All outstanding indebtedness of the Haskell Saddle Tramps, rep-resented in the form of bonds is-sued in 1954, will be retired Sept. Bonds in the amount of ap-17 with the exception of \$246 re-maining due on bonds held by di-rectors of the riding club. This was announced following a meeting of directors and officers

proximately \$5,000 were sold in 1954, issued in denomination of \$25, to finance improvements and additions to Saddle Tramp Arena

additions to Saddle Tramp Arena and rodeo plant. After the first year's operation of the club, which are sponsors of the Rice Springs Roundup, a pay-ment of \$4 was made on each out-standing bond. In the second year, the payment was \$8 on each bond. On Sepf. 17 the final payment of \$13 on each bond will be paid to be holders of bonds bought in 1954. 

was superintendent of schools at Girard, and previously had been high school principal and coach at Silverton and Spur.

During his administration, six common school districes were consolidated with the Rochester district enlarging its area, from 28 square miles to 84 square miles. Tax valuations in the district increased from \$1 million to more than \$5 million. A \$250,000 building and improvement program for the Rochester school plant was completed in the fall of 1955.

He is past president of the Ro-chester Rotary Club and had been selected as 1956 nominee for District Governor of Rotary International. He is president of the 91st District Masonic Association. A member of the Methodist Church he is currently teaching a Men's Bible Class.

Mr. and Mrs. King have two daughters, Eileen, 1956 graduate of Rochester high school who plans to attend Texas Western College this fall, and Jean, 9, who is in the fourth grade.

The new Haskell superintendent earned his Bachelor degree at McMurry College, where he was a football and basketball star, and was named to the All-Texas Conference basketball team two years. He received his Master's degree from North Texas State College, where he majored

in public school administration. Mrs. King has a Bachelor's de-gree from McMurry and has done graduate study toward a mas-ter's degree at the University of Colorado.
