worthwhile project that insures the county and towns are not invaded by various predators. Without proper trapping procedures, predators can be devastating not only to livestock, but also to our wildlife populations and eventually they can move into our towns and harm pets or people. You only need to look at places like Austin, where coyotes, bobcats and feral dogs are moving into town and causing damage and possibilities of rabies.
From October 1, 2005 until March 31, 2006 twelve Texas Wildlife Service employees which included our county trapper, aircraft pilots, aircraft gunners, trouble shooters, district supervisor, and other county trappers assisted in predator control in Coke County and took 23 coyotes, 51 bobcats, 1 feral dog, 10 red fox, 54 gray fox, 11 feral hogs and 135 rac coons. This many predators eliminated means dollars to producers whether you raise livestock or wildlife. Predators can have a devastating effect on fawn survival, turkey and quail. To maintain our county trapping program, it takes the involvement of landowners and producers regardless of species raised or size of your place. Dues for the trapping program are figured at seven cents per acre per year. This is pretty cheap compared to price of calves, lambs, kid goats or whitetails that could be lost due to predation.

Dues can be mailed to Coke County Trappers Association at Box 170, Robert Lee, Tx 76945 or brought by the County Extension office in the courthouse.
Participation in the trappers association is essential to the continuance of the program. If you have not joined, we invite you to participate and encourage your neighbors, new landowner and other producers to join.

Milk does a
body good
Texas A\&M Health
Science Center
As young girls enter thei eens, more are turning from milk to sodas.
A recently completed nineyear study of more than 2,300 teen-age girls by Wesleyan University and others found that milk consumption decreased more than 25 percent. However, soda intake increased almost threefold during the course of the study.
Decreased milk consumption
results in less calcium intake. That's a problem, doctors say because adolescence is a critical period for accumulating peak bonemass.
"Eating foods rich in calcium can help make bones and teeth strong at any time of our life, but in adolescence, we can contribute the most to our skeleton," said Loise Gilmer, R.D., pediatric clinical dietitian in the Texas A\&M Health Science Center College of Medicine
"Our skeleton contains 99 percent of all of our calcium stores, and 45 percent of that skeleton is formed during the pre-teen and teen years. This period of dramatic change requires more calcium to produce the healthiest of bones and teeth. Unfortunately, if we don't get adequate calcium during this active growth time, then we can't make up for it later in life."
Researchers believe calcium uptake in the skeleton decreases significantly in the mid-20s, and calcium is slowly released from the bones throughout adulthood. Inadequate calcium can lead to higher risk for osteoporosis, a painful bone disease, and various dental problems.
To promote regular milk and calcium consumption in both boys and girls, Gilmer suggests getting rid of the competition. That means eliminating or drastically reducing the number of drink choices in your household, especially sweetened drinks, as they add nothing but empty calories.
"Adolescents and young adults need four servings of a high-calcium food source every day," Gilmer said. "Any diet that allows the frequent consumption of high calorie and/or nutrientpoor drinks is not a healthy one. You have to walk two miles to work off the calories of one 12 -ounce soda."

## Falls Among Older

 Adults Can Be Deadlyby Sheila Chambers
Falls in senior adults - people ages 65 or older - are the leading cause of injury and death in that age group. This fact recently hit home and became a reality to me - My father died in November of last year after suffering multisystem organ failure secondary to injuries sustained from a fall. Dad was 78 -years-old, suffered from many chronic ailments common to senior adults but overall had a very active, fulfilling lifestyle. He had good neighbors and many friends. He worked hard all his life and retired just four years ago!
As a nursing home administrator and attuned to the threat and risks of falls in seniors, I felt that Dad was relatively safe. He lived in a top-notch adult retirement community with security services. My brother, sisters and I had developed a buddy-call system to check on Dad. But Dad liked his independence, coming and going as he wanted, and we kids probably infringed on his privacy.
Dad apparently fell on a Sunday morning while taking a shower. After numerous calls remained unanswered, my sister went to check on him and found him Monday afternoon; Dad had been down about a day and half. He died two and a half weeks later.
The National Center for Injury Prevention and Control cite some interesting facts about Senior Falls:

- For people ages 65 and older, falls are the leading cause of injury and death.
- Falls are the underlying cause of a large proportion of fatal traumatic brain injuries.
- The risk of falling increases exponentially with age.
- Older adults who have fallen previously or who stumble frequently are two to three times more likely to fall within the next year.
- Two-thirds to one-half of falls in seniors 65 and older occur in or around the home
- At least $95 \%$ of hip fractures among older adults are caused by falls.
- Fall-related death rates and hip fracture hospitalization rates have been increasing.
The Center also reported frequent risk factors for falling: - Being female
- Being white
- Having had a previous fall
${ }^{\text {a }}$ Having lower body weakness or gait or balance problems.
${ }^{\text {a }}$ Having physical limitations, wearing glasses or having other visual problems.
- Having more than one chronic disease, history of stroke, Parkinson's Disease, neuromuscular disease, urinary incontinence, or postural hypotension.
- Being cognitively impaired.
- Taking more than four medications or using psychoactive medications.
- Wearing shoes with thick, soft soles (example, jogging shoes).
The most effective interventions to preventing falls include exercise, medication review with modification, reduction of environmental hazards (examples - install grab bars, remove trip hazards, wear

proper clothing and shoes), have vision checked and wear proper eyewear. In a person with a history of falls, hip pads may be effective in preventing hip fractures. Calcium along with Vitamin D is critical at all ages and in conjunction with other medications that increase bone mass may reduce fracture risk. A buddy-call system and/or a medical alert device could also alert help for a fallen senior.

Order birth \& death certificates online
Birth and death certificates can be ordered online, the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) announced recently.
Previously, the certificates could be requested only by mail, fax or by visiting the DSHS vital records unit in Austin or one of the 490 local registrars' offices throughout the state.
Certificates may be ordered online at www.texasonline.com. DSHS Chief Operating Officer Randy Fritz said, "Customers needing copies of birth or death certificates should find the speed and convenience of the new online ordering system a real timesaver.'
He clarified that while certificates can be ordered online, they cannot be downloaded or printed.
Online ordering of a birth certificate for a birth that occured in the last 75 years is limited to the individual for whom a birth certificate is requested and to the mother or father of that individual.

Online ordering of death certificates for deaths that occurred within the last 25 years is limited to the surviving spouse, a parent of the deceased and to certain funeral directors.
Verification of any birth, death, marriage or divorceregardless of date-also is available online.

## Drinking for Health

To keep your body wel hydrated, consume enough water-eight to twelve cups-throughout the day Because milk, juice, and some other beverages are mostly water, they count toward your daily wate intake. So does water from solid foods, although you can't really measure it
Caffeinated beveragescoffee, tea, and some sof drinks-and alcoholic bever ages aren't your body's best sources of water. Caffeine and alcohol act like diuretics, causing the body to lose water through increased urination. Decaffeinated beverages, however, don't have a diuretic effect.
If you need to increase your water intake..
*Take water breaks during the day instead of coffee breaks. If you're a subconscious "sipper," keep a cup of water on your desk.
*when you buy a vending machine or convenience store drink, reach for bottled water.
*"Water down" your meals and snacks. Complement food with water, milk, or juice. Occasionally, start your meals with soup
*When you walk by a water fountain, take a drink!
*Refresh yourself at snack time with juice, milk, or sparkling water.
*Alternate sparkling water and alcoholic drinks at social gatherings.
*Before, during, and after any physical activity, drink water, especially in hot weather. Consume 4 to 8 ounces of water every fifteen to twenty minutes while you exercise. Don't wait until you feel thirsty!
*Keep a bottle of water with you as you commute, while you work, as you run errands. Travel with a supply of bottled water, too, even for day outings. Airline travel promotes dehydration.

## Know what to <br> expect from <br> investments

If your investment portfolio is even moderately diversified, you probably own both stocks and bonds. And that's a good idea, because diversification is essential to your success as an investor. But you also should know what to expect from different types of investments-because the more you know, the more likely you are to make the right moves.
Unfortunately, some people's expectations get distorted, due to what may be happening with their investments. For example, a couple of years back, many investors saw the value of their bonds rise sharply, causing some to look at these investments as "growth" vehicles. But is that an accurate assessment?
Probably not-although some recent statistics are
quite interesting. From December 1999 through February 2003, long-term government bonds rose about 13 percent, while the S-\&-P 500 -one of the most wellknown stock market indexesfell by about the same amount. This is the secondgreatest period, ever of superior bond returns relative to stocks-and one of the few in the past 80 years, a time in which stocks have consis tently outperformed all other investments.
While you can't base all your investment decisions on what has gone before, it's generally a good idea not to plan on selling your bonds before they mature and make a profit. Instead, plan for what bonds do provide: current income in the form of monthly or quarterly interest checks. As long as you own your bond, you will always receive the same amount in interest (assuming the issue doesn't default), no matter how much the bond's current value fluctuates.
Many stocks also provide current income in the form of dividends. But if you're like a lot of people, you buy stocks for their growth potential. In other words, when you buy stocks, you anticipate the price going up so that when it's time to sell, you can make a profit.
And although past performance is not an indication of future results, stock prices have risen steadily over the long term. In fact, from 1926 through 2005, large-company stocks provided an average annual return of more than 10 percent, while small-company stocks returned, on average, more than 12 percent, according to Ibbotson Associates, an investment research firm.
Of course, you can't assume that, for a given year, your stocks will return 10 percent, 12 percent-or anything at all. In the short term, stocks go down as well as up, so you shouldn't be shocked at losing principal over a single year, or perhaps a couple of years in a row.
But if you buy an array of high-quality stocks and hold them for the long term-at least five to 10 yearsyou increase your chances to achieve some growth.
Ultimately, by knowing what to expect from your stocks, bonds and any other securities you may own, you can draw up a long-term investment strategy appropri ate for your individual needs goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. You may want to work with a financial professional to help evaluate your holdings, what you might anticipate from them and what changes you may need to make.
Nobody can predict the future. But you can plan for it-by having a clear set of expectations, based on a thorough knowledge of your investments.


## Looking for the

 Perfect Goat A Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researcher said most goat producers picture the "perfect goat" as being one that would produce more kids that grow faster, and remain healthy while doing so. This goat also would have lower production inputs because of better health.Dr. Dan Waldron, Experiment Station geneticist at San Angelo, said the key to better health in goats often is tied directly to their resistance to internal parasites
Does the perfect goat exist? Waldron is determined to find out.
"The meat goat industry has experienced substantial growth in the last decade, and much of this growth is in areas outside the traditional goat-raising strongholds of West Texas," Waldron said. "Dry West Texas has relatively few internal parasite problems, but many goats are now being raised in wetter climates. Wetter climates are better environments for parasites that cause problems for goats. Goat producers use anthelmintics (dewormers) to treat the problem. Unfortunately, those drugs are increasingly losing their effectiveness."
To compound the problem, Waldron said the relatively low numbers of sheep and goats make them 'minor species' when compared to other livestock. That dubious distinction causes them to fall below the radar of pharmaceutical companies, he said. The companies are reluctant to expend the dollars necessary to have effective anthelmintics approved by the Food and Drug Administration because they may not be profitable enough.
But there is hope on the horizon, and it's not a new dewormer. Several years ago, Waldron helped The American Boer Goat Association develop a genetic evaluation program called Boer Goat Improvement Network or "BGIN." The project, funded by the National Sheep Industry Improvement Center, provides Boer goat breeders with genetic information needed to select animals with superior genetic merit for growth or reproduction.
This year, the center funded a second "sister" project with the association and the National Sheep Improvement Program. The long-term goal of this Texas A\&M University and Virginia Tech University project is to develop genetic evaluation procedures for determining
