Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini dropped his ballot into a box in his home in Tehran today as millions of Iranians turned out to elect the new Parliament that will decide the fate of the American hostages.

Meanwhile, it was reported the hostages would be moved from city to city to foil another U.S. rescue attempt, and the Swiss Embassy confirmed Cynthia Dwyer was the American woman arrested in Tehran on charges of being a CIA agent.

The 80-year-old Khomeini, still frail after his recent heart attack, said in hushed tones to nearby reporters he hoped convening the Parliament will make Iran "free forever from foreign domination.

The hard-line Islamic Republican party, which won 50 of the 98 Parliament seats decided in the first round of voting March 14, was favored to repeat its strong showing in the runoff for the 149 seats at stake today. Khomeini has urged voters to elect those "who are 100 percent Moslem."

Khomeini has said the Majlis will decide what to do with the 53 Americans held captive since militant students seized the U.S. Embassy Nov. 4. But the legislature, Iran's first since the February 1979, revolution, is expected to deal with procedural and domestic issues before debating the hostage crisis, and Ayatollah Mo-hammad Beheshti, the IRP's leader, said he does not think the captives will be discussed until mid-June at the earliest.

The hostages were reported dispersed among 13 cities, including Tehran, following the U.S. attempt to rescue them on April 25, and the conservative newspaper Donya Iran said Thursday the militants plan to rotate them so that "American intelligence will be confused."

The paper said those with the most suspicious backgrounds will be sent to the least pleasant cities.

However, the militants denied a

report by Italian journalist Oriana Fallaci in the current issue of The New Republic that one of the hostages had tried to commit suicide three times and may be dead.

She said a source she did not identify told her on a recent trip to Tehran that this hostage was one of a group kept in the embassy basement who were "considered unmistakably spies, and some of them are or have been recently tied up because they attacked the students."

Swiss Ambassador Eric Lang confirmed the identity of Miss Dwyer, a free-lance journalist from Buffalo, N.Y. However, he said he has not been able to determine yet where she is being held.

Lang said his embassy, which began handling U.S. consular affairs after President Carter broke diplomatic relations last month, wants permission to visit her, get a lawyer for her and find out what she says about the charges.

# 17 bodies recovered, more sought

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) - A 609-foot cargo ship crashed into the Sunshine Skyway Bridge in a storm today, knocking out a portion of the 15-mile span and sending a Greyhound bus with 23 persons aboard plunging into Tampa Bay, officials said

Phillip Biebender, a Coast Guard spokesman in St. Petersburg said 17 bodies were recovered within hours after the freighter Summit Venture hit the bridge in a thundershower. The accident occurred during the morning rush hour.

The bus was resting in 20 feet of water.

About 300 feet of the bridge collapsed where it crosses the main shipping channel.

One car was seen hanging over the edge of the torn bridge but its four occupants crawled to safety.

Richard Hornbuckle, 60, of St. Petersburg, driver of the car, said, "It was raining cats and dogs. It was dark. The wind was blowing like a hurricane.'

"I was doing about 25 mph; the Greyhound bus passed me doing about 35. There was a stalled car in front. As I came to the very top of the bridge, I saw the rest of it was out. I applied my brakes immediately and stopped within 2 feet of going in. I bailed out and went back to stop other cars."

"We got all the other cars stopped. I looked down and saw my car with all four doors open. I figured the Lord was real good to the four of us." **Coast Guard Chief Petty Officer** Paul Scotti said authorities at first believed 90 persons may have drowned because they thought the bus was filled.

But Robert Rodriguez, a local manager for Greyhound, said the bus was carrying 22 passenges and a driver.

Rodriguez said the bus left St. Petersburg for Miami at 7:05 a.m. and did not arrive as scheduled in Bradenton, on the other side of the bay.

Authorities said it appeared the passenger car and the bus had just passed a slower moving vehicle on the bridge when they sped onto the torn section. The bus plunged over the edge and into the bay, but the car was able to stop barely in time.

Divers from the local sheriff's department were dispatched to the area to search for survivors.

Scotti said one of the spans at the south end of the bridge, which soars over the mouth of Tampa Bay between St. Petersburg and Bradenton, was knocked out when hit by a ship at 7:38 a.m.

"There was a thundershower at the bridge at the time, and visibility was zero," Scotti said.

Sgt. Jim Kelley of the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office in Tampa said there had been wreck on the bridge shortly before the ship hit.

"A (state) trooper was investigating an accident when it happened," said Kelley. He said several sheriff's divers were sent to the scene to help,

Delegates to the Democratic and Republican county conventions will gather at 10 a.m. Saturday to choose representatives and hammer out resolutions to take to their parties' state conventions this summer

The Democrats will meet in Alamo Junior High School while the Republicans will meet at San Jacinto Junior High.

A continuation of the grass-roots movement that started last Saturday in party gatherings in 28 precincts, the county meetings will hear and vote on resolutions formulated during the precinct conventions as well as others from the floor of the conventions.

Republicans also will hear a keynote address by Railroad Commission candidate H.J. "Doc" Blanchard. Blanchard, an Austin attorney, served in the Texas Senate from 1962 to 1975. While there he served on every major committee and chaired many of them.

Both parties expect to consider resolutions on the Equal Rights Amendment, right to life and other topics.

Democratic county chairman Darrell Smith noted one resolution ex-pected to come before that party's convention is a commendation for Carter's handling of the Iranian situation.

Republicans also expect to vote on resolutions praising the family unit and Judeo-Christian work ethic along with discussions of gun control and right to work laws.

The delegates to the state convention selected at the Democratic meeting will either be committed to vote for President Jimmy Carter at the state meeting or be uncommitted. And the delegates to the county convention are almost evenly split over the issue, according to Smith. Twelve of Midland County's 15 delegates to the Democratic State Con-

vention will be chosen in precinct caucuses, and three will be chosen by the convention at-large, Smith said. The three at-large spots likely will be used to fill the party's required quota of minority and women delegates, he added.

The Republicans will choose 46 delegates to their state convention, Shaner said.

Delegate are apportioned on the basis of the number of votes the party's candidate received in the last gubernatorial election.

Because of the large Midland County turnout for Bill Clements, Republi-cans were to choose 552 delegates and 552 alternates to the county convention in the precinct gatherings Saturday.

"Sometimes I don't think there are that many Republicans in Midland County," Shaner said, but added he did not anticipate trouble in gathering 46 delegates and 46 alternates for the party's state convention.

Both party's conventions are open to the public.

# World spiritual leaders to meet in West Africa

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ACCRA, Ghana (AP) - The paths of Pope John Paul II and the new Archbishop of Canterbury, spiritual leaders of the world's 720 million Roman Catholics and 65 million Anglicans, crossed in West Africa today and they were to meet for the first time.

"It is to be an informal, personal and simple meeting which would not be possible in Europe," said the archbishop, the Most. Rev. Robert Runcie, as he left London Thursday to inaugurate a new diocese in Zaire.

The meeting of the pontiff and the archbishop, whose churches are try-ing to draw closer together after more than four centuries of division, was arranged when it was found their pastoral visits to Africa coincided.

The last three archbishops of Canterbury all met with the popes of their time in Rome. But Runcie, who was enthroned as primate of the Church of England and leader of the worldwide Anglican Communion on March 25,

said he and the pope wanted to break away from the formalities which meeting on their home ground required.

"It is good that the pope and the new archbishop of Canterbury should have their very first meeting not in Rome or London but far from the old rivalries of EuroE - in Africa, a continent full of new life and energy." the Anglican leader said.

"Old disputes can look much less significant when measured against the need for all the Christian churches in Africa to combine their faith and resources in an undivided effort to let Christ be seen and heard."

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) - After thousands of Cuban refugees and former prisoners poured into overcrowded facilities here in four-day burst, the tide of boats in the Freedom Flotilla has ebbed somewhat with some 300 people arriving early

today. The total of 2,921 arrivals Thursday was the lowest since last week. So far in the 19-day boatlift, more than 27,000 refugees have come here, with more than 15,000 in a four-day span beginning Sunday.

"There's nothing drifting in this morning," said Sgt. Burt Bond of the National Guard. "And most of the boats coming in last night were people who got tired of waiting at Mariel and came back without anybody."

Havana Radio reported about 1,400 boats still waited to take on refugees at Cuba's port of Mariel.

The slowdown helped federal and local officials catch up on sending refugees from here to 14 South Florida centers and a tent city at North Florida's Eglin Air Force Base.



### Leadership olcano watchers on alert Midland has

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) - As steam and ash spew from Mount St. Helens and a bulge on its north slope continues to grow, scientists have installed monitors on the volcano to study correlations between earthquake activity and eruptions at the 9,677-foot peak.

The seismic readings recorded Thursday in Seattle may signal a massive earth slide down the north slope that could cause major flooding, said Craig Weaver of the U.S. Geological Survey.

The discovery of a relationship be-tween what shows up on seismic readings and what actually is happening at the mountain came after a new recording station was installed near the bulge, Weaver said.

"It allows us to do two things: monitor steam and ash emissions 24 hours a day regardless of the weather, and perhaps predict a slide," he said.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Fierce fighting is raging for the second week between Soviet forces and Afghan rebels in Afghanistan's Ghazni Province southwest of Kabul, near the scene of a massacre of thousands of villagers in late April, according to reports from Kabul received here today.

The Soviets launched a major offensive Tuesday with 600 to 900 tanks and armored vehicles, helicopter gunships and MiG jets against as many as 10,000 Moslem rebel "holy warriors" gathered in the Jughatu region of Ghazni — about 100 miles southwest of the capital — and fight-

### Arizona banker, \$3 million gone

YUMA, Ariz. (AP) - A fraud and embezzlement investigation has begun at a Yuma bank, five days after an assistant vice president and a large sum of money vanished, the FBI says.

"Close to \$3 million may be missing" from the First National Bank of Arizona branch, the Yuma Daily Sun said Thursday, quoting an unidentified source.

Police have been searching since Saturday night for Gregg Roberts, 41, who failed to return after telling his family he was going to a target range Saturday morning.

'This whole thing has walted on the auditors coming up with a figure," said Chuck Stapleton, FBI spokesman in Phoenix. "They came up with a figure so we have an investigation. involving bank fraud and embezzlement."

Police Lt. Rick Leffler said his officers have been searching southwest Arizona and cooperating with the FBI, which has authority to pursue the investigation into Mexico.

Neither Stapleton nor bank officials would confirm the amount missing. No charge has been filed.

Regarding Roberts, Leffler said, "We're still looking for him. We have no idea as to where he is. No clues, whatsoever."

The figures and locations came from travelers who arrived in India from Afghanistan and from reports of a Kabul source who in the past has proved reliable. They could not be confirmed inde-

pendently. Western reporters have been barred from Afghanistan.

The Kabul informant quoted information reaching the Afghan capital that about 5,000 Afghans were slain in an April 26-29 bombardment, shelling and strafing of Andar and Shilgar villages, 10 miles north of Ghazni, the provincial capital. Most of the dead were women and children because the able-bodied men were fighting in rebel units, some of them the target of this week's offensive, the report said.

An Afghan source, who arrived recently in New Delhi, said he took his ill son to Kabul Children's Hospital last-week where he saw a bus bring in 24-youngsters, all maimed, many missing arms and legs.

The driver and a woman accompanying them said the children were injured during two days of bombardments on their villages in Ghazni province.

Soviet troops poured into Afghanistan in December and have joined government forces in theior fight against Moslems rebelling against the Marxist Kabul government.

A Kabul resident reaching New Delhi from Afghanistan estimated, meanwhile, that more than 5,000 school and college students have been arrested in the capital in the aftermath of nearly two weeks of anti-Soviet rioting that ended last Sunday with campuses under heavy guard.

# Israel says Sadat making 'a mistake

By The Associated Press Israel described Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's decision to suspend the deadlocked Palestinian autonomy talks as "a mistake" today. and said the meetings of working committees also will be halted until the ministerial sessions resume.

Sadat's decision was announced Thursday by Sol Linowitz, the special U.S. envoy mediating the negotiations for a plan to give home rule to the 1.2 million Palestinians of the West Bank of the Jordan River and Gaza Strip, which Israel occupied in the 1967 Arab-Israeli War. The move increases prospects that the May 26 target for agreement will not be met.

Linowitz, who met with Sadat for an hour Thursday in Ismailia, said the Egyptian leader wanted time "to reflect on the results" of the last round of negotiations, in the Israeli resort of Herzlia. The talks lasted a week and ended Tuesday with no sign of major progress. They had been scheduled to resume Monday in Cairo.

Israel's chief negotiator, Interior Minister Yosef Burg, called Sadat's decision to postpone the talks a "mistake" in an interview with Israel Radio, and said he thought the move would act against Egypt. "Apparently he decided to create a

Egyptian Prime Minister Mustafa Khalil, Egypt's chief negotiator, acknowledged Wednesday that "a big gap" remained between Israel and Egypt. Israeli Defense Minister Ezer Weizman, who met with Sadat on Thursday, agreed and said he was "not that optimistic" that the May 26

target — the anniversary of the start of the negotations — could be met. Linowitz pointed out that the 1977 breakthrough on the Panama Canal treaties which he helped negotiate came on the day set as a deadline. According to Khalil, the only things

agreed upon in Herzlia were the importance of continuing negotiations and the formation of a ministerial committee to discuss security. But Sadat's action could delay formation of the committee.

The talks are deadlocked over how much authority to grant the Palestinian council that would govern the occupied territories. Israel insists the council should have only limited control over municipal affairs, claiming that any more authority would jeopardize Israel's security. Egypt wants the council to have judicial, legislative and executive powers, leading eventually to the creation of an independent Palestinian state.

Israel meanwhile faces a growing rebellion among the West Bank and Gaza Palestinians, who oppose the autonomy scheme and say they will settle only for independence. And on Thursday the Palestinians got new support from the U.N. Security Coun-

# Kremlin accuses West, China of Afghan deceit


MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Defense Minister Dmitri F. Ustinov today accused Western "imperialist circles" and China of trying to deceive the world about Moscow's "friendly assistance" to Afghanistan.

Ustinov also claimed Peking was trying to create "a united anti-Soviet front" around the globe.

His comments came in an article in the Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda marking the 35th anniversary of Allied victory over Nazi Germany in World War II.

"Imperialist circles do not stop short of calumny of the lowest kind, political speculations and downright deception of the international public," Ustinov wrote.

He said this was illustrated by "attempts of the U.S. administration and its supporters to distort the essense of the friendly assistance of the Soviet Union to the people of Afghanistan, which helped disrupt the plans of internal and international reactionaries to strangle the Afghan revolution."



Inflation eased in April, Labor Department says

WASHINGTON (AP) - Inflation's iron grip loosened in April, as wholesale prices rose only 0.5 percent, the smallest increase in 11 months, the Labor Department reported today.

The slowdown was due largely to a 2.8 percent decline in wholesale prices of food, the sharpest drop since June 1974 when prices fell 3.3 percent. In March, food prices shot up 1.1 percent. April's overall 0.5 percent rise in wholesale, or producer, prices compares with a 1.4 percent surge in March and a 1.5 percent increase in both January and February, the Labor Department said. At last month's pace - the lowest since May 1979 - the composite inflation rate at the producer level would be only 6.2 percent about

inflation rate at the producer level would be only 6.2 percent, about one-third the rate of recent months.

The clear slowdown in wholesale prices occurred as the U.S. economy is entering a recession. Unemployment last month shot up from 6.2 percent to 7 percent.

Energy prices went up 3.8 percent last month— a pace far less than the 7 percent-plus figures of Febrary and March — as last year's OPEC oil price increases rippled through the U.S. economy.



# Deteriorating Iran, Libya relations putting U.S. at odds with suppliers

### By STAN BENJAMIN

WASHINGTON (AP) - The deterioration in U.S. relations with Iran, Libya and now Saudi Arabia has put the United States at odds with three of its major oil suppliers, highlighting the nation's sensitivity to foreign pressure on the energy nerve.

American dependence on foreign oil was dramatically demonstrated in October 1973, when the Arab members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries stopped shipments in a bid to influence U.S. policy on Israel. Despite the long gasoline lines caused by the 1973-74 crude oil embargo, U.S. dependence on foreign crude increased from 18.7 percent in 1973 to almost 36 percent in 1977.

Libya have been strained; those with Saudi Arabia, merely irritated so far.

The range of problems - the seizing of hostages, the rejection of diplomats, the scheduling of a TV film show how fragile are the relationships on which U.S. oil supplies depend.

The United States has been doing without Iranian oil for the last six months, since militants seiz U.S. Embassy in Tehran Nov. 4 and took the Americans there captive. President Carter then ordered a halt to oil imports from Iran, to free U.S. responses to the situation from that complication.

Saudi Arabia is the largest single foreign supplier of oil to the United States, providing 7.3 percent of total U.S. oil needs in 1979.

While Saudi Arabia has not threatened to withhold its oil, Saudi objections to the scheduled showing of a television film here have already aroused some nervousness in Washington.

"Death of a Princess" has stirred the anger of the Saudi government, which ordered Britain's ambassador to leave the Middle Eastern country after the film was shown on English television last month.

The two-hour film recreates the circumstances surrounding the 1977 public execution of Saudi Princess Misha'al and her commoner lover. They had been accused of adultery. The movie never mentions Saudi Arabia by name.

Although the State Department has asked the Public Broadcasting Service to give "appropriate consideration" to Saudi concerns, PBS says it. still intends to air the film Monday night.

However, Acting Secretary of State Warren Christophzr said Thursday the U.S. government would not seek to impose any censorship on PBS.

But Rep. Clement Zablocki, D-Wis., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, and Rep. William S. Broomfield, R-Mich., the committee's ranking Republican; urged that the film not be shown.

And Sen. Charles Percy, R-Ill., told President Carter he would find support in Congress if he decided that showing the film was "not in the national interest," a Percy aide reported.

Saudi Arabia's contribution to U.S. crude oil supplies has increased from 7.7 percent of total imports in 1973 to around 21 percent of imported oil in 1977, and remaining at about that level.

Iranian crude provided 3.5 percent of the crude oil imports in 1973, climbed to 8.1 percent in 1977, and has now virtually dried up.

Libya, whose oil provided only 2.6 percent of U.S. crude oil in 1973, increased its share to 11 percent in 1977, and slipped slightly to 10.3 percent in 1979

While Arab exporters could shut off direct crude oil exports to the United States, they could not effectively block shipments to the United States of gasoline, fuel oil and other products refined from Arab oil in Europe, the Caribbean and elsewhere.
