SOUTH PLAINS COTTON HARVEST 75 to 80 PER CENT COMPLETE

Ideal weather conditions this week enabled South Plains farmers to continue the cotton har vest and 75 to 80 per cent of the crop was out according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

The three South Plains offices classed 260, 000 samples during the week ending Wednesday, December 6th. The Lubbock office classed 223, 000 of this total, the Brownfield office 26, 000 and the Lamesa office 11, 000.

Through Wednesday, December 6th the three offices had classed 766,000 samples of this year's crop and had 20,000 samples on hand. This brought the total classed and received by the three offices to 786, 000.

At this date last year 1, 062, 000 samples of the 1966 crop had been classed.

Cotton prices, as reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA, were higher for the better micronaire cotton last Monday and Tuesday and remained steady the remainder of the week. Prices for this cotton ranged from \$6.50 per bale over the loan for high grade, short staple cotton to \$75.00 per bale over the loan for high grade cotton having staple length of 1-3/32 and longer. Demand continued strongest for cotton having micronaire of 3.3 and better, and this cotton was selling at a greater premium over the loan. Cotton in the lower micronaire categories was generally selling at \$5.00 to \$15.00 per bale over the loan.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Middling 15/16 -20.95, Middling 31/32 -24.05, Middling 1-Inch -26.60, Strict Low Middling 15/16 - 19.95, Strict Middling Light Spotted Low Middling 31/32 - 22. of the fields at mid-week 35, Strict Low Middling 1-Inch - 24.60, Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 20. 10, Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 22.60 and

The public is invited to come by the Center at any time that it is open to view these decorations.





We immediately began our preparation to move "out west." We secured a box car, storing our household goods in one end and plow tools, a flock of chickens, and twelve cows in the other end.

For our own transportation, we rigged up two covered wagons. The first one had a rug on the floor and a small heater for warmth. The two mattresses were rolled up to sit on in the daytime and spread out to sleep on at night. The second wagon was loaded with feed for the stock and a chuckwagon kit at back. Our eleven-year-old son was to ride a saddle horse so that he could drive twenty head of young mules we had gathered up through the past two years to sell and help pay for the farm. By December 23, we were ready to start out.

I had gone to Abilene a few days previously to Woolworth's Christmas shopping. That was the first year the store opened there and for \$5.00 you could buy as much as you can now for \$110.00.

In 1931 Seminole had the one building that is presently the Junior High School Building, which has been added onto since then. The school was served by four busses which carried between 100 - 125 students. Eighty-five thousand dollars worth of bonds were voted and not nearly all of it was spent to build this building. One trustee said, "Seminole will never need to build another school building."

As the buildings grew, so have the busses and the bus routes. Today the school system owns twenty-five busses and runs fifteen routes. They drive between 1500-1600 miles a day or an average of about 100 miles per route. They travel approximately 275, 000 miles per year. Six hundred and four students make up the passengers on the fifteen routes.

Of the twenty-five busses, two are 1957; three are 1967; the balance were bought in 1958, 1959, and 1960.


