### Blood drive set in Bronte

The East Coke County EMS will sponsor a blood drive in Bronte Saturday, September 6, from 10:00 am until 2:00 pm at the WTU offices at 301 W. Main St.

United Blood Services of San Angelo will conduct the drive, where organziers hope to draw 15 to 20 donors. Donors are asked to provide identification, such as a driver's license or UBS donor card. Donors are also asked to know the name of any medication they are currently taking.

Appointments are available, but not mandatory, by contacting Gwen Baker at 473-2201. Donors with appointments will be taken before walk-ins. The entire donation procedure takes approximately 45 minutes.

United Blood Services of San Angelo must collect more than 300 units of blood per week to adequately supply area hospitals. There are approximately 20 hospitals in the UBS service area, including those hospitals in San Angelo, Big Spring, and Brownwood.

UBS representatives say that, after this summer, the need for blood is stronger than ever.

"This has been a very difficult summer for blood collection, not just in San Angelo, but nationwide," said Angie Tyson, UBS Community Relations Representative. "The blood drive in Bronte is especially important because it's scheduled after Labor Day, which is typically a time for higher blood usage."



### Farm Bureau holds convention

The Annual Coke-Sterling Farm Bureau County Convention was held in the Robert Lee Recreation Center on Saturday, August 23, 1997. A fish fry supper was prepared by the Board of Directors and office staff. It was served to approximately 110 members.

The business section of the meeting followed with the minutes of the last meeting and a membership report being read by all. An insurance report was given by Agency Manager, Tommy Sisemore. Robert Brown reported for the Resolutions Committee stating that there were no new resolutions at this time. Jeff Eubanks reported for the nominating committee that we have 4 members up for reelection to the County Board.

A very informative speech was then given by the guest speaker, Texas Farm Bureau Executive Director, Vernie Glasson. He stated that Texas Farm Bureau has had a good year and membership was expected to grow by approximately 5,000 member families this year. Currently TFB has 312,000 member families. He discussed the legislative issues that Farm Bureau has been involved in at Austin, such as the Property Tax Relief, Endangered Species Act, and the Death Tax.  Very few children under 8 years of age can deal safely with traffic. \*These children are at risk because they are impulsive and tend to do things without thinking first. \*They believe that if they can see a driver, the driver can see them. \*They believe cars can stop instantly. \*Few can judge the speed of traffic or distances. \*A child's field of vision is one-third of an adult's. \*They do not recognize unsafe situations. \*They are easily hidden by bushes, parked cars, etc.

Advice for parents...

\*Be examples for their chil-\*Remember that younger children are at the highest risk of being involved in an accident because they have not yet developed a sense of danger. \*Cross the streets hundreds of times with children before they cross by themselves. \*Supervise children at all times until they prove they are safe pedestrians even when distracted. \*Structure child's play areas in locations away from any type of vehicular traffic. \*Provide repetition and positive reinforcement in order for children to develop skills.

### Eating healthy

It is never too late to benefit from a healthy diet.

With increased age comes an increased risk of developing heart disease or suffering a stroke. However, maintaining a well balanced, low-fat, low-sodium diet can lessen

"Dairy products are among the most important foods for the elderly," said Lynne Scott, a registered dietitian at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Foods such as low-fat milk, yogurt, cheese or frozen yogurt are the best sources of calcium. Calcium is particularly valuable for maintaining bone density and assisting in the healing process as we get older.

Guidelines developed by scientists who met at the National Institutes of Health recommend that people over 51 consume 1,500 milligrams of calcium a day - that is about five eight-ounce cups of milk.

While foods high in calcium are vital for the elderly, eating a variety of foods can keep your diet from becoming stale and also ensure that you are getting the necessary vitamins and minerals.

### No "Mad Cow" in Texas

No signs of "mad cow disease" have been found in Texas by the state's only laboratory which handles bovine

autopsies.

Bovine spongiform encephalophathies (BSE) is a transmissible disease of which Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease is the human form.

Recent news articles have reported incidences of Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease in East Texas. However, the Texas Department of Health issued a statement in late June saying no evidence of BSE in cattle or the new variant of Creuzfeldt-Jakob disease in humans has been found in the United States.

Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease is found in levels of approximately one case per million people in the United States, but the new variant has been found only in England and France.





### Color not a factor in ground meat safety

The US Department of Agriculture recently announced that color is no longer a factor when determining if ground meats have been cooked long enough to be eaten safely.

New evidence shows that harmful bacteria like E.coli can remain active in ground meat even after it appears to be well done. At other times, meat may prematurely brown. Hamburger, and all other ground meats, must reach a temperature of 160 degrees Fahrenheit in order to be safe.


Dr. Gary Acuff, associate professor of food science at Texas A&M University, said parents should continue to teach their children not eat ground meat that shows pink.

Time running out to obtain crop insurance

Ron Berryhill, Director of the Oklahoma City Regional Service Office, Risk Managment Agency, announced recently the sales closing date for crop insurance is September 30 for wheat. Last year in Texas, \$171.5 million in protection (liability) was provided to producers through more than 20,000 policies.

"The freeze of last April is a vivid reminder that eventually everybody will have to cope with crop losses or low

prices," said Ron Berryhill.
"Appropriate crop or revenue insurance protection will help you survive these hardships."

Sales closing dates are significant because signing up for insurance, changing the crop insured or level of protection, and changing insurance providers, must be done prior to the announced date. Sales closing dates vary by crop and location.

Beginning with the 1998 crop year, crop insurance is available exclusively through crop insurance agents. USDA will continue to subsidize all policies, establish policy terms and conditions, set rates, and guarantee funds for the payment of approved claims. Although a producer's policy will be randomly transferred from USDA to an insurance company, producers have the right to choose their own

The reason? People at risk for possibly fatal flu complications should not be caught unvaccinated just in case the flu season begins early.

The largest group at risk is the elderly, but people younger than 65 with chronic health problems, particularly those involving the heart or lungs, have a high risk of hospitalization during the annual flu outbreak.

### WHAT IS LUNG DISEASE?

Lung disease affects the larger airways that connect to the lungs or the lungs themselves. It is often caused by various things that irritate the airways and lungs. Here are several suggestions to help persons with lung disease breathe easier and more productively.

PURSED-LIP BREATHING: Take a slow, deep breath through your nose counting to yourself for a count of two. Bring your lips together as if you are going to whistle. Slowly breathe out through your lips counting to yourself for a count of four. This exercise slows your breathing and helps keep air in your lungs a few seconds longer.

STOMACH BREATHING: Lie on your back with your knees bent. Place one hand on stomach. Place other hand on chest. Breathe in and out slowly. The hand on your stomach should rise when you breathe in. The hand on your chest should be still. This exercise gives your lungs more room allowing you to breathe in more air.

BREATHING CAN ALSO BE IMPROVED BY: Avoiding such



things as smoking, smog, dusts, vapors, extremes in temperature. Get plenty of rest, remain calm. Avoid stress. Eat three well-balanced meals, or five smaller meals per day. Drink six to eight glasses of water per day. Check with your doctor about flu vaccine. Take your medication exactly as prescribed.





### Sheep and Goat Field Day set

Brush sculpting, a producers' lamb feeding program, industry updates, and special recognition of a veteran newsman, are just some of the topics scheduled for the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center's 24th Annual Sheep and Goat Field Day September 4. The Center is located north of San Angelo on US Highway 87. Registration runs from 8:30-9:30 am. Morning field tours begin at 9:30 am.

A major field day highlight is the special recognition of long-time farm broadcaster Roddy Peeples. Peeples has been a strong supporter of the Texas A&M University system throughout his career. He is the founder of the nationally known Voice of Southwest Agriculture (VSA) network. Peeples began the network with two affiliates after moving to Midland in 1964. Another 60 stations were added over the years. Peeples sold his business in 1995 to Clear Channel Radio of San Antonio. He and his wife, Bettimae, now live in Dallas where he remains VSA's Senior Farm Broadcaster.

The morning's tour stops include the "Pasture to Packer" program, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service lamb feeding project that allows producers to gain experience in retained ownership of their animals to slaughter. The program also provides performance data useful to producers wishing to improve their flock's efficiency. Drs. Frank Craddock, Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist at San Angelo, and Rick Machen, Extension Livestock Specialist at Uvalde, will man the stop. "Brush Sculpting" the art of managing brush for optimum livestock, wildlife, and recreational use, is also a tour stop. Brush Busters originators, Drs. Allan McGinty, Extension Range Specialist and Darrell Ueckert. Professor in Rangeland Ecology & Management, both of San Angelo, will join Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension Wildlife Specialist also based in San Angelo, with the instruction.
