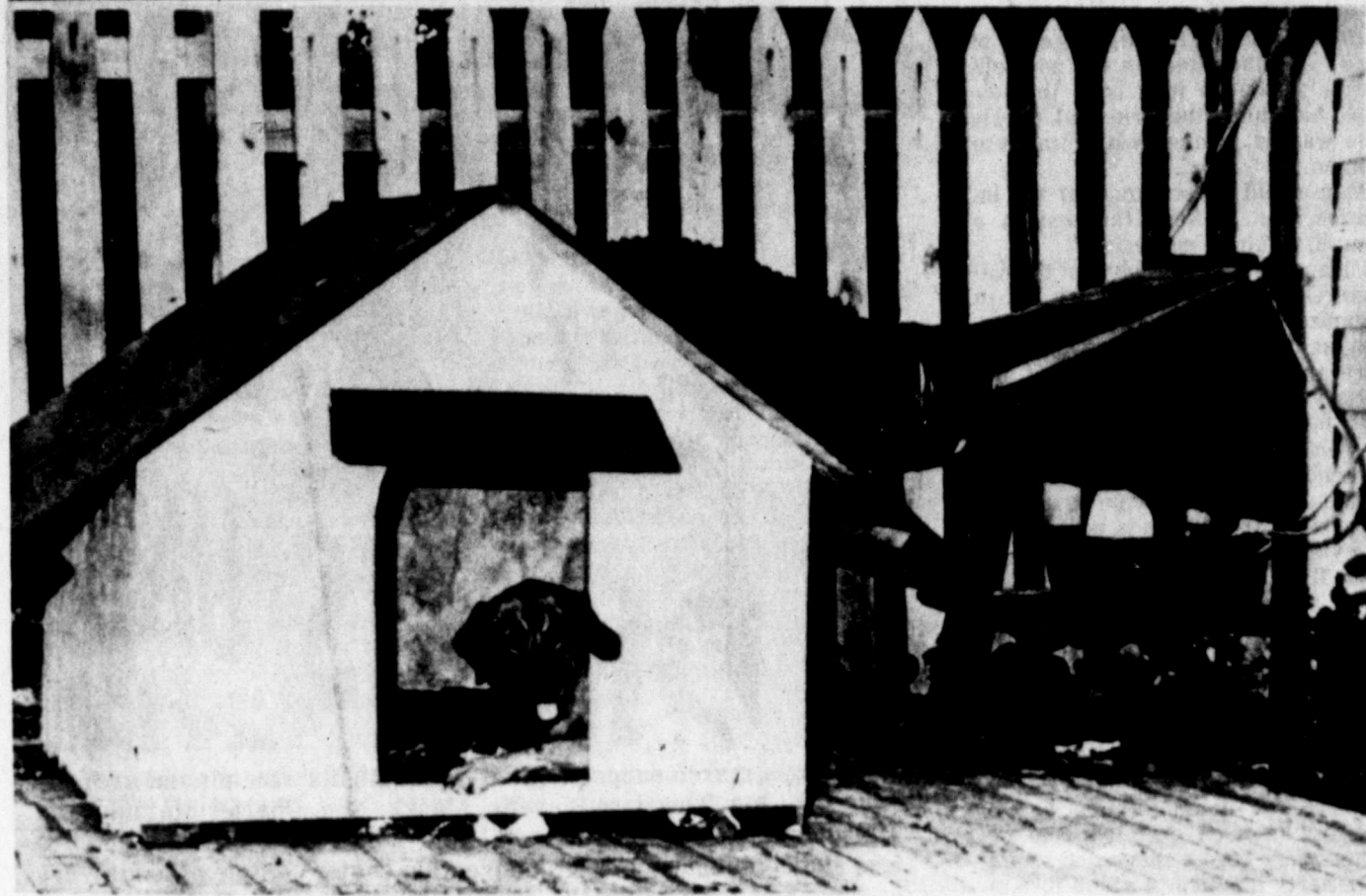

Queen's illness diagnosed

Hostage has multiple sclerosis

WIESBADEN, West Germany (AP) — Freed American hostage Richard Queen is suffering from multiple sclerosis, a disease of nerve degeneration whose symptoms first appeared during his captivity in Iran, a doctor at the U.S. Air Force hospital here said today.

Dr. Jerome Michael Korcak told a news conference that the 28-year-old former vice consul at the American Embassy in Tehran will return to the United States "in the next few days."

Queen, released last week because of ill health after 250 days as a hostage, "will resume his duties as a foreign service officer as soon as his health permits," Korcak said.

"Mr. Queen developed symptoms of the disease in December 1979 while he was held hostage in Tehran," Korcak said. "His symptoms during the past

eight months have included numbness and abnormal sensations in his upper extremities and some difficulty with balance associated with nausea and vomiting."

"Mr. Queen's physicians have every hope that he will be among that group of patients with mild and transient manifestations of the illness," Korcak told reporters at the sprawling U.S. base.

"There was no indication that the (U.S.) embassy occupiers worsened his condition," the doctor said, adding, "They (the Iranian militants) were very forthcoming." He did not elaborate.

In New York, a spokesman for the National Multiple Sclerosis Society said it was "very likely" that the stress of captivity may have helped

set off Queen's multiple sclerosis attack.

But the spokesman, Bard Lindeman, emphasized that current theories hold that the infectious agent probably enters the body years before symptoms appear, so that "the supposition is that it would have surfaced earlier anyway."

Korcak described multiple sclerosis as a disease of unknown cause, the effects of which vary very widely from patient to patient. Webster's Dictionary describes it as "a chronic disease in which there is scattered demyelination of the central nervous system: it is characterized by speech defects, loss of muscular coordination, etc." Demyelination is the destruction or damage of the fatty tissue that surrounds nerves and helps them function.

21 killed, 35 injured

in nursing home blaze

MISSISSAUGA, Ontario (AP) — Twenty-one people were killed and 35 injured in a nursing home fire that spread rapidly through the top floor of the three-story building where most of the chronically ill patients were housed, police said.

Initial reports indicated a careless smoker was responsible for the fire, but there was no official ruling on the cause.

Authorities said most of the victims died of smoke inhalation and extreme heat. "The smoke was very heavy and there was considerable flame and a tremendous amount of heat," said local Police Chief Douglas Burrows.

The fire broke out on the third floor of the Extencicare Ltd. nursing home shortly after 9:30 p.m. Monday, and fire trucks were on the scene in about two minutes. But Fire Chief Gordon Bentley said by the time his men got there, the flames had spread across the entire third floor.

"Either the fire went undetected for a considerable length of time or spread very quickly," said Bentley. However, he said the 202-room

building's smoke detectors were working.

There were 198 residents in the home. Bentley said the firemen had difficulty getting them out because "they were mostly in wheelchairs and bedridden."

Ontario Health Minister Dennis Timbrell said there would be a full investigation into the fire, but Bentley said he had no clue yet to what caused it.

"Nothing is left of the rooms," he said. "We'll practically have to sift through the ashes."

Most of the injured were treated for smoke inhalation at Mississauga General Hospital across the street. The dead were laid out on a lawn beside the hospital, then put in an ambulance bus and taken to a morgue set up at a nearby recreation center so relatives could identify them.

Mayor Hazel McCallion said the nursing home was about six years old.

"The part I visited is totally gutted, really a mess," she said. "When you see it you wouldn't believe anyone got out."

Don Shurman, vice president and general manager of Extencicare, was asked why the least ambulatory patients were on the top floor.

"There are various philosophies on how to segregate patients, there is no sure right or wrong way," he replied. "Some say the most mobile should be on the first so they have access to the outside and can enjoy it."

There are 18 other Extencicare homes in Ontario. The company also has homes in Saskatchewan and British Columbia and about 30 in the United States.

Shurman said it was the worst tragedy in Extencicare's history. He said monthly fire drills are held in all the homes during which the staff sets a fake fire and then responds. They don't always evacuate the building in the drills, he said.

The worst nursing home fire in Canadian history killed 38 people. It occurred in December 1969 in Notre-Dame-du-Lac, 125 miles northeast of Quebec City. Witnesses said that fire swept through the three-story wooden building in a few minutes.

Bush may be

Reagan's pick

DETROIT (AP) — With everything going his way on the Republican convention floor, Ronald Reagan's search for a winning vice presidential running mate intensified today, with signs pointing toward George Bush as the leading prospect.

Reagan also met with former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and supporters of the Equal Rights Amendment in a dual effort to smother the only flickers of controversy at this carefully scripted convention.

After he met with top Reagan advisers, Bush told the California delegation that "I believe this party is more unified than at any time in history. ... And I believe that under Governor Reagan we are going to see that sort of respect for the United States that everyone wants."

After his session with Reagan, Kissinger told reporters he did not discuss the possibility of joining a Reagan administration.

"The only discussion we had was on substantive issues of foreign policy," Kissinger said. He called Reagan's foreign policy views "compatible" with his own.

While there was hardly a ripple of public controversy at the convention sessions on Monday, the first of four days of meetings in Joe Louis Arena, some prominent party figures expressed disagreement with the conservative cast of the party platform to be presented to the delegates for approval tonight.

Betty Ford, former first lady, said in an ABC television interview today that platform planks dropping endorsement of the Equal Rights Amendment and supporting a constitutional ban on abortions were threatening to carry the party toward the sort of election disaster that Barry Goldwater suffered as the GOP nominee in 1964.

"We're treading on dangerous ground just like 1964," said Mrs. Ford, a strong supporter of ERA. "I hope we correct some of these issues."

In an earlier appearance on the CBS Morning News, Kissinger sidestepped a question whether he agreed with the platform's opposition to the SALT II treaty with the Soviet Union. The arms limitation pact, strongly opposed by Reagan, is stalled in the Senate.

Kissinger replied that "at this moment the big problem in national defense is catching up with the Soviets." Then he added that "I support the many directions of the platform."

Kissinger was on Reagan's guest list today along with former President Gerald R. Ford, ERA supporters and, quite likely, some of the men mentioned as leading his list of vice presidential possibilities.

Meanwhile, The Washington Post quoted an unnamed Reagan intimate as saying the candidate was "90 percent of the way toward choosing" Bush as his running mate.

Speculation about Reagan's vice presidential choice remained the favorite sport at this convention.

The highlight of the opening day occurred Monday night when Ford received a warm emotional welcome from the delegates and pledged that "this Republican is going to do everything in his power to elect our nominee to the presidency of the United States."

It was Ford's 67th birthday and when he finished speaking and cheers had died down, the delegates sang "Happy Birthday" to the former president.

On the floor after the Ford speech, William Casey, Reagan's campaign manager, said a Reagan-Ford combination "would be a great ticket."

But Ford has made it clear he

would not accept the vice presidential nomination and Casey said he doubted there would be any effort to try to draft Ford.

Kissinger was interviewed Monday night on CBS and when asked if he thought he might be offered his old job as secretary of state in a Reagan administration, he replied that "I have no expectancy one way or the other."

Sen. Richard Lugar of Indiana, one of the opening day speakers, said that he had not been invited to any meeting with Reagan, but that he had been asked for material to supplement the personal and financial data the Re-

gan staff had requested from several vice presidential prospects.

The deadline was drawing near for a decision from Reagan who will receive the presidential nomination from the convention on Wednesday night. He is expected to make his choice late that night and announce it at an 11 a.m. news conference on Thursday.

While Reagan pondered, others lobbied.

Gov. William Milliken of Michigan, who had supported Bush for the presidential nomination, now is boosting the former U.N. ambassador for the second spot on the ticket.

Betty Boop runs

as 'anti-frownie'

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit's Les Bowman didn't want to be left out of all the excitement.

So before he went into the convention headquarters Plaza Hotel for a bit of celebrity watching, he pinned onto his shirt a piece of cardboard on which he'd written: "Official Pass. I Live Here. Admit Bearer."

Bowman was one of thousands of people out Monday on Jefferson Avenue between Joe Louis Arena and the futuristic Plaza, where Ronald Reagan is staying. That stretch of the street has become a promenade where Republican delegates, Detroit residents and all kinds of others ogle each other and street vendors offer everything from water colors to souvenir beer mugs.

At an information booth, volunteer Dorothy Ferguson says, the three most common questions are: "What's going on today? Where do I find my bus? Where can I get a button like yours?" (Hers carries the official slogan: "Detroit Loves A Good Party.")

A few other sights and sounds from the streets:

Few Uncle Sams on stilts or bearded Abraham Lincolns have shown up here, but there's a presidential candidate running against "the frownies."

Victoria D'Orazi, 24, an actress,

singer and songwriter from San Francisco, has set up headquarters in a trailer.

She is running under the name Betty Boop. It is a gag, of course, Betty Boop being a cartoon character of the 1930s.

Dressed in a silver halter, red and silver shorts and a red garter, the reincarnated Miss Boop sat atop a trailer across from the convention hall.

"There's a disease going around called the frownies," she called down to an inquirer. "The frownies can make you sick and the scowls can kill you."

Ice cream vendor Pete Bible pedaled up and traded Miss Boop a red-white-and-blue ice cream for a Betty Boop bumper sticker.

"Don't forget my slogan," she called, blowing a kiss. "Have it my way, see if I care."

"We are not going to rain on their parade," she said firmly.

"The Reagan people," she said, "have been very gracious."

For \$5, convention visitors can get what looks for all the world like a photograph of themselves standing arm-in-arm with Ronald Reagan.

The trick is a lifelike Reagan cutout. A group of Michigan Republicans are selling the photos as a fund raising technique.

Three die in Houston

bowling alley shooting

HOUSTON (AP) — The bowling alley had been robbed just the night before, so four young people volunteered to spend the night and guard against burglars. When they were seen again, three had been shot to death execution-style.

Investigators said they hoped the lone survivor of the bloodbath — a teen-ager who was shot in the head — could give them a clue to help track the killers.

Investigators speculated that robbery was the motive for the bloody break-in. About \$800 was taken from a cash register near the bodies, police said. The four were apparently told to lie on the floor and then each was shot once in the head.

"Hate," said Betty Rappe, a bowling alley employee and friend of the victims. "That's all it could be. Hate."

Police identified those killed as Stephen Allen Sims, 25, assistant manager of Fair Lanes Windfeyn Bowling Center in northwest Houston; Tommy Lee Temple, a 17-year-old employee of the alley; and Temple's girlfriend, Arden Alane Felsner, also 17.

Gregory Garner, 18, also an employee, was in critical condition following the shootings and authorities said he may lose an eye.

Garner's father, Ira, found the bodies early Monday when his son called home for help, unable to speak clearly.

Midlander dies after plunge

of 35 feet from drilling rig

ODESSA — A 19-year-old Midland man died Monday morning of injuries sustained when he fell 35 feet from a drilling rig under construction at OIME on East Highway 80. The accident occurred at 9:40 a.m.

Thomas Michael Lawson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Lawson, 1401 Community Lane in Midland, was pronounced dead at Odessa Medical Center.

According to a spokesman with OIME, the younger Lawson was a summer employee. His father is vice president of sales for OIME.

No one else was injured and the case is still under investigation, said the spokesman.

OIME is located in Midland County near Odessa.

City's move causes county grief

When Midland City Council annexed 6½ square miles of north Midland into the city limits, Midland County Commissioners discovered the city apparently threw a monkey's wrench into the county's voting precincts.

County commissioners, meeting Monday in the County Courthouse, wrestled with two options — keeping Precinct 18, which was the portion annexed by the city, or creating another precinct, 29, to provide for equal representation.

The commissioners discovered the problem when they started to appoint election judges and designate voting places for the Nov. 4 election.

However, by the end of the meeting, commissioners still hadn't made up their minds what to do about the precinct.

No matter what the decision will be, it won't become effective until March 1, 1981, according to County Clerk Rosellenie Cherry.

In the future, county residents may have to secure a permit for the installation, inspection and maintenance of septic tanks, according to Jewel Smith, chief sanitarian for the Midland County-City Health Department.

Commissioners gave Smith permission to research and present a proposal to charge a permit fee for the increasing number of septic tanks appearing in the county.

Last year, Smith noted about 600 septic tanks were installed in residences outside the city. This year about 125 tanks have been installed, he said.

The sanitarian said money obtained from the fee would be placed in the county's general fund.

Also, commissioners approved another request by Smith to charge a

health permit fee for food services outside the city limits.

Restaurants and businesses currently selling food inside the city limits are required to pay a fee to obtain a health department permit. Those businesses outside the city must have a permit but they do not pay for it.

Present charges for a health permit are in the \$5-\$25 range with a possible increase to \$10-\$50 next year, he noted. The fees would be set depending on the number of employees in the business, Smith said.

Deputy constables Tom McGinnis and Charlie Smith, both running for constable in the Nov. 4 general election, were authorized to act as constables. The two men will be completing the term of longtime constable Jack Merritt, 76, who died June 11.

Both men were required to post a \$1,000 bond for the position.

A bid of \$6,200 from Rogers Ford Sales of Midland for a pickup truck

was accepted.

Other approved bids included a painting contract for Culver Youth Home and rental of the old county warehouse building.

Also, commissioners voted to approve county jail door repairs and tabled requests to purchase a typewriter and an emergency generator for the sheriff's office.

Tom King was unanimously elected to act as the county's appraiser for property along proposed Texas Highway 191.

A request by the Texas-New Mexico Pipeline Co. to place a concrete slab over pipelines crossing Industrial Avenue was approved.

Commissioners decided to allot \$78 for a foster parent to accompany a child to Dallas for neurological testing. Beverly Acker, supervisor of the Midland County Department of Welfare, was given permission to use \$101.19 to repair damages at the Culver Youth Home.

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Anderson's name will be on ballot

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Independent presidential candidate John Anderson and the little-known Libertarian Party met Texas' deadline Monday for submitting petitions for places on the Texas ballot.

But the Citizens Party, whose presidential candidate is Barry Commoner, didn't make it, announcing it could gather only 15,000 of the 23,698 signatures needed to put a third party slate before the voters.

Anderson's Texas supporters presented Secretary of State George Strake petitions bearing 80,057 signatures — but about 20,000 will be eliminated because they are unaccompanied by voter registration numbers.

As an independent, Anderson needed 41,719 signatures, almost twice as many as a third party.

The Citizens Party said it might sue to wipe out Texas' tough petition requirements, and Libertarians — who paid hired help an average of 50 cents per name to collect signatures — also were unhappy about it.

Libertarians, led by presidential candidate Ed Clark, turned in petitions they said contained 60,000 signatures, far more than they needed.

Anderson's Texas chairman, Houston lawyer Sam Guiberson, brought his candidate's petitions in the red and white "Vanderson" used in the signature drive.

Strake has until Sept. 30 to certify that petitions met Texas' requirements but said he would try to finish validating them sooner than that. He said his staff would pull a 1 percent sample and make sure voter registration numbers were correct and also verify that signers did not vote in the Republican presidential primary.

Strake has interpreted state law as prohibiting persons who voted in the GOP primary — but not Democratic primary voters — from signing Anderson petitions. Attorney General Mark White says Democratic voters also were barred from signing.

Democrats are expected to sue to block Strake's certification of Anderson, whose candidacy is expected to drain away Texas votes from President Carter but have little effect on Ronald Reagan.

Anderson might face another legal hurdle if he is certified for the Texas ballot. He has not chosen a running mate but had to list one on his Texas application, so Milton S. Eisenhower — Ike's brother — was listed.

Guiberson said Texas courts have not ruled on whether independent presidential candidates may change running mates.

Strake, a Republican, had some kind words for Anderson's petition campaign.

"It was an important indication that Texans feel they not only have the right to vote but can petition to get their man on the ballot," Strake said.

Kennedy warns against U.S. turn to 'Reaganism'

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the Republican Party ready to nominate Ronald Reagan for president, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy is offering a grim prediction of what four years of "Reaganism" would mean for the country.

"You know the Reagan philosophy," the Massachusetts senator told the International Union of Police Associations on Monday.

"With great fervor and few specifics, Reaganism promises to turn out the lights in Washington, roll back the federal budget and wind down the federal government."

Kennedy, still hoping for a miracle that will make him the Democratic presidential nominee, coupled his blast at Reagan with his standard warning that his own party must offer a real alternative if they expect to retain the White House this fall.

"In 1980, we must not bend to the wind of Reaganism — or sail in Reagan's wake. For then we will surely finish behind in the race this fall," said Kennedy, who flew to Washington from his home on Cape Cod to deliver the speech, and flew back again immediately afterwards.

The speech was in keeping with Kennedy's recent pattern of campaigning as he maintains his longshot challenge to the president. The Massachusetts senator has spent much of the last several weeks on Cape Cod, surfacing every couple of days for a speech, designed to keep his name and his candidacy before the public.

Carter, formerly a chief target of Kennedy's campaign rhetoric, was not mentioned by name in the address to the police association.

Instead, Reagan and the convention nominating him for president were the new villains.

"We will hear flights of oratory at the Republican Convention assailing the federal budget," Kennedy declared. "But if they ever get their platform off the ground, its planks will come crashing down on you and other hard-working, middle-income Americans."

"Their orators will proclaim that we can spend billions more on overkill and pay for it by slashing billions from essential domestic goals," he said. "Will they make deeper cuts in revenue sharing and aid to states and cities? Will they take it out of health and education and housing?"

There may be some bruised feelings among Texas GOP

DETROIT (AP) — There may be some bruised feelings among longtime Republican local leaders, but statewide directors of the Ronald Reagan campaign say they intend to arrange party workers however they feel necessary to win in November in Texas.

"Some indeed will have lesser roles in the campaign and some will have larger," said Gov. Bill Clements, state chairman for Reagan.

He was backed up by Ernest Angelo, Midland, state campaign director for Reagan, and State GOP Chairman Chet Upham, Mineral Wells.

The three top leaders called a news conference Monday after it was learned that 77 Texas delegates and alternates met Sunday night in an unannounced session to discuss Reagan's general election campaign.

Some delegates said there was a grassroots feeling, particularly in north and south Texas, that the developing general election campaign might drop some local leaders who had supported the party for years.

Afterwards, Jesse Brookshire, Texarkana, who presided at the unofficial caucus, said "it was basically a lack of communication," which was directed mostly at had two caucuses sche-

duled today, one including an appearance by Nancy Reagan, wife of the expected GOP presidential nominee.

Clements quickly let the Monday news conference know who was in charge of the November campaign for Reagan.

"There is no question of who is chairman of the Reagan drive in Texas. You're looking at him. I'm it," he said, glaring at reporters.

Later the Republican governor said that "for people to be concerned at this point (about campaign organization) is not helpful."

Angelo said that the Reagan organization that won 52 percent of the presidential primary vote, and 61 of the 80 delegates, had been disbanded. The makeup of the new organization for the general election has not been announced.

"I expect most if not all of those who helped us in the primary will have a part in the fall campaign," he said, "but there will be other people too. No decision has been made who will be involved. Maybe we will know something next week."

Clements said the general election campaign must be "so much broader than the primary campaign," which was directed mostly at regular Republican

Party members and political conservatives.

He said there would be eight regions set up to cover rural areas of Texas plus four metropolitan regions for Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth.

"There also will be a very aggressive organization for Democrats and independents," he said.

He estimated the Reagan campaign for November would cost between \$2 million and \$2.25 million, with \$600,000 from the national GOP office.

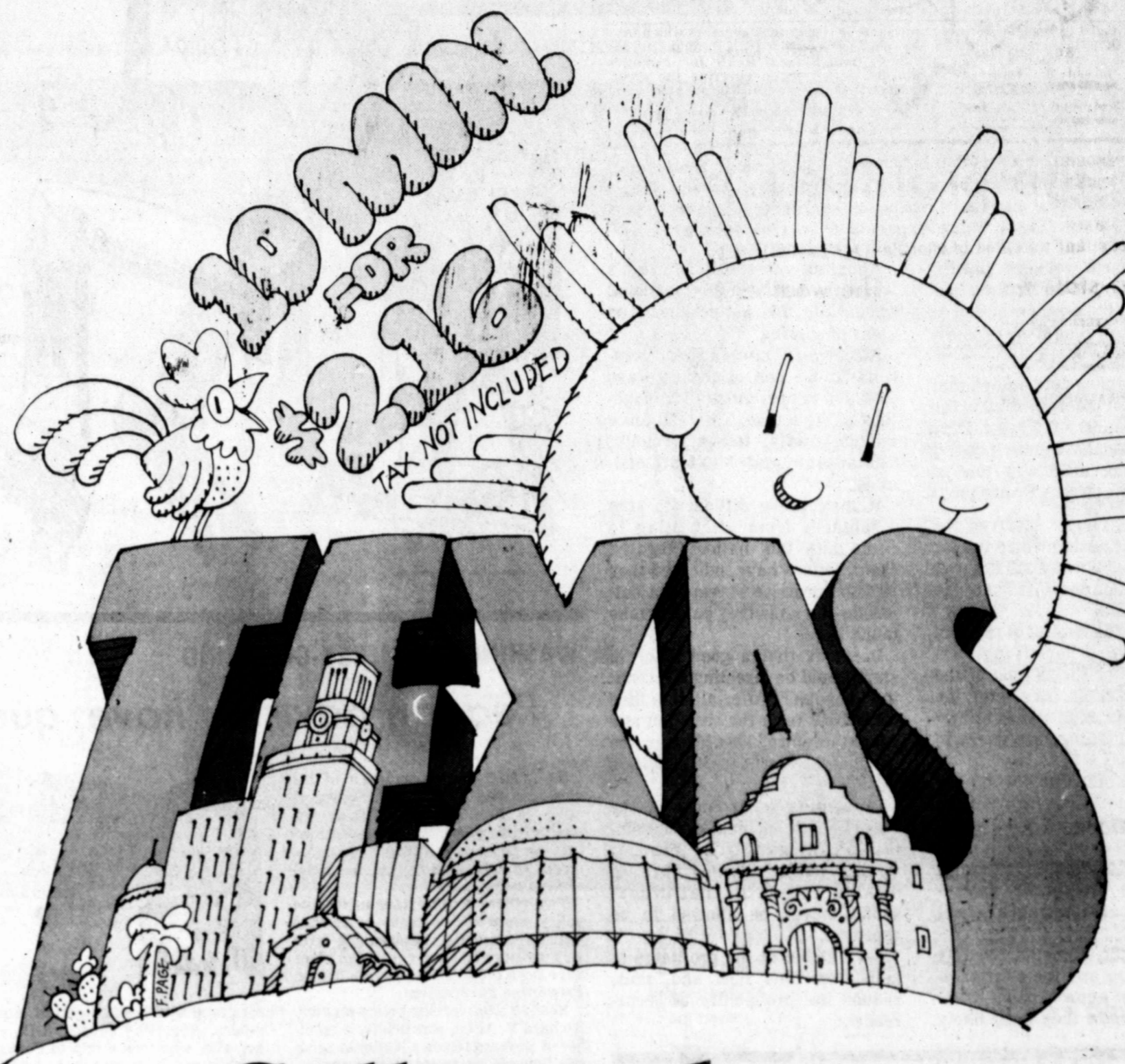
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Stop the profiteers

The tragedy that unfolded over the July Fourth weekend and the week following in an Arizona desert points up the need for action on the problem of illegal entry to the United States.

It has now been determined that at least 13 Salvadorans died in the scorching sand of Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument desert while making their way toward Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Another 14 people survived the grisly ordeal during which the air temperature reached 110 degrees and the soil temperature soared to 150.

Details of the deaths of the Salvadorans were horrifying. Responsibility for the deaths of the victims, it seems, lies with the "coyotes," the men who profit by illegally smuggling foreigners to this nation.

It is those individuals who prey on other human beings to make an illegal profit. Certainly all those who contract to come to the United States illegally via Mexico — or virtually any other way — know they are taking a giant risk.

They face the elements, the ugly side of nature and the ever-present reality of apprehension. If located they know they most likely

will face deportation. Apparently they still believe it's worth the risk. The flow of illegal aliens into this nation shows no signs of slowing.

Already an international commission has met to discuss ways in which to prevent similar tragedies in the future. The task force included state, federal, county, Salvadoran and Mexican officials.

It may prove difficult to stop foreigners from attempting to come into this nation illegally. Their actions have indicated they feel the promise of America outweighs the risks they have to take to get here.

It seems that a good place to start would be directing efforts at the "coyotes." After all, it is they who profit from the situation and who, therefore, should bear the brunt of the legal penalties in such instances.

Preventing recurrences of the July Fourth incident is a commendable goal. The kind of human suffering described in news accounts of that ordeal should never be allowed to be repeated.

Let's strike at the profiteers to help stem this flow and, thus, reduce the probability of recurrences.

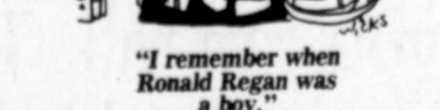

Reagan advisers have questionable ties

DETROIT — As evidence of his well-heralded gift for picking expert advisers, Ronald Reagan has chosen an erstwhile publicist for former Portuguese colonial interests — a registered foreign agent — as his chief foreign policy aide.

Two others on the Reagan foreign policy team are current or former registered agents representing Israel. Two more Reagan campaign aides have been identified as agents for the Taiwanese government.

Reagan's top foreign policy mentor, Richard V. Allen, was briefly a member of Richard Nixon's National Security Council. He fostered the impression that he was a Ph.D., and liked to be called "Dr. Allen." When it turned out that his doctoral thesis for the University of Munich had not yet been accepted, he reluctantly took a downgrading to just plain "Mr. Allen."

Allen abruptly departed the National Security Council in 1969, sources told his reporters Lucette Lagnado and Joe Spear, because of a personality conflict with Dr. Henry Kissinger (a genuine Ph.D.). Allen was later accused of having pressured the Grumman Corp. for contributions to Nixon's 1972 campaign, a charge he denied when called before a congressional subcommittee.

Allen's Portuguese connection began in 1973 when he registered as a foreign agent for a trade association known as the Overseas Companies of Portugal. This was a consortium of major Portuguese companies with major investments in the then colonies of Angola and Mozambique.

The consortium paid Allen \$60,000 a year to promote its interests. The companies hoped to persuade Americans — or at least Congress — to support the Portuguese dictatorship's determination to hold onto its increasingly restive African colonies. One of Allen's projects was a "foreign visi-

tors program," which netted, among others, Rep. Phil Crane, R-Ill., and his wife, who took a trip to Portugal, Angola and Mozambique in 1974.

Allen's efforts were in vain. The dictatorship collapsed in 1974 and the Portuguese empire crumbled, as did the business consortium that had propped it up.

The other former or current foreign agents in the Reagan camp are Uri Ra'anun, who represented Israel in the United States from 1959 to 1964; Rita Hauser, a New York attorney who is still a registered agent for Bank Hapoalim of Israel; Michael Deaver and Peter Hannaford, who are registered agents for the government of Taiwan.

Footnote: Allen confirmed that he was an agent for the Portuguese consortium and he was not a Ph.D., saying "I can't help what people call me." Ra'anun said he wasn't really a foreign agent, because at the time he was a diplomat and an Israeli citizen. Hauser, Deaver and Hannaford confirmed their status as foreign agents.

MIGHT-HAVE-BEEN: What if a tiny fraction of the American electorate had voted the other way — or stayed home — in 1976? How would Gerald Ford have handled the foreign and domestic crises that have beset Jimmy Carter?

Key to judging candidates: character — not experience

A friend of mine suggested recently that if I were writing a technical manual on the operation of a tractor I'd find a way to slip in a few words of criticism of President Jimmy Carter.

He's probably right, not that I dislike our commander in chief personally, but he is, for sure, the worst president in the history of the republic.

At least I am consistent. Way back in 1976 when my big city journalistic cousins were writing profound analyses about the new kid on the political block, I warned my readers that James Earl was a liar, a liberal and an opportunist. If anything, I understated my case.

There is a simple key to understanding politicians that a lot of famous and well-paid folks have yet to find. That key is to realize that the oath of office is not a magical incantation that can transform a saint into a scoundrel or a scoundrel into an angel.

Winning a political race does not alter the candidate. Whatever he was before the vote was counted, he remains after the inauguration. I suppose some people are fooled by campaigns. In a campaign, everything a candidate does and says has been pre-calculated to give a predetermined impression. This premeditated

deception works because most journalists are lazy.

I was able to predict accurately Jimmy Carter's performance as president because I went to the trouble of locating people who knew him before he became a presidential candidate. He has done as president exactly what he did as governor and as a state senator and as a small businessman.

Jimmy Carter was never the poor boy his campaign fiction portrayed. He was, by the standards of Plains, Ga., the town's rich kid the other boys beat up. Even in 1976, when he was cooking fish and playing softball for the benefit of network television reporters, he had a net worth nearly two times larger than Jerry Ford's and regularly socialized with the likes of David Rockefeller.

The campaign image created for Jimmy Carter was a deliberate deception of the American people. Carter has always been a person who would brazenly say anything which would help him achieve his goal with no regard for the truth. He is energetic, disciplined and ruthless but he is not compassionate, he is not courageous, he is not honest, nor is he well-intentioned.

That is important to understand because the 1980 image being constructed for his re-election campaign is of a kind, honest well-intentioned man whose problems were the result of his inexperience. A campaign image is a carefully constructed argument. They are saying his mistakes were due only to inexperience. He has gained experience. His expected opponent, Ronald Reagan, has no experience.

If you analyze Carter's mistakes, you will see for yourself that they do not result from inexperience, but from his character. Lies, vacillation, demagoguery, concessions to the Soviets, decisions to cancel or delay defense weapons systems are not mistakes of inexperience.

The mortal conflict between the United States and the Soviet Union has been the single most important task of every president since 1945. Carter has handled our end of that conflict disastrously.

The point is nobody who aspires to be president can honestly claim ignorance of the nature of that conflict or of the nature of the Soviet Union after three decades of it dominating not only our government but our private lives as well.

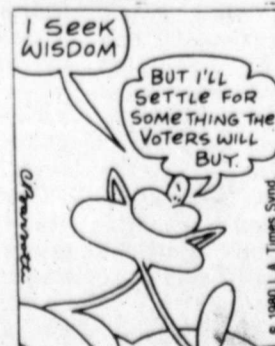
Yet Carter and his image-makers would have you believe that he just didn't know how bad they were until Afghanistan. If a majority of American voters buy that baloney, then after 204 years we will know at last that Hamilton was right and Jefferson was wrong. People are too dumb to govern themselves.

Negative tone of GOP platform blamed on tradition

By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK

DETROIT — The negative tone coming out of the Republican Platform Committee's deliberations is blamed by key members of the committee on ritualistic insistence by the committee chairman, Sen. John Tower of Texas, that traditional procedures be maintained.

Tower proved a strong committee chairman, keeping much tighter control of the platform process than Gov. Robert Ray of Iowa did in 1976. But Tower stubbornly rejected pleas by several subcommittee chairmen to make public the platform's early drafts. They always had been kept secret in the past, and Tower (whose service on Platform Committees dates back to 1964) refused to change the practice.

The economic and defense planks and all other material agreed upon were kept secret. Therefore, all publicity was concentrated on the successful right-wing fights against the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) and abortion. On Thursday, Rep. Trent Lott of Mississippi finally prevailed on Tower to release publicly copies of the platform. But it was too late to avoid headlines on abortion and ERA.

ERA TROUBLE

Although Reagan operatives see the hand of Rep. John Anderson's independent campaign in the platform trouble over ERA, it was hard-nosed conservatives who really torpedoed any hope of avoiding a fight over women's rights.

Dr. Martin Anderson, Ronald Reagan's top agent on the platform, had agreed to one compromise that came close to endorsing ERA without actually taking that step. But conservatives on the committee would have no part of it.

Nevertheless, Reaganites claim the hand of the Anderson campaign was felt inside the Platform Committee. They charge that the women's rights lobbyists who work up the atmosphere to make a fight unavoidable intended to keep the issue hot in Detroit in order to hurt Reagan and help Anderson.

A footnote: President Carter's one-day visit to Detroit inadvertently eclipsed publicity about ERA and abortion. But once the president left Detroit, the bad news returned to front pages.

KEMP VS. HELMS

Efforts by Rep. Jack Kemp of New York to use the Platform Committee proceedings as a booster for his vice presidential prospects got some unintended help from an unusual source: Sen. Jesse Helms of North Carolina.

Actually, friends of Helms were still pursuing his long shot campaign for vice president. Tom Ellis, Helms' closest political adviser and campaign manager, had long planned to bring a minority platform report to the convention floor as a vehicle to publicize Helms. To this end, Helms clashed with Kemp inside the Platform Committee on a variety of foreign and economic issues.

The result was help for Kemp's campaign to show he is no far-out conservative. Kemp consistently took the moderate position against Helms, for example favoring free trade over protection. "It's easy to come over as a moderate when you have Jesse to your right," one Kemp insider said.

GOP VS LABOR

Rep. Jack Kemp only partially succeeded in his backstage efforts to keep the Republican platform free from its usual labor-baiting.

Seeking to "put behind us any tendency to emphasize our differences with labor," Kemp privately submitted a revised labor plank to the Platform Committee. Some of what he proposed was adopted, but he failed to remove the usual reaffirmation of the Taft-Hartley law's section 14(b), which permits state "right-to-work" laws.

However, conservatives who wanted the platform to endorse a national "right-to-work" law (banning compulsory unionism) also failed. Reagan aides talked them out of submitting the amendment, which would have spawned an epidemic of labor-baiting in the committee.

Majority interest in 12th largest bank to be sold

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Majority interest in Crocker National Bank, the nation's 12th largest, will be sold to a British bank, a Crocker official says.

Ward Stevenson, Crocker's senior vice president, said final arrangements for the sale were reached last Monday between officials of Crocker National Corp., the bank's holding company, and Midland Bank Ltd. of London, England's third largest bank with assets of \$4.7 billion.

Under the agreement, Midland would acquire 51 percent of Crocker's stock by buying \$495 million in new common stock from Crocker, or 3 1/2 million shares at \$90, and tendering another 6 1/2 million shares at book value, subject to approval by both banks boards and stockholders and U.S. banking authorities.

Midland will pay no more than \$50 a share for the 6 1/2 million existing common on shares, Stevenson said. The bank sale will not be completed until after the tender offer is made, which could take as long as 12-15 months, he said.

Crocker, California's fourth largest bank, has assets totaling \$16.9 billion and 370 branches in California. "The significant thing is that we get the proceeds of 3 1/2 million shares right off the bat, as soon as the existing stock is tendered," Stevenson said. "The key is the infusion of capital to Crocker."

The NYSE's composite index climbed .25 to 68.93, while the American Stock Exchange market value index slipped .01 to 310.11. Both those indicators closed Monday at all-time highs.

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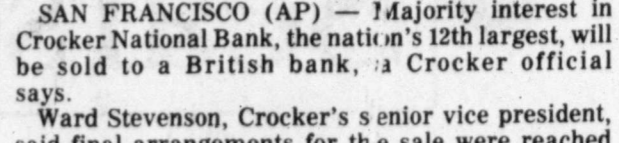

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Billy Carter registers as foreign agent

WASHINGTON (AP) — After receiving almost a quarter of a million dollars from Libya, Billy Carter, brother of the president of the United States, is officially a foreign agent for the radical Arab government.

By signing a consent order agreeing to register Monday, President Carter's outspoken younger brother resolved a civil suit by the Justice Department and avoided any legal penalties or fines.

While denying any wrongdoing, he revealed that he has received \$220,000 from Libya as partial payment on a \$500,000 loan he said he requested in return for his services during the past two years.

The registration statement said Billy Carter isn't currently involved in any activities on behalf of Libya and has none under consideration.

In a complaint filed in U.S. District Court, the government said Billy Carter "undertook a propaganda campaign" for Libya in this country and acted in a variety of ways "to promote Libyan foreign policy objectives."

The younger Carter was unavailable for comment Monday, and White House officials said President Carter would have no comment.

At the Republican National Convention in Detroit,

Sen. William Roth, R-Del., called the revelations "absolutely outrageous." He said he will seek a full investigation by the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee to determine if, "as an undisclosed agent for the Libyan government, Billy Carter has had any improper influence on government policy."

Billy Carter's dealings with the oil-rich North African nation headed by Moammar Khadafy dates to a 1978 visit to the country. He returned last August during the 10th anniversary of the Libyan revolution

and since then has organized a group called the Libyan-Arab-Georgia Friendship Society.

The Justice Department complaint noted that Billy Carter played host to the delegation of Libyan officials visiting the United States and has acted as an intermediary between U.S. business interests and Libyan officials. By engaging in such activity, the department said, Billy Carter must be considered an agent of a foreign government and by law must register as such.

Exes upset with Miller removal

DALLAS (AP) — Texas A&M's Association of Former Students has voiced disapproval with the way Jarvis Miller was removed as president of the university.

The association's board in a special meeting Monday said the association is the first to hear "complaints or who receive critical mail" concerning the actions of any A&M official.

Regents removed Jarvis from office last Thursday, saying the school had received mail and phone calls critical of the president.

Miller has been offered the job of special assistant

to A&M System Chancellor Frank Hubert. However, Miller's clashes with Hubert are believed partly responsible for his ouster.

"We have neither heard any complaints nor have we received any mail critical of... Miller covering the administration of Texas A&M University," the alumni board said Monday in statement released at a news conference.

Board President Raul Fernandez of San Antonio said Miller's removal was "ill-timed, ill conceived and effectuated without any planning or thought of the consequences or the future."

Lawyers argue to drop Hustler case

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Lawyers in New Hampshire newspaper publisher William Loeb's \$10 million libel suit against Hustler magazine are locked in a battle over a move to dismiss the case.

Attorney Tom Tyack argued Monday at a hearing that a March 1977 profile of the 74-year-old Loeb was malicious and designed to discredit his client.

But lawyers for Hustler publisher Larry Flynt asked Franklin County Common Pleas Judge Frederick Williams to dismiss the case because similar suits filed by Loeb against other publishing enterprises have been dismissed.

Flynt's lawyer C. William Brownfield argued that "Whether he likes it or not, William Loeb, by thrusting himself into the most heated vortex of public opinion, has indeed become fair game for the most critical and hard-bitten criticism of his personality and public doings."

"He cannot be permitted to use the threat of lawsuit to inhibit such expressions of free speech, whether the offending words have been published in Time magazine, or in the likes of Hustler."

But Tyack said malice was intended in Hustler's story, based on a book by a former Manchester Union Leader reporter. Loeb owns the Union Leader.

The article was based on the book, "Who the Hell is William Loeb?" by Kevin Cash. Cash sued Loeb after the Union Leader printed an editorial saying the book was filled with lies and innuendos. The civil action and a countersuit filed by Loeb eventually were dismissed.

If Williams refuses to grant the summary judgment, the case will be set for trial.

Brownfield said a dismissal would be justified because suits by Loeb against New Times magazine and The Boston Globe in connection with articles printed about him were dismissed. Judges ruled no malice was involved in the stories.

Actors OK strike of film-TV industry

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Leaders of the 46,000-member Screen Actors Guild will be armed with a July 20 strike authorization when they resume talks Wednesday with movie and television producers on a new three-year contract, according to a union spokesman.

Meanwhile, the 44,000-member American Federation of Television and Radio Artists also was expected to give strike sanction to its leadership in regional membership meetings Thursday, an AFTRA spokesman reported Monday.

A strike would virtually paralyze the nation's film industry, particularly its network television. Production has been under way here since June on the fall television season, but some series have just begun.

When contacted Monday, the primary producers' organization, the Association of Motion Picture and Television Producers, had no comment on a possible strike.

SAG spokeswoman Kim Fellner said that of 12,000 ballots received by Monday, the final day of

tabulating, 92 percent favored a strike.

Alan Davis, national director of AFTRA's western region, said Monday that on July 11 the directors of the union's eastern section recommended a strike "if and when it becomes necessary."

They instructed eastern locals meet to authorize such action.

AFTRA's 20,000 Hollywood members will meet Thursday, Davis said. Talks were recessed June 30 with both sides far apart on money issues after more than a month of bargaining.

"The outstanding issues to be resolved when talks resume are still all those that impact on economics — the pay TV area and all the economic issues," Ms. Fellner said Monday.

But, she added, "strike continues to be a last resort."

SAG seeks 40 percent across-the-board pay increase, plus a piece of the producers' gross from pay TV shows.

The two unions are bargaining jointly this year for the first time.

Gun control linked to suicide rate

Dear Dr. Solomon: A few weeks ago we heard the shocking news that a friend of ours had committed suicide by shooting himself. We don't know what was troubling him, and that's not the point of this letter. But we can't help thinking that if the gun had not been so readily available, he might still be alive today. Your comments would be appreciated. — Mr. and Mrs. K.J.C.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I have finally decided to undergo cosmetic surgery, a decision I have been debating for some time. Having resolved one problem, however, I'm faced with another. The doctor to whom I was referred wants to do the operation in his office on an out-patient basis — in other words, I'll be in and out within a matter of hours. I don't particularly enjoy being in a hospital, but my primary consideration is my well-being. How can surgery be performed safely and efficiently in an office? — Kay.

Dear Kay: While your concern is understandable, one-day out-patient surgery is no longer a rare event. A number of procedures, including plastic surgery, vasectomies, and dilation and curettage, can be performed on an out-patient basis as safely and efficiently as in an office.

This should not be construed as a blanket endorsement of all same-day surgery centers. But out-patient facilities can be equipped so that a skilled surgeon can handle selected patients as if they were hospitalized, and at much less cost in both time and money.

Dr. Bernard McGibbon, who practices office

surgery in Maryland, places a great deal of stress on patient selection. For those seeking cosmetic surgery, he insists on a series of studies that include an electrocardiogram and blood tests, a general physical examination, and a psychiatric evaluation. If the tests are at all equivocal, he will not perform the surgery in his office.

These precautions help make office surgery both economical and convenient. In addition, it often tends to promote faster healing and assures the patient a greater degree of privacy that is possible in a hospital.

Shah's health has taken sudden turn for worse

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Deposed Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi's health has taken a sudden turn for the worse, a leading Egyptian newspaper said today. Spokesmen for the exiled Iranian monarch disputed part of the account, but one acknowledged that a "serious" situation could develop.

The new problem is an infection in Pahlavi's left leg, the spokesman said.

The semi-official Al Ahram newspaper said his "temperature rose suddenly" Monday night and reached 102.2 degrees Fahrenheit, indicating "there may be another abscess" like the infection that forced his hospitalization and subsequent surgery last month.

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Al Ahram said Pahlavi's condition was "delicate. It's not a desperate situation, but the doctors are anxious and are taking all precautions."

My idea included the basics: putting things in boxes, sorting, cutting grass, running errands, hanging things on hangers, growing up, doing homework, clearing the table, helping the elderly and developing an attitude toward social change.

The problem is that children are taught to be spectators from the moment they are born.

We stand over their cribs entertaining them with funny faces, hide behind our hands and try to scare them half to death, put a rattle in each hand and dance, sing to them, give monologues while we change diapers, play games when we feed them, and tell them stories when we bed them down at night.

Their potty chairs have recordings in them, their cribs have twirling mobiles, their chairs have springs and wheels, their car seats have horns and steering wheels, their eating bowls have pictures in the bottom, their dolls talk and their pillows squeak.

As they get older, math becomes a game and athletics become a spectator sport. They don't live life ... they're an audience for it.

The cure for "There's nothing to do" should be obvious. Always keep a list of chores on hand to fill the void. After awhile my children got so fed up with my suggestions, they'd be halfway through, "There's nothing ... " get a stricken look on their faces and finish with, "I'd like better than to chat, but I've got a busy day."

How did I get so wise? That solution worked so well when my husband used it on me ... I decided to use it on the kids.

Woman to be tried on charge of conspiring to kill witness

TITUSVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Priscilla Bradford, accused with two other women of killing her husband with a frying pan, was going to court today to face charges of plotting to kill a prosecution witness.

Jury selection was scheduled in Brevard County Circuit Court for the trial of Mrs. Bradford, 36, on charges of conspiracy to murder and solicitation to murder. Janice Gould, 34, and Joyce Cummings, 18, are to be tried separately on the same charges. The three women have pleaded innocent to all charges.

The three also are charged with first-degree murder in the March 28 death of Dr. John Bradford, 53. The optometrist owned an optical laboratory in near-by Melbourne, where the defendants worked.

Prosecutors say the conspiracy charges stem from an alleged scheme the women concocted in jail to arrange the slaying of Tracy Smith, 21, a fellow employee and key state witness.

Ursula Mattox, 32, was serving time for writing bad checks when the three women were locked up at the Brevard County Jail. Miss Mattox said they approached her about hiring someone to kill Ms. Smith.

Police said they later recovered instructions, allegedly written by Mrs. Bradford, for paying a hit man. On May 15, police say they watched the mothers of two of the defendants drop off \$2,000, according to instructions, at a local restaurant. Neither mother was charged.

Mrs. Bradford had filed for divorce on Feb. 15, after four years of marriage, saying she

feared for her safety. The couple continued living and working together, but Melbourne police records show numerous domestic disturbance calls from their home.

On the day of the slaying, Bradford's counter-suit for divorce arrived at the Brevard County Courthouse.

Mrs. Bradford "had attacked, hit and beaten and threatened to kill respondent (Bradford)," it stated. "Respondent is in fear of his life."

Police said that on March 28, the doctor was beaten in his kitchen with a 12-inch cast-iron skillet, two apothecary jars, a bar stool and an antique cast-iron bottle capper — a device for capping home brew. The bottom of the skillet had popped out and split into

seven pieces when officers found it. Depositions allege that the slaying was witnessed by Mrs. Bradford's 14-year-old daughter, Eden. The girl told prosecutors that at one point, her mother allegedly handed her the bottle-capper and said, "Keep hitting him! Anywhere!"

Bradford was struck 15 times and his jaw broken twice, said pathologist Dr. James B. Adamson, and died of asphyxiation after his tongue blocked his airway.

Miss Gould and Miss Cummings, who had been swimming in the Bradfords' pool, said they acted in self-defense with Mrs. Bradford after Bradford allegedly grabbed the bottle capper and said he was going to kill his wife.

Heat wave still blanketing South

As the skyrocketing death toll topped 600 in the nation's three-week-old heat wave, police in Atlanta blared warnings over loudspeakers urging people to leave home for cool shelters and an army of Red Cross volunteers in Kansas City delivered fans to the poor and elderly languishing in Missouri's deadly heat.

Missouri's governor placed the National Guard on alert and declared a state of emergency Monday as the state's heat-related deaths mounted to 131.

"Missourians are suffering and dying," said Gov. Joseph Teasdale, who is seeking \$5 million to \$8 million in federal aid to provide fans for the poor and old.

Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton also declared a state of emergency as hundreds of miles of highway buckled and melted and farmers assessed cattle and crop losses in the millions of dollars. He has requested \$11.7 million in federal aid for the highway system.

The heat wave has claimed 91 lives

in Arkansas, and in an unusual weekend accident, a Little Rock girl was burned when she was sprayed with water from an outdoor hose that had been in the sunlight, doctors said.

The death toll in 16 states that have sweltered in unrelenting heat stood at 614 Tuesday, according to an unofficial count by The Associated Press.

Heat and drought have killed millions of chickens in Arkansas and Florida, where citrus crops also are showing signs of stress. In West Texas, cattlemen are selling herds early as pastureland bakes. And without rain, the Illinois corn crop may be stunted, agronomists say.

As the mercury in Kansas City reached 109 degrees Monday — above 100 for the 13th time in 15 days — Al Cohn, a 25-year Red Cross veteran, and his partner, Larry Widener, drove door-to-door delivering fans.

"We've been in some houses that are so hot that I just can't believe people are staying there," Cohn said. "They're sealed up. Their windows and doors are shut. Old people don't want to leave their homes, their cats and dogs. And they're afraid someone will break in. They just don't want to leave and you can't force them."

"Old people ... don't realize that their body temperature is going up ... they lay down to go to sleep and they don't wake up," he said.

Since the distribution program began Friday, about 1,000 electric fans have been donated to the Red Cross and Salvation Army and some 300 have been delivered.

One Missourian who got a fan Monday was Willie Haney, a 72-year-old widow who lives alone with her dog and keeps her windows shut for fear of burglars. "I've never had heat like this before in my life," she said.

Another fan went to Ernestine Serell, who lives in a small frame house with her 15-month-old son, her mother and four brothers and sisters.

Her baby has "been breaking out with heat bumps," Mrs. Serell said, and everyone in the family "has been getting sick and throwing up" because of the heat.

In Georgia, where 45 people have died in the heat, officials declared a state of emergency in Macon, Floyd County and Valdosta, where the temperature was 108 degrees Monday.

"I have never seen it so hot before in my life," said Moudie James as she lay on a stretcher at the Macon Coliseum, where some 150 people sought refuge from the heat. "I didn't have no way to keep cool. My fan had done run hot. It wasn't putting out anything but hot smoke. I'll celebrate my 72nd birthday this Thursday, the good Lord willing."

Death toll climbs in South; Tornadoes rake Kansas area

The death toll has topped 600 as the unrelenting heat wave grips the South and Southwest, and thunderstorms produced high winds and tornadoes in Kansas.

The governors in Missouri and in Arkansas declared states of emergency as heat-related deaths mounted and cattle and crop losses rose.

Thunderstorms were scattered over the Rockies with thunderstorms over Ohio and northern Florida.

More showers were expected from the upper Ohio Valley across the northern Atlantic Coast from New England into New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Southern Florida, the upper Missouri Valley and the northern Pacific Coast also were expected to get rain. Forecasters said temperatures would remain unseasonably hot

over most of the nation except for the southern California coast, southern Florida and from Montana to upper Michigan.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 a.m. EDT ranged from 52 degrees in Butte, Mont., to 94 degrees in Topeka, Kan.

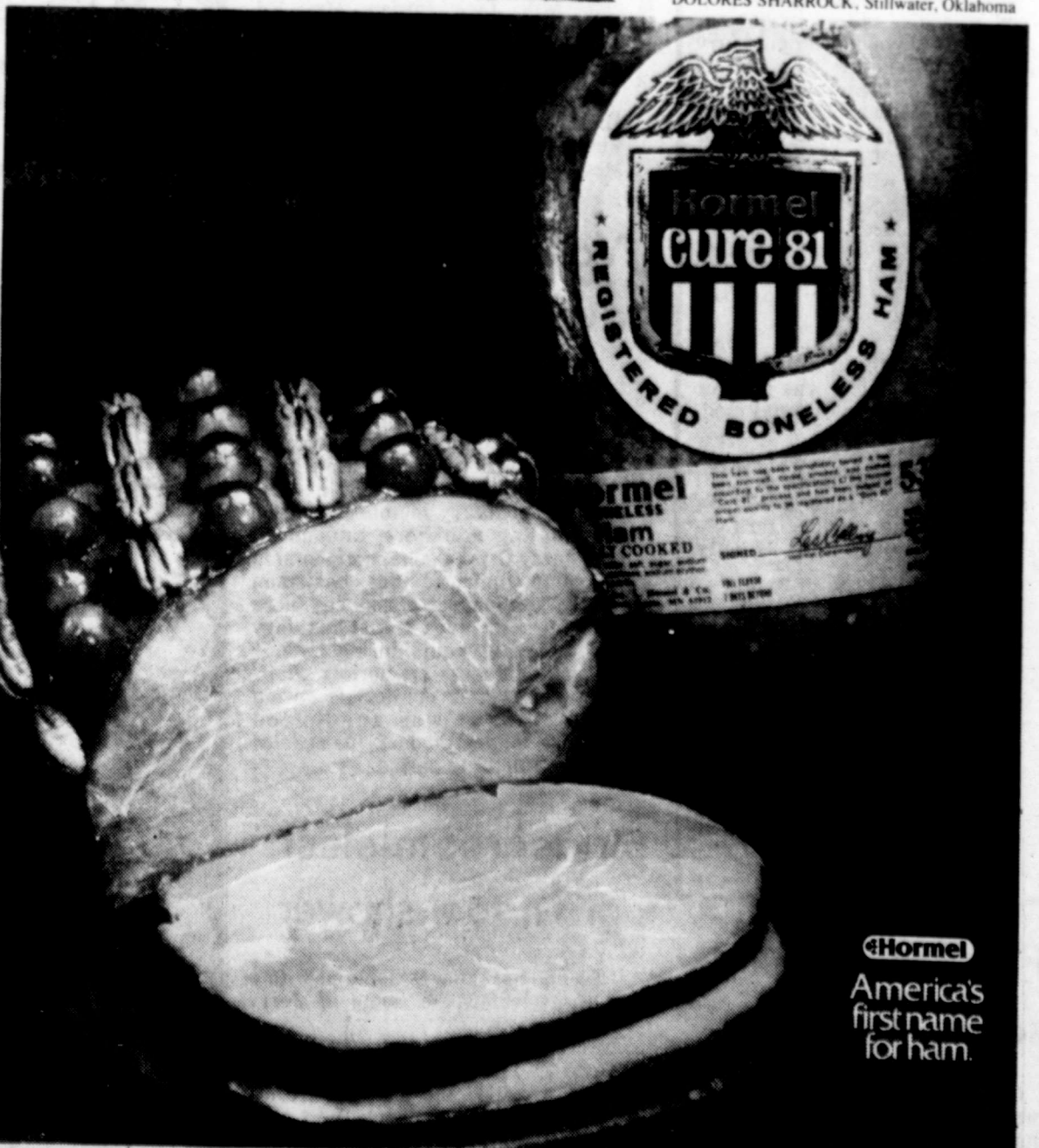

Lubbock police seek two suspects in slayings of four outside pool hall

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Police searched today for two men wanted in connection with the slayings of four men, including three members of a family, outside a small East Lubbock pool hall.

Detectives said the shootings apparently arose from a fist fight. Several persons were questioned Monday, but no arrests were made.

The suspects were described as Mexican-Americans in their early 20s, police said. Witnesses told officers the pair fled in a late model white-and-maroon Ford.

Police said several Hispanic men entered the hall Sunday night and followed several patrons outside, where shots were fired.

The victims were identified as Geronimo Cavarrubio and Leo Cavarrubio, owner of the pool hall, both in their 60s; Jim Cavarrubio, 20, son

of Geronimo Cavarrubio, and Willie Guerra, 20.

The elder men were pronounced dead outside the pool hall, and the younger men died at Lubbock General Hospital about an hour after the shooting, police said.

One of the younger men was found mortally wounded in a low-income housing area across from the pool hall, officers said. Police found a .38-caliber pistol near the residential area.

Preliminary autopsy results showed the victims suffered wounds from small, medium and large caliber weapons, police said, indicating as many as four or five weapons may have been used in the assault.

Geronimo Cavarrubio had been indicted recently for attempted murder in connection with another bar room shoot-out, police said.

City sales tax rebate jumps

Midland's sales tax rebate for July jumped more than \$80,000 over the amount received last year, according to figures released by the State Comptroller's Office.

The refund of the one-cent sales tax will amount to \$285,105.08, compared to \$204,504.32 last year.

For the first seven months of this year, Midland's rebates already are 45 percent above the amount received last year. 1980 payments to date are \$2,944,409.09, compared to \$2,026,674.51 last year.

Odessa's sales tax rebate also has increased. For July, the city will receive \$319,658.60 compared to \$306,460.11.

Payments for the year to date are up 18 percent, according to the comptroller's office. Thus far, Odessa has received \$3,340,032.76 compared to \$2,813,815.38 in 1979.

The optional one-cent city sales tax is collected with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated on a monthly basis by the comptroller's office.

With book in, East looked around for the setting trick. It did not seem likely that it would come from clubs, and if West held the ace of diamonds it probably wasn't going away. The possibility that West held the king of diamonds was moot, for in that case declarer had the king of clubs and that suit would run.
 Therefore, it was apparent that the setting trick would have to come from the trump suit. If declarer had nine trumps, he would probably play for the drop and East would automatically score

the setting trick. But if declarer held only eight trumps, he would rely on the finesse.
 East worked out, though that if West held the nine of trumps, the defenders could assure a trump trick. At trick four, East led the thirteenth spade. If South ruffed high, East's queen of hearts would become promoted. But declarer chose to sluff a club, and West put his nine of hearts to good use by ruffing. Dummy was forced to over-ruff with an honor, and now East could not be stopped from collecting a trump for the setting trick.

 Since he was going to game anyway, South chose to respond in his major suit rather than in his strong minor. North had a natural raise, and South would have been wiser simply to close the auction in the major suit game.

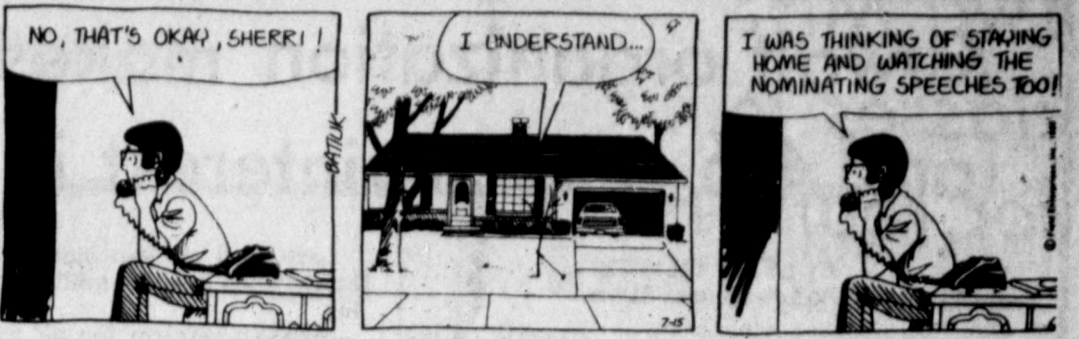

Kuwait organization makes offer for 14.6 percent interest in Getty

LOS ANGELES — In a move that could make it the first Arab country to own a substantial part of a large U.S. oil company, Kuwait has offered to purchase nearly 12 million common shares, or 14.6 percent, of Getty Oil Co. for \$982 million, the Los Angeles-based company said Monday.

The \$82-a-share offer, made through the Kuwait Investment Organization of London last Friday, would be the largest single Arab investment in a publicly held U.S. company.

The Kuwaiti government organization would become the second-largest holder of Getty stock. At present, the largest block of stock — 38.7 percent — is held by the Sarah Getty Trust Fund.

The offer was made to the estate of J. Paul Getty and is subject to the completion of a stock purchase agreement with the estate. The offer represents all of the remaining 11,970,340 outstanding shares of Getty's estate.

Getty died June 6, 1976. The Sarah Getty Trust Fund is named after his mother.

In a tersely worded statement, Sidney R. Petersen, Getty Oil's chairman and chief executive officer said: "Our preference would be to see that block of stock more widely distributed. We don't think it is in the best long-term interests of our other stockholders to keep those shares off the market."

The executors of the Getty estate, Title Insurance & Trust Co., and Ronald and Gordon Getty, met here Monday to consider the offer.

"We're still at the stage of asking a lot of questions and I HAVE NO IDEA HOW LONG IT WILL TAKE FOR US TO COME TO A DECISION," SAID William Bell, a vice president of Title Insurance Co., the parent company of Title Insurance & Trust.

Bell said that for approval of the offer, only two out of the three executors must agree to the stock purchase. "But in a decision of this magnitude I think we would want unanimous agreement," he added.

Morgan Stanley & Co., New York-based investment bankers, is representing the Getty estate and a New York law firm reportedly is representing the Kuwait organization. Morgan Stanley refused to comment on the offer.

Last April Morgan Stanley represented the Getty estate when it sold 4 million shares in a public offering.

It was unclear why Kuwait, which has a surplus of \$40 billion, wanted to make the investment in Getty. Until now, most of the Arab money invested in the United States has gone into real estate.

"For an Arab country to invest in an oil company here would be like bringing coal to Newcastle," said Michael Goodwin, an international economist in the Department of Commerce's office of foreign investments.

The Kuwait organization issued a statement in London saying the government of Kuwait wanted the Getty stock "as a portfolio investment and has no present intention to acquire control of the company."

Some industry sources said that Kuwait's primary interest in Getty might reflect the company's exploration and production activities in the so-called neutral zone that runs along the border between Saudi Arabia and Kuwait. Both Saudi Arabia and Kuwait enjoy equal rights to the resources in the zone, which are estimated at 6 billion barrels of crude oil reserves. At present, Getty produces 66,000 barrels of oil a day from three fields in the zone.

In the last couple of years, the OPEC countries have also begun to try to enter the refining and marketing side of the oil business.

"Kuwait is trying to build up its downstream capabilities and Getty offers the marketing and management capabilities," Ms. Goodwin said.

Getty is an integrated oil company with operations in exploration, refining and marketing in 30 states. In 1979 it earned \$604 million on revenues of \$5.12 billion. On news of the offer, the price of Getty stock jumped from \$79.75 to \$81.25 on the New York Stock Exchange.

The Kuwaiti government has made other investments in the United States through the Kuwait Investment Corp., including the \$7.4 million purchase in 1974 of a 10,000-acre island off the coast of South Carolina. The island is now being developed by Kuwait at a total cost of more than \$600 million. The Kuwaiti corporation also has extensive real estate holdings in Atlanta.

In 1978, the investments made by OPEC countries in the United States made up only \$325 million of the total foreign investment in this country of \$40.8 billion. About \$200 million of that OPEC investment was in real estate.

Maralo announces drillsite for Howard County wildcat

R. C. Bennett Co. of Midland No. 1 Jones will be drilled as a 9,000-foot wildcat in Borden County, 18 miles northeast of Gall.

The prospector will be spudded 467 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 670, block 97, H&T survey.

Elevation at ground level is 2,838 feet.

DAWSON PROSPECTOR

A 12,200-foot wildcat has been staked in Dawson County, four miles southwest of Welch.

It is Dinero Operating Co. of Midland No. 1-4 Scanlon.

Drillsite is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 83, block M, EL&RR survey, abstract 308. It is 1/3 mile east of 5,000-foot production in the Welch (San Andres) field and eight miles north of 12,083-foot Devonian production in the Wells pool.

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MHMR to get continued funding

FORT STOCKTON — The Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission Board of Directors approved a resolution to the Department of Health of Human Resources for continued funding for the Midland Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center Friday when it met for its monthly meeting here.

Midland's MHMR is requesting \$154,613 from HHR, as well as other funding including \$309,818 in state funds, \$67,740 in local funds and \$155,000 from other sources.

The Midland MHMR Center presently offers 12 basic services as required by public law 94-63: outpatient, emergency, partial care, consultation and education, children's services, services to the elderly, transitional living services, alcoholism services, drug abuse services, assistance to the courts and follow-up services.

One new program to be offered by the Midland center soon is the screening and referral of employees of area businesses. Industries in Midland will be able to contract with MHMR to screen for employee problems and refer these employees to services to aid them.

In other matters, the board approved resolutions to recommend the following: — An application from W.H. Tolbert Corp. of Odessa to the Veteran's Administration for the approval of the feasibility analysis for the proposed

Quail Run Subdivision in Ector County. — An application from the Northgate Joint Venture to the Federal Housing Administration for the approval of the development of Northgate Subdivision in Midland.

— An application from the City of Fort Stockton to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for second year funding of Comprehensive Community Development Block Grant.

— An application from Community Council of Reeves County to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to purchase two vehicles.

— The appointment of Jim Frost of Odessa, Roger Robles of Midland, Jose Flores of Andrews, and Santos Rodriguez of Andrews to the Permian Basin Area Agency Advisory Council.

— The PBRPC's annual budget for fiscal year 1980-81.

— The site for the next semi-annual meeting in January 1981 to be Kermit.

The Tolbert Corporation's proposed Quail Run Subdivision for western Ector County will include 29 lots to be developed on 15 acres. The homes are to range in price from \$40,000-\$60,000.

The Northgate Subdivision proposed for Midland is to be located in the southeast corner of the Holiday Hill Road/County Road 60 intersection. The Northgate Joint Venture developers plan to sell 250 improved lots of the 79-acre area. An adjacent parcel of

86 acres is also under the developers' control and is planned for an apartment/retail trade area.

Fort Stockton's application to HUD is for \$500,000 for funding of a second year of a three-year \$1.5 million comprehensive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). The southeastern section of the city, composed primarily of low/moderate income families, is the target area for refurbishing. The \$500,000 figure breaks down as follows: \$20,000 for the demolition of approximately 20 substandard structures; \$355,000 for making loans/grants available for the rehabilitation of substandard housing; \$75,000 for relocation payments and assistance for approximately 10 families; and \$50,000 for administrative costs.

Reeves County's application to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is for the purchase of two transportation vehicles. The county is requesting \$15,960 from SDHPT, to be matched by local funds of \$3,990. The vehicles will be used to transport elderly and handicapped citizens to medical services, elderly nutrition programs and sheltered workshops. Low-income persons will also be provided transportation to food stamp purchasing areas and other nutrition sites.

Pecos County Community Action Agency's application to SDHPT is also for two vehicles and is also a request for \$15,960 to be matched by \$3,990 in local funds. The vehicles are also to be used for elderly and handicapped transportation.

Militants publish interview of hostage

The Iranian militants holding the U.S. Embassy in Tehran have published a purported interview with one of their American captives, Thomas Ahern, 48, of Fond du Lac, Wis., in which he admitted being a CIA agent and named two high-level Iranians among his contacts.

The account published in the Tehran newspaper Azadgan said Ahern, a State Department employee who has been accused previously of spying by the militants, told an interviewer he had four Iranian contacts who provided him with details of the Iranian revolution including "information about individuals ... information about Kurdistan ... and brief reports about the leadership and morale in the armed forces."

According to the report, Ahern named two of his sources: Amir Entezam, a former ambassador to the

Scandinavian countries who was jailed in Iran last October for allegedly cooperating with the CIA, and Khosrow Qashqai, who was elected to the new Majlis (Parliament) but has been barred from taking his seat because of accusations that he served the deposed shah's secret police.

The press report said Ahern also implicated Rear Adm. Ahmad Madani, another elected member of the new Majlis who has also been blocked from taking his seat. Ahern was quoted as saying Qashqai discussed the possibility of publishing a newspaper with Madani, and the questions attributed to the interviewer implied that the paper was to have U.S. support.

Qashqai and Madani were elected to the Majlis as members of the National Front Party, one of the few non-religious factions still allowed to function in Iran. They have been under increasing pressure

from the Moslem fundamentalist majority in the parliament because of their comparatively moderate position on the American hostages.

The Parliament has been empowered to decide the fate of the 52 remaining hostages, who began their 255th day in captivity today. However, there has been no reliable indication when the parliamentary debate on the captives will begin, and most members of the Majlis are already said to favor trying the Americans as spies.

Meanwhile, a doctor disclosed today that former hostage Richard Queen is suffering from multiple sclerosis, a chronic disease that attacks the central nervous system. Queen has been undergoing tests at the U.S. Air Force hospital in Wiesbaden, West Germany. He was freed by Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the leader of the Iranian revolution, last Friday after he became ill and was hospitalized.

Suzuki chosen to succeed Ohira

TOKYO (AP) — Zenko Suzuki, a skilled negotiator and backstage mediator of political squabbles, was chosen president of Japan's ruling Liberal Democratic Party today, succeeding the late Prime Minister Masayoshi Ohira.

Suzuki, 69, will be the LDP candidate for prime minister when the lower house of the new Diet, the Japanese Parliament, meets Thursday. He is certain of election because his party controls 287 of the 511 seats, a majority of 63.

A meeting of LDP members of both houses of the Diet named Suzuki party president, unanimously endorsing a decision of the party elders.

The vote ended a month of maneuvering following the death of Ohira June 12. Suzuki, a longtime Ohira aide who was chairman of the party Executive Council, emerged from relative obscurity to take over Ohira's party faction. With the elevation of more powerful factional leaders blocked for one reason or another, he became the compromise choice.

Suzuki told the party meeting he would "work for unity and harmony within the party." He said in a speech Monday that he would give priority to national defense, energy, social welfare and ridding the government of deficit financing. He is not expected to veer from the conservative course set by the LDP in its control of the government since 1948 — strongly pro-business with close economic, political and military ties with the United States.

The party has moved toward the U.S. position that Japan should boost its defense budget from the current 0.9 percent of the Gross National Product to help contain Soviet military expansionism. Suzuki, the son of a well-to-do fisherman, graduated before the war from the Agriculture Ministry's fisheries college. After working with a fishery cooperative and a year of military service at the end of the war, he was elected to the Diet as a Socialist in 1947.

He switched to the ruling conservatives two years later to improve his chances of getting disaster relief funds for his district after a typhoon. A member of the Diet ever since, he has been minister of posts and communications, chief cabinet minister, minister of health and welfare and most recently minister of agriculture, forestry and fisheries.

Cheering nation celebrates birthday of Queen Elizabeth

LONDON (AP) — Crowds cheered, church bells rang out and the sun shone today on Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, on her 80th birthday.

The mother of the reigning monarch, Queen Elizabeth II, rode in a horse-drawn carriage from her old home at Buckingham Palace, down the tree-lined Mall to a thanksgiving service for her at St. Paul's Cathedral.

Later, the Queen Mother led the royal family onto the balcony of Buckingham Palace to receive the acclaim of thousands of loyal British subjects. They sang "Happy Birthday," gave her three cheers and raised a rousing "For She's a Jolly Good Fellow" before the royals retired behind the balcony's glass doors for an official birthday lunch.

Defying a St. Swithin's Day forecast of yet more rain in a horribly wet summer, royalty-loving Britons trooped into town and waited for hours, wrapped in blankets and shrouded in raincoats, for a brief glimpse of royalty going by. They were rewarded with sunshine, the glitter, gleam and clip-clop-clap of escorting mounted guardsmen in breastplates, and the queen mother's famous smile.

"She is a perfect lady. You feel she really cares about people," said one of those watching, Jane McKenzie, 56, who spent more than \$120 on train tickets, taxis and food to London from her home in Cheshire.

Bernard Bran, 74, was the first outside the cathedral at 5:10 a.m. "This is a very happy day for me to be able to say my thanks to the Queen Mother, who has given us so much joy," he said.

In the cathedral, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Rt. Rev. Robert Runcie, said the Queen Mother made every British citizen feel part of a family where common interests and kinships exist beneath and beyond all divisions and conflicts.

"Royalty puts a human face on the operations of government and provides images with which the people of a nation can identify and which they can love," Runcie said.

Britain honored her with Queen Mother garden parties and balls all over the country, a gala performance by the Royal Ballet, a rose walk named for her in St. James's Park and her picture on a postage stamp in one of her characteristic flowered hats.

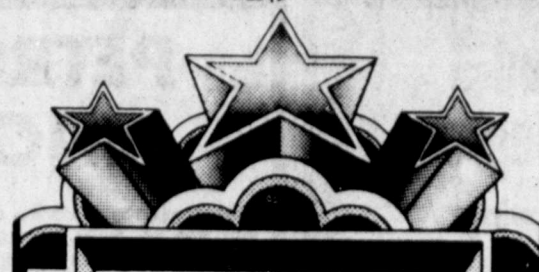

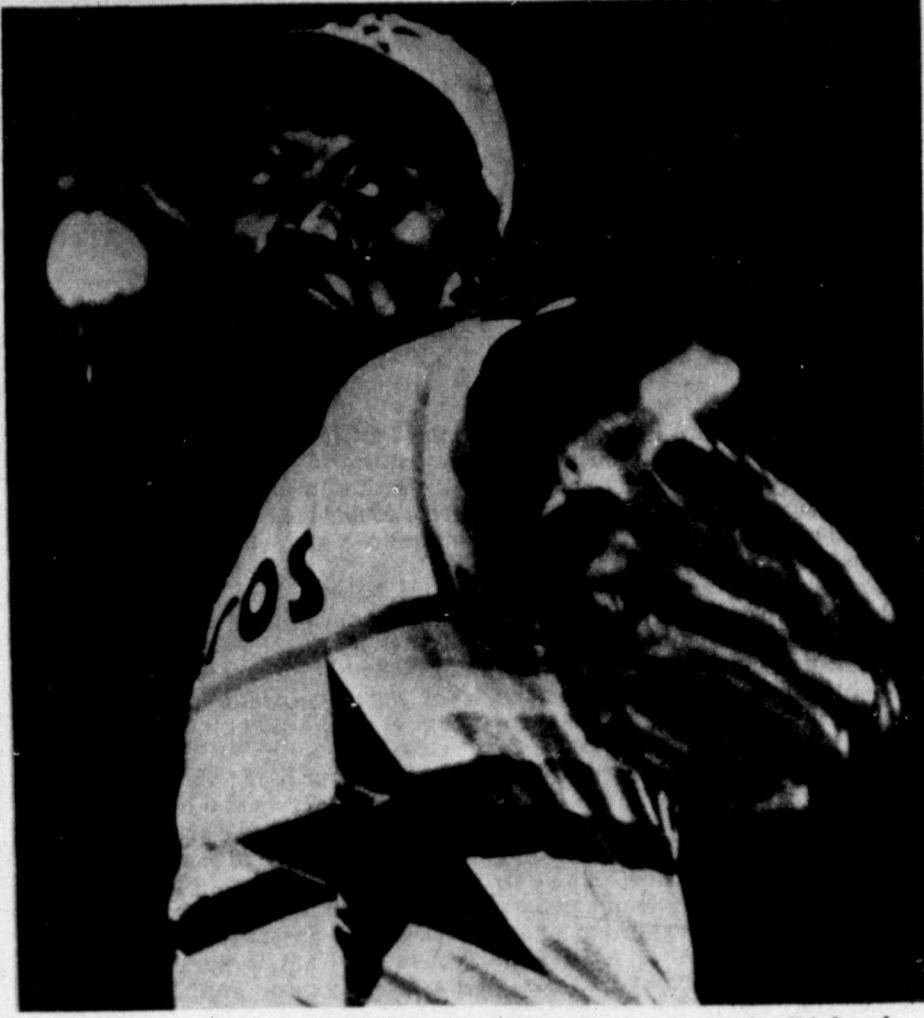

Richard's ailments puzzle Bill Virdon

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston's J.R. Richard, who reputedly has the deadliest fastball in major league baseball, sat in front of his dressing room cubicle, eating fried chicken and meatballs.

Earlier Monday night, Richard had left Houston's game against Atlanta after 3½ innings, complaining of an upset stomach.

The Astros eventually lost the game 2-0 on a two-hitter by Atlanta's Phil Niekro, pitching despite a bruised elbow.

"I ate a hamburger before I came to the game. That must have been what did it," Richard said.

"I started feeling nauseated about the third inning."

It was the latest chapter in the intriguing mystery of Richard's health problems. In 17 starts this season, Richard has left 10 games complaining of various ailments.

Monday night's stomach episode was a new one. Richard told some officials last weekend that he needed 30 days rest to recover from what he called a tired arm.

Richard, 30, and the starting pitcher for the National League in the All-Star game was not scheduled to pitch Monday night.

Richard decided to pitch, however, after team physician Dr. Harold Bresford told a pre-game news conference that two examinations had failed to find any physical problems with Richard's arm.

"J.R. might be suffering some slight muscle fatigue," Bresford said. "But Dr. (Frank) Jobe who examined Richard on Friday) suggested perhaps it would be best for J.R. to miss one turn."

But missing one turn is far from 30 days rest.

Bresford said neither he nor Jobe suggested 30 days rest. Richard said he mentioned the 30 days rest.

Why? he was asked.

"Because I felt like it," he said.

Richard walked slowly to the mound to start each of the first four innings Monday night. He appeared to have trouble seeing signals from catcher Luis Pujols, and prior to the fourth inning it appeared he was not going to take the mound.

Astros Manager Bill Virdon had to prod Richard.

"I didn't know if he was going out," Virdon said. "I asked him if he was going out and he said 'Yeah.'"

Atlanta Manager Bobby Cox also noticed something was amiss with Richard.

"He was throwing super, but he was acting a little funny on the mound," Cox said. "He couldn't seem to see some of the signs."

Virdon said he didn't know the next step in the mystery.

"But we're definitely going to have to have a talk now," Virdon said.

By this time Richard had finished his chicken and overcome his upset stomach, leaving behind many unanswered questions about his and the Astros future.

Reaves is spared from commitment

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Minnesota Vikings reserve quarterback John Reaves has been spared commitment to a mental health facility, but both a doctor and a judge say he should still seek psychiatric help.

During a 15-minute hearing Monday, Hillsborough Circuit Judge Benjamin Sidwell rescinded an order to commit the 30-year-old National Football League player after a psychiatrist said Reaves need not be confined. Sidwell last week issued the emergency ruling ordering psychiatric observation on the basis of three sworn affidavits from friends of Reaves saying he was battling alcohol and drugs and was a danger to himself and others.

Reaves had been in hiding for five days, eluding sheriff's deputies who were trying to take him into custody. He appeared in the judge's chambers flanked by three attorneys. No mention, however, was made of drugs or of his whereabouts during the last week.

Afterwards, Reaves said he was relieved and pleased at the outcome and anxious to get back to Minnesota for the Vikings training camp.

Mike Lynn, the general manager of the Vikings, planned to meet with Reaves and his attorneys today to discuss the former University of Florida star's future with the club. Lynn has suggested Reaves report to camp earlier than the July 31 opening date for physical training and recommended treatment, according to attorney Tom MacDonald.

Sidwell made his decision revoking the commitment order after Tampa psychiatrist Gary Arthur testified that Reaves is competent.

Arthur told the judge he gave Reaves a mental status exam Sunday and felt certain there would be no further outbursts of irrational behavior.

Three restaurant employees said last week in sworn statements that Reaves had gone "berserk" and apparently was under the influence of drugs. One woman said in her state-

Reaves threatened to kill her husband.

"Mr. Reaves had been on a binge or a tear," said Sidwell, referring to the affidavits. He warned the athlete he couldn't hide under fame and called him a "highly visible symbol of our city." Although Sidwell revoked the order, he retained jurisdiction of the case and asked that he be kept informed of Reaves' progress while under psychiatric care.

Last season, Reaves was the Vikings' second-string quarterback behind Tommy Kramer. But he didn't play a single down. Coach Bud Grant has since added rookie Steve Dils from Stanford and veteran Mike Livingston from Kansas City.

He is confident his recent problems won't endanger his career.

"I'm too good a player," Reaves said.

He still has a marijuana possession charge pending in county court with a hearing set for July 31 on a motion to dismiss the misdemeanor charge.

NBA star is in jail
ATLANTA (AP) — Atlanta Hawks star Eddie Johnson was in the Fulton County jail today, unable to make bond totaling \$26,000 on charges of possession of cocaine, driving under the influence and driving without a valid driver's license.

MUIRFIELD, Scotland (AP) — Two of the prime favorites, Lee Trevino and defending champion Seve Ballesteros, had their problems going into the 109th British Open golf championship which begins Thursday.
 Trevino, who won in 1972, the last time this ancient event was played on the 6,926-yard, par 71 Muirfield golf links, was keeping an anxious eye on the weather.
 "When I won here before, it was warm, really warm," said Trevino, bundled in layers of sweaters after a practice round in the cold, windy, sometimes-rainy weather.
 "I don't do that well in this weather," he said.
 "I'm not a cold weather player, never have been. I don't like the cold. I can't get loose. I'm all tightened up. My back hurts. I miss too many shots in the cold because I'm not loose and I'm restricted by all the clothes you have to wear."
 "And if you miss a shot here, miss a fairway or a green, it's a bogey. That's simple."
 "It's the toughest rough I've ever see at a British Open," Trevino said. He spread his hands about two feet apart. "Man, it's up to here," he said.
 But Trevino did not discount himself entirely.
 "I'm playing as well as I ever have," Trevino said Monday. He's won twice this year, including his last start, has been second in three other tournaments and has collected almost \$300,000 in prize money.
 "I'm hitting the ball very, very well. And I'm putting better than I have in the past."
 "If the weather turns warm, I have an excellent chance. If it gets about 15, 20 degrees warmer, I like my chances. Even if it doesn't turn warm, I've got a chance, but it's not so good."
 The long-range forecast is for "unsettled conditions" which often translates to cold, wind and rain.
 "If it stays cold," Trevino said, "I like the long hitters, and the British players because they're used to playing in these conditions." He specifically mentioned Brian Barnes, Tony Jacklin and Sandy Lyne.
