Court hears concerns of groups

Coke County Commissioners heard from groups representing both ends of the county at their regular meeting Monday morning.

Following the pledge, the court heard from a group of Robert Lee citizens who were representing the 40 Plus Dance Club and other groups who regularly utilize the Rec Hall for their monthly or bi-monthly get-togethers. Group representatives indicated that there was some misunderstanding between the different droups who use the Rec Hall concerning clean-up procedures. After

some discussion, the court decided that the groups using the Rec Hall would be responsible for sweeping the floor. The caretaker would then be responsible for mopping.

Next on the agenda were Mrs. Gilley and Mrs. Childs from Bronte, who were concerned about the condition of their county roads in the Fort Chadbourne area, due to the heavy rainfall received. They also expressed concern about the dangers that the high water posed to residents in that area. Precinct 2 Commissioner Billy Joe Luc-

kett explained that with all the rainfall, it had been too wet to make the necessary repairs to the roadway in that area, and indicated that just as soon as the weather let up, his crew would be in that area. It was also decided that more high water markers were needed in areas throughout the county, and commissioners would install these as needed.

Following this discussion, the court reviewed the Extension Agents' reports, paid bills, and worked for a short time on the '88 budget.

Dear Mr. Spain,

In the column, "Hints for Health" by Guno G. Kletter, M.D., appearing in the June 5, 1987 edition, serious allegations were raised, and on behalf of St. John's Hospital, I wish to respond to the misinformation and set the record straight.

St. John's Hospital, approved by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals and approved for participation in the Medicare program, has various pricing structures for most services. Laboratory services provided on an out-patient basis through physicians' offices, nursing homes, and industrial accounts, wherein the St. John's laboratory has no expense for obtaining or transporting specimens to be analyzed are provided at a price significantly lower than similar services provided to patients requiring a full range of services.

In the instance cited by Dr. Kletter, St. John's Hospital billed the patients as required in accordance with the Medicare fee schedule. Unfortunately, hospitals are

required to charge the rate prescribed by Medicare for services provided a Medicare patient.

I feel it necessary to point out that Dr. Kletter compared two patients that in fact did not receive the same laboratory procedures; therefore, the charges were different. Hospitals are required to charge the fee schedule prescribed by Medicare for patient services. I sincerely regret that Dr. Kletter and his office staff failed to understand and properly inform patients of Medicare regulations.

In spite of Dr. Kletter's statement, "unfortunately we don't have any input on St. John's billing policy," upon being contacted by Dr. Kletter's office regarding the patients concerns, Mr. Carl Lange, Technical Director of the St. John's lab, contacted both patients and was able to completely resolve their concerns.

In addition, as a member of St. John's Hospital medical staff, Dr. Kletter's concerns and recommendations are given the same serious consideration accorded any physician using St. John's Hospital. And finally, in spite of Dr. Kletter's allegations, St. John's Hospital does not "charge higher rates to well-insured patients" as we have been accused.

St. John's Hospital has a strong record of providing the highest quality health care to the people of West Texas and especially Coke County. For the past 75 years, St. John's has been privileged to serve the people of Tom Green County and surrounding counties, and the past 18 months we have made an extensive effort to provide multiple services to the West Coke County Hospital District. We look forward to continuing this proud tradition of service and caring.







the next best thing to our "Express Mail" which guarantees overnight delivery.

Touching on "Second-Class" mail-- this type mail consists mostly of newspapers, magazines and church bulletins. This type mail

generally is used only by publishers who mail out large numbers of their publication, such as your local newspaper, Southern Living, Field & Stream, Baptist Standard, etc. When this type mail is non-deliverable or when somebody moves, we forward the mail on or notify the publisher of the new address if the customer doesn't notify them within 90 days.







WHEREAS, by prior resolution, order, and special election vote taken by the electorate of the City of Bronte on April 5, 1975, said electorate voted the adoption of local sales and use tax within the City Limits of the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas: and

Whereas, said resolution, order, and election results have been on file with the City Clerk of the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas, and said city has received, since the passage of such matter, sales and use tax proceeds for general operational usages within the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas; and

WHEREAS, it is determined in the best interest of the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas, that there be an amendment in addition to said taxtaion resolution and ordinance to allow for the taxation of telecommunication services and to reflect that this ordinance, as well a prior resolutions and ordinances be cumulative as well as there being a severability clause in connection with such ordinance and to specify and stipulate the effective date of such ordinance;

Therefore, Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City Of Bronte, Coke County, Texas:

1. The existing resolution and ordinance regarding the 1% local sales and use tax dated April 5, 1975, is hereby amended by the addition of an additional provision to

be entitled as Section 4, styled as follows, to-wit:

SECTION 4: Taxation of **Telecommunication Services**

(a) Tax is hereby authorrized on all telecommunication services sold within the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas. The purpose of this section of the sale of telecommunication services is consummated with the location of telephone or other telecommunication device from which the call or other communication originates. If the point of origin cannot be determined, the sale is consummated at the address to which the call or other communication is billed.

(b) The rate of the tax imposed by this section shall be the same as the rate imposed by the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas, for all other local sales and use taxes as authorized by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

(c) The City Secretary shall forward to the Comtroller of the State of Texas by United States Registered Mail, a copy of this ordinance along with a copy of the minutes of the City Council vote and discussion of this ordinance.

(d) This section shall become effective as of October

(e) This ordinance shall be and is hereby declared as an addition and amendment to existing other ordinances of the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas, and this ordinance shall not operate to repeal, change, alter, or affect any other such ordinances insofar as such provisions hereof might be inconsistent or in conflict with such provisions in which event, any other ordinance in regard to this specific taxation herein named, as to telecommunication services, if any, and in such other ordinances or instances, such ordinances are hereby repealed.

(f) If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is, for any other reason, held unconstitutional, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining provision of this ordinance.

(g) This ordinance is to deliberately construed to achieve its remedial pur-

(h) This ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage as provided by law.
