### 'Vampire' dead

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (AP) - Richard Chase, the so-called "vampire killer" convicted of six grisly murders in the Sacramento area, was found dead in his Death Row cell Friday, a

possible suicide. Prison spokesman Mike Madding said a preliminary examination by the Marin County Coroner's office showed Chase, 30, swallowed a fatal amount of anti-depressant pills prescribed

by a physician. An officer making lunch rounds called into Chase's cell about 11 a.m. and asked if he wanted his meal. When no one answered, the officer looked inside and reported that Chase was slumped on his bed, his feet

and legs dangling to the floor. Prison doctors pronounced Chase dead at 11:23 a.m., Madding said.

### Dogs practicing?

CINCINNATI (AP) - A man who was attacked by two terriers, the type often used in illegal dog fighting, says the animals may have been set on him

for fighting practice. Lee Dorsey, who has been hospitalized since he was attacked late at night on Dec. 13, told police the dogs seemed to obey an unseen trainer's commands when they attacked him near a Cincinnati high school football

"I could see they were well taken care of," Dorsey said. "They were clean, well-fed; their teeth were good. Never did I know that one or two would attack a person for no reason at all - not unless put to it."

#### Texans charged

NUEVO LAREDO, Mexico (AP) - Two Texans were charged with arson after one of them allegedly flipped a burning cigarette into a fireworks stand, igniting a blaze that gutted a popular shopping center and killed a night watchman.

Workers on Friday discovered the body of 60-year-old Simon Reyes Puente, the father-in-law of market manager Luis Sanchez. Officials said Puente, whose body was pinned to the floor by a heavy beam, apparently died of asphyxiation.

Bond was denied for Santos Hernandez Zapata of Laredo and a 16-year-old companion whose name was not released by police. Authorities Friday said they were contemplating additional charges against the two.

# Hostages send holiday greetings

More than a dozen of the 52 Americans forced to spend a second Christmas as hostages in Iran offered holiday greetings to their families and countrymen Friday via a televised broadcast that also showed them singing Christmas carols and receiving gifts from visiting priests.

"God bless all of you, and God bless America," said hostage Steven Lauterbach, 28, of Dayton, Ohio. "I would like to say hello to my family and friends ... and wish them a happy holiday season."

Lauterbach's brother, Victor, 21, said Steven looked "in pretty good health and pretty good spirits. We were glad to see him on television, but we'd rather have him in the flesh.

"They seem to be all fairly well, but what they need is freedom," President Carter said. President-elect Ronald Reagan declined comment.

The film of the hostages, made by Iranian television, showed them sitting at a table at a solemn holiday party. In the background was a decorated Christmas tree, and on the table were boxes of fresh fruit.

They sang "Silent Night" and "Away In A Manger" and got wrapped Christmas gifts and communion from Bishop Yohannan Issaie of the Catholic Chaldean minority in Iran and two Roman Catholic priests.

The film was relayed to the United States Friday morning. CBS, which acted as the pool for U.S. television networks receiving the broadcast, said the transmission was delayed in Iran, possibly by censorship.

A separate, six-minute silent clip, also made in Iran, was shown Thursday on the three U.S. commercial TV networks and on Cable News Network. It was the first film of the hostages since Easter.

"Hi, Connie and Scott. As you can see, I'm healthy and well, so don't worry about me," said hostage Phillip Ward, whose wife lives in Culpepper, Va. "I'm doing just fine. And Scott, I expect you to continue the good work in school, and help mom around the house and don't forget to feed the wild birds this winter. They'll probably be getting

Most of the 21 hostages who gave statements on the films did not identify themselves, but CNN provided on-the-screen identifications of some of the speakers during its broadcast. CBS said there were five hostages shown who did not give statements.

# All 52 U.S. hostages found to be healthy

Algeria's ambassador to Iran said Friday that he met with all 52 American hostages, found them healthy and talked with them for several hours about negotiations for their release.

Iran's chief negotiator said his country would consider U.S. counterproposals but would not reduce the \$24 billion Iran demands in exchange for the hostages.

Algerian Ambassador Abdelkarim Gheraieb's visit with the three Americans in Tehran's Foreign Ministry and the 49 others in an unnamed location, allayed fears for the safety of some hostages whose conditions had not been reported in many

Gheraieb then headed for Washington where he was expected to join two other Algerian intermediaries, apparently to report on the hostages' conditions or await a U.S. reply to the latest Iranian demands.

An Iranian television film broadcast in the United States on Friday showed a dozen of the hostages sending encouraging messages to their families. A brief film Thursday showed some of them during a Christmas visit with clergymen.

President Carter said he was relieved to hear all the the hostages had been visited and were reported in good health and high spirits, but called their continued imprisonment "insulting ... What they need is free-

The militants holding the Americans captive claimed they scattered the hostages around the country after

the failed U.S. rescue attempt last April, but Gheraieb's visit and the Christmas visit of papal envoy Anibale Bugnini indicated all the hostages still were in the Iranian capi-

Bugnini, who said he saw 25 to 30 hostages Thursday, was blindfolded en route to the meeting but from the length of the drive it appeared he stayed within the city. Gheraieb, too, said he was blindfolded

Gheriaeb and Algerian Economic Consul Ben Hossein spent several hours - some reports said 111/2 hours - Christmas night and early Friday morning visiting all of the hostages and said they brought the Americans up to date on the latest developments in negotiations.

U.S. officials said Gheriaeb, who heads the Algerian intermediary team, would meet with Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher for a review of latest developments upon his arrival in Washington. The other two Algerians involved in the Washington meetings are Redha Malek. Algerian ambassador to the United States, and Mohamed Seghir, governor of the Central Bank of Algeria.

One report said Gheraieb's talks with the hostages were held at U.S. and Iranian request. State Department spokeswoman Sue Pittman said it was hoped his visit would set a precedent for regular meetings with the hostages.

Iran's last message was a demand the United States deposit \$24 billion in cash and gold with the Algerian gov-

ernment as a guarantee. Iranian Executive Affairs Minister

Behzad Nabavi, head of the hostage negotiating team, told reporters in Tehran that Iran would listen to any alternative method of payment that the United States might propose although he said he knew of no such

method. "Of course if we can have any other suggestion that would be like a guarantee yes, we would listen," Nabavi " told reporters. But he insisted the \$24-billion figure would not be re-

Iran had called the financial demands its final answer and said there is no room for bargaining. Nabavi's new comments were the first indication the revolutionary government might be flexible at least in regard to the execution of its financial de-

meanwhile, said the hostages' living conditions seemed satisfactory 'They looked to us in good health and as far as morale, they seemed OK, Hossein said in an interview.

"Of course they are wondering what is going on and how the negotiations are proceeding. This is the main questions we had from them.

Asked if he had been able to provide details of the situation Hossein replied: "The whole details no but we gave them a general idea of what is going on

"Of course they hope that there will be a conclusion, a good ending to this negotiations and that that it will end soon. I think they are hopeful," he said of the reaction of the hostages, but of course they are not sure that this will end positively soon.

## 'It's a criminal act,' says Carter, 'it has been from the beginning'

PLAINS, Ga. (AP) - President Carter said today-that while he is reassured by eyewitness accounts that all 52 Americans held hostage in Iran are alive and well, he still believes it "insulting" that they continue to be held prisoner.

'What they need is freedom," the president said. Speaking to reporters outside his mother's home in Plains, the president said that Algerian diplomats report that they have seen all 52 hos-

Referring to the hostages being visited by the Algerians, he said, "We are pleased that they have been finally observed by someone in whom we

'They all seem quite well and we are very pleased at that," he said of He said the United States knows where all the hostages are being held

and is aware that their accommodations are "not luxury. "It's still imprisonment," he said. "They're not free. That's the most

important single thing. It's a criminal act. It has been from the very begin-The president said the United States is doing the best it can to gain the

freedom of the hostages. "But we just don't know what the future will hold," he "It's still insulting to see them held as prisoners," he added.

He said that it is obvious that the families of the hostages were pleased to know "that they are up and around and seem to be in good health.

Carter said he was especially pleased that all the hostages have been seen because he said the whereabouts of three or Sfour of them had not been known In Washington, meanwhile, a State Department spokeswoman said that it was hoped the visit to the hostages by Algeria's ambassador to Iran,

Abdel Karim Gheraieb, will serve as a precedent for other visits. "In this way we and the rest of the world, which has joined in condemnation of that detention, can have regular reports on the hostage situation,"

said spokeswoman Sue Pittman.

# Paris grande dame to get face lift PARIS (AP) - At age 91, the Eiffel Tower is ailing famous than I am." Eiffel said shortly before his

and city officials have decided to close the first level of the world-famous monument for at least a year. The 7,500-ton grande dame of Paris, a staging ground for lovers, protesters, artists, moviemakers and suicides, is getting a face lift.

The restoration of one of the world's most visited tourist sights will entail reinforcing the tower's floors and replacing its aging hydraulic elevators with electric ones.

The famed restaurant on the tower's 190-foot high first-level platform is throwing one last "dinner spectacle" Wednesday night in a New Year's Eve champagne bash and then turning off its lights. "We won't be back for at least a year," a spokes-

man for the En Plein Ciel restaurant said. "We're looking for a new location until then, but whatever we find will never be able to compare. The rest of first level, the most visited of the tower's three platforms, will close two weeks later.

The second level will remain open to the public while the third will reopen in March after a normally scheduled four-month winter hibernation. The 985-foot 11-inch Eiffel Tower was the tallest man-made structure on earth when it opened at the Paris Exhibition of 1889. It was built for \$1.5 million by Gustav Eiffel, a master engineer who also helped

design the Panama Canal. Two hundred men spent 27 months building it. "I should be jealous of the tower - it's more

In the nine decades it has dominated the skyline of the City of Light, the Eiffel Tower has drawn a good number of publicity seekers. People have climbed it backwards, on their hands, on stilts, piggyback and naked. The mayor of Montmartre once rode down its steps on a bicycle.

The tower also has been deadly. About 400 people have jumped to their deaths from the Paris land-

This year, the Eiffel Tower greeted more than 3 million visitors, who took away 2 million minature copies of the tower and sent 1.5 million postcard pictures of it to the folks back home. It earns \$10

But Eiffel's engineering wonder was not always so

During its construction, the tower caused an uproar among Paris artists. In an open letter, they called it "a dizzy, ridiculous tower dominating Paris like a black and gigantic factory chimney.

The tourist sight almost never made it past its 20th birthday. It was scheduled to be torn down in 1909 and was saved from destruction only when the French army discovered its tower would make an excellent communication station for army posts stationed hundreds of miles away.

During World War I, it was the tower's aerial and wireless station that intercepted a radio message that led to the arrest and execution of Mata Hari as a



# Cold, wet, hungry 12-year-old rejected by his mother on

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — The case of a 12-year-old boy who ran away from home just before Christmas and was then rejected by his mother will be turned over to social workers and a

family court, police said Friday. 'We're not going to forget this, said Sgt. Robert Connell of the Columbia Police Department. "We're going as far as we can with it."

The unidentified boy was being kept Friday at a youth shelter operated by the state Department of Social Services. Officers said the case would be turned over to a family court Monday investigation.

No charges have been filed. But Sgt. Gordon A. Crews, a detective in the juvenile division, said, "Criminal charges (against the parents) definitely are possible, depending on what we come up with in our investiga-

The cold, wet and hungry boy was found by a passerby walking on the Sumter Highway at 1:30 a.m. Wednesday, officers said. He had run

away about 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.

with a recommendation for further had been kicked out, but Crews said the boy left and his mother refused to take him back when police took the boy to the home on Christmas Eve.

The boy told officers his parents "just didn't want him anymore and if they didn't want him, he didn't want them," said Connell.

Police originally listed the boy's age as 9, but they later found out that he had given them the wrong year when he was asked for his birthdate

Wednesday. The boy was on his way to an aunt's Officers earlier had said the boy home on the Sumter Highway when police were called by the passerby. They telephoned the aunt and the boy spent part of the holiday with her.

The boy's birthday was Dec. 20, but he received no presents, said Crews. "From what he told us, it didn't appear he was going to get anything for-Christmas either," he added.

"He told us he didn't want to go back because of the way he was being treated." Crews said.

"He said anything that happened, whether he did it or not, he got blamed for it," the officer continued. "Some things he did do, but some

things he didn't and he was blamed for everything that happened.

The boy, a pupil at Hand Middle School in Columbia, was living with his mother and a man he described as his stepfather, Crews said. His father apparently lives somewhere in Georgia, the investigator said.

Connell said a patrol car was sent to the mother's home with a message to call police headquarters. When no one called, Connell said he and another officer drove the boy to the parents' home


"They absolutely refused to take

him back," Connell said.

"He seemed real happy when she refused to take him back," said Crews. "When he came back in here he was smiling and grinning.'

Before taking him to the shelter. police officers gave the boy gifts during their annual Christmas Eve party at the station. They presented him with gifts of a small football, wrist watch and about \$25 in cash.

"He was well-mannered and we just felt sorry for him," said Sgt. R.G. Knox. "We don't know a thing about his family except that they didn't want him

# Hospitals face troubles with unionized workers

BALTIMORE (AP) — Contract talks broke off Friday between unionized health care workers and Maryland General Hospital, while employees of two other Baltimore hospitals voted on proposed contracts.

Ronald Hollie, president of Local 1199-E of the National Union of Hospital and Health Care Employees, said the union had set a new strike deadline of Jan. 9 at Maryland General.

The union originally planned a strike for 7 a.m. Friday, but the deadline was extended temporarily while contract talks were conducted. The talks broke off Friday afternoon, and no further negotiations were scheuled

A hospital spokeswoman said the sticking point in the contract talks continued to be the union's welfare and benefits fund.

Susan Mancuso said the hospital had offered the workers 8 percent for each of two years of the proposed contract for cost-of-living and had offered payment of 8.5 percent of the

union payroll into the union's benefits fund, down 1½ percent from what the hospital had been paying under the expired contract.

"Evidently, what we offered wasn't acceptable to the union," Ms. Mancu-

She said no further negotiations had been scheduled.

Spokesmen at Lutheran and Provident hospitals said workers voted on tentative agreements reached early Tuesday by the hospitals and the

The union ratified a two-year contract with the Greater Baltimore Medical Center in suburban Towson on Wednesday.

Gary Michael, a spokesman at the Greater Baltimore Medical Center, said workers approved a new, twoyear contract providing an annual 8 percent pay increase.

# Christmas sales finally take off

The Christmas gift-buying bug almost forgot to bite this year. But when it did, Americans flocked to many retail stores in a rush one shopowner called "absolutely mind-boggling. Sales in the weeks before Christmas

had been sluggish, but an eleventh hour shopping surge struck a merry note on retailers' cash registers from coast to coast, an Associated Press survey indicated Friday.

"What started out to be a moderate December turned out to be gang busters," said a spokesman for the Lazarus department stores in Colum-

The Lazarus spokesman, who asked not to be identified, said the biggest surge came on Saturday and Sunday. But many other retailers reported

their best gains on the final three days

before Christmas. "We sold to the walls in the last few days," said Michael Lauerman, general manager at Saks Fifth Avenue in suburban Philadelphia. Cosmetics

sold especially well, he added. In Los Angeles, Broadway stores spokeswoman Suzy Lewis, said sales were "very good" on Monday and Tuesday, with "better-quality items" doing especially well.

'It was the old Christmas syndrome," said Jeffrey Edelman, retail analyst at Dean Witter Reynolds Inc. in New York. "When it comes down to the wire, the purse tends to get opened regardless of the environ-

"A lot of people just don't have any money because the economy is so bad," said Claudia Davis, manager of a Spencer's Gifts outlet in Little Rock, Ark. "I think some of them were waiting on their last paycheck before they bought anything.

But the rush was not universal. 'In a word, it's a disappointment,"

said Cavan Riley, a K mart manager in Cheyanne, Wyo., where relatively warm weather was blamed for poor sales of winter clothes. "People are being very frugal. What people are shopping for are practical items.'

Pat Coon, head cashier at Hughes & Hatcher men's specialty shop in downtown Cleveland, said the store was "super busy" Monday through Wednesday.

"I even had one of our buyers down here wrapping gifts," Mrs. Coon said.

In Troy, N.Y., the general manager of Stanley's Department Store said sales on Christmas Eve were up 20 percent over the same day last year, but had been only "fair" earlier in the month.

"We had to throw people out when we closed at 5 o'clock Christmas Eve," said Stanley's manager Sidney Feibus, adding the crush was "absolutely mind-boggling."

The retailers were aided by this year's calendar, which had Christmas on a Thursday, rather than a Tuesday as last year. That helped to make up for a relatively late Thanks-

The surge of buying helped to brighten what had been a disappointing Christmas season for retailers. Sales had been sluggish, with the blame being put on inflation, signs that the economy may be heading for another recession, and the effects of rising interest rates.

'People had a desire to treat themselves for Christmas," said Rudolph L. Hirsch, president of Chicago's division of Marshall Field & Co. "They had been caught in an economic squeeze, and they didn't chintz when it came to Christmas.'

Many retailers said men's and women's apparel, home furnishings, cosmetics and jewelry were among the biggest sellers. Novelties and Christmas decorations were reported to have done poorly at a number of

"People were buying necessities like shirts. They stayed away from some of the gimmicks we've sold in previous years," said Connie Burch, assistant manager of the Hudson-Belk department store in downtown

# Consumers borrowing more, enjoying it less these days

Twas the day after Christmas, And away went the smiles, As the mail brought the bills, To be stacked in big piles.

Americans charge billions of dollars in gifts and other purchases during the holiday season. In the last quarter of 1979, for example, retailers, banks and other lenders extended \$34.5 billion in revolving credit - the kind you get with charge cards. Consumers borrowed more in revolving credit during December - \$12.9 billion - than in any other

Credit-card use declined in some areas this year due to rising interest rates and a tight economy, but the charges still added up to billions and the post-Christmas period is a good time to review the advantages and disadvantages of credit. Interest rates are rising and the old ceilings usually 1.5 percent a month or 18 percent a year on a revolving account no longer apply in many places. And while credit may be expensive, it is hard to avoid.

The National Association of Federal Credit Unions notes that credit is more than charge cards and purchases. You are using credit, for example, when you pay your electricity bill at the end of the month.

"Credit usage is not only very common, but it is in fact essential in any economy," says the association, which designed a credit management seminar for its members so they, in turn, could help their members handle family finances.

The association drew up a list of pluses and minuses attached to credit. First, the advantages:

-Credit lets you use a product while it is being paid for.

-Credit can help you meet emergencies. -Credit can be used to level out peaks and valleys in family income or

-Credit can act as a form of forced savings for people who cannot manage to put money aside to buy something - no matter how much they

-Credit lets you take advantage of special sales. -Credit makes recordkeeping easier, particularly for business people

who need evidence for income tax purposes. -Credit acts as a hedge against inflation. You can beat rising prices,

while paying back your debt with dollars that are worth less. Now, the drawbacks: -Credit costs money - in several ways. Unless you pay your bill immediately, you face interest charges. Less-obvious costs include

things like membership fees, charges for credit reports and even the price of the postage you use to pay your bill. -Credit encourages impulse buying and it can become habit-form-

-Credit ties up future earnings. You lose flexibility -There is a limit on the amount of credit you can get. Some people overuse credit to the point where they can no longer get more; when they

really need to charge, they cannot There are several things you can do to help yourself if you are in debt over your head. Esther Peterson, director of the U.S. Office of Consumer Affairs, says the initial step should be a call to your creditors. "Many times you can work out special arrangements," she says. If you DO work

out a new repayment plan, get the creditor's agreement in writing. If you cannot arrange things yourself, you might want to consider counseling. The non-profit 1consumer Credit Counseling Service has chapters in over 200 cities. The groups offer advice on budgets and can help you work out a debt-management plan that you can live with and your creditors will agree to. The counseling services are supported by local retailers, banks, credit card companies and other lenders. They usually charge a small monthly fee. Mrs. Peterson says the counselors can provide valuable advice, but she adds: "Be wary of becoming locked into inflexible repayment schedules with accompanying high interest

But for four young Midland children in the burn center at Oklahoma City Children's Hospital, the prospects for Christmas looked gloomy, to With their mothers facing felony charges and possible jail sentences

and only the prospect of more painful burn treatments to look forward to, Christmas apparently seemed doomed to be nothing more than a hollow mockery Instead, there was Santa, presents and carolers.

The day after Santa's visit, Hobbart Williams, 4; Tyrone Williams, 1; and Lakephine Williams, 3, were listed in fair condition with severe burns over their bodies. Karen Williams, 3, was listed in good condition. Hobbart, Tyrone and Karen are the children of Kathy Williams. Lakephine is the daughter of Brenda Williams.

'Santa Claus came in," said a hospital spokesman late Friday, "at 7: 30 Christmas morning, and they got sacks of presents ranging from baby dolls to Tonka trucks and stuffed animals. "They were all awake and had their picture taken with Santa. They got

a Polaroid picture of them with Santa and it was taped to their bed so they can see it. "Christmas carolers came to every unit of the hospital and sang Christmas songs, so they were serenaded while Santa delivered his gifts."

The hospital spokesman explained that Santa timed all his visits at the hospital to coincide with the carolers. "They (the Williams children) seemed to really enjoy it. They're still

playing with their toys. There are so many of them, they can switch toys every hour.' The toys are paid for by donations to the hospital and through the hospi-

tal's volunteer services. The four children were severely burned Dec. 13 in an early morning fire when the two-room shack in which they were sleeping caught

Fire Department officials suspect an extension cord, stretched into the house to provide electricity, shorted out and caused the blaze. A neighbor, Joe O'Neal, saw the flames as he drove past and woke the owner of the house, Willie B. Thomas. Thomas had rented the house, which sat in the alley behind his residence at 209 N. Madison St., to

Brenda and Kathy Williams. Thomas grabbed a garden hose and sprayed water on the flames while O'Neal dashed in three times to pull the children to safety. Three police officers were commended for their work with the children after they had

According to information given to Fire Department officials, neither of the mothers was home when the 12:45 a.m. fire started. Both mothers were indicted last week by a Midland County grand jury for injury to a child, a felony charge, and were taken into custody early this week. They are now free on bond.

# Four suspects arrested following killing of police officer at Amarillo

AMARILLO (AP) - Four men have been arrested and one of them charged with capital murder following the Christmas night killing of a police officer making a routine traffic stop, officials said Friday.

Ernesto Gutierrez, 17, was arraigned shortly after his arrest early. Friday in Dumas on the murder charge in connection with the shooting death of officer Barry McGuire, 26, whose body was found near his patrol car after he radioed for assis-

Peace Justice Gilbert Couch denied bond for Gutierrez, who officers say was arrested as he returned to his mother's home in Dumas about 7 a.m. Friday

The other three suspects were arrested earlier - two of them about two hours after the shooting when their car ran out of gas near the Candadian River 17 miles north of Amarillo - and the third as he walked along a railroad track in

The three suspects are 18, 19 and 21 years old and are all believed to be from the Denton-Dumas area. Police

said they will be arraigned Monday. One of the men, believed to be the driver of the car, was still wearing McGuire's handcuffs when he was arrested.

Capt. Herb Hill of the Amarillo Police Dept. said McGuire, who joined the force in July 1978, had stopped the suspects late Thursday night when their car ran a red light in an east Amarillo residential area.

He said McGuire arrested the driver on suspicion of driving while intoxicated, handcuffed him and placed him in his patrol car, then radioed for a backup unit and went to arrest the

other three suspects. Witnesses told police that when McGuire returned to the suspects' car, the three men jumped the officer and managed to get his .357 Magnum service revolver away from him-

### Black patrolman dies near Denton in wreck during high-speed chase

DENTON (AP) - A 24-year-old state trooper whom officials say is the first black state patrolman to die in the line of duty was killed Friday during a high speed chase, the Department of Public Safety said.

came up to the stop sign with all his lights flashing and the siren on,"





## Hua absent

PEKING (AP) - Communist Party Chairman Hua Guofeng, last seen in public 29 days ago, was absent from the ranks of officials who met with visiting Pakistani Foreign Minister Agha Shahi. Foreign diplomats here say Hua's unexplained disappearance indicated his ouster may be immi-

Pakistani officials said Shahi had left his appointments up to Chinese officials, who arranged meetings for him with Foreign Minister Huang Hua, Premier Zhao Ziyang and Party Vice-Chairman Deng Xiaoping, the key man in Chinese politics.

Shahi was to leave Peking today without the traditional meeting with the Communist Party chief.

The official Chinese press has published increasingly sharp attacks against Hua, successor to the late Chairman Mao Tse tung, accusing him of clinging to some of Mao's discredited radical ideas while the rest of the party moderated its poli-

Diplomatic sources say Hua is expected to resign formally at a party Central Committee meeting scheduled for January.

Planning Minister Yao Yilin denied Monday that Hua has already submitted his resignation. Only the party's Central Committee or Congress can decide Hua's future status, he said.

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# Blackledge comes back to haunt Ohio State

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) - Todd Blackedge, a native shunned by Ohio State, came back to haunt the Buckeyes in the Fiesta Bowl Friday.

e stu

"They talked to me as a junior. They were looking at me as a tight end or a linebacker," the Penn State freshman quarterback said of Ohio State after leading the Nittany Lions to a 31-19 victory over the Buckeyes.

"They really didn't recruit me as a senior because Art Schlichter was progressing so well," said the product of North Canton, Ohio.

BLACKLEDGE UPSTAGED his more heralded rival Schlichter in the second half of the Fiesta Bowl, scoring one touchdown and leading 10thranked Penn State on two other scoring marches that wiped out a 12-point lead for No. 11 Ohio State in the opening half.

Blackledge wasn't surprised he started slowly. He threw five incompletions to open the game and didn't complete his first pass until 20 minutes were gone. But he finished with a flourish, directing a Penn State ground game that accounted for 351 yards and hit four of eight passes for 68 yards in the last 30 minutes.

"I've been doing that stuff all year. I hate to do it, but it has become a routine. It takes awhile for me to get going. I knew it was going to work said the 6-foot-4, 218-pound

Joe Paterno, Penn State's coach,

said of Blackledge, "He played a great game against a very tough secondary. He came back very well.

Schlichter wasted a career-high 302 passing yards with a 20-for-35 performance. However, he managed only five completions in 13 attempts in the

"They kept coming in," he said of Penn State's defenders, led by left tackle Frank Case, the game's outstanding defensive player. "I just didn't have time to throw. They took a lot of chances on their defense and it

SCHLICHTER'S previous best effort was 297 passing yards in a losing Rose Bowl effort against Southern California.

Penn State tailback Kurt Warner was voted the game's top offensive player. He carried 18 times for 155 yards, 45 yards more than the entire Ohio State team managed in 39

Blackledge, the son of the recentlyfired Kent State University football coach Ron Blackledge, ran three yards for a touchdown in the second half. His passing set up a second touchdown, helping the Nittany Lions overcome a 19-7 deficit before a record crown of 66,738 for this 10-year old

Meanwhile, the young Penn State defense shut down Schlichter with an aggressive rush in the second half. The Buckeyes' quarterback had punished the Nittany Lions for 15 completions, 244 yards and three touchdowns passing in the first 30 minutes.

The victory gave Penn State a 10-2 record. The loss was Ohio State's third in 12 games this season and marked the Buckeyes' fourth straight bowl setback. Ohio State has lost seven of its last nine bowl appear-

TAILBACK KURT Warner shocked Ohio State with a 64-yard touchdown run on the Nittany Lions' first play from scrimmage in sunny 70-degree weather. It was the longest touchdown run in Penn State's 19 years of

However, Schlichter. the holder of virtually all of Ohio State's passing records as a junior, came right

He threw 23 and 19 yards to flanker Doug Donley and 33 yards to split end Gary Williams to provide Ohio State with a 12-point lead late in the first half. Schlichter hit 15 of 22 passes in the first half. Williams and Donley both went over 100 yards each with a combined 11 receptions.

Herb Menhardt booted a 38-yard field goal with eight seconds left to cut Penn State's deficit to 19-10 at half-

Penn State's adjustments at halftime worked wonders in the third quarter. The Nittany Lions held Ohio State to no total yardage and forced Schlichter to throw four incomple-

MEANWHILE, Blackledge directed the Nittany Lions on a 10-play

75-yard march. He bootlegged the final three yards himself. Menhardt kicked the conversion and Penn State trailed 19-17 with more than ten minutes remaining in the third period. Jonathan Williams' 17-yard punt return to the Ohio State 37 set up the Nittany Lions' go-ahead touchdown



But through the tense week that followed, neither quarterback knew who would start against Miami in the next contest. Kiel got the nod on

'It probably always will hurt," Courey said.

"But our relationship is still good. It's still the same as it was on Day 1, "We help each other. When he's on the field, I'm looking for things to help him, and he does the same when I'm on the field.'

He said they are friendly, though not really close friends 'He's a freshman, and I hang around mostly with the other seniors," he explained. Kiel said he has been pleasantly surprised by the way Courey and the rest of the veterans on the squad accepted his ascent to the first



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

# Deaf parishoners find mixed reaction to signed service

CRANSTON, R.I. (AP) - Each Sunday, Mary Eibner sits in front of tin 200-member congregation at the Assembly of God-Trinity Church, interpreting the minister's words with her hands for the congregation's dozen or so deaf members.

"She is totally involved in the service," the Rev. John A. Cooper said. "All of her facial expressions along with her signs just glorify God."

At St. Catherine's Church, Christine Dunleavy, another registered sign language interpreter, sits in a room off the main sanctuary interpreting the sermon for about nine deaf parishioners, including her husband, John.

The Rev. William F. Pyne turned down a request by Mrs. Dunleavy that she be allowed to stand near the altar. Pyne contended it would be too much of a distraction for the rest of the church, but he did agree to provide a special room where the deaf could

Some members of the group told Mrs. Dunleavy they did not like being segregated from the rest of the congregation, where they cannot see the service. She said, however, that the attitude of the church might change once it becomes accustomed to the

"As a rule an interpreter is a huge star and a great attraction for all of about 10 minutes," she said. "And then you just fade into the wall and nobody really notices you anymore.'

Thousands of churches across the country have experienced the same problem - what to do about the growing number of deaf parishio-

Mrs. Dunleavy feels it is a question of human rights. "Hearing people don't realize that they carry interpreters within them ... and that is their ears. A deaf person, by the nature of their handicap, has to have an interpreter outside of them.

The Rev. Cooper said Mrs. Eibner began signing his sermons about 18 months ago at the request of a deaf couple who moved here from Minneapolis, where they had attended sermons exclusively for the deaf.

At that point, he said, the effort at Assembly of God "became a ministry in the church, to which more and more deaf people have been com-

"They want to be a part of the service the same as anybody else, and I want to treat them the same as

To more fundamentalist groups, however, the risks abroad are no greater today than when missionaries went to uncertain fates in Africa, China and Latin America a century

'Where there are serious violations of human rights and the church takes a-stand, the church pays the consequence," said Father Tony Bellagamba, an Italian-born former missionary in Africa who now directs the U.S. Catholic Mission Council in Washington.

"I think the missionaries will have harder times ahead not only because of the problem of social justice, but also because of the tremendous problems facing the church in becoming indigenous," said Bellagamba. "Both will cause much pain and trouble to all the missionaries, and the problem of justice will cause more martyrs." 'From our perspective," said Dr.

Richard Butler, who directs the Middle East missionary force representing 32 denominations that compose the National Council of Churches in New York, "there are greater challenges for missionaries as they attempt to identify with the poor.

"They run up against government policies and as they try to speak out for the poor, they obviously become targets, as the situation in El Salva-

Dr. Samuel Wilson is director of the Missions Advanced Research and Communications Center of World Vision, a non-denominational group in Modesta, Calif., that keeps statistics on church missions abroad.

"The risk has always been there," he said. "Missionaries in Africa a century ago frequently died shortly after arriving. The church continued to grow. At that time the risk to health was even greater. But I don't see the risks today affecting the number of people to go.

According to MARC, this year there were almost 57,000 career and shortterm American missionaries abroad, almost two-thirds of them dedicated to long-term evangelizing

Protestant and evangelical groups, which account for about 51,000 of these, spent close to \$1 billion to keep them in 130 countries as church pastors, crusade leaders, teachers, doctors and nurses, radio technicians, translators and pilots.

The Roman Catholic church, America's largest religious denomination with 47.5 million members, fields 6,400 clerical and lay workers in

Of all the groups, evangelicals have grown mostly quickly in the past 12 years, Wilson said.

'It's no longer possible for Third World governments to keep their people in a state of almost total dependence," Bellagamba said. "American missionaries have become aware of the injustices and violations of human rights, and they have taken more ary work.

He said that evangelical and fundamentalit missionaries have grown in number "because they don't challenge the status quo.

To Dr. R. Keith Parks, director of the Southern Baptist Mission Board in Richmond, Va., "as the local Christians become aware as citizens, they are the ones who should exercise their political function. They are the residents and we are the guests.

Despite violence in El Salvador, he said, none of the eight Baptist missionary familes there has wanted to

'We've been in mission work for 145 years," he said, "and in all that time through internment in China, through the Vietnam war, and so on we've had less than 10 missionaries die of violent causes

'We recognize there are some risks," he said, "but if we wait until there are no risks, we wouldn't ever be able to preach.

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# The year lady luck frowned on Nevada

RENO, Nev. (AP) - The year 1980 may be recalled as the year recession gutted Nevada's golden goose.

A bombing at Harvey's Resort Hotel at Stateline, a tragic fire at the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas, and sidewalk killings in Reno on Thanksgiving Day all left the impression that Lady Luck finally may have deserted the state's glittering casinos.

More ominous still was the news that Nevada's "recession-proof" industry might be dependent on

the outside economy after all.

For the first time in anyone's memory, inflation outstripped the growth of gaming revenues during at least one quarter of 1980. During the third quarter of 1980, casinos took in \$636 million, up by 7.76 percent from the \$590.3 million they took in during the same period in 1979. But third-quarter inflation hovered at around 14 percent.

"Things are not too good," said Gaming Control Board member Jack Stratton at the time. "We're a little concerned.'

Nevadans have been keeping a wary eye on Atlantic City, N.J., where gross gambling revenues of \$1.05 billion were reported from May 26, 1978, when the first casino opened, through November 1980. More casinos are opening regularly, and with higher air fares, the fear is that many Eastern gamblers may be choosing the Atlantic Coast resort over the desert state.

For Nevada, the year started out on a gloomy note, with casino operators in the northern part of the state trying to figure out where their winter business

'This town is a bummer right now," said veteran Reno gamer Pick Hobson in January. "Inflation is our biggest problem - nothing hurts us more." About the same time, University of Nevada-Reno

economist Bill Eadington was pondering the future 'Analyzing the situation is so difficult," said Eadington, "because there are so many factors involved. Right now, nobody can say with any certainty how the industry will change and react to challenges over the next few years. But we do know there's some catching up to do on the demand

Spring came and several major Las Vegas resorts announced layoffs. By the end of summer casino

operators were admitting the recession was beginning to hurt.

In September, the accounting firm of Laventhol & Horwath announced the results of a survey showing that 62 percent of the state's gambling operators felt the recession had a negative impact on business. On the Las Vegas strip, 88 percent said their business had been seriously hurt.

'The times are just tough, by gosh, tough all over," said Stratton in November. He added that, contrary to his earlier belief, "we're not recession-

Of course, the economy was not all that was hurting Nevada gaming. There was the problem of image. The disasters did not help. Nor did the problems of the Aladdin.

When the state Gaming Commission shut down the Aladdin Hotel's casino in Las Vegas July 10, it was the largest casino closure in Nevada history. The shutdown climaxed more than a year of legal maneuvering between hotel owners and state officials that began with the convictions of several of the Aladdin's top officers on charges of allowing mob-tainted operators to obtain interest in the hotel-casino.

Approximately 1,800 of the Aladdin's 2,100 employees were laid off for about four months until entertainer Wayne Newton and veteran gaming figure Ed Torres purchased the resort and reopened the casino in October.

On Thanksgiving Day, as crowds milled about downtown Reno's casino strip, a car careened down a sidewalk, killing six people and injuring 26 others. Police arrested 51-year-old Patricia Ford, who reportedly was distraught over a battle with authorities for custody of her child.

# Study warns of sharp hikes in cost of imported gas multibillion-dollar U.S. investment in liquified natu-

WASHINGTON (AP) - This country's payments for imported natural gas could rise by \$3.5 billion annually if the United States agrees to a demand by Algeria for a 200 percent increase in the price of its liquefied natural gas, a congressional study said

The study by the General Accounting Office said that would mean an increase of 79 percent in the cost of all imported natural gas supplies if Canada and Mexico demanded a similar increase to the one being

The study, done at the request of Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., provides ammunition to critics of the LNG deal with Algeria, who have contended that the United States is being asked to pay too high a price for continued imports of LNG.

The study concluded that "importing large amounts of LNG from OPEC countries is not in the national interest. It makes little sense to increase U.S. dependence on gas at a time when extraordinary steps are being taken to reduce dependence on

Algeria halted shipments of LNG to this country in

April after the Carter administration refused to accept Algeria's demand for a tripling of LNG

The gas shipments had been arriving at terminals at Cove Point, Md., and Elba Island, Ga., since 1978. Because of the stalemate, six huge tankers built at a cost of \$100 million each to carry the supercooled LNG have been sitting idle. The El Paso Co., the leading company involved in

the LNG venture, reported an 85 percent drop in nings in the second quarter of this year, a decrease it blamed on the LNG cutoff.

Critics have charged that the Carter administration's efforts to reach a price agreement with Algeria would represent nothing more than a bailout for the American companies involved and force U.S. consumers to pay much higher natural gas prices.

Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, has said consumers in his state should not be forced to burn expensive LNG when there is plenty of cheaper

However, at stake in the current impasse is a domestic natural gas available.

# Brezhnev affirms confidence in Poland's communist leaders

MOSCOW (AP) - Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev, meeting with the Polish foreign minister, expressed renewed confidence Friday in Poland's ability to overcome its problems along communist lines, the Soviet news agency Tass reported.

Tass said Brezhnev and Polish Foreign Minister Jozef Czyrek also reaffirmed the need for close cooperation between the two countries and denounced what was described as attempts by "imperialists" to subvert socialism in Poland.

The Kremlin meeting, the highest-level Soviet-Polish talks in three weeks, came as the Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda condemned the concept of "free" trade unions.

The Pravda piece, taken with the joint communique of Brezhnev and Czyrek, seemed a new challenge to independent trade unionists in Poland who are demanding reforms from their nation's Commu-

### Explosion caused crash, airline official says

BOGOTA, Colombia - An explosion, possibly that of a bomb, occurred in one of the two restrooms on the jetliner that crashed in northern Colombia last Sunday, the manager of the airline said Friday.

Alfonso Satbeez said in a broadcast interview that this was the conclusion of investigators for the airline, Aerovias del Cesar. All 68 people aboard died

Investigators have reconstructed enough of the plane and have found sufficient traces of explosive material to determine that there was an explosion in the restroom on the left side and at the rear of the plane, Sanchez said in the interview with the Bogota radio station Caracol.

The possibility of the explosion being caused by a possible cargo of fireworks shipped illegally by a passenger is not being discounted, Sanchez said.

The explosion aboard the French-made Caravelle jetliner knocked out the plane's hydraulic system, leaving the pilot unable guide it or otherwise control it, Sanchez said. Three witness who saw the plane going down said they saw smoke coming from the left rear side of the aircraft and not from the engines, Sanchez said.

He said the company received three telephone calls from anonymous c)llers, after the pgane crashed, warning that the airliner would not reach

However two persons in the corporate offices of the airline and a pilot for the airline had told the Associated Press previously that the airline received two threatening calls about the flight before it took off from the Caribbean port city of Riohacha.

The explosion aboard the plane came seven minutes after it left Riohacha.

But Brezhnev seemed again to be saying the Soviets are willing, for the time being, to let Polish Communist Party leader Stanislaw Kania take care of matters himself. Labor unrest in Poland this year gave birth to a

labor movement independent of the Polish Communist Party. Strikes and the continuing popular ferment in Poland have raised concerns in the West that the Soviets might intervene militarily to end the free union movement. The Soviets have repeatedly rebutted such reports

and said they are confident the Polish leadership will handle the problem properly. Speaking of the possibility of Soviet intervention, U.S. Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie said this week that "the situation seems to have calmed down.'

Pravda, referring directly to events in Poland, said there should be no place for strikes in a socialist country, that strikes like those in Poland help the enemies of socialism, and that trade unions must be guided by Communist parties.

The use of strikes testifies either to "an inability of workers to use their rights fully" or to the "impatience" of some workers to receive certain benefits before other workers, Pravda said.

Czyrek met separately with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko later in the day before leaving for home. He had arrived in Moscow for the

official visit Thursday night. In Warsaw, a report of the meeting and the joint communique was the first item on the evening

newscast of the Polish state radio. Tass said Brezhnev "expressed the hope that the working people of Poland will overcome as soon as possible the difficulties that arose on the road of socialist development and expressed confidence that the task would be accomplished under the guidance

of the Polish United Workers' Party (Polish Communist Party). The Soviet president and Polish foreign minister "resolutely denounced ... attempts of imperialist and other reactionary circles to conduct subversive activities against socialist Poland, and to interfere in its internal affairs and relations with allies based on the

principles of socialist internationalism," Tass said. Czyrek apparently used the occasion to reassure Brezhnev and Gromyko of the Polish leadership's determination to keep Poland socialist.

Friday's talks were also believed to have touched on the question of additional Soviet aid for Poland, although no details were disclosed.



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
