria, Jordan and other areas of the Middle East, including the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan River. The church's adherents are largely descendants of Biblical Assyrians and speak "Syriac" which is also the language of their liturgy.

Pastor to attend Methodist conference

The Rev. O. A. McBrayer, pastor of St. Luke's United Methodist Church, will attend the South Central Jurisdictional Conference of the United Methodist Church in Little Rock, Ark., Monday through Thursday.

Although Suzy Chaffee, the three-time world freestyle ski champion, performed the more difficult stunts, Miss Raffin had to demonstrate sufficient skill to be convincing on the slopes.

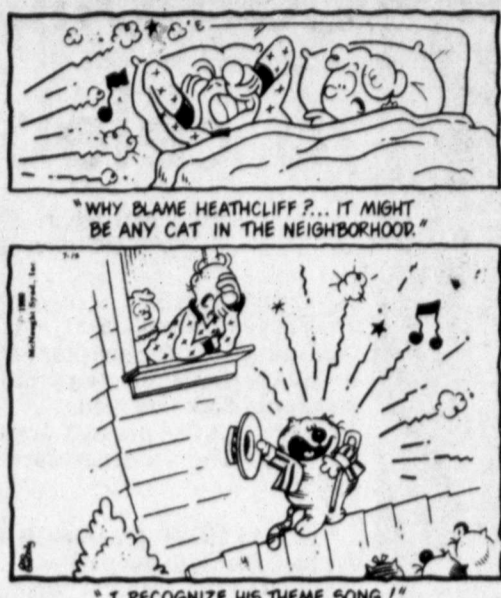

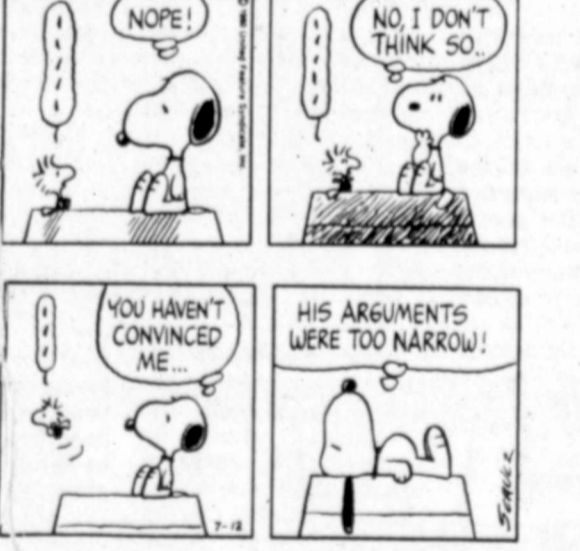

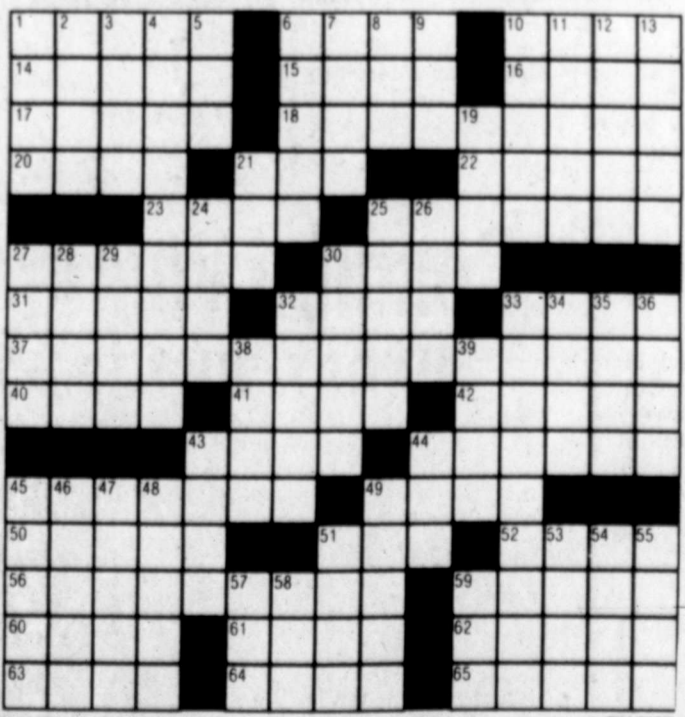

Basketball player hears the sound of different drummer

NEW YORK (AP) — Some athletes spend their off-seasons fishing, hunting or just resting their tired bodies. Others work in brokerage firms or other offices, paying the way toward a career they can turn to when their playing days are done.

But there are some who choose to give of their time and talent to those less privileged than themselves. Many do it on their own, often receiving little recognition — but great satisfaction.

One of these is Mike Glenn, a 24-year-old reserve guard of the New

York Knicks, who spent this past week conducting the first Mike Glenn Basketball Camp for the Hearing Impaired.

About 35 youngsters ages 14-18 from the metropolitan New York area attended the camp at the Mill Neck Manor Lutheran School for the deaf, receiving basketball instruction from Glenn and several Knicks teammates, as well as basketball coaches and educators of the deaf.

"It's something I've always wanted to do," said Glenn, whose hearing is normal but who has had a long-standing

relationship with the deaf. "Since deaf people, who have been an intricate part of my life, have often been overlooked in our noisy and fast-paced society, I decided to hold a basketball camp strictly for my very special friends."

"The progression was natural," adds the 6-foot-3 Glenn, a sharp-shooting veteran of three seasons in the National Basketball Association who averaged 5.9 points in less than 11 minutes per game last year.

"My father was a teacher and basketball coach at a school for the deaf

in Cave Spring, Ga., and I went to work with him a lot. I learned to communicate at an early age, and gradually I started signing (using sign language) and talking with the kids."

"I developed a deep love for them. I think they had resentment toward talking people, but I grew up with them and they felt I was on their side."

Although Glenn, an academic All-America at Southern Illinois who is

working toward a masters degree in business administration, has had little formal training in teaching the deaf, he has spoken before dozens of organizations and schools for the deaf around the country.

He notes that the deaf can adapt easily to the demands of basketball, since the crowd noise forces players to communicate with each other by use of hand signals and other gestures. He said he would not be surprised if within a few years a deaf player made it to the NBA.

Glenn says he derives great satisfac-

tion from his relationship with the deaf, and is happy to help them in any way he can.

"I'm in a profession they really respect, so maybe I can help because of my position," he reflected. "But some of them are my best friends. At times the NBA can be rough, and it's comforting to know you have people pulling for you."

"I feel a responsibility toward them because I've been publicized. But the deaf have been very special in my life. I love these people, and I want to continue this."

Texas hitting stops Yankees

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — John Grubb led a 18-hit Texas attack with a homer, double and three runs batted in Friday night as the Rangers took an early lead and held off a late New York rally for a 10-8 victory over the Yankees.

Jon Matlack, 5-5, benefited from a five-run outburst against Yankee starter Tom Underwood in the first inning. Underwood, 7-6, did not retire a batter.

Reggie Jackson's towering 440-foot three-run homer chased Matlack in the seventh and the Yankees scored another run in the eighth on Rick Cerone's second double and Willie Randolph's RBI single that cut the Texas lead to 9-8.

The Yankees got 14 hits, including six doubles.

All four New York runs in the seventh were unearned. First baseman Rusty Staub juggled a throw from shortstop on Lou Piniella's apparent

inning-ending grounder. Bob Watson followed with an RBI single and Jackson followed with the longest ball ever hit to center field in Arlington Stadium, according to club officials.

The 18 hits tied a Ranger high for the season.

Underwood faced five Rangers in the first. Texas got four singles off Underwood and three more off reliever Ron Davis in the big inning. Mickey Rivers, running his hitting string to 20 games, had two singles and a triple.

His three-bagger came in the fifth, when he scored ahead of Bump Wills' single, and Buddy Bell tripled in the eighth and scored on Richie Zisk's single.

Grubb hit an RBI double in the second and two-run homer in the fourth. He only got into the contest because the Yankees changed pitchers, and the left-handed batting Grubb pinch-hit for the right-handed swinging Johnny Ellis.

Dodgers tame Astros, 3-2

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A week ago in Houston, veteran Joe Morgan of the Astros slugged a ninth-inning homer off Steve Howe to send the game into extra innings.

Friday night, Howe faced Morgan again with the tying run at third, and this time he struck him out to preserve the Dodgers' 3-2 victory over the Astros, moving them two games in front of Houston in the National League West.

Reuss, 10-2, allowed only three singles over the first seven innings before giving way to Bobby Castillo. Dave Goltz relieved Castillo after an

RBI single by Enos Cabell and gave up a sacrifice fly to Jeff Leonard before Steve Howe came on to record his eighth save for the Dodgers.

Ken Forsch, 8-8, took the loss.

The Dodgers' first run came with two out in the seventh when pinch-hitter Rick Monday walked, stole second and came home when third baseman

Cabell threw wildly to first on Davey Lopes' grounder.

Baker then slugged his 19th homer of the year following a single by Steve Garvey.

Reuss, lowering his league leading ERA to 1.83, walked two and struck out four. He was removed for a pinch-hitter because he had tired.

Carpenter says Phils not involved

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — State officials have contacted Philadelphia Phillies players and their wives in connection with a criminal investigation of persons not employed by the club, Phillies' president Ruly Carpenter said Friday night.

His statement referred to news reports earlier this week linking team members with an investigation into the illegal prescribing of amphetamines by a Reading, Pa., physician.

"Each individual interviewed cooperated fully and was assured that he or she was not suspected of any criminal involvement," Carpenter said in a five paragraph statement read by team public relations director Larry Shenk.

"The officials from the Commonwealth requested that none of the details of the interview, including the identities of the individuals interviewed, be disclosed at this time," Carpenter said in the statement issued shortly before his team met the Chicago Cubs in the last of a two-game series.

Amphetamines, commonly known as "uppers," are stimulants.

First reports of the amphetamine investigation said eight Phillies' players were involved, but only four were named. They were shortstop Larry Bowa, third baseman Mike Schmidt, first baseman Pete Rose and outfielder Greg Luzinski.

Still another report included the names of pitchers Steve Carlton, Randy Lerch and Larry Christenson. All have issued denials or refused to

comment.

The reports angered both club officials and the team. Some of the players have refused to talk with reporters — even about baseball — because of the adverse publicity.

Phillies' Manager Dallas Green said he thought his players had been treated unfairly by the media, but said he did not believe the reports had any effect on their performance.

Judge dismisses action by NFL

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal judge dismissed a breach of contract suit Friday filed by the National Football League against the Oakland Raiders in the continuing battle to keep the team from moving to Los Angeles.

U.S. District Court Judge Robert Schnacke ruled that the issue of NFL franchise transfer rules should be decided in his court. A federal appellate court in Pasadena already has heard arguments in an attempt by Los Angeles officials to overturn those rules.

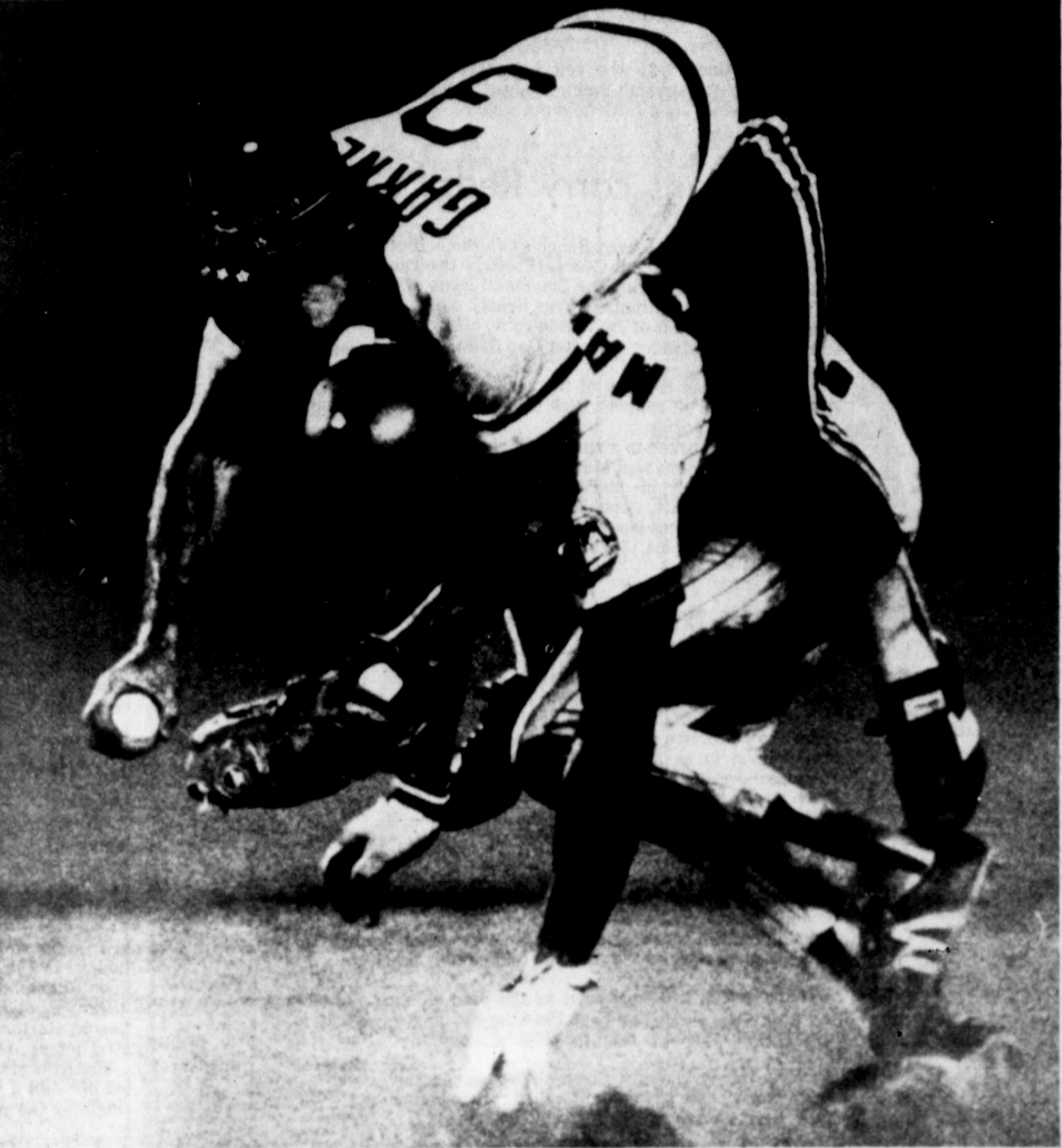

Consistent Alcott has midway lead

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Amy Alcott, saying she strives for consistency, fired her second consecutive one-under-par 70 Friday to take the midway lead in the U.S. Women's Open golf championship.

Barbara Moxness, a co-leader after Thursday's opening round, fell four strokes off the pace after she birdied four holes and bogeyed four others, including a double-bogey on 17.

A field of 150 players, 49 of them amateurs, were entered in the 28th annual U.S. Women's Open, a \$140,000 72-hole event which is to continue through Sunday at Richland Country Club.

Alcott, 24, of Santa Monica, Calif., bogeyed two holes on the front nine but finished the round with three birdies and a 25-foot putt on No. 18 to turn in another par-breaking performance.

"The key to my round today — like yesterday — was consistency," she said. "I play each shot as it comes. I'd just like to play well today and the next day."

Moxness, meanwhile, blamed her putting for dropping her out of the share of the lead.

"I think this was my worst putting round in quite a while," she said. "I actually four-putted one hole — 17 — to get a double-bogey."

Sharing 144 with Moxness is Penny Pulz, who carded a 72 Friday to remain in strong contention.

Pulz said she'll have to keep up the pace if she's to catch Alcott.

"The room for error is none out there," Pulz said. "You have to have a tremendous mental game."

"I think with Amy Alcott playing so well, I will have to stay one or two under. If I can stay in that position, it could be a real squeaker Sunday."

A crowd estimated at 3,800 watched defending champion Jerilyn Britz post a 78, giving her a 156 at the halfway point, 16 strokes off the pace.

The leading amateur at the midway point was Judith Oliver of Sewickley, Pa. She combined rounds of 75 and 76 for a 151, 11 shots behind the leader.

Kratzert paces GMO field But Streck, Pohl aren't far back

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Bill Kratzert, a consistent money-winner but without a PGA tournament victory since 1977, shrugged off stiff crosswinds Friday to drill a 66 and take a 1-stroke lead midway in the Greater Milwaukee Open.

Kratzert stood at 11-under par 133. Breathing down his back in another par-breaking frolic over the 7,010-yard, par-72 Tuckaway Country Club Course were Don Pohl and first-round leader Ron Streck.

Pohl blazed the front side in 32, dropping 40- and 35-foot putts en route and came back in 35 for 67. Streck, who closed with a 33, included a string of three birdies in his round of 69.

The group at 9-under 135 included Howard Twitty, who did not make a bogey in carding 68; 40-year-old Miller Barber, who had four birdies on his finishing nine for 69; Jack Renner, with a 67, and Johnny Miller, putting cross-handed for a 67.

Staying in contending position for the \$36,000 top prize at 136 were Keith Ferguson, with his second straight round of 68; Hale Irwin with a 67; Jay Haas, 66, and Chi Chi Rodriguez, 68.

At 137 were Mark Lye, Mike Morley, Fred Marti and Gibby Gilbert. Marti, who had a double-eagle Thursday, collected an eagle in his second round while shooting 71.

Among those at 138 was defending champion Calvin Peete.

Scott Simpson, coming off his first

PGA tour win in the Western Open, was in a large bracket at 139.

Simpson, who could collect a \$100,000 bonus by winning the GMO because of the tournament committee's decision to award it to anyone who won both the Western and the Milwaukee, rounded out a 68 Friday with an eagle-2 on the 18th by sinking an 8-iron shot from 160 yards out.

The cut Friday was at 3-under-par 141, the lowest on the PGA tour this year, leaving 71 players in contention. Among those failing were former U.S. Open titlist Andy North, Jeff Mitchell and Dave Stockton, a two-time GMO champion.

Kratzert's last victory was in the Greater Hartford Open. His best finish this year was a tie for second at Greensboro and he has won \$100,267 this season, good for 24th in the PGA dollar derby.

One of Kratzert's most sensational shots came when he planted a 6-iron two feet from the cup on the fifth for one of his six birdies. Other birdies came on putts of 22, 20 and 10 feet.

Pohl, who missed the cuts in his last two starts — the U.S. and Western Opens — also had the greens tamed. He included birdie putts of 40 and 35 feet.

Miller, who dominated the tour scene for several years after winning the 1973 U.S. Open, was having such troubles that for the first time he started stroking the ball cross-handed Thursday.

"I did it again today and it's starting to feel more reasonable. But I never made anything over 14 feet," he said. "It's an extremely physical change. I had lost my feel putting the other way. I missed five or six birdies from 10 to 12 feet, and otherwise, I would have had a really sensational round."

NBC stunned

MOSCOW (AP) — The NBC television network says a demand for \$15 million by the International Olympic Committee came as a complete surprise and claims that a presidential order forbids the network from paying the money.

On Friday, the IOC's Executive Board met in Moscow's palatial House of Unions and resolved to step up efforts to obtain the money from the network, which had planned to cover the 1980 Summer Olympics here until the United States decided to boycott the Games.

Monique Berliou, director of the IOC, said the money was still owed from an original \$35 million bid for rights to the Games — plus another \$50 million for satellite equipment. Berliou said \$10 million would go to the Moscow Olympic Organizing Committee and \$5 million to the IOC.

John Reaves eludes deputies for third day in row

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — John Reaves, the reserve quarterback for the Minnesota Vikings, eluded deputies for the third day Friday as they tried to serve him with papers committing him to a mental health center.

"We're checking every tip, every phone call," said Sgt. Tony Marcheta of the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department. "Nothing has turned up yet."

Reaves' wife Patti said she didn't know where he was. "I've heard rumors he's headed for Minnesota," she said.

Circuit Court Judge Benjamin Sidwell of Tampa issued a commitment order Wednesday after three people swore out affidavits.

One of the affidavits said Reaves had been seen using cocaine, quaaludes and alcohol at the same

time. Another said Reaves was threatening to kill people. The other said he was "totally out of his mind at this time."

Reaves, 30, joined the Vikings last season after being released by the Cincinnati Bengals. He didn't play at all last season and expected to be cut by the National Football League team.

He was a star quarterback at the University of Florida and the first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1972. He played for the Eagles for three years before moving to Cincinnati.

According to the three who filed the affidavits for commitment to the Hillsborough Mental Health Center, Reaves allegedly became irrational in a Tampa restaurant Monday night. Another incident occurred Tuesday night. The three filed the affidavits on Wednesday.

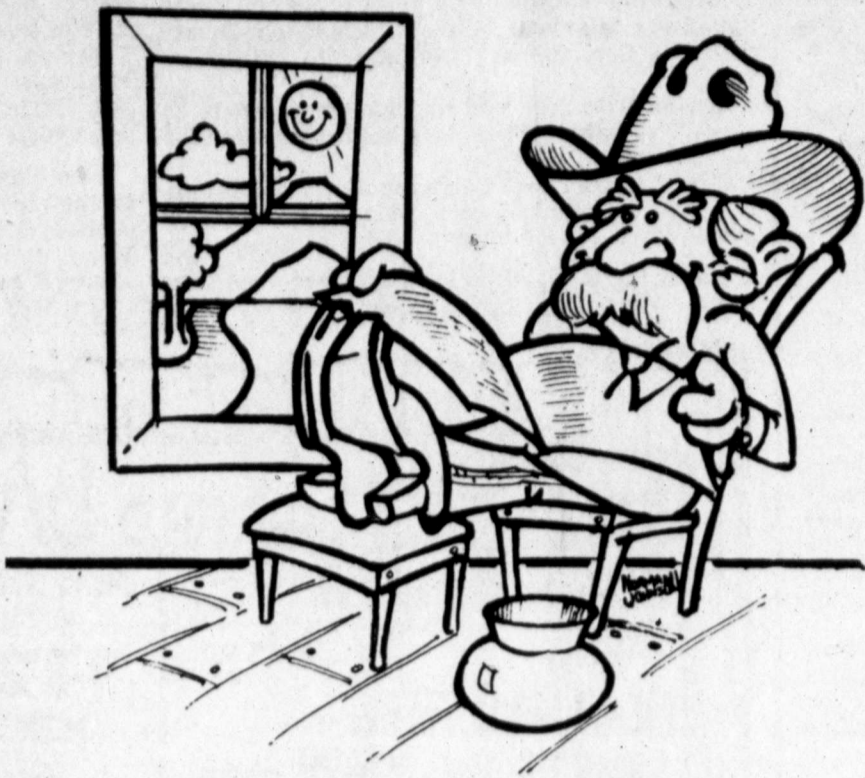

Group wants nuke route changes told

ATLANTA (AP) — A member of a citizens group says the federal government should announce what his group has learned — that a major route for shipping nuclear waste down the East Coast has been changed.

William Reynolds of the American Friends Service Committee's Nuclear Transportation Project said Thursday the government's caution is not keeping information from terrorists, but from citizens who should be aware of the potential for a nuclear accident near their homes.

"If we can get this information, certainly a terrorist can do the same," Reynolds said in an interview. A spokesman for the Nuclear Regulatory Commission would not say whether the route described by the AFSC and the Sierra Club's Radioactive Waste Campaign is actually being used. The spokesman declined to be identified.

Reynolds said the new route for waste taken from a research reactor at Chalk River, Ontario, to the federal government's Savannah River Plant near Aiken, S.C., has been verified by local officials and others along the route.

He said the old path, which followed Interstate 95 through eastern Virginia and North and South Carolina, has been replaced by a more westerly course through the Appalachian region. Reynolds said that route runs southward along Interstate 81 through Virginia and Tennessee, then through North Carolina on Interstate 40 and into South Carolina via Interstate 26.

Reynolds said several shipments have been made on the route since April, another is planned this week and two or three others can be expected this summer.

Reynolds said the tracing was aided by North Carolina and Virginia laws requiring that state officials be notified of nuclear shipments passing through. He said the North Carolina records are open to the public.

He said his group has been unsuccessful in attempts to get the NRC to disclose the route change. Reynolds said provisions for the agency's congressional funding in 1981 require that it disclose routes and amounts of nuclear material shipments.

The new rules will not go into effect for several months, and Reynolds said he fears they are not stringent enough.

"There's no public involvement in decisions on how or when the material will be shipped," he said.

He said changes in the Chalk River-Savannah River Plant route apparently were sparked by passage of federal laws two years ago banning nuclear shipping through densely populated areas. He noted that those rules have since been changed to allow such movements as long as the material is under heavy armed guard.

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Pope ends Brazilian trip

MANAUS, Brazil (AP) — Pope John Paul II spent the last day of his long and demanding visit to Brazil in this remote Amazon city, and despite the sweltering heat and rigors of the trip, hinted he will return.

In farewell remarks made before boarding a Brazilian DC-10 at 5:25 p.m. (EDT) for a non-stop flight to the Vatican, the pope said, "I had said that this was the time to say goodbye. But no. I tell you: 'See you soon,' or thinking twice, I tell you: 'See you very soon.'"

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The pope thanked the tens of millions of "Catholic faithful as well as non-Catholic" Brazilians who had turned out to see and hear him during his tour, saying, "God bless you all. God bless Brazil." The crowd at the airport sang and cheered and the pope had to gesture to quiet his admirers.

In temperatures of more than 100 degrees, softened only slightly by a tropical downpour, the

60-year-old pontiff told worshippers at an outdoor Mass earlier in the day he was especially pleased to be in this remote jungle land.

Here, nearly 1,000 miles upriver from the mouth of the Amazon, the inhabitants are Indians, peasant farmers, hunters, homesteaders, adventurers, diamond and gold prospectors, and malaria-stricken religious missionaries.

many of you came from your homelands in Europe never more to return? How many of you quickly spent your youthful energy, consumed by fatigue or disease? How many of you found death here, sucked down by the waters? How many are dreaming your last dream in unmarked graves in this vast forest?" he asked.

"I kneel down before these graves and before each missionary," the pontiff declared.

The pope has expressed pointed interest in the plight of Brazil's approximately 200,000 Indians.

UT says it can't cut employees by 5 percent

PORT ARANSAS, Texas (AP) — Chancellor E.D. Walker said Friday a five-month study shows The University of Texas system cannot meet Gov. Bill Clements' request for a 5 percent job cutback.

UT was "already lean when the governor asked us to cut fat. ... To comply with the 5 percent mandate would have resulted in cutting muscle and bone," Walker said.

The regents authorized Walker and chairman Dan Williams of Dallas to convey that message to Clements.

Walker said the UT system's average student-teacher ratio is 23.3 students per teacher, higher than most

universities in the region. He said the average teaching load at UT-Austin is 12.9 hours, well above the nine-hour minimum workload set by the regents in 1978.

The regents also voted to spend \$2.5 million for remodeling at the Lyndon B. Johnson Library, including enlargement of exhibition space and conversion of an eighth-floor courtyard to a meeting room.

Architectural plans were approved for 228 new apartments for married students at the location of the old Brackenridge Apartments, converted World War II barracks that will be demolished.
