AN EDITORIAL-TheTax Story

June 17th is Election Day in Seminole. The vote is to decide whether or not there will be a tax increase in Gaines County. The increase is needed for our schools and the outcome of the election will be decided by each of us. As individuals we have an obligation to provide an education for the youth of our area. It has been the privilege of Gaines County residents to enjoy a school system known throughout the state for its superior standards and facilities. This has been a result of dedicated men and women. We have had conscientious school board members, administrators and teachers to bring about the good reputation of the Seminole Schools. A number of factors have played a part in the need for increased revenue. Inflation and alarming increase in the cost of living is a major factor. This increase carries over in the operation of our schools in the same way it affects a private ly owned business or a household.

The tax asked for is not unreasonable. We have one of the lowest tax rates and evaluation in the state. For comparison, we have obtained a few examples which illustrates how fortunate we in Gaines County are—tax wise. We only pay 5% of the school taxes. Oil companies and utility companies pay 95% of our school taxes.

Landowners with Terry, Floyd, and Gaines County and the Seagraves school district (property owners) pay the following taxes:

> Gaines County--all taxes--\$114.58; School taxes--\$54.15. (This 400 acre of irrigated land has a market value of \$120,600.00). Terry County--school taxes only--

\$174.80. (This 320 acres--160 acres irrigated and 160 acres dry land--has a market value of \$72,000.00).

Floyd County--school taxes only--\$263.58. (This amount on 405 acre of dry land).

Seagraves—school taxes only—\$78.00 (150 acres of dry land).

Gaines County--school taxes only--\$32.91. (475 irrigated acres).

Most any local person owning property in other counties find the situation similar.

A \$15,000.00 home in Seminole is taxed on \$1,500.00. The School tax on this property is \$25.50 per year. If the tax increase that is being asked is approved, the 21¢ needed at the present time would increase the above tax by \$3.15 per year. (This figure is based on a \$15,000.00 brick home). In Brownfield, a three bedroom frame home is assessed at approximately 60% of the total evaluation at a \$1.82 rate, (Seminole is 10% at \$1.50 rate). The school taxes on this Brownfield home was \$120.00 in 1966.

The tax is needed and the tax is reasonable We hope all eligible voters will exercise their right and privilege of voting.

Jimmie Garland of Seminole has been taken home from the Hospital. George Norman of Lamesa started harvesting peaches last Friday, June 9. They are harvesting "Dixie Reds". Mr. Norman told us that he has 160 acres of peach trees that are 3 years old, and 80 acrea that are one year old. They expect very few peaches from the young trees, but on the old trees the harvest will be more abundant. These trees are in the western part of Gaines County.

Mr. Norman has several varieties. The different varieties inable the harvest of the fruit every two or three weeks. The "Dixie Reds" are the first to be ready to harvest followed by the "Ranger Red Globe" and "Redskin". In the young orchard the varieties are "Ioring and "Jefferson".

The Norman peach farm has cold-storage facilities (the farm stores up to 1400 bushels of peaches). The first harvest was sold and the trucks were waiting for the peaches to be culled, cooled, and loaded.

They were sold to Louie Gilmore of Lamesa, Texas, Piggly Wiggly store, and Deordoff Whole sale Company of Lubbock.

Peaches on the Moore-Freeman and the Fred Barrett Farms are also ready for harvest.

GAINES COTTON FARMERS FACE DECISION ON REPLANTING

Some South Plains cotton farmers face an important decision—whether to replant hailed-out or cold damaged cotton or to plant permitted cotton acreage to soybeans.

If the decision is to plant soybeans, growers must receive prior approval from the county ASCS office, says Calvin D. Holcomb, county agricultural agent. With this approval, cotton price support pauments may still be received.

Growers can expect a decline in lint yields as planting dates become later in the season, Holcomb points out. In fact, some yields have decreased as much as 728 pounds per acre.

Average lint yields obtained at the South Plains Research and Extension Center over a five-year period have been 800 pounds per acre for June 1 plantings compared to 662 pounds per acre for planting on June 8-10. Based on an average price of 16¢ per pound, this difference alone amounts to \$14.08 per acre.

Holcomb adds that there are a number of factors consider before planting soybeans on cotton acreage. First of all, adequate irrigation water should be available to produce sufficient yields.

Also, tests have shown that yields are increased if cotton follows soybeans in a rotation. Thus higher yields should be obtained on next year's acreage if soybeans are planted this season.

Of course, the rental agreement between the landlord and tenant must be considered, points out Holcomb. Usual agreements call for one-fourth of the gross income from cotton to go to the land owner whereas one-third of the income of soybeans is paid

The expected income above operating costs is another all-important factor in deciding between late-planted cotton and soybeans, points out Holcomb. On a per acre basis, to produce a lint yield of 800 pounds, a grower may spend \$80 and thereby leave a net operating return of \$40.

In comparison, irrigated soybeans planted by June 6 normally yield about 25 to 30 bushels or more per acre. Considering a production cost of \$35 per acre for soybeans, a producer could expect

School board

The School Board met Friday, June 9, for their regular meeting. They accepted the resignation of Mrs. Roy Hart, first grade teacher.

David Hubert Cavitt and Melvin G. Clark were hired, subject to assignments for the 1967-68 semester.

The board elected Rayford Bates, delegate and Horace I. Jones, alternate, to be a member of the delegate assembly, which shall elect officers, vote on resolutions, policy statements and ammendments to the constitution and by-laws of the Texas Association of School Boards. This is an annual meeting held in September; the date and location to be announced later.

It was voted to offer Drivers Education to students 15 years of age, prior to the semester in which they enroll. It is a state law now that a 16 year old can secure a license if they have had drivers education, if not the required age is 18 years of age.

reasonably more net operating return from soybeans than from cotton.

If cotton is to be replanted, Holcomb feels that a few guidelines should be considered with regards to varieties that might do best in Gaines County. Only early maturing varieties should be planted at this late date due to the shortened growing season. Long staple varieties such as Acala and Del Cerro will not have sufficient time to mature.

Irrigation of late cotton also becomes more critical, says Holcomb. Less water should be applied in order to insure early fruiting. Following preplant irrigation, generally one additional application at peak bloom is sufficient.

R.A.C.E.S. on call to Serve Seminole

How wonderful it is when someone offers to serve. It is good to hear the words 'willing to help'. Such a fellow was in our office last week. He is Billy Houston. Billy serves the Civil Defense as a radio operator for the "Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service" or what he commenly calls: "Races".

He pointed out several ways that he and others can serve our community and our country. As long as our telephones are working, our radios are recieving, and we are getting TV reception, we feel connected with the rest of the world, but what if a catastrophe were to happen to our part of the country. But if disaster, such as a tornado, power failure, or sudden war, then our ''Races Operators'' such as Billy Houston, Tom Wood, and E. L. Wallace would be 'People of the Hour''.

Did you know that Judge Charlie Lawrence and Dr. C. P. Alexander are co-chairman of our Civil Defense: In case of an emergency they along with us would have to depend upon the amatuer radio operators to keep us in touch with other parts of our world.

WHO CAN JOIN RACES? Anyone with an amateur radio license is eligible to enroll if they meet the high standards imposed by such a vital service. Holders of certain commercial operator licenses may be enrolled if adequate numbers of qualified amateurs are not available. Amateurs should meet this obligation to their community and keep RACES a truly AMATEUR service.

Each applicant must obtain a written certificate from the local or State Civil Defense Director concering loyalty to the United States and attesting to his general reliability in accordance with prescribed FCC procedures.

WHAT IS RACES? Races (Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service) is an organization of amateur radio operators who help provide communications needed by Federal, State and local governments in time of emergency.

Races was created in 1952 by the Federal Communications Commission and the former Federal Civil Defense Administration (now Office of Civil Defense), primarily to serve in a civil defense emergency.

Membership is now more than 50,000.

RACES provides backup communications for landline telephone and teletype systems applicable to civil defense. RACES is used at points of disaster, or wherever needed, to relieve overloaded circuits and to replace circuits temporarily out of operation, as well as to furnish communications from areas where communications are not normally available.

WHEN IS RACES USED? RACES may be called on to provide communications in any emergency concerning:

Public Safety
Preservation of Property
Maintenance of Law and Order
Alleviation of Human Suffering and Need
Armed attack or Sabotage
National Defense or Security

Billy Houston said further, "In event of an ice storm in Montana or a flood in Carlsbad; if people will contact us, we will contact their folks there, or any other place where other communications have failed." If you are interested in becoming one of the a mateur operators, you may contact one of the mentioned men. (Thanks Billy for coming in and Thanks for Serving).



WEB WORMS SHOWING UP

Web worms are beginning to show up in trees in Gaines County says County Agent Clavin Holcomb. If you have shade trees in your yard and want to keep leaves on them, you should examine them now for these worms.

When they are real small they start eating on leaves and forming a web. Sometimes they will have a good many leaves eaten and webs already formed if you are not keeping close watch on your trees.

These worms generally feed by eating leaves, sometimes in concentrated areas. Some web within, or build "webnests" in crotches of limbs, end visitors of the or feed together in large groups without making a web. Caterpillars vary from one to two inches long. They also vary in color, but usually are striped, multicolered and hairy. If webbed branches are present, small infectation may be destroyed by cutting out and burning webs or by other mechanical means. There are one to three generations per year. Some winter as eggs in clusters on limbs, others hibernate as papae in the ground.

Usually sprays are the best to use and following is the material to be used: Sevin, chlordane, D.D.T., Lead Arsenate, Molanthin and Toxaphane.

Holcomb says all insecticide are poisonous and should be handled with care. If insecticides come in contact with skin, remove residue immediately by washing with soap and water.

Insecticides are sold under many different trade names. Always refer to the statement of active ingredients on the label to determine the thousands of people here, specific insecticide in the foundation. Mix and apply the material exactly as directed on the label






MRS. MELTON HONOR GRADUATE



CABLE TV CELEBRATES 7th ANNIVERSARY

Cable TV had its beginning in 1949 at Astoria, Oregon. Today there are over 2,000 systems Seminole Cable TV was completed in June, 1960, after receiving a franchise in 1959. In early 1960 a 500' receiving tower, tallest of its kind in West Texas, was completed. The tower was built to gather signals from distant stations. 60 amplifier and coaxial cable were strung through Seminole to boost the signals in the homes. 1963–1964 saw several new amps added to the system.

1965 was a big year for Cable TV--a new building-to-house receiving equipment at the tower was completed, the new building for Cable TV offices was completed in 1965, a new aluminum trunk line to reduce the number of amps needed was added. Cable TV started local program origination by television services from the First Baptist Church in 1965. Seminoel Cable TV was one of the first systems in the United States for this type service. The year 1966 saw great strides in its local programming and additional equipment was installed. By 1967 local program origination was in full swing with a fully equipped studio including four cameras Altec Audio equipment and amp and video tape recorder. Future plans include increasing the channel capacity of the system from 5 to 12 to enable the addition of other TV Stations; some of the stations will be brought to Seminole via micro-wave from Dallas and Ft. Worth. Expansion of local programming is also planned.

Presently available on Cable TV are the following: TV Stations 13 and 11, Lubbock; #9, Monahans; #7, Odessa; #2, Midland; and also FM music--plus, our own local CHANNEL 3. Programs on Seminole Cable TV 3 are the 4 D's Show, a 'Town Talk' program with a bit of humor, News, Sport, and Weather. Always something of local interest is featured with local people involved. Don and Dave narrate the shov It may be seen at 9:30 a.m. daily Monday through Friday. Other shows include: 'TV Bingo' played daily at 9:00 a.m. Two local persons have already won \$100.00 each on Black-Out Bingo. Each Tuesday, Joe Seagler, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, has a program direct ed to the interests of Seminole residents. Saturday finds a Teen program featuring Donna Carter and Bruce Agnew, called 'The Record Party'.

Seminole Cable TV still broadcast each Sunday, services from the First Baptist Church.

The first Cable cast from our studio was a Girl Scout Cablethon, which raised almost \$300.00 for the Girl Scouts. A huge success has been the reporting of Election Returns and interviews of persons involved. It is plans of Seminole Cable TV to continue the service of reporting all local election results. Additional ways that Cable TV helps the community is in serving as a civil defense alert system. In time of emergency, Cable TV comes on the air to warn of any impending danger.

Special events planned this week are 'pro's' and 'con's' of the school Tax Election. This program will be on Friday at 6:30 p.m. Election returns will be given Saturday at 7:00 p.m. Other programs are planned for the pleasure and benefit of the Cable viewers

District 2 4-H Council is the governing body for 4-H work in the twenty county Extension District 2. Members of District Council are composed of five officers and a boy and a girl from each of the twenty counties. This group meets twice a year to transact its business.

To be elected for office on the District 2 4-H Council, a 4-H member is elected from the current membership of district council and is eligible for one office for one term (January 1 to December 31) for the coming year. The chairman and first vice-chairman of District 2 4-H Council then serve as members of the Texas 4-H Council the year they serve as district officers. Texas 4-H Council is composed of 29 delegates, two from each of Texas' 12 Agricultural Extension Districts and five officers. The first meeting of Texas 4-H Council will be June 16-21 on the campus of the University of Houston.

4-H projects for Chris have been and/or now are: foods-nutrition, clothing, field crops, electricity, public speaking, and junior leadership. Other than project work, she has participated in many 4-H activities on county, district and state levels. Some of these activities have been county dress revue, county cherry pie contest and bake show, county and district food show, county and district share-the-fun contest, and district elimination contests. Chris has had 4-H records judged at district as a junior and a senior 4-H'er.

Development of leadership has been a large portion of 4-H work for Chris. Locally she has served as junior leader in foods-nutrition 4 years, treasurer, council delegate, and president of the Seagraves 4-H Club. 

SUMMER HOMEMAKING CLASS MET

The Summer Homemaking class met Monday, June 5, and Wednesday, June 7, in the Seminole High School Homemaking Department from ten to twelve a.m. Each girl reported on a subject she had chosen to study about fabrics and fibers such as: how to judge quality, finishes, fabrics requiring special attention, woven vs. printed designs, types of weaves, cotton, linen, wool, silk, and synthetic fibers and qualities of each.


A TORNADO (cont'd)

Average tornado path is 16 miles long, less than 1/4 mile wide.

Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles an hour.

Tornadoes can strike at any hour of the day or night, but most hit in the afternoon and early evening.

'Wandering Wheels' Visit Seminole



How refreshing to meet the youth of our nationespecially when they are wholesome and enjoy the good things of life. Such a group of young men came through Gaines County last Wednesday, (June 7, 1967) There were 35 boys traveling on bicycles on a crosscountry jaunt. "Wandering Wheels" is what the boys call themselves and they are all students or associated with Taylor University in Upland, Indiana.

Since 1964, Wandering Wheels has criss-crossed the Middle West with four trips totaling 3100 miles with 60 riders. This experience led to a 3500 mile coast-to-coast trip in 1966, 35 bikes traveling from San Francisco to Rehoboth Beach, Delaware in 50 days.

The truck, which goes along with the group, is equipped with a locker for each cyclist, there are parts and spare tires; and also musical instruments. When they left San Diego they had 24 spare tires. There were 2 left on arrival here. Deevee Boyd, is Mr. Ralph Boyd's son. He is a skilled mechanic, experienced cyclist and a leader in WW. He was with the group here. Mr. Ralph Boyd is Superintendent of buildings and grounds at Taylor.

Bob Davenport, a well known college athelete, is the coach at Taylor U. and the Wandering Wheels was his idea of a means of relating rugged physical discipline to spiritual growth. Hetravels on a motorcycle with the "WW". Dale Murphy, who teaches English in Fairmont, Indiana, was with the group and he said that he had to keep up with the 'Texas Tales' as he had a brother teaching at Texas A&M in Bryan, Texas. A Seymour, Indiana student, John Gregory, was pleased to learn of a Seymour, Texas and said they studied about Seymour, Australia at the University.

The young men sleep in city parks and there cook out--and they enjoy the fellowship and fun of like minded persons. Some of the most appreciated help, as well as the occasion for the most memorable fellowship has been the carry-in suppers provided by churches and service clubs to the riders en route. The riders are from all over the nation and represent many church backgrounds. They stress Christian principles and ideals. No one sponsors Wandering Wheels. In order to be part of the team, each rider pays a minimal "trail fee" covering his basic expenses.
