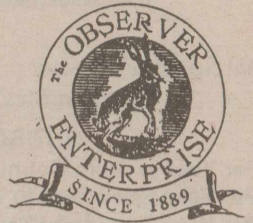

Ft. Chadbourne fundraiser nets over \$23,000 to aid restoration

The Fort Chadbourne Foundation held a fundraiser at the Fort Saturday evening, June 12th. The Foundation was set up by Garland Richards to aid in funding restoration efforts at the Fort.

Storms Friday evening and Saturday morning had things off to a shakey start. The large tent flew into power lines and electricity was off most of the morning.

Wade Stautzenberger and Gary Sam Williams, West Texas Utilities employees in Coke County, were able to get power back after the tent poles were unraveled from the power lines. A few hours before the cannon boomed to start the event, volunteers finished putting up tables and chairs in the reconstructed tent.

The Fort Concho Living History Unit brought in the regimental colors and fired the cannon that Garland had made for the event. Following the firing of the cannon, the Fort Concho soldiers fired their cannon and the Fort Phantom Irregulars sang the Star Spangled Banner.

The silent auction, which

ran during the course of the evening, was announced and people began moving toward the buffet, catered by The Shed. The Board of Directors was then introduced to the audience of over 250 people. Speakers for the evening included Lisa Sanders, a representative with the Texas Forts Trail, and Jody Grigsby, a representative from the Nonprofit Resource Center in Abilene.

The Fort Phantom Irregulars made their debut, followed by cowboy poet Sammy Davis. Garland told the crowd a little of the history of the Fort while the silent auction bids were tallied. Auction results were then announced. The Fort Phantom Irregulars ended the evening, which turned out to be a calm and beautiful night, with an Irish blessing song. The guests remarked on what an enjoyable time they had as they were driven back to their cars in wagons driven by David Papasan and Mac Sayles, under the escort of the Fort Chadbourne firetruck. Over \$23,000 was donated to the Fort Chadbourne Foundation at the event.

Bronte residents are reminded to keep their animals on their property at all times. It is unlawful to permit any animal to run loose in the city. Any animal running loose can be declared a nuisance.

Residents are also reminded to have their animals vaccinated against rabies at least once a year. Animals should wear the tags showing that they have been vaccinated at all times.

Failure to comply with the City's Animal Ordinance can lead to a fine of up to \$200.

All proceeds from the mini camp will go to help the color guard raise money for camp

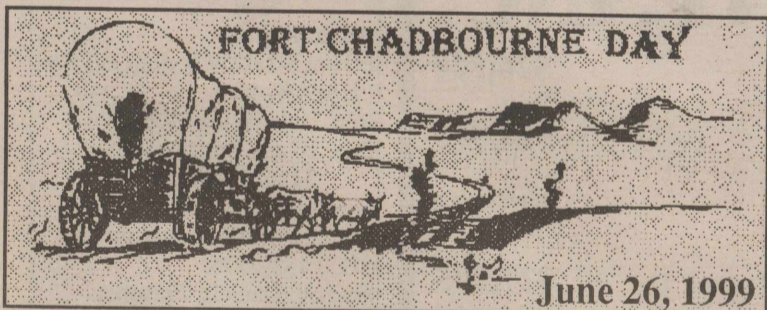

WTRC lamb and meat goat sale a success

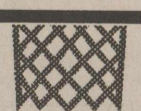

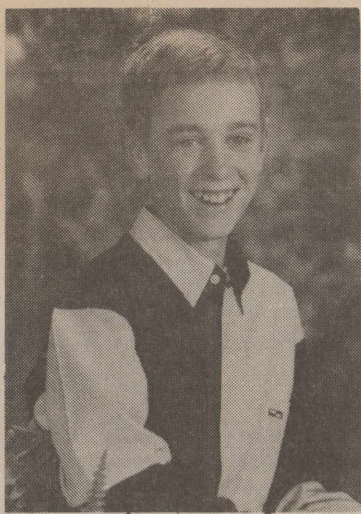

Skywarn News

Thursday, 9:30 pm, the National Weather Service advised of a Severe Storm headed for Coke County. At 9:45 pm there was baseball size hail at Colorado City. This was a slow moving storm, only 5 MPH. This storm was moving NNW. At 11:05 pm they gave Robert Lee the All Clear.

Friday at 6:00 pm the Weather Service advised of severe storms headed our way. The watch covered the western half of the Concho Valley. The spotters didn't see anything but dark clouds until 10:33 pm when a tornado passed south of Colorado City, in a SE direction at 20 MPH. The base of this thunder storm was at least 10 miles wide. Baseball size hail was seen in Roscoe. Robert Lee spotters reported an impressive cloud formation with a lightning show.

A tornado was seen in Roby and Sylvester moving SSW. It went through Maryneal at about 11:40 pm. We were having no activity so our spotters went to Blackwell to help. The only damage he saw was the bark skinned off a lot of trees, and a lot of debris on the roads. A pickup with trailer attempted to cross a low water crossing and got washed in to Eagle Creek. They rescued him from his truck. Channel 8 news crew was there and recorded it. It was aired on Saturday.

Saturday morning at about 8:45 am Robert Lee was hit by a severe thunderstorm. We were not notified it was coming. We had winds of 50 plus MPH with gusts up to 65 MPH. The rain was coming sideways, out of the north. My rain gauge showed 9 tenths of an inch of rain. Wildcat Creek reported as much as 1 1/2 inches. The straightline winds caused considerable damage. Skywarn leader Bud Thompson reported the damage he saw, to the weather service, which included, my roof came down off the porch of my mobile home, the press booth on the grandstand at the high school football field landed in the bleachers. A mobile home at 1st and Colorado had skirting blown in on

the north side and out on the south side, a wooden fence at Zero Street and Colorado was blown down. There was quite a bit of street flooding, and anything not tied down, such as toys and lawn chairs ended up in the neighbor's yard. Tree limbs and shingles were scattered on the streets.

Saturday night and Sunday the clouds passed over, but did not drop any rain. The Colorado River overflowed its banks in some areas, but did not affect Robert Lee.

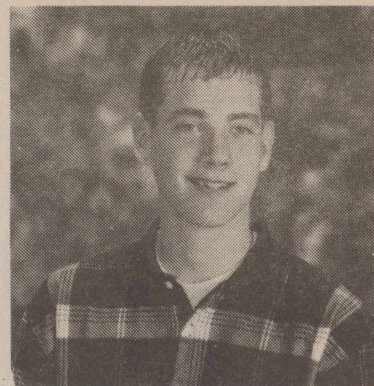

Grants available for preservation projects

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has established deadlines for the 1999 transportation enhancement grant program. The federal Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (TEA-21) will award a total of \$128 million in Texas to reimburse up to 80 percent of allowable costs on selected projects. The application deadline is August 9, 1999.

Created by Congress and managed by TxDOT, TEA-21 money is for transportation related projects that enhance roadways. Seven of the 12 qualifying categories for the grant awards involve historic preservation activities. Projects may include: acquiring scenic or historic properties;

tourist and welcome centers along historic railway facilities and canals; establishing transportation museums; archeological planning and research; and more.
