Lubbock hostages freed Gunman demands his back pay

LUBBOCK (AP) - Two combat-trained Marines held hostage at a recruiting office by an armed man said they didn't take their captor seriously until he began firing shots.

The man, reportedly an ex-Marine, entered the U.S. Armed Forces Recruiting Office Monday afternoon and took four Marines captive, demanding \$1,200 in back pay, police said. After a 2-hour standoff with Lubbock police SWAT team members, the man was surprised and subdued by police. No one was injured. David M. Vance, 32, of nearby Levelland, was charged with two counts of aggravated kidnapping late Monday. State District Judge Wayne LeCroy set bond at \$250,000 on each count.

Opponents fighting 10-cent gasoline fee which starts Thursday

oline prices may go up 10 cents a gallon Thursday — unless a federal judge rules against President

Carter's plan. U.S. District Judge Aubrey E. Ro-binson Jr. was considering a suit that claimed the gas fee is unconstitutional. The losing side is expected to appeal his ruling, which he promised by the end of today. Carter announced the fee as a gas

conservation measure, saying the higher prices would force drivers to use less gas and thus help cut U.S. imports, which now are 7.3 million barrels of crude oil daily. The fee is due to take effect Thursday. But a coalition of congressmen, con-

sumer groups and petroleum marketers filed suit, contending that the fee is actually a tax and thus Carter is unconstitutionally usurping the power of the House of Representatives to initiate tax measures.

While the tax was challenged in the courts Monday, it was also under fire in Congress. A House Ways and Means subcommittee on trade arranged to vote today on legislation to block the tax. The bill is sponsored by some 50 congressmen and is expected to easily pass both the subcommittee and the full Ways and Means Committee.

"This is a program without a con-stituency," said Rep. James M. Shannon, D-Mass., the prime sponsor of the bill. "Republicans are against it. liberal Democrats are against it, consumer groups are against it, oil states are against it."

There is considerable sentiment in both chambers against the fee, although it appeared doubtful that a two-thirds vote could be mustered to override a likely veto of blocking legislation.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Retail gas- ucts such as heating oil, customers may balk because price competition would prevent them from passing the fee along.

Modell countered, "There's no guarantee the full burden...will fall on gasoline as intended. The only way to ensure that is to apply price controls" to all petroleum products.

In Congress, the House Commerce Committee has already approved its own version of legislation to block the fee. And a floor vote in the House to roll it back seems likely by early summer.

Drug roundup under way here

Early this morning, four teams of Midland police officers began the last stage of a three-month drug investigation.

The roundup of approximately 18 people in connection with 23 to 25 cases of delivery of drugs started at 6 a.m. today.

The investigation began in February with a single undercover officer assigned to the narcotics department of the Midland Police Department. According to Police Chief Wayne Gideon, the undercover officer was an experienced policeman who is generally unknown — even to other officers.

The undercover officer began the investigation with information gleaned from people in local bars and lounges and from areas where drug addicts were known to frequent, Gideon said. Officers began arresting the 18 Midlanders from addresses that ranged from west Midland to the east and south sides. Eleven of the cases involved delivery of marijuana. Three involved delivery of cocaine; one, delivery of hashish; three, delivery of metham-phetamines; two, delivery of amphetamines; and two, delivery of preludes, also known as Phennatrezine. "We know we have a problem in some areas. I think it will be obvious where we have been directing our efforts," Gideon said regarding the cases filed before and signed by the district attorney. All of the cases were filed against those who delivered the drugs, not users. Gideon said the round-up would be done quietly. "They (the officers) will

Vance remained jailed in Lubbock today.

Staff Sgt. Adrian Swafford and Master Sgt. Peter Delandero, who remained behind, said they thought the gunman was "a nut" until two shots were fired. The man then ordered them to barricade a front picture window with a desk, chairs and a couch, they said.

"He (the gunman) couldn't have picked two worse hostages ... both Marines with combat experience." Chagnon said.

During their ordeal, Swafford said he was seated on the floor, the gunman holding his collar and pointing a .22-caliber rifle at his head.

Swafford said he shifted his position "to try to strike the gunman in the groin," but Delandero shook his head 'No" when the rifle's safety was clicked off. Officers said the man secluded himself in a small office

in the northeast corner of the building, located in a shopping center, after taking the hostages. He would emerge occasionally and point the rifle in the hallway. they said.

New security measures considered at courthouse

Sheriff Dallas Smith, urging the Midland County commissioners to "take some (security) steps before it does become a problem," Monday recommended that a sign-in, sign-out procedure be used at the courthouse to prevent any pilfering of county and personal property. "We have had a few articles miss-

ing lately," Smith told the commissioners, "and we'd better (take) security measures."

But the commissioners, wishing to consider who might be exempted from the proposed measure, unanimously tabled the motion on the recommendation of Commissioner Charlie Welch.

"Maybe before we rush in we ought to consider" the proposal more, agreed Commissioner Durward Wright.

"I PERSONALLY like it," said fellow Commissioner Win Brown. "Some of the buildings around town are going to this (security system)."

The sheriff's proposal was prompted after between \$500 and \$600 in fines paid by defendants to the county was taken in early February from a locked secretary's desk in County Attorney Les Acker's office, after between \$50 and \$60 was taken from the justice of the peace's office and, as best as Smith can determine, a camera is missing from the sheriff of-

fice. However, Acker said, a now-fired, after-hours cleaning person who admitted taking the money from the desk has agreed to make restitution. No charges are being filed, he said

"We've got it settled," Acker said in a 10-minute recess in the two-hour meeting. "We'll be recovering the money in about three weeks." Possible tornado, hail reported in Big Lake

Rankin and Big Lake were the victims of a rain and hail storm early today and the possibility of a small tornado hitting Big Lake was voiced by a spokesman in that town.

According to officials in both towns south of Midland, the storm hit shortly after 7:30 a.m. Hail covered the lawns like a snow in Rankin and about half an inch of rain fell. The hail stripped leaves off the trees and a spokesman said it knocked down her tomato plants.

The Reagan County sheriff reported "a heck of a hailstorm" with wind and rain that caused damage to several buildings.

Carter, Reagan favored in today's primaries

Defying the numbers that read **Jimmy Carter versus Ronald Reagan** for the White House, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy and George Bush pressed their never-say-never presidential challenges in the Maryland and Nebraska primary elections today.

Party leaders and pollsters say Kennedy and Bush could wind up even more behind the frontrunners when the votes were counted. But the challengers said in advance that they wouldn't stop running before the national convention roll calls that install presidential nominees this summer.

President Carter entered the day's primary competition 347 delegate votes away from the majority he needs to clinch Democratic renomination against Kennedy.

Reagan was 220 votes short of a Republican majority. Bush was far behind.

The Maryland primary was for 59 Democratic delegates and 30 Republican nominating votes. Nebraska was apportioning 24 Democratic votes, 25 Republican.

The polls closed at 8 p.m. EDT in Maryland, 9 p.m. EDT in Nebraska. Carter and Kennedy, Reagan and Bush, and an assortment of minor and dropout candidates were on the ballot in both states. In addition, Democrats could cast uncommitted ballots, a po-tential protest vote that concerned the Carter camp.

Maryland and Nebraska were two of the states Carter lost to late challengers in 1976. California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. beat him in Maryland. Brown is on both of today's primary ballots, though he dropped from the campaign six weeks ago. Sen. Frank Church of Idaho edged Carter in the 1976 Nebraska prima-

By the time Carter started losing late-season primary elections in 1976, his grip on the nomination was too

secure to be shaken. His position this time is at least as commanding, though Kennedy insists nothing is settled

Carter now has 1,319 of the 1,666 delegates needed to win nomination. Kennedy has 734. Another 54 are uncommitted.

That means Carter can clinch a nominating majority by winning 28 percent of the delegates yet to be chosen. Kennedy would have to win 76 percent of those to get to a majority.

Since the Democrats award delegates in proportion to popular votes in the primaries, Carter's odds are overwhelming.

Reagan's position is even stronger. He has 778 delegates, needs 998. Bush has only 171. There are 153 uncomitted and scattered GOP delegates, including 56 still pledged to Rep. John B. Anderson, who has quit the Republican race to run as an independent but remains on the GOP ballot in both Nebraska and Maryland.

That means that 25 percent of the remaining delegates will deliver the nomination to Reagan. Bush would have to win 93 percent of those that remain to have a majority. The for-mer U.N. ambassador insists he can woo away Reagan delegates with strong showings in the final primaries. He has been saying that for weeks.

Campaigning in Detroit on Monday for the May 20 Michigan primary, Bush again brushed off the notion it's time for him to quit for the sake of Republican unity. Michigan Gov. William Milliken is working for Bush. and said that former President Gerald Ford had told him he wouldn't endorse any candidate before the convention.

Milliken said Ford "felt Mr. Bush clearly had a chance ... that anything can happen."



At least 25 persons hurt as tornadoes hit nation

Steel girders were twisted at a factory and mobile homes were wrecked as at least one tornado cut a half-mile swath through Sedalia, Mo., injuring 25 persons and leaving 200 homeless.

No deaths were reported in Sedalia, or in tornadoes that hit elsewhere in Missouri and Pennsylvania. A tornado in Chambersburg, a com-

munity in south-central Pennsylvania, damaged eight homes and left three families homeless, officials said.

"Our trailer was just gone. We couldn't find anything recognizable," said Kirby Thomas, resident of a Sedalia mobile home park where only two of 64 trailers were left intact by the Monday twister.

Sedalia Mayor Allen Hawkins esti-mated there was \$45 million in damages and said five or six businesses were destroyed.

Le Pre Oslik 55 .42 cir 56 .cir 53 cir 55 DALLAS (AP) - Convinced they did not arrest the wrong man, Dallas police were still powerless to prevent Donald Wayne Hemphill's release from jail after a grand jury refused to indict him for murder

"Sometimes you just don't get enough evidence," said police Capt. William F. Gentry.

Police had charged Hemphill in the death of Debera Martinson, the wife of Dallas attorney Don Martinson. She was found dead in her home March 21, strangled with a braided rope plant hangar.

A message, "Now we are even Don," was scrawled on a bedroom mirror in pink lipstick, and police unofficially referred to the case as the 'lipstick murder."

Hemphill, an appliance repairman, was arrested April 13 on evidence given police by an attorney for the husband. Martinson told police he found his wife's body when he returned home from a day of jury duty.

Hemphill was released from the Dallas County Jail on Monday, just hours after police failed to convince grand jurors to return an indict-

"Apparently the police didn't es-tablish who did it," said District At-torney Henry Wade, after the grand jury's decision. "It'll just be an un-solved murder."

The National Weather Service reported that there may have been two tornadoes at work.

In Sedalia, many of the injured were thought to come from the Kel-sey-Haynes wheel manufacturing plant, where damage was heavy. Sheets of the plant's metal siding were torn away, girders were twisted and insulation dangled from the building shell.

Hawkins said 1,500 to 2,000 people would be out of work until the businesses that were damaged or destroyed reopened.

Officials at Bothwell Memorial Hospital said that most of the 25 people they treated had cuts and bruises. But two were admitted, one for a broken leg and the other for a concussion.

Wallace McCwon, a Sedalia resi-dent, said the tornado "sounded like a jet. "You could hear it tearing up stuff.

It was just a big black cloud and then when it went through, the sun came out," he said.

Twisters were also reported in at least six other communities in Missouri. In only one, Jonesburg, were any injuries reported.

A tornado destroyed three mobile homes in Jonesburg and three people were taken to a hospital. An unidentified person who saw the

Chambersburg, Pa., twister said it hit some power lines before blowing the roof off a lumber company. "It was like fire rolling over the top

of the building, all red and just like fireballs," the witness said. Tornadoes also struck in New Alex-

andria, where an auto dealership was damaged and in Gettysburg, where apparently no damage was done.

There were no serious injuries reported in any of the Pennsylvania tornadoes.

"The aircraft shuddered from the force of the plane going by," Turner said after speaking by telephone with the pilot, Lt. David Kunkel, at his base in Boringuen, Puerto Rico.

One MiG passed over the helicopter and the other swooped 100 or 200 yards to the left, then one of them approached from behind, pulled about 50 feet below the chopper and shot straight up just in front of it, Turner said.

"He thought they were just joking when they first started," Turner said. "But the third time...he heard him and all of a sudden he saw him just in

front of him, going straight up.... "(It) passed 50 feet under the helicopter, which was only 300 feet above the ocean, cutting in its afterburner as it passed under the helicopter, then climbed to full altitude and circled.

"That's an extremely close pass for any aircraft, especially for a helicopter, which is so susceptible to turbulence. It's almost a near miss when

you have aircraft pass that close." Afterward, the helicopter hovered over a nearby Navy ship, the USS Charles F. Adams, until the jets were no longer on the missile destroyer's radar, he said.

"They took a stand against the enemy and lost their lives for Islam, God and their country," Ghotbzadeh said. He noted the government had said the embassy staff was ready to die rather than surrender to the terrorists' demands for the release of 91 Arabs imprisoned in southern Iran.

The gunmen murdered Lavasani and Samadzadeh on May 5 after the Iranian government refused to negotiate with them. British commandos then stormed the embassy, killed four of the terrorists, captured, the fifth one and rescued 19 hostages. Iran accused Iraq of being responsible for the attack.

Although Iranian government leaders praised the British government and its commandos for rescuing most of the hostages, some Tehran newspapers have said Britain tacitly approved the embassy seizure in hopes of gaining freedom for the 53 American hostages in Iran.

The militants who seized the U.S. Embassy in Tehran Nov. 4 said the "martyrdom" of Lavasani and Samadzadeh "foiled the conspiracy hatched by the world-devouring U.S.A."

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

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) - So-viet military might is "ominous" and approaching a dangerous level of superiority, the chairman of the North

Among those attending was U.S. Defense Secretary Harold Brown. Edmund S. Muskie, making his first foreign trip as secretary of state, will participate in a joint defense-foreign ministers' meeting on Wednesday.

Zeiner-Gundersen said that since 1970, the members of the Warsaw Pact have increased their manpower by 20 percent, to about 225 active divisions.

"This increase in itself gives some cause for concern, but in combination with a constant flow of new equipment, all of which reflects extraordinary progress in advanced technology, the improved capacity to make war and to use military power to achieve the stated aims of the Soviet

Union could be described as ominous," Zeiner-Gundersen said. He said that in 10 years the number

of long range Soviet bloc missile launchers has remained the same, but that with the introduction of multiple warheads, missile strength has increased from 1,300 to 5,000.

"And this number of warheads will continue to grow as more of the new generation of missiles replace older models," he said. He said intermediate and medium

range missiles have been made more mobile and that the number of nuclear powered, missile-firing submarines has tripled to about 70.

Major Soviet warships have increased from 200 to 275, but the important aspect of the naval balance, he said, is the introduction of Kiev class aircraft carriers, tripling to 25 of the number of missile cruisers, one of which is nuclear powered.

"These improvements, coupled with the acquisition of bases in distant, areas have allowed the Soviets to expand their operations into every sea area of the world in which they have an interest," he said. Today's meeting is NATO's first

since the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan last December. Brown warned Monday that because of the Soviet action and the U.S.-Iranian crisis, "a greater part of the increase included in the American defense budget for the next five years will have to be assidn Southwest Asia."

"As a result, the European allies and Japan will have to take on a larger share of the increases in the allied defense effort. This will be necessary in their immediate regions," Brown said in an interview publish by the Rome newspaper Il Tempo.


