### Big Spring man found hanged

FORT WORTH (AP) — A Big Spring man was found hanged from the bars of his cell at Tarrant County Jail Thursday afternoon.

Timothy Alan Davidson, 19, apparently shredded his mattress cover to make a rope, authorities said.

He was arrested Tuesday for a probation violation. He was on probation for marijuana possession.

### 'Vampire' dead

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (AP) — Richard Chase, the so-called "vampire killer" convicted of six grisly murders in the Sacramento area, was found dead in his Death Row cell Friday, a possible suicide.

Prison spokesman Mike Maddening said a preliminary examination by the Marin County Coroner's office showed Chase, 30, swallowed a fatal amount of anti-depressant pills prescribed by a physician.

An officer making lunch rounds called into Chase's cell about 11 a.m. and asked if he wanted his meal. When no one answered, the officer looked inside and reported that Chase was slumped on his bed, his feet and legs dangling to the floor.

Prison doctors pronounced Chase dead at 11:23 a.m., Maddening said.

### Dogs practicing?

CINCINNATI (AP) — A man who was attacked by two terriers, the type often used in illegal dog fighting, says the animals may have been set on him for fighting practice.

Lee Dorsey, who has been hospitalized since he was attacked late at night on Dec. 13, told police the dogs seemed to obey an unseen trainer's commands when they attacked him near a Cincinnati high school football field.

"I could see they were well taken care of," Dorsey said. "They were clean, well-fed; their teeth were good. Never did I know that one or two would attack a person for no reason at all — not unless put to it."

### Texans charged

NUEVO LAREDO, Mexico (AP) — Two Texans were charged with arson after one of them allegedly flipped a burning cigarette into a fireworks stand, igniting a blaze that gutted a popular shopping center and killed a night watchman.

Workers on Friday discovered the body of 60-year-old Simon Reyes Puente, the father-in-law of market manager Luis Sanchez. Officials said Puente, whose body was pinned to the floor by a heavy beam, apparently died of asphyxiation.

Bond was denied for Santos Hernandez Zapata of Laredo and a 16-year-old companion whose name was not released by police. Authorities Friday said they were contemplating additional charges against the two.

# Hostages send holiday greetings

More than a dozen of the 52 Americans forced to spend a second Christmas as hostages in Iran offered holiday greetings to their families and countrymen Friday via a televised broadcast that also showed them singing Christmas carols and receiving gifts from visiting priests.

"God bless all of you, and God bless America," said hostage Steven Lauterbach, 28, of Dayton, Ohio. "I would like to say hello to my family and friends... and wish them a happy holiday season."

Lauterbach's brother, Victor, 21, said Steven looked "in pretty good health and pretty good spirits. We were glad to see him on television, but we'd rather have him in the flesh."

"They seem to be all fairly well, but what they need is freedom," President Carter said. President-elect Ronald Reagan declined comment.

The film of the hostages, made by Iranian television, showed them sitting at a table at a solemn holiday party. In the background was a decorated Christmas tree, and on the table were boxes of fresh fruit.

They sang "Silent Night" and "Away In A Manger" and got wrapped Christmas gifts and communion from Bishop Yohannan Issaie of the Catholic Chaldean minority in Iran and two Roman Catholic priests.

The film was relayed to the United States Friday morning. CBS, which acted as the pool for U.S. television networks receiving the broadcast, said the transmission was delayed in Iran, possibly by censorship.

A separate, six-minute silent clip, also made in Iran, was shown Thursday on the three U.S. commercial TV networks and on Cable News Network. It was the first film of the hostages since Easter.

"Hi, Connie and Scott. As you can see, I'm healthy and well, so don't worry about me," said hostage Phillip Ward, whose wife lives in Culpepper, Va. "I'm doing just fine. And Scott, I expect you to continue the good work in school, and help mom around the house and don't forget to feed the wild birds this winter. They'll probably be getting hungry."

Most of the 21 hostages who gave statements on the films did not identify themselves, but CNN provided on-the-screen identifications of some of the speakers during its broadcast. CBS said there were five hostages shown who did not give statements.

CBS said these hostages were shown but did not give statements: Johnny McKeel Jr., 27, Balch Springs, Texas, Richard M. Morefield, 51, San Diego, Regis Ragan, 38, Johnstown, Pa., Charles Scott, 48, Stone Mountain, Ga., and Donald Sharer, no hometown or age available.

"He looked bad from what he was when he left home," said Robert Brown of Columbia, S.C., Belk's brother-in-law. "He's not the same person he was."

# All 52 U.S. hostages found to be healthy

Algeria's ambassador to Iran said Friday that he met with all 52 American hostages, found them healthy and talked with them for several hours about negotiations for their release.

Iran's chief negotiator said his country would consider U.S. counter-proposals but would not reduce the \$24 billion Iran demands in exchange for the hostages.

Algerian Ambassador Abdelkarim Gheraieb's visit with the three Americans in Tehran's Foreign Ministry and the 49 others in an unnamed location, allayed fears for the safety of some hostages whose conditions had not been reported in many months.

Gheraieb then headed for Washington where he was expected to join two other Algerian intermediaries, apparently to report on the hostages' conditions or await a U.S. reply to the latest Iranian demands.

An Iranian television film broadcast in the United States on Friday showed a dozen of the hostages sending encouraging messages to their families. A brief film Thursday showed some of them during a Christmas visit with clergymen.

President Carter said he was relieved to hear all the hostages had been visited and were reported in good health and high spirits, but called their continued imprisonment "insulting... What they need is freedom."

The militants holding the Americans captive claimed they scattered the hostages around the country after

the failed U.S. rescue attempt last April, but Gheraieb's visit and the Christmas visit of papal envoy Anibal Bugnini indicated all the hostages still were in the Iranian capital.

Bugnini, who said he saw 25 to 30 hostages Thursday, was blindfolded en route to the meeting but from the length of the drive it appeared he stayed within the city. Gheraieb, too, said he was blindfolded.

Gheraieb and Algerian Economic Consul Ben Hossein spent several hours — some reports said 1½ hours — Christmas night and early Friday morning visiting all of the hostages and said they brought the Americans up to date on the latest developments in negotiations.

U.S. officials said Gheraieb, who heads the Algerian intermediary team, would meet with Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher for a review of latest developments upon his arrival in Washington. The other two Algerians involved in the Washington meetings are Redha Malek, Algerian ambassador to the United States, and Mohamed Seghir, governor of the Central Bank of Algeria.

One report said Gheraieb's talks with the hostages were held at U.S. and Iranian request. State Department spokeswoman Sue Pittman said it was hoped his visit would set a precedent for regular meetings with the hostages.

Iran's last message was a demand the United States deposit \$24 billion in cash and gold with the Algerian government as a guarantee.

Iranian Executive Affairs Minister

Behzad Nabavi, head of the hostage negotiating team, told reporters in Tehran that Iran would listen to any alternative method of payment that the United States might propose although he said he knew of no such method.

"Of course if we can have any other suggestion that would be like a guarantee yes, we would listen," Nabavi told reporters. But he insisted the \$24-billion figure would not be reduced.

Iran had called the financial demands its final answer and said there is no room for bargaining. Nabavi's new comments were the first indication the revolutionary government might be flexible at least in regard to the execution of its financial demands.

The Algerian Consul Hossein, meanwhile, said the hostages' living conditions seemed satisfactory. "They looked to us in good health and as far as morale, they seemed OK," Hossein said in an interview.

"Of course they are wondering what is going on and how the negotiations are proceeding. This is the main question we had from them."

Asked if he had been able to provide details of the situation Hossein replied: "The whole details no but we gave them a general idea of what is going on."

"Of course they hope that there will be a conclusion, a good ending to this negotiations and that that it will end soon. I think they are hopeful," he said of the reaction of the hostages, "but of course they are not sure that this will end positively soon."

## 'It's a criminal act,' says Carter, 'it has been from the beginning'

PLAINS, Ga. (AP) — President Carter said today that while he is reassured by eyewitness accounts that all 52 Americans held hostage in Iran are alive and well, he still believes it "insulting" that they continue to be held prisoner.

"What they need is freedom," the president said. Speaking to reporters outside his mother's home in Plains, the president said that Algerian diplomats report that they have seen all 52 hostages.

Referring to the hostages being visited by the Algerians, he said, "We are pleased that they have been finally observed by someone in whom we have confidence."

"They all seem quite well and we are very pleased at that," he said of the hostages.

He said the United States knows where all the hostages are being held and is aware that their accommodations are "not luxury."

"It's still imprisonment," he said. "They're not free. That's the most important single thing. It's a criminal act. It has been from the very beginning."

The president said the United States is doing the best it can to gain the freedom of the hostages. "But we just don't know what the future will hold," he said.

"It's still insulting to see them held as prisoners," he added. He said that it is obvious that the families of the hostages were pleased to know "that they are up and around and seem to be in good health."

Carter said he was especially pleased that all the hostages have been seen because he said the whereabouts of three or four of them had not been known since last April.

In Washington, meanwhile, a State Department spokeswoman said that it was hoped the visit to the hostages by Algeria's ambassador to Iran, Abdel Karim Gheraieb, will serve as a precedent for other visits.

"In this way we and the rest of the world, which has joined in condemnation of that detention, can have regular reports on the hostage situation," said spokeswoman Sue Pittman.

# Paris grande dame to get face lift

PARIS (AP) — At age 91, the Eiffel Tower is ailing and city officials have decided to close the first level of the world-famous monument for at least a year.

The 7,500-ton grande dame of Paris, a staging ground for lovers, protesters, artists, moviemakers and suicides, is getting a face lift.

The restoration of one of the world's most visited tourist sights will entail reinforcing the tower's floors and replacing its aging hydraulic elevators with electric ones.

The famed restaurant on the tower's 190-foot high first-level platform is throwing one last "dinner spectacle" Wednesday night in a New Year's Eve champagne bash and then turning off its lights.

"We won't be back for at least a year," a spokesman for the En Plein Ciel restaurant said. "We're looking for a new location until then, but whatever we find will never be able to compare."

The rest of first level, the most visited of the tower's three platforms, will close two weeks later. The second level will remain open to the public while the third will reopen in March after a normally scheduled four-month winter hibernation.

The 985-foot 11-inch Eiffel Tower was the tallest man-made structure on earth when it opened at the Paris Exhibition of 1889. It was built for \$1.5 million by Gustav Eiffel, a master engineer who also helped design the Panama Canal. Two hundred men spent 27 months building it.

"I should be jealous of the tower — it's more

famous than I am," Eiffel said shortly before his death in 1923.

In the nine decades it has dominated the skyline of the City of Light, the Eiffel Tower has drawn a good number of publicity seekers. People have climbed it backwards, on their hands, on stilts, piggyback and naked. The mayor of Montmartre once rode down its steps on a bicycle.

The tower also has been deadly. About 400 people have jumped to their deaths from the Paris landmark.

mark. A pilot once was killed while trying to fly his plane through the tower's arches and a Hungarian tailor made a fatal leap when he attempted to demonstrate a combination raincoat and parachute.

But not all of the attempted suicides were fatal. In 1963, a young woman's fall was stopped by a projecting piece of metal. She gave birth to a healthy boy five months later.

A Dutchman once jumped 190 feet from the second

to the first floor. When ambulance drivers arrived at the scene, he angrily shoved them aside, collected his spectacles and walked away without any evident injuries.

Since its creation, more than 87 million people have visited the Belle Epoque-style monument that has become the symbol of Paris.

This year, the Eiffel Tower greeted more than 3 million visitors, who took away 2 million miniature copies of the tower and sent 1.5 million postcard pictures of it to the folks back home. It earns \$10 million a year.

But Eiffel's engineering wonder was not always so popular.

During its construction, the tower-caused an uproar among Paris artists. In an open letter, they called it "a dizzy, ridiculous tower dominating Paris like a black and gigantic factory chimney."

The tourist sight almost never made it past its 20th birthday. It was scheduled to be torn down in 1909 and was saved from destruction only when the French army discovered its tower would make an excellent communication station for army posts stationed hundreds of miles away.

During World War I, it was the tower's aerial and wireless station that intercepted a radio message that led to the arrest and execution of Mata Hari as a spy.



# Cold, wet, hungry 12-year-old rejected by his mother on Christmas

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — The case of a 12-year-old boy who ran away from home just before Christmas and was then rejected by his mother will be turned over to social workers and a family court, police said Friday.

"We're not going to forget this," said Sgt. Robert Connell of the Columbia Police Department. "We're going as far as we can with it."

The unidentified boy was being kept Friday at a youth shelter operated by the state Department of Social Services. Officers said the case would be turned over to a family court Monday

with a recommendation for further investigation.

No charges have been filed. But Sgt. Gordon A. Crews, a detective in the juvenile division, said, "Criminal charges (against the parents) definitely are possible, depending on what we come up with in our investigation."

The cold, wet and hungry boy was found by a passerby walking on the Sumter Highway at 1:30 a.m. Wednesday, officers said. He had run away about 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.

Officers earlier had said the boy

had been kicked out, but Crews said the boy left and his mother refused to take him back when police took the boy to the home on Christmas Eve.

The boy told officers his parents "just didn't want him anymore and if they didn't want him, he didn't want them," said Connell.

Police originally listed the boy's age as 9, but they later found out that he had given them the wrong year when he was asked for his birthdate Wednesday.

The boy was on his way to an aunt's home on the Sumter Highway when

police were called by the passerby. They telephoned the aunt and the boy spent part of the holiday with her.

The boy's birthday was Dec. 20, but he received no presents, said Crews. "From what he told us, it didn't appear he was going to get anything for Christmas either," he added.

"He told us he didn't want to go back because of the way he was being treated," Crews said.

"He said anything that happened, whether he did it or not, he got blamed for it," the officer continued. "Some things he did do, but some

things he didn't and he was blamed for everything that happened."

The boy, a pupil at Hand Middle School in Columbia, was living with his mother and a man he described as his stepfather, Crews said. His father apparently lives somewhere in Georgia, the investigator said.

Connell said a patrol car was sent to the mother's home with a message to call police headquarters. When no one called, Connell said he and another officer drove the boy to the parents' home.

"They absolutely refused to take


him back," Connell said.

"He seemed real happy when she refused to take him back," said Crews. "When he came back in here he was smiling and grinning."

Before taking him to the shelter, police officers gave the boy gifts during their annual Christmas Eve party at the station. They presented him with gifts of a small football, wrist watch and about \$25 in cash.

"He was well-mannered and we just felt sorry for him," said Sgt. R.G. Knox. "We don't know a thing about his family except that they didn't want him."

Christmas sales finally take off

The Christmas gift-buying bug almost forgot to bite this year. But when it did, Americans flocked to many retail stores in a rush one shop-popper called "absolutely mind-boggling."

"What started out to be a moderate December turned out to be gangbusters," said a spokesman for the Lazarus department stores in Columbus, Ohio.

The Lazarus spokesman, who asked not to be identified, said the biggest surge came on Saturday and Sunday. But many other retailers reported their best gains on the final three days before Christmas.

But the rush was not universal. "In a word, it's a disappointment," said Cavan Riley, a K mart manager in Cheyenne, Wyo., where relatively warm weather was blamed for poor sales of winter clothes.

# Iraqi leader 'mad:' Khomeini

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Iran's Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini said Friday that Iraqi President Saddam Hussein had reached "a state of madness" in his quest for a war victory over Iran and "will go to hell soon."

The 80-year-old patriarch of Iran's Islamic revolution lashed out a day after Hussein declared his army has opened a new invasion front in Iran's northwestern province of Kurdistan and vowed to hold onto all conquered territory as "Iraq's military border."

—Communique from Tehran and Baghdad reported artillery barrages and helicopter gunship raids in Khuzistan's main cities of Abadan, Ahwaz, Susangerd and Dezful as well as the Zagros Mountain foothills in Gilan Gharb on Friday.

Describing the 43-year-old Iraqi president as a "servant of the superpowers," Khomeini said "he is nervous and in a state of madness. He wants to achieve victory, even a relative victory, by whatever means."

Tehran Radio said Khomeini made his statement to a visiting group of Iranian Kurds and Arabic and Farsi-speaking delegations from Iran's southwestern oil province of Khuzistan, the southernmost tip of the battlefield. Both Khuzistan and Kurdistan provinces have ethnic minority populations waging sporadic battles for a degree of autonomy from the central government of Iran, a Persian nation. The country's primary language is Farsi.

Iraq, an Arab nation, acknowledged that it has been encouraging ethnic Kurds in Kurdistan and Arabs in Khuzistan to

take up arms against the Khomeini regime. Hussein announced the Kurdistan invasion on Thursday, saying the war front with Iran now stretched from the northern tip of the Persian Gulf northward some 550 miles to the remote juncture where Iraq's northern and Iran's northwestern borders meet with Turkey's southeastern frontier.

That area has a Kurdish population in all three countries — most of them Sunni Moslems. Most Iranians are Shiite Moslems. There are an estimated 2 million Kurds in Iran and another 2 million in Iraq.

"This is the new military map of the border," Hussein told a council of ministers in Baghdad. "We shall hold to our positions in Khuzistan, Gilan Gharb and Kurdistan until the Iranians recognize our territorial and offshore rights and end the state of the war."

Until the Kurdistan offensive, the front had stretched 300 miles north from the gulf and had remained largely unchanged for two months.

Hussein said the week-long invasion of Kurdistan

was staged from several points of Iraq's northern border. This indicated the Iraqis pushed into Kurdistan from the Suleimaniyeh Province and the mountainous district of Rawanduz in northernmost Iraq. The two locations are 120 miles apart.

Iranian communiques acknowledged the invasion in Kurdistan's Marivan district 40 miles east of Suleimaniyeh, claiming the Iraqi forces were driven two miles back from bridgehead positions they set up 10 miles inside Marivan.

Iran said 92 Iraqi troops were killed and 15 captured in the Marivan fighting on Wednesday and Thursday, but made no mention of a thrust from Rawanduz that would put Iraqi forces close to Iran's major Kurdish-populated city of Mahabad. It is 350 miles northwest of Tehran and some 50 miles from Turkey's southeastern border.

The Marivan action put the Iraqi forces within 50 miles of Sanandaj, the second major Kurdish city in Kurdistan province where the insurgents have been active. Khomeini rose to

power in 1979. Iran's official Pars news agency reported a sharp escalation of Kurdish guerrilla activity in the Sanandaj and Mahabad areas in the last three weeks.

# Illinois suing California firm

CHICAGO (AP) — Attorney General Fryrone C. Fahner said Friday he has filed suit against the Southern California Edison Co. because the utility was planning to violate a state law by shipping 32 tons of spent nuclear reactor fuel rods to an Illinois dump.

Fahner said the utility's apparent decision to send its wastes to a General Electric Co. nuclear waste storage facility near Morris, Ill., violated the state's untested Illinois Nuclear Safety Act. He said he filed the suit in Grundy County circuit court on Wednesday.

California utility is about to complete two on-site storage facilities that could accept the spent fuel rods.

"Let them take their waste that they want to haul here and move it right next door," Fahner said at a news conference.

Fahner said Southern California Edison is "one of the largest shippers to the Morris facility" and that it has shipped 95 tons of high-level waste there already. The site

has a 715-ton capacity. Referring to Edison and GE's contention that questions arising from the new statute are governed by federal agencies, Fahner said that the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission's "failure to act" opened the door to state action.

He added, however, that a federal policy governing the complex problems of on-and-off-site storage is "absolutely necessary." "Everyone else is

ducking the problem because as long as we're here it's convenient" to make use of the Morris site, Fahner said.

The federal govern-

ment recently announced plans to seek a national off-site storage facility for spent fuel, and Morris was said to be the most likely choice.

ROCHELLE, Ga. (AP) — Two men who argued at a disco club pulled guns and shot each other to death, wounding six bystanders in the hail of bullets, authorities said Friday.

Wilcox County Sheriff C.E. Bloodworth Jr. said the dead men — Tyrone Daniels, 27, of Rochelle and L.C. Murphy, 32, of Abbeville — apparently began firing at each other during an argument at the Soul City Disco Club in this southeastern Georgia town on Thursday night.

Six others were wounded in the gunfire, Bloodworth said. Two of them — James Woods and Emma Miller, both of Rochelle — were taken to an Albany hospital in serious condition. Four women, all residents of Rochelle, suffered minor injuries and were hospitalized in Cordele, he said.

Bloodworth said he had no idea how the argument between Daniels and Murphy started. "They both pulled pistols and fired six shots each," he said.

Daniels was armed with a .38-caliber revolver and Murphy with a .357-caliber Magnum, he said.

The sheriff said the Georgia Bureau of Investigation was called in to help investigate.

# Four suspects arrested following killing of police officer at Amarillo

AMARILLO (AP) — Four men have been arrested and one of them charged with capital murder following the Christmas night killing of a police officer making a routine traffic stop, officials said Friday.

Ernesto Gutierrez, 17, was arraigned shortly after his arrest early Friday in Dumas on the murder charge in connection with the shooting death of officer Barry McGuire, 26, whose body was found near his patrol car after he radioed for assistance.

Peace Justice Gilbert Couch denied bond for Gutierrez, who officers say was arrested as he returned to his mother's home in Dumas about 7 a.m. Friday.

The other three suspects were arrested earlier — two of them about two hours after the shooting when their car ran out of gas near the Canadian River 17 miles north of Amarillo — and the third as he walked along a railroad track in

Amarillo.

The three suspects are 18, 19 and 21 years old and are all believed to be from the Denton-Dumas area. Police said they will be arraigned Monday.

One of the men, believed to be the driver of the car, was still wearing McGuire's handcuffs when he was arrested.

Capt. Herb Hill of the Amarillo Police Dept. said McGuire, who joined the force in July 1978, had stopped the suspects late Thursday night when their car ran a red light in an east Amarillo residential area.

He said McGuire arrested the driver on suspicion of driving while intoxicated, handcuffed him and placed him in his patrol car, then radioed for a backup unit and went to arrest the other three suspects.

Witnesses told police that when McGuire returned to the suspects' car, the three men jumped the officer and managed to get his .357 Magnum service revolver away from him.

Police said McGuire was shot at least once in the head, but witnesses said they heard three shots.

His body was found in a ditch near

his patrol car.

Hill said the suspects then fled the scene, triggering a manhunt by state and local officials who combed the

frozen Panhandle late Thursday and early Friday searching for the four men.

Police notified the victim's wife, a

nurse who works in the emergency room at a hospital where McGuire would have been taken had he survived the shooting.

## Black patrolman dies near Denton in wreck during high-speed chase

DENTON (AP) — A 24-year-old state trooper whom officials say is the first black state patrolman to die in the line of duty was killed Friday during a high speed chase, the Department of Public Safety said.

Hollis Stephen Lacey was pronounced dead on arrival at Westgate Hospital in Denton about 2 p.m. DPS Lt. Ray Ward said that Lacey was pursuing a vehicle on Interstate 35 West, left the highway at the exit onto state highway 407.

Lacey pulled out at the intersection and was hit broadside by a van.

Witnesses reported that he (Lacey) was going to make a turn. He came up to the stop sign with all his lights flashing and the siren on.

Ward said he pulled out after he stopped. We guess he didn't see the van, but we have no way of knowing.

The driver of the van, Lynn Couch of Ponder, said Lacey's car slid into a ditch and rolled over three times. Lacey was thrown from the car. It rolled over and pinned him.

Couch said he and several other passersby pushed the car off the trooper and administered cardio-pulmonary resuscitation until a Denton County ambulance arrived.

"I knew him," Ward said. "He was a quiet individual, a very good trooper. He was well-thought of and did a good job."

## Washateria explodes

HOUSTON (AP) — Police were checking for possible arson and on a reported extortion attempt after a Christmas Day explosion wrecked a washateria and convenience store and injured six persons.

Investigators said two gas lines to clothes dryers had been disconnected and accumulated gas apparently was ignited by a pilot light.

David Levy, 34, owner of the washateria, said he considered himself lucky for several reasons.

He received only minor injuries when the building exploded. He said someone sent word the door was ajar and he went to investigate for possible vandalism.



# Lumumba U. denies links to international terrorism

MOSCOW (AP) — Patrice Lumumba University, an institute here for students from developing countries, isn't happy about being linked by Westerners to international terrorism and Third World subversion, its Soviet administrators say.

They claim the Westerners often note that the notorious Venezuelan terrorist Carlos Ramirez — known simply as "Carlos" — was a student at Lumumba. The administrators note, however, that he was expelled in the early 1970s on grounds of poor grades and bad behavior.

The university's Soviet administration prides itself in training civil servants, scientists, teachers and other professionals for Africa, Asia and Latin America.

In its 20 years of existence, more than 9,000 Lumumba graduates have taken their skills back home to 110 mostly emerging nations.

Apart from Carlos, only a handful of former Lumumba students — some reportedly from Mexico and Sri Lanka — have been implicated in revolutionary activities in their homelands. The Soviets complain that Western publicity given these cases has created the impression that the university exports subversion.

"Some unobjective organs of the press claim that we are a school for spies, saboteurs, the best hijackers, and so on," said Assistant Rector Leonid Kharyukov, displaying an English paperback book about Carlos.

"He was enrolled here only 18 months or two years, but some people concluded that he was thoroughly trained by us," Kharyukov said. "We had nothing to do with his actions."

Carlos is accused of masterminding the kidnapping of OPEC oil ministers in Vienna, Austria, in 1975; the killing of two French security agents in Paris, and bombings in the French capital during the mid-1970s.

Some Western investigators suspect he may have received Soviet military instruction after his student days at Lumumba, but the Soviets have never acknowledged this.

Carlos has dropped out of sight, but his notoriety has had repercussions at Dumumba University.

Military training — a normal part of the curriculum in Soviet higher education — is banned at Lumumba for foreigners and Soviets alike, Kharyukov said.

"To head off any attempts to slander the school, we don't even permit rifle target shooting or archery for recreation," he said in an interview with The Associated Press.

Soviet political slogans and portraits of graduates decorate the hallways of the university in a seven-story building that once served as a military college three miles south of the Kremlin.

Officially called Patrice Lumumba Peoples' Friendship University, it is named for the Congolese leader slain in Katanga Province in 1961.

In five- or six-year courses at Lumumba, foreign students get not only training in their specialties but full exposure to Soviet society.

Attendance is mandatory at lectures by the all-Soviet faculty on Soviet politics and social philosophy, and foreigners must maintain passing marks in all their work to remain at the school, Kharyukov said.

Campus life is tightly controlled. Soviet students, who make up about a quarter of the 6,700 undergraduate and graduate students, help monitor the foreigners, 900 of whom are women.

It is unknown, however, what percentage of Lumumba students leave Moscow convinced that the Soviet model is right for their own countries. Some students say privately that Soviet economic shortages and bureaucracy are obvious to any student, and that some of them leave in a far from pro-Soviet state of mind.

Kharyukov said there is intense competition among foreigners for the 600 places in the annual freshman class. Three hundred Soviet students also are admitted each year.

Kharyukov said India is allotted one of the largest blocks of scholarships — 40 per year. "Smaller countries, such as the Maldives Republic or Gabon, get two or three a year."

The foreigners begin with intensive Russian-language training — six hours daily for six months — to enable them to understand the lectures.

"I didn't speak a word of Russian when I arrived in Moscow. But now I get along quite well in the language," said Akhil Gupta, 21, a mechanical engineering student from India. "As for adjusting to life here, it depends on the person."

Lumumba students have free tuition and dormitory space, plus travel and clothing allowances and a monthly stipend of 90 rubles (\$135), considerably more than state payment to Soviet students.

Kharyukov said the drop-out rate is about 15 percent to 16 percent. Some 80,000 foreigners from 139 countries in all are enrolled in 300 Soviet institu-

tions.

The school has six faculties — economics and law, history and philology, agriculture, medicine, natural science and engineering.

Associates put on practical training so that graduates can go right to work when they return home.

"Our guiding principles are internationalism and patriotism," Kharyukov said. "We encourage students to return home to help their countries. If they don't, our work has been defective."

## Hua absent

PEKING (AP) — Communist Party Chairman Hua Guofeng, last seen in public 29 days ago, was absent from the ranks of officials who met with visiting Pakistani Foreign Minister Agha Shahi. Foreign diplomats here say Hua's unexplained disappearance indicated his ouster may be imminent.

Pakistani officials said Shahi had left his appointments up to Chinese officials, who arranged meetings for him with Foreign Minister Huang Hua, Premier Zhao Ziyang and Party Vice-Chairman Deng Xiaoping, the key man in Chinese politics.

Shahi was to leave Peking today, without the traditional meeting with the Communist Party chief.

The official Chinese press has published increasingly sharp attacks against Hua, successor to the late Chairman Mao Tse-tung, accusing him of clinging to some of Mao's discredited radical ideas while the rest of the party moderated its policies.

Diplomatic sources say Hua is expected to resign formally at a party Central Committee meeting scheduled for January.

Planning Minister Yao Yilin denied Monday that Hua has already submitted his resignation. Only the party's Central Committee or Congress can decide Hua's future status, he said.

# Blackledge comes back to haunt Ohio State

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Todd Blackledge, a native shunned by Ohio State, came back to haunt the Buckeyes in the Fiesta Bowl Friday.

"They talked to me as a junior. They were looking at me as a tight end or a linebacker," the Penn State freshman quarterback said of Ohio State after leading the Nittany Lions to a 31-19 victory over the Buckeyes.

"They really didn't recruit me as a senior because Art Schlichter was progressing so well," said the product of North Canton, Ohio.

**BLACKLEDGE UPSTAGED** his more heralded rival Schlichter in the second half of the Fiesta Bowl, scoring one touchdown and leading 10th-ranked Penn State on two other scoring marches that wiped out a 12-point lead for No. 11 Ohio State in the opening half.

Blackledge wasn't surprised he started slowly. He threw five incompletions to open the game and didn't complete his first pass until 20 minutes were gone. But he finished with a flourish, directing a Penn State ground game that accounted for 351 yards and hit four of eight passes for 68 yards in the last 30 minutes.

"I've been doing that stuff all year. I hate to do it, but it has become a routine. It takes awhile for me to get going. I knew it was going to work out," said the 6-foot-4, 218-pound Blackledge.

Joe Paterno, Penn State's coach,

said of Blackledge, "He played a great game against a very tough secondary. He came back very well."

Schlichter wasted a career-high 302 passing yards with a 20-for-35 performance. However, he managed only five completions in 13 attempts in the second half.

"They kept coming in," he said of Penn State's defenders, led by left tackle Frank Case, the game's outstanding defensive player. "I just didn't have time to throw. They took a lot of chances on their defense and it worked."

**SCHLICHTER'S** previous best effort was 297 passing yards in a losing Rose Bowl effort against Southern California.

Penn State tailback Kurt Warner was voted the game's top offensive player. He carried 18 times for 155 yards, 45 yards more than the entire Ohio State team managed in 39 rushes.

Blackledge, the son of the recently-fired Kent State University football coach Ron Blackledge, ran three yards for a touchdown in the second half. His passing set up a second touchdown, helping the Nittany Lions overcome a 19-7 deficit before a record crowd of 66,738 for this 10-year old bowl.

Meanwhile, the young Penn State defense shut down Schlichter with an aggressive rush in the second half. The Buckeyes' quarterback had punished the Nittany Lions for 15 comple-

tions, 244 yards and three touchdowns passing in the first 30 minutes.

The victory gave Penn State a 10-2 record. The loss was Ohio State's third in 12 games this season and marked the Buckeyes' fourth straight bowl setback. Ohio State has lost seven of its last nine bowl appearances.

**TAILBACK KURT** Warner shocked Ohio State with a 64-yard touchdown run on the Nittany Lions' first play from scrimmage in sunny 70-degree weather. It was the longest touchdown run in Penn State's 19 years of bowl play.

However, Schlichter, the holder of virtually all of Ohio State's passing records as a junior, came right back.

He threw 23 and 19 yards to flanker Doug Donley and 33 yards to split end Gary Williams to provide Ohio State with a 12-point lead late in the first half. Schlichter hit 15 of 22 passes in the first half. Williams and Donley both went over 100 yards each with a combined 11 receptions.

Herb Menhardt booted a 38-yard field goal with eight seconds left to cut Penn State's deficit to 19-10 at halftime.

Penn State's adjustments at half-time worked wonders in the third quarter. The Nittany Lions held Ohio State to no total yardage and forced Schlichter to throw four incompletions.

**MEANWHILE**, Blackledge directed the Nittany Lions on a 10-play

75-yard march. He bootlegged the final three yards himself. Menhardt kicked the conversion and Penn State trailed 19-17 with more than ten minutes remaining in the third period. Jonathan Williams' 17-yard punt return to the Ohio State 37 set up the Nittany Lions' go-ahead touchdown drive.

Penn State needed only five plays with Williams running the final four yards. Menhardt kicked the extra point and the Nittany Lions were ahead to stay, 24-19 on the second play of the fourth quarter.

The Nittany Lions, scoring their sixth victory in eight games with their neighboring rivals, clinched the victory when fullback Booker Moore dashed 37 yards for a touchdown with 45 seconds left.



## 'Foaming' Bears have confidence

DALLAS (AP) — Grant Teaff says he's never seen his players foam at the mouth, but agreed Friday his Baylor football team is eager to defeat Alabama in the Cotton Bowl classic on Jan. 1.

"I think it's a very good match-up, contrary to some belief across the nation that we don't stack up with them. I sincerely believe our team will make a good showing not only for themselves but for the Southwest Conference," Teaff told a news conference.

The only time Baylor and Alabama played was in 1979, and the Crimson Tide routed Teaff's Bears 45-0.

"They'll be foaming at the mouth to get us because we beat them pretty bad in Birmingham last year," Alabama Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant said recently.

Teaff called the thumping "embarrassing to me personally and embarrassing to our players. It was a very good licking from the word go, and we did not represent the conference very well. We have worked very hard to play very well against them this time, and I think we will."

Teaff's ninth Baylor squad went 10-1 in 1980, including an unblemished SWC slate, to earn its way to the Cotton Bowl host spot. Alabama went 9-2.

The game next Thursday will be one of the biggest Baylor has ever played, Teaff agreed.

"Beating Alabama would go a long way toward establishing our program here" because of the credibility the victory would give his team, the 46-

year-old Teaff said. Baylor is ranked sixth and Alabama eighth, with the final rankings due after the bowl games. Teaff was asked how high the Bears could finish in the polls.

"If everything went right, we could be No. 1, but it would be very difficult to convince the people who don't see us play, that don't know the caliber of play in our conference, primarily the East Coast and West Coast press," Teaff said.

"Unless we were able to beat Alabama very convincingly, I'll tell you one thing, if we beat Alabama, maybe no one else would claim it but I'd be running around wearing 'No. 1' signs for a long time. Alabama is what everybody thinks of when you talk about college football."

Teaff called the Alabama team very close, defensively, to the team that beat the Bears so convincingly a year ago.

"This is the best defense we will have faced this year," said Teaff, who called Alabama linebackers Thomas Boyd and Randy Scott "just tremendous" and the best he saw in the nation last season.

Teaff also praised Alabama defensive end E. J. Junior. "He's not only a great young man, he's awesome," Teaff said.

"The key, if we're to win, is we have got to be able to move the ball against Alabama. Otherwise, our defense will be on the field all day, and although we have a good defense, we don't have that much depth," he said.

## Holtz worries about Tulane's strengths

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — The Hall of Fame Bowl matchups concern Arkansas Coach Lou Holtz.

"Their strengths are the big question marks we have on our team," Holtz said Friday as his Razorbacks prepared for today's game with Tulane.

"One thing we don't do very well is rush the passer and they do an excellent job of protecting the passer," he said.

"Their defense doesn't give up the big play. Conversely, our offense has trouble putting together long drives."

However, Holtz said his team's approach to the game is a plus.

"Their concentration is better than any bowl we've been to," said Holtz, who has a 1-1-1 record in his three

previous bowl "tips at Arkansas. I couldn't be more pleased with our progress."

Both he and center Keith Houfek agreed that the team's attitude is different than it was in preparing for last year's Sugar Bowl game against Alabama, the national champion.

"The mood is more serious this year," Houfek said. "We've lost our last four games on TV and that hurts. This game means as much to us as any game we've played."

"Last year, the attitude was, 'Isn't this great to be here. What a great reward,'" Holtz said.

Arkansas received some criticism for getting a bowl bid with a 6-5 record.

"We wanted to get a bowl bid," Holtz said. "We didn't want our young

players to end the season with their heads down."

"I've never had a football game that wasn't the most important. There may be 800 million Chinese who care more about the Sugar Bowl, but this game is more important to me. That's like asking somebody which one of their children they like the best."

Holtz said he was impressed with the talent of Tulane, which is 7-4 and playing in its second straight bowl game for the first time in history.

"They are very comparable to teams in the Southwest Conference," Holtz said.

Tulane Coach Vince Gibson described Arkansas as a "fine big-time football team" that appeared a "little bit snakebit."

## Sun is salve for wounded Cornhuskers

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — No. 8-ranked Nebraska, so serious it has benched one of the nation's top runners and worked out all week in secret, was a whopping 14-point favorite over 17th-rated Mississippi State in today's 46th annual Sun Bowl.

Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne sees the game as a way the Cornhuskers can salve losing wounds inflicted by Florida State and Oklahoma with an upward jump in the national rankings.

Accordingly, he closed the workout gates and told Jarvis Redwine, the nation's No. 3 rusher, that he didn't grade well in the 21-17 loss to Oklahoma and would not be starting against the Bulldogs.

Senior Craig Johnson or sophomore Roger Craig will get the call ahead of

Redwine.

"This game gives us an opportunity to play well on national television and end up fairly well in the national rankings," said Osborne. "So far as I'm concerned it's the most important game of the season."

Mississippi State of the Southeastern Conference turned a 3-8 season into a 9-2 club under Emory Bellard, good enough for SEC runnerup status.

## Baltimore keeps Murray with five-year contract

BALTIMORE (AP) — First baseman Eddie Murray, one of the keys to the continued success of the Baltimore Orioles, has signed a five-year contract with the American League team, the team's general manager announced Friday.

Hank Peters said Murray's contract also provides a clause leaving options open for a sixth year with the Birds.

"Eddie's new basic contract extends through 1985 but will automatically renew itself on a guaranteed basis for one additional season if Eddie reaches certain performance levels in 1985," Peters said.

Orioles owner Edward Bennett Williams was first to confirm late Thursday that Murray had reached agreement on the pact, although he would not reveal the terms.

But Friday's Washington Post quot-

ed sources as saying the contract would be worth \$1 million annually, although the pact does not contain a cost-of-living increase.

Peters said an oral accord on the five-year agreement was reached late Wednesday in discussions between Peters and Murray's representative, Ron Shapiro. But he said it wasn't until Friday that the contract actually was finalized by agreement on the details of the option year.

"The thing that pleased me as much as anything about this negotiation was the complete absence of acrimony on both sides," Shapiro said.

Murray, 24, is the sixth veteran player Peters has signed to a multi-year contract since last spring.

The others signed so far are Jim Palmer, Doug DeCinces, Scott McGregor, Terry Crowley and Rich Dauer.

## Victor and vanquished manage to toil for Notre Dame

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The victor and the vanquished, they're thrown together daily under circumstances that could spawn envy and animosity. But Notre Dame quarterbacks Blair Kiel and Mike Courey say they genuinely like each other.

Courey, a senior, started the first three games of the season for Notre Dame. Blair, a freshman, started the rest and figures to be the starter against top-ranked Georgia in the Sugar Bowl on New Year's Day.

Georgia is 11-0. Notre Dame, 9-1-1, is ranked seventh after a season-ending loss to Southern Cal.

Courey said he was shocked and disappointed when he was replaced by Blair in the starting lineup midway through the third game of the season.

"It was in the Michigan State game. I started, and at halftime Coach (Ron) Toman told me they were going with Blair in the second half," Courey recalled.

"I didn't really play bad. I just couldn't get any points."

Toman said Kiel had managed to move the team late in two earlier games, then led Notre Dame from a 9-8 halftime deficit to a 26-21 victory over Michigan State.

But through the tense week that followed, neither quarterback knew who would start against Miami in the next contest. Kiel got the nod on

game day.

"It probably always will hurt," Courey said. "But our relationship is still good. It's still the same as it was on Day 1, when he got here."

"We help each other. When he's on the field, I'm looking for things to help him, and he does the same when I'm on the field."

He said they are friendly, though not really close friends.

"He's a freshman, and I hang around mostly with the other seniors," he explained.

Kiel said he has been pleasantly surprised by the way Courey and the rest of the veterans on the squad accepted his ascent to the first string.

"It's been amazing the way the seniors treated me," he said. Not since Gus Dorias played at Notre Dame in 1910 has a freshman logged as much time at quarterback as Kiel has. And he is the first freshman to start at quarterback for Notre Dame since Ralph Guglielmi did in 1951.

"It's quite an honor and a thrill to come in and play as quickly as I did," he said. "But it really hasn't hit me yet. I guess during the off-season, I'll sit down and think about it, and it will hit me."

He said he has deliberately avoided reading newspapers since the

season began, so he only gets second-hand reports on what is being written about him.

He said his mother keeps a scrapbook, but he felt he probably wouldn't want to browse through it for a while.

"I think when I get home, I'll just want to forget all about it for a while," he said.

Reminded that fellow freshman Scott Grooms could be expected to challenge him for the starting job during spring training, Kiel grimaced.

"Don't remind me," he said. "With a new coaching staff, it will be just like coming back as a freshman again."

Dan Devine announced before the season started that this would be his last year of coaching.

But Kiel said he has given very little thought to that subject. "Our season's not over yet," he said.

He said he expects the season to end with a close game. "I think it will be pretty tight," he said. "I think it will come down to who makes the fewest mistakes."

Reminded of the sports axiom about "rookie mistakes," he grimaced again. "I just hope I'm not the one who makes it," he said.



# Deaf parishoners find mixed reaction to signed service

CRANSTON, R.I. (AP) — Each Sunday, Mary Eibner sits in front of the 200-member congregation at the Assembly of God-Trinity Church, interpreting the minister's words with her hands for the congregation's dozen or so deaf members.

"She is totally involved in the service," the Rev. John A. Cooper said. "All of her facial expressions along with her signs just glorify God."

At St. Catherine's Church, Christine Dunleavy, another registered sign language interpreter, sits in a room off the main sanctuary interpreting the sermon for about nine deaf parishioners, including her husband, John.

The Rev. William F. Pyne turned down a request by Mrs. Dunleavy that she be allowed to stand near the altar. Pyne contended it would be too much of a distraction for the rest of the church, but he did agree to provide a special room where the deaf could meet.

"As a rule an interpreter is a huge star and a great attraction for all of about 10 minutes," she said. "And then you just fade into the wall and nobody really notices you anymore."

Thousands of churches across the country have experienced the same problem — what to do about the growing number of deaf parishioners.

Mrs. Dunleavy feels it is a question of human rights. "Hearing people don't realize that they carry interpreters within them ... and that is their ears. A deaf person, by the nature of their handicap, has to have an interpreter outside of them."

The Rev. Cooper said Mrs. Eibner began signing his sermons about 18 months ago at the request of a deaf couple who moved here from Minneapolis, where they had attended sermons exclusively for the deaf.

At that point, he said, the effort at Assembly of God "became a ministry in the church, to which more and more deaf people have been coming."

"They want to be a part of the service the same as anybody else, and I want to treat them the same as anybody else."

# Missionaries brave risks, march on

CLEVELAND (AP) — They literally dot the globe. Some preach in Latin America's dusty slums, others teach theology in modern Middle Eastern seminaries and still others work with refugees in Southeast Asia.

A veritable army of American missionaries, braving isolation, health hazards and turbulent politics, was listening to strains of "Onward Christian Soldiers" or other hymns as they celebrated Christmas at foreign bases.

And despite the killings of three American nuns and a Catholic lay worker in El Salvador this month, Catholic and Protestant missionary leaders say few of the estimated 60,000 Americans serving churches abroad would opt to return.

"We're all committed to going back to our people," said Father Paul Schindler, expressing a feeling that church leaders say is common. Schindler has spent nine years in the El Salvador mission of the Cleveland diocese. He and three other missionaries returned to El Salvador after the burial here of two comrades who were shot to death on Dec. 2.

The killings put a spotlight on missionary work abroad and caused a major U.S. government investigation into the reasons for the violence that has claimed 8,500 lives in El Salvador in the past year.

Missionary leaders ranging from progressive Catholics to fundamentalist evangelicals are divided as to whether the risks are growing as Americans continue to evangelize around the world.

According to some, particularly

Catholic leaders, the more the missionaries work for the poor, the more they become involved in local political disputes that in some cases have spurred violence.

To more fundamentalist groups, however, the risks abroad are no greater today than when missionaries went to uncertain fates in Africa, China and Latin America a century ago.

"Where there are serious violations of human rights and the church takes a stand, the church pays the consequence," said Father Tony Bellagamba, an Italian-born former missionary in Africa who now directs the U.S. Catholic Mission Council in Washington.

"I think the missionaries will have harder times ahead not only because of the problem of social justice, but also because of the tremendous problems facing the church in becoming indigenous," said Bellagamba. "Both will cause much pain and trouble to all the missionaries, and the problem of justice will cause more martyrs."

"From our perspective," said Dr. Richard Butler, who directs the Middle East missionary force representing 32 denominations that compose the National Council of Churches in New York, "there are greater challenges for missionaries as they attempt to identify with the poor."

"They run up against government policies and as they try to speak out for the poor, they obviously become targets, as the situation in El Salvador demonstrates."

Dr. Samuel Wilson is director of the Missions Advanced Research and Communications Center of World Vision, a non-denominational group in Modesto, Calif., that keeps statistics on church missions abroad.

"The risk has always been there," he said. "Missionaries in Africa a century ago frequently died shortly after arriving. The church continued to grow. At that time the risk to health was even greater. But I don't see the risks today affecting the number of people to go."

According to MARC, this year there were almost 57,000 career and short-term American missionaries abroad, almost two-thirds of them dedicated to long-term evangelizing.

Protestant and evangelical groups, which account for about 51,000 of these, spent close to \$1 billion to keep them in 130 countries as church pastors, crusade leaders, teachers, doctors and nurses, radio technicians, translators and pilots.

The Roman Catholic church, America's largest religious denomination with 47.5 million members, fields 6,400 clerical and lay workers in 110 countries.

Of all the groups, evangelicals have grown most quickly in the past 12 years, Wilson said.

"It's no longer possible for Third World governments to keep their people in a state of almost total dependence," Bellagamba said. "American missionaries have become aware of the injustices and violations of human rights, and they have taken more courageous stands in their missionary work."

He said that evangelical and fundamentalist missionaries have grown in number "because they don't challenge the status quo."

To Dr. R. Keith Parks, director of the Southern Baptist Mission Board in Richmond, Va., "as the local Christians become aware as citizens, they are the ones who should exercise their political function. They are the residents and we are the guests."

Despite violence in El Salvador, he said, none of the eight Baptist missionary families there has wanted to come home.

"We've been in mission work for 145 years," he said, "and in all that time — through internment in China, through the Vietnam war, and so on — we've had less than 10 missionaries die of violent causes."

"We recognize there are some risks," he said, "but if we wait until there are no risks, we wouldn't ever be able to preach."

# New York Mayor, Israeli Prime Minister meet in Jerusalem

JERUSALEM (AP) — New York Mayor Edward Koch said today he would continue to publicly criticize some of Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin's Mideast policies, despite Israeli insistence that American Jews keep any opposition private.

After paying a courtesy call on Begin today, Koch, himself Jewish, said that to be a supporter of Israel does not mean to accept all its policies.

The mayor has in the past criticized Israel's settling of Jews on occupied Arab land, including the West Bank of the Jordan River, and he called the recent law reaffirming Israel's annexation of predominantly Arab East Jerusalem "a dumb thing."

Koch told reporters today that he backs Israeli control of East Jerusalem, and said he sometimes does "dumb things" too.

The mayor, who visited Egypt before coming here on the second leg of his Mideast "pleasure trip," said he talked with Begin about his chat with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat last week.

Sadat told Koch that despite Egypt's refusal to recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital, he would allow Egyptian ministers to visit the city "but they cannot sleep here," Koch said.

Egyptian Minister of Agriculture Mahmoud Mohammed Daoud was due to arrive on a visit to Israel later today and he has a meeting scheduled with Begin in Jerusalem on Sunday.

Koch also toured Yad Vashem, Israel's memorial to the six million Jewish victims of the Nazi holocaust.

"My own father's family was killed and decimated in Poland," Koch said.

# Judge says prayer OK if taxpayers don't fund it

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A federal judge has decided that Nebraska lawmakers can't pay their official chaplain with state funds, but the minister who has opened each legislative day with prayer since 1965 says that won't change anything for him.

U.S. District Judge Warren K. Urbom on Wednesday ruled that Nebraska's practice of paying its legislative chaplain a monthly salary of \$319 while the one-house body, the Unicameral, is in session violated the constitutional separation of church and state.

Urbom also ordered a halt to the expenditure of state money for the chaplain's office — a legislative institution in Nebraska since 1855.

But on another point raised in the lawsuit filed by Omaha Sen. Ernest Chambers, Urbom refused to prohibit the daily prayer.

"As I understand it, he has decided that I may pray but not for pay,"

said Rev. Robert E. Palmer. "But I didn't begin for pay. I didn't continue for pay and I won't stop because there is no pay."

Unless he is told otherwise, Palmer said, he will be on hand for the opening day of the 1981 legislative session on Jan. 7.

American Civil Liberties Union attorneys who represented Chambers said the case could set

precedent for all 50 state legislatures, and said they were considering an appeal because Urbom refused to stop the daily prayer.

"We still contend that the prayer itself violates the Constitution," said Herbert Friedman, Urbom said the prayer was permissible because it was an "internal act" directed at the government unit itself or its own members.


