Saddle Tramps to Retire Remainder Of \$5,000 Bonds Issued in 1954

All outstanding indebtedness of the Haskell Saddle Tramps, represented in the form of bonds issued in 1954, will be retired Sept. 17 with the exception of \$246 remaining due on bonds held by directors of the riding club.
This was announced following a meeting of directors and officers of the club Thursday night, when the annual financial report was made.
Bonds in the amount of approximately \$5,000 were sold in 1954, issued in denomination of \$25, to finance improvements and additions to Saddle Tramp Arena and rodeo plant.
After the first year's operation of the club, which are sponsors of the Rice Springs Roundup, a payment of \$4 was made on each outstanding bond. In the second year, the payment was \$8 on each bond. On Sept. 17 the final payment of \$13 on each bond will be paid to holders of bonds bought in 1954. On 82 bonds bought by directors after the original offering, a \$10 payment will be made, leaving \$3 due on each of the 82 outstanding bonds.
Checks for holders of the bonds will be presented at a supper to be held at the Corral on Monday evening, Sept. 17, it was announced.
Following the supper, officers of the riding club for the coming year will be elected. Slate of officers will be submitted by a nominating committee composed of Gene Hunter, Dr. T. W. Williams and Adel Thomas.
Officers of the club are Jetty V. Clare, president; Shelly Royall, vice president; Fred Gilliam, secretary and treasurer.

Council Re-Appoints Health Officer Approves Tax Rolls and Levy for 1956

Dr. Joe E. Thigpen was re-appointed as City Health Officer for the ensuing year, and tax rolls and city tax levy for 1956 were approved, in the major items of business transacted at a meeting of the City Council Tuesday night.
Draft of a letter of intent, embodying points of agreement between the City of Haskell and J. R. Coody relative to filing for water rights on North Paint Creek, was read and approved. All provisions specified are contingent upon the proposed municipal water supply being developed.
An application to be filed with the State Water Board pertaining to the proposed lake on North Paint Creek has been prepared and will be filed as soon as Mr. Coody can be contacted, officials indicated.
On the tax levy of \$1.50 on each \$100 valuation fixed for 1956, 40c goes to the general fund, 3c to park fund, 20c to street fund, 16c to fire department, and 71c to the interest and sinking fund. "Because the city has no definite policy governing employee benefits and salary schedules, Aldermen will devote a special session to considering setting up a permanent plan covering rates of pay, vacations, sick leave, insurance, and other related matters.
Other routine business transacted at Tuesday night's session included approval for payment of July bills against the city.

Robert R. King, superintendent of schools at Rochester for the past 10 years, was named superintendent of the Haskell public schools Wednesday at a special meeting of the school board of trustees.
He will succeed Supt. C. D. Allen who resigned August 10. Selection of Mr. King was made from more than 20 applicants for the position. E. G. Hattox, president of the local school board said, "The resignation of Allen, who had been head of the school system since July, 1953, was submitted and accepted at a special meeting of the district's board of trustees last Thursday night.
Before going to Rochester, King was superintendent of schools at Girard, and previously had been high school principal and coach at Silverton and Spur.
During his administration, six common school districts were consolidated with the Rochester district enlarging its area from 28 square miles to 84 square miles. Tax valuations in the district increased from \$1 million to more than \$5 million. A \$250,000 building and improvement program for the Rochester school plant was completed in the fall of 1955.
He is past president of the Rochester Rotary Club and had been selected as 1956 nominee for District Governor of Rotary International. He is president of the 91st District Masonic Association. A member of the Methodist Church he is currently teaching a Men's Bible Class.
Mr. and Mrs. King have two daughters, Eileen, 1956 graduate of Rochester high school who plans to attend Texas Western College this fall, and Jean, 9, who is in the fourth grade.
The new Haskell superintendent earned his Bachelor degree at McMurry College, where he was a football and basketball star, and was named to the All-Texas Conference basketball team two years. He received his Master's degree from North Texas State College, where he majored in public school administration.
Mrs. King has a Bachelor's degree from McMurry and has done graduate study toward a master's degree at the University of Colorado. A member of the Rochester faculty, where she taught language arts in the seventh and eighth grades. Mrs. King will teach in primary department of Haskell elementary schools.
Three vacancies remain to be filled in completing the high school faculty, trustees said Wednesday. Needed are a math and science teacher in high school, and combination junior football coach and girls basketball coach in junior high school.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23
Proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas to provide that the commissioners of each county may levy whatever taxes may be necessary to pay the interest on any bonds or other obligations of such county, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and any other purposes so long as the total of such taxes does not exceed Eighty Cents (\$0.80) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners shall not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations providing for the necessary election and form of ballot and providing for the necessary publication and publication.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize the Legislature to amend or repeal Section 48 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide for the retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount of such contributions for each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the State or school district, and shall in no one (1) year exceed the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for each such person; and providing that no person shall be eligible for retirement benefits unless he has rendered ten years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before attaining the age of fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of money paid into the fund.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2
Proposing an amendment to Section 49b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans Land Board so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans Land Board shall be increased to Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000), providing for the issuance of such bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans Land Fund, providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Stamford Council Adopts Regulations For Operation of Boats on New Lake

An ordinance containing regulations on operation of boats on Lake Stamford, recently included in the city limits of that city by annexation, was adopted by the City Council of Stamford Aug. 3.

The lake, located on Paint Creek 11 miles southeast of Haskell in this county, is becoming increasingly popular as a fishing and boating spot. During the spring and summer months, water skiing and surf board riding have also become popular recreation. Regulations embodied in the City Ordinance are designed to make for greater safety on the lake, Stamford city officials said.

A maximum fine of \$200 is specified for violation of any part of the ordinance, but no provision is set out for enforcement.

Before its enactment by the council, a copy of the proposed ordinance was submitted to the Haskell County Commissioners Court which approved it unconditionally in a special session. The ordinance was passed as an emergency measure and will become effective immediately.

Here are the provisions: At night all power-driven boats shall have a white light aft to show all around the horizon and on the fore part of the boat lower than the white light aft, a combination light showing green starboard and a red light to the portside.

All boats shall carry approved life preserving devices, sufficient to sustain afloat every person in the boat and all boats, except sail boats, shall carry at least one

paddle in good condition. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat in a flashed the rays of a search light into the pilot house of a boat in motion, or to hold such a light upon the operator of any boat; except by authorized peace officers.

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat in a manner reasonably calculated to endanger life or property, and the speed of every craft around the docks or landing places and in channels shall be reduced so as to avoid disturbing such docks, landing places and boats, and to prevent the washing of channel banks.

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or navigate any boat while in a state of intoxication or otherwise incapacitated or while unable to operate or navigate such boat properly and safely.

The operation of any boat at a speed in excess of five miles per hour within any harbor, or within 100 feet of any shore line or dock is expressly prohibited.

It shall be unlawful to operate any boat carrying one or more persons in excess of the rated capacity of the boat as stated by the manufacturer thereof, or if said boat be constructed by private individuals, not engaged in the construction of boats for a business, then the rated capacity shall be considered as the reasonable capacity of said boat.

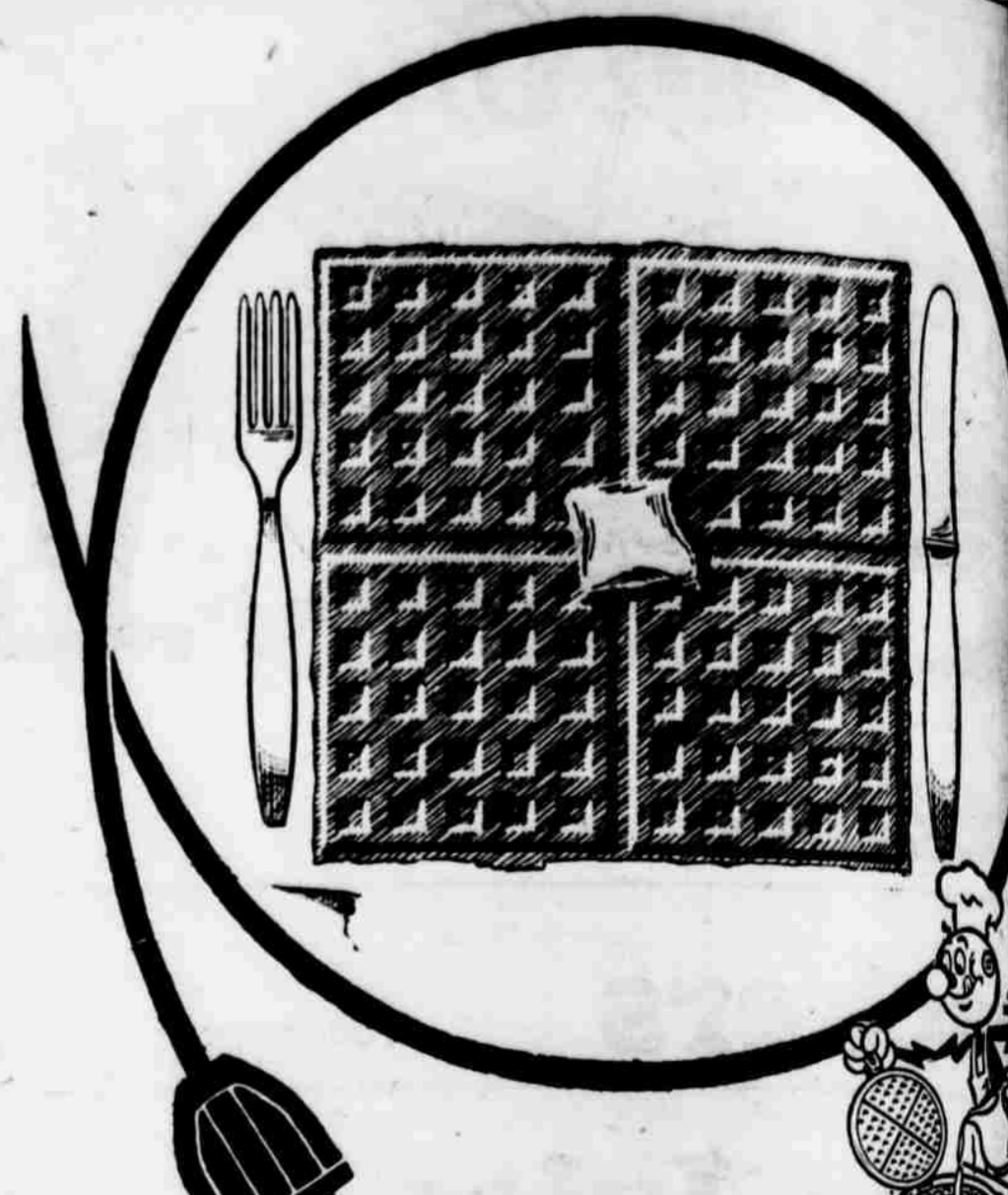

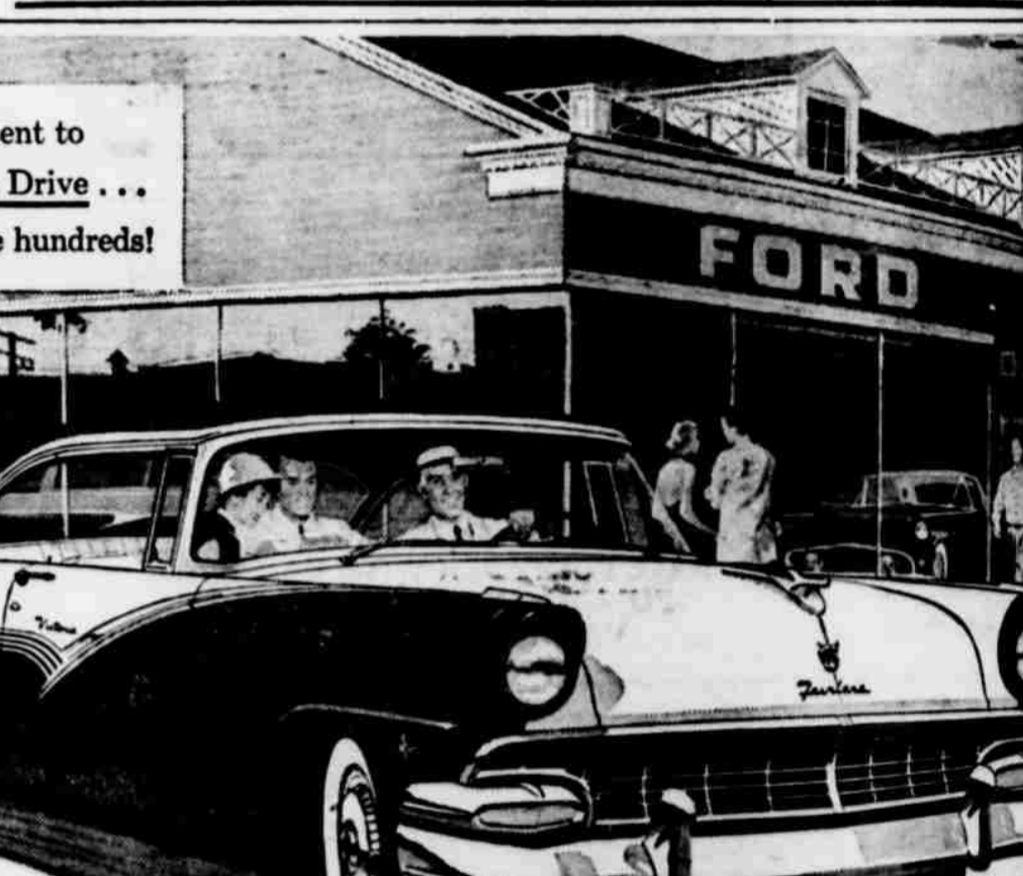

Livestock Prices Fairly Steady at Fort Worth

By TED GOULDY

Fort Worth—Trade was fairly active and prices were generally steady on cattle and calves at Fort Worth Monday. Again buyers showed a market preference for the better quality and the higher yielding types of cattle and calves. Some sales of fed cattle were considered strong compared with last week.

Butcher hogs and packing hogs sold 25 to 50 cents higher. Choice meat type hogs cashed at \$17 to \$17.25, and the less desirable weights and grades sold from \$13 to \$16.50. Packing hogs cashed at \$13 to \$14.50. Stags cashed at \$5 to \$8.

Sheep and lambs were fairly active and generally steady. Choice fat lambs topped again at \$20.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings cashed at \$16.50 to \$22 and common and medium offerings cashed at \$10 to \$16.50.

Fat cows cleared at \$9 to \$11, with a few smooth young cows higher. Canners and cutters sold from \$16 to \$9. Bulls drew \$9 to \$13, with a few lightweight dairy breeds at \$8.

Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$14.50 to \$17, and fancy baby beef calves cashed at \$17 to \$18. Common and medium slaughter calves sold for \$10 to \$14, and culls drew \$8 to \$20.

Good and choice stocker steers cashed at \$17 to \$19.50 and were quotable to \$20 in load lots. Stocker and feeder steer yearlings of good grades sold from \$15 to \$17.50. Replacement heifers and heifer calves were quoted \$2 to \$3 under similar steers. Stocker cows were slow and weak, a few sales from \$8 to \$10.50.

Good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$18 to \$20, and cull to medium lambs cashed at \$10 to \$17. Stocker and feeder lambs drew \$13 to \$16.

Slaughter ewes sold mostly from \$4.50-\$5 with some freshly shorn ewes downward to \$3. Pelt credit and old slaughter ewes were regrades as worth \$1.50 to \$2 or more per hundred, which accounted for the low price offered for those freshly out of the shearing pens. Old wethers drew \$8 to \$12.50. Yearling wethers were reported from 10 to \$16. Old bucks sold around \$4.

Abilene District Has 12 Traffic Deaths in July

Tragedy rode the highways in July in the Abilene Highway Patrol District, reports Captain G. L. Morahan, after scanning the July accident figures. Twelve persons died in the Abilene district in ten fatal accidents, he said. Fatigue and drinking while driving, coupled with speed, was the greatest factor involved in these fatal accidents.

Five people died in Scurry County accidents and two died in Taylor County. Captain Morahan cautioned, "Let's weed out our habits and handicaps, such as late starts, impatience, intolerance, temper, fatigue, 'little law' violations, speeding, willingness to take a chance, and downright bull-headedness. Let's rid ourselves of the notion that it is every man for himself. Let's try remedying, teaching, and developing regard for the other fellow."

"An automobile is as deadly as a gun in man's hand, we must respect it, keep it in top-notch condition, and as we use it, keep it under control," he reminded.

Total valuation of property rendered on the city tax rolls for the current year is \$3,456,434, an increase of almost \$40,000 over last year, according to City Secretary T. J. Arbuckle. Total renditions for 1955 amounted to \$3,416,742.

Taxable value of real estate rendered for 1956 was listed \$2,599,745 along with personal property valued at \$856,689. Tax revenue from the 1956 rolls is figured at \$51,846, based on a levy of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation.
