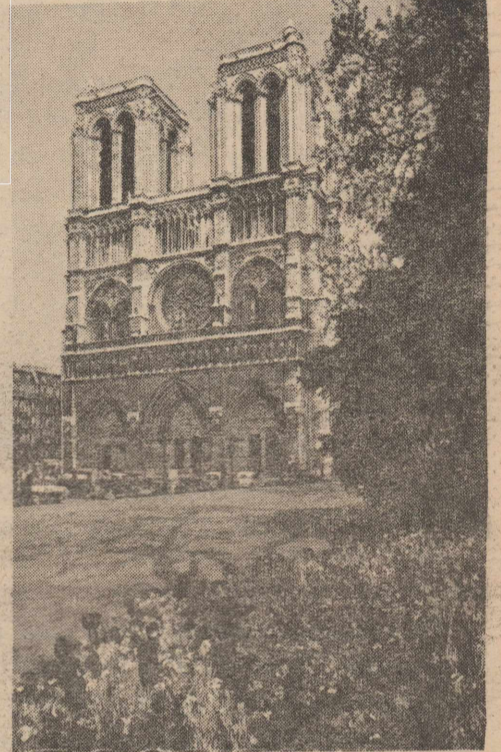

TEACHER PAY BOOST

The School Board met in a special meeting last Thursday night to finish setting the salaries of the School personnel. All Board members were present, and Aubrey Mays was a guest.

The Board decided to increase the salaries of the entire personnel. The decision for the increase was based on the cost of living rise and the State Teacher pay increase which became law during the last legislature. The pay increase figured \$25.00 per month for secretaries and clerks. For teachers and administrators, the increase figured \$550.00 per year; Maintenance,

TRAVELERS RETURN

Eight persons from Seminole joined some 200 other American members of the Church of Christ and 66 missionaries and family members in Paris, France, for a two week Campaign for Christ.

1 1/2 million pieces of advertising were distributed into the homes in Paris by the English speaking workers. About 3,600 people were contacted by the French speaking people.

In spite of tired bodies and aching feet the interest and joy of the group increased daily. During the second week of the campaign, there were services in French each night. These were conducted by men representing five different nations, United States, Spain, Canada, France and Italy. Evening services were held in the heart of Paris. The group attended daily morning devotionals in the church building. These devotionals were in English, and held before the group left for a busy day of distributing pamphlets. Attendance was very good for the services and the response of the people of Paris exceeded the expectation of the Campaign leaders.

One of the highlights of the missionary efforts other than the wonderful response of the French people was the impression made by a group of Negro students from Southwestern Christian College in Terrell, Texas. The A Cappella singers did what was considered a near impossibility by singing over the radio and on T.V. in Paris. These students were outstanding and their conduct, appearance, and talent endeared them to all workers. French people could see that the racial prejudice they had heard so much about was not completely true. Con't on Page 14

TIMING VITAL FOR IRRIGATING COTTON

Proper timing of irrigation water can mean the difference between profit and loss for cotton farmers in Gaines County, says Calvin D. Holcomb, Co. Agri. Agent.

Research results at the South Plains Research and Extension Center at Lubbock indicate that one four-inch summer irrigation applied 15 to 25 days after first bloom on early to medium maturing stripper cotton varieties yield the greatest retruns from irrigation water.

The key to increased income from one four-inch summer application, points out Holcomb, includes the cotton variety and its growth stage. At peak bloom the plant can most efficiently utilize water. Net income decreases when application is made earlier or later than this stage.

Approximately \$6 to \$8 more per acre can be obtained by irrigating at this time as compared with the same water applied at 30 days after first bloom, says Holcomb. When the one summer irrigation is delayed until 40 to 45 days after first bloom, a loss of more than \$14 per acre can occur when compared optimum timing.

Late maturing stripper and non-stripper types can be irrigated as late as 30 to 35 days after first bloom.

Timing is also critical in late-planted cotton where maximum fiber quality is to be maintained, adds the agent. Any delay in applying irrigation water can delay maturity and decrease micronaire--an important quality measure. A reduction of at least \$3.25 per ble can result from a micronaire below 3.5.

Production of maximum fiber quality and optimum yields, coupled with efficient utilization of irrigation water, lends to increased income for South Plains cotton producers. These and other factors, explains Holcomb, can contribute to an annual potential increase of \$27 million as projected in the South Plains Development (SPD) program.

cause death, County Agent Calvin D. Holcomb, says.

These troublesome insects can be controlled effectively through the proper use of insecticides, Holcomb pointed out.

Hog louse, a blood-sucking parasite, can cause serious loss of weight, poor utilization, and general unthriftiness. The hog louse reaches five to six mm in length and is bluish gray. They feed mainly on tender body areas.

Sarcoptic mange can result in a loss of hair and the appearance of lesions. The mange is caused by a small yellowish mite scarcely visible to the naked eye.

Demodetic mange is not common, but may occur occasionally in some areas of Texas. This mange is a result of the hog follicle mite which causes small hard nodules that may grow to an inch in diameter and often rupture.

Since the screwworm eradication program is in the Southwest, screwworms has not resulted in serious damage. However, swine producers should be alert for possible infestations.

For a complete listing of insecticides and their recommended use for swine external parasite control, refer to the current issue of MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites on Livestock and Poultry," available at you county agent's office.

These games will be played July 10th in the Noon Lions Club Park. The Little League game will begin at 6:30 and the Babe Ruth game will follow.

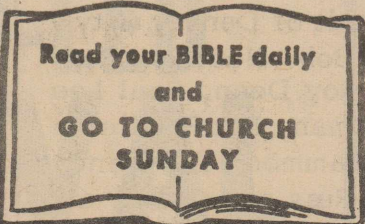

HIGH COST RED TAPE

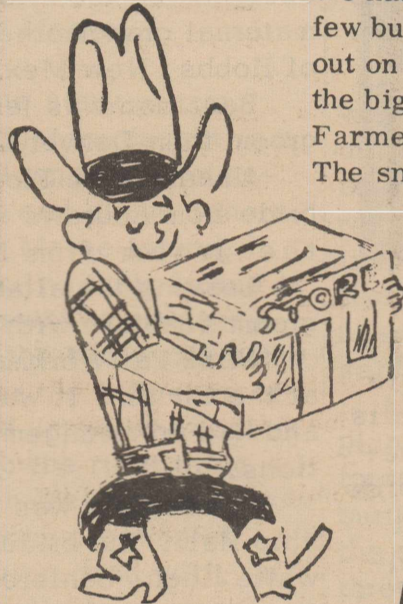

custodians and mechanics--\$516.00; Bus drivers, an increase of \$120.00 per year; cafeteria workers from \$10.50 to \$12.00 per day. The hourly wage was raised from \$1.25 to \$1.35.

According to estimates compiled by George Christy, Business Manager, the salary increases reflect an increase of \$80,517.00 to the budget, making a total budget figure of \$1,649,440.00, for the 67-68 year. Based on this estimate the tax increase will be an added 18¢. The first estimate (before the recent tax election) called for a 21¢ increase. These estimated figures are subject to the Boards approval.

The Board will meet Thursday, July 6, with oil company tax men.

McALLEN--(Spl)--"It was a disgrace to democracy to see the biased manner in which Senators Ralph Yarborough, (D.-Tex); Edward Kennedy, (D.-Mass.); and Harrison Williams, (D.-N.J.), conducted themselves during the Senate subcommittee hearing on migratory labor last Thursday in Rio Grande City," M.F. (Mike Frost), McAllen, Texas Farm Bureau secretary-treasurer and State director, said after the hearing was completed Friday.

The Senators present Thursday were not at all interested in listening to the farmers' side of the story concerning labor disputes in the Valley. They gave union representatives much more time per witness than agreed before the hearing began. They also asked Farm Bureau, and Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers and Shippers (who were represented by growers) not to read or discuss their statements at length, but to hurriedly summarize them in the interest of time.

Most of Thursday's hearing was devoted to discussing allegations against the Texas Rangers, Gov. John Connally and growers of the Valley - namely La Casita Farm.

It was quite obvious Thursday that the subcommittee did not come to conduct a fair and impartial hearing, but rather were completely partial to the union and union sympathizers. This was ever so evident Thursday morning when Sen. Williams, shortly before noon, offered to take some union witnesses to lunch, but later retracted this offer upon advice from his staff.

During union testimony, Thursday, the bills supposedly under consideration were only briefly mentioned; instead; it looked like a kangaroo court was in session to do all possible to down grade the Rangers, Gov. Connally, Valley growers and Starr County officials.

The subcommittee, Thursday, refused to accept a transcript of an injunction hearing held the prior two days, where many of the same persons testified under oath and cross examination.

"Friday was somewhat more gratifying to see Sen. Paul Fannin, (R.-Ariz.), join the subcommittee and display objectiveness and fairness for all parties concerned," Frost added.

"In my opinion Texas does not need any Senator visiting the State in an attempt to decide whether or not we need the Texas Rangers or to publically judge Gov. John Connally's actions concerning the Valley labor dispute," Frost concluded.

TEXAS FARM BUREAU
FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE July 1, 1967
Two Farm Bureau leaders testified last week (June 29 & 30) during Senate subcommittee hearings on migratory labor in the Rio Grande Valley. M.F. (Mike) Frost, TFB secretary-treasurer and state director of McAllen, and Dwayne Bair, Hidalgo County Farm Bureau president, each presented testimony opposing the proposed Senate Bills concerning farm workers.

Frost told the subcommittee Thursday in Rio Grande City that "the unique feature of the employment relationship in agriculture is the vulnerability of the farmer as an employer to any work stoppage on his farm.

"While most industrial or commercial concerns may suffer a reduction in profits as a result of a strike, it is rare for them to be disastrously affected.

"Compare this with agriculture. It is not possible to close down a farm due to a strike. Production must continue in tune with the season. Crops must be harvested when ready.

"If a strike should occur when a perishable crop is ready to harvest, and of course this is the time a strike would be called, this would entail much more than a reduction in the farmer's profits for the year. More likely it would involve (1) a loss of income for the year and (2) a loss of money invested in bringing the crop to harvest state which would run (for fruits and vegetables) \$300 - \$400 or more per acre. A loss of this size would bankrupt many farmers.

"Collective bargaining would not equalize the bargaining power of farmers and workers; it would make farmers subservient to labor union leaders wherever such leaders could establish the practice of collective bargaining.

"The extension of the National Labor Relations Act to the production of perishable farm products would probably result in some temporary benefits to some workers. These benefits would be temporary because, conscious of their vulnerability, farmers would necessarily make investments in mechanization of farm operations to reduce or eliminate their vulnerability."

"Other factors which must be considered is a comparison of return on investment by farms and industry, and the increasing volume of imports of high labor requirement crops from Mexico."

Bair told the subcommittee, Friday, "we are now harvesting a crop on our farm for which we are receiving \$18 per ton and the harvesting crew is receiving \$15 per ton.

"Does this sound like we are taking advantage of these agricultural workers?" he asked.

"We are now finishing a fruit season where the harvestors received more dollars per ton on juice than the grower," he added.

"The point I make is that this type of national legislation is not going to solve our economic problem," he concluded.

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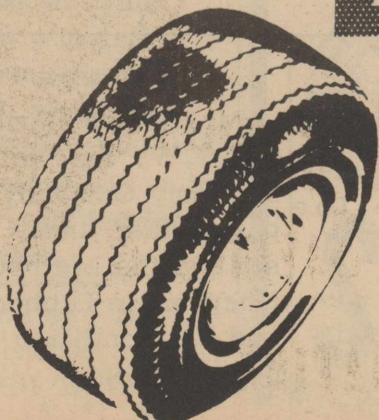

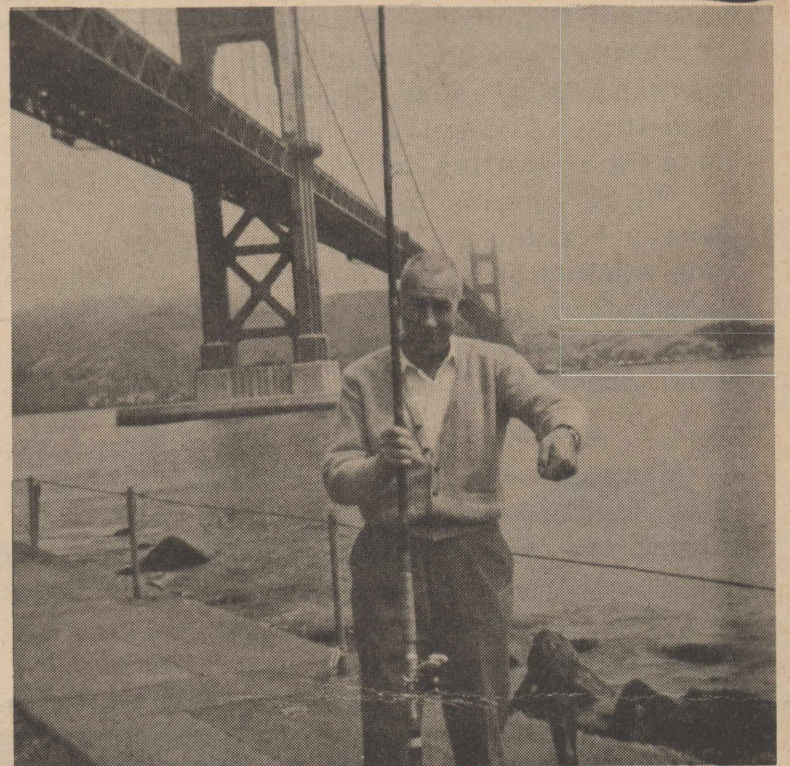

TIMING IMPORTANT FOR IRRIGATION GRAIN SORGHUM

For maximum yields of grain sorghum, adequate soil moisture should be available during the critical growth stages of boot, bloom and soft dough. Best yields are realized when soil moisture is kept at or above 45 per cent of field capacity during these stages, says Calvin Holcomb, county agricultural agent

Grain sorghum uses less than one-tenth of an inch of water per day up to about the seven-leaf stage, but thereafter the water use rate increases rapidly.

Holcomb says the peak water use of more than three-tenths of an inch per day comes between the boot and bloom stage. Two to three well-timed summer irrigations will generally give good yields or probably near maximum net return. One irrigation should be applied at preboot and the other at late bloom stage. If sufficient water is available for a third irrigation, it should be applied during the soft dough stage.

However, points out Holcomb, one irrigation on grain sorghum gives the most efficient water use. If rainfall is short, the boot stage is the approximate time to apply this single irrigation.

Research has shown that irrigation during the preboot stage will often speed up maturity slightly. This may be important in view of the large acreage in late-planted grain sorghum. Moisture stress between the seven-leaf and boot stage could delay maturity enough to increase losses from the sorghum midge, explains Holcomb.

A good supply of moisture should be continued through grain developments to reduce charcoal rot. Adequate moisture preceding the boot stage often results in rapid stalk elongation. This, followed by a moisture stress during grain development, may contribute to a higher incidence of charcoal rot and an increase in stalk lodging, says Holcomb.

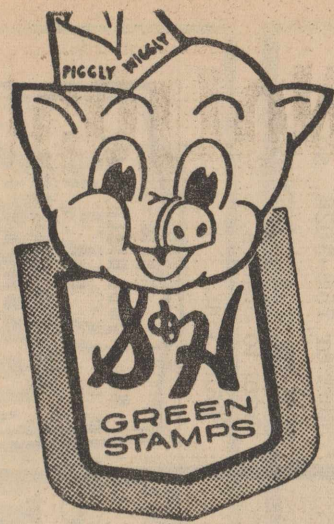

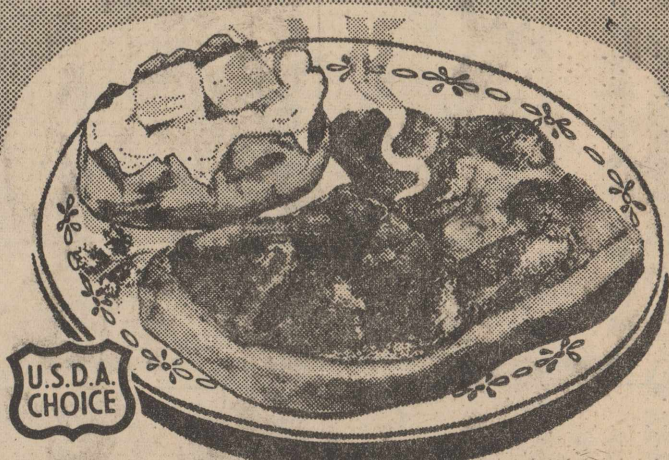

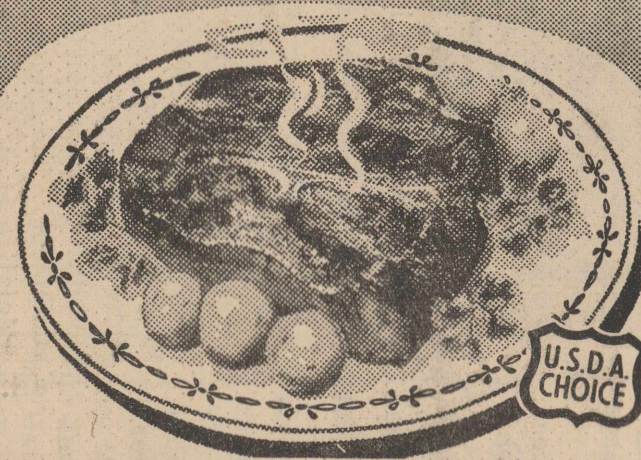

While the official attitude of the French Government seems rather 'cool' toward America, the people of Paris received the workers well and all with whom daily contact was maintained (hotels, restaurants, etc.), expressed their deep appreciation for the outstanding friendliness and conduct of each of the workers.

The workers found that it was difficult to find a drink of water during the day. Cokes, the small ones, were 70¢ and 80¢ each in American money. Breakfast (rolls and coffee) were served in the hotel rooms each morning. Each person had lunch in the area where they were working, and the evening meal in their hotel area, or near the opera house.

Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoons, were devoted to sight-seeing. In a city like Paris there is so much to see one hardly knows where to begin. Weeks could be spent in the Louvre (an art museum) alone. Many of the world's greatest paintings and other art treasures are housed, such as the Mona Lisa, Winged Victor of Milo and countless other works by the world's famous artist. The Palace of Versailles is another great and beautiful attraction. Most took guided tours to see both historical and modern Paris, and cruises on the Seine River, etc.

Following the Campaign, most of the American workers returned to America. Some enjoyed a lovely and scenic return to their homes from New York. The James W. Kennedy's were among those returning. However, for some of the Seminole people, Europe still beckoned, so Mrs. Almeda Gady and her two children, Frank and Ann and Mrs. Joe Greene of Lamesa, Joe and Don Coffman of Seminole and Jim Minnix and Nicky Breedlove of Rogersville, Missouri, set out by train to visit other countries. They visited Venice, Italy; they toured the scenic streets of that lovely city. Next, they went to Lucerne, Switzerland, a beautiful city with one of the most beautiful lakes in the world, and on to Amsterdam, Holland and Brussels, Belgium and back to Paris, before returning to America. Cindy Woods left Paris for Brussels, Belgium. She will be engaged in Mission activities for the remainder of the summer. A similar campaign is being planned for Brussels in 1968.

All agreed it was good to be back home, but that this was one of the most exciting, wonderful and thoroughly exhausting, experiences of their lives.

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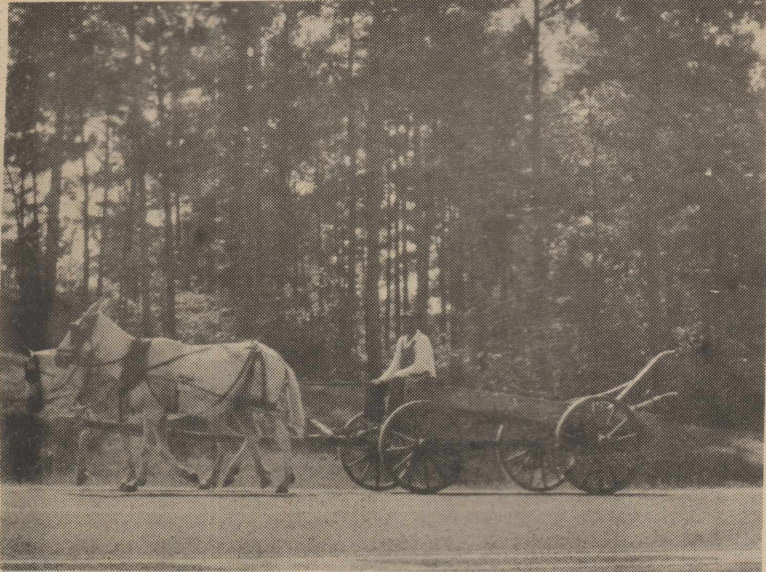

Here I found Coconut, Pineapple, Litchi, (it looks like a strawberry, grows in a tree, has a hard cover that can be peeled by hand, and eats good), Avacodos, Apples, Mangos, and others that I have no name for.

Some of the trees I saw! I must return again! I never saw an Ixora tree before, a member of the coffee family. Also, a 'White Bird of Paradise' that was not a tree, but big enough to be a 'West Texas Tree'. It grows the prettiest flower that I have ever seen. A Paper Bark Tree, it actually had bark falling off that looked like a two week old newspaper found on the beach. I liked the next one, a Magnolia, Texas variety. The smell was every bit as good as the groves that grow near Huntsville and Conroe, Texas. Blue Gum, French Cherry, and then there was the India Pine that had leaves that looked like a delicate fern.

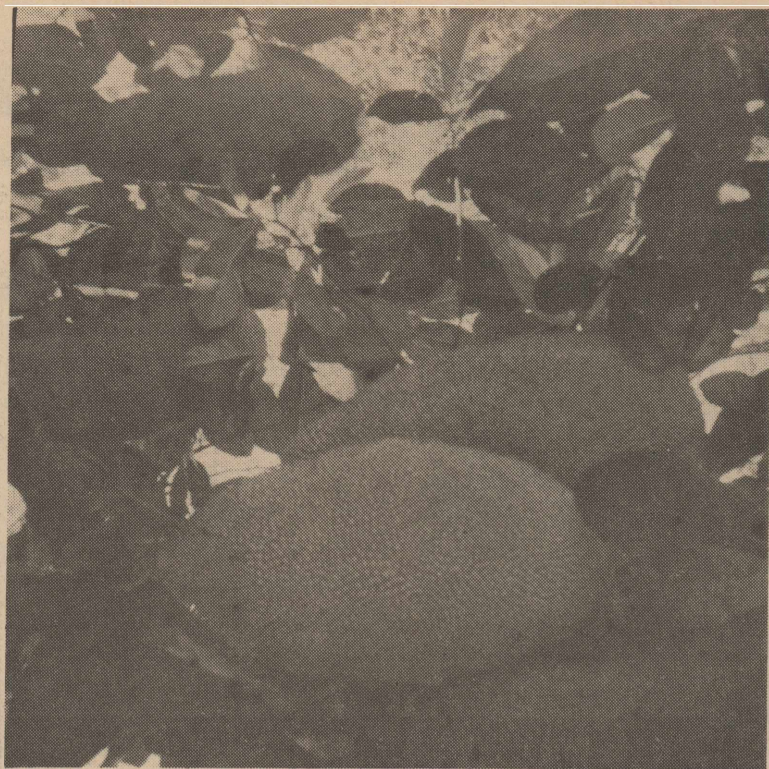
The Pineapple plant was too high to reach, but it looked good. And thanks to that nice native in the park near the bay who scaled the tree and shook out the Mangos for us to eat; just like baseball, he would shake the limb and we caught the fruit. Good to eat, you bet! Another sign said, False Litchi, and it must have been as there was no fruit on it. The Queen Flower tree had blooms two feet across. The Philippine Fig, Bottle Fig, and Fiddle Fig looked good and one of them tasted better than any Fig on the mainland. The Octopus Tree looks like a cousin of the Banyon with lovely blooms measuring two feet across with the smaller part of the bloom resembling our small red berries.

The Star Apple Tree did not have fruit, but the Mountain Apple had the ground covered. AND Avocados, this kind, that kind, and another kind. There were various kinds of Citrus fruit; Kinnow, Satsuma, Gim Gong Oranges, Grapefruit, Tangerines, and Ramgupn Lime, which looked like an orange, smelled like an

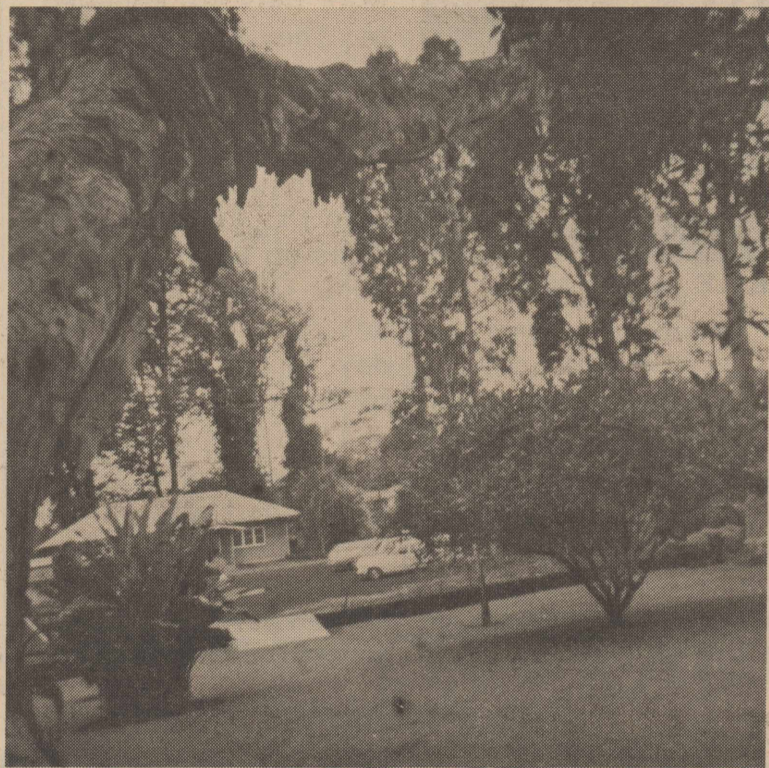
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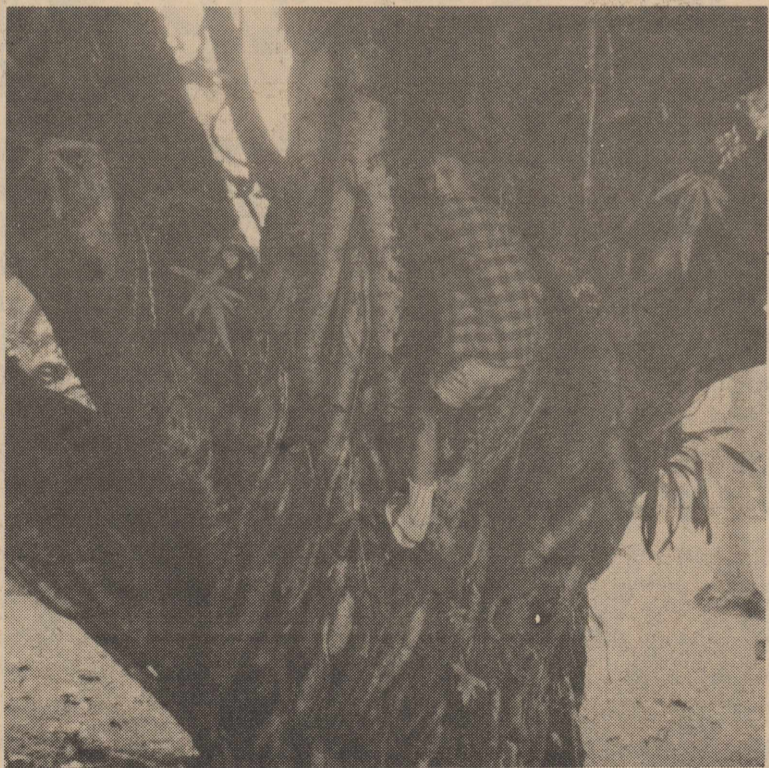
COCONUT TREE

orange, but tasted very much lime.

When I die I hope there is no large marker placed over my grave, but that someone will plant a tree where someone might pause in the shade and maybe eat the fruit thereof. I saw carved on stone under one of the large trees, such names as Fscott, Sauza, Yono, Yohida, Kim, Oishi, Higa, along with Young and Evans that had given their lives for the ir country. Somehow it seemed to make their deaths a little more meaningful placed there in the cool of the shade. Then my heart swelled with pride to notice such a MARKER as a tree with names: T.P. Williams, Thomas Smith, and Henry K. Umuiwe, each having died at the FRONT in 1919.

A Sausage Tree? It did have things growing on it that looked like an overstuffed two-foot sausage. I saw the Lemash Tree. It had pods on it that were about the size of one and one half footballs or maybe two. There were many more: The Cassia, The Olive, The Durion, The Shaddock, and the Monkey Pod.

The Banyan Tree is a story all its own. Ever since childhood and the Poem, "The Banyan Tree", I have looked forward to seeing one. I was not disappointed. Numerous aerial roots grown down into the ground from more or less horizontal branches and by their support allow the tree to cover a large area. Some in the world have measured several hundred feet in circumference. In Hilo, I stepped 43 steps to go around a Banyan tree, or approximately 130 feet. On Banyan drive such people as Lou Armstrong, Fannie Hurst, James A. Farley, Bobbie Jones, George H. (Babe) Ruth, and Cecil B. DeMille planted trees in the 1930-35 period. There is a story told here (and loving a good story, I did not check it too close). It is told that Richard Nixon planted a Banyan Tree here and that it died the year he ran for the Presidency.

I hope you too will find the way; stand a little taller; and walk HUMBLY before your God. 'Take a walk under the trees.'

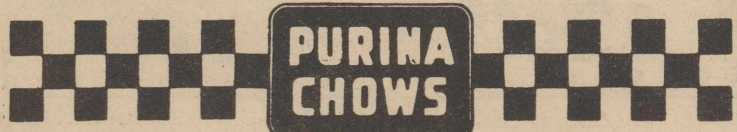

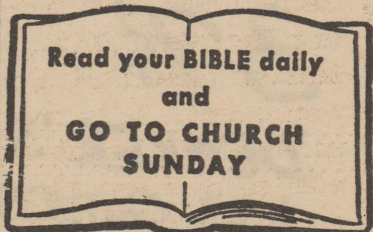

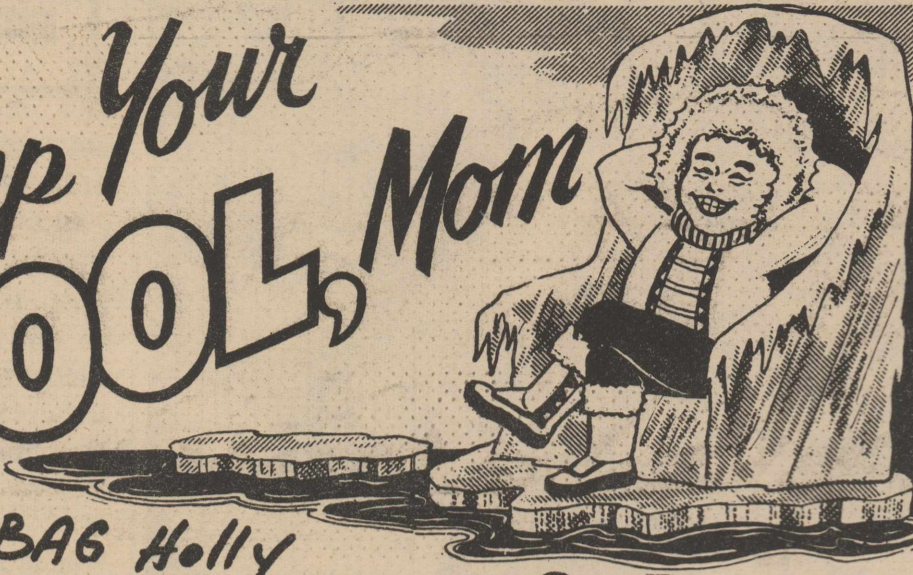
