Polls open in Illinois

advance as the showdown state, held interested in the delegate selection," its presidential primary election today, with Rep. John B. Anderson there. trying to detour Ronald Reagan's drive toward the Republican nomina tion and President Carter out to derail Sen. Edward M. Kennedy.

The polls opened at 6 a.m. CST for 2.5 million voters expected to turn but on a brisk but sunny day

In Chicago, election officials projected a record turnout of 56 percent of the city's 1.4 million registered voters. In southern Illinois, voting was reported heavy in Williamson County but "awfully-light" in nearby Randolph County.

The stakes were high. 152 votes for the Democratic presidential nomination in a state Kennedy once said would prove Carter's vulnerability to his challenge for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The senator from Massachusetts now says he'll beat the public opinion polls, which show him trailing Carter by a margin of more than 2-to-1, but doesn't claim he can beat the presi-

Republicans were choosing 92 convention delegates.

There are two primaries in each party, one for delegates, one for popu-



Absorbing earlier defeats, Kennedy had said Illinois was the state where he'd turn it around. Now he is saying that he will press the challenge to Carter no matter what the outcome 13 hours of balloting, with as many as here, or in the New York primary one week from today

While Illinois Democrats cast their ballots today. Kennedy campaigned in New York, where he accused the Carter administration of political cynicism in refusing to announce details of its proposed \$14 billion in federal budget cuts until after the New York and Connecticut primaries next Tuesday

Anderson invited the Democrats, and independent voters, to make those ballots Republican, and mark them for him against Reagan. He campaigned until late Monday night, saying "the tide is rising. I've never felt more optimistic about an election

Independents and crossover Democrats enabled Anderson to come close to upsets in the Massachusetts and Vermont primaries, and in Illinois those voters can also cast GOP ballots

The so-called windfall profits tax seems destined for a long life, but to the detriment of the independent oil producers, consumers and nation, said independent Midland oilman A.W. "Al" Dillard. He spent last week in the nation's capital trying to persuade senators to kill the measure.

"This tax (if passed) will never be removed from this industry," said a pessimistic Dillard, president of the 1,500-member Permian Basin Petroleum Association.

"I'm very pessimistic; the tax will pass. I just don't think there are enough votes in the Senate to defeat

The bill, designed to generate revenue and to penalize the major and independent oil companies for making what the government deems "excess profits," has passed the House of Representatives. It is being readied for a Senate vote.

Dillard was among 15 Midland independent oil operators and some 500 independents from several oil-producing states participating in an "Oil Field Roundup" in Washington, D.C., sponsored by the Energy Consumers and Producers Association of Oklahoma and the Permian Basin Petroleum Association

Their aim was to get Congress to reinstate the 1,000-a-barrel exemption into the bill, to exempt independent operators and royalty owners from the bill, and to get the bill killed.

Oklahoma Senator Henry Bellmon, one of the movers behind the Oil Field Roundup, was joined in the effort by Texas Senators Lloyd Bentsen Jr. and John Tower

Oilmen from Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Pennsylvania, Tennessee. Kansas and Indiana tried their lobby ing powers in telling the senators the oilman's side of the windfalls profits

Oilmen, too, tried to get the attention of the nation's media by bringing rigs and other oil field equipment to the capital.

The independents argue that they must have additional revenue to explore for and produce more oil and

gas for the nation. They, and ultimately the paying consumer, will be hurt by the tax. The major oil companies will be the least hurt, Dillard

'They (congressmen and senators) seem to forget the fact that we need domestic production.

They are out to punish the major oil companies. They are not basically going to hurt the major oil companies," which Dillard said, "can take their money overseas" and invest it.

Congress, in making the majors "the scapegoat," are "upsetting the little guys (independents)" and will be heavily taxing the royalty

Dillard views the proposed tax as an "excise tax" and not a tax on profits.

"And the politicians have their eye on a lot of 'free' money...to pass around to their constituents and to buy votes with," Dillard said.

This thing was designed as a tax revenue measure, and that's all it is,"

Clayton faces Federal jury again today

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas House Speaker Billy Clayton returned today for a second round of questioning before a federal grand jury investigating an alleged insurance kickback scheme

Clayton spent six hours before the panel Monday

A central figure in the FBI Brilab - bribery labor - investigation, Clayton has acknowledged he accepted \$5,000 in \$100 bills from labor leader L.G. Moore in the presence of FBI informant Joseph Hauser.

One of Clayton's lawyers, Charles Burton, said today the \$5,000 received from Moore has now been turned over to the grand jury. The speaker has insisted the money was a campaign contribution and planned to return it to Moore

The federal panel, along with Clayton, listened to at least three tapes of conversations involving the speaker, Moore and Hauser. Minton said said the tapes were played before the grand jury with the House

speaker listening, then answering questions. One tape involved a telephone conversation Jan. 15 of this year between

Moore and Clayton. Another was made during a Nov. 8 meeting in Austin when Clayton, Moore and Hauser discussed the state employees \$70 million insurance policy

Minton said his client was answering all questions and had not at anytime

taken the Fifth Amendment. "And the grand jury is asking him about everything."

Asked if there was a possible criminal case against Clayton, Minton answered, "Hell no.

The federal grand jury began its probe in February and questioned 14 witnesses, including several labor leaders and three Houston city council-

Moore, the regional director for the Operating Engineers International Union, was subpoenaed but his appearance was delayed by several legal actions. Sources now say Moore may not be called because the grand jury has enough information in the tape recordings.

The Britab undercover operation began in Louisiana and spread to Texas. Documents filed in a Los Angeles federal court indicate government agents posed for 10 months as insurance agents and paid thousands of dollars in bribes in an investigation they called Brilab for Bribery-Labor.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The export to the Soviet Union of a wide range of said at the time that a study of American exports to Russia would be industrial knowledge would be limited under a new Carter administration conducted by the White House and the Departments of Defense, Commerce

That study is finished and will result in the newer, more stringent guidelines, according to the source, who asked not to be identified. In the wake of the January guidelines, more than 400 licenses permit-

ting American exports to the Soviet Union were suspended along with about 300 license applications that had not yet been processed. Those 700 licenses will now be reviewed anew to see if they meet the

In addition to the American ban on exports, the source said, the United States also will propose that NATO nations and Japan limit their exports to Russia according to the same new restrictions.

Midland College announces new journalism professor



Jim Patten, currently professor of journalism at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, has been appointed by Midland College to assume the post of Allison Professor of Journalism, an endowed professorship at the two-year comprehensive community college.

The appointment was to be made today during a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Midland College. It becomes effective with the 1980 fall

"The selection committee closely examined the backgrounds of more than 130 applicants for this outstanding position and unanimously selected Jim Patten as the person most qualified to fill this position," commented Dr. Al G. Langford, Midland College president, in recommending the appointment. "He has a unique blend of practical experience and distinguished teaching experience in one of the finest journalism schools in the

An endowment of \$750,000 was made to Midland College in September, 1979, by Mrs. Helon Y. Allison of Midland to establish the Allison Chair of Journalism. The gift was made in memory of James N. Allison Sr. and James N. Allison Jr., late publishers of The Midland Reporter-Telegram and the Plainview Herald. James N. Allison, husband of Helon Y. Allison, died in 1975, and James N. Allison Jr. died in 1978.

"MRS. ALLISON CONCURS that Jim Patten is the ideal person for the Allison Chair of Journalism. We feel he can create an excellent journalism department at Midland College, training young people as skilled journalists who will be responsible and responsive to the community they serve," Dr. Langford said. Notified of his selection, Patten

said, "This appointment represents

an honor and a challenge. I intend to try very hard to live up to both.

'I found Midland, the town, a pleasant, bright and shiny place. I am looking forward to living there and contributing to it. I found Midland, the college, delightful. Everyone there seems excited about Midland College. I think the school is going places and I am thrilled to be part of

"We're going places in journalism at Midland College. I don't intend for our journalism department to take a back seat to any similar department in the country. There's no reason why we can't be number one," Patter declared.

A NATIVE OF Fremont, Neb., the 44-year-old Patten began his journalism career in 1955 as a reporter for the Dawson County (Neb.) Herald. He

Playboy photog gets only one threat at Baylor WACO (AP) - Playboy photographer David Chan has come to Waco with an armed guard and an offer to help any Baylor University student expelled for posing for the maga-

But despite a furor which resulted in the firing of student newspaper editors, the only threat so far has been a telephone call, says Playboy spokesman Dan Sheridan.

We did not come here to challenge anyone, to fight anyone or to antagonize anyone. David just wants to do his job," Sheridan said Monday, adding that the guard, who packs a .45-caliber pistol, is "more than adequate at the moment to take care of anything that will happen.'

Chan said he had been planning to bring the guard since Playboy's plans to photograph coeds - in the buff and otherwise — created an uproar at the Southern Baptist university.

Baylor President Abner McCall threatened to expel any student who posed for the pictoral essay, "Girls of the Southwest Conference." When the student newspaper published an editorial advocating free choice in the matter, McCall imposed editorial guidelines and three editors of The Lariat were fired when they protest-

A journalism professor, Don Williams, resigned in support of the students. The publications board plans to meet this week to name new editors but, in the meantime, The Lariat has suspended publication

Baylor is the last of the nine SWC schools Chan has visited for the feature, planned for September's issue. Chan said he photographed one of

four applicants Monday and had received numerous calls for appointments. He said he expected a larger turnout later in the week.

Playboy will offer to help any student who is kicked out as a result of the sessions, Sheridan said.

"We'd provide legal counsel and we'd try to assist them in getting to another university," he said. Sheridan offered to meet with McCall in the matter.

What I'm suggesting is that it's silly and unnecessary that students should get hurt by the university," Sheridan said. "I certainly respect Dr. McCall. I respect his religious convictions. And I think there ought to be a way for reasonable people to sit down and find some common sense

solution so the kids won't get hurt." McCall said he had not heard from Playboy and he had "nothing to meet with them about."



Franco aide not seriously hurt in blast

MADRID, Spain (AP) - A top aide to the late dictator Francisco Franco narrowly escaped an assassination attempt today when a bomb exploded a short distance from him outside his downtown Madrid home. His escort

Police said the bomb, which had been placed under the seat of a motorbike, exploded about 10 yards from Gen. Fernando Esquivias, a supply officer and former aide-de-camp to Franco, as he walked toward his car. His driver and one of his aides also escaped serious injury.

But police said Esquivias' armed escort, Pvt. Jose Ramirez, 19, who was walking a few yards ahead of the general and was closer to the motorbike, was killed instantly. He was the 30th person to die as a result of terrorism in Spain so far this year.

As the argument became more heated, one of them shot Morgan with a 22-caliber rifle

Officers are searching for two men, one who wore a sack with eyeslits in it over his head, according to witnesses. The second man is black, 17 to 20 years of age, about 5 feet 10 inches tall and 175 pounds

Police know the two are about the same build and one was wearing a

orders banning further walkouts. We're just hanging by a thread, said Deputy Chief Louis Hansen. 'Fire protection is almost nil. There's token protection, but that's all."

Police Chief Norman Caron said that before firefighters abandoned their stations, the fire equipment was sabotaged. Police said tires were slashed, gas tanks were contaminated, rags were stuffed into pumps and wiring was ripped out. He called the sabotage "lawlessness of the highest

Police Sgt. James Treece said six confirmed cases of arson had occurred during the 12-hour period after the walkout began, but he said it was not known if the arson was related to the strike. He noted that the number of arsons was "noticeably higher" than the daily average of less than two in the city

Striking firefighters carried picket signs outside a stationhouse Monday night while a vacant three-story apartment building burned to the

ground across the street. Treece said 33 fires - six of them confirmed arson - were reported since the walkout. He said the arson occurred in a tavern, four homes and

one auto, all of them vacant. No civilians were injured in the spate of fires.



BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — John Henry Phelan IV seemed destined to follow in his great-grandfather's footsteps when he was named the nation's best Junior Achievement salesman of 1977.

But Monday, the 19-year-old descendant of oil pioneer Henry Phelan Sr. filed for bankruptcy in federal court, describing himself as a victim of

Two years ago, at 17, Phelan was chosen as the best salesman of 200,000 high school students in Junior Achievement programs. Junior Achievement groups, sponsored by companies across the nation, let teen-agers learn about business by forming their own companies and marketing products.

"I'm an excellent salesman," he said Monday, adding he does a "good job" selling for J.C. Penney Co., Inc., in Beaumont.

His salesmanship award, however, may have brought him to the attention of credit companies.

Phelan said his locally famous name may have helped him obtain loans from local banks, but that credit card companies with no reason to be familiar with his name kept raising his credit limit. "So many people were so willing to give me credit so easily," he

His great-grandfather made his fortune in oil in the East Texas

'I'm glad there is a legal way out of it, but it's been pure hell." Phelan said collection agencies constantly harrassed him, and that they even called his mother and threatened to ruin her credit and sue her. He lives with his mother and grandmother in Beaumont.



Two-way responsibility

The jury's in and Ford Motor Co. has been acquitted in the landmark criminal trial centering on the safety of its sub-compact, the Pinto.

But the acquittal does not relieve Ford Motor Co. - or any product manufacturer — of the moral responsibility of producing the safest product possible.

The company was indicted in the August 1978, deaths of three teenage girls who perished when their 1973 Pinto burst into flames in Indiana after being struck from behind by a van.

Prosecutors in the case had argued that Ford knew of dangerous defects in the Pinto's fuel system which made an explosion likely in rear-end accidents, such as the one in which the girls died. But, they said, the company put profit above human life and sold the cars anyway

The company, on the other hand, had argued that the force of the impact rather than any defect caused the gasoline tank to explode.

It was a difficult, drawn-out case. The trial itself lasted 10 weeks and the jury deliberated four days before reaching its ver-

Ford Chairman Philip Caldwell probably best summed up the case when, following the announcement of the verdict, he said, "There must be a responsibility on the part of the people who use products as well as people who design them."

It has to work both ways. Certainly companies must strive to produce and distribute products that can safely be used within the marketplace.

The public, on the other hand, has a responsibility to be as cautious as possible when selecting and purchasing an automobile or any product which, potentially, can prove dangerous, even lethal,

According to news accounts, three months prior to the fatal accident Ford had recalled 1.5 million 1971-76 Pintos and Mercury Bobcats when government tests indicated the cars could leak fuel in rear-end collisions, posing a risk of fire.

The mother of two of the victims testified during the trial her family did not receive a recall notice until six months after the crash.

The Pinto jury's verdict does not relieve companies of the responsibility to make and distribute safe products. There is a moral responsibility that cannot be overlooked.

But there is little doubt that an informed public can better guard itself against potential hazards than can either companies or government or any combination

In effect, the jury's verdict leaves intact the marketplace caveat of "let the buyer beware." It did, however, add the notation that companies still can be held accountable if they abuse their place in American society through neglect or intentional error.



WASHINGTON MERRY-GO-ROUND Intelligence community watching Cuba

WASHINGTON — The uproar over the Soviet "combat brigade" in Cuba last fall has been supplanted in the headlines by Iran and Afghanistan, but the short-lived Cuban crisis brought a dramatic reordering of priorities in the U.S. intelligence com-

Cuba has now replaced Red China as the target of our second most intensive intelligence efforts - second only to the Soviet Union. From the status of "low priority attention," the Marxist-ruled island 90 miles off the Florida coast has risen in the intelligence community's estimation as an area worthy of concentrated and massive surveillance.

"If a rabbit moves on that place, we know about it." So a Central Intelligence Agency source described the new emphasis on Cuba to my associate Dale Van Atta. While this sounds like hyperbole, it's not all that farfetched: The satellites that have been committed to spying on Cuba since the Soviet brigade fiasco can take clear pictures of a one-foot object from 100 miles up in the strato-

The administration is clearly not going to be caught napping on Cuban developments again. Briefings by the CIA are made on an almost everyday basis. As a CIA source put it, "Cuba gets an intelligence enema every three days.'

A series of "Top Secret Umbra" reports from the summer of 1979 to February 1980 shows the detail with which U.S. intelligence agencies have been alerting the administration to the dangers from Russia's Caribbean colony. Much of the information focuses on Cienfuegos, on the southern coast of Cuba, where Fidel Castro has been modernizing a key naval and air

What alarms our military experts is that present defenses against bomber raids are aimed toward the north (against Soviet missiles coming over the North Pole) and on each seacoast (against submarine-launched missiles), leaving the nation's southeastern defenses relatively naked.

- Spy satellites have spotted a suspicious-looking building at Punta Movida, near Cienfuegos. It closely resembles the kind of structure used in Eastern Europe for storage and maintenance of nuclear missiles. Punta Movida is also being connected to Cienfuegos by a railroad, which raises the possibility that nuclear submarines could be serviced at the huge

Some intelligence analysts, however, have cautioned that everything turned up by the spies-in-the-sky is consistent with a nuclear power plant the Cubans are building with Soviet help in the Cienfuegos area. And these experts note that there have been "no indications that Havana has plans for nuclear weapons."

"Whenever someone says that sport lies outside the framework of political relations, we feel their remark is not a serious one.

The Moscow Olympics are as much political as they are athletic. The free world should, at long last, stop paying tribute to Soviet oppression — with a boycott and a world competition in a more wholesome locale. And, if there is no other answer to Morris-Killanin's ultimatum of "Moscow or nowhere," the response should be a loud "nowhere."

Do voters know where John Anderson really stands?

PEORIA, Ill. - As word arrived that newspaper polls had made him the Republican favorite in the Illinois presidential primary, Rep. John Anderson won cheers from Bradley University students by seeming to abandon 15 years of staunch support for nuclear power.

Having just promised to answer questions "just as frankly and as honestly as I can," Anderson was greeted by the first questioner here inquiring about his position on nuclear power. Congressional colleagues had been predicting Anderson's pronuke position ultimately would erode his feverish campus constituency. They did not reckon with Anderson's adroitness on the campaign stump.

He accused the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) of failing to meet safety recommendations, adding that until it did, the government should 'not grant new operating licenses. Cheers and applause. Criticizing President Carter's proposals for nuclear waste treatment, he declared: "I don't think that's good enough. If you can't do (better), then I don't think we should expand nuclear power." More cheers and applause. Nobody present would have doubted his anti-nuke credentials.

That is part of the pattern that moved Anderson from pathetic obscurity to darling of the national news media and now into contention as leading alternative to Ronald Reagan. Although depicted by admiring news accounts as the only candidate of principle, he tells audiences (most-



ly on college campuses) only what they want to hear and seeks confrontation only with his enemies. That is not quite St. John

While deftly fogging his littleknown nuclear past, Anderson plays to his collegiate audiences by attacking what he calls Carter's intention to "ultimately" draft men to "protect an (oil) interest that is vital" and pushing the 50-cents-a-gallon gasoline tax that is remarkably popular on campus ("I love it, just love it," enthused an Anderson student booster

at the College of Lake County). In fact, his celebrated clashes with foes sketch less a profile in courage than a profile in political shrewdness, featured by his face-down of the gun lobby in New Hampshire. There has been more of the same in Illinois. He boosted the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) in Alton, home of anti-ERA crusader Phyllis Shlafly. When rightto-life pickets showed up outside Wheaton College, he opened his speech by proclaiming that "I square it (support of abortion rights) with my own Christian conscience." The audiences loved him.

This technique moved New England liberal voters out of Democratic primaries to support Republican Anderson. The difference in Illinois is that in addition, bona fide Republicans are turning to Anderson as the alternative to Reagan.

The process was explained to us by one state legislator, running as an uncommitted national convention delegate who attended one Anderson speech. "All this business about ERA and abortion is hurting John," he said. "But when he gives conservative speeches like today about the balanced budget, he makes it easier for moderates to support him.'

Whatever the impression given, however, Anderson is farther from the Republican main line on economic issues than on social questions. Even more abruptly than his softening on nuclear power, he has now totally abandoned his previous highly vocal support of broad-based tax reduction the principle economic strategy of

his party. Anderson's ravaging of Republican principles while sounding conservative is typified by his proposed budget revision, described in newspaper accounts as an example of Anderson the economic conservative. Actually, its proposed spending cuts of \$11.3 billion are relatively insignificant and do not greatly disturb social welfare pro-

Anderson's adjustments on the revenue side are startling: \$10.7 billion in revenue increases over and above the Carter budget's \$49 billion in new taxes (which Anderson never mentions). Anderson's program even includes a one-year 5 percent surcharge

on corporate profits.

Anderson would also slightly reduce the Carter defense budget that other Republican presidential contenders consider deficient. After disposing of the anti-abortion hecklers at Wheaton, he told the audience he would feel more comfortable with Sen. Edward M. Kennedy as president than with Ronald Reagan, and denounced Reagan's "total dependence on arms.

A candidate who comes over as high-taxation, anti-military, anti-nuclear and pro-abortion is understandably congenial to normal Democratic voters who see him as more liberal than Jimmy Carter and more moral than Teddy Kennedy. That genuine Illinois Republicans have now made him the front-runner in their own party primary suggests that either they don't know what John Anderson stands for or in fact really stand for nothing themselves.





Aspirin should be avoided by some

Dear Dr. Solomon: Since aspirin is sold without a prescription, I figure it. must be harmless. My mother-in-law disagrees and says aspirin is dangerous for some people to take. Is this so?

Dear Marge: Although aspirin is our most widely used drug, it is not completely inocuous for everyone at all times. Some individuals are sensitive to aspirin and should be careful

People with stomach ulcers or gout, and those who have experienced episodes of bleeding, should avoid aspirin, as should women who find that it increases their menstrual bleeding. Since alcohol irritates the stomach lining and increases the potential for internal bleeding, aspirin and alcoho should never be mixed. Neither should aspirin be used - except with a physicians approval - for the treatment of fever in a child who may be dehydrated; dehydration sometimes occurs when there is vomiting or diar-

To prevent bleedng problems in both mother and child, pregnant women should avoid the use of aspirin, except under medical supervision, particularly during the last three months of pregnancy. Because aspirin can increase blood loss during an operation, it should not be taken within a week of scheduled surgery without the advice of the doctor.

Finally, there are some people who are simply allergic to the drug. For some of these people, aspirin may

even be life-threatening.

Dear Dr. Solomon: My son recently broke an arm while using a skateboard. Shouldn't dangerous products like this be kept off the market? -

Dear Mrs. N.: The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission has denied a petition recently filed by the Consumer Affairs Committee of the Americans for Democratic Action, which called for a ban on the manufacture and sale of skateboards. The Safety Commission based this decision on statistics show. ing a decline in skateboard injuries from about 140,000 in 1977 to 87,000 in 1978. Reasons for the decline probably include a decreasing popularity of skateboards, the increased use of facilities specifically set aside for skateboarding, which often require the use of special protective equipment, and the effectiveness of safety campaigns by various interested

The Commission noted that injuries associated with skateboards usually result from their misuse, rather from any built-in defect in the product. It concluded that banning their manufacture and sale might encourage a do-it-yourself trend that could lead to more injuries as a result of hazardous equipment.





Carter won't list items to be cut from the budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter has no definitive list of spending cuts in his much-ballyhooed \$13 billion budget-balancing package, congressional sources and administration officials say.

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, D-Mass., said the only list of cuts was "in my pocket," and it was worked out by congressional negotiators.

Gasoline availability and prices both up

Availability of gasoline in Texas during the past month increased dramatically, according to a survey made by the Texas Division of the American Automobile Association. However, prices continued their steady climb. Of 15 service stations checked in the Midland-

Odessa area, the average price of regular gas at a full service station was 116.8 cents per gallon and 112 cents at a self-service place. Premium gas cost 120.7 cents a gallon at full

service and 116.5 for self-service. Unleaded gas listed at 120.2 cents a gallon at full service stations while self-serve had it at 115.6 cents. Full-service diesel was 106.9 cents a gallon. Of the stations surveyed in the area, 53 percent

close at 8 p.m. Monday through Friday, 33 percent close at 6 p.m. on Saturday and 46 percent don't open on Sunday.

According to the survey, gas prices in Texas have increased by an average of 5.5 cents per gallon for all grades. This is less than the 8 cent average increase that occurred between January and February.

The hike, however, still is higher than the rate of increase posted last summer during the gasoline shortage.

Current prices for gasoline in Texas are 115.9 per gallon, regular; 119.7 cents, unleaded; and 120.8 cents, premium at full-service stations. Self-serve operations were listed at 113 cents for regular; 116.9 cents, unleaded; and 117.9, premium.

Diesel fuel has become the least expensive with the average price posted at 110 cents per gallon.

Relatives face assault charges

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (AP) - Six grief-stricken relatives and friends of a man who died at the Jersey City Medical Center face a variety of charges stemming from a wild melee in the intensive care unit at the hospital, according to

Only minor damage was reported at the hospital following the disturbance in which 20 persons allegedly attacked doctors, nurses and police

officers, authorities said. Six persons, including a doctor and a nurse who were not identified, were injured.

The rampage began at 7:30 p.m. Saturday when Samih Haddad, 42, of Jersey City, was pronounced dead, and doctors informed his family, authorities said.

The mourners, believed to be of Jordanian extraction, hurled obscenities at a doctor and charged him with killing Haddad, witnesses said. When hospital security officers arrived, bottles were thrown at them and city police were called, authorities said.

Haddad was admitted to the hospital Jan. 25, complaining of headaches, police said. He underwent brain surgery but died of an apparent heart attack, police said. Hospital officials

declined to discuss medical details of the case.
"It was crazy," said a security guard who asked not to be identified. "All of a sudden these people went nuts and were running all around the place, shouting and destroying equipment."

Police officers James O'Brien, Joseph Lardino and Robert Duane were treated for minor injuries at the hospital as were the unidentified doctor and nurse, police said.

Issa Haddad, 20, the son of the deceased man, was arrested and charged with aggravated assault. Police said he also was treated for injuries sustained during the fight. 'The damage was minor and no patients were

evacuated from the unit," said Joseph F. Too-mey, executive director of the hospital. "The patient had a large family who loved him. Unfortunately, when he expired, they over-reacted," Toomey said. "Often when a patient dies, the family has a certain amount of grief and rage. We often have to calm them down. This isn't unusual. But this situation went be-



Noted psycologist Fromm dies

LOCARNO, Switzerland (AP) -Erich Fromm, the eminent Germanborn American authority on psychology, died at his home in suburban Muralto today of heart failure, family sources said. He would have been 80 on Sunday.

Fromm was rated as one of the world's leading figures in the psychoanalytic movement, and was an oftcited proponent of "alternative" lifestyles. Among his pioneering works were "Pschoanalysis and Religion," "Healthy Society" and "The Art of Loving.

Fromm felt Western man was a product of his culture and that he became estranged from himself in industrial society. His key concern was how man could come to terms with his isolation, insignificance and doubt about the meaning of life.

Fromm was a vociferous critic of what he felt were radical "vulgarized" interprerpretations of Sigmund Freud's theory of repression of conflicts into the subconscious mind

as being at the root of psychoneurotic disorders. These radicals called for abolition of all moral-religious barriers limiting the professed freedom of the "principle of lust." settled in Muralto, outside Lucarno, Fromm held that psychoanalysts,

like theologians, should waken the in the late 1960s, and is survived by voice of the conscience," appeal to a patient's morality. He was saddened at what he felt was a process of self-alienation in Western culture, "indifference toward oneself and toward others" and recommended a return to a simpler lifestyle.

He sympathized with "humanitarian" forms of religion as expressed in the teachings of Jesus and Buddha and in Jewish and Christian mystics, but opposed what he viewed as "authoritarian" forms of religion, citing Lutheran and Calvinist Protestant-

A native of Frankfurt, Fromm emigrated to the United States when Adolf Hitler launched his anti-Jewish campaign following the 1933 Nazi takeover in Germany.

FBI probe finds Medicare fraud

LOS ANGELES (AP) - An FBI undercover investigation of alleged Medicare and Medicaid fraud has implicated as many as 50 doctors and several medical laboratories in the Los Angeles area, according to NBC

FBI agents posing as medical clinic representatives and as salesmen for a medical laboratory discovered some doctors routinely asked for kickbacks before signing contracts with labs, NBC reported Monday.

Returns from Friday's voting in Tehran showed Bani-Sadr's followers leading in seven of the capital's 30 parliamentary districts and the Islamic Republican Party leading in none. But of the 79 districts declared won outside Tehran, the IRP and its allies took 34 and Bani-Sadr's candidates only 16.

Independent candidates had won 21 seats so far and may hold the balance of power in the 270-Parliament, called the Majlis. Splinter and ethnic parties took the other eight seats decided.

The IRP claimed the lead in about half the 75 districts where vote counting was over but no one attained the majority necessary for election. Those seats will be decided by a runoff April 4 between the two top can-

The votes were still being counted in the other 116 districts.

# Virginia, Minnesota advance to NIT championship

### Las Vegas, Illinois are victims

NEW YORK (AP) - Ralph Samp- 13 minutes left in the game. son, probably the most sought-after high school basketball player since Wilt Chamberlain, says he is not ready to forego his final three years of college ball for the pros.

The 7-foot-4, 210-pound Sampson led the Virginia Cavaliers into the final of the National Invitation Tournament, scoring 26 points, grabbing 15 rebounds and blocking four shots Monday night in a 90-71 victory over Nevada-Las Vegas.

Sampson has averaged 14.6 points and 11 rebounds with the Cavaliers this season, and he has blocked 155 shots in 33 games. His statistics have stirred interest in the front office of the Boston Celtics, who would like him to go hardship and turn pro.

"I haven't established anything about turning pro yet," said the 19-year-old from Harrisonburg, Va. "I know I'm not physically ready, and I'm probably not all the way emotionally ready for the pros."

WITH VIRGINIA tied 35-35 at the half with Nevada-Las Vegas in the NIT semifinals, Sampson led a surge that gave Virginia a 10-point lead. Sampson scored nine points as the Cavaliers outscored the Runnin' Rebels 20-10 and took a 55-45 lead with

Jeff Lamp, a 6-6 swingman, had seven points in the surge, and wound up with game honors at 30 points. Michael Burns led Nevada-Las Vegas with 20 points.

"We work well together," Sampson said of he and Lamp. "We move well. He gets the ball to me when I need it, and I get it to him when he needs it. "We had to get out and establish a lead in the second half," Sampson

With the victory, Virginia, 23-10, earned the right to face Minnesota, 21-10, in the NIT final Wednesday night. Minnesota edged Illinois 65-63 in the first game of the semis. Illinois, 21-13, and Nevada-Las Vegas, 23-8, will meet in the consolation game

preceding Wednesday night's final.

ANOTHER BIG freshman, 7-2 reserve center Randy Breuer, was the key to Minnesota's victory. Breuer scored 24 points and grabbed nine rebounds as the Gophers held on to beat Illinois. Darryl Mitchell hit two free throws with 14 seconds remaining to provide Minnesota with it's final margin.

"We watched the Minnesota game real close," Cavaliers Coach Terry Holland said. "I marked down the

score when Breuer came into the game. I think it was 14-8 (in favor of Illinois). Even when he didn't get the rebound, he had a hand on it.'

When Breuer came off the bench, Gophers Coach Jim Dutcher was able to move his top scorer, 6-11 Kevin McHale, to forward. That gave Minnesota plenty of height on the front line with the other forward, Gary Holmes, going 6-10.

"Their height will present some problems for us," Holland said. Asked if he would compare Minnesota with big and burly Atlantic Coast Conference foe Clemson, Holland said: "Minnesota looked more like the Russians tonight."

Breuer scored 13 consecutive points for Minnesota over a span of six minutes in the second half, all from the inside and the foul line, as the Gophers battled to take a four-point lead, 48-44, with nearly 13 minutes

Minnesota never led by more than three after that, and even trailed 51-50 once on a bucket by Illinois' Reno Gray with 9: 20 left.

"I think some of our big people got tired toward the end," Dutcher said. "Breuer and McHale weren't moving

# Cards hope to overcome NCAA tournament jinx

Denny Crum and Larry Brown feel they owe something to UCLA - but each may want to repay the debt differently.

Crum has twice taken his University of Louisville basketball team to the NCAA Final Four. And twice his Cardinals have had dreams of a national championship shattered by UCLA's

Crum took his first Louisville team to the 1972 NCAA semifinals, but UCLA, led by Bill Walton, drubbed the Cardinals 96-77 on the way to the championship. And in 1975, it was UCLA again derailing Louisville with a 75-74 overtime decision in the semi-

IN EACH OF those games, Crum faced John Wooden, who coached Crum at UCLA in the 1950s and later made him a UCLA assistant.

But things are different this year. And Crum is hoping this third trip to the finals, in Indianapolis, may be the charm that carries second-ranked Louisville, 31-3, to its first-ever na-

Louisville tangles with Iowa, 23-8, in Saturday's semifinals, with the winner advancing to Monday's finals against the winner of Saturday's other semifinal matching Purdue (22-

9) and UCLA (21-9). 'If anybody's going to beat us now, they're going to have to play awfully ' well," Crum said.

Something that a very indebted Larry Brown has UCLA doing.

"I was kinda down and out when they offered me the job here," said Brown, the first-year UCLA coach whose surprising Bruins have made it to the championship round of the NCAA playoffs. "I thought to myself that if a school like UCLA wants me, I must be able to coach basketball."

**BROWN QUIT AS Denver Nuggets'** coach in February of last year although he guided Denver to four National Basketball Association division titles in as many seasons.

'When I arrived here and saw the kids and got caught up in everything, I knew college coaching was for

The matching of Brown and UCLA was not a "lived happily ever after" story. He and his Bruins had some nant basketball team during the past two decades slipped to 8-6 at one point in the season

UCLA wound up fourth in the Pacific-10 — the first time the Bruins failed to win the league title in 14 years and was doubtful for inclusion in the NCAA playoffs.

16 NCAA crowns, was invited to the tournament and defeated Old Dominion, top-ranked DePaul, 10th-rated Ohio State and then Clemson to take the NCAA West Regional title.

But UCLA, winner of 10 of the last

AN 11TH NCAA title would make it easier next season, and possibly convince everybody that Brown was meant for coaching a college team.

Mask-maker Higgins keeps hockey goalies smiling By JON O'HAIRE Special to Newsday

For the last two decades Ernie Higgins has been protecting the faces of some of the most valuable goalies in the National Hockey League. Operating out of a small office in Norwood, Mass., Higgins, a former plumber who now does prescription orthopedic work, supplies his hockey clients with custom-molded, fiberblass face-

However, Higgins' list of customers is not exclusively made up of the several dozen (13 active) NHL goalies who have worn his masks. During the last 18 years Higgins has made almost 3,000 masks for goalies ranging upward from the "mites" level - and for several women as well.

Higgins' service, for which he currently charges \$255 per mask, is not unique, but it is rare. Among the handful of others who make goalies masks are Greg Harrison of Toronto and John Brown of Collingwood, On-

When Higgins started work on his first mask, he had no intention of making a career of the project. In 1961 he was a concerned hockey fan with a son playing goalie. Higgins was so disturbed by the facial protection then available that he set out to make

IN ALL THE world of sports few positions have more danger associated with them than the hockey goaltender. Yet it was not until Jacques Plante teamed up with fiberglass salesman Bill Burchmore in 1958 that a real attempt was made at a functional facemask. Since Plante and Burchmore's first effort, great progress has been made in the refinement of the mask.

Though his son never made the professional ranks, the Higgins mask did. The finished product caught the attention of several goalies, but before Higgins would make other masks, he had to assure himself he was producing the safest one possible. He studied medical textbooks, looking this day, he continues to look for ways to improve the mask.

The Higgins mask is custom-molded to the goalie's face. A series of plaster molds are taken of the player's face, resulting in a final mold that is an exact replica of the face. The final mold is then shaped to form smooth contours. When the mask is completed, these contours will dis-

perse, rather than absorb, the shock of the puck. Finally, the inside of the mask is padded with foam rubber, which not only cushions the blow, but also makes for a closer, more comfortable fit.

Since Plante's experiment most goalies have opted for the fiberglass masks. However, with the coming of Vladislav Tretiak and the Soviet national team to North America in 1972.

### Unknowns contribute to Atlanta win streak

TORONTO (AP) - When teams get hot, they put streaks together from the unlikeliest of sources.

The Atlanta Flames are hot right now, having lost but one game in their last nine. Paul Henderson and Pat Riggin might not be two names expected to be linked with the Flames' newfound success, but Monday night they were the leaders in a 5-1 victory over a hapless Toronto Maple Leaf

Henderson, a one-time member of the Leafs, has saved his shooting eye for his old club. The left winger, 37, has scored six goals in 21 National Hockey League games this season. Four of those goals have been against Toronto, including two Monday.

"When I was up earlier in the season, I enjoyed it more than I thought I would," Henderson said. "So, when they brought me up again and asked me to play for the remaining 25 games of the season, I said sure because I've never won a Stanley Cup

and I'd like to give it another shot. "I didn't know what to expect tonight," he said. "But our line (Willi Plett and Garry Unger) did get a lot of ice time. We ended up getting four goals and it makes you feel a part of the team.

"I was hustling to get back in the net and I fell to my knees," Riggin explained. "I didn't mean to go down. I don't know whether I tripped or what but that gave him (Kaszycki) time to put it in."

PISCATAWAY, N.J. (AP) - Larry Bird doesn't expect everything to go Boston's way from the start of every game, but the Celtics' star rookie believes that sooner or later things will fall into place.

"Sometimes it takes the first period or more for us to get going, but once we get into it and get the ball moving and get running, things really start to flow," Bird said.

### Pemex now one of world's biggest crude oil companies By VICENTE MORALES

MEXICO CITY (AP) - When President Lazaro Cardenas nationalized foreign oil holdings in Mexico 42 years ago today, many predicted that the Mexican oil industry would collapse

Today Petroleos Mexicanos, the government monopoly known as Pemex, is one of the world's biggest oil companies, employing more than

#### **ENERGY** OIL & GAS

100,000 workers, producing 2 million barrels of crude oil daily and with a yearly income of \$10 billion.

Pemex's exploration programs have located proven reserves of more than 30 billion barrels of crude oil with potential reserves estimated at more than 130 billion barrels, plus half as much natural gas.

Pemex's chairman, engineer Jorge Diaz Serrano, estimates that more than two-thirds of Mexico and the 200-mile offshore belt it claims off both coasts is potential oil-bearing territory. He says only 10 percent has been explored.

"It took a lot of work and sacrifice but we have demonstrated we can administer and develop the oil industry," said Gabriel Lezama, a retired Pemex worker.

Oil and tar were oozing out of Mexican soil before the Spaniards landed in the 16th century. The Aztecs, the Teotihuacanos and other native tribes used it to fuel their pyres and

The Spaniards collected tar balls from the Gulf of Mexico beaches to caulk their ships and weatherproof

Dictator Porfirio Diaz granted the first oil concessions in 1901 to Edward L. Doheny, an American, and Weetman Pearson, a Briton. By the early 1920s, 15 American, British and Dutch oil companies were operating in the country. They included the Sinclair-Pierce Oil Co., the Richmond Petroleum Co., Standard Oil of California and the Penn-Mex Fuel Co.

The oil fields stretched along the upper coast of the Gulf of Mexico. A study by Jose Lopez Portillo y Weber,
President Jose Lopez Portillo's father, estimated that by 1921 the companies averaged 4,000 per cent profit

Madero decreed it in 1912. Pemex now pays a 12 per cent income tax, which accounts for 12 per cent of the national government's income.

The 1917 Constitution declared petroleum the patrimony of the nation. But it was only after a decade of growing labor strife in the oil fields that Cardenas, an army general, in a surprise radio announcement on GARZA COUNTY March 18, 1938, ordered the holdings of the oil companies expropriated and the industry nationalized.

Pemex was born by government decree a few days later. Cardenas offered the companies \$615.4 million in compensation for their holdings, to be paid over 30 years. The companies, led by Standard Oil and Royal Dutch Shell, rejected it. They were convinced that Pemex, lacking technical skills and experience, would soon col-

#### Exxon Co. concerned

HOUSTON (AP) - Exxon Co. USA says it will have normal gasoline inventories for higher spring and summer demand but that it is con-cerned about recent federal orders to set 4.5 at 7,490, waiting on completion supply oil to other refiners.

"The assignments are unfair to Exxon customers," the company said in a prepared statement. "Exxon is pursuing administrative and judicial means to stop such government ordered diversions of Exxon's crude oil supplies.'

Exxon placed its inventory at 61 million barrels of crude oil at the end of February, compared with 60 million for January and 54 million a year earlier when the Iranian situation and major equipment breakdowns disrupted supplies.

The companies boycotted Mexico, refusing to sell it petroleum products or cooperate in any way. But Pemex did not go under. After the beginning of World War II, an agreement was reached, and the companies accepted the compensation.

Pemex's bonanza came in the mid-1970s when, with a new generation of Mexican geologists and engineers trained in modern techniques, the company found huge new fields in the southern part of the gulf.

In order to keep down inflation caused by the huge inflow of petrodol-lars, President Lopez Portillo has set a production ceiling of 2.5 million barrels of crude oil a day until the end of 1982. Approximately half the production is for export, with most of that going to the United States.

#### Dealer order shut down

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - A California-based dealer of gasoline options has been ordered to shut down business in Oklahoma until a temporary injunction hearing next month.

The Oklahoma Securities Commission requested the temporary restraining order against Co-Petro. Oklahoma County District Judge Harold C. Theus scheduled an April 21

Co-Petro has advertised in local newspapers offering investment opportunities in gasoline. The ad claimed an investor could buy gasoline at current market value and resell the fuel at the going price at a future date.

The commission alleges Co-Petro is making false statements to potential investors or is omitting important information.

Co-Petro owner Harold Goldstein, of Los Angeles, was sentenced in 1973 to 15 years in federal prison after pleading guilty to three counts of mail fraud. Goldstein was sentenced three years later to serve seven years in federal prison after pleading guilty to securities and mail fraud charges, and conspiracy.

The ad says Co-Petro operates a chain of "coast" gasoline stations around the country but the commission contends there are no gasoline stations by that name.

The firm purported to sell gasoline at the "then quoted" spot price, without saying where the "quoted" price was obtained, making the term anbiguous and misleading, the commission contends.

Co-Petro is charged by the commission with violating state laws governing securities, also
