Iran claims Iraqis pushed back from Abadan

BASRA, Iraq (AP) — Iran claimed today its forces pushed Iraqi troops back from the embattled oil refinery center of Abadan and reported hand-to-hand fighting in the besieged port city of Khorramshahr.

Clydesdales awe many Midlanders

Danny Truelove was sitting on 100 horses, as he watched eight big horses draw nigh. "I had a whole lot rather ride this," he said, as he was sitting astride his one-eyed "hoss" — a 100-horsepower, 1,100cc motorcycle. "It's a lot smoother, I assure you. And you don't get as sore."

What had struck Truelove's curiosity and that of a growing horde of spectators Thursday afternoon was eight Clydesdale draft horses heralding the virtues of Budweiser beer.

The one-ton horses, each standing about 18 hands high, were being unloaded from Anheuser-Busch Inc. tractor trailers, harnessed and hitched up to a 1902 red Studebaker beer wagon decked with wooden beer cases. They were being readied to prance around Midland Park Mall.

Four-year-old Spring Wright "eagerly watched the equine creatures, whose ancestors were used as mounts by warring knights and by farmers to pull earth-tearing plows. The horses emerged from the trailers and were gently led to the red beer wagon, which was embellished in gleaming leather and brass.

"ARE THEY BIG ONES?" Spring innocently queried, as she was in a strung-out line with other children from her day-care class.

"Will the horses bite?" she asked, as she was holding hands with classmates Jason Paul Barden, 4, and Justin Paul Hunt, 4.

Their teachers had brought them out to behold the regal horses, which had been trucked in for, the Permian Basin Oil Show.

"Teacher," the girl asked of Jarene Teters, "can we go look at them?" She stayed put.

Within a short gallop of the youngsters, who were just learning something about horses, were a couple of fellows decked out in genuine cowboy attire — from their Western hats to their boots.

The seasoned cowboy, 83-year-old John McWhorter, had worked with many a horse on ranges in West Texas and New Mexico, but those massive Clydesdales were mostly foreign to him.

"Oh, we just had 'horses' in those days," the old cowpoke said. "We didn't have Quarter Horses. We just had Spanish horses. Oh, we used to have some Percheron (draft) horses and a few Clydesdales. Some of the farmers did."

L. Saunders, 64, was leisurely standing with the old cowhand. He said he remembers back in 1948, when the "Budweiser horses" were in Midland for a show.

"I stood up and watched them harness them up just like they are now," Saunders recalled. He also recalled his working days with horses and mules.

"I WORKED EIGHT mules abreast — not strung out — to pull a two-row plow," Saunders said. But he figured that driving a team of mules is a whole lot different than whipping around a team of double-sized Clydesdales.

"I imagine not everybody in the world could drive them horses," which Saunders termed as "flat gentle." "It takes a teamster to do that."

The teamster driving the eight-horse hitch was Lloyd Ferguson, 26. "I've worked with horses all my life, he said.

"All the guys (on Anheuser-Busch's three touring Clydesdale hitches) have been associated with

horses. You have to be associated with horses or you have to be associated with the beer business" to get hitched up with the Clydesdale team, he said.

Ferguson seemed quietly proud that his lot was to be on the team. "They are a very showy horse," he said of the Clydesdale. "They show themselves naturally by the way they pick up their feet. They're the hackney of the draft horses."

Joe Ortega was "riding shotgun" with driver Ferguson, as the Clydesdale hitch promenaded around the mall. Sleepily riding atop the red beer wagon was Bud, the Dalmatian, the perennial coach dog.

BEARDED REECE Jones Jr. watched the Clydesdale hitch ride out of sight. "I'm not much of a teamster, but I like to look at them," Jones said. "I drove a team a little, but not that much. I'd hate to be handling the reins on that herd."

J.C. Powers was admiring the hitch. "My, they're monsters, aren't they? Beautiful," he said. "I'm a horse lover. I have been all my life. Powers said he grew up on a farm in Kansas long before tractors replaced horses and mules in the field.

"When I was a kid, we done everything with horses, (mostly) Percherons," he said. Horse handler Steve Dawson was patiently waiting for the return of the Budweiser Clydesdales, whom he could readily call by name: Sammy, Buck, Craig, Grant, Davy, Captain, Mark and John. The "two spars," Duke and Commander, were off that day and were stabled elsewhere.

"They've got a lot of sense. They're fairly easy to train and to work with," Dawson observed. The Clydesdales have been symbols of Budweiser

beer since 1933, when August A. Busch Jr. got a team of Clydesdales to celebrate the repeal of Prohibition.

"It's probably the world's greatest advertising gimmick," Dawson said of the Budweiser Clydesdales.

Elbert "Tinker" Taylor, who works for a Budweiser distributor and who was hauling around several cases of Bud in a modern-day wagon, seemed to sum up the essence of the Clydesdales. "There ain't nothing like an ice-cold beer."

Three convicted in assassination plot

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — An Israeli military court has convicted a woman and two men from the occupied Gaza Strip of plotting to kill Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon, the engineer of Israel's controversial policy of settling Jews on occupied Arab land, a military spokesman said today.

The three defendants were sentenced to prison terms by a military court on Wednesday, the spokesman said.

Last July, the army announced it had foiled a long-simmering plot to kill the outspoken Sharon, whose job as the

head of the settlement program has set him up as an enemy of many Palestinians.

The plotters were reported to have stockpiled

weapons and to have established contacts with Arab workers on Sharon's farm in the Negev Desert in order to keep tabs on his movements.

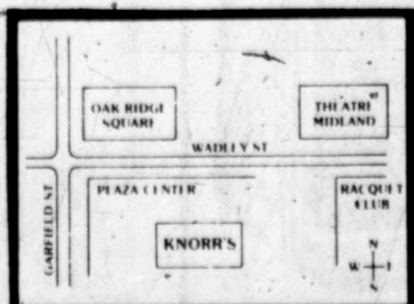

Council due brothel study

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — The city council will hear the results of a special investigation into an alleged brothel that one councilman claims operated for two decades with the sanction of powerful city officials. City Manager Tom Huebner told the council Thursday he wanted a special session Monday at 5 p.m. to present results of the study he began last week. Three women were arrested and an alleged "trick list" confiscated in an Oct. 2 raid of the bordello. Councilman Bernardo Eureste charged the bawdy house was allowed to operate with police protection for 20 years. The council last week empowered Huebner to look into the allegations after Eureste shocked council members and Mayor Lila Cockrell with his charges. Theresa Brown, 46, alleged madam of the operation, was arrested and charged with promoting prostitution, and two Houston women were charged with prostitution as a result of the raid. Capt. James Despres said more than 2,000 names, including those of well known businessmen and politicians, were on the "trick list" and some names were accompanied by sexual preferences of the clients.

Ms. Brown has waived arraignment on the promotion of prostitution charge and under the state's Speedy Trial Act, a trial date must be set within 120 days. Negotiations for a plea bargain broke down last week and her attorney said if his client were brought to trial, he might introduce the "trick list" in her defense. Eureste, in open session last week, charged that a police inspector and fellow councilman's names were on the list, but both denied they were clients at the brothel. Mrs. Brown said she would take a polygraph test on behalf of the police official.

Three deaths blamed on first big snowstorm

A blinding snowstorm across the Rocky Mountains downed power lines, closed roads and took the lives of three people, two of whom died in a train wreck during a blizzard in Wyoming. And in the Plains Thursday, tornadoes tore through houses and barns, injuring at least seven people. In Wyoming, where as much as two feet of snow fell during autumn's first snowstorm, two Union Pacific trains wrecked near Laramie Thursday afternoon, officials said. Two men were killed and two others were seriously hurt. "We know it was blowing very hard up there," according to Union Pacific spokesman Joe McCartney, who said the weather was probably a factor in the crash. One train crashed into the rear of the other train, authorities said. The storm also contributed to the death of a Colorado man whose light plane crashed while he was attempting an instrument landing at the airport in Rock Springs, Wyo., officials said. The snow forced the closing of Interstate 80 between Cheyenne and Walcott Junction and the closing of two sections of U.S. 287. In Montana, authorities reported that 2 to 4 feet of snow accumulated in some mountain regions. The snow clogged roads near the 10,940-foot Beartooth Pass south of Red Lodge. In Billings, Mont., utilities reported widespread power losses. "Our switchboard was overloaded," said Chet Belden, division manager of Montana Power Co. "Hundreds of people were without power." Accumulations of snow reached six inches in the mountain communities of Red River, N.M., and Mammoth, Calif. Tornadoes were reported in Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado and Oklahoma. In Kansas, a twister ripped up an area 40 yards wide and nearly 28 miles long from about four miles south of Winfield to about five miles east of Atlanta, according to Crowley County deputy sheriff Keith Wohlge-muth. A barn near Atlanta, Kan., was flattened and three people were hurt. In Burden, Kan., Randy Gordon, 26, watched the roof of his house being snatched away by a twister.

Police hold sniper summit

CINCINNATI (AP) — A federal weapons charge has been filed against Joseph Franklin, the fugitive who is the subject of a police conference here on the unsolved shootings of blacks in cities across the country. Franklin, who is believed to be a native of Birmingham, Ala., was charged in Lexington, Ky., on Wednesday with transporting stolen firearms across state lines. Authorities said a .357-caliber Magnum stolen from an Indiana state trooper 10 years ago was found in a car owned by Franklin. Franklin also is wanted for questioning in the shooting deaths of two black youths in Cincinnati, the wounding of National Urban League President Vernon Jordan in Fort Wayne, Ind., and sniper slayings in Oklahoma City, Indianapolis and Johnstown, Pa. Most of those incidents involved high-powered rifles. Franklin reportedly is a gun enthusiast who buys and sells high-powered rifles.

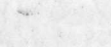

Reagan, Carter get in jabs at N.Y. charity fete

President Carter and Ronald Reagan shook hands and then came out — well, if not fighting — at least jabbing verbally.

The two men met Thursday night for the first time since the presidential campaign began. The scene was a charity dinner in New York at which serious political speeches are traditionally put aside in favor of humor, but both Carter and Reagan managed to get in at least one undercut at his opponent.

Across the continent in Santa Barbara, Calif., independent candidate John Anderson continued to maintain that despite his poor showing in public opinion polls he could still win the presidency.

"There's going to be a surprise on the fourth of November when the results come in," Anderson said Thursday. "When the last vote is counted, I'm going to win."

Reagan picked up the endorsement of two well-known black leaders, meanwhile, and Carter's camp disavowed a statement by another black, former U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young, that Reagan's rhetoric means "it's going to be all right to kill niggers when he's president."

Today, Reagan is meeting with Mayor Ed Koch for a briefing on New York's needs, and Carter is back at the White House. Anderson is campaigning in California.

The prospect of a debate remains vaguely in the offing, meanwhile, as League of Women Voters officials continue to consider canceling their debate invitation to Anderson. Such a move could lead to the long-awaited contest between Reagan and Carter.

Thursday night, Carter strode up to Reagan and shook hands with him at a charity dinner honoring Al Smith, the New York Democrat who was defeated for the presidency by Herbert Hoover in 1928.

Reagan, who is 69, kept up the dinner's tradition of humor by denying the "rumor" that he had been at the first dinner for Smith.

Carter, too, drew laughs when he said that Cardinal Terence Cooke, who heads the foundation that sponsors the dinner, had demonstrated "a power even greater than that of the League of Women Voters" in getting Reagan to share a platform with

him.

Both Carter and Reagan left humor behind at some point during their speeches, however.

Reagan mentioned the 52 American hostages whose captivity in Iran has come up more and more with the approach of the first anniversary of their seizure, which coincides with Election Day.

"No one in America will rejoice more than I when America's long wait for a resolution of this crisis is ended," Reagan added.

Carter, for his part, brought up a statement about God not hearing the prayers of Jews, which was made at a meeting of fundamentalist Christians at which Reagan was enthusiastically greeted. Reagan later criticized the statement.

"In our zeal to strengthen the moral character of our nation, we must not set ourselves up as judges of what God may hear," Carter said.

Earlier in the day in Detroit, Reagan was endorsed by the Rev. Ralph David Abernathy and Hosea Williams, two men associated with the late Martin Luther King Jr. during the civil rights struggle.

"Crime has increased, inflation has increased, unemployment has increased and interest rates have increased" since Carter took office, Abernathy said as Reagan and GOP vice presidential candidate George Bush stood by.

"Poor black people cannot make it under this type of system for another six months, and we don't need this doctor any more," he said.

Anderson still confident of victory

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Everything seems to be going against John B. Anderson's independent campaign for president — the polls, the banks, one of his most prominent backers, and even the weatherman.

But none of that quiets Anderson's confident public predictions of an upset victory over President Carter, whom Anderson calls a poor leader, and Republican Ronald Reagan, an "irrelevant" man of the past in Anderson's view.

"There's going to be a surprise on the fourth of November when the results come in," Anderson says. "When the last vote is counted, I'm going to win."

There's little except Anderson's personal optimism to back that prediction as he campaigns today for the third time in a month in Reagan's home state.

Polls in California find

Anderson stronger here than most of the nation, but still a distant third, with 12 to 18 percent of the vote. But Anderson, who plans still another one of his most prominent California campaign trips before the election, is spending more time here than in any other western state.

"Jimmy Carter does not have the ability to take the 45 electoral votes of this state away from Ronald Reagan," Anderson said Thursday. "So it is clear, I think, that I represent the only alternative in this state to a Reagan victory."

But Anderson's latest campaign blitz of California, Oregon and Washington has been hampered by more than the usual share of problems.

The first day of his western tour, Anderson confirmed that his attempts to borrow several million dollars from a group of banks for televi-

sion commercials had failed. Then, a new Gallup survey showed a drop from 15 percent in mid-September to 8 points this month.

But despite the failure of the bank loans, Anderson said his commercials will start this weekend, paid for with \$1.7 million in new contributions and loans from supporters.

Responding to questions, Anderson also confirmed that "All in the Family" television producer Norman Lear, one of his earliest and most generous backers, "said he would do nothing further (for the campaign) until we had had an opportunity to discuss the campaign."

"Obviously, some people are more influenced by the polls than others," Anderson said of Lear.

Even the weather was against Anderson Thursday. A noontime rally in Los Angeles, planned as the high point of the day's campaigning, was canceled while Anderson and his entourage sat glumly for nearly two hours in Eugene, Ore., after a breakfast speech, waiting for thick fog to clear so his campaign plane could take off.

Anderson's optimistic predictions of victory Thursday contrasted with his somber self-criticism of the previous day, when he told supporters that his campaign "has been unable somehow to raise the real issues," and that he felt he was personally to blame.

Those comments and others in a similar vein prompted news stories speculating about an Anderson withdrawal. He responded emotionally in a Los Angeles news conference.

"I have made it abundantly, irrevocably plain that I am in this race to stay...I will be in this race until the last voting booth is closed late the night of Nov. 4," he said.

Anderson also reacted angrily to questions suggesting he might be continuing his campaign only to qualify for the retroactive federal campaign funds he will receive if he tops 5 percent of the popular vote.

"I don't have to stay in this race to collect money from anyone," he snapped.

Reagan courting New York mayor

NEW YORK (AP) - Ronald Reagan, ribbed by President Carter on his conversion to supporting federal aid to New York, today resumed his courtship of the city's Democratic mayor, Edward I. Koch, and his large political following.

With 41 electoral votes at stake in New York, Reagan hoped to demonstrate his concern for the city's problems — and win some votes — in his pilgrimage to Gracie Mansion today for a 45-minute briefing from Koch on the city's needs.

The Republican presidential candidate has gone out of his way in recent weeks to say nice things about Koch. And the mayor has long been cool toward Carter in a move that one Reagan aide described as "playing cutesy" with the president.

From New York, Reagan flies to Chicago for an afternoon walk through a German neighborhood. He winds up the day with a pep rally and bonfire at his alma mater, Eureka College in Illinois, where he was student body president before his graduation in 1932.

His onetime opposition to federal loan guarantees to New York City has come back to haunt Reagan in the presidential race.

In New York, billboards and subway signs purchased by the Carter campaign show a picture of the president signing legislation to help bail out the city. The same ads remind voters of Reagan's words: "I have included in my morning and evening prayers ever day the prayer that the federal government will not bail out New York City."

Blacks surprised by Abernathy's move

DETROIT (AP) - Reaction among local black religious leaders ranged from surprise to outrage to the Rev. Ralph Abernathy's endorsement of Republican presidential nominee Ronald Reagan.

Abernathy, a longtime associate of Martin Luther King Jr., threw his support to Reagan on Thursday at a meeting of 50 black ministers at a Detroit church.

Abernathy succeeded King as president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference after King was assassinated in Memphis in 1968.

"I can't understand how Ralph got involved with this," said Dr. Claud Young, national vice president of SCLC. "Only a few months ago he was campaigning for Sen. (Edward) Kennedy. How he goes from Kennedy directly to Reagan, bypassing Carter, I do not understand at all."

Detroit City Councilman Nicholas Hood, a black Congregational minister, also expressed disbelief.

"It looks like he is looking for someplace to jump," Hood said. "Well, he's out there all by himself."

The Rev. Darneau V. Stewart, vice president of the Detroit Board of Education and pastor of Peoples Community Church, said that when he agreed to attend, he did not know Abernathy even would be at the meeting. When he heard the endorsement, Stewart said he was shocked.

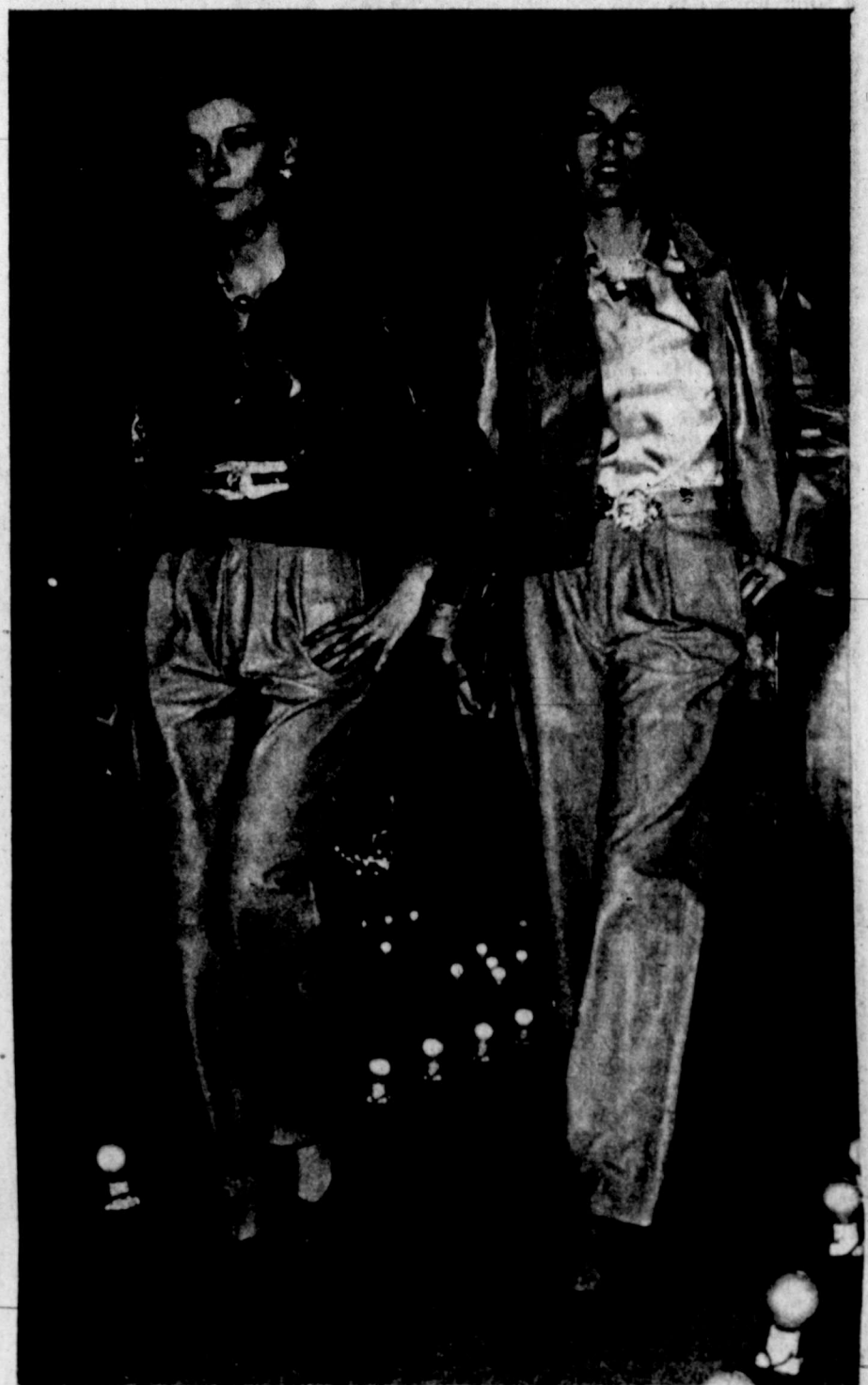

Riot police clash with students in Seoul

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — About 500 riot police stormed onto the campus of Korea University today and used clubs to disperse some 500 students holding an anti-government demonstration in defiance of a martial law ban, witnesses said.

They said police carted two busloads of students away after breaking up the protest, the first major demonstration since May when security forces quelled a nine-day rebellion in the southern city of Kwangju, leaving 189 dead.

South Korea's new strongman, President Chun Doo-hwan, told a news conference Thursday that most campuses were calm throughout the nation, except for a handful where students had scattered "sedition" leaflets recently. One of the leaflets, signed by the Emergency Student Council of Korea University, called on students to rise up against what they called Chun's fascist government to "realize a democratic era."

Fight for animal rights raging

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Every perfume, deodorant, shampoo and household cleanser probably has been dribbled into a rabbit's eyes to see if it burns, blinds or irritates, the Humane Society of the United States says.

It's called the Draize test, and it's one of the society's main targets in the 1980s.

At its annual convention here, which ends Saturday, the group is outlining other problems it hopes to tackle in the new decade:

—Intensive animal farming. Most of the nation's milk-fed veal comes from calves that spend all 16 weeks of their lives in dark stalls so tiny they can't turn around, eating an iron-free diet that leaves them anemic, said Michael Fox, director of the Institute for the Study of Animal Problems.

Even animals doomed to stew pots should have certain rights, the society maintains: the rights to stand up, turn around, lie down, stretch and groom or preen, to mix with others of their kind.

—The increased popularity of dog fighting. Humane Society investigator Frantz Dantzier estimates the bloody

sport increased tenfold in the past seven or eight years and now involves 5,000 to 10,000 people nationwide "in a major way."

—Pre-race drugging of race horses, which Society President John Hoyt says has contributed to increased breakdowns on the track.

—Elimination of ill-staffed roadside zoos and menageries.

Still concerned about unwanted dogs and cats — 13.5 million are killed in euthanasia programs yearly — the society now is addressing many other animal-rights issues. "I think the whole philosophical concept of animal rights is just beginning to have its day," said Hoyt.

The Humane Society is beginning to win its fight against the often-painful Draize test, especially for tests on "frivolous products."

Pressed by humane groups, the Environmental Protection Agency recently stopped using the procedure for testing chemicals and pesticides, and the Consumer Product Safety Commission no longer uses it to test household chemicals, said Andrew Rowan, associate director of the Institute for Animal Problems.

The Food and Drug Administration still allows its use for cosmetics, but Rowan said manufacturers now are beginning to seek alternatives.

The society also hopes to rally public support for improving the living conditions of livestock, Fox said.

About 1 million calves in the United States are trapped in the 22- to 24-inch-wide boxes, consuming a milk diet and injected with antibiotics to ward off disease, although other low-cost, profitable methods are available, Fox said.

About 95 percent of the eggs eaten by Americans come from hens stuffed into battery cages — "Four, sometimes five birds kept in a cage that is 12 by 16 inches."

But it would cost only "a few cents more per dozen" to eliminate the battery cage system, he claimed.

The agency also is boosting its investigative efforts to track down and report dog fighting, Dantzier said. After convincing Congress to make interstate trans-

portation of dogs for fighting a crime, the society now has sued the Department of Agriculture, claiming it has failed to enforce the law.



No link between diet, hyperactivity

WASHINGTON (AP) — A report commissioned by the food industry says there is no relationship between diet and hyperactivity in children. But proponents of diet therapy disagree and the government says neither side has made a good case yet.

The controversy over diet and hyperactivity stirred again Thursday when a report backed by the Nutrition Foundation said there is no evidence that natural and artificial food components directly cause hyperkinesis.

This condition includes hyper, or accelerated, activity in children, as well as such symptoms as short attention span, apathy, impulsiveness, lack of concentration and

bed wetting.

Hundreds of thousands of children are thought to be affected in varying degrees. Approaches to treatment include diet, drugs, behavioral counseling and special education.

Dr. Sanford Miller, director of the Bureau of Foods of the Food and Drug Administration, said food's role in hyperactivity has not been proved.

"The problem with the current situation is that people are looking at the extremes," Miller said in an interview.

The new report surveyed the research on hyperactivity and diet done by dozens of scientists over a five-year period.

It concluded that the

best studies "provide sufficient evidence to refute the claim that artificial food colorings, artificial flavorings and natural salicylates produce hyperactivity."

Therefore, there is no scientific basis to conclude that the popular diet prescribed by Dr. Ben Feingold, which excludes foods with additives and naturally occurring chemicals called salicylates, helps these children, it said.

Drs. Morris A. Lipton of the University of Carolina and Esther H. Wender of the University of Utah Medical Center, who headed the committee that did the study, said many improvements seen with the diet probably are caused by a "placebo effect."

This means that if people really believe the diet works, they will see improvements in behavior. They also pay more attention to their children and do other things when following the diet that may help the condition, Ms. Wender told a news briefing.

However, the report did conclude that the food additive-free diet has no apparent harmful effects and that there is no reason to discourage people from using it as long as they continue other treatment of proven benefit.

The Feingold Association of the United States immediately took issue with the new report. This group of parents and professionals who support

the diet said other studies show hyperactive children do react to food additives.

"We totally disagree with the report and its conclusions don't change my mind," said Dee Anne Treadway, an association board member. "I've had four years of success with my child on the diet and I know it works."

Miller of the FDA said "studies suggest there is some kind of link between behavior in some sets of children and food components. There may be some kids who can't handle artificial additives and others who can't deal with normal food components."

Miller said there is no satisfactory evidence to prove or disprove the role of synthetic additives and natural food components in causing hyperactivity, or which particular children may be affected.

"Based on the evidence we have, I have to conclude that the jury is still out on the question," Miller said.

Five airlines seek China route

WASHINGTON (AP) — Five airlines battled Thursday before the Civil Aeronautics Board for the right to launch the first regularly scheduled air service between the United States and China in 30 years.

CAB Chairman Marvin S. Cohen said he expects the board to choose one of the carriers Friday. Several of the airlines said they could begin regular flights between the two nations before the end of the year.

The way was opened for the U.S.-China route, described by one airline representative Thursday as "a treasure... a jewel," when President Carter and Chinese officials signed a new trade agreement last month.

Although U.S. airlines have flown charter flights to China, no American carrier has provided regularly scheduled flights there since the Communists took power in 1949.

The five carriers vying for the route, which is expected to have relatively few passengers at the outset, are Pan American World Air-

ways, Trans World Airlines, United Airlines, Northwest Orient Airlines and TransAmerican Airline.

The Pan Am proposal would provide the broadest service with three flights a week, while each of the other carriers proposes two flights a week.

The agreement limits departures from four U.S. cities — New York, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Honolulu. Only the Pan Am proposal would serve New York City without intervening stops in the United States and only United would

provide service from Hawaii.

Four of the airlines would have stopovers in Tokyo on the way to either Shanghai or Peking. Only TWA has proposed direct flights from the West Coast to Shanghai and on to Peking, although Pan Am said it would make one of its West Coast flights direct to Shanghai next June.

TransAmerica, primarily a charter service, has proposed the cheapest flights — \$489 roundtrip economy fare from San Francisco to Shanghai — but the air-

line's prospect for getting the China route is impaired by the fact that it has yet to get approval for a route to Tokyo.

In contrast, Pan Am and Northwest have had service to Tokyo for years.

Representatives of TWA and United argued they should get the route to break what they called the dominance of the Pacific market by Pan Am and Northwest Orient. The China route would signal the return of TWA to the Pacific market.

More prone to accident

Dear Dr. Solomon: I've just finished watching a television program dealing with the subject of preventive medicine—warnings against smoking, the need for sufficient sleep, etc. In my age group (mid-30s), however, the people I come in contact with either socially or in business are more prone to accidents than to illness. A close friend of mine was killed in an automobile accident a few months ago, and one of my business associates is now hospitalized because of a job-related accident. Are these unusual cases or are accidental injuries as significant a public health problem as my experience would suggest? —Mike

Dear Mike: If you consider 100,000 deaths a year significant, then accidental injuries do constitute an important public health problem. That's the number of Americans who lost their lives in accidents in 1977, about half of them as the result of automobile mishaps. In addition, a mind-boggling 65 million people suffered nonfatal accidental injuries severe enough to require medical treatment.

The concept of preventive medicine is as applicable to accidents as it is to diseases. Educational programs, many aired on radio and television, urge people not to drink and drive, to use their seat belts, and to keep medicines out of the reach of small children. These approaches generally are aimed at those at the highest risk of accidents—young children, teen-age boys, the elderly and alcohol abusers. However, as you probably can tell from the daily accident reports in your newspaper, these efforts unfortunately have not been very effective in reducing the toll of injuries.

Dear Dr. Solomon: Why is there all this controversy about mammography for the detection of breast cancer? For every article recommending the technique, there seems to be one warning against it. Why are there so many differences of opinion? —Selma

Dear Selma: Your confusion about the value of mammography is shared by many people, including health professionals. The differences of opinion involve a weighing of the acknowledged benefits of the procedure against the acknowledged risks inherent in it.

It is generally agreed that mammography may identify cancerous cell deposits that are too small to be discovered by physical examination. On the other hand, mammography uses x-rays which themselves may cause cancer. Those who advocate its use in spite of the risk maintain that the potential benefit makes it worthwhile. For example, it has been estimated that five mammograms would increase a woman's chance of developing breast cancer from 7.0 percent to only 7.35 percent.

Anyone thinking about undergoing mammography should discuss with her physician the advisability of the procedure in her particular case, taking into consideration such factors as age and family history of cancer.

Whiskey taxes help keep Ireland a tight little island

RIDGEFIELD, Conn. (AP) — From all indicators, as the financial writers say, this should be a grand year for the makers of poteen — illegal whiskey — in Ireland.

Taxes on the legal stuff, still known as "Parliament Whiskey", have gone up again; the police are otherwise occupied with the troubles in the North, which like any crisis increases the national thirst, and the lads in the hills have not lost their skill at distilling the blessed stuff right under the noses of the authorities. October is the month for making it.

A letter from Ireland just this morning confirms all this.

"Paddy McCann made his Christmas deliveries early this year," a cousin twice removed (once by the police) in County Cavan informs me. "He cooked up a lovely batch and put it in those big stone calor gas cylinders; you know, like the ones they store oxygen in at the hospital. Well, that was a new one on me. Cannon —, who has the central heating, has two drums standing outside the priest house and the Gardaí (the Irish police) haven't tumbled."

I have never met Paddy McCann, which is probably an alias anyhow, as

he used to be known as "Paddy the Porker," because the false floor in his old Austin taxi was deep enough to smuggle a herd of pigs across the Ulster border in the poteen off-season.

Paddy is a "cadger," a professional poteen distributor. Men of charm, daring and deception, to whom the risk is often more enticing than the profit, cadgers over the years have resorted to all sorts of ruses to throw the excise men and the police off the scent, including tossing a few bottles here and there along the trail to slow down the search.

The nectar of the bogs has been delivered in milk carts, butter churns, hay ricks, diaper trucks, tinkers' caravans, canal boats, jaunting carts, whatever moves in Ireland. It has been hidden in fairy forts, school houses and church confessionals. It has been tied beneath cattle on the way to market, concealed in the drum of a "honey wagon" — a fertilizer spreader — and piously paraded in front of the police barracks by old "shawlies" wearing hollowed out metal bras and containerized fake pregnancy protrusions.

Rarely, however, despite the old John Ford movies, has the lovely stuff, also known as the delicious

dropeen, made its way into town in a casket, hearse, flower car or other funerary conveyance.

"It wouldn't work at all," Martin Thornton of Galway once informed me: "If there's a funeral procession, the police might start looking around

That was a few years back, and I thought it was the best description of white lightning I had come across since Irving S. Cobb described some Tennessee moonshine: "A sudden violent jolt of it has been known to stop the victim's watch, snap his sus-

penders and crack his glass eye right across."

But then last year in an Irish country hotel, which like most such centers of learning came equipped with a library as well as a fully licensed pub for seminars, I happened on a learned treatise called "In Praise of Poteen" by the Irish writer John McGuffin.

McGuffin quotes the ecstasy of an old man named Seamus, sampling a first rate drop at a shebeen — an illegal pub — out in Connemara in the West: "It goes down yer throat like a torchlight procession — sure, 'tis grand altogether."

According to the author, poteen — from the Irish word for "wee pot," in which the mash is cooked — had been

made for donkeys years in the Auld Sod. It became the wine of the country in the late 18th century when the British Crown outlawed private distilling and Parliament put a heavy tax on legal whiskey, forever afterwards known as Parliament Whiskey.

Ireland was blessed by her Maker with all the ingredients for producing a pleasingly pulverizing un-Parliamentary potion: clear running water, turf for fuel, an abundance of potatoes, barley, corn, oak husks or whatever else, even sugar beets, that could be boiled up for mash; remote caves and coves for the skilled craftsmen to hide in, friendly judges who didn't mind a dram themselves, a clergy that preached temperance but also blessed the stills at the outset of each season and a police force never quite large enough to cope with the dimensions of this cottage industry.

Sometimes the army had to be called in. In Limerick in 1778, McGuffin relates, "a detachment of the 27th Regiment and two field pieces proceeded to attack Castle Ognolly in which had been carried on for some years an immense distillery." But in 1819 "a force of 140 infantry and 40 cavalry were repulsed and forced to flee" by the poteen lovers of Bun-

crana and Cudaff.

Modern home heating assists the poteen makers by doing away with the telltale smoke of a turf-fired still. Last Christmas the I.R.A. lads in Long Kesh, the Ulster internment camp, made poteen right under the noses of the guards. They called it "Special Powers," after the unpopular act authorizing imprisonment without trial. And not long ago in County Mayo, the "Gardaí found 30 gallons of 'wash' simmering in a barrel under the heat of an electric blanket." Defendant Geoffrey Fair told the sergeant, McGuffin relates, "that the barrel was used for salting a pig which had been killed." The explanation cost him a fine of 100 pounds, but it was worth a try.

Mickey McIlhatten, the king of the County Antrim poteen makers, once got off with a small fine by solemnly assuring the magistrate he came by the stuff because "a man from Sligo told me that a rub of poteen on the fiddle makes it sound all the sweeter."

It's also supposed to be good for oiling typewriters.



to find out if maybe somebody was dead."

Thornton, who once was the heavyweight boxing champion of Ireland, is a renowned cadger and poteen maker. In the John Ford classic movie "The Quiet Man," he not only did the fight scenes for the aging Victor McLaglen in that unforgettable donnybrook with John Wayne, but also provided the poteen for the end-of-film cast party, which like the famous fight sequence sprawled out over several counties.

What does the really good stuff taste like?

"Well," he pondered my question, licking his chops longingly, "it has a kind of smoky, thundery taste."

Italian Communist Party leader, Luigi Longo, dies

ROME (AP) — Luigi Longo, the Italian Communist Party leader who survived street battles, riots and wars through 60 years of radical politics, died Thursday in a Rome clinic after a long illness. He was 80 years old.

The Moscow-trained stalwart served as secretary of the West's largest Marxist party from 1964 to 1972, when he retired in favor of a new generation of "Eurocommunists" that rejected unquestioning acceptance of the Soviet policy line.

At the time of his death, Longo held the largely ceremonial post of party president.

Upon learning of his death, politicians headed by Italian President Sandro Pertini, a Socialist, went to the Gina clinic and paid their respects.

The Communist Party, now headed by Enrico Berlinguer, said Longo's body would be taken Friday to party headquarters near the Piazza Venezia where it would lie in state. The funeral is to be an open-air ceremony Saturday in St. John Lateran Square, where the fiery orator and World War II partisan leader often led party rallies.

Political sources said Longo's seat in Parliament probably would be taken by actress Carla Gravina, 38, a candidate

in the 1979 national elections.

The son of successful cloth merchants, Longo entered politics as a Socialist in 1919. He joined the Communist Party two years later at the urging of party founders Antonio Gramsci and Palmiro Togliatti, who preceded Longo as party secretary.

Longo distinguished himself by organizing mass demonstrations and strikes as a leader of the Communist Youth Federation in his native Piedmont in northern Italy. He attended the 1922 Congress of the Communist International, the last congress presided over by Lenin, and by 1935, his position in the party was secure.

He was arrested five times for subversive activity.

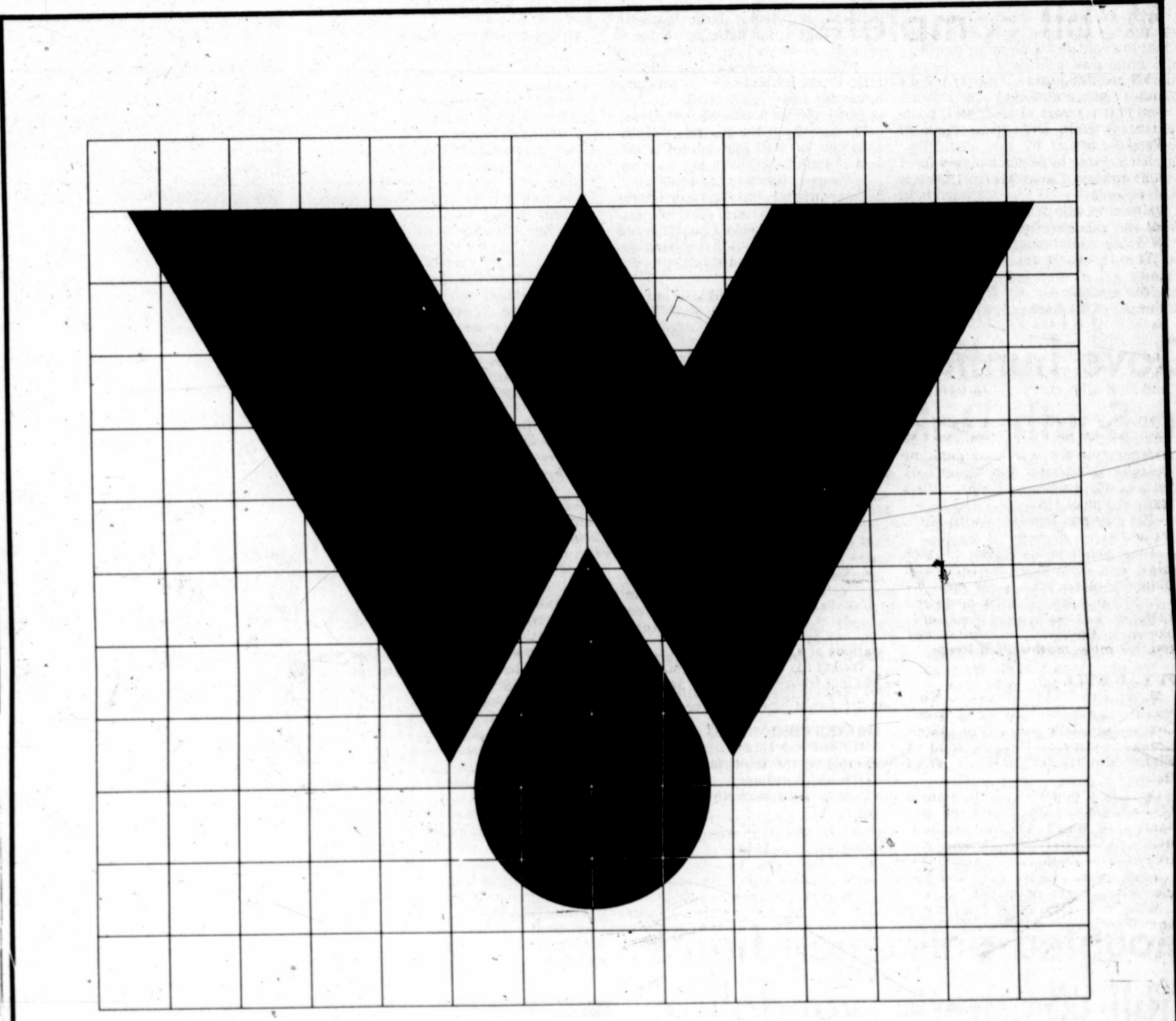

Severe tragedies belie Mary Tyler Moore

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — When the lights went out in the make-believe Minneapolis TV newsroom 3½ years ago, Mary Tyler Moore turned from TV situation comedies to

meatier stuff. But her TV image, indelibly etched in the public mind by seven years of "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" and countless reruns, dies hard.

To millions of Americans, she's still Mary Richards, the bright, sunny yet vulnerable producer, who broke new ground in TV comedy as a single, over-30 career woman. New traits for a sitcom star, not to mention wit, intelligence and sex appeal.

Off-camera, Miss Moore also seemed to radiate those qualities. Her marriage to producer Grant Tinker, her partner in Mary Tyler Moore Enterprises, seemed idyllic, a model for women aspiring to career and family life.

BUT THAT cheerful image has been crumbling lately — and, sadly, not only due to her determined quest for recognition as a serious actress.

Her only child, 24-year-old Richard Meeker, died Tuesday in Los Angeles of a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Her marriage to Tinker broke up last December. And 2½ years earlier, her sister Elizabeth died of a drug overdose at age 21.

Authorities still are trying to determine whether her son's death was an accident or suicide. The father, Richard C. Meeker, said Thursday he was certain his

son's death was accidental. "He just liked guns. He had them all over the place. It was just one of those things."

As an actress, Miss Moore has been dealing with tragedy in several highly-acclaimed performances since she left weekly television after flopping in two variety series.

In a TV film, "First You Cry," she played a career woman dealing with a mastectomy. In the Broadway show "Whose Life Is It Anyway?" she was a paralyzed artist fighting for the right to die.

And in an uncanny parallel to her current ordeal, Miss Moore plays a middle-aged, well-to-do matron whose normal self-control deserts her in the face of the death of one son and the attempted suicide of the other in the recently released, highly praised film "Ordinary People."

In real life, the 43-year-old actress — "devastated" by her son's death, according to Tinker — is a private person, reluctant to talk with friends about her own problems, much less to reporters. Hence the rosy image of her Mary Richards persisted.

But that has been changing, in part due to

four years of visits to a psychiatrist. In a recent interview in McCall's magazine, she said, "I never saw before that it wasn't fair to friends to present myself as a person without problems; I didn't understand that I was depriving them of a chance to be human."

IN THE SAME interview, she spoke of her childhood in less than glowing terms, saying she never was close to her parents. The family — her parents, sister Elizabeth and brother John — moved from Brooklyn, N.Y., to California when she was 10; when she was a teenager she moved in with her grandparents.

At 17, she married Richard Meeker and began acting in commercials. They were divorced when their son was 6, and six months later she married Tinker.

By then, she already was starring in her first TV series, playing housewife Laura Petrie in "The Dick Van Dyke Show."

After the series ended in 1966, she appeared in several so-so films — "Thoroughly Modern Millie," "What's So Bad About Feeling Good," "Don't Just Stand There," "Change of

Habit" and "Run a Crooked Mile" — and had a brief Broadway for making mistakes and role in a stage adaptation of "Breakfast at Tiffany's" before moving

on to the "Mary Tyler Moore Show" in 1970. Miss Moore, who now lives in New York, shies away from discussing why her two marriages failed, talking instead about her new-found independence.

"DO YOU EVER stop feeling naked without a man to rely on?" she wondered aloud in the McCall's interview. "I'm going to sound like a soap opera — 'A Woman's World.' It's scary, but

Author of 'Patton' is dead at 74

NEW YORK (AP) — Ladislas Farago, author of a biography of Gen. George Patton on which the Academy Award-winning film "Patton" was based, has died at age 74.

Farago died Wednesday at a New York hospital after a brief illness, according to a relative.

Farago wrote "Patton: Ordeal and Triumph," the 1964 book on which the film starring George C. Scott was based.

He also wrote "The Game of the Foxes," which was about espionage during World War II. Another book, "The Broken Seal," was the basis for the film "Tora! Tora! Tora!"

Before he died, Farago completed two manuscripts, "The Last Days of Patton," which McGraw-Hill plans to publish in February, and an untitled biography of FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

Farago, who lived in New York City and Southbury, Conn., wrote more than 15 books on espionage and military history, beginning with a 1935 account of the Italian invasion of Ethiopia.

Born in Hungary, he came to the United States in the late 1930s after serving as foreign editor of the London Sunday Chronicle. During World War II he worked in Naval intelligence.

He is survived by his wife, Lisel; a son, John; and a brother, Paul.

New medical committee being formed

JERUSALEM (AP) — The Israeli government is setting up a new watchdog committee to give prior approval for new medical techniques on humans like the experiment in genetic engineering conducted here last July.

Professor Baruch Modan, a top Health Ministry official, said Thursday that government regulations applying to the introduction of untried medicines will be expanded to include new medical practices.

The regulations were drawn up after news broke last week that an Israeli woman received an injection of foreign genes to treat a fatal blood disorder, in what was reported as the first test in humans of genetic engineering.

Treatments in Jerusalem's Hadassah Hospital and in a separate case at the University of Naples were supervised by Dr. Martin Cline of the University of California at Los Angeles after a committee at UCLA turned down a proposal for similar treatment there.

Modan said Cline won approval from Hadassah's ethics committee and had acted properly under existing regulations in July. "We are not trying to criticize what happened in the past. Everything was done legally," he said. But the Hadassah operation drew attention to a gaping hole in the regulations that was now to be filled, Modan said. If Cline wanted to repeat the experiment here he would have to apply to the new seven-man national committee, he said.

T. G. Sheppard concert is tonight

T.G. Sheppard performs in concert at 8 tonight at Chaparral Center along with Conway Twitty and TomPall Glaser and the Glaser Brothers. T.G.'s latest hit is "Do You Wanna Go To Heaven." Tickets priced at \$8.50 may be purchased at area record stores and Chapparral Center.

"Hello, this is T.G. Sheppard. How are you this evening?"

"Fine," came the reply, which was not true. It had been one of those uneasy out-of-sorts with self nothing wrong, nothing right days. And now it was early evening and things didn't seem to be faring much better.

But the voice had a refreshing quality to it which stopped the grumbling thoughts of a writer caught unprepared in the midst of an ill-lived day. He sounded as easy to talk with as an old friend. And he was.

T.G., who "works from 7 a.m. to 1 a.m." and considers himself "to be in that 2 percent that love to get up and go to work everyday," will be performing at 8 tonight at Chaparral Center along with Conway Twitty and TomPall Glaser and the Glaser Brothers.

He said he lives for those performances when the "lighting is just right, the audience is with you"; and those "nights when the magic unfolds on stage. I haven't been able to find that feeling anywhere except on stage."

Although T.G. "likes singing," he would "rather be known as an entertainer."

For him, a performance should "take the audience away from where they just came," encompassing both "comedy and sadness. It should show every aspect of a person's life," so that when an entertainer leaves the stage the audience feels it "knows that person personally."

At 36, T.G. said he spent some years working at purging himself of his ego and getting his priorities in order.

"Ego can totally destroy a person," T.G. said. "An entertainer takes a big chance if he portrays somebody other than himself on stage because, if he becomes popular," he never knows whether he's liked for what he is or what he pretends to be. "I want people to like me for what I really am."

Perhaps the event that most altered T.G.'s perspective on living was the death of his long time friend, Elvis Presley.

"A drastic change occurred in my life when Elvis died," T.G. said. "It scared the hell out of me."

"Until then, I thought life was what you obtained; the things you can keep score by."

In the 16 years T.G. knew Elvis, he said, "Elvis

tried to teach me differently, but I couldn't hear because I had never had anything" like expensive rings, cars, homes — in other words — unlimited resources.

"I was watching the funeral procession, when I turned to my wife, Diane, and said, 'I think a wall just fell on me.' She said, 'What do you mean?' I said, 'When you leave this world you don't take anything with you.' I quit from that moment on trying to collect and began to give."

"I really learned then," said T.G., "that peace and happiness come from within. Before that, I was working in this business for the wrong reasons."

"That was Aug. 16, 1977 and I've been a happy person since then: The more I work toward being a good person, the more successful I am."

T.G., whose latest album is "Smooth Sailing," said he is "a great believer in the power of positive thinking" and surrounds himself with people who "are positive" and who know him.

"If I get off the track, they tell me," T.G. said, adding he works at utilizing positive power. "I believe anything is possible, if you want it bad enough."

A lover of the outdoors who admits he doesn't have much time to enjoy nature, T.G. said he also likes to play golf and tennis when he gets the chance. But, his favorite hobby is people.

"I'm a people person and an avid people watcher."

For him, the healthiest thing in life is a "deep laugh."

"I'll do anything for a laugh. Now I'm not the kind of ham," he said, laughing, "that when the light comes on in the refrigerator I do 20 minutes. But I do like to have fun."

Perhaps spontaneous best describes the impact he has on the phone. T.G. believes the "secret to success is being able to communicate and converse with others," which he certainly does in a straightforward manner.

And maybe he best summed up his approach to life when he said of himself and those around him, "Everyone gives 100 percent. We all work toward a goal — living a day at a time and getting as much out of it as we can because tomorrow it might all be over. We work as hard as we can for our families and we have a good time."

Charley Pride feels so lucky to be alive

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Country music star Charley Pride, spared from death in an airplane collision over Texas in August, would like to portray the late Nat King Cole in a movie.

"I could do it with a little practice," said Pride, who has little acting experience but whose mellow voice is comparable to that of the late Cole. "The possibility is there; it's on the burner," Pride said.

Meantime, he said feels himself lucky to be alive to be considered for such a role. He and his traveling band escaped death Aug. 6 when their plane and a small Cessna collided, killing two people in the smaller plane. Pride's plane, a Fairchild 27, landed 20 minutes later despite extensive tail and rudder damage.

"I'm glad I'm here," Pride said in a telephone interview from his home in Dallas, where he was taking a couple of days off from concert dates.

"There could have been 19 casualties instead of two."

"We heard a 'whomp' while we were playing cards in the back. I said, 'What was that?' The captain came on and said we had a slight problem and to buckle up."

"We didn't get all the details until later so we were speculating what had happened. But we could tell the plane wasn't running normal as usual. The engines were fluctuating."

Thirty minutes after the plane landed, he found out two died in the other plane.

"My first thoughts on the ground were about the other people," recalled Pride, who picked cotton with his 10 brothers and sisters in Mississippi until he was 17. "I felt they probably came up on the shorter end."

After he landed amid the presence of emergency vehicles, he embraced pilot Bob Sowers whose cool handling of the situation may have saved 19 lives.

"We didn't realize until we landed what he went through," Pride said. "He put his great ability plus all his experience to work to get us down. A good pilot doesn't think about the circumstances, he just uses his experience to get you on the ground safely."

Pride is still flying, using a plane formerly owned by Donny and Marie Osmond. In fact, he flew one night after the accident.

"I hope and pray it doesn't happen again. It was in the hands of a higher being," he said.

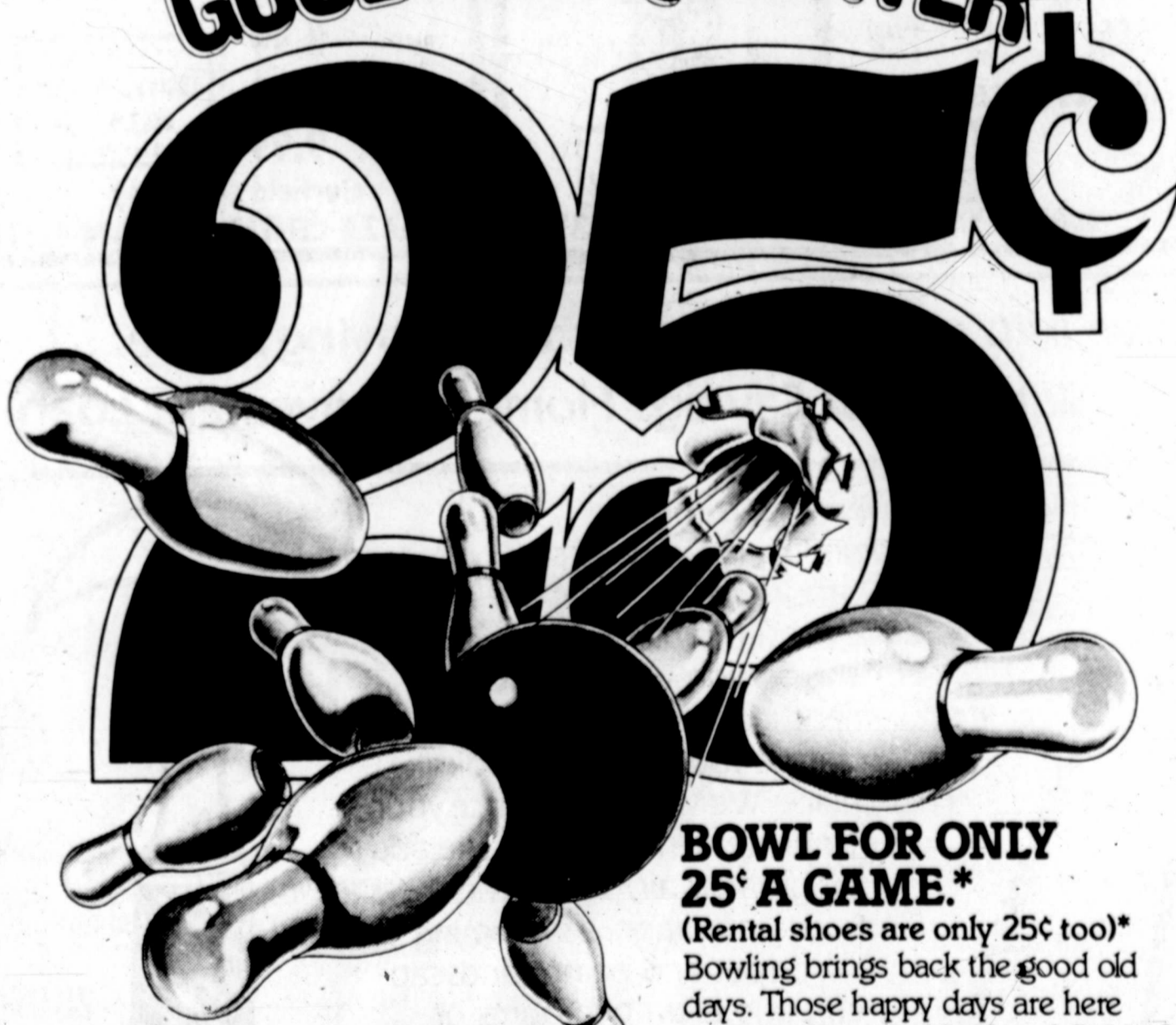

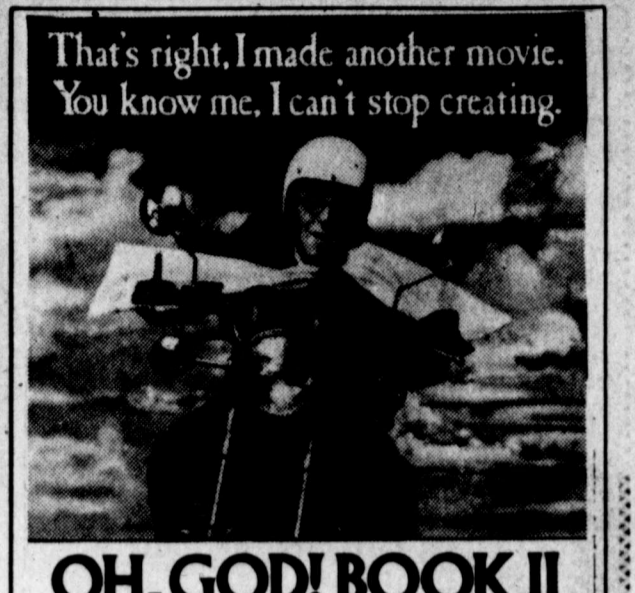

Steve Allen: back in prime time

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Last spring, just after carving for himself one of the sweetest deals in the history of television, Johnny Carson proceeded to kill a "Steve Allen Show" NBC had planned for the slot following "Tonight."

Carson didn't want comedy following his show. So, NBC kept Tom Snyder and "Tomorrow."

In vetoing the proposed Allen show, Carson was actually doing Allen and TV viewers a favor. Beginning Saturday night, Allen will have a comedy series in prime time. Steve Allen is back in network favor.

It is a circumstance to be welcomed (although it's strange to realize that even his huge talent could be subject to the trends and whims of TV fashion).

Allen's entire time around was his brief stint in that NBC variety elephant, "Big Show," which stuck just long enough for people to realize that network television needs Steve Allen. This isn't said as a nostalgic exercise, but because Steve Allen is a genius with a sense of humor. If television can have him, it should jump.

NBC President Fred Silverman did, excitedly offering Allen the late-night job, then, after the Carson six, this comedy series.

This could be just the right thing. It will be an hour of comedy, nothing else, with Allen and guests working skits and those patented Steve Allen impromptu devices — man-on-the-street interviews and the like. "I'm not doing a variety show," Allen says. "I make my living with comedy and that's what it will be. There will be no dancing bears."

"My stock has risen, and they're willing to put me on the air now. It's purely a matter of what's box office, and I don't say that critically. Five years ago, you couldn't have sold a 'Steve Allen Show' to TV. You could have told them 'This guy's great, he's funny,' and all of that, and the network feeling was, 'You don't have to tell us about Steve Allen. But we need ratings. We need someone who's hot.'

"This wouldn't be happening now if it weren't for the fortunate accident of their needing someone with some experience to come out and say, 'Good Evening' for the 'Big Show.' There are some things that Erik Estrada is just not perfect for."

Even his job with "Big Show" was offered with reluctance. NBC wanted Bert Reynolds to act as host, asking Allen after Reynolds declined.

In the premiere show, Saturday, Allen will be joined by Steve Martin, Lucille Ball, George Kennedy, Louis Nye and Steve Landesberg, himself a talented ad-lib comedian. NBC isn't quite sure what

Rebs defeat attempt to take valley

NEW DELHI (AP) — Moslem rebels repelled an attempt by Soviet and Afghan government forces to capture a strategic Afghan mountain pass in a four-day battle, causing heavy casualties, according to a Kabul source whose reports have been accurate in the past.

The source, who arrived from the Afghan capital Thursday, said the anti-communist rebels killed or wounded 40-50 Soviet soldiers and killed "hundreds" of Afghan Marxist volunteers and tribal mercenaries during the fighting in the Ghorband Valley, 60 miles northwest of Kabul.

"Losses on the Mujahdeen (rebel) side were heavy as well," he said.

The source said 400 Soviet tanks and armored vehicles and about 1,000 Afghan volunteers and mercenaries were involved in the attempt, which he claimed was the first major government offensive since the Soviets abandoned efforts to seize the Panjshir Valley last month. Rebel-held Panjshir lies northeast of Kabul.

There was no independent confirmation of the report, but diplomatic sources in Kabul said they had received accounts of a pitched battle in the Ghorband Valley area with heavy losses on both sides.

In a separate meeting with reporters here, an Afghan army defector claimed in a report that could not be verified that an underground network with 40,000 members was being set up around the country, preparing to move against Soviet forces.

Within three months, he said, there would be a wave of assassinations and bombings in Kabul. "The events will be very sensational," said the defector, who declined use of his name.

He said the group stole money from the Afghan government and weapons from Soviet troops.

Sometimes the Soviets readily accepted hashish in exchange for their Kalashnikovs, he claimed. "The soldiers take the hashish and get intoxicated and we overpower them and take their arms."

The rebel said he had helped set up the group shortly after an estimated 85,000 Soviet troops entered Afghanistan last December, ousting Afghan President Hafizullah Amin and installing Babrak Karmal.

Karmal traveled to Moscow Thursday for the first time since he was installed. He met with President Leonid I. Brezhnev and other Kremlin officials, and receiving a warm welcome despite speculation by sources in New Delhi that the Afghan leader

might be in trouble because of continued resistance to his regime by the Afghan rebels.

Brezhnev used the occasion of a state dinner in Karmal's honor to repeat Soviet charges that America was behind an "undeclared war" on Afghanistan.

He also charged that "feverish military preparations and unrestrained propaganda — it can be even said a eulogy of nuclear war — have reached an unprecedented scale in the United States," according to a report in the official Tass news agency.

Before the dinner, the Soviet and Afghan delegations signed a joint statement expressing satisfaction "with the successful and fruitful development of Soviet-Afghan friendship," Tass said. The news agency account made no mention of the Soviet troops in Afghanistan.

The declaration was not expected to be made public until after Karmal leaves the Soviet Union sometime this weekend, but diplomats here predicted the Afghan regime would receive pledges of massive economic, technical, political and military support.

'Pray-in' timed to witches' meeting

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — As followers of the Church of Wicca — also known as witches — head for a weekend seminar here, evangelists are organizing a "pray-in" aimed at thwarting the "demonic forces" they believe will be conjured up at the pre-Halloween gathering.

Those prayers are welcome, says an organizer of the seminar. "We don't want any demonic spirits either," said Skip Tarrant, director of the International School of Wicca in New Bern, N.C.

People who show up at the seminar in hopes of seeing bizarre rituals will be disappointed, he said, adding that gathering will be nothing more than discussions and lectures that many people might find boring.

"We are here for a seminar, not to cast circles, put on robes and dance around fires. Most of us do that at one time or another, but we do it at home," he said. "Our avowed intention is to ignore them (the evangelists) as much as possible."

But Judy and Jimmy Mamou, an Amarillo couple, disagree. They have organized a "pray-in" Saturday for

what they say will be "several hundred people" near the hotel where the witches will meet.

"We're not there to interfere with the seminar at all," Mrs. Mamou said. "We felt they would be chanting and using witchcraft and wizardry and that is forbidden in the Bible."

"We feel like the spirits they will be calling on will be demonic. ... If we stand together, our prayers of faith to the God Almighty will cancel those demonic forces."

The witches' seminar, expected to draw "several hundred" of the church's "several thousand" members nationwide, coincides with the witches' new year — celebrated on the full moon closest to Nov. 1 — Oct. 23 this year, Tarrant said.

The gathering has attracted attention because of the involvement of Loy and Louise Stone, directors of the Church of Arinahu, a branch of the Church of Wicca. Stone was acquitted last February of the 1977 Halloween shooting death of a 15-year-old girl.

Stone has said he and his wife were holding a witchcraft seminar at their Dimmitt, Texas, home that night and were harassed by teen-agers. He said

he fired a shot in the air to scare off five teen-agers. Roxanne Casas was killed and two other youths were wounded.

The Stones, who have lived in seclusion since the trial, released a statement saying the upcoming seminar was intended to "promote understanding and unity among those who were interested" and to "illustrate that witches — male or female — don't always have long, warty noses

nor wear pointy hats and brew evil-smelling concoctions in a cauldron." Mrs. Stone said witches do not believe in Satan, but a god, or creator, who recognizes people for their talents. Tarrant said the group teaches witchcraft as part of its religious ceremonies.

"We are very heavily into philosophy," Tarrant said. "It's a fairly intellectual type of individual religion for thinking people."

Teen gets death rap

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A jury convicted Joseph Marshall, 16, of first degree murder and recommended the death sentence early today in the slaying of a Texas businessman who was shot to death as he and another out-of-state couple searched for a French Quarter restaurant.

Judge Alvin V. Oser of criminal district court set an Oct. 23 sentencing date, although imposition of the death penalty carries an automatic appeal.

Marshall, 15 at the time, was accused in the March 23 shooting of Max Minnig, a Borden executive from Houston, Texas, whose assailant fired a third shot into his body as the conventioner lay dying in the street.

Minister writes self-criticism

PEKING (AP) — Chinese Commerce Minister Wang Lei, accused of enjoying sumptuous restaurant meals at nominal "special guest" rates, has written a self-criticism and offered to pay the full cost, the People's Daily reported today.

The Communist Party newspaper said Wang acted after China's Youth News ran a front-page expose Thursday from a young cook at Peking's popular Feng Ze Yuan restaurant.

The Youth News said Wang used to scare the staff there by losing his temper over the slightest provocation, and most of the staff worried only about keeping him happy.

In his self-criticism, Wang blamed his mistakes on the idea that "rank has its privileges," promised to reform and asked for party disciplinary measures against himself, the People's Daily reported.

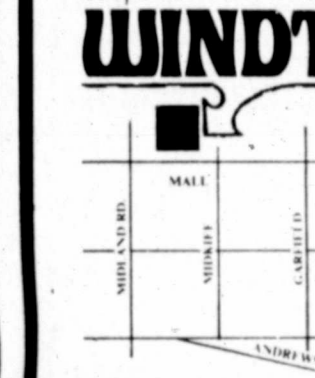
