He told me later --be sure your right and if you can't whip them, you can always get good help.

In a School Board election the County Comissioners Court canvasses the vote.


Resolutions were passed pertaining to several questions involving district races, but having no bearing on this section of West Texas.







When school bells ring next fall for the start of the new school year, a face familiar to Seminole pupils for over two decades will be missing from the local scene. Mrs. W. D. Webb, cafeteria manager, is retiring at the end of the 1967-1968 school year after twenty-four years of service with the Seminole Schools.

Kate, as this pleasant, dark-haired, brown-eyed lady is affectionately known, first went to work in the school cafeteria in 1944. The hot lunch program had been in existence in Seminole less than one year and the cafeteria building was a former beer parlor which had closed when the county voted dry during World War II. Moved to the campus, this structure, known as "El Patio" during its night clubbing days, was used until 1951 when the cafeteria in the primary building was completed.

In 1947, Kate was promoted to manager of a staff of seven ladies who fed about 550 pupils daily. In her twenty years as manager, she has seen this grow to a force of sixteen, including some part-time help, feeding over 1200 pupils each school day in two cafeterias, one on the central campus and one at the F.J.Young Elementary School.

Kate remembers that she was hanging our her washing one day in the summer of 1947 when the Superintendent, Ted Edwards, came into her back yard to offer her the job as cafeteria manager. She had originally planned to stop working that year in order to devote more time to her family, but after first hesitating, she wound up as manager because the kids at school needed her too.

When asked if she could make some kind of estimate as to the number of meals served under her managership, she replied, "Why, I can tell you exactly, let me look in my book here as I have kept a running count since my first day". After checking the latest figure, she revealed that through March 13 of this year, 4, 023, 347 lunches had been served to Seminole school kids since that day in 1947 when she became manager.

Kate was born in Parker County near Weatherford and in 1920 was married to W.D.Webb. For the first eight years of the marriage her husband worked for the railroads, but in 1928 he left railroading and moved the Webb family from Texline to northwest Gaines County where the Webbs farmed and ranched until 1944 when they moved to Seminole. Mr.Webb died in 1962 after a lengthy illness.

Mrs. Webb is the mother of nine children: Mrs. Roaslie Jones of Seminole; Mrs. Frances Klahn of Abilene; Mrs. Betty Estes, who died in 1962; Mrs. Dorothy Belknap of Midland; Bill, of Seminole; Mrs. Mary Lois Hood, Iowa City, Iowa; Sammy of Seminole; Mrs. Sue Gwaltney, Madrid, Spain; and Mrs. Joann Cargill, Brownfield. The Webb girls were all known as local beauties and Kate laughed that things got a little tense around the Webb household in 1939 when four of the five class nominees for Tepee Queen were her daughters. At that time the eighth grade was eligible to submit a nominee. However, she said that when the youngest of the four, Dorothy, won, the others were all good sports and were proud of their little sister too. Later in 1954, the School annual was dedicated to Mrs. Webb. She felt that this was one of her high points in life. When asked what she planned to do on retirement, she replied with a twinkle in her eye. "Well, I think that for about a year I'll just sit in a chair with my arms folded and rock". Those who know her energy and enthusiasm take this with a grain of salt for they cannot imagine Kate sitting and doing nothing. Ceramics is a hobby Mrs. Webb throughly enjoys and she turns out professional-looking ash trays, vases, and lamps in her workshop built on to her home. In addition to her ceramic work, she plans to do some more traveling and presently plans another visit to Spain in December of this year.




Contestants were judged on knowledge of foods and nutrition information, the food exhibited the menu for one day, and recipe.
