Bronte man arrested following theft

Investigations are still underway in the case of a car theft from the Town and Country Food Store last Saturday night.

At 12:25 a.m. Sunday morning Coke County authorities received a call from the girl on duty reporting the theft of her car. Apparently a man had entered the store and asked to use her car. He told her he had been shot and needed to go to the hospital. She told the man she would call and get some help. He produced a gun and demanded her car keys. After the man left she called authorities.

The car was intercepted by Highway Patrolman Roy Blair who was working south of Bronte on Hwy. 277. Just south of Orient, Blair stopped and arrested Carlos R.

Ruiz.

Ruiz is 23 years old and is a Bronte resident though he recently lived in San Angelo. Upon the discovery of Ruiz' wound, Trooper Blair called for an ambulance. Ruiz was taken to Shannon Medical Center and underwent surgery for a .25 caliber gunshot wound in the lower abdomen. A .25 caliber semi-automatic pistol was found in the car.

Ruiz contends that a white male shot him at Ruiz' residence at 206 Jackson Street in Bronte, however it was originally thought the wound was self-inflicted.

Ruiz was still in Shannon Medical Center at last report but will be charged with aggravated robbery upon his release.

Saddles reported stolen

Four saddles were reported stolen from a barn 4½ miles east of Robert Lee from the Steve Kelton's place May 2nd. The theft resembled several others re-

ported in the county.

The investigation continues and authorities say it is possible the same person or persons are responsible for the crimes.

Misti Taylor will run in the 800 meters at 12:50. Good Luck Tracksters!

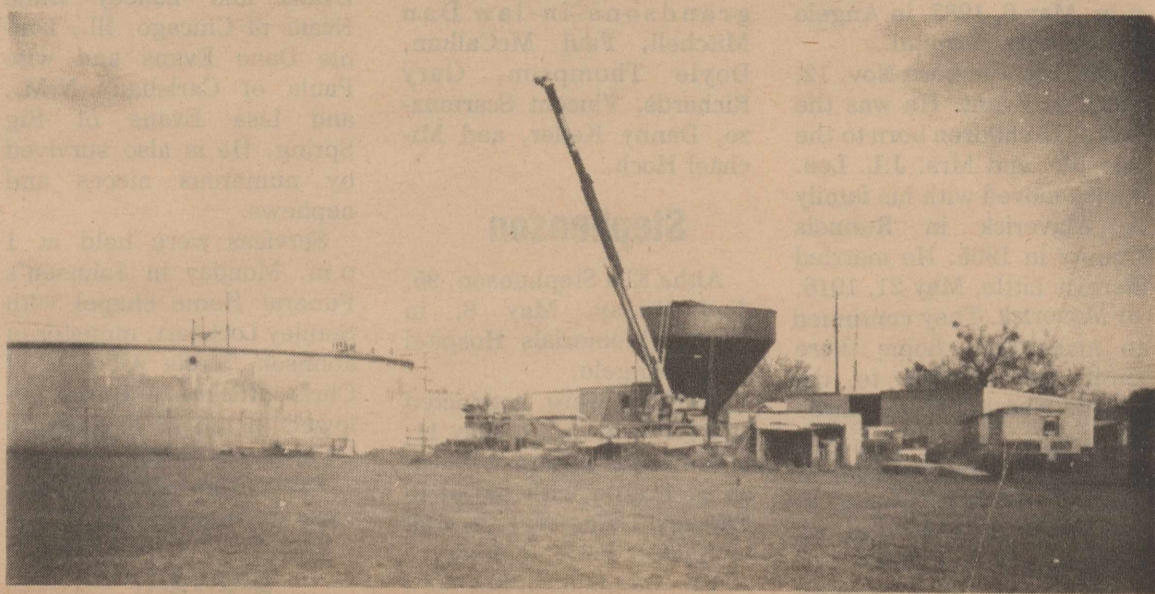
Band Concert

New construction in Bronte has been booming this spring. Gallaway's Grocery Store is still expected to open in mid-summer. Construction on it is fairly well on schedule after some earlier delays due to rain and other bad weather. Larry Rawls has been named as new supervisor over Gallaway's three stores. Rawls will spend much of his time in the Bronte store when it is opened.

Bronte's water plant renovation and expansion is progressing well. The recent installation of the claircone pictured above will replace the old settling tank. Most of the work on the plant will be completed in the next few months, however, total estimated completion time is in October.

Margaret Brunson recently completed six new storage spaces on West Main. The spaces will be for lease.

They sit on a concrete slab with metal walls and roof.

Johnny Elam is building a new office - warehouse building on West Main. He is now operating Johnny's Building Service from his home. His new building will provide office space as well as storage. Much of the material in his building was salvaged from the three old buildings which were torn down to be replaced by Gallaway's Grocery.

RL family left homeless by fire

A Robert Lee family was left homeless by a mobile home fire last Sunday night.

Mr. and Mrs. Dan Martin and their teenage sons, Tony, 18, and RLHS freshman, Jesse, 16, were awakened about 11:15 p.m. by the smoke alarm system. The wall and drapes behind a television set were already blazing when they awoke.

The origin of the fire has not been determined.

The home, located in the 300 block of Cleveland Street in the south part of the city, and its contents were virtually a total loss. The front half

of the trailer was engulfed by flames on the quick response of the Robert Lee volunteer firemen. They kept the fire contained and saved it from spreading to a car and

pick-up with camper parked near-by.

According to friends, the American Red Cross has rented the family a home for one month.

FM 2059 bridge at Silver is reopened by Texas DHT

After several months of construction, the bridge spanning the Colorado River on FM 2059, just southwest of Silver, has been reopened, according to Gene Hirschfeld, Public Affairs Officer with the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

HOW TO AMEND YOUR TAX RETURN

Taxpayers can correct mistakes or omissions they made on tax returns they have already filed by completing and mailing a Form 1040X to Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

The correction can be submitted within three years of the due date (including extensions) of the original return, or two years from the time the tax was paid, whichever is later.

The IRS says that taxpayers can receive copies of Form 1040X by calling the toll-free number 1-800-424-FORM.

The project will not be sponsored by the All Sports

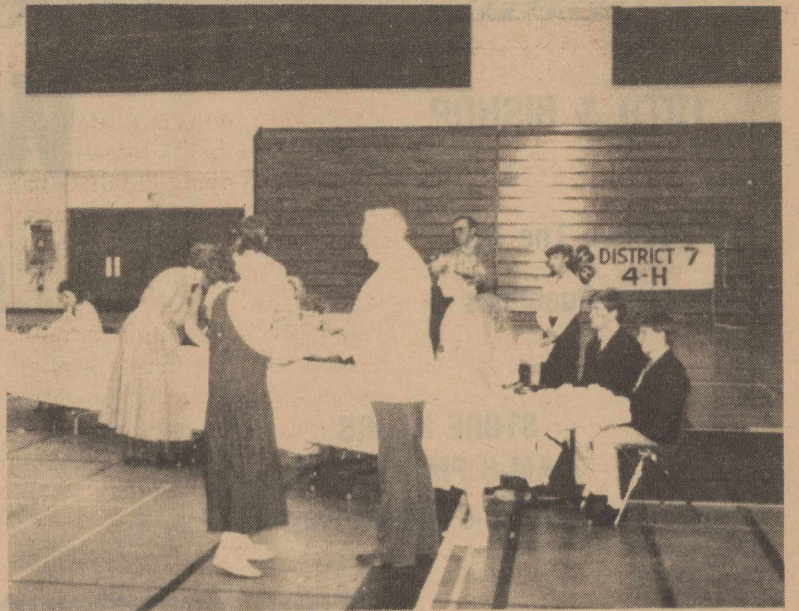
Boosters as reported in last week's paper. An account has been opened at the First National Bank in Bronte for persons wishing to help Todd travel on the tour of Scandanavia.

Getting back to problems you may be having with your mail-- are you receiving unsolicited sexually oriented mail? Did you know that we have a form you can fill out and we send it in. After 30 days from the time your name is added to the Postal Service reference list, any mailer who sends you this kind of material is subject to legal action by the U.S. Government.

Don't just get mad if you are receiving this kind of mail-- do something about it! Forms are available at the post office and it only takes a few minutes to fill out one.

Chili, reunion at Orient

Several thousand dollars must have been raised for services to dying children in the chili cook-off held Saturday, April 25, at Wayne Cason's ranch around the historic spring at Orient. But, a pleasant bonus for one pioneer Bronte family was a mini-reunion during the chili stirring.

Among observers were Anna Mae Eaton Pendergrast, 90, who moved to Bronte from Carbon as a child, and attended Bronte schools before working for the telephone company and marrying. Her daughter, Mrs. Wanda (June) Pendergrast Wright, children's librarian at Weatherford Public Library, who was born in Sterling City in 1929, and lived on one of the Eaton farms near Bronte as a child, was also in attendance; Mrs. Pendergrast's son Tom, retired Army sergeant-major from Maxdale near Killeen, who was born at the home of the late Pink and Henriette Eaton on Easter Sunday of 1932; and her son Sam, born fifteen minutes later, who is an Abilene freelance writer and peripatetic newsman, who has written for numerous media around West Texas, including some of his own.

Joining them from San Angelo was Shift Chief Jack Eaton of the Angelo Fire Department, who was born in Bronte and has spent

more than thirty years as an Angelo fireman. He is the son of the late Jack and Nan Eaton of Bronte and Angelo, and the nephew of Mrs. Pendergrast.

The men all cooked chili for the contest, and Tom's chili was awarded 8th Place. Eaton's maiden chili entry - with instruction by Tom and spices from Sam's commercial Zen Chili "non-mix" - was judged good enough to make the final table. Interestingly enough, both entries were nearly spicy enough to melt horseshoes.

The entry of Sam - Long-time chilaficionado and judge at the World Championship event at Terlingua since 1975 - did not place among winners, apparently because of an excessive edibility quotient, according to observers.

Oh yes, the cook-off was won by Debbie Turner of Angelo, bringing her "points for Terlingua" to 11 of the necessary 12.

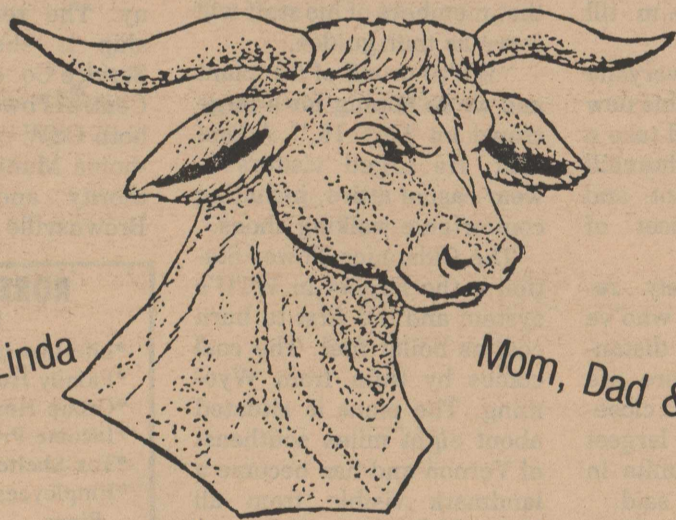

RL FFA holds awards ceremony

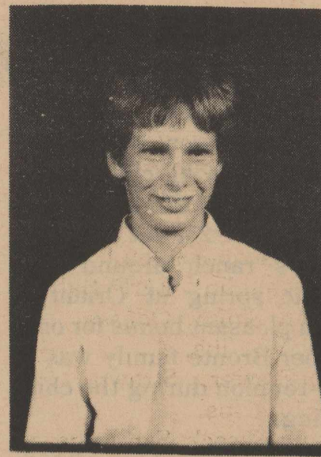

Musical entertainment was provided by Lin Long, chapter reporter, as she sang

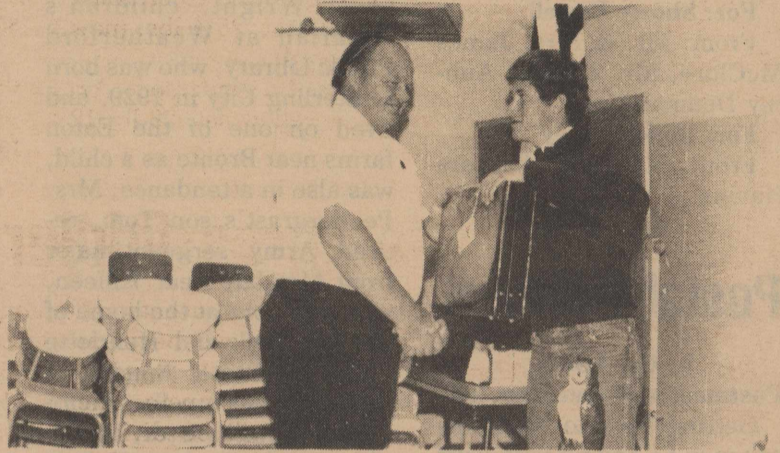

WTU to open new Vernon plant

West Texas Utilities Company will open its new coal-fired Oklaunion Power Station to the public on Saturday, May 16, with an open house from 10 a.m. till 3 p.m.

"We're inviting everyone interested in seeing this new plant to come out and take a tour," said Glen D. Churchill of Abilene, president and chief executive officer of WTU.

"We've had many requests from people who've seen the plant from a distance and we know there are many others wanting a close-up view of one of the largest electric generating units in the state," Churchill said.

Both walking and riding tours will be available during the five-hour open house period. Refreshments will be served and souvenirs will be handed out to all visitors,

with special favors for children.

Plant Manager Chuck Adami said plenty of parking space will be available and that members of his staff will serve as tour guides.

"We're proud of the plant and we're hoping for a large crowd on May 16," Adami said. He urged visitors to wear casual attire, including comfortable walking shoes.

The Oklaunion Power Station is the largest in WTU's system and the first to burn coal as boiler fuel. The coal comes by train from Wyoming. The plant is situated about eight miles southeast of Vernon and has become a landmark visible from all major highways in the area.

Construction began in May 1982 and the plant was completed and placed in

service in December 1986. WTU, a member of the Central and South West System, owns 54 per cent of the plant and is the operating company. The remaining ownership is shared by Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co., both CSW companies; Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority and the City of Brownsville.

request abatement of a penalty charge. Generally, the taxpayer's first step is to contact the IRS office shown on the notice. If the request is denied, the taxpayer will receive an explanation, including information on further appeal procedures, the

IRS says.

Contact IRS about refunds

If you get a federal income tax refund check and don't know why-- don't cash it. Instead, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), says, contact your local IRS office to determine if you are entitled to it.

The tax agency says their

local office can find out for you why the check was issued and give instructions for returning it to the government, if necessary.

Interest or penalties may be charged if taxpayers do not return a check issued in error.

Bottled water is alternative to 'hard' tap water

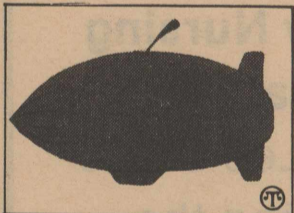
WHY DRINK BOTTLED WATER? -- Water, your body's most essential nutrient, flows "free" from a tap inside your home, so why buy it in a bottle? "Bottled water can be an alternative to the off-taste of hard tap water, the additives in sodas and other beverages, and can replace alcohol," says Mary Kinney Sweeten, a nutritionist for the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

"Some people on restricted diets will also find bottled water helpful, because some minerals in tap water, like sodium, may be too concentrated for their dietary recommendations," she adds. Sweeten says to read the bottled water labels carefully, and make sure what you're buying is what you want. "Bottled water has no more nutritional value than tap water," the specialist warns. "It just may taste a

little better and may not contain some of the minerals and impurities that come out of the tap."

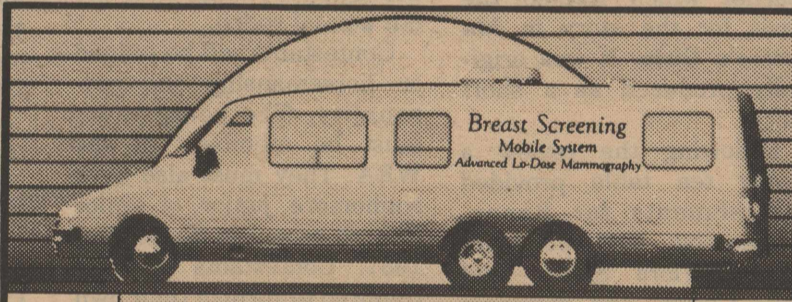

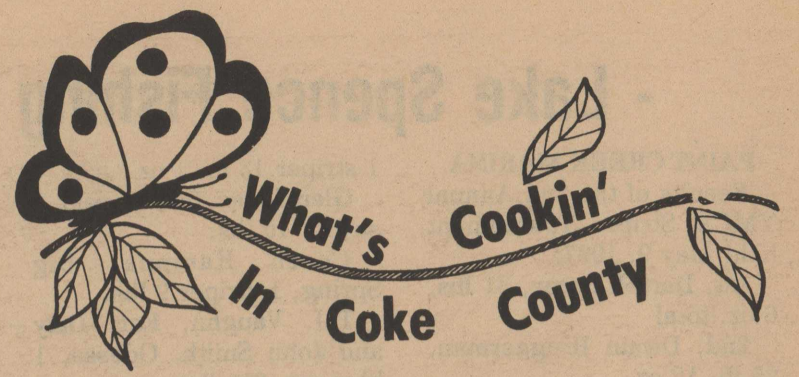

CHOCOLATE CAKE

- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- Pinch of salt
- 1/3 cup cocoa
- 1/2 cup Crisco
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/3 cup buttermilk
- 1 cup hot water

Sift together flour, baking soda, baking powder, salt and cocoa. Set aside. Cream Crisco and sugar. With mixer going, add eggs one at a time, then the vanilla. Beat until smooth and creamy. Add flour mixture and buttermilk and beat until smooth. Last of all, stir in the hot water by hand. Batter will be very thin. Bake in three 9-in layer cake pans for

20 minutes at 350 degrees. Frost with Fudge Icing.

FUDGE ICING

- 2 cups sugar
- 2 heaping Tbsp. cocoa
- 3 Tbsp. Karo corn syrup
- 1 heaping Tbsp. Crisco
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla

In a saucepan, mix sugar and cocoa together until well-blended. Add Karo, Crisco and milk. Slowly bring to a boil. Start testing the icing by dropping a little of the mixture into tap water. As soon as the icing holds together when dropped into the water, remove from heat. Add vanilla. Beat until icing starts to thicken. Ice cake immediately. ("This takes a lot of time," says Effie. "The secret is not to overcook it.")

Soil Conservation News

NEW TAX CODE LIMITS DEDUCTIONS FOR CONSERVATION PRACTICES

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 contains some special expensing provisions related to soil and water conservation expenditures that should be kept in mind by farmers and ranchers planning such work.

The old tax code (Section 175), applying to expenditures incurred through December 31, 1986, provided that a taxpayer may deduct certain expenditures for soil or water conservation practices that otherwise would have to be capitalized. The Tax Reform Act of 1986 revised the tax law as follows: "Soil and water conservation expenditures eligible for the expensing election are limited to those consistent with a conservation plan approved by the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture or, in the absence of such a plan, a plan with a comparable state conservation agency. Expenditures in connection with the draining or filling of wetlands or preparing land for installa-

tion or operation of a center pivot irrigation system are not eligible for deduction under this provision. This provision applies to expenditures incurred after December 31, 1986."

Some important points related to the Act at this time are: 1) The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) is incorporating this provision into the new tax code, and is responsible for interpreting the Act. Requests for interpretation, including eligible expenditures, should be referred to local officials of that agency. 2) The burden of proof of expenditures rests with the taxpayer as does the responsibility for maintaining records of expenses and a copy of the conservation plan or similar plan. 3) It is important to note that the expenditure must be included in the conservation plan or similar plan before it is incurred for it to be eligible. 4) A plan approved by the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) is one that is signed by the Local District Conservationist.

The local Soil Conservation Service office, located in the Coke County Courthouse, telephone 453-2623, will be glad to assist anyone who has need of planning assistance in this area.

The goal of this program is to assist visually impaired elderly persons to learn the skills that would enable them to remain in their homes and to enhance the independent living skills and socialization skills of those in nursing homes.

Counties that can receive services through this program are Reagan, Crockett, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Irion, Schleicher, Sutton, Concho, McCulloch, Menard, Mason and Kimble. Tax checks decrease

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$97.9 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1987 payments were down 7 percent as compared to payments to date made in May of last year.

Houston's check was the largest-- \$14.8 million-- bringing total payments in 1987 to \$58.3 million, down 10 percent over 1986. Dallas received \$11.5 million for a

total of \$43.8 million in total payments for this year, a decrease of 5 percent.

Payment to the city of Bronte for the period was \$2,970.15 for their share of the local tax which computed to a -19.25% decrease. Robert Lee's tax check was \$5,021.42, down -21.92%.

May checks represent taxes collected on sales made in March and reported to the Comptroller by April 20.

Knox, is married and has two daughters. Elaine and her husband, Kyle, have two children, Traci and Jason, both in Sonora High School.
