## Scandal clouds address

■ Iraq, welfare, children, social security main focuses

If the specter of scandal was evident in the comments of newscasters at Tuesday's State of the Union Address, it was hardly noticeable inside the Capitol.

President Clinton's tone was confident as he addressed the newest crisis in Iraq.

"I think I speak for Republicans and Democrats when I say to Saddam Hussein, 'You cannot defy the will of the world,'" Clinton said, spurring a standing ovation.

The president said he intended to deny Hussein the ability to use weapons of mass destruction, but did not comment on whether that would involve military action.

Cameron Graham, chairman of Texas Tech's College Republicans, said Clinton enjoys bipartisan support in his dedication to thwart Hussein.

Hussein has told the Iraqi people that if the United States uses military force against Iraq, it will be to distract the public from the scandals involving Clinton's personal life.

Graham said he does not feel that is the case.

"If we do strike (against Iraq), it will not be because the president wants to divert attention from his own problems," he said.

In other matters, however, Graham is skeptical of the president. The allegations that Clinton lied about an affair with former White House intern Monica Lewinsky call his credibility deeply into question, he said.

Tech political science professor Craig Emmert agreed that no connection between foreign policy

and the president's personal scandals should be made.

"Cynical people may draw that conclusion, but I don't think there's any connection," he said.

Clinton began his speech by outlining the positive aspects of the last year, including lower crime, lower welfare rolls and a quickly disappearing deficit with hope for a surplus in sight.

The president also made perfectly clear what he hopes any surplus would be used for.

"Save Social Security first," Clinton said.

## First Lady, Starr trade disapproving remarks

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an extraordinary clash, Hillary Rodham Clinton accused the Whitewater prosecutor Tuesday of allying himself with "right-wing opponents" out to destroy her husband.

The prosecutor dismissed her comments as "nonsense" and summoned President Clinton's personal secretary before a grand jury.

"Our current investigation began when we received credible evidence of serious federal crimes,"

Whitewater Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr said in a tersely worded statement defending the expansion of his investigation.

Among the issues Starr is investigating is whether Clinton encouraged former White House intern Monica Lewinsky to lie on a sworn affidavit she gave in connection with the Paula Jones sexual harassment lawsuit.

He also his investigating whether job offers that presidential friend Vernon Jordan arranged were in any way connected.

## President increases pressure on Hussein

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Clinton intensified U.S. pressure on Iraq to open its suspect weapons sites Tuesday and directed Secretary of State Madeleine Albright to sweep through Europe and the Persian Gulf in a drive for support.

Secretary of Defense William Cohen is weighing a parallel trip to the Gulf region, seeking backing for a military response in a calculated campaign to put maximum pressure on Iraqi President Saddam Hussein.

Clinton, doing some high-level consulting of his own, talked to British Prime Minister Tony Blair on the telephone, the two closely allied leaders agreeing that the situation was serious.

In a State of the Union address later, aides said, the president would indict Iraq for refusing to give U.N. weapons inspectors unfettered access to sites where caches of biological and other weapons of mass destruction may be hidden.

Clinton planned to tell Congress and the American public that Saddam should not be permitted to pursue these weapons programs with impunity and that all U.S. options to stop him were open.

Albright is due to depart Thursday to confer with the French, British and Russian foreign ministers and then go to the Persian Gulf for talks with leaders of Arab countries that are within Iraq's range.

In a double-barreled, six-day mission, she also plans to meet with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and in Palestinian-controlled territory with Yasser Arafat on sputtering peacemaking.

Cohen could leave as early as next week "to consult with our friends and allies in the Gulf about possible military action" against Iraq, said Pentagon spokesman Kenneth Bacon.

"The train is leaving the station here," Bacon said, adding: "If diplomacy fails here, we will have to look at different options."

## Groups donate to Honors Program

Donations coming from four different sources totaled \$1,325,000 in contributions to the Texas Tech Honors Program scholarships endowment fund.

The donations will go toward an effort to establish 100 new Honors

scholarships. "This program at Texas Tech University has recently exploded with enthusiasm and enrollment. I think that it is certainly deserving of our added support," Tech Chancellor John Montford said.

Montford presented a \$1 million donation that came from an anonymous West Texas family after the new year.

The family has donated millions of dollars to Tech and always remains anonymous, he said.

"Their generosity is overwhelming," Montford said.

Also, the Chancellor's Council donated \$250,000 to go toward the scholarship fund.

The Chancellor's Council is made of more than 900 people who donate at least \$1,000 to the university and pay a monthly fee after the initial donations. Members of the council provide financial support to a wide-range of university programs, including scholarships, faculty awards and student recruitment.

The initial \$1.25 million raised for the scholarships is a challenge grant. Donors are being challenged to match the \$1.25 million, making the total

fund for the honors program \$2.5 million.

In response to the challenge, the Dora Roberts Foundation donated \$50,000 toward the scholarship fund. The privately established foundation in Big Spring is dedicated primarily to education in West Texas.

Montford donated \$25,000 to the scholarship challenge on behalf of the

Plum Foundation.

The foundation is headquartered in Los Angeles and Lubbock. Montford serves on the board of this foundation in Lubbock. It donates money to programs dedicated to the advancement of education, envi-

ronment, visual and performing arts, medicine and human services.

Honors Program Director Gary Bell accepted the donations on behalf of the program.

"We can now bring here, in large numbers, these students with excellent SAT scores," Bell said.

The new scholarships fund will benefit students with SAT scores ranging from 1200 to 1300, he said.

"These students, once they graduate, will remember Tech fondly and hopefully will add to the quality and reputation of the school," Bell said.

These gifts will count toward the \$300 million goal Tech has set to raise in private donations as part of the Horizon Campaign.

The Horizon Campaign officially will be launched Feb. 6 as Tech celebrates its 75th Anniversary with a gala musical presentation in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium.

## Tech athletics encourage good behavior

Even in the midst of the charges and allegations brought against Texas Tech athletics by the NCAA, a new venue may help maintain accountability of character for athletes.

The NCAA has charged Tech with using ineligible players, as well as improperly participating in student-athletes' schoolwork. Charges were made in November, and a rebuttal is expected in February.

Character Counts All Stars is an extension of the Character Counts Coalition, which supports building character among youths. The Character Counts All Stars asks

athletes, coaches and athletic directors at professional and collegiate levels to support sportsmanlike conduct among athletes.

Tech Athletic Director Gerald Myers and head football coach Spike Dykes signed a declaration sent out to college-level athletics, stating an intent to maintain character both on and off the field.

Joyce Brubaker, Character Counts Coalition associate, said the coalition has been in existence for five years, and just in the past

year has begun to seek support from the athletic community. "We're using athletics as a way to develop character and good sportsmanship in athletics," Brubaker said. "The declaration is a sign of their support for character in athletics."

Brubaker said the declaration of character's goal is to spotlight athletes who depend on good qualities and responsibility but often are overlooked.

Administrators at universities also received information about

the declaration, including a challenge from the coalition for the administration to keep the athletic department accountable.

Myers said he signed the declaration on a national level, and he believes in the idea of promoting character.

"We need to use the influence of athletes as role models for young people," Myers said. "I'd say our athletes realize their influence on the community, and we have staff that encourages our athletes to be aware of their influence on young people."

Tech President Donald Haragan said he agrees with the coalition's idea of accountability.

"I think it's a good idea, and I See ATHLETICS, page 2

## Oprah showdown watched in states with 'veggie libel' laws

■ Some say case is true test of laws

PHOENIX (AP) — Say what you will about California oranges, but you might want to bite your tongue before engaging in sour talk about their Florida and Arizona cousins.

Both states and 11 others have "veggie libel" laws, which are intended to protect the food industry — from large companies to sole proprietors — from defamation.

The first true legal test of the laws is under way in Texas, where cattle ranchers have sued Oprah Winfrey over remarks made on her show about mad cow disease.

The cattlemen claim they lost \$10.3 million because cattle prices

plummeted after the segment on Winfrey's popular daytime talk show.

Opponents call the laws an unconstitutional violation of free speech.

The laws also pose a threat to public health "because they intimidate journalists and food safety activists," said Ronnie Cummings, national director of the Pure Food Campaign, a nonprofit advocacy group.

Not so, says an agribusiness industry whose push for state laws began after apple growers unsuccessfully sued over a 1989 CBS report on Alar blamed for dropping apple prices.

# Rape victims' parents say they shouldn't be blamed for crime

FORD CITY, Pa. (AP) — Misfits in a derelict town, seven teen-age girls used to hang out at the home of a man who allowed them to smoke, drink and watch scary movies like "Rosemary's Baby" and "The Exorcist."

The freedom came at a high price: For three years, they say, they were raped and molested by the man, Walter Booher, who threatened them with black magic and Mafia reprisals if they told anyone.

Booher, 47, a seedy, big-bellied man who eked out a living mowing grass and umpiring Little League games, was charged with 334 sex-related offenses. Last week, though, he struck a deal with prosecutors and pleaded guilty to only five counts. The rest of the charges were dropped.

That angered the girls' parents. Then they were even more enraged to hear the prosecutors suggest that

they were to blame for not being more attentive.

One mother confronted prosecutor George Kepple after he recommended Booher get 15 years in prison at his sentencing next month.

"He threw his hands up," the mother said. "He said, 'Where were you as a parent?' He tried to put all the blame on the parents."

The mother, whose name was withheld to protect her daughter's identity, admitted she might have done more.

"I was raised very strict, not allowed to go anywhere, do anything. I didn't want that for my daughter. So

I gave her a little more leniency," she said.

Kepple did not return calls for comment but told the *Leader-Times* of Kittanning that the case would have been hard to prove because the girls weren't

Andreassi said. "It doesn't excuse him from what he did. But it does raise the question: Where were the parents to allow their children to live with a man who was not a family member?"

He said prosecutors had no physical evidence of the rapes, nor could the girls specify the dates and locations of the assaults. Booher moved three times during the years he assaulted the girls.

For much of that time, he lived in Ford City, a town of about 3,400 in a rural area 40 miles north of Pittsburgh. Ford City has been dying ever since the chief source of jobs, the PPG Industries glass plant, closed in 1993, and many stores are boarded up.

When Booher lived in Ford City, his house was three blocks from the Junior-Senior High School, so it was a convenient place to hang out or play hooky.

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## Students get lesson on health

Wellness Fair features demonstrations on car safety, new food developments

Students using the Student Recreation Center Tuesday could not miss an Interactive Health and Wellness Fair, featuring more than 20 information booths including a vehicle roll-over simulation.

A 12-year veteran of the Texas Department of Safety, Trooper John Gonzalez manned the auto roll-over simulator.

"The important thing as far as this simulated roll-over is for students to wear their seat belt," Gonzalez said. "It's not always going to keep you from being injured, but the main idea is keeping everyone in the vehicle."

The simulator, located outside the

Rec Center, consisted of the cab of a truck, seats and seat belts, two dummies — an adult and infant — and a motor that turns the apparatus.

"I've never taken an infant who has been injured or killed out of an infant seat," Gonzalez said. "A lot of people have the misconception of four-wheel drives as being better in accidents."

Chad Elrod, a senior public relations major from Comanche, and Karston Baker, a junior management information systems major from Dallas, witnessed the car safety demonstration.

"Definitely, a seat belt helps. If you don't wear it, you would be crushed (in an accident)," Elrod said. "It makes you realize you need to wear a seat belt."

Baker was impressed with the simulation.

"It didn't take them (the dummies) very long to get tossed out — just a matter of seconds," Baker said. "It's definitely worth it to buckle up."

Other booths at the fair included a hearing test, alternative foods and a booth about calcium featuring a taste test between conventional milk and long-term homogenized milk that does not need refrigeration until opened.

David Sanceda, a sophomore pre-med major and member of Health Occupation Students of America, the sponsor of the booth, said people could tell the difference quickly.

"Everyone's been saying it's (LTH milk) a little sweeter," he said. "That's

how they've been able to tell."

Sanceda said studies have linked an increased intake of calcium with decreased blood pressure and a lower incidence of stroke.

Kyle Province, a sophomore business major from Llano, participated in the taste test.

"It's not exactly the same thing as real milk, but if you don't have a refrigerator, it would be a good idea," Province said. "I'm not running to the store right now, but it's a good idea."

## Bursar's, Financial Aid should connect

I've just about picked upon everyone on the campus, and it just occurred to me that I never picked on the financial aid office — more importantly on the Bursar's office. To which I then added, how am I supposed to know how your antiquated computer system files my checks?

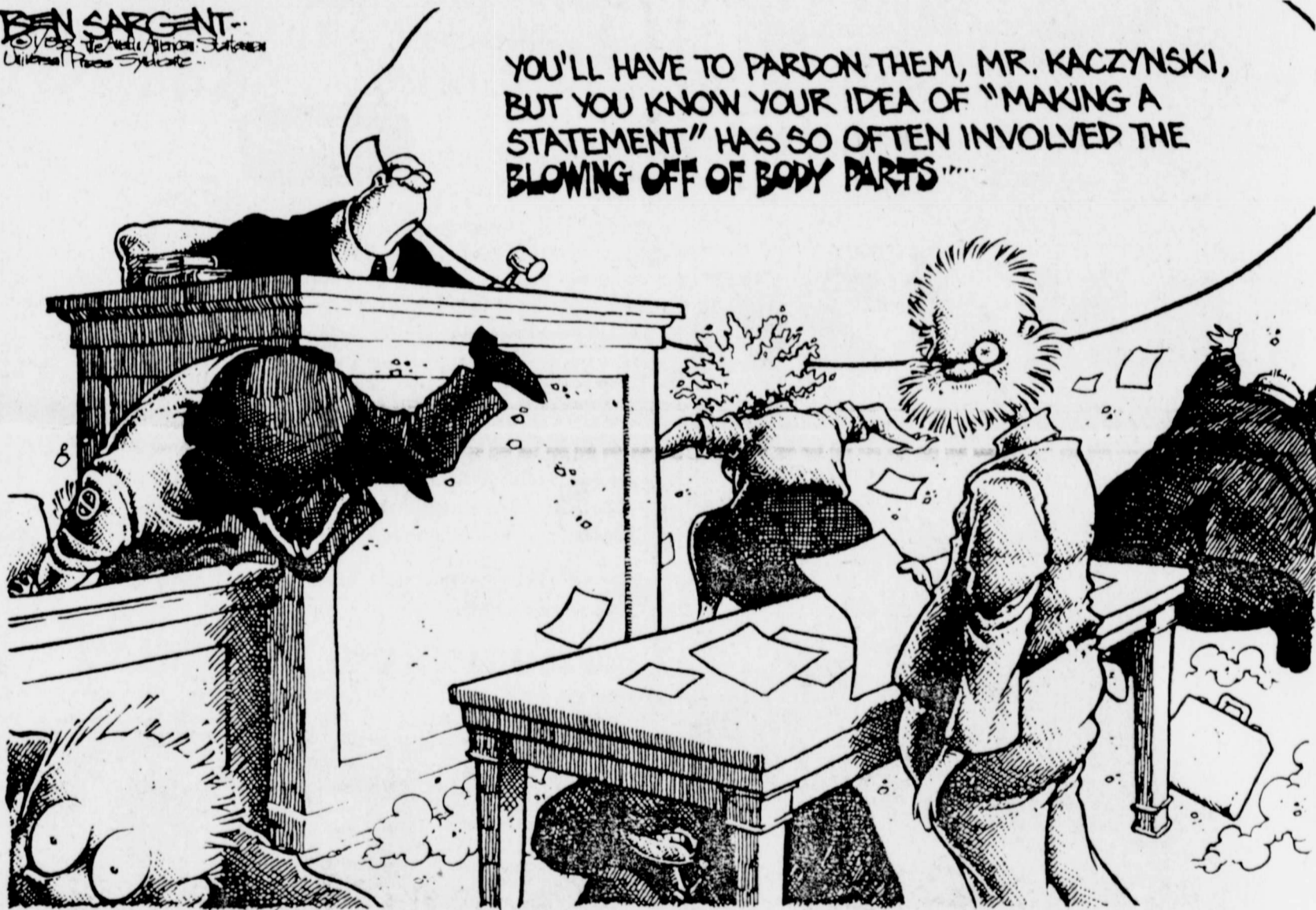
Of course there was no reply, just a dumbfounded look.

## READERS ASK

Readers Ask is printed in *The University Daily* every other Wednesday to answer students' questions about health issues. Drop boxes are set up in the University Center, West Hall and the Student Recreation Center. Not all questions are answered, but most topics will be discussed.

All questions are answered by Jo Henderson, Student Health Services education coordinator.

I want to get a cat but my friend said a dog would be better since I have some allergies. Which is better, a cat or a dog?

Unfortunately, there are no "allergy free" dogs or cats. Even a completely hairless animal produces saliva, and that is what you are allergic to. Since both dogs and cats groom themselves using their saliva, it sticks to their hair and skin and flakes off all over your living quarters.

Cats are more likely to cause allergies than dogs because they groom themselves more often. You might try visiting a friend with a cat and one with a dog just to see if your allergies are worse with one than the other. There is a chance that you might find

a critter you are not allergic to, but I don't know of any "rent-a-pet" places in town where you can "try one out." If you do decide to get a pet, try keeping them out of your bedroom, eliminating carpets and upholstered furniture and keep the house really clean. Also, buy a really high powered vacuum cleaner and get the pet bathed once a week. Finally, a vaccine for cat allergies is being developed and may be on the market soon.

I saw the funniest thing the other day — this lady was walking backwards around a track. Is this a new trend?

Actually, it's called retro walking. It works well for people whose knees hurt when they walk or for people who like walking but are bored with the same old "forward" way. Walking this way also helps strengthen the back and abdominal muscles as well as the hamstrings and quadriceps in the legs. If you decide to try it, be sure to pick a smooth surface, start out slowly watching for other walkers, trees, etc. You might get a partner to walk forward while you are going backward to watch out for obstacles for you, and then you can switch off

and do the same for them. Just be careful of your pace so you don't end up falling on your behind.

Between my job and night classes, I get home in time to eat supper and fall into bed. With this schedule, I've been experiencing more heartburn lately when I lie down, but I feel better when I prop myself up. Why?

Lying flat or bending over can worsen heartburn. Heartburn is caused by acid in the stomach backing up into the lower esophagus. To relieve some of this problem, try these things: elevate the head of your bed at least 6 inches, purchase a foam wedge and place it under your mattress at the head of your bed, try lying on your left side. That position keeps the stomach contents below the juncture with the esophagus or try using over-the-counter antacids. If there is any way to grab supper earlier, it would be better since a large meal just before bedtime adds to this problem.

My roommate broke up with her boyfriend and got off her birth control pills.

Now, after a one night stand, she's pregnant by another guy. Would it

have hurt her to stay on the pill after they broke up, even if she was not planning on having sex for a long while?

The birth control pills of 30 years ago had high levels of estrogen in them, and it was not a good idea to stay on the pill for lengthy periods of time. That isn't true anymore if you are under age 35 (after age 35 you need to check with your health care provider).

You really shouldn't look at them as "birth control" pills because there are a number of excellent reasons to take them aside from birth control.

The benefits of taking the pill include easing cramps during your period, increasing the regularity of your menstrual cycle, decreasing the blood loss and therefore decreasing the incidence of iron deficiency anemia, decreasing the incidence of functional ovarian cysts, decreasing the incidence of ectopic pregnancies and, in the long term, decreasing the incidence of fibrocystic disease of the breast, acute pelvic inflammatory disease, endometrial cancer and ovarian cancer.

So, if you decide to get on them, don't stop just because sex stops.

# Jerry Jones continues interviewing possible candidates for Dallas Cowboys' vacant coaching position

IRVING (AP) — Not since Tom Landry was hired in 1960 have the Dallas Cowboys gone this long without a head coach.

Tuesday marked the 18th day since Barry Switzer's resignation statement was read at a news conference by owner Jerry Jones and a replacement has yet to be named.

When Jones fired Landry, he immediately hired Jimmy Johnson.

When Johnson got his \$2 million resignation check, Jones hired

Switzer a day later.

Jones has twice interviewed former San Francisco coach George Seifert and former UCLA coach Terry Donahue.

He also has interviewed Green Bay offensive coordinator Sherman Lewis and he has a strong interest in Brian Billick of the Minnesota Vikings as offensive coordinator.

Jones didn't name his new coach Super Bowl week as a few predicted he would, but he made sure his mile-

age was a tax write-off.

He interviewed Seifert, Donahue and Lewis the day after the Super Bowl in San Diego.

He previously had interviewed Donahue in Dallas and Seifert in San Diego.

Jones made three trips between the cities last week.

Someone who didn't get inter-

viewed although he was in San Diego was Denver Broncos offensive coordinator Gary Kubiak.

Jones was working the telephones again Tuesday, but wasn't disclosing where he was making the calls.

Jones could be looking for a package deal. Seifert's strong suit at San Francisco was defense and Donahue was a college coach for 20 years.

Both need a strong offensive coordinator and that could be Billick, who has one year remaining on his contract with the Vikings.

One scenario could lead to Jones giving up a 1998 draft pick for Billick

because of the possibility of tampering charges.

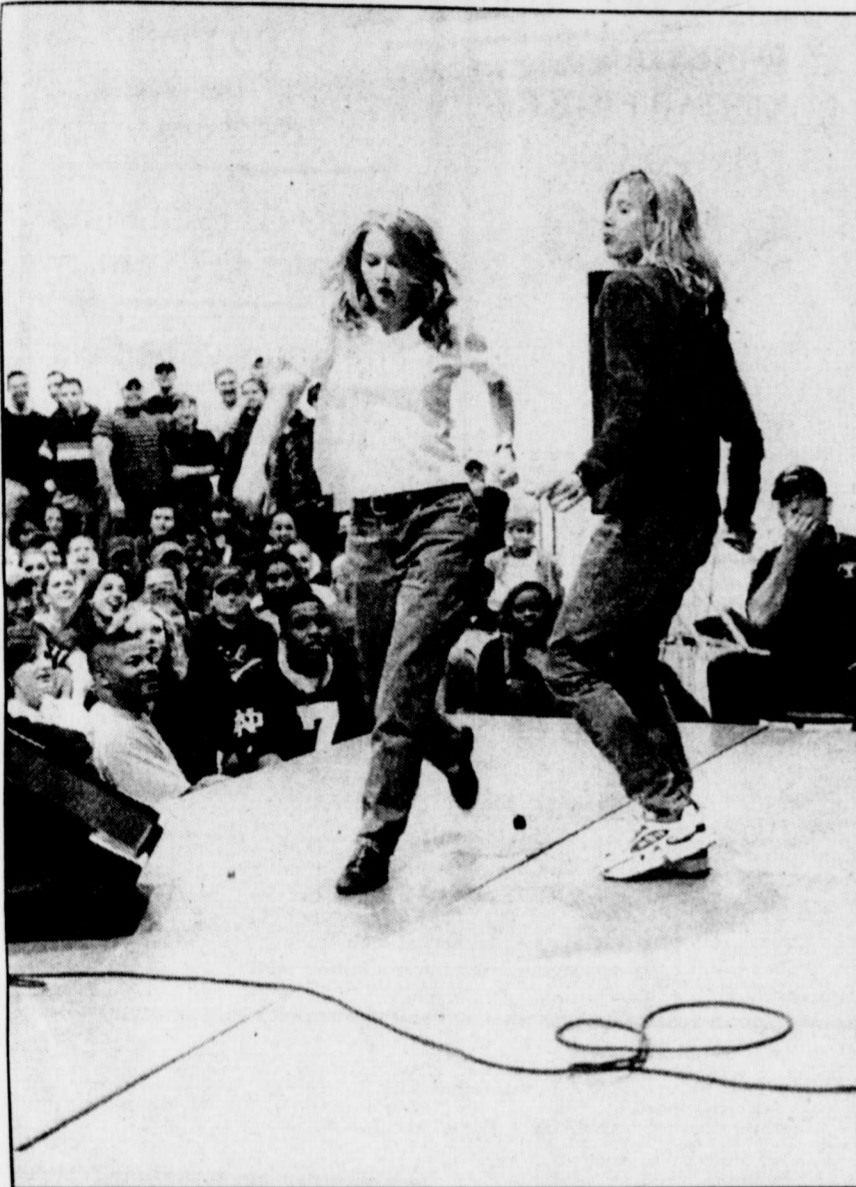
