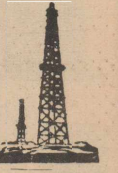

TWO PEOPLE KILLED

GAINES FARMER KILLED

AREA HOUSEWIFE BURNS TO DEATH



Smallwood

Mr. W.E. (Dog) Smallwood, a farmer residing eight miles northwest of Seminole was killed last Friday at 6:30 p.m. It was the second time on Friday that tragedy had struck in the west part of the county. A woman, Mrs. Andy Robertson, Burned to death Friday morning.

Mr. Smallwood was driving a 'G' John Deere tractor when it reared, and crushed him to death. He was pulling a quarter mile irrigation sprinkler system made up of five inch pipe. He had moved it about four hundred feet when the accident occurred. Mrs. Smallwood and an employee, A. J. Carroll were at the accident scene. Mr. Carroll said, "I was watching him. His wife was watching him. Mr. Smallwood was not used to a tractor with a hand clutch on it. He tried to hit the foot clutch two or three times and by the time he decided to jump it was too late. It was terrible."

As the tractor was moving forward, the heavy weight of the irrigation line, and the soft earth caused the front wheels to rise straight into the air. The back wheels and the rear part of the tractor pinned Mr. Smallwood beneath them. The weight of the line, which is known as a "drag line" and is moved on skids, was increased because of water left in them; the contour of the land was slightly upward, and the field was sandy. The line had been attached to the power lift. All of these factors played a part in the tragic accident. Seagraves Justice of the Peace S.B. Chenault, conducted the inquest. Mr. Smallwood was killed instantly.

Mr. John Upton, who lives nearby, came to the accident scene. He asked to be quoted, "I have lost a good friend and

PETITION

FAILS

County Clerk, Chester Browne, reported Monday that the petition for Local Option to Legalize Achololic Beverages in Seminole failed to carry by 15 names

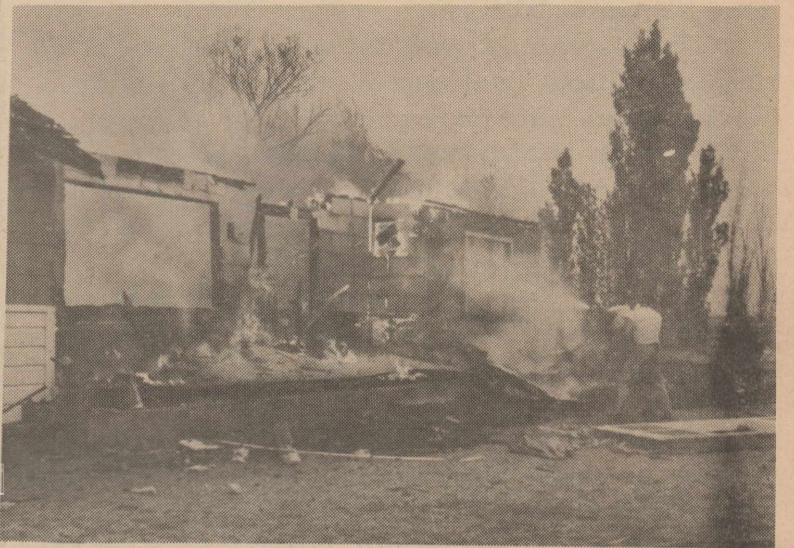
There were 501 names appearing on the petition, (41 copies of the petition were used). Of this number, only 466 were qualified. A total of 481 were needed for the option to carry. The Signers of the petition, along with their legal aides, were asked by Browne to meet with him when the Commissions court met. The Commissions met on Monday, but no one appeared before the Court. Browne reported there was a duplication of names, some names without registration numbers, (failure to register), some names rejected because of signing more than one name on the petition. The law reads:

Mrs. Robertson

In the early morning hours last Friday, tragedy struck in West Gaines County. An area housewife, Mrs. Norma Joyce Robertson, 43, was burned to death. The Robertson home was the scene of an explosion of such intensity that the entire back wall of the house was blown out; windows, with casements intact were blown twenty and thirty feet from the dwelling. A son, Michael, was in bed sleeping when the explosion occurred. He made a futile attempt to rescue his Mother, but was forced by intense heat and flames to plunge through a window for his life. The magnitude of the situation was keenly felt as Michael looked at his burning home and said "My Mother is still in there somewhere." There was a feeling of helplessness permeating the area; a son who had been unable to save a loved one, dedicated firemen working at a tremendous pace, and a husband returning to the scene of tragedy. Andy Robertson had left home before 6:00 A.M. for work. He stopped by Payne's Corner for breakfast. "I had breakfast with Andy at 6 o'clock this morning," said Lynn Crossland, "then he was going straight home. His house must have been on fire when he left."-- It was reported that the smoke and flames were seen when he left. The Firemen were called at 7:12, and it was estimated the fire had begun shortly before 7:00 A.M. "We needed more water," said the firemen. Spud Clifford rushed his trucks with additional water to fight the loosing battle. The explosive nature of the fire made control virtually impossible. The search for Mrs. Robertson continued -- the firemen using gas mask -- the smoke and heat intense.

As the tragic events were unfolding

"SHIRTSLEEVE" MEETINGS

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced today that he is directing national and State Officials of Department agencies in major farm States to extend the series of "shirtsleeves" meetings in which he participated last week. Agency officials are to report to the Secretary from time to time.

The agencies are to schedule and hold several such conferences in each State so as to learn the current thinking of county, area, and State leaders of farm organizations and of individual farmers. Secretary Freeman said the meetings should be completed as soon as possible.

The meetings in which the Secretary participated were held April 19 and 20 in Hutchinson, Kans.; Ames, Iowa; and Decatur, Ind.

"I deeply appreciate the time, trouble and expense which many farm leaders and many other people devoted to last week's meetings, and I believe American agriculture will benefit from them," Secretary Freeman said. "From my standpoint, it was very much worth while to get straight talk straight from people who are living the experiences that are so often put before me in the form of tables and charts. With the help of their experience, I think we can improve our programs and administration so as to maintain the upward movement of farm income and to minimize the danger of pricewrecking surpluses."

Meetings for this area are being planned, James A. Evans will announce them at a later date.

THE TIME IS NOW

The ideal time for planting castor in the Gaines County area is now -- from the first to the fifteenth of May. Soil temperatures are favorable for rapid germination and emergence, and much of the early spring windy weather is now past. Later plantings can be made up until the first week in June, but earlier varieties or hybrids should be used.

The longrange outlook for castor producers is the brightest in many years, due to the following: (1) Castor oil prices are the highest in the past 10 years, and a shortage in supply is forecast. Disappearance of castor oil in the U. S. during 1966 is estimated at 158 million pounds, while domestic production accounted for only 12-15% of this amount. The remainder was imported -- 105 million pounds of oil from Brazil alone. (2) Castor meal is now being detoxified and fed as a protein supplement to beef cattle in the Plainview area with excellent results. This development has made a by-product into a quality feed supplement that is in good demand. (3) A good selection of varieties and hybrids adapted to the Gaines County area are available. 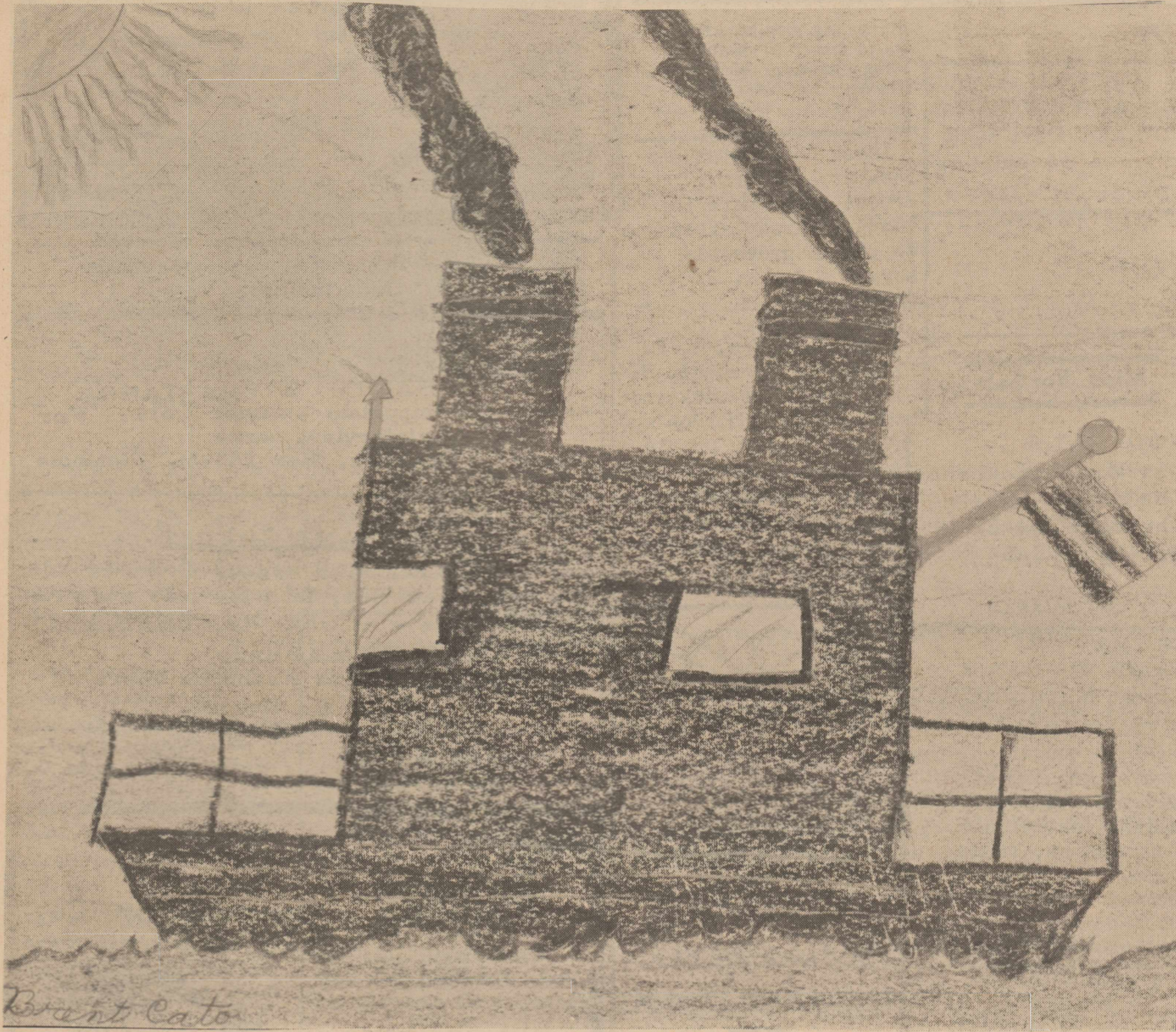

- 3/4 cup Sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt

When the above has colled to lukewarm, add two well beaten eggs, two yeast cakes dissolved in one cup of warm water, then 6 1/2 cups of flour. Let stand until dough has doubled in size. Knead dough and make into rolls, place in well greased pan, allow

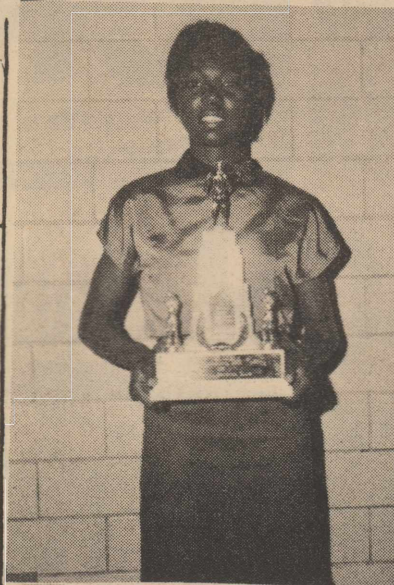
In a surprise move which by-passed regional finalist Jerry Wauson, Eddie Bright was awarded the Val Joe Track trophy.

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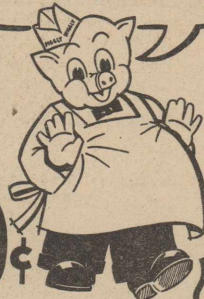

 10. The City Judge Office hours are 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M.; 3:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. The Judge is on call 24hours per day. All Police Officers are subject to call at any time of the day or night or whenever they are needed.
 11. The Police investigate all wrecks within the City Limits. They escort all emergency vehicles either to the Hospital or through town.
 12. When there is a fire, the Police hold traffic at the lights to enable the fire boys to give faster and safer service.

MOM

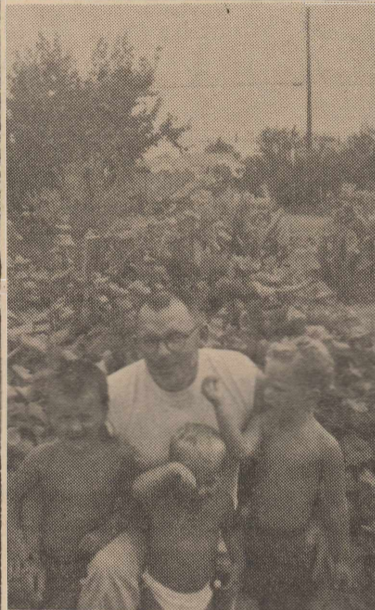
I guess it goes with history,

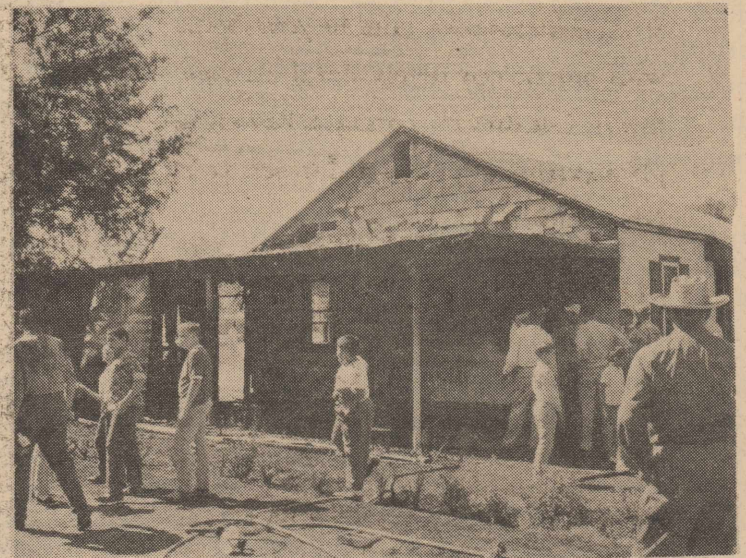

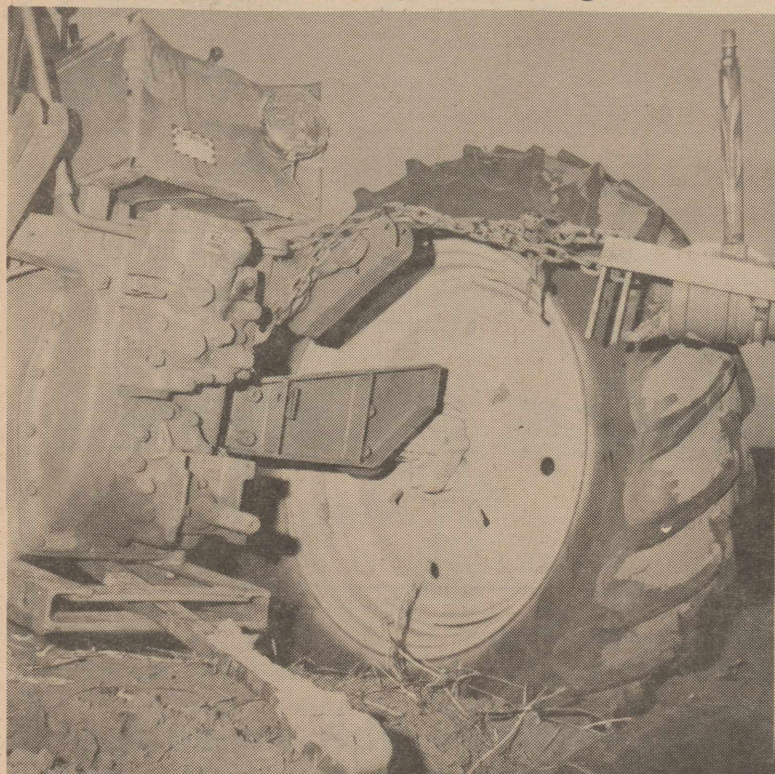
On the Metal Work written examination Keith Rhea won first place in the Senior division. Jimmy Jeter took second place on the Advanced Woodworking Knowledge test.

No signature shall be counted either by County Clerk or the Commissioners Court where there is reason to believe it is not the actual signature of the purported signer or that it is a duplication either of name or of handwriting used in any other signature on the petition and no signature shall be counted unless the resident address of the signer is shown or unless it is signed exactly as the name of the voter appears or the official copy of the current poll list or the official copy of the current list of the exempt votes if the signer be a holder of either a registration receipt or an exemption certificate.

At 8:48 the Seagraves Justice of the Peace, S. B. Chenault pronounced Mrs. Robertson dead. Her charred body had been found by Fireman Sammie Webb. Mr. Chenault was at the scene due to the absence of Seminole's Justice of Peace, Jim Vining who is ill. When the body was found, Roger Pool, who was at the scene told the Robertson men-- Friend and neighbor, Lynn Crossland left with the Robertson men to spare them of some of the sorrow that was at hand.

Mrs. Robertson had been found in a back bedroom face down and near her bed. The firemen continued to work, and all of the redness in their eyes was not caused from smoke. The setting of the chain of events was more profound by the whining of the family pup and the call of a peacock. Leaning against the barn were two skulls of cows with horns. The smoldering ruins of the home had left a charred cross standing--

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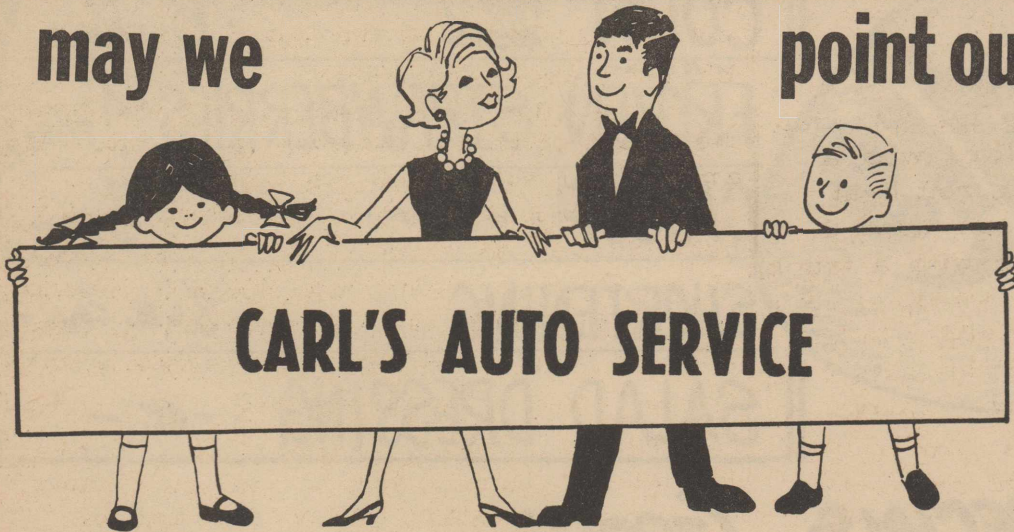
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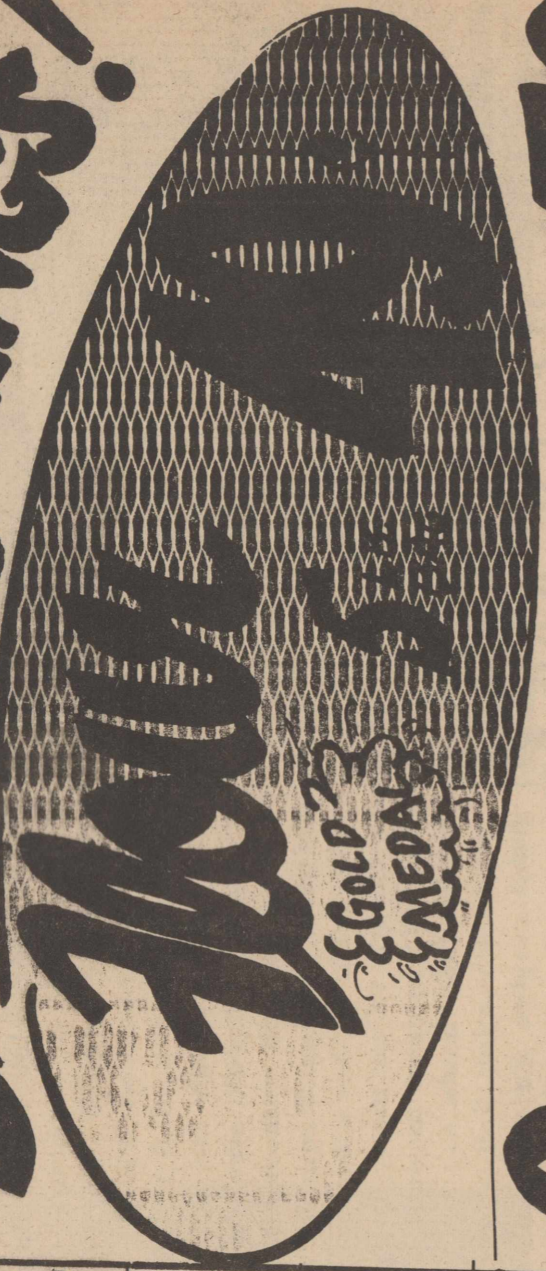
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
