LARGE CROWDS AT CITY WIDE-REVIVAL

FARM SAFETY WEEK PROCLAIMED

County Judge Charles Lawrence has officially proclaimed July 23-29, 1967 as Farm Safety Week in Gaines County, according to Oscar Fowler, President of the county Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

OFFICIAL PROCLAMATION

SEMINOLE, TEXAS

WHEREAS all the citizens of Gaines county are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities; and

WHEREAS farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of approximately 150 fatalities and thousands more suffer painful disabling injuries each year in Texas, plus the great economic loss, causes profound physical and psychological damage suffered by members of farm families that are involved; and

WHEREAS the President of the United States and the Governor of Texas have proclaimed the week of July 23-29, 1967 as FARM SAFETY WEEK;

WHEREAS during this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Safety Association Service, the Texas Safety Association, 4-H clubs, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Gaines County Farm Bureau with the theme "Think and Act Safely";

WHEREAS usch a campaign can do much to call to the attention of our rual citizens the need for observing safety practices which would reduce the tragic toll inflicted by accidents:

NOW, THEREFORE, I Charles Lawrence, County Judge of Gaines County, do herby designate the week of July 23-29, 1967 as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Gaines County and urge all farm and ranch families to become more safety conscious and help reduce deaths and injuries caused by accidents.

IN OFFICIAL RECOGNITION THEREOF, I hereby affix my signature this 23 day of July, 1967.

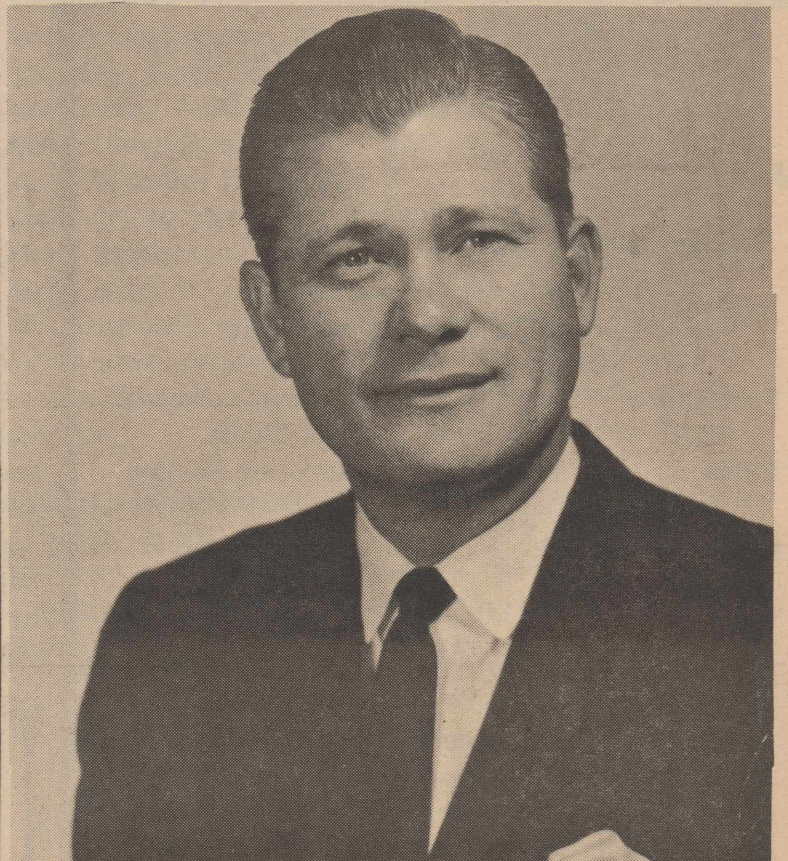
Fairview people have been quite busy this week hoeing weeks, knifeing and cultivating with plows for the weeds.

Farm hand

DON'T BE NEXT by C. H. DeVaney

You say that your tractor is a necessity to the operation of your farm or ranch? I readily agree, and add that it is one of the most dangerous necessities to any agricultural operation.

The average tractor operator refuses to become alarmed when told that 1,000 persons die annually as the result of tractor accidents, especially when he finds that this is only 2.2 deaths per 10,000 tractors.

But before you close your mind to safety reminders, consider that YOU could very well be Texas' next tractor fatality.

What causes most tractor accidents? No, it isn't mechanical failure; neither do most accidents just happen. A careless operator is the number one cause - - of both injury to himself and others. Going up too steep a grade, working too close to embankments and moving along the highway with improper safety equipment are perfect examples of this carelessness.

A cautious, careful operator has all lights, reflectors and the like required by law; but he can do more to prevent accidents. Such items as the SMU (slow moving vehicle) emblem roll or crash bars and crush-proof cabs add to the operator's safety.

Don't become injured, disabled or even killed due to carelessness. Not only are you needed by your family and friends, but by agriculture in general. Our state is hurt each time it loses an agricultural worker.

Continue to operate safely and proudly in one of the world's oldest and most respected professions - - that of producing our food and fiber.

ATTENTION GAINES COUNTY FARMERS

We can begin making 1967 Cotton and Feed Grain Payments on August 7th, if at least 50% of the farms in the county have certified their acreage by that time. All farms must certify their acreage by August 15th.

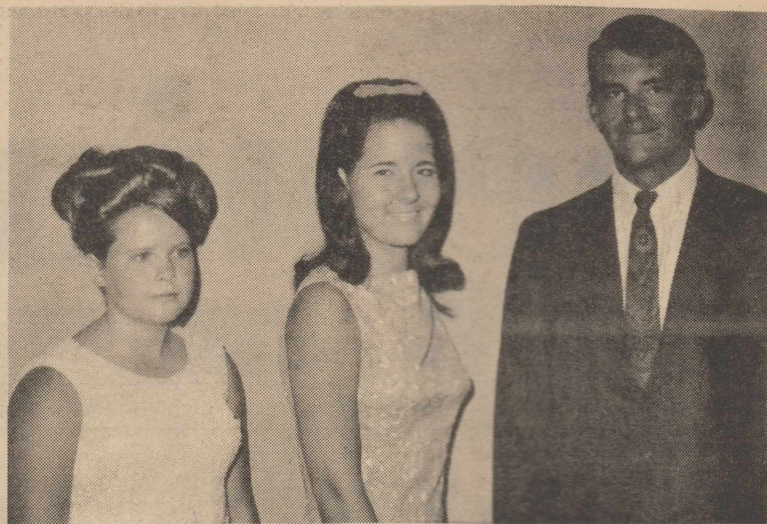

A. Alizarin Crimson is your pure red. Rose Madder has a little blue mixed in with it.

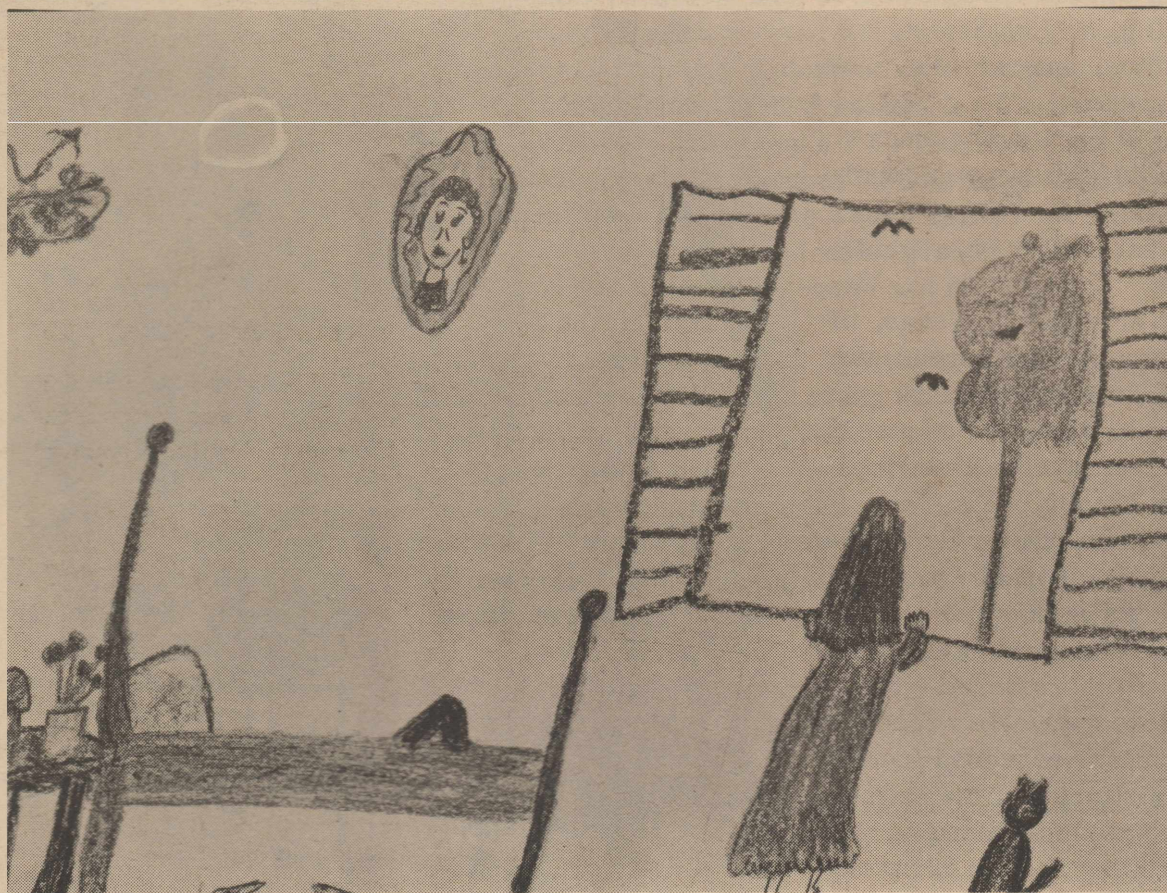

Past research has led to the development of new information about weed control and a variety of herbicides for specific weeding problems. The most spectacular change in cotton weeding occurred with the appearance of Treflan on the market in 1964. Presently, at least 1/3 of the cotton acreage is treated with preplant applications of this herbicide. However, approximately 2/3 or one million acres of the cotton in West Texas is still not treated with herbicides. With the ever rising cost of labor, the amount of herbicide usage will increase. An economical weed control practice in dryland farming areas would be the use of postemergence herbicides when weeds develop in the crop. The cost of a 10-inch band treatment is about 50 cents per acre. This is much more economical than hand labor.

The overall objective of weed control research since 1959 had been to eliminate the hoe from West Texas cotton fields. To date, we have been partly successful, and the amount of hand weeding has been greatly reduced.

I anticipate that with an ambitious research program, the hoe will be gone in another 10 years. Future research will find cheaper and more effective methods and herbicides for weed control that are presently available. Studies will be conducted to work out combinations of preemergence, preplant, and postemergence treatments that are more economical than present practices. For example, preplant or preemergence herbicides applied in narrow bands just ahead of planting, followed by cultivation and postemergence treatments, may reduce herbicide costs and be more effective than present methods used. This is particularly true in sandy soils, where cultivation is needed to prevent sand damage to cotton.

FERTILIZATION OF IRRIGATED PASTURES

Consistant forage production on irrigated pastureland if important to the farmer or rancher. Producing enough grass each year for livestock will redcut large feed bills and help avoid overgrazing on pastures. High quality pasture is one of the least expensive sources of livestock feed. In order to produce a uniform amount of forage, proper fertilization is necessary.

Better use of irrigation water is also an important advantage of proper fertilization. Plants with sufficient food nutrients require less water than plants needs to take in its required food depends upon how available the plant food is.

Farmers and ranchers in the Gaines-Andrews Soil Conversation District who are not following a good fertilization program on their irrigated pastures should start one now.

Technical assistance is available through Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the Distric.

NEWS ABOUT MEDICARE

Filing a claim for reimbursement on paid medical bills under medicare is a new experience for many older citizens. Yet most of them have handled it very well, according to H. P. Thomas, district manager of the Social Security Administration in Odessa.

"In any new program you can expect some problems to arise and some delays in payment will result," Thomas said. "However, there are some things that the individual can do in filing his claim to make sure it can be handled promptly."

"Sometimes the doctor will ask the patients to pay his bill and then file his own claim for reimbursement under medicare. The patient then needs to complete a Request for Payment which is a simple form designed to obtain only enough information for the insurance company to identify the person. He then mails this request with his itemized receipted bills to the insurance company which is under contract to handle these payments."

"Delays in receiving payments may occur when the receipts are not complete enough to enable the insurance company to determine how much to pay," Thomas added. "The itemized bills must show the date treatment was received, the place of treatment (home, office, hospital, etc.) the nature of treatment received, the charges for each service, and the amount paid."

Personal assistance in completing the first claim under medicare may be obtained by visiting or writing to the Social Security Administration, 516 First National Bank Building, Odessa, Texas 79760.

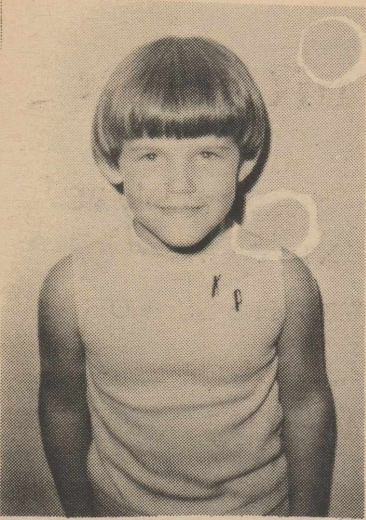

NEWS FROM THE E.B. BAKERS' IN EUROPE

7-13-67

Here we are in Cologne, Germany waiting for our plane. We are running about three hours late from New York to Cologne.

7-15-67

Dearest Mother-in-law, Mother, Grandmother, Great Grandmother, and grandmother-in-law, We arrived here fine except for being four hours late. Our German plane had engine trouble before we left New York and that threw us one hour late getting to Koln, Germany, so we missed our plane from Koln, to Frankfurt and the next plane didn't leave until 11:05 a. m., but we called Connie and Ken from Koln. They had to wait nearly four hours on us. Ken was supposed to be back at the base. Ken borrowed a friend's volkswagon station wagon so he could have all of us and the luggage.

I got up and walked to town at 4 a. m. for cigarettes. I didn't have any German money for the cigarette machine, so I walked and walked until I found a Shell station open to get some change. He wouldn't take American silver but did take an American dollar bill. To cap that off he couldn't speak English and I couldn't speak German, but I finally did get some cigarettes. 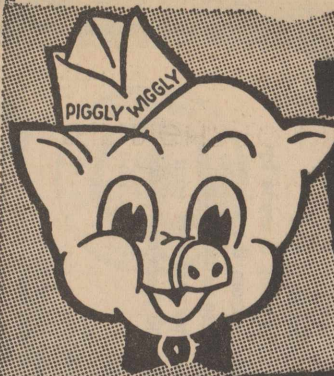

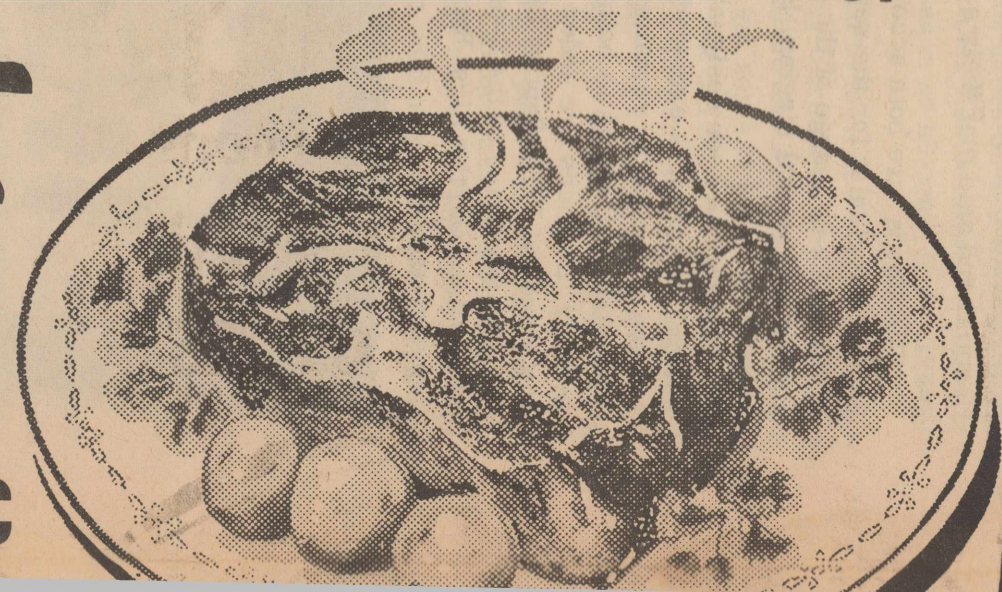

LETTER HOME FROM THE TRAVELING FOLK OF SEMINOLE

'A LUAU'

"YOU HAVE TO HAVE A 'RICH PIG' TO HAVE A LUAU." Once upon a time there were three pigs. One stayed at home and raised a family. The second little pig made a teacher. And the third little pig went to Hawaii, became known as the 'Rich Pig', and went to an LUAU. (Someone said to me, "In Texas don't you say rich food". I said, yes. "Well, here we use rich like you would use fat. YOU HAVE TO HAVE A FAT PIG".

O.K. On with the story. The pig, you cook. "YOU HAVE TO HAVE POI TO HAVE A GOOD LUAU". "FISH TOO, RAW". "AND GREEN COCONUT, CHICKEN LIVERS, CRAB, AND ON AND ON."

Let me tell you about that 'POI' first and I will get back to that third little pig. You say it Po-eee. It is made from Taro roots that has been pounded into powder that is very starchy. It looks like thick clabber with a little chocolate added. (I put sugar in mine on a suggestion from Mrs. Terry Fung, Box 595, Waimea, Kauai. She also was the one that said you have to have a rich pig. Readers, you have her address if you would like to check this out. Zip # 96796.) That sugar helped the POI and we got along fine. They eat it here in Hawaii like a lot of people eat rice, and Fred Barrett and I eat potatoes. You can buy it in all the grocery stores put up in a plastic bag.

Mama, please stroke me gently on the back, that piece of raw fish is not going either way.

The Hawaiians prepare for the cook-out for the fat pig just like a lot of people do for a barbecue. They dig out a place in the ground, build a big fire, placing stones among the wood to heat up. After several hours they bring the 100 pound pig dressed and ready to cook. They spread the fire back, place heated stones in the pig, season it, wrap it in banana leaves so it will help hold the moisture, add moisture sacks, put more fire and hot rocks on top of all that, and cover with earth. They are sure that none of the steam escapes. Some said four hours, some six, and some said it was 8 hours that they cooked it.

One fellow said (his name was Joe) "I never left one that I was not hungry".

Well, I am here to testify, I left full. That 'Rich pig' was good. I am glad he came to Hawaii.

It is said of Captain Cook upon being introduced to 'Poi', "It tastes like wallpaper paste."

"If you people of Seminole buy any wallpaper paste from Pittmans Builders Supply or Forrest Lumber Company and it is chocolate brown, just add a little sugar and try it."

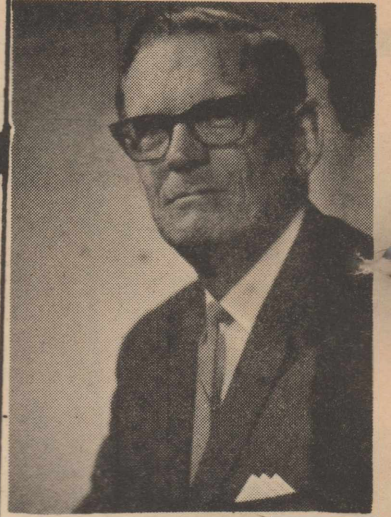

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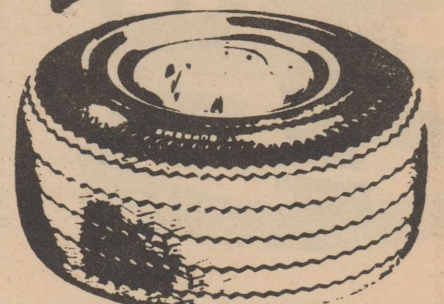

"THE DAY DEATH RODE THE FENDER WITH ME"

It was such a beautiful day. Warm, Sunny. A quiet, peaceful day, as only Sunday in June can be. And a very special day at that, because it was my wife's and my thirteenth wedding anniversary.

But our happiness on this special occasion was overshadowed by thoughts of an even happier event coming up. Next Friday would be Barbara's birthday. She was going to be five years old.

As we pulled out of the gate, Barbara shouted above the noise of the tractor engine, "Daddy, are you going to get me a bicycle for my birthday--just like Chippy's?"

"Yes, darling, I'll buy you a bicycle this week," I shouted back. "You'll have it in time for your birthday."

We were spending the weekend on our farm--my wife, my daughter and I--just as we did practically every weekend the weather permitted. Chippy, Barbara's six-year-old friend, was also staying with us.

Usually we would be in church at this time. Barbara never missed Sunday school. Except today... Chippy was there, and they were having so much fun, and the time seemed so short... well, today for the first time in a long while, she didn't go.

I didn't go either. I'd been sick the previous week and hadn't gotten as much done as I hoped. We'd just had several heavy rains, and grass and weeds were really growing. I wanted to keep the place looking nice.

It wouldn't take me long--not with that brand new tractor and rotary shredder. I had gotten an early start and by ten o'clock the road leading to the house and I'd be done.

I mowed one side of the road, then pulled up to the house to remind my wife to have lunch ready early, as we had to deliver some cattle right after noon.

As I got ready to pull out again, Chippy ran up and cried, "Let me ride. I want to ride."

What are you going to do? He was almost in tears, "All right," I agreed. "Climb on and we'll finish mowing along the road."

My daughter was standing off to the side drinking a soda pop. Chippy called over her, "Come on Barbara, let's ride the tractor."

Barbara didn't really want to ride. She hadn't finished her drink and didn't know what to do with it. The boy kept begging her, so I said "Come on Barbara, set the soda pop down and let's go. We'll be right back."

I lifted her up. She made Chippy get off the left fender and over on the right. "This is my fender, Daddy, isn't it?" She was an old hand when it came to riding the tractor.

I guess I'm typical of lots of weekend farmers. We live in Dallas. I own an office equipment company that I built up from nothing--starting out forty years ago with \$44.

I was even president of the National Office Machine Dealers Association some 10 years ago. I really do love my work.

But we always looked forward to the weekends--to spending all Saturday and Sunday together in the country, looking after our registered Angus cattle, plowing and mowing, working hard, and getting close to the soil. Boy, that's the life.

I threw the shredder in gear and the blades bit into the soft, pithy weeds. The ditch is fairly wide and not too steep. It was a smooth ride.

I looked proudly at my daughter. She looked very pretty in that brand new dress, one of our country neighbors had given her for her birthday.

"Aren't we having fun, Chippy?" Barbara called out. "Isn't it great to ride on the tractor?"

And then it happened. I didn't see the hole the rain had washed out until just before the front wheel was about to hit it. I'm not sure what happened next. Either I stamped on the brakes or the front wheel hit the hole. Barbara lost her hold on the fender and flipped forward head over heels. I just knew that giant wheel would crush her.

It didn't. The wheel just missed her. It ran over her feet; but with those big new treads on the tire, it didn't crush her.

"Thank God," I breathed. "It missed her." I must have been in shock already. In my relief that the wheel hadn't caught her, I never once thought about the shredder only feet back that would hit her in a split second later.

Somehow I got the tractor stopped, and just sat there--the world spinning about me.

I don't know how much time elapsed, but I remember Chippy, still on the other fender, screaming, "It killed her! It killed her!"

What do you tell a mother as you carry the lifeless body of her daughter into the house? How do you drown out the screams of the most precious possession you ever had echoing in your ears night after night?

I've had a lot of time to reflect on what has happened. I've gained new respect for tractors--and other farm machinery as well. Maybe what I have learned will be of value to other farmers--weekend or full time--who never give much thought to accidents. I never did, and I've run a tractor for 14 years.

Review those rules of safe tractor operation. And above all, keep the kids off the tractor. (Tractors aren't toys. Sure, they're easy to drive and fun to ride, and youngsters are just naturally attracted to them.)

Those fenders serve a useful purpose, but they are not designed for kids (or adults) to sit on, regardless of how convenient and attractive they look. I've started a personal campaign to get every tractor manufacturer to post a warning on each fender: "Danger! Do not permit children to ride on fenders." Two manufacturers have consented to place such a warning on their equipment.

Do you know that Barbara was the third child in a 60-mile radius of our ranch that was killed in a tractor accident within a 90-day period? We've had letters from parents all over the country who have lost a child through tractor accidents.

But there is no one who can stop this senseless tragedy from reoccurring except the tractor operators themselves.

It won't be too long until a whole year will have passed since it happened. Most memories gradually fade away, but this kind never leaves you. Every time you stumble over an old toy, run across a photo in the family album, or hear the laugh of a happy child, the pain returns.

The weather will be warming up soon, spring rains will fall, weeds will be growing. Tractors, shredders, and mowers will be humming again.

People, without thinking, will be eager to ride a child, grandchild, friend, or relative on a tractor.

They always look so cute--the little things on that big tractor. It thrills the child and it thrills the parents and grandparents.

But in one brief, terrifying second, a thrill can be turned into a kill. Just ask me. I know.

The county farm leader said that the accidental death rate for farm residents has increased since 1961. "If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort," Fowler continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today. He also said that farm and ranch families can reduce these costly farm accidents by using some of the tools of safety, such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, and SMV emblems.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Lawrence said: "All citizens of Gaines County are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities.

"Farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of approximately 150 fatalities and thousands more suffer painful disabling injuries each year in Texas, plus the great economic loss, causes profound physical and psychological damage by members of farm families that are involved."

"During this special week, statewide farm accidents prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, 4-H Clubs, the Texas Safety Association, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Gaines County Farm Bureau, with the theme "Think and Act Safely".

County Farm Bureau President Oscar Fowler said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week; Sunday - reverence for life; Monday - safety begins at home; Tuesday - agricultural chemicals; Wednesday - prevent falls; Thursday - rural highway safety; Friday - farm machinery; Saturday - recreation safety.

Mrs. Lona Wallace from San Angelo come to see Mr. and Mrs. Jettie Burk this week.

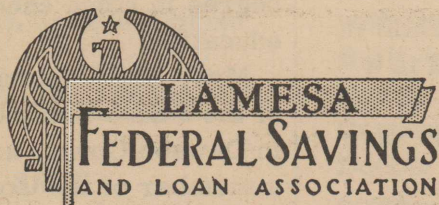

**PARCEL POST DELIVERY
6 DAYS A WEEK**

Postmaster Jewell F. Cobb today announced that parcel post deliveries in Seminole has been expanded from five to six days a week as of July 20. This is in line with a recent directive from Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien following the signing of the Post Office Department appropriation bill by President Johnson. The legislation contains an \$8.5 million item for restoration of the six-day a week delivery which had been cut back in May 1964 as an economy measure.

Nearly 5000 cities are affected, Postmaster Cobb said.

The Seminole postal official noted that the improved service will remove an inequity for many business and residential routes.

Postal customers served by "motorized" letter carriers have been receiving six-days deliveries all along. They were not covered by the 1964 cut back inasmuch as carries on vehicles can deliver parcels of any size. Customers living on routes serviced by foot carriers have received larger parcels from a five-day a week parcel post route covered by a truck. Carriers on foot only deliver small packages.

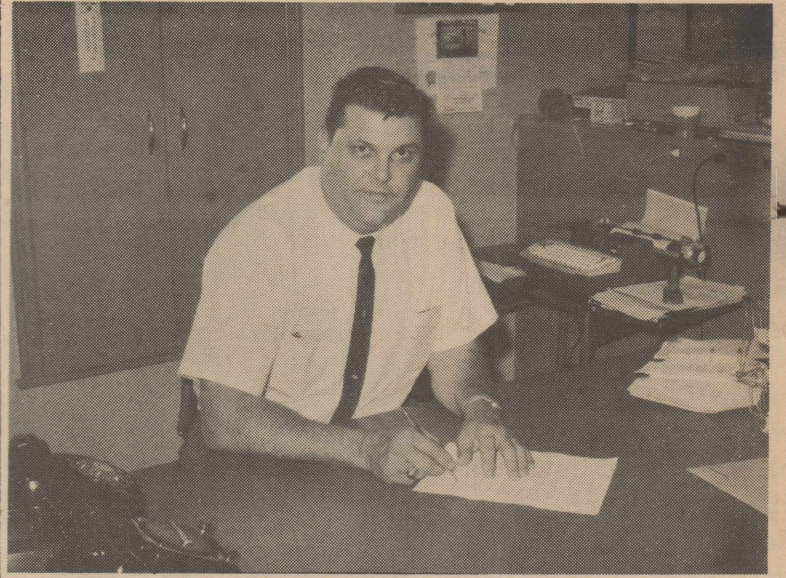

Many people do not realize that earnings of babysitters who work in private homes must be reported and social security taxes be paid if their earnings from one employer amount to as much as \$50 cash paid in any calendar quarter, H. P. Thomas, social security district manager in Odessa, said today.

This means that babysitters or any other workers in a private home (such as maids, cooks, gardeners, and the like), who work for the same employer often enough to earn at least \$4 a week have the same protection under the law as workers in commerce and industry. An employee is never too young or too old to be covered under social security, Thomas said. Every employer who has household help that meets this requirement should:

1. Make a record of the employee's social security number.
2. Deduct social security taxes from the employee's earnings each week or payday.
3. File the quarterly report with Internal Revenue Service including both the employee's and employer's share of the tax.

Domestic employees or employers who wish additional information about social security protection or the filing of the quarterly reports should get in touch with the social security office at Odessa or the nearest representative of Internal Revenue Service.

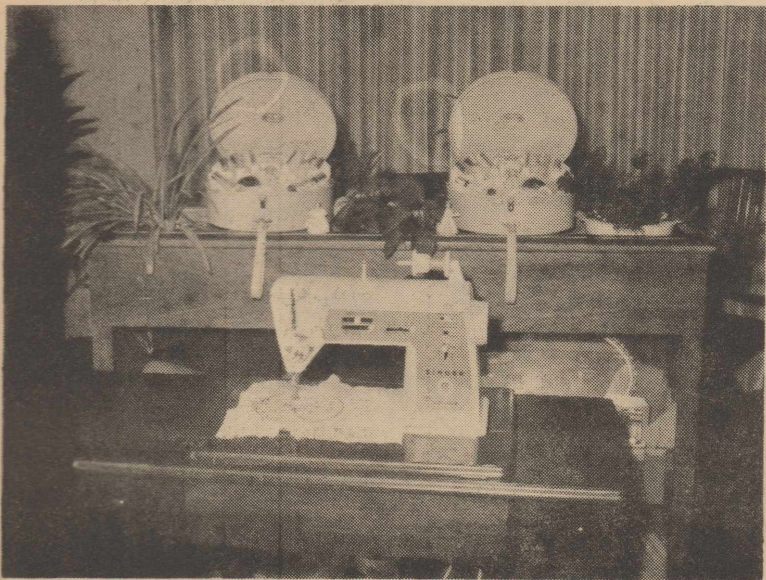

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

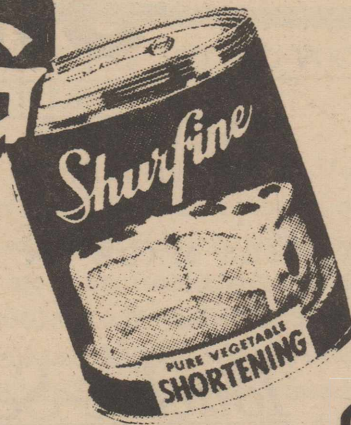
