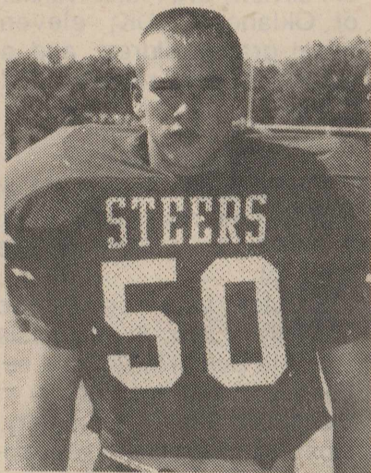

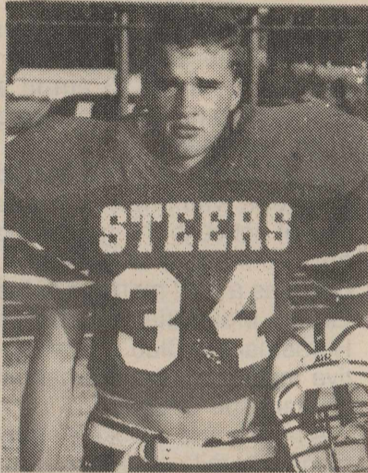

Steer players, coach named to awards

Robert Lee Steers' Cinderella football season just keeps going and going and going. More honors have been heaped on team members and finally, rightfully so, on Coach Ed Poehls.

Coach Poehls has been named Coach of the Year on the Standard Times 1993 All West Texas Class 1A football team. Now word comes that he has also been named Coach of the Year by the Abilene Reporter's All-Big Country Class A football team. Honors that richly were deserved, since his Steer squad was passed over in district and area standings at the beginning of the season. He said from the onset his team had potential and could be outstanding if everything clicked. He was right. The Steers were not turned back until the quarterfinals. Many long, hard hours of work and "cheerleading" went into the season; he will, as he always has, give the credit to his "young men" and his fine staff.

Honors continue to be heaped on Steer senior tailback Scot Millican. An average-size back by high school standards at 5' 9" and 175 lbs, Scot carried 241 times for 1,342 yards (5.6 yard average) while helping the Steers to a school-record 12-1-1 season. He scored 16 touchdowns, kicked 41 extra points, and three field goals

for 146 total points. He rushed for more than 100 yards in Robert Lee's three playoff victories. He was voted the offensive MVP of District 9-1A by league coaches.

He has now been chosen for the MVP on the Standard Times All-West Texas Class 1A football squad and the prestigious Abilene Reporter's All-Big Country Class A football team as the Offensive Player of the Year. Perhaps his highest honor of the season came recently when the Standard-Times chose him for a utility player on their All-West Texas Super Team which included players through 5A.

Accolades for the Steers didn't end with Poehls and Millican. Team members, Seniors Dean Burns, John Williams, and Judd Pitcock, and junior Jonathan Torres were also placed on the 1993 All-West Texas Class 1A football team.

Dean made this team as a defensive lineman in 1992 and this year made it as an offensive lineman. His position made it possible to spring two 1,000 yard rushers, Millican and Lee McCown. Defensively, he finished with 126 tackles and 10 quarterback sacks for a unit that allowed an average of 7.5 points per game.

He has now been chosen for the All-Big Country Class A squad and what may be his highest award - a place on the Texas Sports Writer's Association team.

All-around athlete John Williams was named All-West Texas Class A and All Big Country Class A team, too, as an end. A big 'un at 6' 3" and 225 lbs, he caught 20 passes for 264 yards and five TD's. He also started on the defensive line as the Steers allowed only 105 points in 14 games. He also was All-District punter with a 39 yard average.

Judd Pitcock, also no small thing at 6' 4" and 220 lbs, finished the 1993 season on the defensive line with 128 total tackles, three pass break-ups and four quarterback sacks. He has also been named to the two prestigious squads.

Jonathan Torres, only junior in the group who made the All-West Texas Class 1A team, was one of the team's spark-plugs and a member of the Steers' stingy defense at linebacker which shut out five opponents, allowed an average of 7.5 points in 14 games and had 22 take aways in four playoff games. He was voted the defensive MVP of District 9-1A by league coaches. He finished the season with 148 total tackles.

San Angelo Teens apprehended in RL

Quick action by a Robert Lee school district employee enabled sheriff's department personnel to apprehend ten subjects Sunday night. Two young men, classed as adults, and eight juveniles, all of San Angelo, were in one vehicle and arrested south of Robert Lee. They were initially charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle but other charges may be forthcoming connected with several vandalism incidents. They were transported to Tom Green County Jail and the Tom Green Juvenile facility late Sunday night.

Deputy Jeff Barnes noted that the suspects would have gone back to San Angelo and the incidents gone unsolved if the school employee had not quickly called law enforcement. He stressed that citizens could make a real difference in criminal activities if they remained aware and alert to any unusual events they observed. Quick response in notifying law enforcement would make the #1 impact on criminal activities, Barnes said.

The Robert Lee city council will consider a juvenile curfew in the near future. At this time, neighboring towns have already installed like programs. Ballinger and Sterling City both have regulated curfews and officials say the new regulations have curtailed the rapidly increasing crime rate.

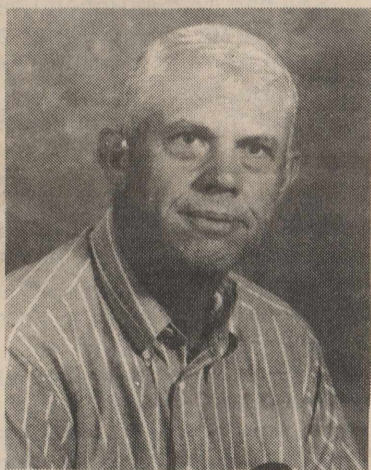

CC Commissioners

The Coke County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, Jan. 10, with a lengthy slate of business.

Much of the discussion centered on items concerning the continued work on the 911 program. America Conoly, Concho Valley of Governments representative, informed the group of the awarding of a \$3,000 grant to Coke County to aid with the current addressing of residents. Commissioners and precinct employees will be doing the rural addressing work for 911. Conrad Buchanan of JEDCO in Abilene will train those workers.

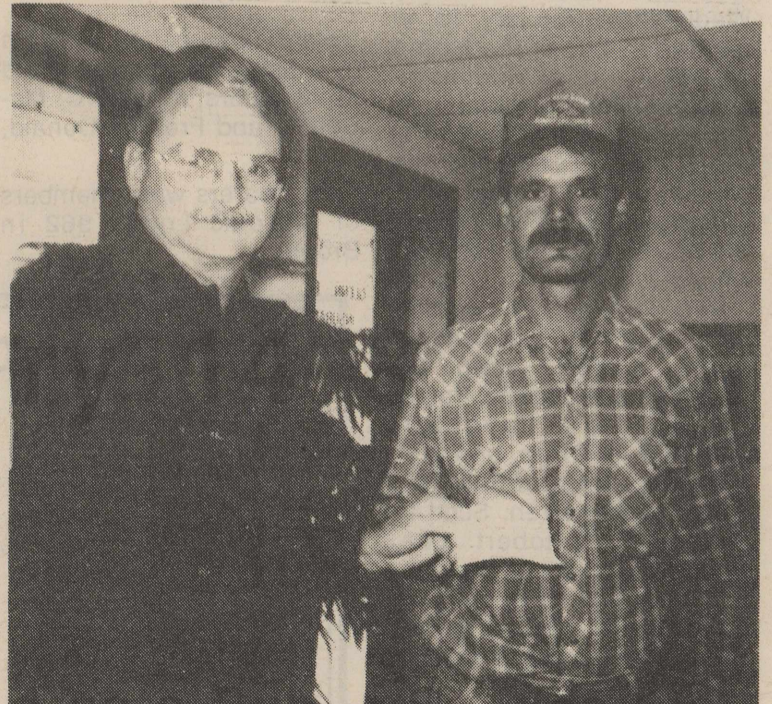

A former Bronte native, Terry Jay Richards, 39, apparently died of a bacterial infection according to Abilene Police reports Monday.

He was taken to Abilene Regional Medical Center where he was pronounced dead. Blood toxicology tests were taken there but no autopsy was ordered by Justice of the Peace Chuck Griffin. When the tests showed no drugs or alcohol and no apparent cause of death, Griffin ordered the body exhumed from Ft. Chadbourne Cemetery in Coke County.

Buried on Tuesday, Jan. 4, the body was exhumed late Thursday, Jan. 6, and sent to the Tarrant County Medical Examiner's office in Ft. Worth.

Richards had lived in Coke County most of his life and attended Bronte schools. He was the son of Joyce Richards of Abilene and the late Ralph Richards.

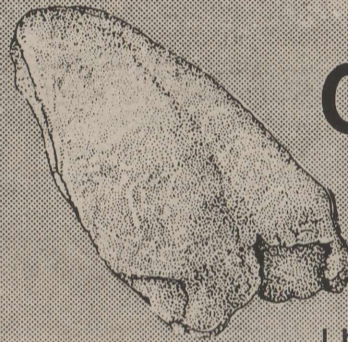

Wind Erosion

Recently the wind reminded us just how much damage it can do. If wind can blow hard enough to tear up Christmas decorations and blow over small sheds, just think how damaging it can be to cropland fields with no protection to absorb the wind energy. Strong winds can blow the

fertile topsoil particles and carry them quite a distance, forming in some severe cases a brown fog or haze in the sky. In sandy soil type, which is the soil type of most of Coke County cropland, the sand will soon cover any fences that might be around the field.

The best remedy for wind erosion is leaving crop residue on top of the soil. Not only does residue absorb the wind energy, but it allows for easier infiltration of water and maintains the moisture longer. Leaving crop residue along with terraces and/or wind-break trees can be very effective in controlling wind erosion. In cases where there is not enough residue left over from the previous crop to protect the field, surface roughening or tillage during the critical period will help. The tillage should be deep enough to leave ridges and furrows allowing clod formation on the surface of the soil.

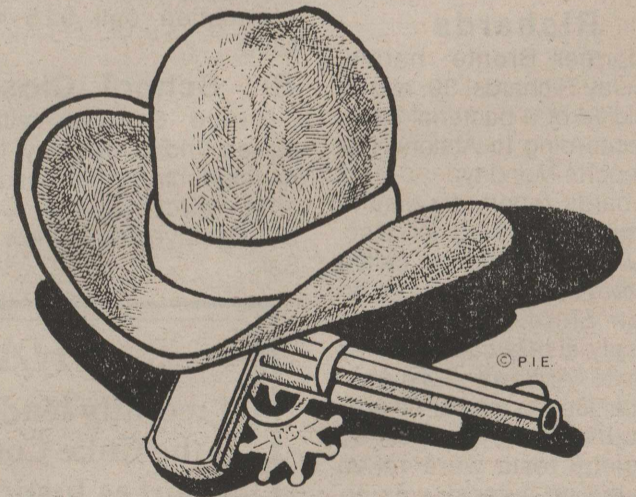

Bryan's Barn has been a busy place since before Thanksgiving of 1993. That was when the Wilson Bryan family began putting up Christmas lights that eventually lit approximately three acres of his six-acre plot of land bordered by Messbox Creek and FM 1904 near the north end of the Robert Lee dam. The annual project has grown each of the three years that Thelma Jo Hinnard and Cookie Burns of Robert Lee, Terry Frank Bryan of San Angelo, and Richard Bryan and his family of Ballinger have helped their dad (granddad to some) make what has been called by viewers "a fantasyland", "a little bit of heaven", "a miracle of lights", and other complimentary phrases. Viewers have come from all over Coke County area and far beyond.

Wilson's creativity is the guiding force behind the project, with many innovations by his family members. Lucile Bryan does not claim any credit for the beauty outside. Her domain is decorating the inside Christmas tree and overseeing "food service" on family work days.

Wilson and Lucile took the initiative of keeping open house at the Bryan Barn every night from 6:00 pm to 10:00 pm. They hoped all viewers would drive around the house, park in the designated parking lot then come in to register and visit the snack table and eat popcorn as they explore the toys, family history, collectibles, and oddities on display. It is a converted barn with typical concrete floor, but a place where EVERYONE is welcome.

Visitation formally began Sunday night, December 5, 1993, and ended on Saturday, January 1, 1994. A total of 1,906 names were signed in the registration book (the total count in 1992 was 1,096). Many names were of people who returned several times bringing family members or friends as they became available during the holidays.

Wilson's "guess-timate" is that only one third of the people who viewed the lights by driving down the highway and across the creek, and/or around the house and on out, came in to register. He urges friends to help spread the word next Christmas so more will come in.

Having offered a 21-inch loaf of baked bread to the person who brought out the most guests, all competitors were asked to write their total beside their name. The winner was Jeffie Roberts who escorted 32 visitors. Several who ran a close race were Billy Kelly with 26; Cova Sparks and Leta Ardrige, 25 each; and Jeanie Glidewell of San Angelo who brought and/or sent 22 guests.

Sixteen states, including Texas, were represented in the registry, with one person each from Japan and Germany.

The youngest guest was Beau Dakota Grigg, three days of age, from Bronte. The oldest visitor was Lillie Gaines, 90 years, 9 months, (all grieve her death on Jan. 9, 1994, 16 days after a beautiful visit with her). Other senior guests were Theresa Kriegel, 89, of

Miles, and Katherine Parris, 88, of San Angelo. Pat Attebery of KLST-TV brought her 87-year-old mother & her family for a visit.

Every guest is special to the Bryans. Wilson especially enjoyed children who were fascinated with his toys that moved and/or made noises. Many adults like examining his collection of old and unusual farm and ranch tools, many of which were hard to identify. (There is one that nobody has identified, not even Richard Johnson, who found several items like it in his store when he bought it.)

Lucile especially enjoyed greeting visitors, getting them to register then stop by the snack table to take a cup of popcorn and punch to graze on while exploring the collectibles on the walls and posts. Several friends brought items to add to the "Bryan's Museum," as they called it, because of their similar interests.

There is one reason the Bryans regret the busy schedule at The Barn during December. There were many beautifully decorated homes and yards in Robert Lee, but the senior Bryan's did not get to see but very few of them!

The whole family was delighted with the WCCCD award, Christmas Spectacular category. The beautiful 4' x 4' Christmas card will be prized and treasured as an item of display in the future. The San Angelo Standard Times selected Bryan's Barn as one of its featured "Twelve Nights of Christmas".

David Tillery, professional video person from San Angelo, made a video tape of the lights and activity at The Barn, including an interview with Wilson and Lucile sitting beside the wood stove. Anyone wanting a copy may call 453-2692 or 453-2764 (Bryan #).

A busy schedule will continue at The Barn until the lights and other equipment are stored. By then, it will be only 8 1/2 months until it will be brought out again with much more added to make a bigger and brighter spot in and around Messbox Creek in honor of "the Birthday of The Holy Babe, - The True Light of the World."

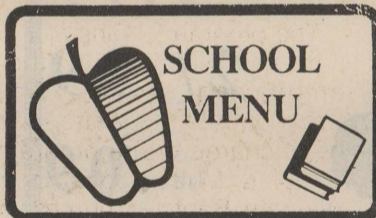

Foot Pain

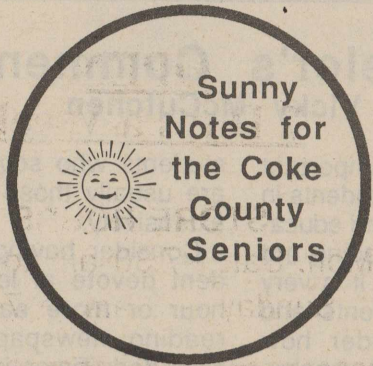
Most of us take our feet for granted, giving them less care than they deserve until pain gets our attention. Heel and arch pain is often caused by inflammation of the connective tissue at the bottom of the foot. Pounding on a hard surface can cause microtears in the tough, fibrous layers of the foot resulting in pain that can last for weeks or even months.

Dr. James Michelson, director of the Foot and Ankle Center at Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions, says loss of elasticity contributes to the problem as we get older, especially in runners and tennis players. Among the options are orthopedic and podiatric treatments, including surgery, but Dr. Michelson says to first try a series of stretching exercises, standing with toes on a step and heels hanging below the edge. Do not bounce, just stretch. He says stretching the muscle tissue at the base of the foot is usually the only permanent answer to the pain, but the conditioning and healing process takes time.

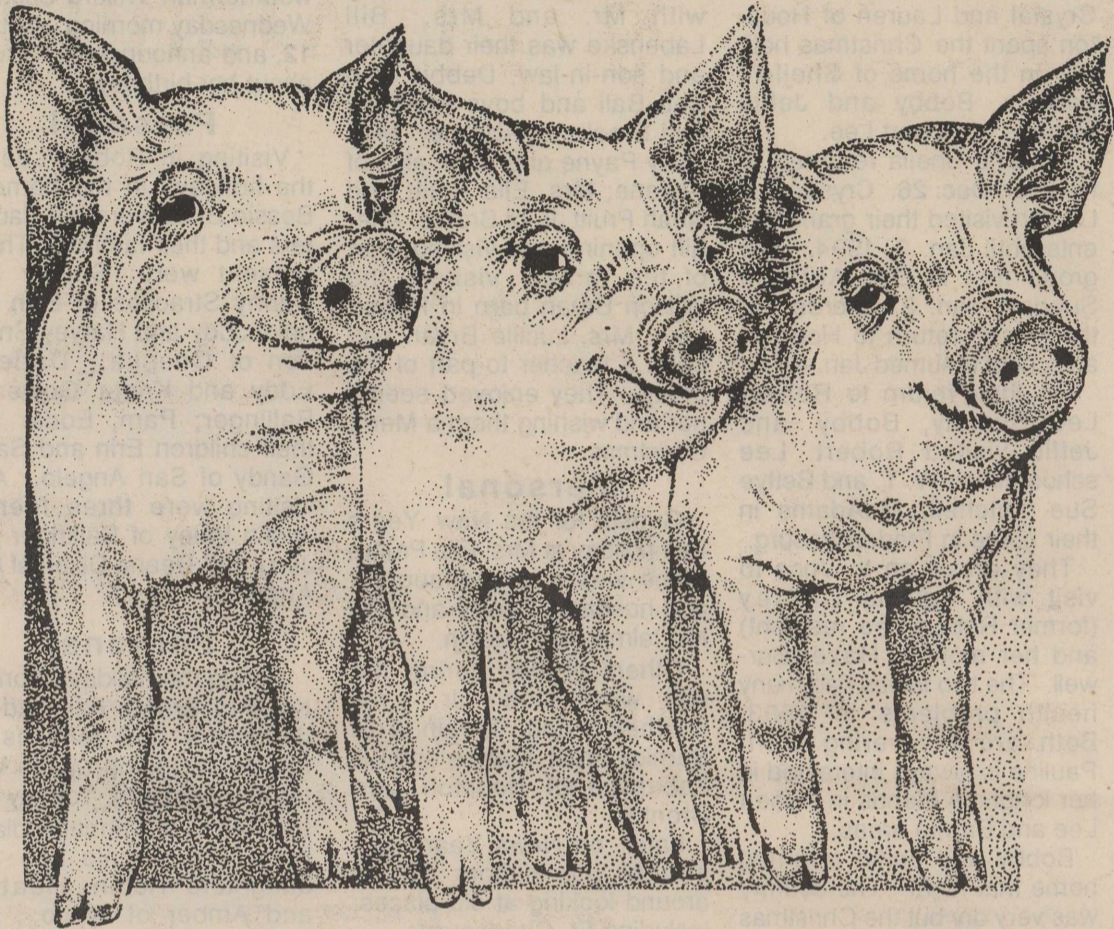
PUBLIC NOTICE

The City of Robert Lee is considering a Curfew Ordinance and would like the opinion of the citizens of Robert Lee. The main substance of the proposed ordinance is as follows:

1. A minor commits an offense if he remains in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the City during curfew hours.
 2. A parent of a minor commits an offense if he knowingly permits, or by insufficient control allows, the minor to remain in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the City during curfew hours.
 3. The owner, operator, or any employee of an establishment commits an offense if he knowingly allows a minor to remain upon the premises of the establishment during the curfew hours.
- Curfew hours means:
- A. 11:00 pm on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday until 6:00 am and
 - B. 12:01 am, until 6:00 am on any Saturday or Sunday.
