Bronte preps for exciting week-end

The Memorial Day activities to be held in Bronte this weekend will begin with a three-day golf tournament. Entrants will be two men one woman teams. Coke County 4-H Club will operate a concession stand for the duration of the tournament. The Bronte Volunteer Fire Department will donate the meat to the concession stand. Brisket, sausage, cold drinks, etc. will be served. Proceeds will go to pay for the 4-H'ers annual camp-out in the Big Bend area.

On Monday at 9:30 a.m. a parade will travel through Bronte. Anyone who wants to ride, drive, pedal or walk

may enter the parade. Entrants should assemble at the Nursing Home.

At 1:00 p.m. the Grand entry to the Second Annual Coke County Mules Days will begin at the Bronte Rodeo arena. The Mule Rodeo will follow and is expected to last until 5:00 or 5:30. All entrants are welcome, and books will open at 10:00 a.m. Monday morning. If an entrant doesn't have a mule he can borrow one.

The list of events includes team roping; mule races; goat roping; a rescue race; balloon bust; a run, saddle, ride & lead contest; and a business men's steer saddling event.

A highlight of the rodeo will be an exhibition by M.C. Hendry of Silver and his World Famous Mule Team.

Concessions at the rodeo will be operated by the East Coke County Medical Service and proceeds will benefit the Rodeo Association and the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department. The Fire Department is working to buy a new fire truck without the aid of any public funds. They are approaching \$40,000, but will need a total of approximately \$55,000 for the purchase.



Health instruction pays off

After 19 years as a health class instructor at Robert Lee, Kenneth Rasco never expected anything dramatic to occur from his routinely-taught classes.

During the course of the year students study various emergency measures. As with any high school student, one never knows if the material is being absorbed or not. One of the life-saving studies taught this year was the relatively new Heimlich Maneuver in which any trained party stands behind a choking victim who has an obstruction in the windpipe. Sharp pressure is applied with doubled fists to a point

just below the rib cage. Usually the lungs will expel the object.

One of Rasco's students, Blanca Salazar, a senior transfer from Lamesa, was paying attention in class. She recently used the technique to dislodge food from the throat from a co-worker at a local restaurant where she is employed part-time. Blanca reacted quickly as the victim gestured frantically and the obstruction was dispelled.

Blanca coolly told Rasco she was prepared to give mouth-to-mouth resuscitation if necessary.

The team believes mathematical concepts can be strengthened through these "real-world" experiences and will help the students gain marketable skills for use in the future.

In addition, since the same

faculty teaches grades seven through twelve, the teachers can encourage a higher level of development of these skills in all students.

Mrs. Mackey and Mrs. Taylor will also receive an expense paid trip to Waltham, Massachusetts August 3-7 to tour the GTE Laboratories Seminar. They will attend a banquet at the Dallas/Fort Worth Hyatt Regency Hotel on Sunday, August 2. There they will meet with approximately 20 other teachers from Texas who also received grants. Afterwards, they will fly to Boston and then on Waltham.

A total of 43 riders helped ride a grand total of 621



TIME TO CHECK FOR CASEBEARERS

Pecan growers need to be on the look-out for pecan nut casebearers, those perennial pests that can destroy a pecan crop if not controlled.

Based on various prediction models and trappings casebearers should be showing up in Coke County on or about May 26 - June 1.

Normally, casebearers damage nuts within a two week period.

To time spray applications for effective control, first check for eggs on a daily basis. Eggs are usually found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of a ball in a ball point pen.

These are white when first laid, then turn red over a three to five day period before turning white again after hatching.

Apply an insecticide the third day after the first eggs hatch to kill the larvae before they enter the nutlets. Since the larvae will hatch over a week-long period or more, a second application may be necessary.

Insecticides recommended for casebearer control include Diazinon, Pydrin, Malathion, and Zolone. It is also recommended to add zinc to any spray application to control rozette of pecans which stunts growth and reduced production.



PARENTS DEALING WITH TEEN DEPRESSION

Recent highly publicized teenage suicides in other states have once again focused Texas parents concerns closer to home.

Like adolescents everywhere, many Texas youngsters are under a great deal of stress. This stress may lead to distress and then to depression.

Depression takes many forms and has a wide variety of symptoms. It can range in intensity from a case of the blues to a chronic and reoccurring state of despair so severe that outside help is needed to over come it.

Many mental health professions think adolescents experience masked depression or behaviors that are indirect evidence of their depression. These indirect signs include low school achievement, school phobia, drug and alcohol abuse, anorexia nervosa, social isolation, sexual promiscuity and delinquency. While depression is associated with a variety of behaviors, it is not always clear whether depression precedes or follows the behaviors.

According to the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist, parents may help reduce stress and the possibility of depression in their teenagers. Recognize that youngsters can be under stress even from daily school activities such as getting good grades, succeeding in sports or making friends. Major life changes such as

the death of a parent, friend or family member, pregnancy, parents divorce or starting to take drugs are even greater stressors.

Parents are advised to communicate with their teenagers. Communication is a key to positive parent-teen relations. It is as important to listen as well as speak. Be willing to share your feeling as well as accept differences.

Providing clear guidelines is also important. Even though teenagers may outwardly reject parental authority they need clear guidelines and expectations. They will respect you for providing responsible standards and explaining the reason behind the rules.

Do not feel rejected. Accept the fact that teenagers turn to the peer group for emotional support and acceptance as part of growing up. The teenagers is not rejecting you as much as reaching out for new relationships and independence.

Help is available in many communities for parents who want to improve their parenting and communications skills. Courses and workshops are offered through churches, community education and county Extension offices and other programs in most Texas communities.

Parents who are concerned that their child is at risk of serious depression which may lead to suicide should not hesitate to call a local hospital, mental clinic or suicide hotline for help.

WTU files for 23.9% rate increase

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in its retail electric rates, citing the costs of completing a new coal-fired power plant as making the move necessary.

"We have said over and over again that it would be necessary to increase rates when our Oklaunion Power Station was completed," said Paul Sublett, WTU's local manager in Bronte, adding that WTU's last rate request came almost three years ago.

The rate changes being sought would add \$50,361,-475 to the Company's annual retail revenue. This is a 23.9 per cent increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin.

Sublett said there is no such thing as a "typical customer," but that the new rates, if approved, would mean that a residential electric customer using 625 kilowatt-hours per month would

pay \$10.83 more per month than previously. A commercial customer using 1,500 kilowatt-hours would pay \$29.94 more.

"To put this request in its proper perspective, our overall residential revenues will be only six to eight per cent higher than they were two years ago," Sublett said. "The decline in fuel costs since then just about offsets this increase."

The Oklaunion Power Plant situated near Vernon, went into commercial operation Dec. 24, 1986. WTU's share of the cost as majority owner is \$275 million, which increased the Company's total investment in facilities by 75 per cent.

"Until this cost is reflected in our rates, the Company does not have the opportunity to recover its expenses and earn a reasonable return on its investment," Sublett explained.

Construction at Oklaunion started in May 1982, and the plant was completed on time and well with in the original budget. Industry surveys show that Oklaunion was the most economically constructed coal-fired power plant built during the mid-1980s.

The plant will provide 25 per cent of WTU's total generating capacity. The long-term contract for low sulphur western coal diversifies the Company's fuel base and will help stabilize fuel costs, which in recent years have been affected by sudden changes in natural gas prices.

Other company's owning shares of the plant are Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co., both associated with WTU has members of the Central and South West System; the city of Brownsville and Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority.

Usual procedures at the PUC indicate that a full-scale hearing of WTU's case would be held in late summer, with a final order by the Commission coming late this year. This would make it almost three years since WTU's last change in basic retail rates.





PUDDING CANDY

½ cup Brown Sugar ²/₃ cup evaporated milk

1 cup sugar

Jan Hohensee.

1 small pkg. instant pudding, pie filling (vanilla or butterscotch)

2 Tablespoons butter 1½ cups pecans

Boil sugar, milk, pudding, butter at low heat 240 degrees. Stir constantly till mixture forms a ball. Remove from heat and add pecans. Spoon on wax paper. Cool.

PEANUT BUTTER ICE CREAM PIE

2 C. (about 30 cookies) chocolate wafer cookie crumbs

½ C. melted butter

3 pt. softened vanilla ice cream

butter

½ C. honey

3/4 C. coarsely chopped roasted peanuts

Hot Fudge Sauce (recipe follows)

Mix cookie crumbs and butter in food processor fitted with metal blade or mix together in medium bowl. Press evenly over bottom and two-thirds up sides of 9x3-inch springform pan; set aside. With electric mixer on low, mix ice cream, peanut butter, honey and peanuts in large bowl until combined. Pour into prepared crust.

Cover and freeze until firm. Remove pie from freezer 10 minutes before serving. Run sharp knife around edges and remove sides of springform. Place on serving platter and serve with Hot Fudge Sauce. Pie may be frozen up to a month before serving. Leftovers may be refrozen. Makes 12-14 servings.

HOT FUDGE SAUCE

1 C. chocoalte chips

1 (14 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk

²/₃ C. water

1 tsp. vanilla



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'87 may be the year to spray mesquite

MESQUITE SPRAYING SHOULD WORK WELL IN

1987 should be a good year for battling mesquite with foliar applied herbicides.

Good rainfall last fall and winter have made conditions good for mesquite control this spring. The only negative factor is the late freeze that damaged plants with open buds. Freeze damaged plants will need time to develop leaves before herbicide applications.

Good soil mositure conditions allow mesquite plants to make excellent growth, a key factor in herbicide effectiveness. Data obtained for Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research show that higher plant kills occur when monthly rainfall exceeds the average six months prior to spraying. Generally, if mesquite plants have developed a large quantity of leaves and plants are not moisture stressed at time of application, reasonable control may be expect-

Also, mesquite leaves should be fully extended and should have turned from light green to dark green before herbicide is applied. Usually, this occurs about 40 days after bud break. When leaves have matured, plants begin to store carbohydrate reserves, and control is good at this time.

Research by Texas Tech University show that food reserves are used during the period of pod elongation. Applying herbicide during this period usually results in poor control. Once pods have elongated, storage of food reserves continues, and excellent control is obtained during this period.

About 90 days after bud break, control with foliar applied herbicides decreases because of wax build-up on leaves and a general decrease in plant growth activity.

Still temperature also is an important factor in mesquite control. Research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Tech University has shown that soil temperature at 12 to 18 inches of depth at time of spraying should be 75 degrees farenheit or higher for the best control of mesquite. Data from Texas Tech shows poor mesquite control if herbicide is applied when soil temperature at 12 to 18 inches is below 75 degrees farenheit.

If frequent rains occur during the spray season, plants may put out new leaves. These leaves should be allowed to mature before spraying. Also, mesquite with foliage damaged by insects, disease, hail or the late freeze should not be sprayed until new foliage has developed and matured.

With the recent labeling of Reclaim (clopyralid), four herbicides are registered and effective for mesquite control by foliar application. The others are Grazon ET (triclopyr), Banvel (dicamba) and Grazon PC (picloram).

Grazon ET, Banvel and Reclaim may be used alone; Reclaim has been found most effective. Also, a higher degree of control may be obtained by using a one-toone mixture of Grazon ET or Banvel with grazon PC than when using these materials alone. Grazon PC in a one-toone mixture with Reclaim also works well, slightly better that Reclaim alone, and should be used on brush species other than mesquite. Reclaim alone is not effective on brush other than mesquite.

Although 2, 4, 5-T registrations have been cancelled and 2, 4, 5-T is no longer available, a rancher with a supply of 2, 4, 5-T on hand can legally use it. Use 2, 4, 5-T alone or in a one-toone mixture with picloram or dicamba. 2, 4, 5-T cannot bel dicamba. 2, 4, 5-T cannot be legally sold nor can it legally change hands.

For cost-effective mesquite control with foliar herbicides, use proper timing combining with the proper method and follow up with good range management.

The card says "This is our very finest choice model, made for today's delicious recipes. manual, complete with all blades and attachments. You are not supposed to catch the word "manual" but that is the word that will protect them from false advertisement. Also-- please add \$1.00 for postage and handling-- another \$5,000.00 from these 5,000 people who send in replies to this card.

Don't fall for these gimmicks. These things are nothing more than inexpensive little items you can get cheaper at our discount stores.

Check with the Post Office before you send money to these companies.
