 The Board of Directors of the West Coke County Hospital District met November 30, 2009, in regular session in Roger Alexander's office at the Robert Lee Care Center, since the conference room had just received a fresh coat of paint. Members present were Mary Bessent, Dessie Kendall, and Pat Stephens. Others present were Janie Munoz, Business Office Manager, and Roger Alexander, Administrator. President Bessent called the meeting to order at 9:36 am, and declared there was a quorum. She also gave the invocation. There were no visitors.

Absent Board members Marilyn White and Dessie Kendall were excused from previous meetings. The minutes from the October meeting were approved.

In the staffing update, Roger shared the need of an RN/LVN, and a new housekeeper was hired. Roger also reported there are currently 8 residents in the Alzheimer's unit. The aviary was moved into the unit due to some painting being done in the dining room, and the residents in the unit are thoroughly enjoying the birds, so it will be left there for the present time.

The Board discussed accounts receivable, and no action was needed at this

time. In discussing public relations, the Board was informed the radio ads will continue to run through January, and gifts of home-made rolls will be shared with the discharge planners again this year.

In the report on capital projects, Roger informed the Board the new windows have been installed and are already making a very positive difference in the climate of the facility. A previously owned pick-up truck has been purchased for use at the facility.

Roger reported 289 people fed during the annual Thanksgiving meal at the facility in November. The decorations were very festive, and the food, turkey and dressing, ham, and all the trimmings, was delicious. Smiles were abundant, and it was a wonderful day of celebration for everyone involved. The staff and employees are certainly to be

commended for a job well done.

After sneaking a peek at the calendar, the Board discovered that December promises to be a very busy month at the facility. In addition to the daily activities, some of the residents will be traveling to San Angelo December 11 to enjoy the Tour of Lights, and have dinner out. The resident's Christmas party will be December 15, and on December 17, they will enjoy the children's Christmas play at the school. The employees Christmas party will be December 16, complete with snacks, prizes, and surprises. Roger Claus will be in attendance again this year, with all his wonderful helpers, to make the afternoon a success.

The financial statements were discussed and approved.

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### Brewer Scholarship Fund Challenge

Since 2003, the Jack and Nina Brewer Scholarship Fund has awarded over 80 scholarships totaling more than \$48,000 to Robert Lee High School graduates. Nina Brewer has continued to add additional gifts to the Fund each year and friends and family have also made over 100 gifts to this fund in honor of Nina and in memory of Jack. The White-Tailed deer is the most popular big-game animal in North America, and is an amazing example of an animal that adapts and perseveres. As hunters go into the woods in pursuit of this graceful animal, here is a quiz from Whitetails Unlimited to see how much you really know about the whitetail's biology, behavior and history.

**80th Birthday!** On Thanksgiving Day, a surprise 80th Birthday party was held honoring LeDrew Arrott (right).

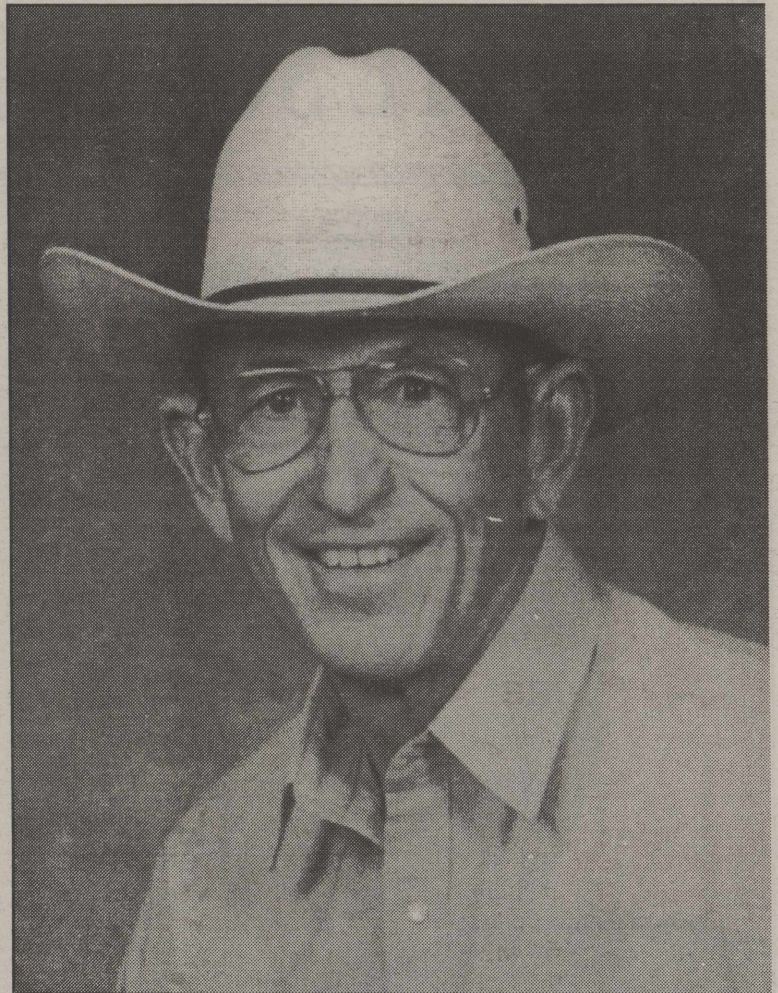
The special day of thanks and celebration was held in the home of LeDrew and Bobbie.

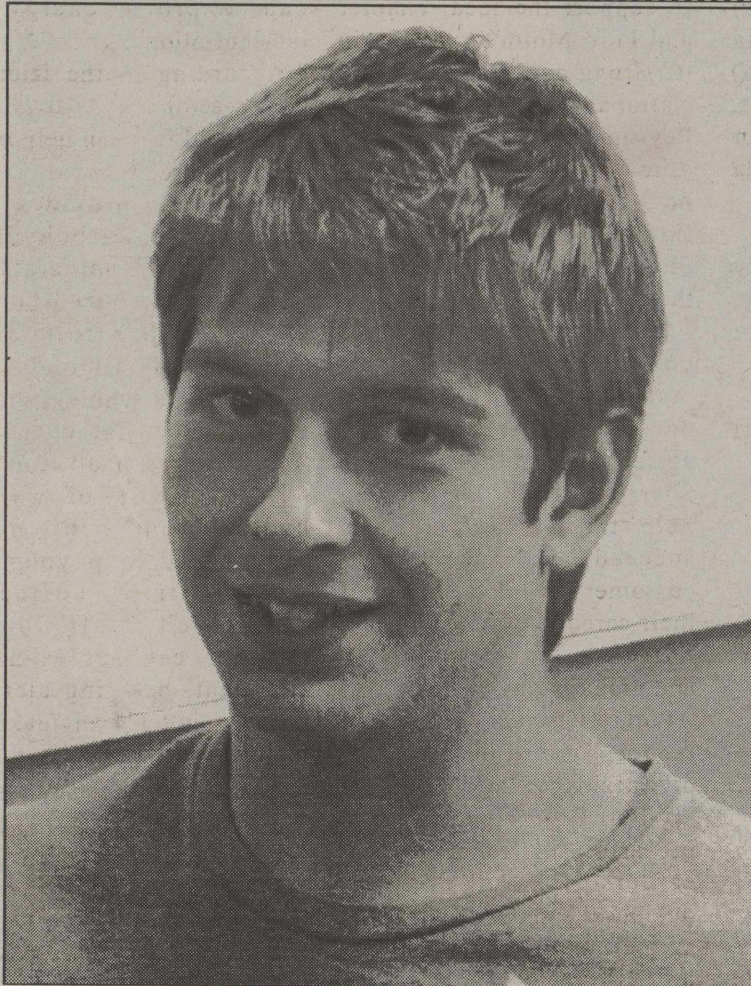

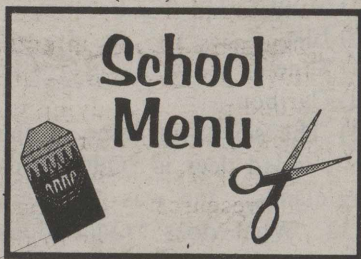

### Safety Tips For Cribs

- **Infants should ALWAYS sleep in a crib meeting Federal and ASTM standards.**

- **Check for missing, loose, or improperly installed screws or hardware.**

- **Follow all instructions provided. If they aren't clear, call the manufacturer.**

- **Under no circumstances should substitute hardware be used.**

- **When disassembling, retain all parts and instructions.**

- **Always send in the product registration card (most manufacturers offer this service online as well) to ensure you'll be notified if your crib is recalled.**

Voluntary recalls to replace missing parts highlight the importance of proper assembly. Many older cribs don't meet current safety standards.

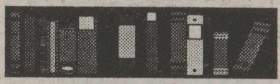
Researchers compared oxygen levels in 200 newborns and found that babies seated in car seats for 60 minutes had lower oxygen levels in their blood than those lying on their backs in hospital cribs.

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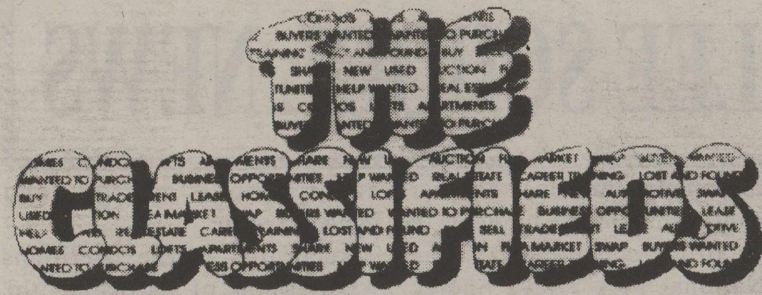

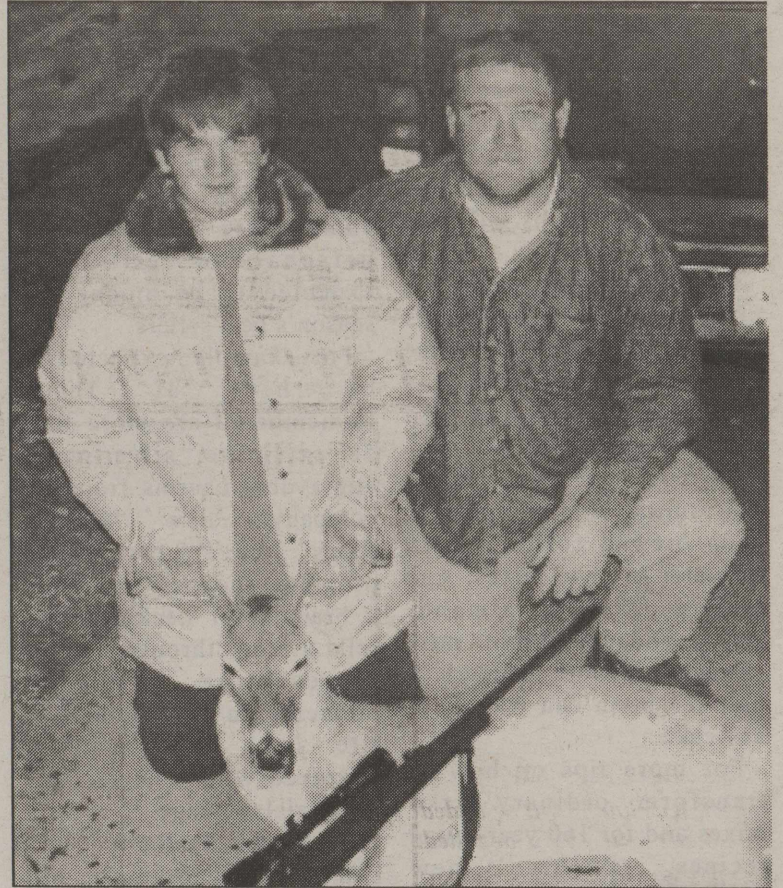

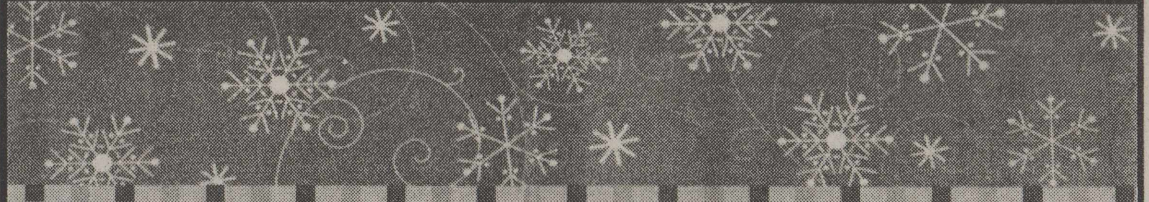
